GAOLS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight
Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath,
Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of
Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria passed in the twenty-seventh year of Her Majesty's reign (No. 219), intituled, *An Act to consolidate the Law relating to Gaols*, it is amongst other things enacted that all buildings, erections, houses, enclosed places, and premises hereafter to be erected, built, enclosed, purchased, enlarged, or maintained at the public expense as and for public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments within Victoria; which are from time to time proclaimed by the Governor in Council, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, as such public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, or penal establishments, shall, from and after the publication of such notice, be severally deemed and taken to be the public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments (hereinafter called "gaols"), respectively, of the place or district where the same are situated, and shall be subject to the several provisions made for the regulation, discipline, management, and care of the public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments already erected (also hereinafter called "gaols"), and of the prisoners confined within the same; and it is also enacted that, except where it is otherwise proclaimed by the Governor in Council, every gaol shall be and be taken for all purposes as being equally a house of correction and a prison for debtors, and also every house of correction shall be taken to be a prison: And whereas it is expedient to proclaim the premises hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the provisions of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power and authority conferred by the said Act, and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim, declare, and notify that the buildings, erections, houses, enclosed places, and premises, situate in the places hereinafter described, which have been erected, built, enclosed, purchased, enlarged, or maintained at the public expense, as and for public gaols, prisons, and houses of correction, are such public gaols, prisons, and houses of correction, within the meaning and in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:-

BEECHWORTH GAOL—Comprising all buildings, erections, houses, enclosed places, and premises on the following site, viz.:-Five acres and thirty-six perches, county unnamed parish of Beechworth, being portion of block 23, township of Beechworth: Commencing at the southernmost angle of block 23; bounded on the south-west by Williams street, bearing N. 50° 45' W. five chains; on the north-west by Ford street, bearing N. 12° 40' E. eight chains fifty-nine links; on the north-east by a line bearing S. 50° 45' E. eight chains seventy-one links; and on the south-east by High street, bearing S. 38° 15' W. seven chains seventy links to the point of commencement.

RICHMOND GAOL—Comprising all buildings, erections, houses, enclosed places, and premises on the following site, viz.:-Nine acres, more or less, in the county of Bourke, parish of North Melbourne: Commencing at the north-east angle of the site, being a point formed by the junction of the south side

of the Wellington parade with the west side of the Punt road: bounded on the east by the said road, bearing south ten chains eighteen links; on the south by a line bearing N. 83° 58' W. eight chains ninety-two links; on the west by a line bearing north ten chains; and on the north by the south side of the before-mentioned parade, bearing east eight chains ninety-two links to the point of commencement.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this sixth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign.

THE SUBDIVISIONS OF THE SEYMOUR ROAD DISTRICT.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the sixth day of February, 1865.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act*, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board, for any original or proclaimed district thereafter sometimes called "single district," the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall within three months after the receipt of the same divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions, hereinafter called subdivisions, by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of April, 1863, a road district was proclaimed under the designation of "The Seymour Road District," and the boundaries of the said road district, as at present existing, are defined in another Proclamation bearing date the thirtieth day of January, 1865: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by not less than twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said road district, praying for the division of the same into three subdivisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order divide the Seymour Road District into three separate electoral subdivisions in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:-

THE AVENEL SUBDIVISION—Commencing at the north-east angle of Banks and Boyd's pre-emptive right; thence due east to a point south of the south-east angle of Jones' pre-emptive right; thence north to and by the eastern boundary of said pre-emptive right to the southern boundary of the township reserve of Avenel; thence by the southern, eastern, and northern boundaries of the said reserve to the eastern boundary of section B of the parish of Avenel; thence by the eastern boundary of said section to its north-east angle; thence west and south by the northern boundaries of sections B and A and the western boundary of section A of the said parish to Hughes' Creek; thence westerly by Hughes' Creek to the Goulburn River; thence southerly by that river to the Stony Creek; thence southerly by the Stony Creek to the commencing point.

THE SEYMOUR SUBDIVISION—Commencing at a point two miles west of the north-west angle of Banks and Boyd's pre-emptive right; thence east to said north-west angle; thence further east by the north boundary of said section and a direct line to a point due south of the south-east angle of Jones' pre-emptive right; thence by a line due south to the Goulburn River, at the south-east angle of Worrough pre-emptive section; thence northerly and westerly by the Goulburn River to the Sugar Loaf Creek; thence by the said creek south-westerly to a point due south of the commencing point; thence by a line north to the said commencing point.

THE TALLAROOK SUBDIVISION—Commencing at the south-west angle of the parish of Lowry; thence due north to the Sugar Loaf Creek; thence northerly by the Sugar Loaf Creek to the Goulburn River; thence south-easterly by the Goulburn River to the south-east angle of Worrough pre-emptive right; thence by a line south to a point due east of the south-east angle of the parish of Lowry; thence west to the said south-east angle; thence westerly by the south boundary of the parish of Lowry to the commencing point.

And the Honorable James Forrester Sullivan shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

SHIRE OF CRESWICK.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—TO PROVIDE FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE AFFAIRS OF THE COUNCIL OF THE SHIRE OF CRESWICK.

AT every ordinary meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading of and putting for confirmation the minutes of any preceding meeting, and no discussion shall be allowed thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes, when confirmed, shall be signed by the president, or, in his absence, by the chairman of the meeting.

2. The order of the business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as practicable:—

1. Reading copies of letters sent.
2. Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
3. Reception and reading petitions and memorials.
4. Reading and ordering on reports of committees and officers.
5. Orders of the day.
6. Motions of which previous notice has been duly given.
7. Examination and passing accounts for payment.
8. Reading notices of motions for future meetings.

3. Every petition or memorial addressed to the council shall be in proper form, and must be presented by a councillor who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded, and no debate shall take place thereon, except as to its being received and taken into consideration after the orders of the day or at any future meeting, or if necessary that it be referred to a committee.

4. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the president shall think fit to bring under consideration.

5. Every notice of motion shall be given to the secretary in writing, and shall be read aloud at the meeting previous to that in which the same is to be taken into consideration, and every notice of motion shall be considered in the order in which it is given.

6. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be considered unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some other councillor authorized by him, be present when the business is called on, and notices not so proceeded with shall be struck off the notice paper.

7. The mover of any motion which shall be referred to a committee, shall for the occasion be a member of such committee.

8. Every councillor shall stand up while addressing the president.

9. The president's ruling shall be final in all matters of order or practice.

10. Every motion or amendment shall be entered on the minutes, with the names of the mover and seconder, and on a division thereon the votes shall be recorded, if required by any councillor.

11. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, one other may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote, but upon any amendment being carried, it shall be competent for any councillor to move one other amendment thereon.

12. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council, but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next ordinary meeting of the council.

13. No councillor shall speak more than once on the same question, except by way of explanation or reply on an original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of an amendment last proposed, and after the reply, the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be put to the vote.

14. Every councillor, when proposing a motion or amendment, or speaking on any matter, shall address the president, and shall not be interrupted except called to order, whereupon he shall sit down until the question of order shall have been decided; the councillor in possession of the chair may then resume the subject.

15. Any councillor who shall refuse to obey when ruled out of order, or shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, and who, if required by the president, shall refuse to withdraw such expression and make satisfactory apology, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, to be recovered before any two or more justices of the peace.

16. Any councillor may, with the consent of the president, require the secretary to take down the particular words used by a councillor immediately upon the same being uttered.

17. Any councillor may record his protest against any resolution of the council, on giving notice of his intention so to do on the adoption of the resolution, and on such councillor entering his protest and his reasons for the same in a book to be kept for that purpose in the office of the council, and on his signing the same before the next meeting of the council. Provided always, that such protest may be expunged, if decided by a majority of the council, not to be in accordance with truth, or not to be in terms respectful to the council.

18. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until six clear days' notice shall have been given in some local newspaper, inviting applications for the same; or unless the salary or allowances attaching to such office shall have been fixed before proceeding to such election.

19. All contracts shall be made by tender, unless the council shall otherwise direct. All tenders shall be addressed to the president, and only opened at the time of their consideration by the council. The respective amounts, with the names of the parties tendering, shall, in every case, be entered on the minutes of the council. When any tender shall have been accepted by the council, the person tendering, or some one on his behalf, shall pay a deposit in accordance with a schedule hereto attached, into the hands of the treasurer, which amount shall be returned to the contractor, when he obtains a final certificate from the engineer that the works under such contract are satisfactorily completed.

20. All payments shall be made by cheque, and signed by the president and one other councillor, and countersigned by the treasurer, or such other person as the council may appoint; and no cheque shall be given unless the account for which it is payment shall have been passed at a meeting of the council.

21. The shire office shall be open every day, except Saturdays, and the days excepted by the Local Government Act, between the hours of ten and three, during which hours the secretary shall attend to transact the ordinary business of the council. The engineer shall attend during the hours of business at every meeting of the council.

22. The valuers appointed by the council shall visit and examine every rateable property within the shire; and after having valued such property, shall deliver, or cause to be delivered to the owner thereof, a notice setting forth the amount at which such property is valued, together with other particulars sufficient to describe such property, and every such notice shall be signed by the valuers.

23. The secretary, engineer, rate collector, and thistle inspector, shire inspector, and other officers, shall furnish official reports to the council each ordinary meeting.

THE copies of the standard weights and measures shall be entrusted to the custody of the Shire Inspector for the time being, who shall give security to the council for the proper use and safe custody of the same, as also the due payment of all monies received by him, and the surrender of the said weights,

measures, and all other things the property of the corporation, when he may be required so to do.

The inspector shall attend at the Shire Office every Monday from Ten o'clock in the forenoon till Three o'clock in the afternoon, unless such day shall be appointed a public holiday, or that he may of necessity be absent, when he shall attend at the earliest possible date, a notice of which shall be posted on the door of the council chamber, or such other building, in which the council may have deposited the said authorised copies; and when the said inspector is so in attendance he shall examine, compare, and stamp, if necessary, all weights and measures which may be brought to him, and shall demand and take such fees for so doing as are mentioned in the schedule of this bye-law marked A.

The inspector shall travel through the district, or any place adjoining thereto, at such specified times as he may be directed by the council, notice of which shall be given by placards posted up in the localities to be visited at least seven days before such visitation; and on such occasions the period of the inspector's stay having been published, he shall examine, compare, and stamp, if necessary, all weights and measures which he may be requested, and shall demand and receive such fees for so doing as are mentioned in the schedule of this bye-law marked B.

The inspector shall on or before the third day of each month make a return to the treasurer of the shire of all monies received by him during the past month, shewing the several particulars for which the same were received, the number of prosecutions under the Act, and how the same were disposed of. He shall also keep a diary of the whole of the transactions under this Act.

If any person shall refuse to pay the inspector the fees for examining, comparing, and stamping any weights and measures, after having requested him to do so, he shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Twenty shillings, in addition to the amount of fees, and which may be recovered before any two or more justices of the peace, and the inspector shall be at liberty to detain the said weights or measures until the fees are paid.
