**"THE DISEASED CATTLE ACT 1861."—NEW ZEALAND.**

THE following Regulations made by His Honor the Superintendent of Canterbury, under the above recited Act, are published for general information.

**PROCLAMATION.**

By His Honor SAMUEL BEALEY, Esq., rescinding a certain Proclamation under "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861." WHEREAS on the twenty-third day of September, 1865, I, SAMUEL BEALEY, Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, did, by virtue of the powers vested in me in that behalf, issue a Proclamation declaring certain districts to be infected districts under "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," and making certain regulations for the destruction of diseased cattle, and for the preventing the removal or transportation of cattle from the said infected districts into the Province of Canterbury. Now therefore I, SAMUEL BEALEY, Superintendent as aforesaid, do hereby rescind the said Proclamation.

Given under my hand, and issued under the public seal of the Province, at Christchurch, this twenty-seventh day of November, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

**PROCLAMATION.**

By His Honor SAMUEL BEALEY, Esq., Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, appointing Quarantine Ground under "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861."

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intitled "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," it is (*inter alia*) enacted that the Governor might by order in Council, from time to time appoint places for quarantine grounds under the said Act, and make regulations for the management of such quarantine grounds, and fixing the fees and charges thereof; and for the destroying of diseased cattle, and for landing and driving of cattle under the said Act, and generally for regulating and enforcing the performance of duties thereby imposed on Inspectors and on Masters of ships or vessels.

And whereas the Governor in Council hath by warrant under his hand delegated, to me SAMUEL BEALEY, so long as I shall hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, the several powers vested in the Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act, subject to being rescinded as in the said Act is provided, and subject to the regulations issued by the Governor in Council.

Now, therefore, I, the said SAMUEL BEALEY, by virtue of the powers vested in me, do hereby appoint all that portion of the Province of Canterbury, to the west of the dividing range, to be a quarantine ground under the said Act.

**PROCLAMATION.**

By His Honor SAMUEL BEALEY, Esq., Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, declaring certain districts to be infected under "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861."

WHEREAS by "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," it was provided that the Governor in Council might by warrant under his hand from time to time delegate to the Superintendent of any Province within the said colony all or any of the powers vested in the Governor, or Governor in Council, by the said Act, subject to such regulations as he might think fit, and might from time to time rescind such delegation.

And whereas the said Governor hath with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegated to SAMUEL BEALEY, Esq., so long as he shall hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, the several powers vested in the said Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act. Subject to being rescinded, as in the said Act provided, and subject to the regulations issued by the Governor, on the eighteenth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-five; and to any other regulations to be from time to time duly made.

Now, therefore, I, the said SAMUEL BEALEY, by virtue of such powers in me vested, do hereby proclaim and declare that after the date hereof, the several colonies of Australia (that is to say, the colony of Victoria, of New South Wales, of Queensland, of South Australia, and Western Australia, as well as the colony of Tasmania, and the colony of the Cape of Good Hope, and the Islands of Great Britain and Ireland, shall be deemed to be infected districts within the meaning of the said Act. And I do further proclaim and declare the following regulations for prohibiting the importation of cattle into the colony of New Zealand, from such districts, and for the landing or driving of such cattle, destroying of diseased cattle, imported, landed, or driven contrary to these regulations:—

1. If any person shall import any cattle from either or any of the said infected districts into the colony of New Zealand, unless upon quarantine ground, and after having obtained from an Inspector of Cattle a quarantine certificate he shall be liable to a penalty of fifty pounds for every head of cattle so imported into the colony of New Zealand.

2. If any person shall land or cause to be landed, or assist in landing any cattle coming from either of the said infected districts in or upon any part of the colony of New Zealand, unless upon a quarantine ground, and after having obtained a quarantine certificate he shall be liable to a penalty of fifty pounds for every head of cattle so landed.

3. It shall be lawful for, and the duty of any Inspector of Cattle, or Police Constable to destroy, or cause to be destroyed any cattle which shall be imported or landed contrary to these regulations.

4. If any person shall wilfully impede or obstruct any Inspector of Cattle, or any Police Constable acting under the authority of these regulations every person so offending shall, and may be seized and detained by such person so acting as aforesaid, or any person or persons he may call to his assistance, until such offender or offenders can be taken before two justices of the peace, and shall be liable to a penalty of fifty pounds.

**PROCLAMATION.**

By His Honor SAMUEL BEALEY, Esq., Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, declaring certain districts to be infected under "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861."

WHEREAS by "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," it was provided that the Governor in Council might, by warrant under his hand, from time to time delegate to the Superintendent of any Province within the said colony, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor or Governor in Council by the said Act, subject to such regulations as he might think fit, and might from time to time rescind such delegation. And whereas the said Governor hath, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegated to SAMUEL BEALEY, Esquire, so long as he shall hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, the several powers vested in the said Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act, subject to being rescinded as in the said Act provided, and subject to the regulations issued by the Governor in Council on the eighteenth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and to any other regulations to be from time to time duly made:—

Now, therefore, I, Samuel Bealey, by virtue of such powers in me vested, do hereby proclaim and declare, that after the date hereof the several provinces of the colony of New Zealand, that is to say, the provinces of Otago and of Southland, in the Middle Island, and the provinces of Auckland and of Taranaki in the North Island, shall be deemed to be infected districts within the meaning of the said Act. And I do further proclaim and declare the following regulations for the destruction of diseased cattle, and for the preventing and regulating the removal or transportation of cattle from the said several infected districts into the province of Canterbury:—

1. If any person shall import, drive, or remove, or cause to be imported, driven, or removed, or assist in driving, or removing any cattle from either of the said infected districts into the province of Canterbury, except upon quarantine ground, and the authority of a quarantine certificate, such person shall be liable to a penalty of fifty pounds for every head of cattle so imported, driven, or removed.

2. It shall be lawful for any Inspector of Cattle or Police Constable to destroy, or cause to be destroyed, any cattle which shall pass into this province from either of the said districts contrary to these regulations.

3. If any person shall wilfully impede or obstruct any Inspector, or any Police Constable acting under the authority of these regulations, every person so offending shall and may be seized and detained by such person so acting as aforesaid, or any person or persons he may call to his assistance, until such offender or offenders can be taken before two justices of the peace, and shall be liable to a penalty of fifty pounds.

REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER, 1865.

ACTUAL Daily Mortality of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, embracing a radius of ten miles, and including the Statistical Sub-districts of Melbourne Proper, East Melbourne, North Melbourne and Carlton, Fitz Roy Municipality, East Collingwood, Richmond, Jika-jika parish (exclusive of North Melbourne, Collingwood, and Richmond), South Yarra and Prahran, Emerald Hill and Sandridge, St. Kilda and Brighton, Doutta Galla and Keilor, Boroondara and Heidelberg, Cut-paw-paw parish, and the shipping in Hobson's Bay; also, the Temperature in the shade at Melbourne, deduced from the mean of twenty-four hourly observations taken at the Melbourne Observatory on each day during the month of November, 1865.—

A higher rate of mortality obtained in Melbourne and suburbs during November than in the corresponding month of any year since 1860. The number of deaths was also greater than in any month since last May. The mean temperature of the month was about a degree above the average.

Males and females died in the respective proportions of 56 and 44 per cent. Sixty per cent. of the deaths were of children under five years of age, against 43, 47, 53, 50, and 73 per cent. in the month of November of the previous five years respectively.

Twenty deaths occurred on the 21st, 18 on the 29th, 17 on the 22nd, and 16 on the 2nd and 30th. These were the days of highest mortality. Those of the lowest were the 4th, 8th, and 9th, on each of which there is only a record of five deaths having taken place.

There was no case noted during the month of the death of a person of upwards of 75 years of age. The oldest person who died was a female aged 73 of dropsy.

Twelve violent deaths took place during the month of which 9 were referred to accident, 2 to homicide, and 1 to suicide. The following are the particulars:—Two boys, aged respectively 10 and 12, were drowned in the Yarra; a carpenter aged 22, and a plumber aged 34, were drowned by the upsetting of a boat in Hobson's Bay; a male of unknown occupation, aged 50, a laborer aged 54, and a female attendant at the Yarra Bend, aged about 35, were found drowned in the Yarra; a shoemaker aged 49, whilst under the influence of alcohol, purposely drowned himself in the same river; a boy aged 9, and a girl aged 10, were killed by being passed over by vehicles; a new-born infant was murdered by strangulation, and another by suffocation.

Forty-four deaths, or nearly 14 per cent. of the total, took place in public institutions, as follows:—27 in the Melbourne Hospital, 2 in the Benevolent Asylum, 5 in the Immigrants' Home, 5 in the Industrial Schools, 1 in the Lying-in Hospital, 1 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Royal Park Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Cremorne Lunatic Asylum, and 1 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The following table shows the number of persons of all ages according to the last census, the number of deaths of persons, under and over five years of age, the total at all ages, and the number of deaths to every 1000 of the population during the month of November, in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, and in each of the sub-districts of which it is composed:—

NOTE.—The Melbourne Hospital is in Melbourne Proper, the Benevolent Asylum in North Melbourne and Carlton, the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum in Jika-jika parish (remainder of), and the Industrial Schools in South Yarra and Prahran.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 194, of which 105, or about 54 per cent., were of males; and 89, or nearly 46 per cent., were of females; of those dying 123 were under one year of age, 39 were between one and two years, 11 were between two and three, 9 were between three and four, 7 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 130, of which 77, or rather more than 59 per cent., were males, and 53, or not quite 41 per cent., were females; 14 were between five and ten, 4 were between ten and fifteen, 1 was between fifteen and twenty, 8 were between twenty and twenty-five, 10 were between twenty-five and thirty, 19 were between thirty and thirty-five, 17 were between thirty-five and forty, 14 were between forty and forty-five, 10 were between forty-five and fifty, 11 were between fifty and fifty-five, 9 were between fifty-five and sixty, 8 were between sixty and sixty-five, 4 were between sixty-five and seventy, and 1 was between seventy and seventy-five.

Deaths from zymotic diseases increased from 77 in October to 133 in November. In the former month they were outnumbered by deaths from local affections, but in the latter they were as numerous as deaths from local and constitutional affections combined. The principal increase was in fatal cases of diarrhoea and dysentery, viz., from 11 to 34; of whooping-cough from 30 to 43; of scarlatina and diphtheria, from 17 to 23; of typhus and infantile fever from 6 to 9; and of croup from 5 to 8. Phthisis, the most fatal disease of the constitutional type, caused 25 deaths against 26 in October.

## CONDITIONS.

1. The hay to be open, good, sound, and sweet; the straw to be wheaten and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats (colonial grown) and bran to be sound and sweet and of the best description.

2. The supplies are for police and telegraph horses, and are to be delivered on the order of the officer in charge of the district or station. The quantities stated in the schedule being only approximative, it must be understood that the Government may draw either more or less than those mentioned; and should new telegraph stations be formed or additional horses be required to be stationed in any of the districts tendered for, the supplies required may be drawn from the contractor. The excess over the estimate will not, however, exceed during the whole year 50 per cent. of the estimated quarterly consumption.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. 5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the District, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours of the time specified in the order for delivery, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering the supply, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, ailing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue either to the public service or the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct not exceeding £20, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. It will be competent for the Inspector of Stores on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice only can be given from the first day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th June, 1865; and in the event of a station being discontinued or any change in the supplies required, the contractor will receive the earliest possible intimation.

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time reclaims the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1863* and the now recited Act: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

## RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE OLD CEMETERY, MELBOURNE.

THE following are the Rules and Regulations of this Cemetery.

1. Application for permission to inter in the cemetery can be obtained at the office of the trustees from the officer appointed by them; and when permission is granted, it must be in writing, and delivered to the keeper of the cemetery before the funeral enters the gates.

2. At the time of making the application for permission to inter, the information required in and by schedule A to these rules must be given.

3. The trustees will not undertake to cause graves to be dug, but parties digging or re-opening graves or vaults will be required to do so at their own expense, under the directions of an officer appointed by the trustees.

4. All monuments, vaults, graves, gravestones, and fences must be kept in repair and proper condition by and at the expense of the owners, and if suffered to fall to decay are liable to be removed.

5. Every coffin buried in a vault or brick grave must be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron, and the lid of no coffin shall be within four feet of the surface of the ground.

6. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, and a copy of every epitaph or inscription must be submitted to the trustees for approval, who are required by the 18th section of *The Cemeteries Statute 1864*, to determine and fix the position of any unobjectionable monument which may be proposed to be erected, according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the cemetery in an appropriate manner.

7. No catacombs or wooden fencing will be allowed in future.

8. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

9. The ground will be open daily to the public from sunrise to sunset.

10. The keeper has orders to turn out or take into custody, as the case may require, any person who shall behave indecorously, or commit any trespass or injury to the trees, flowers, or erections, remove grass, or otherwise infringe the Acts relating to the cemetery, or the regulations for the protection of the same; and such person will be proceeded against according to the 34th, 35th, 36th, and 37th sections of *The Cemeteries Statute 1864*.

11. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations, from time to time, in the regulations.

Fifteen out of the twenty-four deaths registered at Collingwood were of children under three years of age. Eight out of the seventeen deaths recorded in South Melbourne occurred in public institutions. Twenty out of the twenty-seven deaths in North Melbourne were of children under three years of age, and the chief causes of mortality were scarlatina, diarrhoea, and whooping cough. Diarrhoea is also very prevalent at Prahran and Richmond.

The tone of the reports generally, however, is more favorable than during the previous week, but the mortality is still very high, and it cannot be too earnestly impressed upon the public mind that no season on record has demanded so much hygienic precaution as does that on which we are now entering.

## SHIRE OF WIMMERA.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE WARRANOOK FARMERS' COMMON.

Passed at a Special Meeting of the Wimmera Shire Council on the 20th of December, A.D. 1865.

ALL persons entitled to commonage on the Warranook Farmers' Common under *The Land Act 1862* and *The Amended Land Act of 1865*, will be allowed to depasture their stock thereon on payment of the following fees, subject to the undermentioned regulations.

2. The fees for horses or mules shall be 10s. per head per annum; for horned cattle 7s. ditto; and for sheep 1s. 6d. ditto; for progeny of sheep, horned cattle, or horses under six months old, free. Pigs and goats not to be allowed on the common.

3. Travellers depasturing stock on the common shall be allowed to run the same free of charge for twenty-four hours, but shall be liable to pay 6d. per head for cattle, 9d. per head for horses and mules, and 2d. per head for sheep for every day beyond that time; but the managers shall always have power to prevent travelling stock remaining on the common for a longer period than twenty-four hours.

4. All fees shall be paid in advance by the half-year or year, to terminate on the 31st March and 30th September in each and every year. The yearly or half-yearly periods herein set forth shall not be divisible in respect to the payment of license fees.

5. Should the fees collected be insufficient to pay the herdsman's wages and other contingencies connected with the management, an additional charge will be made upon each commoner in fair proportion to the number of cattle by him depastured; and each license granted will be under condition that he can be sued for the same, and the amount to be recoverable before any justice of the peace.

6. All holders of stock on the common shall muster them at a time and place to be appointed by the herdsman, of which due notice shall be given, for the purpose of branding the same with the brand of the common, should the herdsman require such to be done.

7. All stock on which the fees have not been paid for ten days after the time when due, or which have not been mustered at the time and place appointed by the herdsman, must be impounded by him at once.

8. The managers or herdsman will not be responsible for any stock which may be depastured on the common.

9. The number of stock depastured by any person on the common may be limited at any time by a resolution of the managers; they must at the same time allow such person fourteen days from the time of notice being given, either by advertisement or otherwise, to remove the stock.

10. No entire horse to be allowed to run on the common.  
11. All bulls, or bull calves over six months old, found running on the common without the consent of the managers, shall be impounded by the herdsman.

12. All trespass fees shall be paid into the general revenue of the common.

13. All dead carcasses found on the common, the owners of which refuse or neglect to remove the same after receiving notice from the managers or herdsman, the managers shall have power to authorise such removal, by burning or otherwise, at the expense of such owners.

14. When any animal is infected with disease, the owner of such animal shall remove the same from the common on receiving twelve hours' notice from the managers or herdsman, and such animal shall not be again put on the common without special permission of the managers; and whether such animal was infected with disease at the time or subsequent to its being licensed to depasture, so soon as it shall be discovered to be infected, it shall in all respects be treated as if it had not been licensed.

15. The managers to meet at least once a month, to transact any business that may come before them.
