THE NEXT GENERAL SESSIONS AT AVOCA AND TALBOT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better administration of Justice in Courts of General Sessions in the Colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, from time to time, to define and appoint by proclamation the times at which such courts shall be holden, and such times to alter or vary as the said Governor shall think fit: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby alter and appoint the times for holding Courts of General Sessions of the Peace at the undermentioned places in manner following, that is to say:-

At Avoca, on Thursday, the twenty-fifth day of May, in the present year, in lieu of the 24th of May aforesaid.

At Talbot, on Wednesday, the seventh day of June, in the present year, in lieu of the 6th day of June aforesaid.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this thirteenth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act*, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and increase (as the case may be) the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:-

BEAC TOWN COMMON.-The land hereafter described shall be and constitute a Town Common for the use of the householders of the town of Beac, viz.:-Six hundred and twenty-two acres, county of Grenville, parish of Ondit, allotments 61, 62, 63, and 64: Commencing at the south-east angle of allotment 61; thence by the north boundary of allotment 24, bearing west eighty chains eleven links; thence by the west boundary of allotment 62, being the parish boundary line, bearing north fifty-three chains ninety-four links; thence by the road, being the west boundary of allotment 64, bearing north-easterly to the north-west angle of said allotment 64; thence by a line bearing east two chains seventy links to Lake Beac; thence by that lake, bearing southerly and easterly to the east boundary line of allotment 63; thence by the said east boundary line and a road bearing south three chains ninety links to allotment 38 B; thence by part of the north boundary of that allotment, bearing east forty chains to the north-east angle of allotment 61; and thence by the east boundary of that allotment, bearing south forty chains to the point of commencement.-(64.19522.)

QUEENSLIFFE BOROUGH COMMON.-The common for all householders of the Borough of Queenscliffe, described in a Proclamation bearing date the seventeenth day of August, 1863, is hereby increased by adding thereto the land hereafter described, viz.:-Queenscliffe, county of Grant, parish of Paywit, extent about 370 acres, more or less, being the reserve at Point Lonsdale known as the Battery Reserve: Commencing at a point at high water mark on the shores of Lonsdale Bay, bearing S. 65° E. four chains fifty links from the southern angle of suburban allotment A; bounded on the north-east by a line bearing N. 65° W. ten chains fifty links; on the north-west by a line bearing S. 25° W. one chain to the north-east angle of suburban allotment 49; thence by the south-eastern boundaries of allotments 49, 50, 51, and 52, to the north-east angle of the cemetery reserve; thence by the south-eastern boundary of said reserve to its south-east angle; thence by the south-west boundaries of aforesaid reserve and allotments 47 and 46 to the south-west angle of the lastnamed allotment; thence by a line bearing S. 25° W. sixty-eight chains fifty links, more or less, to the south-west angle of the Battery Reserve; thence easterly by the southern boundary of said reserve to Point Lonsdale; and on the east by the shores of Lonsdale Bay to the point of com-

menocement, reserving the site at Point Lonsdale set apart for public purposes.—(65.K.85.)

FORM OF LEASE OF LANDS FOR NOVEL INDUSTRIAL PURPOSES.

THE Governor in Council, on the 30th day of January, 1865, approved of the subjoined Form of Lease of Lands for Novel Industrial purposes, to be granted under the 47th section of *The Land Act*, 1862, in lieu of the Form prescribed by the Regulations affecting such leases (published in the *Gazette* of 2nd July, 1862, page 1119), and also in lieu of another form which was substituted by Order of the 10th of November, 1863, viz.:

THIS Indenture made the _____ day of _____ A.D. 186____ between Her Majesty Queen Victoria of the one part and _____ of the other part.

Recital.—Whereas the said lessee ha in accordance with the provisions of *The Land Act* 1862 duly made application in the form prescribed by the Governor of the said colony by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof for a Lease of the Crown Land hereinafter described for the purpose hereinafter appearing and notice of such application and of the lands to be demised and the purposes for which such demise is sought has been given for four consecutive weeks in the *Government Gazette* of the said colony.

Testatum—Parcels.—Now this indenture witnesseth that in consideration of the rents reservations covenants provisoes and agreements hereinafter contained on the part of the said lessee

h executors administrators and assigns to be paid observed and performed Her Majesty doth by these presents grant and demise unto the said lessee h executors administrators and assigns all and singular the lands and hereditaments mentioned and described in the first schedule hereunder written and shown with the measurements and abutments thereof in the map drawn in the margin of these presents and therein colored yellow together with the appurtenances thereto belonging.

Reservations.—Reserving and excepting nevertheless unto Her Majesty Her heirs and successors all gold and other metals and all mines and minerals of every description.

And also reserving and excepting the use of all such parts of the said land as shall be required for making railways canals water-courses reservoirs dams or sewers over in upon or through the same with full and free liberty of ingress egress and regress into out of and upon the said land at all reasonable times for such purposes but nevertheless so as not to do or occasion by the carrying out of any of such purposes any unnecessary damage to the said land hereby demised or any buildings or works thereon and making compensation for such damage as may be done or occasioned by the carrying out of the same.

And also reserving and excepting unto our subjects and people in the said colony the public use of all such parts of the said land as shall from time to time be proclaimed as or otherwise become either a main or district road or other public highway or thoroughfare.

Habendum for years.—To have and to hold the said land and premises unto the said lessee h executors administrators and assigns from the day of the date hereof for and during the full term of _____ years from thence next ensuing and fully to be completed and ended to the intent that the same land and premises shall be used for the purpose of _____ and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Redendum.—Yielding and paying therefor yearly and every year during the said term the yearly rent of _____ pounds by equal half-yearly payments of _____ in advance on the _____ day of _____

and the _____ day of _____ in each year and the first payment to be made on or before the day of the date hereof and all such payments to be made without any deduction or abatement whatsoever.

Covenants by lessee.—And the said lessee for h sel h heirs executors administrators and assigns do hereby covenant with Her Majesty Her heirs and successors in manner following that is to say—

To pay rent.—To pay taxes.—That the said lessee h executors administrators or assigns shall and will well and truly pay or cause to be paid the yearly rent hereby reserved upon the days and times hereinbefore appointed for the payment of the same free and clear from all deductions and abatements whatsoever. And shall and will during the same term bear pay and discharge all and all manner of taxes rates duties charges assessments and impositions whatsoever whether the same be payable by landlord or tenant or partly by each in respect of the land and premises hereby demised. And shall and will use the said land and premises hereby demised for the purpose aforesaid and for no other purpose whatsoever.

To fence.—And also shall and will within _____ from the date of the notification that this lease has been granted enclose the lands hereditaments hereby demised with a good and substantial fence or paling.

To cultivate.—And also shall and will yearly and every year during the first five years of the term hereby granted bring

into cultivation and plant and keep cultivated and planted in a proper husbandlike manner _____ acres of the land hereby demised with _____ so that at the end of the said five years there shall be _____ acres so cultivated and planted.

To furnish returns.—And also shall and will furnish when required during the said term to the Governor of the said colony or the Registrar General for the time being such returns particulars and statistics of the operations theretofore carried on or to be carried on upon the said land and the result thereof as such Governor or Registrar General may from time to time in that behalf require accompanied by a statutory declaration of the truth and correctness thereof.

To permit lessor to enter and view.—And also that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty Her heirs successors and assigns or Her or their servants and agents or the servants and officers of the Board of Land and Works in and for the colony of Victoria at all proper and reasonable times during the continuance of this demise without any interruption or disturbance from the said lessee h executors administrators or assigns agents workmen or servants to enter into and upon the said land works and premises hereby demised or any part thereof to view and examine the state and condition thereof.

Proviso.—Provided also and it is hereby expressly declared and agreed that if the said lessee h executors administrators or assigns shall at any time during the continuance of this demise fail to use the demised land and premises *bond fide* for the purpose aforesaid or shall use the same for any other purpose or shall otherwise refuse or neglect to observe or perform all or any of the conditions covenants and provisoes hereinbefore on his part contained or referred to then and in such case it shall thereupon be lawful for Her Majesty Her heirs successors or assigns or Her or their agents or officers or the agents or officers of the Board of Land and Works in and for the colony of Victoria to enter forthwith into and upon the said demised premises and the same to re-possess and enjoy as fully and effectually as if these presents had not been made and executed And it is hereby agreed and declared that in any such case it shall be lawful for Her Majesty Her heirs successors or assigns and Her or their agents or officers without any demand whatsoever to enter upon the said demised premises and the said lessee and all persons claiming under h for ever to expel and remove therefrom without any legal process whatsoever and as effectually as any sheriff might do in case Her Majesty Her heirs successors or assigns had obtained judgment in ejectment for recovery of possession thereof and a writ of *habere facias possessionem* or other process had issued on such judgment directed to such sheriff in due form of law and then in case of such entry and any action being brought or other proceedings taken for the same by any person whomsoever the defendants to such action may plead leave and license in bar thereof and these presents shall be conclusive evidence of the leave and license of the said lessee and all persons claiming under them or any of them to Her Majesty Her heirs successors and assigns and all persons acting therein by Her or their or any of their order for the entry or trespasses or other matters to be complained of in such action or other proceeding.

In witness whereof Her Majesty hath caused this grant to be sealed with the seal of the said colony and His Excellency Sir Charles Henry Darling Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over our said colony at Melbourne has hereunto set his hand and the said lessee ha hereunto set h hand and seal the day and year first herein written.
