## CUSTOMS NOTICES.

THE accompanying Orders relating to the Customs are published for general information.

As there is reason to suppose that in many cases the values of goods imported are over-estimated in the entries passed for the same, thereby affecting to some extent the trade returns of this department, the collectors are requested to draw the attention of the landing officers to the necessity of their using increased vigilance to enforce the law in this respect, in terms of the 46th and 58th sections of the Customs Act of 1857.

As it has been represented that it would be conducive to the convenience of the owners of boats residing at Williamstown if the tide inspector at that place received the license fees due thereon, and was authorised to receive bonds for the licensing of boats belonging to that station, I hereby, in consequence, authorise that officer to perform the duties mentioned. On receipt of license fees, they, together with the boat licenses, are to be transmitted to the collector, Melbourne, for his endorsement.

Boats' bonds are to be forwarded also to the collector, with a memo. from the tide inspector that the sureties are good and sufficient for the amount contained in the bond.

THE collectors are directed, in granting overtime, to see that no officers are charged for but such as are absolutely and indispensably necessary. They will also take care that such officers are in actual attendance during the time charged.

Officers must on no account delegate their duties to other officers who may happen to be on duty at the same time; and in the case of vessels where it is desired to break out cargo in the hold, and not to land goods after hours, a weigher only will be required to be in attendance.

THE attention of the collectors of this revenue is particularly directed to the necessity which exists for the export officers exercising the utmost care in certifying to the shipment of wine for drawback of duty. It is not only necessary that the marks and numbers of the casks entered out should be carefully compared with the import marks, but their contents must also be examined, in order to prevent the possibility of inferior wines, the produce of this colony, being substituted for the wine imported.

As serious inconvenience is occasioned to the warehousing branch of this department in consequence of the owners of sugar in bond being permitted to enter and pay duty on a quantity of that article in bulk without having been previously weighed in accordance with the usual regulations of this service, by which means the warehousing accounts are kept open until the full quantity entered is delivered, in some instances in small quantities at a time and extending over many months, I have, in consequence, to direct that sugar thus entered must be weighed by the proper officer, and removed by the owner from bond previous to the expiry of each month, or such shorter period as the collector may direct.

# REGULATIONS RESPECTING TRANSHIPMENT OF GOODS FOR EXPORTATION.

Goods intended to be transhipped for exportation will not be allowed to be discharged from the import vessel until the necessary transshipping entry has been received by the proper officer; and in cases where the wharfage on such goods would have amounted to 23 and upwards, a bond in treble the amount thereof shall have been executed, to which the exporter and one other approved surety must be parties.

2. Goods to be transhipped, if landed, must be conveyed on the same day, or as soon thereafter as may appear to the collector to be practicable, to the export vessel by a drayman licensed under the Customs Act.

3. Goods not transhipped in accordance with the above regulations, but allowed to remain on the wharf, will be treated as goods imported, and liable to wharfage and harbor rate.

### Lighthouse, Tiri Tiri Matangi, Houraki Gulf.

The lighthouse in course of construction on the S.E. end of Tiri Tiri, in latitude 36° 36' 30" S., longitude 174° 55' 15" E., will be lit from sunset to sunrise, from and after 1st January, 1865.

The tower is of iron, 48 feet high, painted light red color, and the focal plane of the lantern is 300 feet above high water mark.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric of the 2nd order, showing a fixed white light all round the horizon, which may be seen from the deck of a vessel in clear weather at a distance of 23½ nautical miles.

### Buoy on Shearer's Rock.

Notice is also given that a red buoy has been laid in 14 fathoms N.N.E. of, and close to, the Shearer's Rock, distant from the lighthouse about one mile, with the following magnetic bearings:—Southern extreme of Tiri Tiri, S. 53° W.; northern extreme of Tiri Tiri, N. 72° W.; lighthouse tower, S. 67° W.

WHEREAS by *The Municipal Corporations Act*, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of councillors for any original or proclaimed borough, hereinafter sometimes called in common "single borough," the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by one-fourth of the number of persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in such borough, within three months after the receipt of the same divide the borough into three separate wards by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of such wards shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made upon or within thirty days before any day appointed for holding any annual election of councillors in or for such borough: And whereas the Governor has received a petition signed by not less than one-fourth of the number of persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the borough of Essendon and Flemington, praying that the said borough may be divided into three separate wards, to be designated and bounded as set forth in the petition: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by this present Order divide the said borough of Essendon and Fleming-

ton into three separate wards, by the names hereby assigned to the same respectively and with the several boundaries hereinafter set forth, that is to say:—

THE FLEMINGTON AND KENSINGTON WARD.—Commencing at the point of intersection of the northern boundary line of portion twelve, allotment five, parish of Dousta Galla, with the Moonee Ponds; thence west along the said boundary about twenty chains to the Main Mount Alexander road; thence by that road south-easterly to the intersection of the southern boundary of allotment thirteen of said parish with the said road; thence by the said boundary westerly about thirty chains to a Government road; thence by that road southerly to its intersection with another Government road, commonly known as the Macaulay road; thence by that road north-westerly about thirty-five chains to the north-western boundary of the Racecourse reserve; thence by that boundary south-westerly to the Saltwater River; thence by that river to the southern boundary of the borough; thence by that boundary easterly to the Moonee Ponds; thence by the said ponds northerly to the commencing point.

THE ASCOT VALE AND MOONEE PONDS WARD.—Commencing at the point of intersection of the northern boundary line of portion twelve, allotment five, parish of Dousta Galla, with the Moonee Ponds; thence west along the said boundary about twenty chains to the Main Mount Alexander road; thence by that road south-easterly to the intersection of the southern boundary of allotment thirteen of said parish with the said road; thence by the said boundary westerly about thirty chains to a Government road; thence by that road southerly to its intersection with another Government road commonly known as the Macaulay road; thence by that road north-westerly about thirty-five chains to the north-western boundary of the Racecourse reserve; thence by that boundary south-westerly to the Saltwater River; thence by that river northerly to the point of intersection of the eastern boundary of portion three, allotment seven of the said parish; thence by said boundary northerly eleven chains fifty links to the southern boundary of portion four of said allotment; thence by said southern boundary and also by the southern boundary of portion B, allotment six of the said parish easterly to the Main Mount Alexander road; thence by the said road to the northern boundary of allotment seven of the said parish; thence by said boundary easterly to the Moonee Ponds; thence by the said ponds southerly to the commencing point.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act*, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted, that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board, for any original or proclaimed district thereafter sometimes called "single district," the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall within three months after the receipt of the same divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions, hereinafter called subdivisions, by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of September, 1860, a road district was proclaimed under the designation of "The Eltham Road District." And whereas by another Proclamation, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of May, 1861, the boundaries of the said road district were altered as therein mentioned: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by more than twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said road district, praying for the division of the same into three subdivisions: Now therefore

His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order divide the Eltham Road District into three separate electoral subdivisions in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

**THE SOUTHERN SUBDIVISION.**—Commencing at the junction of the Yarra and Plenty Rivers; thence along the Plenty River to the north-west corner of section 3, parish of Nillumbik; thence east to Arthur's Creek; thence northerly along said creek to north-west corner of portion E, section 16; thence east to a one-chain road dividing sections 17 and 18; thence south along said road to south-west corner of section 9; thence east to the Yarra River; and thence southerly and westerly along said river to the commencing point.

**THE EASTERN SUBDIVISION.**—Commencing at the junction of Watson's Creek and Yarra River; thence along said river to its source; thence along the Great Dividing Range to a point due north of the source of Watson's Creek; thence south to and along said creek to the commencing point.

**WHEREAS** by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board, for any original or proclaimed district thereafter sometimes called "single district," the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall within three months after the receipt of the same divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions, thereafter called subdivisions, by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district: and it is also enacted that every shire shall after the Proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such Proclamation, and save as aforesaid and save where herein otherwise expressly provided all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue and be of full force and effect with regard to such shire and be read accordingly: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the second day of May, 1864, the shire of Colac was constituted: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by more than twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said shire, praying for the division of the said shire into three subdivisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order divide the shire of Colac into three separate electoral subdivisions in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

**THE CORANGAMITE RIDING.**—Commencing at a point on the electoral boundary of the district of Polwarth and South Grenville, at the south-western angle of section xv, parish of Pirron Yaloak, in the county of Polwarth; thence by the said electoral boundary southerly to the sea-coast; thence by the coast line south-easterly to a point due south of the east boundary of the Colac township reserve; thence north to and by the said east boundary to the shore of Lake Colac; thence westerly and northerly by the shores of said lake to the south boundary of the parish of Ondit; thence westerly and northerly by the southern and western boundary of said parish to the south-west angle of portion A, section 94, of the same parish; thence by a direct line south-westerly to the centre of a road forming the south boundary of sections 38, 39, 40, parish of Cundare; thence westerly by the centre of that road to the centre of a road forming the east boundary of section 25, parish of Dreite; thence southerly by the centre of that road to the centre of a road forming the south boundary of sections 25, 26, 27, and 28; thence westerly by the centre of that road to the shore of Lake Corangamite; thence southerly by the shores of said lake and Pirron Yaloak Creek to the commencing point.

##### PROCLAMATION.

**WHEREAS** by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for ten or more inhabitants of any part of Victoria not lying within the limits of the city of Melbourne or town of Geelong, or of any municipal or road district, and of whom each one shall possess property rateable under the said Act within the area next thereafter mentioned, to sign and present to the Governor a petition setting forth that the area, which shall by metes and bounds be described in such petition, contains not less than forty square miles, and rateable property whereof the net annual value is not less than Five thousand pounds, and praying that such area may be constituted a road district; and it is also enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, upon being satisfied that the statements set forth in the petition are true, and that it is desirable to comply with the prayer thereof, to constitute such part of Victoria, under such name as shall in and by the same Order in Council be assigned thereto, a new road district; and the words "proclaimed district," where used in the said Act, shall be deemed to mean such new district: And whereas a petition signed by more than ten inhabitants of the area or part of Victoria hereinafter described, possessing rateable property in such area, has been presented to the Governor, setting forth the matters and things required by the said Act, and due notice of such petition has been published as provided by the said Act, and in compliance with the prayer thereof, an Order in Council, bearing even date herewith, has been made, to constitute the said area a new road district: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby constitute and proclaim the part of Victoria hereinafter described to be a new road district, under the name

assigned thereto in and by the Order in Council hereinbefore mentioned, that is to say:—

**THE MANSFIELD ROAD DISTRICT.**—Commencing at a point in the centre of the River Howqua at its source; thence westerly by the centre of the River Howqua to its intersection with the centre of the Goulburn River; thence southerly, northerly and westerly by the centre of the Goulburn River to the junction of the Home Creek with the River Goulburn; thence by a direct north line to the summit of the Strathbogie Range; thence easterly by the summit of the said range to a point opposite the source of the Sandy Creek; thence by a direct line to the centre of the said creek at its source; thence by the centre of the Sandy Creek north-easterly to its intersection with the centre of the Back Creek; thence southerly and easterly by the centre of the Back Creek to its source; thence by a direct line southerly and easterly to the commencing point.

**WHEREAS** by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that in every district divided into subdivisions the Governor in Council shall, within fifteen days after any subdivision of such district shall become such subdivision, appoint in and for such subdivision one place to be the place of polling at all elections held in and for such subdivision, and may from time to time afterwards appoint in lieu thereof another such place within such subdivision; and it is further enacted that every shire shall after the proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such proclamation, and save as aforesaid, and save where therein otherwise expressly provided, all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue to be of full force and effect with regard to such shire, and be read accordingly: And whereas it is expedient to add a polling place to those already appointed by Orders in Council of the thirtieth day of September, 1863, and the thirtieth day of May, 1864, for elections in the Shire of Glenelg: And whereas by two Orders in Council made on the twelfth and twenty-eighth days of December, 1864, the Shire of Ballarat and the Eltham Road District were subdivided as therein mentioned, and it is expedient to appoint a polling place for each subdivision of the said Shire and Road District respectively: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint the place mentioned in the second column of the first schedule hereunto annexed to be an additional polling place for the Shire of Glenelg; and with the advice aforesaid doth also appoint the places mentioned in the third column of the second schedule hereunto annexed to be the polling places for the subdivisions of the Shire of Ballarat, and of the Eltham Road District, opposite to which respectively such polling places are named, viz:—

## **COMMON-TOLL ROADS.**

### **PROCLAMATION.**

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** the Council of the city of Melbourne has complained to the Governor in Council that it ought, by reason of the traffic passing along the roads hereinafter mentioned being common to its own district with the districts in which tolls are payable upon such roads, to have a share of such tolls in the manner provided in the 25th clause of *The Local Government Act, 1863*: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the roads hereinafter mentioned to be Common-toll roads, for the purposes and within the meaning of the provisions of the said Act relating to Common-toll roads, viz:—

The road known as the Upper Plenty Road, extending from the north end of Brunswick street, in the Borough of Fitz Roy, to the northern boundary of the Upper Plenty or Morang road District, shall be a Common-toll Road of the city of Melbourne, the Boroughs of East Collingwood and Fitz Roy, and of the Upper Plenty or Morang and the Epping Road Districts.

The road known as the Heidelberg Road, extending from the junction of Reilly street with Brunswick street, in the Borough of Fitz Roy, to the village of Heidelberg, shall be a Common-toll Road of the city of Melbourne, the Borough of Fitz Roy, and the Heidelberg Road District.

## **DISTRICT FOR BEER LICENSES.**

### **PROCLAMATION.**

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** by *The Wines, Beer, and Spirit Sale Statute, 1864*, it is amongst other things enacted that a beer license shall authorise the licensee to sell and dispose of, not earlier than Six o'clock in the morning nor later than Eight o'clock in the evening, any ale or beer to be drunk in the house or on the premises described in such license, except in the city of Melbourne or town of Geelong, or in any borough, and if the premises described in such license be subsequently to the granting of such license brought within any borough, such license shall expire at the end of the then current year; provided that upon the application by the council of any borough the Governor in Council may by proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare the whole or any part of such borough a district wherein beer licenses may be granted, and may on a like application revoke any such proclamation: And whereas the Council of the Borough of Tarnagulla has made application that the whole of the said borough may be declared a district under the proviso of the Act above recited: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power conferred by the above-recited Act, do by this my Proclamation declare the whole Borough of Tarnagulla to be a district wherein Beer Licenses may be granted.

## **VICTORIAN VOLUNTEER CAVALRY.**

**THE** Governor in Council has substituted the subjoined Regulations for the Volunteer Cavalry in lieu of the Regulations approved on the 12th October, 1863.

### **CAVALRY.**

On the 1st January in any year after 1864, the following volunteers, and no others, will be classed as effectives in the cavalry branch of the force—

(a.) Any volunteer who was enrolled before the 1st of April of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—

- (1.) Attended twelve mounted parades, one of which shall be an official inspection.
- (2.) Attended twelve other, either mounted or dismounted parades, or both.

(b.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st April and 30th June of the year next preceding, and has during that year—

- (1.) Attended nine mounted parades, one of which shall be an official inspection.
- (2.) Attended nine other, either mounted or dismounted parades, or both.

(c.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st July and 30th September of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—

- (1.) Attended six mounted parades, one of which shall be an official inspection.
- (2.) Attended six other, either mounted or dismounted parades, or both.

No person shall be enrolled in any troop until he has gone through six recruit drills, either mounted or dismounted, or both.

No person shall be re-enrolled who has been discharged from the force for misconduct.

After the 1st of January, 1864, no mounted parades will count towards classification at which less than fifteen members shall have been present, and no other parades or drills will count at which less than ten members shall have been present.

Every troop shall parade for inspection three times in each year, on such days and at such hours as shall be appointed by the officer in command of the force.

The services of no troop of cavalry shall be retained unless it be composed of at least twenty effective members, and no troop will be allowed to return more than thirty effective members. Any members in excess of this number are to be considered as supernumerary.

On the 1st January in each year, the commanding officer of each troop will be credited with the sum of £7 for each effective member of his troop, beyond which no assistance will be given by Government.

#### FINES.

Every volunteer who fails to attend muster for parades twice in any month shall pay 2s. 6d. fine to his troop; if a corporal or sergeant, 5s.; if a commissioned officer, 10s.—unless on leave of absence or medical certificate.

#### MISCELLANEOUS.

Any volunteer who, during the times of training and exercise, shall not conduct himself in an orderly manner, or shall not obey the command of his superior officer, may be placed in the custody of members of the volunteer force for the period of such training or exercise.

Any volunteer may for any military offence be placed under arrest by his superior officer.

Arrest shall signify a suspension from all military duty; and members placed in arrest shall, on demand, deliver up their arms and accoutrements and uniform to such person as the officer commanding the corps may direct.

The officer commanding the volunteer force may, at any time, order a court of enquiry to be assembled; and such courts of enquiry shall be conducted, as far as practicable, according to the regulations in force in Her Majesty's army.

Acting appointments for temporary purposes, as officers and non-commissioned officers, may be made by the officer commanding the force; and volunteers, while holding such appointments, shall exercise the same authority as though they were permanently appointed.

#### MAIN ROADS UNDER "THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1863."

THE Governor in Council, in exercise of the power conferred by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, has, by an Order in Council made on the 28th day of December, 1864, appointed the road hereinafter mentioned to be a Main Road, in compliance with an application made in accordance with the 219th clause of the said Act, viz.:—

The road extending from the south-western boundary of the Shire of Mortlake, near Lett's Ford, through the township of Mortlake, to the eastern boundary of the said shire, at or near the township of Darlington.

#### WORKS ON MAIN ROADS ORDERED UNDER "THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1863."

THE Governor in Council, in exercise of the power conferred by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, has, by Orders severally made on the 28th day of December, 1864, directed that the undermentioned Councils of Shires and District Boards of Road Districts shall, within the times by the said respective Orders appointed, execute the works on Main Roads hereinafter named and described, in accordance with sufficient plans deposited by the said Councils of Shires and District Boards respectively, as provided by the 220th section of the said Act, that is to say:—

The Council of the Shire of Belfast shall, within twelve months from the 28th of December aforesaid, drain, form, and metal about eighty-three chains of the Main Portland road, and about one hundred and twenty chains of the Main Hamilton road.

The Council of the Shire of Creswick shall, within twelve months from the 28th December aforesaid, drain, form, and

metal about two miles thirty-six chains and fifty-six links of the Main Creswick to Daylesford road.

The District Board of the Heathcote Road District shall, within twelve months from the 28th of December aforesaid, drain, form, and metal about sixty-six chains and sixty-six links, and shall form about twenty chains of the Main Heathcote to Pyslong road; and also shall drain, form, and metal about forty-two chains and fifty links of the Main Heathcote to Sandhurst road.

The District Board of the Lancefield Road District shall, within twelve months from the 28th of December aforesaid, drain, form, and metal about two miles one chain and fifty links of the Main Lancefield road.

The Council of the Shire of Maldon shall, within six months from the 28th of December aforesaid, drain, form, and metal about one mile and thirty-three chains of the Main Castlemaine to Maldon and Dunolly road. [This Order is in lieu of that of 10th October, 1864 (gazetted 18th October, 1864), which is hereby revoked.]

Printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne, or from the officer in charge of police at each station, by whom also any information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

The tenders for each station will be accepted or rejected separately.

Tenders may be for either of the supplies required, oats, bran, hay, or straw only; and if all be included in one tender, it will be accepted for one article only, if advisable.

Tenderers may offer for the manure at each station at per cwt.: manure to be removed as may be arranged with the officer in charge, and the value of the manure will be deducted from the account for forage.

As much forage as the storage will accommodate will be drawn at a time for the convenience of contractors.

The price must be per ton for hay and straw, and per bushel of 40 lbs. for oats, 20 lbs. for bran, and 54 lbs. for maize, including delivery at the stations and all charges; bags to be returned when empty.

The net weight only after deducting the tare is to be charged.

The names and addresses of the tenderers and of their proposed sureties must be stated at full length.

All tenders must be enclosed in a separate envelope, marked "Tender for ——" (as the case may be), and deposited in the box at the Government Stores, King street; or if sent by post they must be addressed to the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known by *Gazette* notice and by letter to accepted tenderers.

#### CONDITIONS.

1. The hay to be eaten, good, sound, and sweet; the straw to be wheaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats (colonial grown) and bran and maize to be sound and sweet and of the best description.

2. The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in schedule being, however, only approximative, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will not, however, exceed during the whole year 50 per cent. of the estimated quarterly consumption.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the District, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue either to the public service or the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice only can be given from the first day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th June, 1865.
