**Dog Island, Foveaux Straits, Lighthouse.**

Dog Island Lighthouse is situated on a small island of that name in Foveaux Straits, off the entrance to the Bluff Harbor, in 46° 39' 35" south latitude, and 168° 26' east longitude, as measured on the Admiralty chart.

The light will show all round, and will be a helophotal dioptric revolving white light of the first order, attaining its greatest brilliancy every half minute.

It will be elevated about 150 feet above the level of the sea, and will be visible in clear weather about 18 nautical miles, allowing 15 feet for the height of the observer's eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

The tower is built of native stone of a gray color, and will be 118 feet in height from the ground to the top of the lantern.

This light is expected to be ready for permanent exhibition not later than April, 1865.

**Mana Island, Cook's Straits, Lighthouse.**

Mana Island Lighthouse is now in course of erection on the north-western promontory of Mana Island, off the entrance to Porirua Harbor, on the eastern shore of Cook's Straits, in 41° 5' south latitude, and 174° 48' east longitude, as measured on the Admiralty chart.

The light will be a fixed dioptric white light of the second order, and will be seen in every direction where not intercepted by land.

The light will be elevated about 450 feet above the sea, and will be visible in clear weather about 29 nautical miles, allowing 15 feet for the height of the observer's eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

The tower will be 70 feet in height, from the base to the vane. This light is expected to be ready for permanent exhibition in March, 1865.

**Tairoa's Head Lighthouse.**

Tairoa's Head Lighthouse is situated on the headland bearing that name, on the east or seaward side of the entrance to Otago Harbor, in 45° 47' south latitude, and 170° 45' east longitude, as measured on the Admiralty charts.

The light will be a fixed dioptric red light of the third order, and will be seen to seaward from about E. ½ N. round by the north to about N.W.; and up the harbor it will show from about W. ½ S. to about S.W. ¼ W., the latter line indicating the turning-point of the Cross Channel.

The light will be elevated about 196 feet above the level of the sea, and will be visible in clear weather about 20 nautical miles, allowing 15 feet for the height of the observer's eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

The tower, which, together with the dwelling-houses, will be painted white, will be 39½ feet high from the ground to the top of the lantern.

This light is expected to be ready for permanent exhibition on and after the night of Monday, 2nd January, 1865.

**NOTICE TO MARINERS.**

**TABLE BAY NEW LIGHTS AND FALSE BAY BEACON.**

**Robben Island Light.**

A lighthouse has been erected on the southernmost (and highest) hill of Robben Island, Minto hill, at an elevation of 154 feet above the sea, a light from which will be exhibited on the 1st January, 1865.

The lighthouse is in latitude 33° 48' 52" S., longitude 18° 22' 33" E.

The building is a cylindrical shaft, 60 feet high, painted in horizontal *Red and White bands*, exhibiting a *White* fixed light of the 1st order, dioptric. It is visible all round the horizon, and can be seen from a ship in clear weather 19 or 20 miles.

**Changes in the Green and Mouille Point Lights.**

The two fixed lights in the Green Point square tower will be abandoned on the above date, and a *White* light of the 3rd order, dioptric, flashing at intervals of 10 seconds, substituted. It is 65 feet above the sea, and can be seen in clear weather from a ship 13 miles.

**Mouille Light.**

The old pyramidal building which carried this light will be demolished, and replaced by a cylindrical shaft 30 feet high, painted in alternate *Black and White bands*, and carrying a *Red* light of the 4th order, dioptric. It stands at an elevation of 44 feet above the sea, and can be seen about 10 miles in clear weather.

**Sailing Directions.**

Ships bound for Table Bay from the southward should not shut in the Cape Point light with the land at Slangkop Point until the Robben Island light—which will be seen before the

one on Green Point—bears N.E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E., when they may steer for it; and when the Green Point light bears east, an E.N.E. course may be followed until the red light on Mouille Point comes open to the northward of Green Point light, bearing S.E. by S. This course will lead clear of the Vulcan Rock and the reefs that lie to the northward of it. The course may now be altered to S.E. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E., which will carry them one mile outside Mouille Point, and within this distance no stranger should round the point at night. When the Mouille light bears S.S.W. a S. by E. course for the anchorage may be shaped, anchoring as soon as the Green Point light is shut in with the hillocks near Mouille Point, or with Mouille Point light bearing N.W. about one mile off, in from 6 to 8 fathoms. Small vessels may steer S. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E. for the anchorage in 4 or 5 fathoms, and anchor with the Mouille light bearing about N.W. by N.

Ships bound to Table Bay from the northward must not take too great liberty with Robben Island on account of its light, for the island is low, and the dangerous Whale Rock lies S. 17 W., only 1  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile from the lighthouse and  $\frac{1}{2}$  of a mile from the nearest point of the island.

Having sighted the Robben Island light, a ship should haul to the S.W., if the light bear anything to the westward of south, until the flashing light on Green Point bears S. by E., or S.S.E., when she may steer for it until Robben Island light bears N.E., when she may steer S.E. by E.; and when Mouille light bears S.S.W. steer, as before directed, for the anchorage.

With the light upon Robben Island and the Green Point or Mouille Point light, a vessel may readily determine her position by cross bearings; but the safest and easiest plan to adopt is, whilst the Green and Mouille lights are open of each other, to tack when the Robben Island light bears N. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W., and when they approach each other and become in line, to tack when the Robben Island light bears N. by W. This will prevent accidents from the lowness of the Blauwberg Beach and its deceptive appearance at night. Little, if anything, can be lost in thus beating in by giving up the smooth water near the shore, as the constant northerly current that sets out between Robben Island and the main land more than destroys the seeming advantage; added to which, the wind blows with greater violence from the S.E. on the east side of the bay than it does more to the westward, though not in such sudden and violent gusts.\*

#### New Beacon for the Whittle Rock, False Bay.

A beacon has been erected on a large flat-topped rock near Oatlands Point, which will, in conjunction with the beacon that now stands on the shoulder of the hill beneath Simon's Berg, point out the position of the Whittle Rock. The rock on which the beacon stands lies a few yards from the shore and 0.85 miles from the Shoulder beacon. When on the Whittle Rock the two beacons will be in a line, and also in a line with a large patch of whitewashed rocks on the hill northward of Simon's Town, bearing N.N.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. The Shoulder beacon is white, with a staff and ball. The Oatlands Point beacon is triangular, 35 feet high, and painted white with a red band in the centre.

The advantage of this beacon is that it points out to ships from the westward that they are clear of the Whittle Rock whilst it is kept open to the eastward of the Shoulder beacon. This was somewhat difficult with the patch of whitewashed rocks behind Simon's Town for a mark, as vessels were obliged to run far to the eastward before the patch opened out clear of the shoulder of Simon's Berg hill.

Vessels from the eastward will still find the white patch of rocks serviceable for pointing out the position of the Whittle Rock.

\* Vessels entering Table Bay during the day when blowing hard from S.E. after passing the Mouille Point, may, with great advantage, anchor in 10 or 12 fathoms, where they will be in a good position for dropping into the inner anchorage on the following morning, as the wind invariably falls light during the night although the S.E. may continue to blow hard on the east side of the bay. By observing this rule, more particularly in ships of large tonnage, a great deal of anxiety and risk in wearing ship, when mislaid stays, will be avoided, and less casualties occur from loss of anchors and cables when endeavoring to bring up on the eastern shore.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that if at any time in any district, whether single or united, which shall contain an area of not less than one hundred square miles, the total amount actually paid in respect of the general rate then last made shall have amounted to One thousand pounds, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim, if it shall seem fit, such district, by such name as in and by such Order in Council may be assigned thereto, to be a shire within the meaning of the said Act, and such district shall thereupon be and be called such shire accordingly; and no district, after the proclamation thereof as such shire, save as therein provided with regard to the adjustment of boundaries to those of electoral districts, shall be united with any other shire or district, or with any borough or municipal district: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of December, 1864, a Road District was proclaimed under the designation of "The Kyneton United Road District." And whereas the area of the said district and the amount of the last general rates therein are not less than the area and amount in the said Act mentioned, and it seemed fit to make an Order in Council this day to proclaim the said district to be a shire accordingly: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the district heretofore proclaimed and called the Kyneton United Road District to be a shire within the meaning of the said Act, by the name in and by such Order in Council assigned thereto, that is to say:—

fifteen days after any subdivision of such district shall become such subdivision, appoint in and for such subdivision one place to be the place of polling at all elections held in and for such subdivision, and may from time to time afterwards appoint in lieu thereof another such place within such subdivision: And whereas by Orders in Council made on the twelfth and nineteenth days of December, 1864, the Donnybrook and Wallan-wallan Road District and the Shire of Marong were severally divided into three separate electoral subdivisions, and it is expedient to appoint a polling place for each subdivision: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint the places mentioned in the third column of the said schedule hereunto annexed to be the polling places for the subdivisions of the said Road District and Shire, opposite to which respective subdivisions such polling places are mentioned, viz. :—

## MINING OPERATIONS AUTHORISED ON EXEMPTED LANDS AT SANDHURST.

DEFERRING to an Order in Council, dated the 25th August, 1862, exempting certain lands at Sandhurst, therein described, from the operations of mining, the Governor in Council has authorised the holders of miners' rights to mine on the said lands, on and subject to the following conditions and restrictions, viz. :—

1. The mining operations shall be conducted in such manner as not to interfere with the purposes for which the reserve was made.

2. The miners shall not nor will injure, or interfere with, or mine in the close vicinity of any dam, water-reservoir, water-channel, pipe-track, or other work or works constructed or used by the Bendigo Water Works Company, and shall and will make such provision for the disposal of detritus, sludge, rubbish, or other waste or refuse matter and foul water, in such manner as that the same shall not flow into or upon any reservoir, or water-channel, or spring, or stream constructed or used by the said company.

3. The miners shall and will cease to mine when requested so to do by the Honorable the Minister of Mines, or the Secretary for Mines, whenever it shall appear that the mining operations are not being carried on with due precaution against any contingent damage to the works of the said company, or the drainage area used by them.

4. In case any person so mining shall in any way violate any of the above conditions, it shall not be lawful for him any longer to mine upon any claim upon or within such lands.

## VICTORIAN RAILWAYS.

**BYE-LAW.**—The Board of Land and Works, by virtue of the powers and authorities vested in it by *The Railways Act, 1863*, doth hereby make the following Bye-law for fixing the charges for the Carriage of Animals upon Railways vested in the said Board, that is to say:—

## LIVE STOCK RATES.

For every single sheep, lamb, goat, or pig, 24 miles or under, 2s. each; over 24 miles, 3d. per mile additional.

## UP JOURNEY.

## SHEEP.

Distances over 101 miles, and in quantities of not less than 300, to be charged 1s. 3d. per head; under that number, to be charged as 300, or 1s. per mile per truck. Quantities over 2000, 1s. 2d. per head.

Distances under 101 miles and over 70 miles, and in quantities of not less than 300, to be charged 11d. per head; under that number, to be charged as 300, or 1s. per mile per truck. Quantities over 2000, 9d. per head.

Distances under 70 miles and over 20 miles, and in quantities of not less than 300, to be charged 8d. per head; under that number, to be charged as 300, or 9d. per mile per truck. Quantities over 2000, 7d. per head.

Distances under 20 miles, for any quantity, 20s. per goods truck or part of a truck.

## LAMBS.

Distances over 101 miles, and in quantities of not less than 300, to be charged 1s. per head; under that number, to be charged as 300, or 1s. per mile per truck.

Distances under 101 miles and over 70 miles, and in quantities of not less than 300, to be charged 8d. per head; under that number, to be charged as 300, or 1s. per mile per truck.

Distances under 70 miles, and in quantities of not less than 300, to be charged 5d. per head; under that number, to be charged as 300, or 9d. per mile per truck.

This rate per truck applies to an ordinary high-sided goods truck. Double-tier sheep trucks, double rate.

Minimum charge for both up and down journey: sheep truck, 40s.; ordinary truck, 20s.

Pigs to be carried at the same rate as sheep.

## ON THE DOWN JOURNEY.

Fifty per cent. increase on the up-journey rates, or for double-tier sheep trucks, 2s. per mile per truck; or for ordinary goods trucks 1s. per mile per truck; parts of a mile to be calculated as a mile.

## CATTLE.

On the up journey, 1s. 3d. per mile per truck.

On the down journey, 1s. 6d. per mile per truck.

Minimum charge for truck, 20s.

The department do not undertake to forward live stock by any particular time or train; when there are any to be forwarded, due notice must be given, so as to give time for providing trucks, &c.

The department only undertake to carry live stock in accordance with their printed conditions.

The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in schedule being, however, only approximative, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will not, however, exceed during the whole year 50 per cent. of the estimated quarterly consumption.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. 6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9.
