## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight

Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of  
Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, called *The Weights and Measures Statute 1864*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, at the request of and pursuant to any agreement made by the councils or boards of any two or more of any adjoining boroughs, shires, and road districts, may proclaim such boroughs, shires, and districts to be a "union" for the purposes of the said Act, and by such Proclamation fix the proportion in which the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act shall be borne by the several bodies corporate of such boroughs, shires, or districts: And whereas the Council of the Borough of Beechworth and the Road Boards of the Districts of Stanley and Wooragee have requested that the said borough and districts may be proclaimed a "union," and that the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act may be borne in the proportion of three-eighths by the Borough of Beechworth, three-eighths by the Road District of Stanley, and two-eighths by the Road District of Wooragee: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do proclaim the Borough of Beechworth and the Road Board Districts of Stanley and Wooragee to be a "union" for the purposes of the said Act, and do fix the proportion in which the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act shall be borne by the Council of the said Borough of Beechworth and the said Road Boards of the Districts of Stanley and Wooragee, as follows:—  
Three-eighths by the Council of the Borough of Beechworth, Three-eighths by the Road Board of the District of Stanley, and Two-eighths by the Road Board of the District of Wooragee.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this seventh day of July, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and in the twenty-ninth year of Her Majesty's reign.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS.

ALL charges must be paid to the treasurer when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. Orders for interment must be given to the person in charge of the cemetery before Five o'clock p.m. on the day previous to the interment.

3. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order.

4. The procession to arrive at the cemetery punctually at the hour appointed for the funeral.

5. The usual hours of interment will be from Ten a.m. to Seven p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive; and from Ten to Four in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the only hours will be from Two to Five.

6. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any person on evidence being produced before two of the trustees that the relatives or friends of such persons are unable to pay the costs and charges.

7. Application for permission to make a vault or erect a monument in the cemetery to be made to the trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to the persons applying on payment of the charges set forth in the schedule marked A.

8. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but when a brick grave or vault is required it must be constructed under the direction of the trustees, or some person duly appointed by them; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault belonging to another person, the consent (in writing) of such person must be left with the order.

9. All monuments, vaults, graves, gravestones, and fences to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

10. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, or covered by a slab of freestone, granite, slate, or iron.

11. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and a plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, and a copy of every epitaph or inscription, to be submitted to the trustees for approval, who may withhold permission and prevent the erection of any monument which shall appear to them unappropriate or unbecoming, and shall determine and fix the position of any monument which may be preferred to be erected according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner. In the erection of tablets, copper cramps must be used.

12. Wooden fences allowed, but if not kept in proper repair may be removed by order of the trustees without notice to the owner.

13. A plan of the cemetery and a registry will be kept, and may be inspected at the charge set forth in schedule A.

14. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty in behalf of the trustees, will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

15. It is notified that any person wantonly or wilfully destroying, or doing or causing to be done any damage to, any monument, vault, or tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, or shrubbery, tree, or plant in the cemetery, is guilty of a misdemeanor, and being convicted thereof, is liable to be punished as prescribed by the Act in that case made and provided.

16. No dogs will be allowed to enter the cemetery.

17. The cemetery will be open to the public from sunrise to sunset.

18. Three of the trustees to form a quorum.

19. No grave to be of a less depth than six feet. The trustees reserve the right to make any alteration from time to time in these regulations.

And it is hereby notified to the owners respectively of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon the streets, courts, or alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked A, that if they or any of them shall neglect or omit to remove the obstructions, and pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete and repair the street, court, or alley on which their respective tenements adjoin or abut, in the manner and within the time expressed in this order, then the council of the said city will remove all obstructions in the said streets, courts, or alleys, and pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain, sewer, or otherwise complete or repair the same, or such parts thereof as shall not have been so done pursuant to this order; and will thereupon ascertain, determine, and charge such respective owners with their several proportionate part of the costs, charges, and expenses thereof, according to and co-extensive with their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on said street, court, or alley, proportionate to the extent of the area of the land of each of the several owners so situated as to have or be capable of obtaining access to such street, court, or alley, at the time of or in consequence of the formation or repair of such street, court, or alley, having regard in such apportionment to the state and condition in which the pavement, flagging, macadamising, levelling, draining and sewerage of such streets, courts, or alleys respectively, or any part thereof, shall or may be at time of making this order.

SCHEDULE B.

Referred to in this Order.

Manner in which the streets, courts, and alleys enumerated in Schedule A, referred to in this order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, kerbed, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered.

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up, as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole street, court, or alley, shall in no part have an inclination of less than one (1) in eighty (80), and, where practicable, the entire length is to form one incline.

In laying on any stuff, it is to be spread in layers of not more than one foot thick.

The transverse section of the street, court, or alley (where the water-channels are on the sides), is to show a roadway whose crown shall be one inch above the kerbs of the footways, and the fall from the crown to the water-channels shall not be less than one (1) in twenty-five (25).

Each street, court, or alley shall have a bluestone pitched water-channel, either at each of its sides or in its centre, of sufficient capacity to meet the required drainage for the same, the width of said channel or channels in no instance to be less than two (2) feet.

The pitchers to be nine (9) inches wide, and from six (6) to nine (9) inches deep, and from nine (9) to fourteen (14) inches long, with upright sides, set in sand, and well rammed down to such section as the city surveyor may direct.

The bottom of the channel is to be seven (7) inches below the kerbstones of footpaths.

On either side of the roadway there is to be, where practicable, a footpath, not more than three (3) feet wide, and these are to be separated from the roadway by a neatly dressed bluestone kerb from two (2) to four (4) feet long, six (6) inches wide, and fifteen (15) inches deep.

The footways are to be covered with a coat of gravel three (3) inches thick, and the surface is to fall towards the channel at the rate of one (1) in ten (10).

The roadway is to be covered with a coat of clean bluestone metal, 24-inch gauge, nine (9) inches deep in the centre, and six (6) inches deep on the sides, and this, when necessary, covered over with a coat of good loam two (2) inches thick, and rolled with corporation iron roller.

Whenever private residences lead from the streets, courts, or alleys, they are to be paved to the full width (of building line) with bluestone pitchers similar to those used in the channels.

All entrances from adjoining streets shall be pitched and kerbed either with four (4) inch bluestone cubes or nine (9) inch pitchers, as the city surveyor may direct, the sides being well supported with eight (8) inch stone kerbing.

The whole of the work must be done under the inspection, and subject to the approval, of the city surveyor, who is authorised to order any deviation from these general principles which the peculiarities of any case may require.

BYE-LAWS OF THE MELBOURNE HOSPITAL.

OBJECT.

THE object of the Melbourne Hospital shall be to afford medical and surgical aid to poor persons requiring it, and for casualties; but no person who shall meet with casualties, and shall be found able to pay for surgical aid, shall receive further than temporary assistance.

PRIVILEGES OF CONTRIBUTORS AND HONORARY BENEFACTORS.

2. Every contributor of £1 per annum, and every contributor of not less than £20 in one donation, shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings, and to recommend four out-patients in every year; and every contributor of £5 per annum, and every contributor of £100 in one donation, shall be entitled to two votes, and to nominate two in-patients and twelve out-patients in every year; and every contributor of £10 per annum, and every contributor of £200 in one donation, shall be entitled to three votes, and to nominate four in-patients and twenty out-patients in every year.

3. Every public or corporate body which shall contribute an annual sum of £5 or upwards, shall be entitled to recommend one in-patient and five out-patients in every year, and the same for every additional £5 subscribed. And the first-named executor in any will, paying to the institution the sum of £50 and upwards, and every clergyman paying in one sum, by collections in his church, the sum of £50 and upwards, and every other person collecting by subscriptions the sum of £50 and upwards in one year, and paying the same to the institution, shall be an honorary contributor of the Hospital, and as such be entitled to recommend one in-patient and five out-patients in each year, but shall not have the right of voting.

4. Every yearly subscription shall be paid in advance, and every first yearly payment shall be calculated from the date of such payment, but no such first yearly payment shall entitle to a vote at a general meeting within three months from the date of such payment.

5. The privileges of annual contributors shall be suspended until all arrears are paid.

6. Every firm or partnership becoming contributors shall exercise their privilege through some one member of the same.

7. Persons who shall have conferred any signal benefit on the Hospital, irrespective of subscription, may be elected honorary contributors at any general meeting, on the recommendation of the committee of management—who shall be entitled to recommend one in-patient and five out-patients in every year, but shall not have the right of voting.

GENERAL MEETINGS.

8. At all meetings of contributors the president, or one of the vice-presidents, or the treasurer, as the case may be, shall take the chair, but in their absence the meeting shall choose its own chairman, who shall have a casting vote only.

9. The annual meeting of the contributors to the Hospital shall be held on the second Thursday in the month of January in every year, for the following purposes:—

1. The election of members of the committee of management.

2. The election of the president, vice-president, treasurer, and three auditors for the ensuing year.

3. The transaction of any other business of which due notice has been given.

10. At all general meetings of contributors twelve shall constitute a quorum, and as soon as a quorum is present the chair will be taken, but if no quorum is present within half an hour of the time named, such meeting shall stand adjourned for the following week, at the same day and hour.

11. It shall be competent for the committee of management, or any twenty or more contributors, by a writing under their hands, to require the secretary to summon a special meeting of contributors, the occasion of calling such meeting being specified in the requisition; and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting, except that for which it shall have been summoned; every such meeting shall be called by the secretary by advertisement, in two at least of the public newspapers published in Melbourne, at least one week before the day of meeting.

COMMON SEAL.

12. The common seal of the corporation shall be kept in the iron chest at the Hospital, in a box with two different locks and keys, one of which shall be kept by the treasurer and the other by the secretary.

13. The common seal shall not be affixed to any deed or other instrument except by order of the committee of management at a meeting at which seven members at least are present.

EXTRACTS FROM ACT OF INCORPORATION.

14. The governing committee, in whom are vested the powers and authorities of this corporation, consists of the president, two vice-presidents, and treasurer for the time being, and sixteen contributors; of whom one-fourth part may be honorary medical men on the staff of the institution.—27 Vic. No. 220, sec. 4.

15. On the second Thursday in the month of January in every year, one-third part of the elected members of the committee shall go out of office (but may nevertheless be re-elected), and the persons who shall go out of office shall be those who have been the longest in office without re-election, or where two or more shall have been in office the same length of time, then those who shall go out of office shall be determined by lot.—27 Vic. No. 220, sec. 11.

16. If any member of the committee shall die, or resign by letter under his hand addressed to the chairman of the committee, or become insolvent, or compound with his creditors, or be convicted of any treason, felony, or misdemeanor, or be absent for four consecutive meetings from the committee, his office shall become vacant, and the remaining members of the committee may declare his office vacant, and temporarily appoint

thereto some contributor to such institution until the next annual meeting for the election of the committee, when the person thus temporarily appointed shall retire as one of those who, by the provisions of the said Act, are required to go out of office.—27 Vic. No. 220, sec. 12.

#### COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

17. The committee of management may suspend any member of the honorary medical staff, provided that an absolute majority of the committee concur in such suspension, and provided that the suspension and cause thereof be reported to a general meeting of the contributors, to be specially convened for that purpose within two weeks after the order of suspension was made.

18. The committee of management shall direct the general business of the Hospital, shall frame bye-laws (in accordance with the Act, and rules for its internal regulation, shall have power to enter into contracts for the supply of provisions and other articles for the use of the institution, and direct payment to be made thereof, and shall appoint and discharge all paid officers and servants of the institution.

19. A meeting of the committee of management shall be held at the Hospital at three o'clock p.m., on Tuesday in each week.

20. Special meetings of the committee may be convened on the requisition of the president or one of the vice-presidents, or of any four members of the committee, and the secretary shall give notice of the business to be transacted at such meeting, at which no other business shall be considered.

21. The committee shall present a general report of the affairs of the Hospital at the meeting of contributors, to be held in the month of January in each year, together with a full statement of the accounts of the corporation for the preceding year, from 1st January to 31st December inclusive, duly audited.

22. Sub-committees may be appointed from time to time, at the discretion of the committee of management.

23. At the first meeting of the committee in each year, after the annual general meeting, the following sub-committees shall be appointed, viz.:

1. A finance committee, to consist of three members.
2. A building committee, to consist of three members.
3. A drug committee, to consist of three of the honorary medical officers.
4. An election committee, to consist of three members.

24. The president, vice-presidents, and treasurer shall be *ex officio* members of all committees.

#### RULES APPLICABLE TO THE COMMITTEE.

25. The president one of the vice-presidents, or treasurer, if present, shall preside at meetings of the committee, but in their absence the meeting shall appoint its own chairman.

26. Four members of the committee constitute a quorum.

27. The committee shall commence business as soon after the time notified as there is a sufficient number of members present to constitute a quorum; but if, at the expiry of twenty minutes from the time specified, there is not a quorum present, the meeting shall stand adjourned to the following Tuesday.

28. No business shall be entered upon until the minutes of the previous meeting have been read, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy.

29. No proposition to enact or amend a bye-law, or frame or vary any rule, shall be entertained, unless one month's previous notice has been given of such; and no motion to rescind a resolution shall be submitted within three months after such resolution has been passed, unless one month's notice of the same be given, and such motion be passed by an absolute majority of the whole committee.

30. No motion, except on current business, shall be entertained, unless three days' notice of the same shall have been given to the secretary, who shall notify the same in the summons to each member of the committee.

#### GENERAL RULES.

31. At all general or committee meetings, the chairman shall have a vote only in the event of there being an equality of votes.

32. All votes shall be taken by show of hands, if possible.

33. In order that any person may be qualified to be a member of the committee of management, he must be a contributor to the institution.

34. No person who shall hold any office or place of profit under the corporation, or be concerned, or participate in any wise in any contract with the committee of management, or in the profit thereof, or of any work to be done under the authority of the same, shall be capable of being or continuing a member of such committee; provided that such disability shall not apply to any member of any company, partnership, or association consisting of more than twenty persons, when such contract shall be entered into for the general benefit of such company, partnership, or association. But no committee-man shall vote or take part in the discussion of any matter in or before the committee in which he shall, directly or indirectly, by himself or his partners, have any pecuniary interest.

#### HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.

35. That, inasmuch as the present number of honorary physicians and honorary surgeons is unnecessarily large, and that it is expedient to appoint honorary assistant physicians and honorary assistant surgeons respectively. It is hereby provided that the existing number shall be reduced in manner following, viz.:

36. Whenever by death, resignation, expiry of term of office, or removal, after the passing of these bye-laws, any vacancy or vacancies shall occur in any of these offices, the first of such vacancies shall not be filled up, but the number of honorary physicians and surgeons respectively shall consist of seven, and so on of six, five, and four respectively, as successive vacancies shall occur, until the number is reduced to four; and thenceforward the number of honorary physicians and surgeons respectively shall be limited to four.

37. Whenever the numbers of honorary physicians or surgeons shall be reduced to six, there shall be appointed one honorary assistant physician or surgeon, as the case may be; and whenever the number of honorary physicians or surgeons shall be reduced to four, a second honorary assistant physician or surgeon shall be appointed, as the case may be; and thenceforward the number of honorary assistant physicians and surgeons shall be limited to two respectively.

38. The honorary medical staff are empowered to frame rules for the admission of medical and surgical pupils, and the fees to be paid by the same, subject to the approval of the committee of management.

#### QUALIFICATION, ELECTION, SUSPENSION, OR REMOVAL OF HONORARY STAFF.

39. Whenever any vacancy shall occur in the office of president, vice-president, or treasurer, or in the honorary medical staff, the secretary shall report the same at the next ensuing meeting of the committee of management, who shall at their next meeting direct the secretary to summon a general meeting of contributors, not earlier than ten nor more than twenty days after the occurrence of such vacancy, for the election by such meeting of a successor, and shall notify the same and the names of the candidates in some one or more of the Melbourne daily papers, at least on three separate days until such election has been made.

40. Every such election, if there are not more candidates than one for the same office, shall be determined by show of hands, but in the event of a contest the election shall be determined by ballot, and the poll shall be kept open from Twelve to Four o'clock, or such longer period as the chairman may deem necessary; and, in case of an equality of votes, the chairman shall decide. Contributors must attend personally to vote.

41. No person shall be eligible for election as an honorary physician or an honorary surgeon unless he shall be registered as a legally qualified medical practitioner, under any Act in force in Victoria relating to medical practitioners; and unless he shall possess (for the office of physician) a degree from some one of the universities of the United Kingdom, or of the Australian colonies, or a foreign university recognised by them, or a diploma from a college of physicians in the United Kingdom; and unless he shall possess (for the office of surgeon) a degree as master of surgery, from some one of the aforesaid universities, or be a member or licentiate of some one college of surgeons in the United Kingdom.

42. No person shall be eligible for the office of assistant physician or assistant surgeon unless he possess a similar qualification to that required for honorary physicians or honorary surgeons.

43. Honorary physicians and surgeons and assistant physicians and surgeons shall hold office for ten years only, but on the termination of that period shall be eligible for re-election; and every honorary medical officer shall, on his election to office, sign the bye-laws in token that he will observe the same.

44. Honorary medical officers shall not absent themselves from the hospital for more than ten consecutive days without the leave of the committee; and if they do so for four consecutive weeks without such leave, the committee of management may suspend such officer and report the same, as provided for in bye-law 17.

45. Candidates for any honorary medical or surgical appointment shall forward their qualifications to the secretary who shall lay them before the committee of management four days at least before the day of election, and the same shall be referred to the election committee, and such election committee shall make a written report thereon to the committee of management at their next sitting; provided, nevertheless, that the absence of any such report shall not prevent the election taking place.

#### AUDITORS.

46. The accounts of the Hospital shall be audited in the first week in January in every year by two at least of the auditors, who shall sign a statement of accounts exhibiting a summary of receipts and expenditure.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE.

47. On the first Tuesday of each month (or such other times as the committee may appoint) the finance committee shall examine all accounts for disbursements and certify as to their correctness, and also see that the money received by the collectors, as checked by the superintendent, has been paid into bank to the credit of the Hospital.

#### ACCOUNTS.

48. All sums received on account of the Hospital shall be paid into the Bank of New South Wales, or such other bank as the committee of management may appoint, to one or other of the following accounts as the case may be, viz.:

- Melbourne Hospital Maintenance Fund.
- Building Fund.
- Convalescent Fund.

49. All accounts, before they are discharged, shall be submitted to the finance committee, who shall certify as to their correctness.

50. All payments shall be made by order of the committee of management.

51. All cheques shall be signed by the chairman of the committee of management, countersigned by the treasurer and two members of the finance committee.

#### ADMISSION OF IN-PATIENTS AND OUT-PATIENTS.

52. Patients are admitted on Tuesdays and Fridays, at half-past Eleven o'clock.

53. All sick persons are admissible as in-patients on the recommendation of a contributor, provided they appear to the committee of management as proper objects of charity, and that the physician or surgeon of the week reports that they are likely to receive benefit by treatment in the Hospital.

54. Accidents and cases of emergency are at all times admissible without letters of recommendation, where delay might prove dangerous.

55. The committee may admit articulated seamen on payment of 25s. per week, or in that proportion, on the order of the shipping master of the port, countersigned by the captain or agent of the vessel, in accordance with an agreement made with the Government.

56. No lunatic, or person having the small-pox, or person suffering from chronic epilepsy, or from ulcerated legs of long standing, or pregnant female for the purpose of confinement, or person whose case might be equally relieved as an out-patient, shall be deemed to be a proper case for admission as an in-patient.

57. Whenever the applications for admission are more than can be accommodated in the house, the most urgent cases only will be admitted. No. 1750
