NOTICE RESPECTING WRECKS, MARINE CASUALTIES, AND VESSELS IN DISTRESS.

AS it is desirable that the Government should receive the earliest intimation of wrecks, or marine casualties, or of the necessity for rendering assistance to vessels in distress, all Masters of Vessels and persons connected with Her Majesty's Customs, Police, Harbor and Telegraph Departments, and others who may be in possession of information in respect of such cases, are directed to avail themselves of the most accessible and speedy means of communication to place such information in the hands of the Chief Harbor Master, in order that he may, without any delay, take whatever steps the urgency of the case may demand.

The Police, the Chief Harbor Master, and all Officers of the Harbor and Customs Departments are to use every exertion with promptitude to render assistance where required, transmitting full particulars of the steps which they have taken, and recommendations as to any further assistance necessary, to the Chief Secretary and the Commissioner of Trade and Customs.

WORKS ON MAIN ROADS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the power conferred by *The Local Government Act 1863*, has, by Orders severally made on the 3rd day of September, 1866, directed that the undermentioned Shire Councils and District Board shall, within the times by the said respective Orders appointed, execute the works on Main Roads hereinafter named and described, as provided by the 220th section of the said Act, according to plans deposited with the Board of Land and Works, that is to say:—

The Council of the Shire of Glenlyon shall, within twelve months from the 3rd of September aforesaid, drain, form, and metal about four miles sixty-seven chains and forty-eight links of the Main road from Malmesbury to Daylesford.

The Council of the Shire of Lexton shall, within twelve months from the 3rd of September aforesaid, drain, form, and metal about one mile seventy-nine chains and forty-five links of the Main road from Ballarat to Avoca.

The Council of the Shire of Mortlake shall, within twelve months from the 3rd of September aforesaid, drain, form, and metal about three miles and sixty-three chains of the Main road from Darlington to Letts' Ford.

The District Board of the Melton Road District shall, within twelve months from the 3rd of September aforesaid, drain, form, and metal about thirty-seven chains of the Melbourne to Ballarat Main road.

CUTTING OR REMOVING TIMBER, ETC., IN OR FROM CERTAIN LANDS IN THE PARISHES OF COROP AND BURRAMBOOT PROHIBITED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1862* it is amongst other things enacted, that notwithstanding anything thereinbefore contained the Governor in Council may by Proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall cut or remove live or dead timber or bark, or stone or gravel, from such portions of Crown lands as are named in such Proclamation, or shall exercise on any such portions the powers, or any of them, conferred by any license granted under the authority of the third part of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, do, with the advice of the Executive Council, declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall cut or remove live timber or bark, or stone or gravel, from the portion of Crown lands hereinafter described, or shall exercise on any portion thereof the powers, or any of them, conferred by any license granted under the authority of *The Land Act 1862*, or of *The Amending Land Act 1865*, viz.—Commencing at the

north-east angle of J. C. Read's pre-emptive section, parish of Corop, the said angle being a point on the west margin of Lake Cooper; thence by the north boundary of the said pre-emptive section bearing west ten chains, more or less, to a point bearing south one chain from the south-east angle of allotment C, parish of Corop; thence by allotments C, B, A, 161, 159, 158, 157, 156, 137, 135, 130, 155, 154, 153, 152, 143, 149, 150, and 151, bearing northerly, easterly, and southerly to the south-west angle of the last-named allotment; thence by a line running parallel with and five chains easterly from the eastern margin of the aforesaid lake bearing southerly to an angle of the north boundary of allotment 75, in the parish of Burramboot; thence by allotments 75, 70, 68, 67, and a line bearing north-westerly to a point on the south boundary of the aforesaid pre-emptive section, bearing north one chain from the north-east angle of the last-named allotment; thence by the south boundary of that section bearing east to the west margin of the aforesaid lake; and thence by the margin of that lake bearing southerly, easterly, northerly, westerly, and southerly to the point of commencement; as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(66.N.11462.)

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1862* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold-fields common, or a town common respectively, as the case may be: And whereas by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or reproclaimed, and may from time to time reproclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now recited Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase and proclaim the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Acts, that is to say:—

BEAC TOWN COMMON.—The Town Common of Beac described in a Proclamation bearing date the 30th day of January, 1865, is hereby increased by the addition thereto of allotments 38 A and 38 B, in the parish of Ondit, containing an area of one hundred and eighty-nine acres two rods two perches, as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(66.N.5703.)

Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and may be forwarded (if by post, pre-paid) addressed to the Deputy Postmaster General, with the words "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails" endorsed on the cover, or placed in the Tender-box at the General Post Office.

Tenders are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire service as called for.

Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to twenty per cent. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them on application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.

Persons tendering are requested to state the description of the vehicle they intend to use, and the number of horses by which it is to be drawn.

A separate tender must be sent in for each service, but notwithstanding this condition, any offer will be entertained for the performance of any number of services for a lump sum. The number of the service or services tendered for must be plainly endorsed on the outside of the cover.

SHIRE OF WABANGA.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE
BURNNEWANG FARMERS' COMMON, 1866.

ANY person holding or occupying purchased or leased land within the boundary of this common or area will be entitled to its advantages.

2. Each person entitled to commonage shall be permitted to graze cattle according to the following scale, viz.—Not exceeding 1 head to every 5 acres of grazing land, and 2 head to every 5 acres of cultivated land; and so in proportion for every acre up to 340 acres.

3. The fees for all cattle and horses over twelve months old will be 4s. per head per annum; all under that age free.

4. All fees to be paid quarterly—on the 11th of August, the 11th November, the 11th February, and the 11th May in each year; and in case of non-payment, the commoner's cattle, or a portion of them, may be sold to the amount of fees due and expenses of sale of the said cattle; and in case of said cattle being removed from common, the commoner may be sued for same, and the amount recoverable as a common debt.

5. In no case will either a bull or entire horse be permitted on the common without the written consent of the managers.

6. In no case will sheep be permitted to graze on the said common during the first year, at the end of which time, if the then commoners, or a majority of them agree to depasture sheep, this rule may be altered or mended to suit their wishes.

7. All cattle sent to the said common shall have the Burnnewang Farmers' Common brand on them.

8. All owners of stock depasturing cattle on said common shall muster their cattle on receiving notice from managers or herdsman, and assist in branding them with the common brand.

9. The herdsman will attend at the common yard every Monday from Nine in the morning until Three in the afternoon, to brand all cattle brought to him.

10. The herdsman will be authorized by the managers to impound all sheep, cattle, horses, goats, and pigs trespassing on said common; an entry of which he shall make in a book kept for that purpose, so that all damages and fees arising from the same may be properly accounted for.

11. No person shall be allowed to remove cattle from the common without giving twenty-four hours' notice to the herdsman.

12. It will be the herdsman's duty to see all cattle under his charge twice weekly.

13. Should the fees collected be insufficient to pay the herdsman's salary and other expenses connected with the management, an additional charge will be made on each commoner in fair proportion to the number of cattle depastured by him, and each commoner may be sued for the same and the amount recoverable as a common debt.

14. The herdsman shall release at his own expense all cattle, horses, &c., impounded from off the common, and he shall receive as an equivalent all fees arising from all cattle, horses, sheep, &c., impounded by him from the common.

15. Should the managers at any time consider the herdsman incompetent, or neglectful of his duties, they can remove or discharge him without a written notice, and he can have no claim on them for compensation whatever.

16. The managers do not hold themselves responsible for any neglect or irregularity of the herdsman.

17. All diseased cattle found on the common will be immediately destroyed, at the expense of owner, if known; if owner not known, the managers may cause same to be destroyed, the cost to be out of the funds of the common.

18. The managers reserve to themselves the power in exceptional cases, where considered necessary, to allow more stock on the common or withdraw them in fair proportion from each commoner as they may think necessary as the case may be.

BOROUGH OF BALLARAT.

RULES FOR THE BETTER REGULATION AND GOVERNMENT OF
THE CATTLE MARKET OF THE BOROUGH OF BALLARAT.

THAT the cattle market shall be open for the reception and delivery of cattle and other live stock, on every lawful day, from sunrise to sunset.

2. That there shall be appointed for such cattle market an officer, to be called the inspector thereof, whose duty shall be as follows:—

1st. To see that the market regulations are duly observed.

2nd. To demand and receive all market tolls and dues.

3rd. To allot the principal and drafting yards to the use of the parties bringing stock to the market for sale in such manner as in each particular case may seem to such inspector to be most convenient.

3. RENEWAL OF LICENSES UNDER THE 42ND SECTION OF "THE AMENDING LAND ACT 1865."

THE attention of holders of licenses under the 42nd section of *The Amending Land Act 1865*, is particularly requested to the requirements set forth in the 16th clause of the regulations relating thereto (copy appended), as the penalties attached to a breach of this regulation will be strictly enforced.

16. *Renewal of licenses.*—If the holder of a license shall, within fourteen (14) days before the expiry of the term of such license, or of any license renewed as hereinbefore provided, notify to such receiver and paymaster, or other officer as hereinbefore mentioned, that he desires to renew his right of occupation under such license, and if he forward with such notification the amount payable thereunder, and if he adduce evidence (on being required so to do) sufficient to show that he has complied with the conditions of the license then in force, the license may be renewed subject to all the terms and conditions thereof, and the licensee shall not be required to erect posts, publish notices, or make application as hereinbefore directed. *If the holder of any such license fail to forward such notice and fee within the period before mentioned, he will, on the expiration of the term of the license, be liable to forfeit his right to occupy the land described in such license, and if he continue thereafter to occupy the land, he will be liable to prosecution for unauthorised occupation of Crown lands, and no compensation will be given for any improvements on the land, which will thereupon be deemed to be available for occupation by other persons, or to be otherwise appropriated.*

Forms of application for renewal of license can be obtained from the local receivers and paymasters, or other officers authorised to issue the licenses.

OXLEY CEMETERY.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE OXLEY GENERAL CEMETERY.

ALL charges must be paid when orders are given for interment.

2. Application for permission to make a vault, or erect a monument in the cemetery, to be made to the trustees; permission, in the form contained in schedule A, will be granted to applicants on payment of the proper charges.

3. The charges will be remitted on the burial of a poor person in the cemetery, on evidence to the satisfaction of the trustees that the deceased was without means, and that his relations or friends are unable to pay the charges.

4. The trustees will cause all ordinary graves to be dug, but should a brick grave or vault be required it must be constructed under the direction of the trustees, or of some other person appointed by them. No grave to be less than six feet deep.

5. Orders for interment to be given to the sexton, or other person appointed by the trustees, on the day preceding the interment, between the hours of Eight o'clock a.m. and Six o'clock p.m.; the particulars required in schedule B. must be stated when giving the order.

6. The time fixed for the funeral must be the time of arrival at the cemetery.

7. The hours appointed for interment are from Eight o'clock a.m. until Six o'clock p.m. from 1st September to 30th April, and from Eight o'clock a.m. until Four o'clock p.m. during the remaining months.

8. The plans of all monuments, tablets, and fences to be erected, must first be submitted to the trustees for approval.

9. Monuments, tablets, and fences, are to be kept in proper condition and repair at the expense of the owners, or they may be removed by order of the trustees.

10. Every coffin in a vault must be bricked in or cemented.

11. If an interment is to be made in any private vault or grave, the written consent of the owner must be left with the order.

12. A plan of the cemetery and register will kept.

13. No person employed by the trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge of his duties.

14. All persons injuring the cemetery, or its fences or monuments, will be prosecuted as the law directs.

15. The trustees reserve the right to alter these regulations and charges from time to time, subject to the approval of His Excellency the Governor.

The foregoing Rules and Regulations were agreed to by us at a meeting of trustees held at Oxley on the 28th day of June, 1866.
