The deaths in August, 1866, were fewer by 20 than the average of the month in seven years, and this notwithstanding the districts have greatly increased in population during the period. The mean temperature was a degree higher than the average.

Deaths of males and females furnish a proportion relatively to the whole mortality of 57 per cent. and 43 per cent. respectively. Deaths of children under five exhibit a proportion of 44 per cent. to the whole, against 49 per cent. in August, 1865; 34 per cent. in August, 1863; 43 per cent. in August, 1863; 43 per cent. in August, 1861; and 49 per cent. in August, 1860. August, 1860.

Seventeen deaths occurred upon the 5th of the month. For no other day was a higher mortality than 11 recorded. As few eaths were recorded for the 17th, and only 3 for the 15th.

A female aged 79 died during the month of hernia, and a female aged 86 of dysentery. These were the only persons of 75. years old and upwards whose deaths were recorded.

Only five violent deaths occurred, which is much below the average number. They were all supposed to be accidental. One was of a female 60 years old who was burnt to death, one of a boy aged 2½ years who died of scalds, one of a boy aged 7 years who was drowned, and two of infants each aged three months who were suffocated in bed.

Forty-nine deaths, or 22 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—30 in the Melbourne Hospital, 1 in the Lying-in Hospital, 5 in the Benevolent Asylum, 2 in the Immigrants' Home, 3 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 4 in the Industrial Schools, 3 in the Melbourne Gaol, and I in the prison hulk Success.

Deaths from zymotic diseases are on the increase. The number was 68, or 31 per cent. of the deaths from all causes in the month under review, against 56, or 21 per cent, in July. One death was set down to measles. This complaint, in a fatal form, has for some time past been prevailing in Ballarnt and the surrounding districts, but since last January has not caused a death in Melbourne until now. Twenty-six deaths were set down to scarlatina and diphtheria against 20 in July, 5 to whooping-cough against 2, 9 to typhoid and infantile fevers against 8, and 11 to distribute and dysentery against 8. Deaths from constitutional diseases fell from 67 to 30, only 20 deaths being referred to phthisis against 35 in July.

Any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by aid with the permission of the tristees, and upon payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep such vault mortupent, or tombstone, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons, and his or their representatives for ever. Application for such permission must be made to the trustees.

3. A certificate of permission, in the form set out in schedule A, will be granted to the party applying for such permission, on payment of the proper charges.

4. The charges will be reinitted on the burial of any poor person in such "cemetery, on the certificate of a minister of religion or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relations and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

5. Orders for interments must be given six warking

- charges.

 5. Orders for interments must be given six working hours prior to the hour fixed for the funeral; if not, an extra charge will be made. No free interment will be allowed without the above notice.
- above notice.

 6. The trustees will cause all ordinary graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick vaults will be required to construct them, under the direction of such person or persons as the trustees may appoint.
- 7. The name, age, date, place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased must be stated at the time of giving the order (see schedule B).
- 8. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones must be kept in repair and proper condition by and at the expense of the owners.
- 9. Drawings or plans of every stone, tomb, or monument to be erected; and a copy of every epitaph or inscription must be submitted to the trustees for approval before being admitted into the cemetery.

10. No catacombs or any wooden fencing allowed round graves without the approval of the trustees.

11. The ground will be open daily to the public from sunrise osunset.

12. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the graves, is kept at the oflice, and may be inspected at all reasonable hours. Registers of all grants will be kept by the secretary.

13. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.
