PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1862* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold-fields common, or a town common respectively, as the case may be: And whereas by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now reciting Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Acts, that is to say:—

VIOLETTOWN TOWN COMMON, described, amongst others, in a Proclamation bearing date the 18th day of February, 1861, is hereby increased by the addition thereto of 1130 acres, more or less, being the unappropriated Crown lands within the township of Violettown.—(66.M.11506.)

COMMONS IN AGRICULTURAL AREAS.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land a farmers' common; when one-eighth part of any agricultural area has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim any unselected and unleased portion of such agricultural area, not exceeding twice the quantity so selected and leased, to be a temporary common for the use of such selectors and lessees: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the areas hereinafter mentioned to be commons for the use of lessees and selectors in the undermentioned agricultural areas in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted by sec. 15, that no person shall within any period of twelve months become the lessee, or sub-lessee, or assignee, either in his own name or in the name or names of any other person or persons, of more than 640 acres of the lands proclaimed under that Act, as therein mentioned; and no person shall become the lessee, or sub-lessee, or assignee of any allotment who is an infant, or who is a married woman not having obtained a decree of judicial separation binding in Victoria, or who is not domiciled in Victoria, or who is in respect of the allotment for a lease of which he applies, or in respect of any part thereof, an agent or a servant of or a trustee for any other person, or who at the time of his application has entered into any agreement to permit any other person to acquire, by purchase or otherwise, the allotment in respect of which such application is made, or any part thereof, or the applicant's interest therein; and all land applied for under that Act shall be so applied for *bona fide* for the use and benefit of the applicant in his own proper person, and not as the agent or servant, or trustee of or for any other person; and allotments selected or purchased under the provisions thereinbefore contained shall be reckoned as part of the 640 acres thereinbefore mentioned; and it is by the said Act provided that if any person shall, in violation of any of the provisions of that section, become the lessee, or assignee, or sub-lessee of an allotment, the Governor in Council may declare the lease of such allotment to be forfeited, and upon publication in the *Government Gazette* of notice of such declaration, the term created by the said lease shall cease and determine, and the right, title, and interest of the lessee, and of every assignee and sub-lessee in and to such lease, and all moneys paid for rent in respect of such allotment shall be absolutely forfeited, and the allotment may be sold in fee simple or leased again, in manner in the said Act provided: And whereas the leases mentioned in the first column of the schedule hereto of the allotments therein comprised and thereby demised, being land proclaimed under the provisions of the said Act, were granted at the time, in manner, and to the lessees therein mentioned: And whereas the persons whose names are mentioned in the second column of the schedule hereto became the lessees as aforesaid of the said allotments comprised in and demised by the hereinbefore-mentioned leases, in violation of the provisions to the contrary of the said hereinbefore-recited section, in manner, and for the reasons mentioned in the third column of the schedule hereto: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise and execution of the power or authority in that behalf given by the said hereinbefore-mentioned Act, doth hereby declare that the said leases mentioned in the said first column of the schedule hereto of the allotments therein comprised and thereby demised are forfeited.

And the Honorable James Macpherson Grant, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Crown Lands and Survey for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by *The Electoral Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that where any accidental or unavoidable impediment, misfeasance, or omission shall have happened in the preparation or transmission or printing of any general roll

or supplementary roll or ordinary electoral roll or roll of rate-paying electors, the Governor in Council may take all such measures as may be necessary for removing such impediment or rectifying such misfeasance or omission, or may declare any such roll valid as to and notwithstanding such impediment, misfeasance, or omission; and every such Order in Council shall state specifically the nature of the impediment, misfeasance, or omission, and shall be forthwith published in the *Government Gazette*: And whereas it has been represented that there are rolls of ratepayers within the several electoral divisions hereinafter mentioned, and that certified lists of the same were omitted to be transmitted to the respective Electoral Registrars for such divisions by some or one of the officers named in the 63rd section of *The Electoral Act 1865*, within the time fixed by the said Act for that purpose, viz., the 20th of August, but have since been received by the said Registrars: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power in him vested by the 68th section of the said Act, with a view to rectifying the omissions above referred to, doth by this present Order authorize the several Registrars named in the first column of the schedule hereto annexed, being the Registrars of the divisions of the electoral districts named in the second column of the said schedule, to incorporate the list or lists received too late, as above mentioned, from the officers referred to in the third column of the said schedule, in the manner directed in the 64th section of the said Act; and doth declare the rolls of ratepaying electors containing such incorporated list or lists to be valid.

REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF AUGUST, 1866.

The deaths in August, 1866, were fewer by 20 than the average of the month in seven years, and this notwithstanding the districts have greatly increased in population during the period. The mean temperature was a degree higher than the average.

Deaths of males and females furnish a proportion relatively to the whole mortality of 57 per cent. and 43 per cent. respectively. Deaths of children under five exhibit a proportion of 44 per cent. to the whole, against 49 per cent. in August, 1865; 34 per cent. in August, 1864; 38 per cent. in August, 1863; 43 per cent. in August, 1862; 49 per cent. in August, 1861; and 49 per cent. in August, 1860.

Seventeen deaths occurred upon the 5th of the month. For no other day was a higher mortality than 11 recorded. As few as 2 deaths were recorded for the 17th, and only 3 for the 15th.

A female aged 79 died during the month of hernia, and a female aged 86 of dysentery. These were the only persons of 75 years old and upwards whose deaths were recorded.

Only five violent deaths occurred, which is much below the average number. They were all supposed to be accidental. One was of a female 60 years old who was burnt to death, one of a boy aged 2½ years who died of scalds, one of a boy aged 7 years who was drowned, and two of infants each aged three months who were suffocated in bed.

Forty-nine deaths, or 22 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—30 in the Melbourne Hospital, 1 in the Lying-in Hospital, 5 in the Benevolent Asylum, 2 in the Immigrants' Home, 3 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 4 in the Industrial Schools, 3 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 1 in the prison hulk *Success*.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 95, of which 56, or nearly 59 per cent., were of males, and 39, or about 41 per cent., were of females. Of those dying, 48 were under one year of age, 18 were between one and two years, 9 were between two and three, 9 were between three and four, and 11 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 123, of which 68, or about 55 per cent., were males and 55, or nearly 45 per cent., were females; 19 were between five and ten, 3 were between ten and fifteen, 6 were between fifteen and twenty, 12 were between twenty and twenty-five, 10 were between twenty-five and thirty, 8 were between thirty and thirty-five, 10 were between thirty-five and forty, 14 were between forty and forty-five, 9 were between forty-five and fifty, 7 were between fifty and fifty-five, 7 were between fifty-five and sixty, 10 were between sixty and sixty-five, 4 were between sixty-five and seventy, 2 were between seventy and seventy-five, 1 was between seventy-five and eighty, and 1 was eighty and upwards.

Deaths from zymotic diseases are on the increase. The number was 68, or 31 per cent. of the deaths from all causes in the month under review, against 56, or 21 per cent., in July. One death was set down to measles. This complaint, in a fatal form, has for some time past been prevailing in Ballarat and the surrounding districts, but since last January has not caused a death in Melbourne until now. Twenty-six deaths were set down to scarlatina and diphtheria against 20 in July, 5 to whooping-cough against 2, 9 to typhoid and infantile fevers against 8, and 11 to diarrhoea and dysentery against 8. Deaths from constitutional diseases fell from 57 to 30, only 20 deaths being referred to phthisis against 35 in July.

BORAM-BORAM CEMETERY.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE BORAM-BORAM CEMETERY.

ALL charges must be paid when orders are given.

2. Any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, and upon payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep such vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons, and his or their representatives for ever. Application for such permission must be made to the trustees.

3. A certificate of permission, in the form set out in schedule A, will be granted to the party applying for such permission, on payment of the proper charges.

4. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on the certificate of a minister of religion or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relations and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

5. Orders for interments must be given six working hours prior to the hour fixed for the funeral; if not, an extra charge will be made. No free interment will be allowed without the above notice.

6. The trustees will cause all ordinary graves to be dug; but parties wanting brick vaults will be required to construct them, under the direction of such person or persons as the trustees may appoint.

7. The name, age, date, place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased must be stated at the time of giving the order (see schedule B).

8. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones must be kept in repair and proper condition by and at the expense of the owners.

9. Drawings or plans of every stone, tomb, or monument to be erected, and a copy of every epitaph or inscription must be submitted to the trustees for approval before being admitted into the cemetery.

10. No catacombs or any wooden fencing allowed round graves without the approval of the trustees.

11. The ground will be open daily to the public from sunrise to sunset.

12. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the graves, is kept at the office, and may be inspected at all reasonable hours. Registers of all grants will be kept by the secretary.

13. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.

CONVEYANCE OF MAILS, 1867.

TENDERS are hereby invited, and will be received, until Noon of Thursday, the 11th October, 1866, for the conveyance of Post-office Mails, as undermentioned, for one year, from the 1st January, 1867, to 31st December, 1867; and for services numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 14, 15, 27, 28, 32, 33, 40, 41, 43, 52, 53, 54, 56, 66, 67, 68, 70, for one or three years.

Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and may be forwarded (if by post, pre-paid) addressed to the Deputy Postmaster General, with the words "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails" endorsed on the cover, or placed in the Tender-box at the General Post Office.

Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire service as called for.

Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to twenty per cent. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them on application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.

Persons tendering are requested to state the description of the vehicle they intend to use, and the number of horses by which it is to be drawn.

In cases where vehicles are intended to be used, tenderers are requested to state what additional charge, if any, would be made for the free conveyance of Members of Parliament along the line of road between the districts they represent and Melbourne.

A separate tender must be sent in for each service, but notwithstanding this condition, any offer will be entertained for the performance of any number of services for a lump sum. The number of the service or services tendered for must be plainly endorsed on the outside of the cover.

The tender of any person failing to comply with the foregoing conditions will not be entertained.

The general conditions referred to in the printed form of tender, and upon which the tender is to be made, can be inspected by persons proposing to tender, either at the General Post Office or at any post office in the colony.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.
