**MINING BOARD, BALLARAT.**

**BYE-LAW No. IV.**

At a Meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Ballarat, begun and holden at Ballarat, in the said district, on the twenty-fifth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the bye-law of this board, published in the *Government Gazette* on the seventeenth of August, 1866, and numbered III, the provisions hereinafter contained shall be deemed and taken as forming part of the bye-law aforesaid, and shall be read and construed in connection therewith:—

1. The holder or holders of any registered claim or claims, whether single or united, who desire to hold such claim or claims under a consolidated miner's right, may, on production to the mining registrar of a consolidated miner's right sufficient to hold such claim or claims, require the mining registrar to register such consolidated miner's right in respect of such claim or claims, in lieu of the separate miners' rights under which such claim or claims had been held; and the mining registrar shall register such consolidated miner's right accordingly, and shall mark upon the face of such consolidated miner's right the number or name of such claim, or of each such claim, and the date of such registration: Provided always that for every single claim one miner's right, or for any number of single claims a consolidated miner's right equal to one miner's right for each single claim, shall be held and be in force; and for every united claim so many miners' rights as there are single claims in such united claim, shall be held and be in force; and should more than one single claim be held under one miner's right, or a greater number of single claims than is hereinbefore provided, be held under a consolidated miner's right, the claims so held in excess of the miners' rights, or consolidated miner's right, shall be forfeitable.

2. The holders of water-rights shall not be entitled to take water from any river or main creek, or tributary creek, when by so doing they will reduce the quantity of water in a river-bed or main creek to less than one sluice-head, or in a tributary creek to less than half of a sluice-head.

3. Upon receipt by the mining registrar of a notice of possession of, and application for, a residence or business area, in the form prescribed in the bye-law of this board numbered 3, schedule 14, he shall deliver to the applicant a duplicate of such notice, and the applicant shall post such duplicate notice upon the site applied for, and shall keep such notice posted upon the site for the space of seven days; and if within the said seven days the registrar shall receive no notice of objection, he shall, on being requested so to do, register the applicant as the holder of the site applied for; but if any person shall, before the expiration of the said seven days, deliver to the registrar a notice in the form of the schedule hereto numbered 1, objecting to the registration of the applicant, and stating the grounds of his objection, the registrar shall refrain from making registration of such applicant as the holder of the site applied for until he shall be directed thereto by a judge of the court of mines or by a warden, or until he shall be satisfied the objector has failed to take proceedings, as hereinafter provided, or has failed to obtain an order preventing registration of the applicant; within seven days of the delivery of the notice of objection, the objector shall commence proceedings in the court of mines or warden's court, to prevent the registration of the applicant for the site applied for; but should he fail to commence proceedings as aforesaid, within the said seven days, or fail to obtain an order preventing registration of the applicant, the registrar, on production of a certificate from the clerk of the court of mines or the clerk of the warden's court, to the effect that the objector has failed as aforesaid, shall, if required so to do, register the applicant as the holder of the site applied for.

4. Any person holding two or more shares in any one claim or other mining tenement may transfer the whole of such shares upon one transfer-ticket; provided always that for every share in excess of one share so transferred, the registrar shall be entitled to demand and receive the sum of One shilling and sixpence.

5. All books containing notices of application for mining tenements shall, during office hours, be open for inspection by the public free of charge.

6. Any person or persons who shall, previous to and at the time of this bye-law coming into operation, be in possession of a mining tenement may require the mining registrar to re-register such tenement under the provisions of the bye-law of this board numbered III and of this bye-law. The mode of effecting such re-registration shall be in every respect the same as prescribed in the bye-law of this board numbered III, clauses 16 and 67, except that on production by the applicant or applicants to the registrar of a plan, description, and report, to the effect that the mining tenement shown on the plan has been and is still held by the applicant or applicants, the registrar shall make registration of such tenement without posting the notice as provided in the bye-law numbered III, clauses 16 and 67, of his intention to register: Provided always that previous to making such registration the registrar shall require the applicant or applicants to produce such a consolidated miner's right in force, or such a number of miners' rights in force, as shall, under the provisions of the bye-law numbered III, be sufficient to entitle the applicant or applicants to hold such tenement.

7. The scale of fees contained in the bye-law of this board, published in the *Government Gazette* on the seventeenth day of August, 1866, and numbered three, schedule 1, is hereby repealed; and notwithstanding any provisions respecting the payment of fees to mining registrars contained in the said bye-law numbered three, or in any previous bye-law of this board, the mining registrars in this mining district of Ballarat shall be entitled to demand and receive, in respect of, and in payment for,



the several duties prescribed in the said bye-law numbered three and in this bye-law, the fees set forth in the clause hereof numbered 4 and in the schedule hereto numbered 2, and none other.  
8. Each of the mining registrars shall enter in a proper book, to be kept by him for the purpose, an account of all fees received by him.

2. The orders will be issued by an officer of the railway department; and, should an order not be complied with within twenty-four hours, it will be competent for the local officer who ordered, to purchase at the contractor's risk.

3. Coal, when delivered, is to be accompanied by the order, which will be receipted by the officer receiving the supply, and must be rendered with the contractor's accounts.

4. The contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly or bi-monthly on the prescribed form, and present the same in a complete state to the Locomotive Superintendent, who will send it forward to the Railway Storekeeper, to be passed for payment at the Treasury or at a district pay office, as the case may be.

5. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supply as to the quality, the same is to be decided by the Engineer-in-Chief or the Locomotive Superintendent, and the decision of either is to be final.

6. The Engineer-in-Chief or officer in charge at the station will have the power to reject coal which is of inferior quality, and the contractor must take back the rejected coal, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense charged to the contractor.

Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

7. #### IRON CASTINGS.

**TENDERS** will be received until Noon on Wednesday, the 21st day of November, 1866, from persons willing to furnish Iron Castings, in such quantities as may be required for the Government Railways, from 1st January until the 31st December, 1867.

The castings are required for locomotive engine work, carriage work, &c.

Whenever specially ordered, the castings shall be run from the very best "cold-blast iron," and of such particular brand, quality, and mixture as may be described in the order; or of such other substituted mixture as may be approved or directed by the Locomotive Superintendent, so as to produce a hard, close, soft, or other description of metal.

The castings are to be clean, sharp, free from surface scale, shell, cold shuts, blow holes, honeycomb, cinder, or any other imperfection, and are to be sound in every respect and thoroughly close in grain. When specially ordered, the castings are to be run with heads or runners of such weight as may be requested, and no extra charge shall be made or allowed for same; and the contractor will be required to remove the head or runner from the casting where possible, and charge the casting at the net weight only, trimmed and cleaned. In cases where it is necessary to cut off the head in a lathe or machine, such head will be cut off by the Government, and returned to the Melbourne Station, there to be delivered to the contractor free of cost of carriage.

Whenever ordered, the castings are to be moulded in loam without a pattern, and loam price will be paid according to schedule, but no extra charge will be allowed for patterns, strickles, or loam boards. The orders will express the kind or description of casting according to the schedule distinction; and the rates there filled in opposite each item will be allowed accordingly.

3. Tenderers must fill in opposite to each particular item in the schedule the price at which he undertakes to execute the work, according to the specification and conditions.

4. Should the contractor, in the opinion of the Engineer-in-Chief, fail to furnish work in accordance with this specification, then, in seven days after due notice to that effect shall have been given in writing, the Secretary for Railways shall have full power to re-advertise and relet this contract to any other person the Government shall think fit; and at the expiration of seven days after such notice shall have been given to the contractor, this contract shall become null and void.

5. The contractor must furnish with each delivery detailed invoices or bills of parcels, in duplicate, showing quantity, rate, and value, also the number of the order of the goods, otherwise they will not be received. Delivery, as a rule, is to be of the full quantity ordered at one time.

6. The contractor will prepare his own account on the prescribed form, and render the same to the Railway Storekeeper for certification, previously to payment at the Treasury.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer requiring the supply, as to the quality, the same is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the Engineer-in-Chief, and the decision of the board is to be considered final. Any expense incurred on account of the rejection of supplies by a board of survey will be charged to the contractor.

8. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged to the contractor.

9. The Locomotive Superintendent will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior character, or not in accordance with the specification, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged to him.

10. ## FIREWOOD.

##### RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE GISBORNE AND BULLENGAROOK FARMERS' COMMON.

1. Persons holding or occupying purchased land within five miles of the boundary of this common will be entitled to its advantages. Holders of 25 acres will be allowed to run 5 head of cattle; holders of from 25 to 50 acres will be permitted to run 10 head of cattle; holders of 75 acres will be permitted to run 15 head; holders of 100 acres will be permitted to run 20 head; but none shall be allowed to run more than 20 head of cattle, and they must be the *bona fide* owners of the same.

2. Each person, before taking cattle to the common, shall be required to brand them with his own brand, and then to apply to the secretary, at his private residence, who shall be in attendance between twelve o'clock noon and four o'clock in the afternoon of each Saturday of the first month in the quarter, to have his name and address, together with the brands and descriptions of the cattle and horses entered in the books of the managers; to pay the fees thereon; and shall receive a receipt from the same, together with an order to the herdsman for admission of the cattle and horses to the common.

3. The fees chargeable shall be—for every head of cattle one shilling per head per quarter; and for every horse one shilling and sixpence per head per quarter, paid in advance.

4. The managers shall engage a herdsman, the situation of which shall be advertised for by tender; and when the herdsman is engaged he shall be required to find sureties for the due fulfilment of his duties. The duties of the herdsman shall be to take charge of all cattle entrusted to his care; and should any of the said cattle be missing from the herd, he shall give information to the owners of the cattle at the expiration of twenty-four hours. He shall also be required to give notice to the managers of the least appearance of diseased cattle on the common. The managers shall, as soon as the funds will permit of doing so, provide him with a suitable dwelling and garden-ground; he shall also be allowed to run six head of cattle and two horses for his own immediate use.

5. All persons taking cattle to the common shall be required to produce to the herdsman his order from the secretary, who shall enter the brands and description of the cattle in the herdsman's book, and shall then proceed to brand them with the common brand in pitch; but in no case or under any pretence will the herdsman be permitted to receive any cattle or horses on the common excepting as above, a breach of which shall subject him to immediate dismissal, with forfeiture of salary.

7. Any person wishing to remove their cattle or horses from the common must first give notice to the herdsman of their intention to do so, and they will be allowed to replace them with others. Any person unnecessarily disturbing the cattle on the said common will be dealt with according to law.

8. The herdsman shall be required to muster the cattle at any time when requested by the managers.

9. Any person will be allowed to run one horse in lieu of two head of cattle; and all cattle found trespassing on the common will be impounded, or the owners prosecuted.

10. Parties whose watering-places may be dried up in the summer months will not be allowed to drive their flocks or herds over the common to any water-hole or creek without first making application to the managers for permission to do so. The managers shall, if they think proper, grant the application, and lay off a roadway, which the applicants shall be strictly required to keep.

11. The herdsman shall be required to see that travelling herds or flocks of sheep shall keep strictly within the limits of the boundaries of the common, as provided in the 78th clause of the new Land Act; but any resident of the district desiring to remove his cattle or sheep from one place to another must keep strictly to the road, the same not to be considered as travelling flocks or herds.

12. The managers will be required to ride over the common once every month, to see that the herdsman is doing his duty in keeping stray cattle off the common.

#### REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE GISBORNE TOWN COMMON.

EVERY resident householder within the township shall be entitled to depasture any number of cattle or horses not exceeding five. Each calf or foal over six months to count as one head.

The fees will be 2s. per head for cattle, and 2s. 6d. per head for horses, payable half-yearly in advance, and in all cases before entry in stock-book.

All stock intended to be run on the common must be brought to the branding yards on the 19th October next, also 19th January, 19th April, and 19th July, on which days only will cattle be branded and horses entered. Any stock not so branded and entered, and also all goats and swine trespassing on the common, will be impounded.

No bull or entire horse over nine months will be allowed on the common without the consent of the managers in writing.

The managers are empowered to grant special licenses to butchers to run sheep on the common in such numbers and at such rates as they may think reasonable.

The managers are authorised to appoint a herdsman, and make such arrangements with him as they deem best for the efficient working of the common.
