REGULATING THE GRANTING OF LEASES OF PUBLIC WATER RESERVOIRS.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twenty-ninth day of October, 1866.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor	Mr. Grant

IN pursuance of the provisions contained in the forty-third and forty-fourth sections of the Act No. 291, called *The Mining Statute* 1865, and in exercise of the power thereby conferred, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby make the regulations subjoined hereto, with reference to the leasing of Water Reservoirs constructed at the public expense to any person or persons (not being elective bodies corporate) who may make application for such a lease, in pursuance of the 31st section of *The Mining Statute* 1865.

1. Every applicant shall publish in a newspaper circulating in the district, or nearest to the district, in which the reservoir which he desires to lease may be situated, or if two or more such newspapers shall circulate equally near thereto, then in any one of them, a notice of his intention to make such application; and such notice shall contain full particulars of the name

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and situation of such reservoir, and the term of years for which the applicant requires a lease thereof, and shall bear date the day of its first publication as aforesaid, and shall appear in each consecutive issue of such newspaper during not less than eight days from the day of the date thereof inclusive.

2. Within fourteen days from and inclusive of the date of such notice as aforesaid, the applicant shall forward his application, in writing, to the Minister of Mines, with a copy of the advertisement referred to in the preceding clause, and a reference to the names and dates of each of the newspapers in which the said advertisement has appeared; and shall specify what rent per annum he will be willing to pay for the reservoir should his application for lease be granted.

3. Any person or persons desirous of objecting to the issue of any such lease to any applicant shall send written notice of his or their objections to the Minister of Mines, within fourteen days of the first publication of the notice specified in the first clause hereof.

4. Every such application, together with the objections thereto, if any, shall be considered by the Minister of Mines, who may, if he shall see fit, recommend the Governor in Council to grant a lease of the reservoir applied for, and any lease so granted shall be in such form and shall be subject to the payment of such annual rent, and to the fulfilment of such terms, covenants, and conditions as shall be fixed by the Governor in Council at the time of granting the same.

5. The term of the lessee in the land demised cannot exceed fifteen years.

And the Honorable John Macgregor, Her Majesty's Minister of Mines for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria passed in the twenty-seventh year of Her Majesty's reign (No. 219), intitled *An Act to consolidate the Law relating to Gaols*, it is amongst other things enacted, that all buildings, erections, houses, enclosed places, and premises hereafter to be erected, built, enclosed, purchased, enlarged, or maintained at the public expense, as and for public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments within Victoria, which are from time to time proclaimed by the Governor in Council, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, as such public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, or penal establishments, shall, from and after the publication of such notice, be severally deemed and taken to be the public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments (thereinafter called "gaols") respectively of the place or district where the same are situated, and shall be subject to the several provisions made for the regulation, discipline, management, and care of the public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments already erected (also thereafter called "gaols"), and of the prisoners confined within the same; and it is also enacted that, except where it is otherwise proclaimed by the Governor in Council, every gaol shall be and be taken for all purposes as being equally a house of correction and a prison for debtors, and also every house of correction shall be taken to be a prison: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power and authority conferred by the said Act, and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, with the advice of the

Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that the police lock-up at Jamieson, situate on the land hereinafter described, is a public gaol, prison, and house of correction, within the meaning and in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

JAMIESON GAOL.—Comprising all buildings, erections, houses, enclosed places, and premises on the site hereafter described:—One acre and thirty-two perches, county unnamed, parish of Jamieson, being allotments 3, 4, and 5, of block 12: Commencing at the south-east angle of allotment 2: bounded on the east by Brown street, bearing south 29° 45' W. three chains; on the south by allotment 6, bearing north 60° 15' W. four chains; on the west by Nash street, bearing north 29° 45' E. three chains; and on the north by allotment 3, bearing south 60° 15' E. four chains to the point of commencement.

SECTIONS V. TO X. OF "THE POLICE OFFENCES STATUTE 1865" EXTENDED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the session held in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign (No. 265), called *The Police Offences Statute 1865*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* extend all or any of the provisions contained in Part I. of the said Statute to any city, town, district, or place in Victoria, and may define the limits of any such city, town, district, or place, and vary and alter such limits, and may revoke any such Proclamation; and upon any such Proclamation the provisions so proclaimed shall extend to and be in force in such city, town, district, or place: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, do, with the advice of the Executive Council, by this my Proclamation extend the provisions contained in sections V., VI., VII., VIII., IX., and X. of Part I. of the said Statute to the Shire and Borough hereinafter mentioned, viz.:—

COMMONS INCREASED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1862* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field; or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold-fields common, or a town common respectively, as the case may be: And whereas by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or reproclaimed, and may from time to time reproclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now reciting Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the commons hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Acts, that is to say:—

AVOCA UNITED FARMERS', GOLD-FIELD, AND TOWN COMMON.—The United Farmers', Gold-field, and Town Common of Avoca, described in a Proclamation bearing date the seventeenth day of October, 1862, is hereby increased by adding thereto one thousand six hundred acres, more or less, being the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries hereinafter described, viz.: Commencing at the south-east angle of the township of Avoca; thence by a line bearing south one hundred and thirty chains to the north-west angle of the Lamplough Gold-field common; thence by the north boundary of that common bearing east sixty-one chains, more or less, to the west boundary of the Lamplough pre-emptive section; thence by the west, north, and east boundaries of that section bearing respectively north eighty-one chains, more or less, east thirty-three chains

seventy-five links, and south seventy-eight chains, more or less, to the north-eastern side of the road from Avoca to Lamplough; thence by that road bearing S. 32° E. three chains, more or less, to the north boundary of the Lamplough Gold-field Common aforesaid; thence by the said boundary of that common bearing east fifty chains, more or less, to the south-west angle of the Lamplough A run; thence by the west boundary of that run bearing north one hundred and thirty chains to the north-west angle thereof; and thence by a line bearing west one hundred and forty-six chains forty links to the point of commencement.—(66.N.12632.)

DUNKELD TOWN COMMON.—The Dunkeld Town Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 22nd day of September, 1862, and increased by a Proclamation dated 12th February, 1866, is hereby further increased by adding thereto the allotments of land enumerated as follow, viz.:—Allotments 33a, 39a, 40a, 41a, 42a, 43a, 52a, 56a, 66a, 67a, and 72a, all in the parish of Dunkeld, and containing an area of four hundred and sixty-nine acres and nineteen perches.—(66.M.13049.)

MOONAMBEL GOLD-FIELD COMMON.—The Moonambel Gold-field Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 14th day of September, 1863, is hereby increased by adding thereto two thousand acres, more or less, being the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries described as follow, viz.: Commencing at the south-west angle of portion 121, parish of Warrenmang; thence by the west boundaries of the Moonambel Town and Gold-field Commons and the Redbank United Town and Gold-field Common, bearing north 170 chains, more or less, to the summit of the Pyrenees range; thence by that range bearing south-westerly to the northern side of the road from Navarre to Avoca; and thence by that road bearing north-easterly to the point of commencement.—(66.N.1374.)

TOOBORAC FARMERS' COMMON.—The Tooborac Farmers' Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 4th March, 1861, is hereby increased by adding thereto three thousand five hundred acres, more or less, being the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries described as follow, viz.: Commencing at the north-eastern angle of the existing common; thence by a line bearing north-easterly sixty chains, more or less, to the west angle of allotment 52, parish of Tooborac; thence by the western boundary of the surveyed lands on Melvor Creek, bearing southerly to the creek which intersects the western boundary of allotment 6 of section 7; thence by that creek bearing south-westerly to Mitchell's log fence; thence by that fence bearing northerly and north-westerly to the south-eastern boundary of the existing common; and thence by the south-eastern and north-eastern boundaries thereof bearing respectively north-easterly and north-westerly to the point of commencement; as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(66.M.13712.)

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land a farmers' common; when one-eighth part of any agricultural area has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim any unselected and unleased portion of such agricultural area, not exceeding twice the quantity so selected and leased, to be a temporary common for the use of such selectors and lessees: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the area hereinafter mentioned to be a temporary common for the use of lessees and selectors in the under-mentioned agricultural area in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

The allotments and piece of land hereinafter enumerated, comprising an area of 1,087 acres, more or less, are hereby proclaimed a temporary Common for the use of selectors and lessees in the agricultural area of Lake Wilson, viz.:—Parish of Bellaura, allotments 41a, 41b, 42b, 48a, 48b, 49a, 49b, 50a, 50b, and the reserve adjoining allotments 41a and 49a on the north.—(66.N.14033.)

The deaths in the month of September numbered 6 less than the average, and this notwithstanding the increase of population which has taken place during the seven years over which the observations extend. The mean temperature was a degree and a half below the average.

Males furnished 59 per cent. and females 41 per cent. of the mortality of the month. 41 per cent. of the deaths were of children under five years of age, against 51 per cent. in September, 1865; 38 per cent. in September, 1864; 33 per cent. in September, 1863; 43 per cent. in September, 1862; 40 per cent. in September, 1861; and 53 per cent. in September, 1860.

The day of highest mortality was the 14th, on which 12 deaths occurred; that of the lowest was the 22nd, for which only 2 deaths were recorded.

The deaths of 3 males and 2 females of 75 years old and upwards occurred during the month, viz., those of a male aged 75 of mortification of the foot, of a male aged 78 of bronchitis, of a male aged 90 of dysentery, of a female aged 75 of disease of the heart, and of a female aged 80 of cancer.

Eleven violent deaths were reported. Of these 3 were from accidental fractures and contusions, viz., those of a carter aged 19 who fractured his skull by falling from a horse, of a waterman aged 51 who was crushed between the pier and a ship, and of a carpenter aged 59 who fractured his ribs by a fall. One was from poison, viz., that of a male of weak intellect aged 19, who swallowed a quantity of essential oil of bitter almonds. Three were from accidental drowning, viz., those of a carter aged 27, of a shipwright aged 38, and of a clerk aged 45, all in the Yarra. Two were from suffocation, viz., those of an infant aged 5 weeks, and of an infant aged 24 hours, both in bed. One was from a fractured skull (verdiot, manslaughter), viz., that of a boatman aged 47. One was from drowning, believed to be suicidal, viz., that of a gentleman aged 33, in Hobson's Bay.

Fifty-one deaths, or 23 per cent. of the whole mortality, occurred in public institutions, viz.:—34 in the Melbourne Hospital; 3 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Immigrants' Home, 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Carlton Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Industrial Schools, 2 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 1 in the hulk *Success*.

IRON CASTINGS.

TENDERS will be received until Noon on Wednesday, the 21st day of November, 1866, from persons willing to furnish Iron Castings, in such quantities as may be required for the Government Railways, from 1st January until the 31st December, 1867.

The castings are required for locomotive engine work, carriage work, &c.

When specially ordered, the castings are to be run with heads or runners of such weight as may be requested, and no extra charge shall be made or allowed for same; and the contractor will be required to remove the head or runner from the casting where possible, and charge the casting at the net weight only, trimmed and cleaned. In cases where it is necessary to cut off the head in a lathe or machine, such head will be cut off by the Government, and returned to the Melbourne Station, there to be delivered to the contractor free of cost of carriage.

Whenever ordered, the castings are to be moulded in loam without a pattern, and loam price will be paid according to schedule, but no extra charge will be allowed for patterns, strickles, or loam boards. The orders will express the kind or description of casting according to the schedule distinction; and the rates there filled in opposite each item will be allowed accordingly.

The Government will supply all patterns, and deliver the same to the Melbourne Station free of cost, from whence the contractor must fetch them when required and when due notice of same has been given in writing, and no cost for carriage from Spencer street Station to the contractor's place of business will be allowed.

Any expense incurred on account of the rejection of supplies by a board of survey will be charged to the contractor.

8. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged to the contractor.

9. The Locomotive Superintendent will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior character, or not in accordance with the specification, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged to him.

Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

10. Irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Locomotive Superintendent, to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds; and it will be in the power of the Government, upon repetition of such irregularities, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. The wood is to be split into billets of convenient sizes for the use of the engines, and is to be cut into billets 2 feet in length, and no small branches will be received.

The whole of the firewood, when delivered, is to be stacked where pointed out, at the contractor's expense, in stacks of such sizes as will be directed, ready for measurement. The stacks are to be 2 feet wide by 5 feet high, with space between each stack for measuring, and the billets are all to lie the same way, viz., crossways of the stacks, in the form of a cord, and are to be laid as closely and solidly as possible in the stack.

CONDITIONS.

1. The house coal is to be the best of its kind, free from shale, small coal, dust, or other impurities. The smiths' coal must be free from dust, ashes, shale, or other impurities. The water is to be fresh and pure. The firewood (box, she-oak, red or white gum), and is to be dry and of good burning quality.

2. The orders will be issued by the departments requiring the supplies; and should an order be not complied with within forty-eight hours, it will be competent for the department concerned to purchase at the contractor's risk, and to deduct from the contractor's account the extra expense (if any) over and above the contract price. 4. As soon as the order for the coal or wood shall have been completed, the contractor will be required to furnish his account in the prescribed form, with the order attached thereto, to the department supplied. For water the account is to be rendered monthly for the quantity supplied during the previous month. Accounts will be payable at the Treasury, Melbourne, or Geelong, as the contractor may require.

5. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supply, as to the quality, the same is to be decided by a Board of Survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered as final.

6. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be deducted from the contractor's account.

7. If from any cause injury would accrue to the public service by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of department, or officer in charge of station, will have the power to reject such articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged as in condition 6.

8. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

9. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

10. It will be competent for the Inspector of Stores on behalf of the Government, or the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract by giving, in writing, a notice of three full calendar months; it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period of which the contract is made.

BOROUGH OF DAYLESFORD.

BYE-LAW No. 20.—A BYE-LAW TO REGULATE THE DAYLESFORD MARKET.

BE it ordered and enacted by the Borough Council of Daylesford, that the following regulations shall be observed:—

1. That the market known as the Daylesford General Market, situated in section 32, township of Daylesford, shall be open for the sale of marketable commodities every day during the year from sunrise to sunset, except on Sundays, Christmas Day, and Good Friday, on which days no business shall be transacted, excepting also that on the evenings of Saturdays the market shall remain open until Eleven o'clock p.m.

2. There shall be appointed for the said market an officer to be called the Market Inspector, whose duties shall be as follows:—

(1.) To see that the market regulations are duly observed.

(2.) To inspect all articles intended for human food exposed for sale in the market.

(3.) To take charge of the market weighbridge, and of the scales and standard weights and measures of such market, and to cause such weights and measures to be legally stamped; and for weighing any article or articles on the market weighbridge or scales, and the collection of the several amounts specified in the schedule of tolls and dues which may be fixed from time to time by the Borough Council.

(4.) To inspect all scales, weights, and measures used in the market.

(5.) That any person wishing his or her name or business affixed to any shed, stall, &c., or to have the shed or stall, &c., enclosed in any particular way shall apply to the market inspector, under whose direction the same may be done at the cost of the applicant.

(6.) That any person guilty of any of the following offences, omissions, or neglect shall on conviction thereof for every such offence or omission pay a penalty not exceeding Five pounds:—

(a.) Selling or exposing for sale in the said market any marketable commodity before the time of opening and after closing such market.

(b.) Placing any matter or thing so as to cause an obstruction, and refusing or neglecting to remove the same on being requested to do so by the market inspector.

(c.) Placing or keeping any cart, carriage, barrow, or other vehicle in any part of the said market so as to cause an obstruction in the market.

(d.) Placing any hook, nail, or peg on any part of the market building, or fitting up or enclosing any part of it so as to cause an obstruction, or refusing to remove any such hook, nail, peg, or fittings when required to do so by the inspector.

(e.) Sweeping or causing to be swept or placing any dirt or rubbish into or upon any paths, gutters, or roads of the said market so as to cause a nuisance therein and allowing the same to remain.

(f.) Selling or offering for sale by weight or measure any article which shall be found deficient in the weight or measure represented.
