TOWN OF GRANT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time, before or after the proclamation of any agricultural area, proclaim as a road or as a town or village any portion or portions of such area not selected, purchased, or leased, and not exceeding, if proclaimed as a town or village, six hundred and forty acres of the lands comprised in such area; and the lands in such town or village shall be sold by auction in the manner provided for the sale by public auction of lands not reserved for proclamation in such areas: Now, therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the land hereinafter described as a town in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE TOWNSHIP OF GRANT.—Commencing at the south-eastern angle of portion 6, the said angle being a point on the north-eastern side of the road from Grant to Stratford; bounded thence by lines bearing respectively west eighty chains, north eighty chains, east eighty chains, and south eighty chains to the point of commencement, as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(66. Folio 112.)

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this fifth day of November, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and in the thirtieth year of Her Majesty's reign.

1. The period of occupation will be one year from the date of the acceptance of the tender.

IRON CASTINGS.
