Regulations for the removal under bond of Spirits distilled at the Warrenheip Distillery, near Ballarat, and lodged in the Registered Store or Bonding Warehouse on the Distillery premises, or from any other of the Warrenheip Distillery Company's Bonding Warehouses under the supervision of the Chief Inspector of Distilleries to any other of the Company's Bonding Warehouses not on the same premises, but under the same supervision.

Before any spirits distilled in Victoria and lodged as aforesaid shall be removed from the certified and registered store-room or bonding warehouse on the Warrenheip Distillery premises, or from any other of the Warrenheip Distillery Company's bonding warehouses under the supervision of the Chief Inspector of Distilleries to any other of the said company's bonding warehouses not on the said premises, but under the same supervision, an entry in a prescribed form—as is observed when warehousing spirits in bond under the supervision of the Collector of Customs—shall be passed at the office of the Chief Inspector of Distilleries, and a person duly authorised by the directors of the company to do so shall give security on their behalf by bond in double the amount of duty which would be payable on such spirits if taken out for home consumption, with one sufficient surety to be approved of by the Chief Inspector of Distilleries, that the said spirits and every part thereof shall be re-warehoused within the period mentioned in the said bond to the satisfaction of the Chief Inspector of Distilleries, who thereupon shall grant a warrant for the removal of such spirits from the registered store or bonding warehouse mentioned in the warrant; and upon the delivery of the said warrant to the officer on duty at the distillery or bonding warehouse, such officer shall deliver the spirits therein described to a servant or employé of the Warrenheip Distillery Company duly authorised by the directors of the said company to receive such spirits and give a receipt, which shall be binding on the company for the full quantity of the said spirits, and for their safe conveyance to the bonding warehouse named in the warrant; and upon the removal of such spirits, the weight and strength of the same shall be taken in the presence of such servant or employé of the company as aforesaid, and to whom a certificate shall be given by the excise officer on duty, in which shall be stated the weights, strengths, liquid and proof gallons of spirits in each vessel enumerated at the time of delivery.

Upon arrival of the spirits referred to in said warrant and specified in the certificate heretofore mentioned, such spirits

shall be re-weighed and the strengths taken in the presence of a servant or employé of the said company, and the full duty upon any deficiency in the quantity of spirits which may occur between the time of delivery and re-warehousing of such spirits shall be paid by the parties to the bond.

All labor required in weighing and taking the strengths of the spirits in removal as aforesaid shall be provided by and at the expense of the Warrenheip Distillery Company.

IRON CASTINGS.

The contractor is to deliver the coal screened, ready for use, into the waggons on the railway or breakwater pier at Williamstown, at the option of the Government, or may deliver into the railway waggons at any station on the Victorian Railways. The coal will be weighed by the Government, and such weight and returns shall form the basis upon which the contractor's account will be made out.

3. The contractor will be required to produce the invoice and a letter from either company, to prove the genuineness of the coal, before it will be received. The coal will be afterwards subjected to such test as the Engineer-in-Chief may decide, before acceptance.

4. Orders for Tanfield Moor or Brancepeth Hut coal will be issued by the Secretary one week previously to the departure of English mail; and if the coal ordered be not supplied at the expiration of seven calendar months from the date of the departure of such mail, it will be competent for the Railway Storekeeper, on the order of the secretary, to purchase, at the risk of the contractor, and subject him to a mulct not exceeding Five pounds for each and every day's delay in the delivery after the time specified, disasters of the seas excepted.

5. The contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly or bi-monthly on the prescribed form, and present the same in a complete state, signed by the officer receiving the supply, to the Locomotive Superintendent, who will send it forward to the Railway Storekeeper to be passed for payment at the Treasury or at a district pay office, as the case may be.

6. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supply, as to the quality of the coal, the same is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the Engineer-in-Chief, and the decision of the board is to be final.

7. If the delay necessary for obtaining the decision of a board of survey should be detrimental to the public service, the Engineer-in-Chief or Locomotive Superintendent will have the power to reject coal which is of an inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected coal and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere and the extra expense charged to him.

8. Irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor to such mulct not exceeding Twenty-five pounds for each case, as the Government may direct; and it will also be in the power of the Government to terminate the contract forthwith.

12. The estimated consumption of coal for smith's use during the year will be about 300 tons; but the Government do not bind themselves to order that quantity, but only what may be required from time to time.
