WHEREAS by The Local Government Act 1863 it is amongst other things enacted that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board, for any original or proclaimed district hereinafter sometimes called "single district," the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall within three months after the receipt of the same divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions, thereinafter called subdivisions, by such names as shall by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the sixth day of August, 1857, a road district ware proclaimed under the designation of "The Nunawading Road District." And whereas by another Proclamation bearing date the sixteenth day of February, 1858, the boundaries of the said district were altered as therein mentioned: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by not less than twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said road district, praying for the division of the same into three subdivisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order divide the Nunawading Road District into three separ

SOUTH SUBDIVISION.—Commencing at the south-east angle of portion 110, parish of Nunawading; thence west and north by the south and west boundaries of the Nunawading Road District to the intersection of the centre line of Moloney's road; thence east by the said centre line to the intersection of the centre line of a road forming the west boundary of portions 97 and 98; thence north by the centre of the last-named road to a point due west of the north boundaries of portions 98, 99, 100, 101, 113, 112, and 111; thence east to and by the said north boundaries to the Dandenong Creek; thence southerly by that creek to the commencing point.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir Charles Henry Darling, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by The Land Act 1862 it is amongst other things enacted that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any municipal district, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby abolish and proclaim the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

The Gold Field Common of Wahgunyah, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 28th of January, 1861, is hereby abolished, and in lieu thereof the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries hereinafter defined are hereby proclaimed a Gold Field Common for Wahgunyah: Commencing at the north-east angle of the borough of Rutherglen: thence by the east boundary that boundary of Rutherglen: thence by the south boundary of the parish of Carlyle; thence by that boundary and a line bearing east four hundred and seventy-six chains more or less; thence by the south boundaries of sections F. L. M., U. and T., bearing westerly to the south-west angle of allotment 1 of the last-named section; and thence by a line bearing westerly to the point of commencement. Area available for commonage 5000 acres, more or less, as shown on the plan deposited at

CORAL PATCH IN BLACKWOOD CHANNEL.

INFORMATION has been received at the Admiralty, that H.M.S.

Salamander, 20th January, 1865, whilst steering to the southwest through the Blackwood channel on the route recommended
from Raine island towards the Middle banks, struck on an unknown coral patch, with only 7 feet on its shoalest part at low
water

known coral patch, with only 7 feet on its shoalest part at low water.

The patch lies about a mile E.S.E. of the eastern part of the Middle banks, or in lat. 11° 47′ 10″ S., long. 143° 41′ 35″ E. It is about 230 yards long, east and west, 110 yards wide, has 10 to 17 fathoms all round it, and 15 to 17 fathoms in the channel, a mile wide, between it and the reef in connection with the eastern sand bank on the Middle banks. From its shoalest spot of 7 feet, the centre of the eastern sand bank on the Middle banks bears W. ½ N. distant 2½ miles, and the south extreme of Sir Charles Hardy islands S.W. 14½ miles.

Vessols entering the Great Barrier reef by the Raine island entrance, should as soon as possible after passing north or south of Raine island, bring its beacon to bear N. E. ½ E., steering S.W. ½ W. (allowing for tide and a northerly set) for Sir Charles Hardy islands. As soon as the beacon is lost sight of, the vessel, will be clear of the shoal patches westward of the 100 fathoms line of soundings, and on the bank. Look out now for Sir Charles Hardy islands, and when they are plainly seen, steer for their south extreme on a S.W. ½ W. bearing, and when the easternmost sand bank on the Middle banks bears N.W. by W., and the west Ashmore bank (if seen) S.S.W. ½ W., the vessel will be well to the south-west of the Salamander patch, and a course may then be shaped for either the North or Pollard channels.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

LEADING LIGHTS AND BEACONS FOR NEWCASTLE.
In order to increase the facilities for navigating Newcastle Harbor, leading lights for entering, and also leading lights for taking the north channel, will be exhibited on and after Tuesday, the 1st of May, 1866.

The two fairway lights for entering (red and bright) will be shown from beacons 228 foet apart, in a S.W. & S. and N.E. & N. direction, erected on a clear space of ground on the hill at the back of the town, between the Wesleyan and Catholic Churches. Those for taking the north channel, also red and bright, will be shown from beacons erected on the breakwater in the vicinity of the old Bull beacons, at a distance of a hundred feet apart, in a W. by N. and E. by S. direction.

In both cases, when the lights are in line, the bright will be the uppermost and the red the lowermost one of the two. In the day time, however, this order of color will be reversed, as it is intended to paint the upper beacons red and the lower ones white.

The lower or north-eastern of the two obelisks at present used for the leading mark in situated on Shepherd's Hill, will be removed, so likewise will be the remnant of the Bull beacons on the breakwater.

The exhibition of these leading lights will not necessitate different sailing directions to those already published, any more than the lights and new beacons being substituted for the obelisks and heacons willow are at present in use.

In entering the Port of Newcastle at night great caution will be necessary, in consequence of the strength of the tide, and due allowance will have to be made for ebb or flow, on sighting the north channel lights, and about to alter course from S.W. 4 S., with the fairway lights in one, to.W. by N., the direction which a vessel will have to steer to keep the north channel lights in line to gain an anchorage in the north harbor.

The mortality of Melbourne and suburbs during January was higher than it was in the same month of any year of the previous six, and the deaths were more numerous by 61 than an average of the month extending over seven years. They were, however, fewer by 8 than in the month of December.

The mean temperature and mean atmospheric pressure during the month were about the average.

Males and females died in the respective proportions of 54 and 46 per cent. Sixty-five and a half per cent of the deaths were of children who had not attained their fifth year, against 65 per cent. in January, 1865; 64 per cent. in January, 1864, and January, 1863; 68 per cent. in January, 1862; 71 per cent in January, 1861; and 78 per cent. in January, 1860.

The highest number of deaths on any one day was 23. These occurred on the 6th. The next highest number was 22, which occurred respectively on the 16th and 22nd. The lowest mortality recorded was 9 deaths on both the 3rd and 18th, and 10 upon the 11th and 20th.

Six persons of 75 years old and upwards died during the month, of whose deaths the following are the particulars:—A male aged 75 died of apoplexy, another at 75 of bronchitis, one at 79 of disease of the kidneys, and one at 80 of old age. A female aged 76 died of dropsy, and one at 80 of apoplexy.

The violent deaths numbered 22, of which 16 are believed to have resulted from accident and 6 from suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A boy aged 8 was killed through being run over by a horse on the Flemington race-course, a laborer aged 16 died from the effects of a fall, a farm laborer aged 24 from being accidentally crushed, a blacksmith aged 34 from falling into a drain, a woodsplitter aged 45 from injuries caused by a tree falling on him, a laborer aged 19 from the effects of an explosion of gunpowder whilst blasting gravel, a blacksmith aged 17 from an accident with firearms, an infant aged 16 months and a boy aged 3 years of scalds, a boy aged 3\frac{1}{2} of burns caused by matches, a boy aged 9 of sunstroke, a boy aged 6, a youth aged 15, a painter aged 20, a mason aged 23, and a brickmaker aged 67, of drowning.

The suicidal deaths occurred as follow:—A clerk, aged 21, and a hairdresser, aged 52, shot themselves; a female, aged 31, and a female, aged 33, poisoned themselves, the former owing to religious mania; a sawyer, aged 40, drowned himself; and a chimney-sweep, aged 56, hanged himself.

The deaths in public institutions numbered 78, or 164 per cent. of the whole mortality. Of these, 50 took place in the Melbourne Hospital, 6 in the Benevolent Asylum, 9 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 8 in the Industrial Schools, 1 in the Immigrants' Home, 1 in the Industrial, and 3 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 308, of which 155, or nearly 51 per cent., were of males, and 153, or about 49 per cent., were of females. Of those dying, 102 were under one year of age, 63 were between one and two years, 20 were between two and three, 9 were between three and four, and 9 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 162, of which 97, or nearly 60 per cent, were males, and 65, or about 40 per cent, were females; 16 were between five and ten, 5 were between ten and fifteen, 5 were between fifteen and twenty, 17 were between twenty and twenty-five, 23 were between twenty-five and thirty, 18 were between thirty and thirty-five, 18 were between thirty-five and forty, 9 were between forty and forty-five and fifty. 10 were between fifty and fifty-five, 6 were between fifty and sixty-five, 6 were between sixty-five and seventy, 4 were between seventy and seventy-five, 4 were between seventy and seventy-five and eighty, and 2 were eighty and upwards.

Deaths from zymotic diseases, as compared with those in December, receded in numbers from 202 to 192, and in per-centage to the whole mortality, from 42:35 to 40:85. Under the zymotic head, measles, scarlatina, and diphtheria caused in the month under review 21 deaths against 22 in December, and croup 3 deaths against 2; deaths from diarrhea and dysentery increased from 99 to 135, but those from whooping-cough fell off from 42 to 11. Under the constitutional class, phthisis combined with hemoptysis caused 29 deaths against 32 in December. Under the developmental class, deaths from premature birth toes from 3 to 10, those from teething from 22 to 27, and those from atrophy and debility from 30 to 35.
