## THE TOWN OF TYLDEN.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Brigadier-General GEORGE JACKSON CAREY, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Commanding Her Majesty's troops in the Australian Colonies, and Officer administering the Government of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time, before or after the proclamation of any agricultural area, proclaim as a road or as a town or village any portion or portions of such area not selected, purchased, or leased, and not exceeding, if proclaimed as a town or village, six hundred and forty acres of the lands comprised in such area, and the lands in such town or village shall be sold by auction in the manner provided for the sale by public auction of lands not reserved for proclamation in such areas: Now therefore I, the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the land hereinafter described as a town under the designation prefixed thereto, that is to say:—

THE TOWN OF TYLDEN.—Two hundred and ninety-three acres, more or less, county of Dalhousie, parish of Tylden: Commencing at the north-east angle of the land, being a point on the Little Coliban River; thence by allotment 75, bearing west eighty-one chains 73 links; thence by a road bearing south twenty-six chains ten links, S. 76° 30' E. forty-two chains more or less, and S. 51° 30' E. eight chains ninety-eight links to the aforesaid river; and thence by that river bearing north-easterly and northerly to the point of commencement.—(66.N.4153.)

## CUTTING OR REMOVING TIMBER, ETC., IN OR FROM LANDS IN THE PARISH OF WURDI-YOUANG PROHIBITED.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Brigadier-General GEORGE JACKSON CAREY, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Commanding Her Majesty's Troops in the Australian Colonies, and Officer administering the Government of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1862* it is amongst other things enacted that notwithstanding anything therein before contained the Governor in Council may by Proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorised, shall cut or remove live or dead timber or bark, or stone or gravel, from such portions of Crown lands as are named in such Proclamation, or shall exercise on any such portions the powers or any of them, conferred by any license granted under the authority of the third part of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, do, with the advice of the Executive Council, declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise

authorised, shall cut or remove live timber or bark, or stone or gravel, from the portion of Crown lands hereinafter named and described (the said lands being an extension of the area described in a Proclamation under the said section bearing date the 22nd day of January, 1866,) viz.:—Two thousand four hundred acres, more or less, county of Grant, parish of Wurdí-Youang: Commencing at the north-west angle of portion 1 a, the said angle being a point on the Duck Ponds; bounded thence by the north boundary of the said portion and a line bearing east one hundred and forty-five chains, more or less, to the south-west angle of the area proclaimed as aforesaid on the 22nd January, 1866; thence by the west boundary of that area bearing north to the south boundary of the Station Peak pre-emptive section; thence by the said boundary of that section bearing west to the south-west angle thereof; thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the south-east angle of portion 60 in the parish of Lara; thence by the south boundary of that portion bearing west to the Duck Ponds aforesaid; and thence by the Duck Ponds bearing southerly to the point of commencement; as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(65.L.14963.)

## COMMONS.

### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Brigadier-General GEORGE JACKSON CAREY, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Commanding Her Majesty's Troops in the Australian Colonies, and Officer administering the Government of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1862* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown Land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common respectively, as the case may be: And whereas by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or reproclaimed, and may from time to time reproclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now reciting Act: Now therefore I, the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim, or increase (as the case may be) the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Acts, that is to say:—

BALMORAL TOWN COMMON.—The unappropriated Crown lands within the township of Balmoral are hereby proclaimed a town common for the use of all householders of that township. Area 450 acres, more or less.—(66.N.2949.)

BELFAST TOWN COMMON.—The Town Common of Belfast, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 18th day of February, 1861, is hereby increased by the addition thereto of

the land comprised within the boundaries hereinafter described, viz.:—Parish of Belfast: Commencing at the south angle of the land, the said angle being formed by the intersection of the north-east side of Connolly street and the north-west side of Griffith street; thence by the last-named street bearing N. 30° E. twelve chains eighty links, more or less; thence by allotment 33, bearing N. 54° W. 5 chains eighty links to the margin of a swamp; thence by the said margin of that swamp bearing south-westerly to the north-west end of Connolly street; and thence by that street bearing S. 60° E. thirteen chains eighty-five links to the point of commencement. Area 11 acres 1 rood. As shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(66.M.4382.)

## UNITED COMMONS.

## PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Brigadier-General GEORGE JACKSON CAREY, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Commanding Her Majesty's Troops in the Australian Colonies, and Officer administering the Government of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1862* it is amongst other things enacted, that where there are two or more neighboring commons the Governor in Council may proclaim that the same shall be a common under the name of "The United Town and Gold Field [or, as the case may be] Common of" for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either: Now therefore I, the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the neighboring commons hereinafter mentioned to be a United Common, under the following name, that is to say:—

THE UNITED FARMERS' AND GOLD-FIELD COMMON OF EURAMBREEN, comprising the Eurambreen Farmers' Common, proclaimed on the 13th November, 1865, diminished on the 5th February, 1866, and increased on the 23rd April, 1866; and the Eurambreen Gold-field Common, proclaimed on the 13th November, 1865, diminished on the 5th February, 1866, and increased on the 23rd April, 1866. And the said United Common shall be for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either of the abovementioned commons.—(66.M.4871.)

## TEMPORARY COMMONS.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Brigadier-General GEORGE JACKSON CAREY, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Commanding Her Majesty's Troops in the Australian Colonies, and Officer administering the Government of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted that when any Crown land remains unsold within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land a farmers' common; when one-eighth part of any agricultural area has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim any unselected and unleased portion of such agricultural area, not exceeding twice the quantity so selected and leased, to be a temporary common for the use of such selectors and lessees: Now therefore I, the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the areas hereinafter mentioned to be Temporary Commons for the use of selectors in the agricultural areas of Lexington, Lismore, and Westgarth respectively, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

LEXINGTON TEMPORARY COMMON.—The allotments hereinafter enumerated, and comprising an area of 3454 acres 3 roods 33 perches, more or less, are hereby proclaimed a Temporary Common for the use of selectors and lessees in the agricultural area of Lexington, viz.:—Parish of Moyston, allotments 193, 194, 195, 196, 197, 198, 199, 200, 201, 202, and 203; parish of Lexington, section 13, allotments 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 15, and 31; section 14, allotments 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, and 41; section 16, allotments 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9.—(66.N.2876.)

LISMORE TEMPORARY COMMON.—Allotment 1 of section 1, in the agricultural area of Lismore, is hereby proclaimed a Temporary Common for the use of selectors in the said agricultural area.—(66.M.3362.)

WESTGARTH TEMPORARY COMMON.—The allotments and pieces of land hereinafter enumerated, and comprising an area of 2457 acres, more or less, are hereby proclaimed a Temporary Common for the use of selectors and lessees in the agricultural area of Westgarth, viz.:—Parish of Langi Logan, allotments 25, 36, 37, 38, 39; a reserve on the south of allotment 2; a reserve on the south of allotment 8; and a reserve on the west of allotment 58. His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, has directed the subjoined Treaty of Navigation between Her Majesty and the King of Prussia, to be published for general information.

## TREATY OF NAVIGATION BETWEEN HER MAJESTY AND THE KING OF PRUSSIA.

Signed at Gastein, August 16, 1865.

(Ratifications exchanged at Berlin, February 24, 1866.)

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the one part; and His Majesty the King of Prussia, on the other part; being equally animated by the desire to develop the stipulations relative to the reciprocal treatment of navigation now in force under the Treaties concluded between them on the 2nd of April, 1824, and the 2nd of March, 1841, upon the basis of the alterations in their Navigation laws which have since taken place, have entered into negotiation for that purpose, and have named as their Plenipotentiaries, that is to say:—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honorable Francis Baron Napier of Merchiston, a Peer of Scotland, a Baronet of Nova Scotia, a Member of Her Britannic Majesty's Privy Council, Her Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to His Majesty the King of Prussia, &c.

And His Majesty the King of Prussia, M. Otto Eduard Leopold von Bismarck-Schönhausen, President of His Ministry of State, and Minister of Foreign Affairs;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found to be in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

## ARTICLE I.

British ships and their cargoes shall, in Prussia, and Prussian ships and their cargoes shall, in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, from whatever place arriving, and whatever may be their place of destination, and whatever may be the place of origin or destination of their cargoes, be treated in every respect as national ships and their cargoes.

It is, however, agreed that the preceding stipulation shall not affect the rights connected with fishery belonging exclusively to the subjects of either country within their respective marine territorial limits, nor the local immunities enjoyed in Great Britain, not by British subjects generally, but only by certain privileged classes in certain ports.

Every favor or exemption which either of the Contracting Parties shall grant in these respects to any other power, shall be immediately and unconditionally extended to the other party.

## ARTICLE II.

The stipulations contained in the preceding Article are also to be applied to the Colonies and Foreign Possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, as well as to the ships and cargoes of the same; but as regards the coasting trade, only in those Colonies and Foreign Possessions the coasting trade of which shall have been, or shall be hereafter, opened to foreign ships in conformity with the Acts of Parliament which govern this matter.

## ARTICLE III.

If any ship of war or merchant-vessel of one of the Contracting Parties should run aground or be wrecked upon the coasts of the other, the same aid and assistance shall be rendered to it as to a national vessel, and in such case no other expenses shall be paid by the owners or their agents and representatives for the preservation of the property than would be payable in the like case of a wreck of a national vessel. In case the master of a merchant-vessel should be under the necessity of disposing of a part of his merchandise, in order to defray his expenses, no impediment shall be opposed by the authorities; the master being bound, however, to conform to the existing regulations and tariffs.

The goods and merchandise saved from the wreck shall be exempt from all duties of Customs unless cleared for consumption.

The respective Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents shall, if the owner or master, or other agent of the owner, is not present, or is present and requires it, be authorized to interpose, in order to afford the necessary assistance to those concerned.

## ARTICLE IV.

The Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents of each of the Contracting Parties residing in the dominions and possessions of the other, shall receive from the local authorities such assistance as can by law be given to them for the recovery of deserters from the vessels of their respective countries.

## ARTICLE V.

The right of acceding to the present Treaty is reserved to every State now belonging to, or which may hereafter join, the Zollverein.

IHRE Majestät die Königin des Vereinigten Königreichs von Grossbritannien und Irland, einer Seits, und Seine Majestät der König von Preussen, anderer Seits, von dem Wunsche geleitet, die auf die gegenseitige Behandlung der Schifffahrt bezüglichen Bestimmungen der am 2. April 1824 und 2. März 1841 zwischen Ihnen abgeschlossenen Verträge auf Grund der seitdem eingetretenen Veränderungen Ihrer Schifffahrts-Gesetze weiter auszubilden, haben Verhandlungen zu diesem Zwecke eröffnet und zu Ihren Bevollmächtigten ernannt, nämlich:—

Ihre Majestät die Königin des Vereinigten Königreichs von Grossbritannien und Irland, den sehr ehrenwerthen Francis Baron Napier von Merchison, Pair von Schottland und Baronet von Nova Scotia, Mitglied Ihrer Britischen Majestät Geheimen Raths, Ihrer Majestät ausserordentlichen und bevollmächtigten Botschafter bei Seiner Majestät dem Könige von Preussen, u. s. w.; Und Seine Majestät der König von Preussen, den Herrn Otto Eduard Leopold von Bismarck-Schönhausen, Allerhöchst Ihren Präsidenten des Staatsministeriums und Minister der auswärtigen Angelegenheiten;

Welche, nach gegenseitiger Mittheilung ihrer in guter und gehöriger Form befundenen Vollmachten, die nachstehenden Artikel vereinbart und abgeschlossen haben:—

## ARTIKEL I.

In Preussen sollen britische Schiffe und deren Ladungen und in dem Vereinigten Königreiche von Grossbritannien und Irland sollen preussische Schiffe und deren Ladungen, gleichviel woher die Schiffe kommen oder wohin sie gehen und woher die Ladungen stammen oder wohin sie bestimmt sind, in jeder Hinsicht ebenso behandelt werden, als die einheimischen Schiffe und deren Ladungen.

Man ist jedoch darüber einverstanden, dass die vorstehende Bestimmung weder auf die ausschliesslichen Fischerei-Gerechtigkeiten Bezug haben soll, welche den Unterthanen jedes der beiden Länder innerhalb des Seegebietes der letzteren zustehen, noch auf die örtlichen Bevorzugungen, deren sich in Grossbritannien, nicht die britischen Unterthanen im Allgemeinen, sondern gewisse privilegierte Classen in einzelnen Häfen erfreuen. Jede Begünstigung oder Befreiung, welche einer der vertragenden Theile in diesen Beziehungen einer dritten Macht zustehen möchte, wird gleichzeitig und ohne Bedingung dem anderen zu Theil werden.

## ARTIKEL II.

Die in dem vorstehenden Artikel getroffenen Bestimmungen finden auch auf die Colonien und auswärtigen Besitzungen Ihrer Britischen Majestät, sowie auf deren Schiffe nebst Ladungen Anwendung, jedoch, was die Küstenschifffahrt anlangt, nur in denjenigen von diesen Colonien und auswärtigen Besitzungen, deren Küstenschifffahrt in Gemässheit der über den Gegenstand ergangenen Parlaments-Akten fremden Schiffen eröffnet worden ist, oder künftig eröffnet werden möchte.

## ARTIKEL III.

Wenn ein Kriegs- oder Handelsschiff eines der vertragenden Theile an den Küsten des anderen strandet oder scheitert, so soll ihm der nämliche Schutz und Beistand, wie einem einheimischen Schiffe geleistet werden. Die Eigenthümer oder deren Bevollmächtigte oder Vertreter sollen für die Sicherung ihres Eigenthums keine anderen Kosten zu zahlen haben, als in dem entsprechenden Falle des Schiffbruchs eines einheimischen Schiffes zu zahlen sein würden. Sollte der Führer eines Handelsschiffes genöthigt sein, einen Theil der Ladung zur Deckung seiner Auslagen zu veräußern, so soll ihm von den Behörden kein Hinderniss in den Weg gelegt werden; er ist indessen zur Beachtung der bestehenden Vorschriften und Tarife verpflichtet.

Die von dem Wrack geborenen Güter und Waaren sollen von jeder Zollabgabe frei sein, sofern sie nicht in den Verbrauch übergehen.

In Abwesenheit oder auf Ansuchen des Eigenthümers, des Schiffsführers oder eines sonstigen Bevollmächtigten des Eigenthümers sollen die beiderseitigen General-Consuln, Consuln, Vice-Consuln oder Consular-Agenten befugt sein, die Gewährleistung des erforderlichen Beistandes an die Betheiligten zu vermitteln.

## ARTIKEL IV.

Den General-Consuln, Consuln, Vice-Consuln und Consular-Agenten jedes vertragenden Theiles, welche in den Gebieten und Besitzungen des andern ihren Sitz haben, soll von den Ortsbehörden jeder gesetzlich zulässige Beistand zur Herbeischaffung der von den Schiffen ihres Landes desertirten Personen geleistet werden.

## ARTIKEL VII.

Das Recht des Beitritts zu gegenwärtigem Vertrage bleibt einem jeden, jetzt zum Zollverein gehörenden, oder sich später demselben anschliessenden Staate vorbehalten.

ARTICLE VI.

The present Treaty shall have the same duration as the Treaty of Commerce, signed on the 30th of May in the current year, between Great Britain and the Zollverein.  
It shall come into force four weeks after the exchange of the ratifications thereof.

ARTICLE VII.

The present Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications thereof shall be exchanged at Berlin in six months,\* or sooner if possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

Done at Gastein, the sixteenth day of August, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

ARTIKEL VI.

Der gegenwärtige Vertrag soll die nämliche Dauer haben, wie der am 30. May des laufenden Jahres unterzeichnete Handels-Vertrag zwischen Grossbritannien und dem Zollverein.  
Es soll vier Wochen nach dem Austausch der Ratifikations-Urkunden in Kraft treten.

ARTIKEL VII.

Der gegenwärtige Vertrag soll ratificirt und es sollen die Ratifikations-Urkunden binnen sechs Monaten oder, wenn möglich, früher in Berlin ausgewechselt werden.

Zu Urkund dessen haben die beiderseitigen Bevollmächtigten denselben unterzeichnet und ihre Siegel beigedrückt.
