IMPORTATION OF UNDRESSED WOOL INTO FRANCE.

THE accompanying translation of an extract from the *Moniteur*, communicated to the Earl of Clarendon by Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, and forwarded by the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies to His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, is published for general information.

[TRANSLATION.]

"Representations have been made to His Excellency the Minister of Agriculture, Commerce, and Public Works, respecting the injury likely to be inflicted on French industry by prohibiting the introduction into France of undressed wool the produce of Australia, Monte Video, and Buenos Ayres, and imported into France by way of England or Belgium.

"The Minister being aware that the contagious disease affecting horned cattle does not exist in any country out of Europe, and that, besides, the wools produced there have undergone a long sea voyage, has arranged with his colleague of the Minister of Foreign Affairs that such wools may be admitted over the French frontier on production of certificates signed by the principal officers of the docks and warehouses where they may have been deposited or stored, and *viséd* by the French Consuls certifying that these wools are *bond fide* the produce of Australia, Monte Video, or Buenos Ayres, and that in the docks or warehouses they have not been mixed with wools the produce of infected countries.

"Instructions to this effect have been forwarded to the officers of the Customs Service on the French frontier."

PREPARATION OF GENERAL ELECTORAL LISTS DURING THE WEEK ENDING 1st DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 1866.

SPECIAL NOTICE TO HOLDERS OF ELECTORS' RIGHTS.

IT is hereby notified that holders of Electors' Rights, issued on or before the 1st day of September, 1865, must obtain renewed rights in lieu thereof, in order to have their names placed upon the General Lists to be made up on the 1st day of September next.

Neglect of this precaution will result in the omission of the names of the persons so neglecting from the new list to be made up as aforesaid.

Every renewed right will bear the same number and will be in the like form and tenor as that in lieu of which it is issued, and will be equally available for any election that may take place before the completion of the new roll in October next.

No Elector whose name is on a Roll of Ratepaying Electors for any district is entitled to a renewed Elector's Right for such district.—*Vide* sections 61 and 62 of *The Electoral Act* 1865.

GENERAL RULES FOR PROCEEDINGS BEFORE WARDENS.

WHEREAS by *The Mining Statute* 1865, section 233, it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Chief Judge of Courts of Mines and any two or more of the Judges of the Courts of Mines, from time to time, but subject to the said Act, to frame such general rules as to them shall seem expedient for and concerning, and so far as not therein provided, for the pleadings, practice, and proceedings of the courts holden under the said Act, either in their original or appellate jurisdiction, and the practice and proceedings in cases before the Wardens, and for the execution of the process of such courts and issued by such wardens, and in relation to any of the provisions of the said Act which relate to the courts to be holden thereunder, and to proceedings before wardens, as to which there may arise any doubts; and also to frame forms for every matter or proceedings in the said courts or before such wardens, for which they shall think it necessary that a form should be provided and not therein already provided for; and for and concerning the fees to be paid to barristers-at-law, and attorneys practising in the said courts, and before wardens, and the expenses to be paid to witnesses in said courts, and before wardens: Now we, the undersigned, the said Chief Judge and Judges of the Courts of Mines, in pursuance of the said power, do make and declare the rules following, and declare that the schedules thereunto annexed shall be read in connection therewith, and as part thereof, and that the same shall commence and come into operation from the 10th day of June next.

VENUE.

1. Every suit before a warden shall be commenced by a summons from a warden in whose district or portion of a district the subject-matter of dispute, if land or an interest in land, lies, or where a sole defendant resides; but if there are several defendants, the suit may proceed before a warden in whose district or portion of a district any of the defendants reside, with power, however, in the latter case, for the warden to stay the proceedings, with or without costs, in order that proceedings may be taken before a warden more convenient regarding the residence of the defendants and witnesses, or to direct that any suit or proceeding may be heard, transferred, or adjourned to some other place or before some other warden having jurisdiction.

SUMMONSES.

2. Summonses shall describe the addresses of plaintiffs with such distinctness as will enable the wardens and defendants to serve notices upon the plaintiffs without difficulty.

SERVICE OF SUMMONS.

3. Summonses may generally be served under the 180th section of the Act, personally, or at the dwelling of the defendant upon any inmate of years of discretion, or at the place of business of the defendant upon his servant or agent there employed, four days before the day of appearance, or such other time as the warden shall direct, and which shall be noted at the foot of the summons.

4. An affidavit of service by the person making the same must be endorsed upon, or written under, a copy of the summons served, describing how the same has been served; and no cause shall be heard without such affidavit, unless service be admitted.

5. If any dispute shall arise, or the warden shall entertain any doubt as to the due service of any summons, the warden shall be at liberty to examine witnesses, and to decide whether such service has been good or otherwise, and either to proceed to hear or defer the hearing as he shall think fit; or under special circumstances, appearing by affidavit, to order that a person not served or insufficiently served shall be deemed a defendant under such terms as he shall think fit, entering in his register the names of the persons served as above, and the names and manner of service of persons whom he shall order to be deemed defendants.

PARTICULARS OF DEMAND.

6. If a defendant shall require further particulars of the demand or of the relief sought, he may apply to the warden for an order for further particulars, and the warden shall thereon make such order as he shall see fit.

PAYMENT IN AND OUT OF COURT.

7. A plaintiff issuing a summons shall, in regard to the 182nd section, if required by the warden, leave with him a memorandum of the costs which he expects will be payable to him, from time to time, up to the hearing of the cause, in case the defendant pays money to the warden under that or the 183rd section; and the warden receiving money shall, in measuring the costs payable, have regard to the said memorandum, and may afterwards direct either party to proceed before him, by summons, for the ascertainment of the costs properly payable, and direct the payment of additional costs, or the refunding of costs paid in excess, and may make an order as to the payment of costs by parties on such summons, and in awarding the last-mentioned costs have regard to the contents of the above memorandum.

8. Payment to the warden under the 183rd section shall in no case be used in evidence at the hearing as an admission of the cause of complaint.

9. A defendant, after payment of money to the warden under the 183rd section, may cause notice thereof to be given to the plaintiff in person, or at his usual or last known place of abode or business.

10. A plaintiff drawing money from the warden, paid in under the 183rd section, shall be required, before receiving the same, to leave with the warden a memorandum signed by himself or his attorney, stating whether he does or does not elect to proceed.

11. A plaintiff not leaving such memorandum with the warden within three days after he has received notice of payment, either from the defendant or the warden, and afterwards electing not to proceed, shall be liable for all costs properly incurred by the defendant preparing for his defence, after such payment to the warden.

COSTS OF INSPECTION.

12. In case of any inspection or survey under sections 191 or 192, if the owner or person in the possession or control of the engines or other machinery ordinarily employed for the purpose of descending any shaft or mine shall not supply or afford the assistance of the engineers, laborers, or other persons required for working the same, the warden may, if he shall think fit, employ any fit persons for that purpose, and may allow such sum as he shall think fit for their labor and expenses, and for the costs of fuel or other necessities for working the same; and may require such sum to be paid, in the first instance, by the party applying for such inspection or survey, and may afterwards include the same in the costs of inspection recoverable.

PLACE OF HEARING.

13. Wardens shall generally, and as far as practicable, hear evidence and arguments, and pronounce their decisions in some court house or office, and not at the place where the subject-matter of dispute is; but, at their discretion, may themselves and before assessors, if any, receive the evidence of witnesses, and may give their decisions as to boundaries, &c., at that place.

DISCONTINUANCE.

14. The plaintiff may at any time serve notice in writing of discontinuing his proceedings, and thereupon the defendant may proceed for his costs.

SERVICE ON ATTORNEYS.

15. When parties in any cause have appeared by attorney, whose authority is unrevoked, all notices and summonses by the rules hereinbefore contained, authorised, or directed to be served in such cause shall be served by or upon the attorneys respectively, instead of the parties.

AFFIDAVITS.

16. Every affidavit intended to be used before a warden shall be intitled in the cause, and be made in the first person.

17. Every affidavit used before a warden shall be delivered to and retained by him, and preserved in such order that it may afterwards, if necessary, be referred to.

18. The condition and true place of abode of every person making an affidavit shall be inserted therein, and in every affidavit made by two or more deponents, the names of the several persons making such affidavit shall be written in the jurat; and no affidavit shall be read or made use of before a warden in the jurat of which there is any interlineation or erasure, or in the body of which there is any interlineation or erasure not intitled in the margin by the person taking it.

19. When any affidavit is sworn by any person who from his or her signature appears to be illiterate, the person taking such affidavit shall certify or state in the jurat that the affidavit was read in his presence to the party making the same, and that such party seemed perfectly to understand the same, and also that the said party wrote his or her mark or signature in the presence of the person taking such affidavit.

20. When objection is made to any act done by a warden upon affidavit in regard to non-compliance with any of the last four rules, it shall be at his discretion to determine whether the act should be avoided.

EXECUTION AFTER YEAR.

21. No execution shall be issued under any decree or order after the expiration of one year from its date or the time if any of the act directed to be done, except upon a warden's summons to show cause or special order.

FEES TO BARRISTERS AND ATTORNEYS.

22. The fees to be paid to barristers and attorneys practising in wardens' courts, and the expenses to be paid to witnesses in the said courts shall be those set down in the first and second schedules hereunto annexed, but no barrister's fee is to be allowed against the opposite party where the amount or value of the demand is under twenty pounds, unless under special circumstances.

23. In calculating the said fees, the amount or value of the demand shall, where the defendant succeeds, regulate the amount, and where the plaintiff succeeds, the amount recovered shall regulate it.

24. Where a barrister shall travel in order to attend any one case away from his residence, he shall be allowed further three guineas a day for every day after the first, and his travelling expenses according to the sums reasonably and actually paid, if the warden shall consider the case of such importance as to warrant his employment.

FEES TO SURVEYORS, ETC.

25. The costs and expenses to be allowed to accountants, engineers, surveyors, and other scientific persons, whose assistance shall be obtained by the warden, shall be fixed by him, and shall be paid by the party or parties to the suit temporarily or finally, and in such manner and proportions as he shall direct.

CORPORATIONS, ETC.

26. These rules and forms shall be applicable to suits and proceedings to which corporations or incorporated or registered companies are parties, their offices being substituted for the residences or dwellings of individual parties, and acts done by or to their managing officers being substituted for acts done by or to individual parties.

FORMS.

27. The forms in the third schedule hereto annexed shall generally be used for their respective purposes, in addition to those provided by the said statute; and in case no form is provided, the above may, *mutatis mutandis*, be adapted to such case, or any form plainly showing its object may be used; and the warden shall be at liberty to amend all mistakes in forms on such terms, as to postponement or payment of costs, as he may think fit.

WARDEN'S REGISTER.

28. Every warden shall, before or at the end of every year, subscribe his name at the end of the register kept by him under the 181st section, and specify the number of pages it contains; and every warden appointed in the place of another shall receive the registers kept by his predecessors, and shall enter a memorandum thereof therein respectively, and also shall give his predecessor a receipt for the same, specifying them by date, name of warden, and number of pages.

GENERAL PROVISIONS.

29. In the construction of these rules, and their direction as to forms, words importing the singular shall include the plural, and *vice versa*; words importing the masculine shall include the feminine gender, and words applicable to individuals shall include corporations and companies.

30. The time fixed by these rules in days shall be exclusive of the first and inclusive of the last day, unless the last day shall fall on a Sunday or holiday, in which case it shall be exclusive of that also.

BYE-LAW TO REGULATE THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE BEECHWORTH SHIRE COUNCIL AND THE CONDUCT OF THEIR OFFICERS AND SERVANTS.

THE ordinary meetings of the council shall be held on the first Friday in each month, at Eleven o'clock a.m., or as soon thereafter as a quorum of five shall be present; but should there be no quorum present within one hour from the time of meeting, then such meeting shall stand adjourned as required by clause 133 of the Act numbered 176, 27th Victoria, a minute to be taken to that effect by the secretary, and entered in the minute-book.

2. Special meetings shall be summoned by the secretary upon his receiving a written requisition signed by three members of council, stating the subject matter to be brought forward at such meeting, notice whereof shall be given to each of the members not less than four (4) nor more than seven (7) clear days before such meeting.

3. The order of business at ordinary meetings shall be as follows:—1st, Reading and confirming minutes; 2nd, Reading copies of letters sent; 3rd, Reading letters received; 4th, Reception of and reading petitions; 5th, Reports of committees (if any), and reports of officers of the council; 6th, Orders of the day; 7th, Motions of which notice shall have been given; 8th, Passing accounts; 9th, Giving notices of motion.

4. The minutes of a previous meeting, when confirmed, shall be signed by the president, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon, except as to their accuracy.

5. Any memorial or petition addressed to the council shall be presented by a councillor, who shall be responsible for its being in proper form, and respectfully worded.

6. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of previous proceedings of the council, or business undischarged at such meeting, and any unimportant business the president or any councillor may bring forward.

7. No motion entered on the notice-paper shall be considered unless the councillor giving the same (or one acting on his written authority in that behalf) be present when the business is called on. Notices not so proceeded with shall be struck off the notice-paper.

8. No motion or amendment shall be entertained or discussed until it has been seconded, and one amendment only shall be discussed at one time; but if lost, any other may be moved.

before the original motion is put. The adoption of any amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussions shall be acted upon as an original motion.

9. No resolution passed at any meeting of the council shall be revoked or altered at any subsequent meeting, unless in accordance with clause 136 of *The Local Government Act 1863*.

10. Every councillor, including the president, shall stand up while addressing the council.

11. The ruling of the president shall be final on all points of order or practice, and he shall state the same without argument or comment. He shall also decide who shall first be heard in cases when two or more councillors rise to speak at the same time.

12. Any councillor, when speaking, shall address the president, and shall not be interrupted, except by a call to order, when the member calling to order shall be heard, and the point of order decided before the business shall be resumed or other matters brought forward.

13. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment, if the motion be carried the business undisposed of shall have precedence at the next ordinary meeting of the council, but if lost, the subject previously under consideration or next in order shall be discussed before a subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained.

14. No councillor shall be allowed to speak more than once on the same proposition, except the mover by way of explanation or reply, or the mover of an amendment last proposed; after the reply the amendment or motion, as the case may be, shall be put to the vote.

15. Any councillor who shall refuse to obey when called to order by the president, or shall make use of any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, and who shall refuse to withdraw such expression and make a satisfactory apology, when required to do so by the president, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5, to be recovered before any two or more justices of the peace.

16. Any councillor may, with the consent of the president, require the secretary to take down the particular words used by a councillor immediately on the same being uttered.

17. The voting shall in all cases be by show of hands taken for and against the motion. Every motion or amendment with the names of the mover and seconder shall be entered on the minutes, and the votes shall be recorded.

18. Any councillor may demand the production of documents relating to the matter under discussion.

19. Any councillor may enter his protest against any resolution of the council, and the protest shall be entered on the minute-book, and the councillor or councillors so protesting shall sign the same.

20. It shall be competent for any councillor, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any subject at the next or any subsequent meeting, and if such motion be carried, the secretary shall give notice thereof to each councillor seven clear days at least before the meeting for which such call is made.

21. It shall be competent for a majority of the whole council to suspend one or more of the Standing Orders herein contained, except the purport of such suspension be the rescinding of any motion adopted by the council.

22. In committee meetings these Standing Orders shall also be observed.

23. The revenue raised in any locality, including licenses, rates, and Government grant on account of the same, or from whatever source received shall be, as a general rule, expended in that locality, except for the execution of necessary works for the benefit of the shire generally.

24. Any petition, application, or motion presented or made to the council involving the expenditure of any moneys exceeding the sum of Ten pounds shall not be considered by the council until its next meeting, unless in cases of emergency; and no member or officer of the council shall incur any expenditure on any works on any road exceeding the aforesaid sum without having first obtained the sanction of the council for such expenditure.

25. All contracts shall be made by tender, of which five days' notice shall be given in some newspaper circulating in the district. Tenders to be endorsed and addressed to the president, and be only opened at the time of their being considered; and shall be accompanied with a preliminary deposit in cash, according to the following scale:—If under Forty pounds, a deposit of Two pounds, and all above that amount, a deposit of Five per cent.; and in the event of the successful tenderer declining to take up the contract within seven days from the date of the acceptance of his tender, the preliminary deposit shall be forfeited to the council. The deposits on unaccepted tenders to be returned after such tenders have been finally disposed of. The security in all cases of contract shall be Ten per cent. on the amount specified in the tender (or two sureties to the satisfaction of the council), and shall be paid over to the treasurer, and the moneys so paid shall be lodged in the bank with the other moneys of the council, and shall not be repaid to the contractor until he has obtained his certificate from the council's surveyor that the works have been satisfactorily executed.

26. In all cases where contracts shall be entered into amounting to a hundred pounds and upwards an agreement shall be drawn up (in writing or print, or partly in writing and partly in print) between the council and the contractor for the execution of the works, and shall be signed by two members on behalf of the council, and the common seal attached, and also signed by the contractor. The contractor and his sureties shall also sign a bond in the amount of security required by the council, as set forth in clause 25. In cases where the tenderer fails to take up his contract, it shall be competent for the council to order that the next lowest tender be taken, or fresh tenders to be called for, as the council shall think fit.

27. All payments shall be made by cheque if over One pound, signed by the president and one other member of council, and countersigned by the treasurer.

28. The valuer or valuers appointed by the council shall examine every rateable property in the shire, and shall deliver, or cause to be delivered to the owner or occupier thereof, or left on the premises, a notice setting forth the amount at which the same has been valued, together with other particulars sufficient to describe such property, and every such notice shall be signed by the valuer or valuers.

29. In the collection of rates due to the council, it shall be sufficient for the collector to call once, and if such rates are not then paid to him, a notice in writing or in print, or partly in writing and partly in print, duly signed by such collector, shall be left, stating that, if the same be not paid at the office of the shire within fourteen days from the date of giving such notice, legal proceedings may be taken for the recovery of the same.

30. The collector shall, not less than once in every seven days, pay over to the treasurer all moneys belonging to the council that may have come into his possession, and shall obtain a receipt for such moneys, which shall be a sufficient discharge; and every such collector shall, at each monthly meeting of the council, deliver to them true and perfect accounts in writing, under his hand, of all moneys received by him, and of all moneys paid by him to the said treasurer, and shall, at any other time or times, as shall be required of him by the council, furnish to them full and perfect reports in writing, under his hand, of any matter or thing appertaining to the duties of his office; and every such collector shall have power to sue, in the name of the council, before any justice, for the recovery of any rates or other moneys to be collected by him due to the council.

31. All moneys of the council, amounting to twenty pounds and upwards, shall, within three days after they have come into the possession of the treasurer, be paid by him into such bank as the council shall from time to time appoint for that purpose.

32. The secretary shall be the custodian of all documents belonging to the council, and of the common seal of the corporation, which he shall affix to any corporate document requiring the same when instructed by the council, but not otherwise. In cases of powers of attorney and other legal documents not relating to the corporation (the signature to which requires to be verified before the president by declaration) the said seal shall and may be affixed to the president's certificate accompanying the same, on receipt of a fee of 10s. 6d for each attestation.

33. The surveyor shall attend all council meetings, and also meetings of committees, if required.

34. The secretary, surveyor, and every other officer of the council shall, whenever called upon to do so, furnish official reports to the council.

35. All officers of the council, if required, shall enter into a bond for the faithful performance of their several duties, and all officers entrusted with the control of moneys shall find such security as the council shall from time to time require.

36. Any officer or servant of the council who shall wilfully by any act of omission or commission of any matter or thing appertaining to his duties, cause the council to sustain any loss or damage, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5, to be recovered before any two or more justices of the peace.
