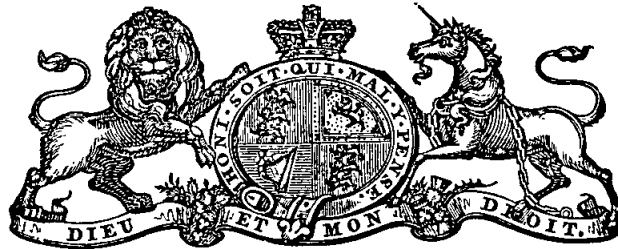

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land a farmers' common; when one-eighth part of any agricultural area has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim any unselected and unleased portion of such agricultural area, not exceeding twice the quantity so selected and leased, to be a temporary common for the use of such selectors and lessees: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the farmers' common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

WENTWORTH AGRICULTURAL AREA FARMERS' COMMON.—The allotments and piece of land hereinafter mentioned, comprising an area of 2600 acres, more or less, are hereby proclaimed a Farmers' Common for the use of selectors and lessees in the agricultural area of Wentworth, viz.:—Parish of Tandarra, allotments 5, 27, 28, 41, 64, 66, 68, 69 B, 70, 71, and 72, and the strip of land, 15 chains wide, reserved for an outlet from the Tandarra Swamp, as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(67.P.8831.)

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now reciting Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, that is to say:—

BALLAN TOWN COMMON.—The Ballan Town Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 18th day of February, 1861, is hereby increased by adding thereto the unappropriated Crown lands in the town of Ballan. Area 300 acres, more or less.—(67.P.10860.)

BROADFORD TOWN COMMON.—The Town Common of Broadford, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 18th day of February, 1861, is hereby increased by adding thereto the portions of land comprised within the boundaries hereinafter described, and containing in all 137 acres 2 roods, more or less, viz.:—101 acres, more or less: Commencing at the west angle of the township of Broadford, being a point on the right bank of Dry Creek; thence by suburban portion 6, bearing S. 35° E. eight chains fifty links, more or less, to the south-eastern side of Mollison street; thence by the said side of that street bearing N. 55° E. sixty-one chains, more or less, to the south-west boundary of the Cemetery reserve; thence by the south-west, north-west, and north-east boundaries of that reserve, bearing respectively N. 35° W. one chain, N. 55° E. five chains, and S. 35° E. six chains, to the east angle thereof; thence by the prolongation of Piper street, bearing N. 55° E. seven chains, more or less, to the aforesaid creek; and thence by that creek, bearing westerly to the point of commencement. 25 acres 2 roods, more or less: Commencing at the north-west angle of suburban portion 41, being a point on the right bank of Sunday Creek; thence by the south-west boundary of the said portion, bearing S. 35° E. seven chains, more or less, to the southern side of the Parade; thence by the said side of the Parade, bearing S. 55° W. seventeen chains fifty links, more or less, and west eleven chains to the north-west angle of section 39; thence by the west boundary of that section, by a line, and by the west boundary of section 40, bearing south fourteen chains, more or less, to the northern side of High street; thence by the said side of that street, bearing west, six chains fifty links, more or less, to the aforesaid creek; and thence by that creek, bearing northerly and north-easterly to the point of commencement. 11 acres, more or less: Commencing on the left bank of Sunday Creek, at the point where the prolongation of the south-eastern side of Ferguson street abuts thereon; thence by the said prolongation, bearing S. 55° W. six chains, more or less, to the north angle of section 38; thence by the north-east boundary of that section, bearing S. 35° E. two chains fifty links; thence by the east boundary thereof and a line, bearing south twenty-one chains, more or less, to the south-east side of Davidson street; thence by a line bearing east four chains, more or less, to the aforesaid creek; and thence by that creek, bearing northerly to the point of commencement.—(60.A.7308.)

GLENLYON, HOLCOMBE, AND WOMBAT FARMERS' COMMON (WITHIN THE SHIRE OF GLENLYON).—The portion of the Glenlyon, Holcombe, and Wombat Farmers' Common lying within the shire of Glenlyon, severed from the portion thereof lying within the Franklin and Yandoit road district, and proclaimed a separate common, pursuant to Order in Council bearing date the 31st day of July, 1865, is hereby increased by adding thereto 3700 acres, more or less, being the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries described as follow, viz.: Commencing at the north-eastern angle of allotment 1 in the parish of Holcombe, the said angle being a point on Middleton's Creek; thence by part of the north boundary of the Porcupine Ridge Farmers' Common and by the north boundary of the portion of the Glenlyon, Holcombe, and Wombat Farmers' Common, proclaimed as aforesaid on the 31st July, 1865, being a line bearing easterly three miles and a quarter, more or less, to the west boundary of the parish of Burke; thence by the said boundary of that parish, bearing north one mile and three-quarters, more or less, to the north boundary of the Holcombe Run; thence by the said boundary of that run, bearing westerly three miles and a half, more or less, to the west boundary of the shire of Glenlyon; thence by the said boundary of that shire, bearing south one mile and a quarter, more or less, to Middleton's Creek aforesaid; and thence by that creek, bearing south-easterly to the point of commencement; as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(67.O.5118.)
