CAUTION TO PASSENGERS.

THE attention of passengers and others is hereby directed to the following list of goods exempted from duty:—

Anchors, chain cables and shackles over 3-inch diameter; animals and birds; wrapping and printing paper, card and millboard; printed books and newspapers; printing materials and ink; coal, coke, and kerosene shale; cottons, linens, woollens, canvas, and bagging in the piece; cotton, raw, wick, and waste; hatters' felt hoods and silk plush; silk mixed doeskins or tweed trousseings and coatings not containing more than two per cent. of silk; hogskins and minor articles used in making saddlery; quartz, quicksilver, rags, sulphur, resin, and saltpetre; hemp, jute, flax, cocoanut-fibre, and unserviceable cordage; fresh meat and fish; guano and other manures; plants; cocoanut and palm oil, wool, tallow, hides and skins, horns and hoofs; coin and bullion; iron in the ore and in scrap, pig, bar, rod, or plain sheet; hoop iron, iron pipes, railway iron rails; wire, No. 12 upwards; block and sheet tin, zinc, and copper in ore, ingot, and sheet; lead in ore, pig, and scrap; yellow metal, bolts and nails, and sheathing felt; steel; timber in logs 12 inches square and upwards; shooks and staves; stone and marble, unwrought; mill stones; pitch and tar; soda ash and caustic soda; silicate of soda and potash; specimens of natural history and curiosities; hair and bristles; telegraphic materials; minor articles of mixed or undescribed materials used in the making-up of apparel; sewing machines; metal work and minor articles used in manufacturing pianofortes; *passengers' luggage, cabin and other furniture or personal effects, which have been in use and are not imported for sale*; carriages and other vehicles used in the conveyance of passengers and goods across the frontier; and all packages in which goods are ordinarily imported.

And all persons are hereby cautioned against landing any goods not mentioned in such list; otherwise they will render themselves liable to severe penalties, and the goods, wherever found, to forfeiture. Any person having any articles liable to duty are desired to communicate with the customs officer on his boarding the vessel, or to ask the master to direct them to the nearest customs office.

N.B.—Passengers' baggage is always liable to examination by customs officers.

ALTERATION OF MINING SURVEYORS' AND MINING REGISTRARS' DIVISIONS.

IT is hereby notified, for general information, that the under-mentioned gentlemen will act as Mining Surveyors and Mining Registrars within the limits severally hereinafter described; and that all previous notices, so far as such may relate to the limits within which the said officers shall act in the Beechworth Mining District, are hereby cancelled:-

MR. ALFRED BOWER AINSWORTH

will act as Mining Surveyor and Mining Registrar for the area which is hereinafter described as follows, namely: Commencing at the summit of the Fountain Head Hill on the Main Dividing Range; thence by a range northerly to the Bald Hill; thence easterly by a track from Enoch's Point to Wood's Point to its junction with the tracks from Raspberry Creek and Jamieson; thence by a range known as the German Spur north-easterly about one mile and a quarter to Weber's Spur; thence by Weber's Spur and a line easterly to the junction of Weber's Creek with the River Goulburn; thence by the River Goulburn to the junction of the Black River; thence by the northern boundary of the watershed of the Black River easterly to the Main Dividing Range; and thence by that range southerly and westerly to the summit of the Fountain Head Hill, the commencing point aforesaid.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold-fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common, respectively, as the case may be: And whereas by *The Amending Land Act 1865*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now reciting Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim, increase, or diminish (as the case may be) the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Acts, that is to say:—

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the thirty-first year of Her Majesty's reign (31 Vict., No. 310), intituled *An Act to amend the Laws relating to or affecting Public Health*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make, alter, or vary, and may revoke such orders as may seem to be necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the introduction into Victoria, from any country or colony, or part of a country or colony (in which respectively any disease in sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals of the same or any other kind or kinds whatsoever, is known to exist), of all sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals of the same or any other kind or kinds whatsoever; or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals; or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate amongst men or other animals any infectious or contagious disease whatsoever: And the Governor in Council may also from time to time make such orders as may seem to be necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places within Victoria as may be designated in any such order of all sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals of the same or any other kind or kinds whatsoever; or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals; or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate amongst men or other animals any infectious or contagious disease whatsoever; and may from time to time revoke, alter, or vary any such order. And all orders for any of the purposes hereinbefore in this section mentioned shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in this Act; and all persons offending against any order made under the authority of this section shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Fifty pounds, or such smaller sum as the Governor in Council may in any case by such order direct, and such sum shall go to and form part of the consolidated revenue; provided that nothing in this section shall apply to the disease in sheep called scab: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, make the following regulations, that is to say:—

1. All cattle, horses, sheep, swine, or other animals brought to this colony by sea from Europe, or other places in which any infectious disease amongst cattle or other such animals is known to exist, shall be examined by the health officer or other officer duly authorized for the purpose, as hereinafter mentioned; and any such cattle or other animals which shall on such examination be found to be suffering from any infectious or contagious disease, or to have been suffering therefrom within the forty days immediately preceding their arrival in the colony, shall perform quarantine in such place as shall have been duly appointed for the purposes of quarantine, or as shall be directed by the health officer or other officer as before mentioned, until the expiration of forty days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such disease amongst such cattle or other animals.

2. For the purposes of this regulation the Collector of Customs at any port at which there may not be a health officer shall be the authorized officer for carrying the same into effect.

Second quality to be made of flour known in the trade as "best seconds," and the third quality (that issued for prisoners of the Crown) to be made of flour, the produce of prime wheat, from which twelve per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Fresh meat is to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and, when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than five inches, must have been cut off.

4. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department, either for delivery at the Stores and Transport Office, or at the office of the department concerned, as may be stated in the order.

5. The order issued by the head of department must accompany the goods, and the account is to be rendered simultaneously with delivery of the supplies. In other cases the account is to be rendered monthly. The rates quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

6. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order they will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor; failing which, it will be procured by the person requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 6.

9. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the person to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor in waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead; failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report of the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

12. CONDITIONS.

All the articles required by this notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages:

The flour and bread must be the produce of prime wheat, from which 20 per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

Fresh beef and mutton are to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and; when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.:-

Green vegetables, such as:-

Pumpkins, greens free from root, carrots free from top, &c. 2 lbs., or } equal to 1 lb. of potatoes.

The above substitutions are to be made whenever it may be considered advisable by the officer authorized to draw the rations, but not otherwise.

Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

In the event of any alteration in the Tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Government, or the contractor, as may be the case, will make a proportionate allowance by way of deduction from, or increase of, the price of the item so affected.
