NOTICE TO MARINERS.

THE Rear-Admiral Commander of the Naval Forces, and Chief of the Marine Department of Netherlands, India, informs parties interested, that, since the 1st July last, a white Dioptric harbor light has been placed at Cheribon, which will in future be regularly exhibited from sunset to sunrise.

The light which is placed at the extreme point of the northernmost head, being about 8 Dutch yards above high sea-level, is visible at a distance of 2 geogr. (8 Eng.) miles, and serves as a guide to vessels entering Cheribon roads by night.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.—PORT OF MARYBOROUGH.

ON and after the 1st October, two Dioptric Condensing Lights, fourth order fixed, will be exhibited from Woody Island, to enable vessels to enter the port by night through the west channel. The lights are placed on hexagonal white towers twenty-two feet high. The higher of the two is placed upon Middle Hill, and is at an elevation of 215 feet, while the lower and the more northern light is about 130 feet above the sea-level.

Directions.—When entering Hervey's Bay, steer so as to pass one or two miles west of the Fairway Buoy, until the two lights on Woody Island are visible, and are brought into line. Steer with the two lights in one, past Dayman Spit and the Middle Bank, until the two lights are almost on the same level; then keep a good look-out for a red buoy which is placed about a ship's length to the S.W. of the line of lights. On sighting the buoy, steer E. & S. (making due allowance for tide) for the red buoy off the Woody Island Spit. Should the low light be the first to appear red, keep upon the edge of the red light until the high light is also red, while, if the high light appears as a red light first, steer south until the lower light is also red. When the lights are seen to become red at the same time, a

vessel is about one-third of distance from the spit across the channel. Then steer about S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., and open the bright lights, when similarly if the lower light shows as a bright light first, a vessel will be to the eastward of the course, and to the westward if the upper light becomes bright first. From thence steer to pass Little Woody and Duck Islands as usual, and keep Little Woody Island open of the latter until the high light is obscured, when a vessel will be abreast the red beacon. Steer S.S.W. until the light again opens out as a bright light, when she will be abreast the red buoy opposite the white cliffs, from which a course must be gradually shaped for the river heads.

Should a vessel entering the port with the lights in one, by any accident miss the red buoy which denotes the turning-point, she may still with safety stand on with the lights in one until the high light is dipped below the northern hill.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.—PORT CURTIS.

ON and after this date the temporary light on Gatcombe Head will be replaced by a fifth order Dioptric Apparatus. The light will show seaward as a white light as formerly, but northward of the old line of shut-off light on a bearing of about W. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., it will now appear as a red light until it is shut in with the land at the back of Settlement Point. The light will also show as a red light between the bearing of N. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. and N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

Directions.—Vessels coming from the southward—being careful to keep outside the east banks, and in not less than eight fathoms water—will steer to the westward until the bright light appears red, and will then haul up to the S.E. until the light is again white, and steer for the lighthouse, being careful to keep the white light open, which will lead in clear of the rocks off Settlement Point. After passing the Point, haul up so as to pass outside the Oyster Rock, and as soon as the light opens out as red light on a N. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. bearing, a vessel may stand across into the South Channel and will be to the westward of the Junction Buoy, while the red light is in sight.

Vessels from the northward will stand to the S.E. through the red light, and, as soon as they open the light as a bright light, will haul up and steer for it, keeping the white light open.

APPORTIONMENT OF TOLLS.

IRON CASTINGS.

When specially ordered, the castings are to be run with heads or runners of such weight as may be requested, and no extra charge shall be made or allowed for same; and the contractor will be required to remove the head or runner from the casting where possible, and charge the casting at the net weight only, trimmed and cleaned. In cases where it is necessary to cut off the head in a lathe or machine, such head will be cut off by the Government, and returned to the Melbourne Station, there to be delivered to the contractor free of cost of carriage.

Whenever ordered, the castings are to be moulded in loam without a pattern, and loam price will be paid according to schedule, but no extra charge will be allowed for patterns, strickles, or loam boards. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

10. Irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Locomotive Superintendent, to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds; and it will be in the power of the Government, upon repetition of such irregularities, to terminate the contract forthwith.
