NOTE.—The increase of population from all sources in the year 1866 (17,394) was less than the increase in 1865 (21,134), in 1864 (31,170), or in 1863 (18,537); but was larger than the increase in 1862 (13,944), in 1861 (3,953), or in 1860 (7,385). The arrivals in 1866 numbered 32,178, and the departures 27,629. The net gain to the population from without was thus 4,549. The births during the year numbered 21,934, and the deaths 12,989. The gain by the excess of the former was thus 12,845. The number of marriages during the year was 4,077. The figures of births, deaths, and marriages will probably be slightly modified after the returns have been finally checked.

Twenty-three out of thirty-four deaths registered in Collingwood were of children under three years of age, the chief causes of death being diarrhoea and measles. Eleven of the nineteen deaths recorded in South Melbourne occurred in public institutions. In North Melbourne, out of the thirty-two deaths twenty-four were of children under three years of age, and diarrhoea is said to be the most fatal form of disease prevalent. In fact, in most of the districts, white measles is reported on the decline, diarrhoea and dysentery are declared to be steadily on the increase.

The mortality of Melbourne and suburbs, in December, 1866, was 148 above the average, and was also higher than it was in the same month of any other year of the past seven. The next most fatal month of December was in 1860, at which time, as will be remembered, a malignant type of scarlatina and measles prevailed in an epidemic form. The deaths then averaged about 17 per day. The daily average in the month under review has been 18. The latter, considering the increase of population, is perhaps not a higher rate than the former.

The deaths in November, 1866, averaged 12½ per day, or not so many by 5½ per day as in the month under review.

The mean temperature of the month was identical with the average during seven years. The mean atmospheric pressure was a tenth of an inch higher than the average.

Fifty-seven per cent. of the deaths were of males, and 43 per cent. of females. Sixty-nine per cent. were of children under five years of age, against 65½ per cent. in December, 1865; 63 per cent. in December, 1864; 47 per cent. in December, 1863; 66 per cent. in December, 1862; 50 per cent. in December, 1861; and 73 per cent. in December, 1860. The relative mortality of young children was thus higher in the month under review than in the corresponding month of any of the years named except 1860.

The greatest number of deaths in any one day was 30 on the 26th. Twenty-nine deaths also took place on the 24th, 25 on the 29th, 24 on the 18th, 27th and 31st, 23 on the 28th, 22 on the 14th, 21 on the 16th, 20th, and 21st, and 20 on the 2nd. All these are very high numbers. The least number of deaths on one day was 7, on the 8th; the next lowest number was 8, on the 4th; then 10 on the 12th and 30th.

The deaths of persons at 75 years of age and upwards numbered three, and were all of males. Their respective ages were 75, 81, and 89; and their deaths were caused by quinsy, mortification of the foot, and paralysis.

Ten violent deaths took place, all of which are believed to have been accidental. Of these, three were from fractures and contusions, viz., those of a boy, aged 4, of injuries received from a fall from a pony, of a boatman, aged 39, of gangrene of the lung, consequent upon an external injury the nature of which was not stated, and of an engineer, aged 45, of the effects of a fall from a vehicle; two were from scalds, viz., those of a female child, aged 13 months, and of a boy, aged 3½ years; four were from drowning, viz., those of a seaman, aged 21, of a fireman, aged 27, and of a male, aged 40, all in the Yarra, and of a female, aged 39, in the Sandridge lagoon; one was from suffocation, viz., that of a male infant, aged 48 weeks, caused by a head of canny grass getting into the larynx.

Deaths occurred in public institutions, as follows:—Melbourne Hospital 32, Lying-in Hospital 4, Benevolent Asylum 4, Immigrants' Home 5, Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum 8, Melbourne Orphan Asylum 2, St. Vincent de Pauls' Orphan Asylum 2, Industrial Schools 15, Melbourne Gaol 1, amounting in all to 73, or to 13 per cent. of the whole mortality.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 174, of which 94, or 54 per cent., were males, and 80, or 46 per cent., were females; 38 were between five and ten, 8 were between ten and fifteen, 4 were between fifteen and twenty, 11 were between twenty and twenty-five, 14 were between twenty-five and thirty, 19 were between thirty and thirty-five, 20 were between thirty-five and forty, 16 were between forty and forty-five, 3 were between forty-five and fifty, 13 were between fifty and fifty-five, 11 were between fifty-five and sixty, 8 were between sixty and sixty-five, 1 was between sixty-five and seventy, 4 were between seventy and seventy-five, 1 was between seventy-five and eighty, 2 were eighty and upwards, and 1 was of age unspecified.

The mortality of the last quarter of 1866 was higher than it was in the corresponding quarter of any previous year except 1860. The deaths however were not so numerous as they were in that quarter of 1860 by 172, and this notwithstanding the population of the district must have greatly increased during the interval. The mean temperature was lower by upwards of a degree (1.3) than it was in the last quarter of 1860, and also lower by nearly half a degree (.4) than the average of the last quarters of the past seven years.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE BAIRNSDALE TOWN COMMON, 1866.

THE word cattle, when used in these regulations, shall have the same meaning as set forth in 64th section Lands Act 1862.

2. All persons entitled to pasturage on the Bairnsdale Town Common shall be permitted to depasture cattle thereon on payment of fees according to the following scale, viz.:

3. For every horse, mare, gelding, colt, filly, ass, or mule; per annum (One pound)	1	0	0
4. For every cow, heifer, bull, ox, steer or calf, per annum (Ten shillings)	0	10	0
5. For every sheep or goat, per annum (Three shillings)	0	3	0
6. For every head of swine, per annum (Four shillings)	0	4	0

7. For working horses and working bullocks, the *bona fide* property of carters, and used by them solely for the conveyance of goods, merchandize, or so forth, at per head per annum (One half of the above rates).

8. All fees must be paid half-yearly in advance.

9. The licenses shall date from the 1st June and 1st December in each year.

10. No cattle will be considered as registered unless such fees are paid at the time of entering of the brands or other description of such cattle by the herdsman.

11. Widows, with helpless families, upon application to and by leave of the managers, but not otherwise, may depasture cows, not exceeding five in number, on the common without payment of fees.

12. No fees will be charged for the progeny of registered cattle which, in the opinion of the managers or herdsman, are under one old.

13. No bulls, entire horses, or sheep will be permitted to graze on the common without the special consent of the managers.

14. All cattle, sheep, pigs, and goats sent to the common shall have a distinguishing brand on them, and horned cattle shall have, in addition, the Bairnsdale Town Common brand on them.

15. The herdsman will attend at the common yards every Monday from Nine in the morning until Three in the afternoon to register and brand all cattle brought to him, with the assistance of the owners.

16. The managers or herdsman will not be responsible for any cattle depasturing on the common, but the herdsman is hereby required to give information to owners immediately on his being aware of their cattle having strayed from off the common.

17. The herdsman will be authorized by the managers to impound all cattle, sheep, pigs, or goats trespassing on the common, an entry of which he will make in a book kept for that purpose, so that all damages and fees accruing from same may be properly accounted for.

18. No person will be allowed to remove cattle from the common without giving at least twelve hours notice to the herdsman, and no person will be allowed to disturb or remove cattle unless the herdsman is present.

19. It will be the herdsman's duty to see all cattle under his charge every other day.

20. Should the managers at any time consider the herdsman incompetent or neglectful of his duties, they can remove or discharge him without a written notice, and he can have no claim on them for compensation whatever.

21. The managers do not hold themselves responsible for any neglect or irregularity of the herdsman.

22. The managers reserve the right to cause all cattle or sheep suspected of disease to be removed from the common; and in the event of any animal or animals dying upon the common the owner or owners thereof must, within six hours after receiving notice from the managers or herdsman so to do, completely destroy by fire, or cause to be destroyed, the carcass or carcasses of said animal or animals.

23. Persons shall, previous to registering any cattle, give to the herdsman a written description of each beast, detailing the brands in accordance to the prescribed form.

24. The herdsman shall give to each person who has registered cattle a receipt for all moneys paid by him on account of the pasturage of said cattle, and shall hand over such moneys to the treasurer of the common within twenty-four hours of his receiving same.

25. On payment of fees the herdsman may register and brand elsewhere than at the common branding-yard, and for which branding the charge shall be, in addition to the common-fees, a sum of One shilling for one beast, and Sixpence per head for two or more.

26. The general mustering of cattle shall take place on the first day of June and first day of December in each year. Six consecutive days to be allowed for the mustering; the three first days for the mustering of horses, the other three days for the mustering of horned cattle.

27. Cattle mustered for the purpose of registration shall, if not registered and paid for, be impounded on the third of the respective days set apart for such mustering.

28. That the managers be empowered to appropriate a portion of the common to be by them set apart for the grazing of sheep, and also a portion for the grazing of pigs.

29. Persons removing cattle will be allowed to substitute others by paying a registration fee of one shilling per head.

BOROUGH OF CRAIGIE.

BY-LAW No. 1 TO REGULATE THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE CRAIGIE BOROUGH COUNCIL BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS.

At every ordinary meeting of the council, the first business thereof shall be the reading of, and putting for confirmation, the minutes of any preceding meeting; and no discussion shall be allowed thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes when confirmed shall be signed by the mayor, or in his absence, by the chairman of the meeting.

2. The order of the business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as practicable:—

1. Reading correspondence, and considering and ordering thereon.
2. Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
3. Reading and ordering on reports of committees and officers.
4. Orders of the day.
5. Motions of which previous notice has been duly given.

3. Every petition or memorial addressed to the council shall be in proper form, and must be presented by a councillor, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded; and no debate shall take place thereon except as to its being received and taken into consideration after the orders of the day, or at any future meeting, or, if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.

4. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the mayor shall think fit to bring under consideration; any councillor may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable, in form of a notice of motion, such notice to be given in writing to the town clerk at the meeting previous to the meeting at which the same is to be taken into consideration; and all such notices of motion shall be considered in the order in which they are given.

5. A notice of motion may be dispensed with in cases of emergency where the council consider it necessary to do so, provided that same be consented to by at least two-thirds of the councillors present.

6. No motion entered on the notice-paper shall be considered unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some other councillor authorized by him, be present when the business is called on; and notices not so proceeded with shall be struck off the notice-paper.

7. The mover of any motion which shall be referred to a committee shall, for the occasion, be a member of such committee.

8. Every councillor, including the mayor, shall stand up while addressing the council.

9. The mayor's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice.

10. Every motion or amendment shall be entered on the minutes with the names of the mover and seconder.

11. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, one other may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried, it shall be competent for any councillor to move one other amendment thereon.

12. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council; but if on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice-paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion

for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next ordinary meeting of the council.

13. No councillor shall speak more than once on the same question, except by way of explanation or reply on an original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of an amendment last proposed, and after the reply the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be put to the vote.

14. Every councillor, when proposing a motion or amendment, or speaking on any matter, shall address the mayor, and shall not be interrupted, except called to order, whereupon he shall sit down until the question of order shall have been decided; the councillor in possession of the chair may then resume the subject.

15. Any councillor who shall refuse to obey when ruled out of order, or shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, and who if required by the mayor shall refuse to withdraw such expression and make satisfactory apology, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, to be recovered before any two or more justices of the peace.

16. Any councillor may, with the consent of the mayor, require the town clerk to take down the particular words used by any councillor immediately upon the same being uttered.

17. The public works committee are empowered to expend a sum not exceeding five pounds per week on necessary works.

18. Any section of these standing orders may be suspended *pro tem* in cases of emergency, with the unanimous consent of the council, there not being more than three councillors absent.

The foregoing bye-law was made by special order on the 24th day of October, 1866, and confirmed on the 21st day of November, 1866.
