REGISTRAR-GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF MARCH, AND FOR THE QUARTER ENDING 31st MARCH, 1867.

ACTUAL Daily Mortality of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, embracing a radius of ten miles, and including the Statistical Sub-districts of Melbourne Proper, East Melbourne, North Melbourne and Carlton, Fitz Roy Municipality, East Collingwood, Richmond, Jika-jika parish (exclusive of North Melbourne, Collingwood, and Richmond), South Yarra and Prahran, Emerald Hill and Sandridge, St. Kilda and Brighton, Doutta Galla and Keilor, Boroondara and Heidelberg, Cut-paw-paw parish, and the shipping in Hobson's Bay; also, the Temperature in the shade at the Melbourne Observatory, calculated from a reduced mean corresponding with that of twenty-four hourly observations taken on each day during the month of March, 1867:—

The rate of mortality in Melbourne and suburbs which in January reached the high average of 2216 deaths per day, fell in February to 1857, and in the month under review to 1476. The deaths in the latter month, however, exceeded the average during eight years by 88.

The mean temperature of the month was nearly two degrees below the average. The mean atmospheric pressure was slightly above the average.

Fifty-one per cent. of the deaths were males, and 49 per cent. of females. Sixty-three per cent. were of children who had not reached their fifth year, against 57 per cent. in March, 1860; 59 per cent. in March, 1865, 58 per cent. in March, 1864, 57 per cent. in March, 1863, 58 per cent. in March, 1862, 65 per cent. in March, 1861, and 61 per cent. in March, 1860.

Twenty-three deaths occurred on the 3rd. This was the largest number on any one day. The lowest number on any day was 7, which is all that were recorded for the 17th and 28th.

Four males and one female of 75 years old and upwards died during the month. The ages of the males were 75, 77, 78, and 84 years; and the causes of death, stone in the bladder, dysentery, bronchitis, and old age respectively. The female was 75 years old, and died of heart disease.

Nine violent deaths were reported during the month. Of these, seven are believed to have been accidental, of which the following are the particulars:—A female child, aged 7, died of a ruptured liver caused by a dray wheel passing over her body; a boy, aged 10, of injuries received from falling from a horse; a baker, aged 25, of tetanus brought on by an accidental injury to the hand; a female, aged 67, of concussion of the brain resulting from the effects of a fall; a male child, aged 3, of an accidental scald; a laborer, aged 40, of drowning in the Yarra; and a gentleman, aged 55, of drowning in a water-hole at Brunswick. The remaining two deaths were suicidal, the one being that of a carrier, aged 40, who died of a self-inflicted wound in the arm; and the other that of a laborer, aged 38, who drowned himself in the Sandridge lagoon.

Seventy-four deaths, or nearly 17 per cent. of the whole, occurred in public institutions, viz.:—46 in the Melbourne Hospital, 4 in the Lying-in Hospital, 6 in the Benevolent Asylum, 6 in the Immigrants Home, 4 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Carlton Lunatic Asylum, 6 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 1 in the Hulk *Success*.

NOTE.—The Melbourne Hospital is in Melbourne Proper, the Benevolent Asylum in North Melbourne and Carlton, the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum in Jika-jika parish (remainder of), and the Industrial Schools in South Yarra and Prahran.

\* This calculation is made upon the population at the last census, instead of the present population, as there are no means of estimating the changes which have taken place in the different districts since the census was taken.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 276, of which 125, or about 45 per cent., were of males, and 151, or nearly 55 per cent., were of females. Of those dying, 152 were under one year of age, 71 were between one and two years, 16 were between two and three, 22 were between three and four, and 15 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 163, of which 97, or nearly 60 per cent., were males, and 66, or about 40 per cent., were females; 18 were between five and ten, 5 were between ten and fifteen, 6 were between fifteen and twenty, 14 were between twenty and twenty-five, 16 were between twenty-five and thirty, 25 were between thirty and thirty-five, 16 were between thirty-five and forty, 14 were between forty and forty-five, 11 were between forty-five and fifty, 11 were between fifty and fifty-five, 9 were between fifty-five and sixty, 6 were between sixty and sixty-five, 3 were between sixty-five and seventy, 4 were between seventy and seventy-five, 4 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 1 was upwards of eighty.

In January 58 per cent. of the deaths were caused by zymotic diseases. This proportion fell in February to 47½ per cent., and in the month under review to 43 per cent. Measles in March caused 32 deaths against 71 in February, and 148 in January; scarlatina and diphtheria caused 31 deaths against 29 and 45; dysentery and diarrhoea caused 81 deaths against 114 and 165. The mortality from constitutional diseases has increased, and 38 deaths were referred to phthisis against 29 in February, and 30 in January.

**MARYBOROUGH MINING DISTRICT.**  
**BYE-LAW No. 4.—FOR REGULATING THE MANAGEMENT OF GOLD-FIELDS COMMONS.—[20th March, 1867.]**

At a meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Maryborough, begun and holden at Maryborough in the said district, on the twentieth day of March, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, it is ordained by the said Board as follows, that is to say:—

**Repealing clause.**—The bye-law of the Maryborough mining district, of the tenth July, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, for regulating the management of gold-fields commons shall be, and the same is, hereby repealed and rescinded.

1. All persons entitled to commonage over any common in respect of which the mining board of this district has power to make rules, will be allowed to depasture their cattle, &c., thereon, on payment of the undermentioned fees.

2. The fees to be charged for horses, asses, mules, or horned cattle shall be three shillings per head per annum; sheep one shilling and sixpence per head per annum, and goats eightpence per head per annum.

3. All fees shall be paid in advance, yearly, to terminate on the 30th day of June in each year.

4. Progeny of horses or cattle under six months old, and of goats under twelve months old to be exempt from fees.

5. Entire horses, wriglins, or bulls shall not depasture on any gold-field common without the consent of the managers.

6. All cattle licensed to depasture on any common shall be branded by their respective owners with some distinctive brand, and be mustered by them and branded with the common brand with tar, at the yard appointed for that purpose, after receiving four days' notice.

7. No person shall be allowed to run cattle, sheep, or goats on any common without first obtaining a license.

8. Whenever the managers of any common believe, or are informed that any animal is infected with a contagious disease, the owner thereof shall remove the same from the common after receiving twenty-four hours' notice, and in case of refusal, such animal shall be treated in all respects as if it had not been licensed; and such animal shall not again be put upon the common without the permission of the managers.

9. Any person depasturing cattle on a gold-field or united common, must apply to the person appointed by the managers to obtain registration of his or her name, and of the brands and description of the cattle, and to pay the commonage fees.

10. All cattle and other stock found trespassing on any common will be impounded.

11. The managers of commons will not be responsible for the safe keeping of any animal licensed.

12. Special licenses will be granted to dairymen, slaughtermen, and butchers, on application to the managers.
