PETITION FOR A NEW BOROUGH.

PETITION FOR THE CONSTITUTION OF A SHIRE BETWEEN THE BROKEN RIVER AND THE RIVERS GOULBURN AND OVENS.

A PETITION has been presented to the Governor, signed by eleven residents in the district lying south of the Murray and between the Broken River and the rivers Goulburn and Ovens, wherein the petitioners state that they are possessed of property in the area hereinafter described, that such area contains not less than one hundred square miles, and property not less than £5000 rateable under *The Local Government Act*; and they pray His Excellency to cause such area to be proclaimed a Shire, and guarantee upon the same being proclaimed a Shire the raising of a sum of £1000 of annual rates as required by the said Act for the constitution of a Shire.

The boundaries of the proposed Shire as described by the Petitioners are as follow:—"Commencing at the junction of the Goulburn and the Murray, following the south bank of the Murray to its junction with the Ovens; following the River Ovens to the south boundary of the Killawarra run up to its junction with the south boundary of the Peechelba run; following the south boundary of the Peechelba run along the south boundary of the Broken Creek run; following the south boundary of the Yabba-yabba run till its junction with the east boundary of the Pine Lodge run; thence by the east boundary of the Pine Lodge run to the Broken River; thence by the Broken River to its junction with the Goulburn; thence by the Goulburn to its junction with the Murray, as shown by the plan annexed *[to the Petition]*."

The Governor has been pleased to order that the said Petition be taken into consideration by his Executive Council on Monday, the 5th day of August next ensuing.
