## PORT WAKEFIELD, GULF ST. VINCENT.

Bearings magnetic, var. 4° 50' east in 1866.

NOTICE is hereby given, that two leading beacons have been placed on Bald Hill for the purpose of indicating the best anchorage for large vessels; also that beacons have been driven in the banks on the edge of the channel recently deepened outside the entrance of the creek, in order to mark the same.

*Beacons on Bald Hills.*—The upper beacon on Bald Hill is triangular, painted red, and is sixteen feet (16) feet in height, from which the lower white beacon, also triangular, and twenty (20) feet in height, is placed north 87° west, at a distance of nine hundred and sixty-six (966) feet.

*Bald Hill.*—Bald Hill is the termination of the low wooded range rising above the mangrove swamp to the southward of the town; the spot where the upper beacon is placed being about fifty (50) feet above high-water mark.

The two beacons in line and the low mangrove point below Bald Hill, bearing south-east by east two-thirds east, and the red buoy off the spit, south three-fourths east, place a ship in four (4) fathoms at low-water, spring tides.

Large vessels approaching the anchorage should shorten sail on passing the buoy, and be ready to round to before the beacons are in line, so as to anchor in the position before indicated.

*Channel Beacons.*—The beacons on the banks of the channel leading to the creek consist of a black beacon on the west side of the entrance, having a round top and a red beacon opposite on the east side having a lozenge-shaped head, a similar black and red beacon are placed inside.

*Caution.*—Masters of barges and others are cautioned against coming into collision with these beacons, as all injury or damage done thereto is recoverable by law.

These directions are to be read with those published by this office in September, 1866.

## WASTE OF YAN YEAN WATER.

THE Board of Land and Works begs to direct attention to the urgent necessity that exists for checking Waste of Yan Yeau Water.

The loss of pressure occasioned by this waste during the summer months is greater than the main pipe is able to afford, and unless stringent means are used to restrict it, citizens generally will suffer serious inconvenience from the great reduction in the supply, while those residing in the higher parts of the city and suburbs will be entirely deprived of water, as the constant discharge by unnecessary waste renders supply at high levels practically impossible.

Under these circumstances the Board has no alternative but strictly to enforce the operation of the 11th bye-law, which provides a penalty of Five pounds in cases where water is allowed to run to waste.

The provisions of the Public Works Statute will also be rigidly carried out, every person using the water for irrigation without permission, and without affixing a meter, will be prosecuted. The service-pipe will likewise be cut off, without notice, in all instances where water is wasted, misused, or unduly consumed.

The Board earnestly trusts that the public generally will assist the police and the officers of the department in abating an evil which causes such serious inconvenience to so large a number of citizens.

## REGULATION AS TO TENDERS FOR ROAD AND BRIDGE WORKS.

Contractors tendering for works under this Department are requested to be in attendance personally, or by agent, at the Board Room, La Trobe street west, at the time of opening the tenders.

All persons, whether resident in or near Melbourne, or in the country districts, must transmit *with their tenders* a remittance, either by bank draft or postoffice order, in favor of the Assistant Commissioner of Roads and Bridges, or, from those resident in or near Melbourne, bank notes equal to ten per cent. on the amount of their tenders, which without such enclosure will not be entertained.

Cheques, marked or unmarked, will not under any circumstances be accepted.

The attention of Contractors is at the same time drawn to the General Regulations of the Board of Land and Works dated 13th May, 1858, respecting contracts.

The castings are required for locomotive engine work, carriage work, &c.

Whenever specially ordered, the castings shall be run from the very best "cold-blast iron," and of each particular brand, quality, and mixture as may be described in the order; or of such other substituted mixture as may be approved or directed by the Locomotive Superintendent, so as to produce a hard, close, soft or other description of metal.

The castings are to be clean, sharp, free from surface scale, shell, cold shuts, blow holes, honeycomb, cinder, or any other imperfection, and are to be sound in every respect and

thoroughly close in grain. When specially ordered, the castings are to be run with heads or runners of such weight as may be requested, and no extra charge shall be made or allowed for same; and the contractor will be required to remove the head or runner from the casting where possible, and charge the casting at the net weight only, trimmed and cleaned.
