WITH reference to a Despatch from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, bearing date 10th December, 1868, and to the notification of the appointment of the Consul-General for France at Melbourne, published in the *Gazette* of 17th July, 1868 (page 1295), it has been found necessary to define the respective jurisdictions of the Consuls for France at Melbourne and Sydney more clearly, as follows:—

The jurisdiction of the Consul-General for France at Melbourne extends over the French Consular authorities in South Australia, Western Australia, and Tasmania.

The jurisdiction of the Consul-General for France at Sydney extends over "New South Wales, Queensland, the region comprised under the denomination of North Australia, and New Zealand."

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act* 1863, it is amongst other things enacted that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board for any original or proclaimed district (hereinafter sometimes called "single district"), the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall, within three months after the receipt of the same, divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions (hereinafter called subdivisions), by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district; and it is also enacted that every shire shall after the proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such proclamation, and save as aforesaid and save where therein otherwise expressly provided all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue and be of full force and effect with regard to such shire and be read accordingly: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the thirtieth day of October, 1865, the Shire of Waranga was constituted: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth, by this present Order, divide the Shire of Waranga into three separate electoral subdivisions, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

THE EASTERN RIDING.—Commencing at the junction of the northern boundary of the shire with the River Goulburn; thence southwardly by the River Goulburn to the point of junction of the southern boundary of the shire with that river; thence by a line bearing true north to the intersection of the northern boundary; thence eastwardly by the northern boundary to the point of commencement.

THE CENTRAL RIDING.—Commencing at the junction of the southern boundary of the shire with the River Goulburn; thence true north to its intersection with the northern boundary of the shire; thence by the northern boundary to its intersection with the western boundary of allotment No. 47, parish of Timmering; thence south by the western boundary of the parishes of Timmering and Carag-carag to the northern boundary of Burramboot East; thence west by the southern boundary of allotment 151, Corop, to the shore of Lake Cooper; thence southwardly and northwardly by the shores of Lake Cooper to the northern boundary of Burramboot pre-emptive right; thence west by the northern boundary of the pre-emptive right to the western boundary; and thence south by the western boundary line to its southern boundary; thence by a road bearing west to the north-west angle of allotment 49, parish of Burramboot; thence south to the north-west angle of allotment 3, parish of Burramboot; thence west to the north-west angle of allotment 2, parish of Burramboot; thence south to the north-west angle of allotment 96, parish of Colbinabbin; thence west to the north-west angle of allotment 97, parish of Colbinabbin; thence by a line bearing south to its intersection with the southern boundary of the shire; and by the southern boundary of the shire to the point of commencement at its junction with the river.

THE WESTERN RIDING.—Commencing at the western boundary of allotment 47, parish of Timmering, at its intersection with the northern boundary of the shire; thence south by the western boundary of the parishes of Timmering and Carag-carag to the northern boundary of Burramboot East; thence west by the southern boundary of allotment 151, parish of Corop, to the shore of Lake Cooper; thence southwardly and northwardly by the shores of Lake Cooper to the northern boundary of Burramboot pre-emptive right; thence west by the northern boundary of the said pre-emptive right to the western boundary; and thence south by the western boundary line to its southern boundary; thence by a road bearing west to the north-west angle of allotment 49, parish of Burramboot; thence south to the north-west angle of allotment 3, in the same parish; thence west to the north-west angle of allotment 2, in the same parish; thence south to the north-west corner of allotment 96, parish of Colbinabbin; thence west to the north-west angle of allotment 97, in the same parish; thence by a line bearing south to its intersection with the southern boundary of the shire; thence westwardly by the southern boundary of the shire to the River Campaspe; thence northwardly by the River Campaspe to the junction of the northern boundary of the shire with that river; and thence eastwardly by the northern boundary to the point of commencement.

And the Honorable Charles Edwin Jones, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

QUARANTINE OF VESSELS PROCEEDING FROM VICTORIA, ETC., TO QUEENSLAND.

THE following Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Queensland relative to the Quarantining of Vessels arriving from Victoria is published here for general information.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SAMUEL WENSLEY BLACKALL, Esquire,
Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of
Queensland and its Dependencies.

WHEREAS information has been received by the Government that the disease called the Small-pox is prevalent at or in the vicinity of Melbourne, in the Colony of Victoria: Now, therefore, I, the Governor aforesaid, in pursuance of the powers in me vested by the Act twenty-seven Victoria, number nine, do, with the advice of the Executive Council, hereby notify and proclaim that portions of the said Colony of Victoria are infected with the said disease, and that it is possible that such disease may be brought therefrom to this colony; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do order and direct that no person or persons arriving in the colony by any ships or vessels (whether by steamships or vessels propelled by sails only) from, or having touched at any port in the said Colony of Victoria, shall be permitted to land from such ship or vessel in the ports of Moreton Bay, Maryborough, Gladstone, Rockhampton, Mackay, Bowen, and Townsville, until the permission of the Health Officer, or other person duly authorised to act in his behalf, shall have been obtained. And I do further order and direct that no steamer or vessel as aforesaid arriving from the ports of Sydney and Newcastle shall be allowed to pass the Water Police Hulk, in Moreton Bay, at the mouth of the Brisbane River, or be brought alongside the wharves at Maryborough, Gladstone, Rockhampton, Mackay, Bowen, and Townsville, without having previously been boarded by the Health Officer or other person duly authorised to act in his behalf, who shall cause a printed form, containing certain questions, to be placed in the hands of the master or officer in command of such steamer, or vessel as aforesaid, and the said master or officer in command shall be required to answer all such questions as shall be put to him by the Health Officer touching the health of the crew and passengers, and the cause or causes of the death of any person or persons, should such have taken place, or in respect of any other matter or thing concerning the health of the passengers and crew, before such steamer or vessel as aforesaid shall be admitted to pratique.

That in pursuance of an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled *The Electoral Act 1865*, a writ was duly issued by and under the hand and seal of the Honorable Sir John Henry Thomas Manners Sutton, Knight, Governor of the colony of Victoria, directed to William Templeton, Esquire, returning officer for the South Province, requiring him, the said William Templeton, to proceed as therein directed according to law, for the purpose of procuring the return of a representative for the said South Province to the Legislative Council of Victoria.

That in accordance with the exigency of such writ, and in conformity with the said Act, three candidates were duly nominated, that is to say, William Arthur Callander a'Beckett, Esquire, John Halfey, Esquire, and Nathaniel Levi, your petitioner.

That there being only one candidate to be returned for the said South Province under and by virtue of the said writ, but three having been nominated, the said returning officer duly published the day for taking the poll for the said election.

That such poll took place on the sixteenth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, at the following polling-places, that is to say:—Anderson's Creek, Bacchus Marsh, Ballan North, Wallan-wallan, Blackwood, Hawthorn, West Brighton, East Brighton, Broadmeadows, Brunswick, Brushy Creek, Bulla, Templestowe, Conflines of Kilmore, Campbellfield, Caulfield, Corinella, Cranbourne, Berwick, Dandenong, The Junction of the Roads, Diggersrest, Donnybrook, Eltham, Epping, Essendon, Sunbury, Gardiner, Gisborne, Heidelberg, Dromana, Keilor, Braybrook, Lancefield, Melton, Mordialoo, Mulgrave, Northcote, Nunawading, Oakleigh, Penridge, Yan Yean, west of Plenty River, Preston, Yarra Flats, Snapper Point, Tullamarine, Whittlesea, Wyndham, Yan Yean, east of the Plenty River.

That on the eighteenth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, the Returning Officer duly notified, in conformity with the said Electoral Act, the result of the polling to be as follows:—

That your petitioner has been informed and believes that the said William Arthur Callander a'Beckett is unqualified from sitting and voting as a member of the Legislative Council of Victoria for the said South Province, and was unqualified from being so elected by reason of his not being possessed at the time of his election of the qualification required by law necessary to entitle him to be elected as a member of the said Legislative Council.

That your petitioner is advised and believes that by reason of the said William Arthur Callander a'Beckett being so unqualified as aforesaid to be elected as such member, your petitioner being the person having the next greatest number of votes at the said election, is entitled to be declared duly elected as a member of the said South Province, and to have his name inserted in the said writ in the place of the said William Arthur Callander a'Beckett.

Your petitioner, therefore, respectfully prays that you will communicate the matter of the said petition to the Legislative Council of Victoria, in order that the case of your petitioner may be referred to a committee of the said Council duly authorised to receive, enquire into, and report upon the same according to law.

And your petitioner further prays, that in the event of the said committee reporting that the said William Arthur Callander a'Beckett was not at the time of the said election possessed of the necessary qualification to entitle him to be so elected, that the Legislative Council will be pleased to declare the said William returning officer's return void as respects the said William Arthur Callander a'Beckett, and to amend the said writ return to the said writ by taking out the name of the said William Arthur Callander a'Beckett and inserting in its place the name of your petitioner, and to declare your petitioner duly elected as a member of the Legislative Council for the South Province.

* This calculation is made upon the population at the last census, instead of the present population, as there are no means of estimating the changes which have taken place in the different sub-districts since the census was taken. It is believed that the present population of the whole district of Melbourne and suburbs amounts to 170,000. If this be correct, the mortality of the month under review would indicate a proportion of 2.18 deaths to every 1,000 persons living.

The mortality of the month of January during the past ten years has ranged from a minimum of 324 in 1864 to a maximum of 687 in 1867. In the month under review it was much below the average.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 99° on the 27th, and the lowest was 46° on the 16th. The mean temperature of the month (65° 5) was slightly below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (45°) took place on the 13th, viz.:—from a maximum of 92° to a minimum of 47°. The least range (9° 1) was on the 1st, viz.:—from a maximum of 66° 8 to a minimum of 57° 7.

Of the deaths which occurred, 54 per cent. were of males and 46 per cent. were of females. Fifty-eight per cent. were of children under five years of age, in January, 1868; 75 per cent. in January, 1867; 65 per cent. in January, 1866; 65 per cent. in January, 1865; 64 per cent. in January, 1864; 64 per cent. in January, 1863; 63 per cent. in January, 1862; 71 per cent. in January, 1861; and 73 per cent. in January, 1860.

Four persons over 75 years of age died during the month, viz.:—a male aged 77 of dysentery, another at the same age of paralysis, a male aged 90 of old age, and a female aged 80 of old age.

Fifteen violent deaths took place during the month. The following are the particulars:—A carter aged 44, died from the effects of a railway accident; a female aged 36, from fracture of the neck caused by a fall from a cart; a gardener aged 16, from the effects of an accidental gunshot wound; a female aged 16, of burns. A boy aged 6½, another aged 11½, a ship's cook aged 26, and a master mariner aged 44, were accidentally drowned, and a commission agent aged 50, was found drowned; an infant aged 2 months, was suffocated by bed-clothes; a gold miner aged 47, died of a fractured skull (verdict manslaughter); a bookseller aged 37 (insane), committed suicide by shooting; a contractor aged 50 (insane), committed suicide by poisoning with opium; a waiter aged 23 and a female aged 26, committed suicide by drowning.

The deaths in public institutions numbered 64, or about 17 per cent. of the whole viz.:—33 in the Melbourne Hospital, 5 in the Benevolent Asylum, 4 in the Immigrants' Home, 7 in the Industrial Schools, 2 in the Yarra Bend, and 1 in the Carlton Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Military Hospital, and 6 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 217, of which 115, or nearly 53 per cent., were of males, and 102, or about 47 per cent., were of females. Of those dying, 159 were under one year of age, 40 were between one and two years, 10 were between two and three, 4 were between three and four, and 4 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 154, of which 86, or nearly 56 per cent., were males, and 68, or about 44 per cent., were females; 8 were between five and ten, 4 were between ten and fifteen, 4 were between fifteen and twenty, 9 were between twenty and twenty-five, 18 were between twenty-five and thirty, 19 were between thirty and thirty-five, 21 were between thirty-five and forty, 14 were between forty and forty-five, 16 were between forty-five and fifty, 9 were between fifty and fifty-five, 7 were between fifty-five and sixty, 10 were between sixty and sixty-five, 7 were between sixty-five and seventy, 4 were between seventy and seventy-five, 3 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 3 were eighty and upwards.

Zymotic diseases caused 147 deaths, or 40 per cent. of the whole, against 129 deaths, or 37 per cent., in December. The most fatal complaints in both months were diarrhoea and dysentery, which caused 105 deaths in January and 68 in December. Deaths from scarlatina and diphtheria fell from 24 in December to 10 in January. No fatal case of smallpox occurred in January against 2 cases in December. Under the class "Developmental Diseases," those complaints placed under the head of atrophy and debility caused 37 deaths in the former month against 33 in the latter.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for ten or more inhabitants of any part of Victoria not lying within the limits of the city of Melbourne or town of Geelong, or of any municipal or road district, and of whom each one shall possess property rateable under the said Act within the area next thereafter mentioned, to sign and present to the Governor a petition setting forth that the area, which shall by metes and bounds be described in such petition, contains not less than forty square miles, and rateable property whereof the net annual value is not less than Five thousand pounds, and praying that such area may be constituted a road district; and it is also enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, upon being satisfied that the statements set forth in the petition are true, and that it is desirable to comply with the prayer thereof, to constitute such part of Victoria, under such name as shall in and by the same Order in Council be assigned thereto, a new road district; and the words "proclaimed district," where used in the said Act, shall be deemed to mean such new district: And whereas a petition signed by more than ten inhabitants of the area or part of Victoria hereinafter described, possessing rateable property in such area, has been presented to the Governor, setting forth the matters and things required by the said Act, and due notice of such petition has been published as provided by the said Act, and in compliance with the prayer thereof an Order in Council, bearing even date herewith, has been made, to constitute the said area a new road district: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby constitute and proclaim the part of Victoria hereinafter described to be a new road district, under the name assigned thereto in and by the Order in Council hereinbefore mentioned, that is to say:—

THE TOWONG ROAD DISTRICT.—Commencing at the junction of the Murray River with the Mitta-mitta, and bounded on the west by the Mitta-mitta so far as the junction of Sandy Creek; thence by the eastern boundary of the Shire of Yackandandah to a point due west of the junction of Snowy Creek with the Mitta-mitta River; thence by a line due east to the junction of the Snowy Creek with the Mitta-mitta River; thence by a straight line to one of the sources of the Murray River at Forest Hill; and thence by the Murray River to the starting point.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1862* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district or upon or within five miles of any gold-field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold-field common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be: And whereas by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land a farmers' common; when one-eighth part of any agricultural area has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim any unselected and unleased portion of such agricultural area, not exceeding twice the quantity so selected and leased, to be a temporary common for the use of such selectors and lessees; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now reciting Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim, increase, or diminish (as the case may be) the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, that is to say:—

CASTLEMAINE UNITED TOWN AND GOLD-FIELD COMMON.

—The Castlemaine United Town and Gold-field Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 11th day of February, 1867, is hereby diminished by deducting therefrom the land comprised within boundaries described as follow, viz.: Commencing at the south-west angle of the town of Haxcourt; thence by a line bearing south one mile, more or less, to the north boundary of the parish of Castlemaine; thence by the said boundary of that parish bearing west forty-four chains, more or less, to the Melbourne and Murray River railway; thence by that railway bearing north-easterly to a point bearing west from the point of commencement; and thence to that point by a line bearing east ten chains fifty links, more or less; as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office Melbourne.—(69.T.2460.)

CHILTERN UNITED BOROUGH AND GOLD-FIELD COMMON.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir John Henry Thomas Manners Sutton, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land a farmers' common; when one-eighth part of any agricultural area has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim any unselected and unleased portion of such agricultural area, not exceeding twice the quantity so selected and leased, to be a temporary common for the use of such selectors and lessees; and it is also enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time

reproclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now reciting Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase or abolish (as the case may be) the Commons herein-after mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

IRREWARRA FARMERS' COMMON.—The Irrewarra Farmers' Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 9th day of December, 1861, is hereby abolished.—(69.T.2731.)

IRREWARRA AGRICULTURAL AREA COMMON.—The temporary Common for the use of selectors and lessees in the agricultural area of Irrewarra, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 11th day of November, 1868, is hereby increased by adding thereto allotments 63, 64, 65, 66, and 67, in the parish of Yeo, comprising an area of about 833 acres.—(69.T.2731.)

INGLEWOOD HOSPITAL, INCORPORATED.

THE following Rules and Regulations were passed at a Meeting of Contributors held on the 22nd February, 1869:—

MANAGEMENT.

1. The institution is for the purpose of affording surgical and medical aid in cases of accident and disease.
2. The affairs of the institute shall be directed by a committee,—consisting of president, vice-president, treasurer, and seven (7) other subscribers.
3. The annual general meeting shall elect two subscribers, not members of the board, as auditors for that year.
4. Should vacancies occur in any of the offices under the second rule the board shall supply such vacancies according to the provisions of Act No. 220; and should vacancies occur in the office of auditors, a special meeting of contributors shall be called before the end of the year to supply such vacancies. Any member of committee failing to attend three consecutive monthly meetings of the board may be requested to resign his seat.
5. The board of management shall include all the officers named in the second rule. It shall direct the collection and distribution of funds, appoint and dismiss all paid officers and servants, frame regulations for the management of the hospital, the same not being repugnant to the general rules, present a report to the annual general meeting, and manage the affairs of the hospital generally, and may from among themselves from time to time appoint house and other committees, give the same power to perform such duties as may not be contrary to the Act of Incorporation, and may also from time to time alter or discontinue such committees.

MEETINGS AND QUORUM.

6. The board shall meet for general business on the first Monday in each month, and adjourn such or any meeting as may be deemed expedient. Special meetings of the board shall be called, upon the requisition of any three members of the said board to the president or vice-president, such requisitions to state the objects of such meeting, and no other business but that stated shall be entertained. At any meeting four members to form a quorum; the president or vice-president to be chairman, and in their absence the meeting shall elect a chairman. The chairman to have, in addition to his own vote as member of the committee, a second or casting vote.

ACCOUNTS.

7. All accounts for payment shall be passed by the board, and signed by the chairman and the secretary.

CONTRACTORS.

8. No person under contract to the hospital shall be eligible to sit on the committee during the consideration of his tender or the period of his contract.

CONTRIBUTORS.

9. That every contributor of Twenty pounds in one sum shall be a life governor, with the privilege of voting at all meetings of subscribers and of nominating four patients in each year. Other contributors shall be entitled to nominate one patient for every pound of their contribution within the year of such contribution; provided that the funds and accommodation of the hospital will admit of the reception and treatment of such patients. The board of management shall also have power to add to the list of life governors such persons as by their eminent services may have added within one year the sum of Twenty pounds to the funds of the hospital; and members of the board are not to be limited in the number of patients they may recommend.

MINING COMPANIES.

10. Where mining companies pay sixpence per week for each man employed to the hospital funds, they shall have the privilege of nominating one patient for the year of such subscription for each pound received.

PAYMENT OF MAINTENANCE.

11. All patients will be expected to pay towards the actual expense of their maintenance, so far as their circumstances may enable them; and all property found on patients who may die in the hospital will be appropriated to defray the expenses of their maintenance and burial, the residue, if any, to be handed over to their legal representatives.
12. The board of management shall appoint a sub-committee to judge as to the ability of patients to pay, which sub-committee (with the concurrence of the surgeon) shall have power to discharge any patient, in case of his refusal to pay, and shall have the further power to require (if necessary) patients to make a declaration before a justice as to their means.

VOTERS' QUALIFICATION.

13. That no person shall hereafter be qualified to vote at any meeting of subscribers to this hospital unless he shall have been a subscriber of at least One pound sterling to this hospital within the period of twelve months from the time of such meeting being held.
14. Each contributor of One pound, having fulfilled the above conditions, will be entitled to one vote, of Five pounds to two votes, and of Ten pounds and upwards to three votes. Life governors to have one vote in addition to any they may possess as subscribers; provided that no subscriber shall exercise more than three votes.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

15. That accidents and such cases as may be deemed of decided emergency by the medical officer in attendance be received at any time; that patients arriving from a distance of over ten miles from the hospital be treated in accordance with rule No. 35; but in ordinary cases patients shall be admitted daily between the hours of eleven and twelve a.m., on the recommendation of a subscriber for the then current year.

16. That no female for the purpose of confinement, child under five years of age, insane person, or one affected with syphilis or any infectious disease, or any person who in the opinion of the medical officer in attendance is unfit to be an in-door patient, shall be received under any circumstances, except with the express permission of the board of management; and the reason of refusing any patient shall be stated to the house committee by the surgeon.

17. The house committee shall, at least once a week, visit the hospital, for the purpose of inspecting the arrangements thereof, and of enquiring of the patients if they are properly attended to, and report to the next meeting of the board any alterations or suggestions they may think necessary; such house committee to be selected by agreement amongst the members during the sitting of the board.

HONORARY TREASURER.

18. He shall receive all moneys on behalf of the hospital, and invest the same in such bank or banks as the board of management shall direct, to the credit of the hospital. He shall pay all accounts, after the same have been signed by the chairman of the meeting and the secretary as having been approved by the board, by draft on the bank or banks, which shall be countersigned by the president or vice-president and by the secretary. He shall also keep an account of all moneys received and paid by him, and report the same, at least once a month, to a meeting of the board.

AUDITORS.

19. The auditors shall at the end of each year examine the annual financial report, with all accounts, vouchers, and documents relating thereto, and shall report thereon to the annual general meeting.

HONORARY MEDICAL OFFICERS.

20. Legally qualified medical practitioners must lodge written applications for the office with the secretary ten days previous to the meeting of the subscribers.

21. The consulting medical officers shall attend at the hospital for consultation or operation whenever requested by the hospital surgeon.

HOSPITAL SURGEON.

22. He shall receive the certificates from applicants for admission, examine the nature of each case, and decide on the fitness of complaint for admission, and shall discharge such patients as he considers fit to be discharged.

23. He shall have charge of all patients in the hospital and their treatment, shall attend at the hospital, and visit each patient at least once a day, and in cases of difficulty or danger shall request the attendance of such of the consulting medical officers as may be available; but in the event of the services of such honorary medical officers not being obtainable, he shall report the fact to the house committee, and shall in all other respects comply with such regulations as the board of management may frame for his guidance.

24. He shall superintend and control all servants in the hospital, and in cases of neglect of duty or insubordination may suspend any of them; but must forthwith report to the house committee, who may discharge or reinstate the same at their discretion.

25. He shall have charge of all surgical instruments, drugs, and chemicals, and shall carefully examine them both as to quality and quantity, and report any defects in either respect to the board of management; and he shall make an inventory of the same in a book to be kept for that purpose (such book to be provided by and remain the property of the board), and keep an account of the receipt and expenditure, or loss and breakage, of all such instruments, drugs, and chemicals. And he must, in the absence of the dispenser, perform such duties as would devolve upon that officer.

26. He shall enter regularly in books to be kept for the purpose (such books to be provided by and remain the property of the board) the names of patients as they are admitted and discharged, together with the nature and history of their diseases while under treatment, manner of treatment, time of attending each case, medicine prescribed, and instructions for the guidance of the dispenser.

SECRETARY AND COLLECTOR.

27. The secretary and collector shall keep the minutes, accounts, and records of the hospital; compile all reports, conduct the correspondence, attend all meetings, and bring all business before the same; carry out their resolutions and perform all clerical and other duties that may be ordered by the board.

28. He shall convene the annual general meeting of each year, as directed by the Act of Incorporation.

29. He shall convene special meetings of duly qualified subscribers when directed by the board, or on the written application of ten duly qualified subscribers of at least One pound each, the object of such special meeting to be stated in the advertisement, and he shall also give special notice in writing to each member of the board of such meetings.

30. He shall collect subscriptions and all moneys due to the hospital, in all cases give receipts for the same, and pay to the treasurer, at least once in every month, all moneys he may have received, and render an account of the same to the board of management.

HOSPITAL SERVANTS.

31. Nurses and hospital servants, such as may be required, shall live in the hospital, and shall not leave it for any time without permission of the hospital surgeon; they shall obey the orders of the said officer, be regular in their attendance, and conform generally to such rules as may be made by the board.

PATIENTS.

32. The patients shall conduct themselves in an orderly manner, and strictly observe all the directions of the hospital surgeon and nurses, and such regulations as may be made by the hospital surgeon or house committee.

33. Any patient having cause of complaint shall make the same known to the hospital surgeon, or to the house committee or board of management.

34. Patients deemed able by the hospital surgeon to assist in the work of the hospital, shall, at his request, so employ themselves.

35. Out-door patients shall attend at the hospital between eleven and twelve o'clock a.m. daily, unless coming from a distance of over ten miles from the hospital, when the dispenser, in the absence of the surgeon, may provide such patients with accommodation for the night of arrival. All out-door patients must observe the rules so far as may be practicable.

36. All patients received by the dispenser, in the absence of the surgeon, under Rules Nos. 15 and 35, shall, until the surgeon has decided upon the fitness of the case for admission, be placed in a ward apart from the rest of the patients.

VISITORS AND PATIENTS.

37. Patients and visitors are requested not to give any fee, reward, or gratuity to any officer, nurse, or other person connected with the hospital.

38. Visitors will be admitted daily, between the hours of two and five o'clock in the afternoon, except persons from a distance, who may be admitted at any time by permission of the hospital surgeon or house committee; but no visitor will be allowed to remain more than one hour, except ministers of religion, who may visit the patients at any time, but all visitors must retire when requested by the nurses.

39. Visitors shall not give to or leave with any patient medicines, victuals, tobacco, or liquor of any kind, nor any other thing, without the permission of the hospital surgeon; nor interfere with the nurses, nor disturb the patients by loud talking or unnecessary noise.

40. Any visitor or patient violating any of the rules of the hospital, or behaving with impropriety, will be compelled to retire, or be dismissed, and will not be re-admitted at any time without special leave from the hospital surgeon or board of management.

GENERAL MEMORANDA.

41. Any officer, nurse, servant, or other person in any way connected with the hospital, who shall receive, directly or indirectly, any fee, reward, or gratuity, shall be immediately disqualified and dismissed, and shall not be permitted in future to hold any office or appointment belonging to this hospital.

BOROUGH OF TARADALE.

NOTICE is hereby given that it is the intention of the council of this borough to pass the following bye-law to regulate, by means of standing orders, the proceedings of the Borough Council of Taradale:—

BOROUGH OF TARADALE. BYE-LAW No. 1.

A bye-law to regulate, by means of standing orders, the proceedings of the Taradale Borough Council.

Order of Proceeding.

1. That the sittings of this council shall be open to the public, but a majority of the council may require the withdrawal of strangers.

2. At every regular meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting for confirmation the minutes of any preceding meetings, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.

3. If the mayor of the borough be not present one-quarter-of-an-hour after the time appointed for the meeting of the council, a councillor shall be elected chairman for the time being.

4. That after the confirmation of the minutes, the order of business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable; but for the greater convenience of the council at any particular meeting thereof, it may be altered by resolution to that effect:—

1. Reading copies of letters sent by authority of the council.
2. Reading letters and accounts received, and considering and ordering thereon.
3. Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
4. Reading and ordering on reports of permanent committees.
5. Reading and ordering on reports of select committees.
6. Reading and ordering on reports of deputations.
7. Special payments.
8. Special payments not classified.
9. Order of the day, including subjects arising from proceedings of former meetings.
10. Any other matter not hereinbefore classified.
11. Motions of which previous notice has been given.
12. Notices of motion.

6. All communications by letter intended for the council shall be made and addressed to the town clerk, and all petitions and memorials shall be addressed to the mayor and council under cover to the town clerk.

6. No motion shall be decided on at any meeting of council unless notice in writing, signed by the councillor proposing, shall have been given at the previous meeting of council, nor shall any report of committee be decided on unless similar notice be given, unless in committee of the whole council or the whole council be present.

7. The order of the day shall include all business of which due notice has been given, and all matters arising out of all former meetings of the council.

8. No motion shall be proceeded with unless the councillor giving notice, or any one of the council authorized by him, in writing, be present to proceed with the same when called upon.

9. Any councillor proposing a motion, amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the chairman; and no councillor shall be interrupted unless by a call to order, when he shall sit down, the councillor calling to order shall be heard, and the question of order decided before the subject is resumed, or any other business.

10. Any councillor proposing a motion or amendment, must state the nature of it before addressing the council.

11. No question once brought before the council shall be withdrawn without leave of the council, nor shall any motion be entertained by the council until the same be seconded.

12. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, unless by way of explanation merely, or in reply as the mover of an original motion or upon any amendment; and after such explanation or reply the question shall forthwith be put to the vote; but councillors merely seconding any motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

13. If more than one councillor rise at one time, the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.

14. No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion, or impute motives; and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.

15. The chairman when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case, without argument or comment, and his decision as to what is order or explanation shall be final.

16. The chairman shall rise when addressing the council in discussion of any question.

17. Any councillor may demand the production of any documents of the council relating to the subject under discussion.

18. Only one amendment shall be discussed at one time, and, upon the adoption of any amendment, the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.

19. The chairman shall, in taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative, and the votes of all the councillors shall be entered in the minutes.

20. The council shall vote by show of hands, except in cases of elections.

21. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion of adjournment; but if the question be negatived, the next motion or order of the day shall be considered before the question of adjournment shall be again entertained. Provided the motion be carried, any business left undecided shall take precedence at the next meeting of the council.

22. Any councillor may record his protest against any decision of the council, provided the same be in writing, before the next meeting of council, and be couched in respectful language, and be consistent with truth. Notice of such intention, however, must be given on the adoption of the resolution.

23. No motion, the effect of which if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council be made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the council, which shall have been negatived by the council, shall be again entertained during the same municipal year.

24. Any councillor who shall use expressions capable of being offensively applied to any other councillor shall, if required by the council, withdraw such expressions, and make a satisfactory apology to the council.

25. Any councillor may require the clerk of the council to take down any particular expressions immediately on their being used.

Elections.

26. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until three clear days' notice shall have been given in one or more of the local newspapers, inviting applications or tenders for the same.

27. The clerk shall have the charge of the common seal of the corporation, and shall be responsible for the safe custody and proper use of the same, each impression thereof being duly verified by the signature of that officer.

28. Any one or more of the standing orders of the council, except No. 23, may be suspended *pro tempore* in case of emergency, provided that the majority present deem it necessary.

29. The mayor of the borough, when appointed or committees, shall be chairman thereof, and the standing orders of the council shall be observed in all committees, except as to the number of times limited for speaking.
