PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS a desire has been expressed that a day should be set apart on which all persons may unite in Humiliation and Prayer to Almighty God to avert the consequences of a protracted Drought: And whereas it is right and expedient that an opportunity should be given to the Clergy and Ministers of Religion of all Denominations and all others Her Majesty's subjects in the colony of Victoria, to observe such day as a Day of Humiliation and Prayer: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby direct that for the purpose aforesaid the Public Offices be closed on Friday, the second day of April next ensuing.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-fourth day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and in the thirty-second year of Her Majesty's reign.

THE SUBDIVISIONS OF THE BROADMEADOWS ROAD DISTRICT.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the fifteenth day of March, 1869.

WHEREAS by The Local Government Act 1863, it is amongst other things enacted that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board for any original or proclaimed district (hereinafter sometimes called "single district"), the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall, within three months after the receipt of the same, divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions (hereinafter called subdivisions), by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the twenty-third day of November, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, a road district was proclaimed under the designation of "The Broadmeadows Road District." And whereas by a subsequent Proclamation, bearing date the twenty-fifth of January, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, the boundaries of the said road district were altered: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by not less than twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said road district, praying for the division of the same into three subdivisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth, by this present Order, divide the Broadmeadows Road District into three separate electoral subdivisions in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

THE BROADMEADOWS SUBDIVISION.—Bounded on the east-south by a straight line from the north-east angle of section 18,

in the parish of Yuroke, to the Moonee Ponds; thence by the Moonee Ponds to the southern boundary of the Broadmeadows Road District; on the south, west, and north by the limits of the Broadmeadows Road District to the north-west angle of section 11, in the parish of Yuroke; thence eastwardly to the starting point.

THE CAMPBELLFIELD SUBDIVISION.—Bounded on the north by the northern boundary of sections 14 and 15, in the parish of Yuroke; on the east from the north-east angle of section 15, in the said parish, by the Merri Creek to the south-east angle of section 3, in the parish of Will-will-rook, and the eastern boundary of section 151, in the parish of Jika-jika; on the south by the southern boundary of last-named section and of sections 2 and 3, in the parish of Will-will-rook; on the west by the eastern boundary of the Broadmeadows subdivision, as already described.

THE MICKLEHAM SUBDIVISION.—Bounded on the south by the northern boundaries of the Broadmeadows and Campbellfield subdivisions, and of sections 5, 6, and 7, in the parish of Mickleham; on the west by the western boundary of sections 19 and 20, in the parish of Yuroke, and the Deep Creek, to the northern boundary of the parish of Mickleham; on the north by the northern boundary of said parish, and of section 24, in the parish of Kalkallo and Yuroke; on the east by the eastern boundary of section 29, in the parish of Mickleham, by the western boundary of the Sydney road from the north-east angle of section 24, in the parish of Kalkallo, to the south-east angle of section 1, in the parish of Mickleham; and by the Merri Creek from the north-east angle of section 24, in the parish of Yuroke, to the south-east angle of section 16, in the said parish.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board for any original or proclaimed district (hereinafter sometimes called "single district"), the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall, within three months after the receipt of the same, divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions (hereinafter called subdivisions), by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district; and it is also enacted that every shire shall after the proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such proclamation, and save as aforesaid and save where therein otherwise expressly provided, all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue and be of full force and effect with regard to such shire and be read accordingly: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the eighth day of February, 1864, the Shire of Grenville was constituted: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth, by this present Order, divide the Shire of Grenville into three separate electoral subdivisions, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

THE WEST RIDING.—Commencing at a point in the middle of the Emu Creek which forms the north-east angle of the county of Hampden; thence southwardly by the eastern boundary of the said county to the road forming the south boundary of the parish of South Yarninghill; thence east by the said parish boundary to the Woody Yaloak Creek; thence northwardly by that creek to its intersection with the Upper Western road in the township of Pitfield; thence north-westwardly by that road and northwardly by the Pitfield and Linton road to a road on the south of section 12, parish of Argyle; thence by the said road to the eastern boundary of the said parish; thence north by the said boundary and by a line to a point on the shire boundary due north of the north-east angle of allotment 18, parish of Argyle; thence by the said boundary south-westwardly to the commencing point.

THE EAST RIDING.—Commencing at a point about two miles sixty chains due south of the south-east angle of section 12, parish of Haddon; thence eastwardly by a line to the north-west angle of the borough of Browns and Scarsdale; thence south to its south-west angle; thence east to its south-east angle; thence north by the eastern boundary of the said

borough, and by a portion of the eastern boundary of the borough of Smythesdale to its intersection with the road from Smythesdale to Ross's Creek; thence eastwardly by that road to a point south of allotment 112, parish of Yarrowee; thence southwardly by a line to the south-west angle of the shire of Buninyong; thence by a line due west to the centre of the Little Woody Yaloak Creek; thence southwardly by that creek to its confluence with the Woody Yaloak Creek; thence north-westwardly by that creek to its intersection with the Upper Western road on the township of Pitfield; thence north-westwardly by that road and northwardly by the Pitfield and Linton road to a road on the south of section 12, parish of Argyle; thence by the said road to the eastern boundary of the said parish; thence north by the said boundary and by a line to a point on the shire boundary due north of the north-east angle of allotment 18, parish of Argyle; thence by the said boundary north-eastwardly to the commencing point.

THE NORTH RIDING.—Commencing at a point in the centre line of the road from Carngham to Ballarat at its intersection with the centre line of a road which forms the eastern boundary of section 8, in the parish of Haddon; thence eastwardly by the centre of the said road from Carngham to Ballarat to a point due north of the east boundary of sections 3 and 5, in the parish of Cardigan; thence south to and by the eastern boundaries of the said sections to the south-east angle of section 5, in the said parish; thence southwardly by a line to the north-west angle of J. Winter's pre-emptive right; thence south to its south-west angle; thence west to a point due south of the western boundary of section 8, in the parish of Cardigan; thence south to the road leading from Ross's Creek to Smythesdale, situated south of allotment 112, parish of Yarrowee; thence westwardly by that road to its intersection with the eastern boundary of the borough of Smythesdale; thence north to the north-east angle of the said borough; thence west to its north-west angle; thence south to its south-west angle; thence west by a portion of the northern boundary of the borough of Browns and Scarsdale and a line westwardly to a point about two miles sixty chains due south of the centre line of a road which forms the eastern boundary of sections 11 and 12, in the parish of Haddon; thence north to and by the said centre line of the said road to the commencing point.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act 1863* it is amongst other things enacted that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board for any original or proclaimed district (hereinafter sometimes called "single district"), the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall, within three months after the receipt of the same, divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions (hereinafter called subdivisions), by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district; and it is also enacted that every shire shall after the proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such proclamation, and save as aforesaid and save where therein otherwise expressly provided, all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue and be of full force and effect with regard to such shire and be read accordingly: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the twelfth day of December, 1864, the Shire of McIvor was constituted: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order, divide the Shire of McIvor into three separate electoral subdivisions in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

THE SOUTH-WESTERN RIDING.—Commencing at the junction of the Campaspe River with Mount Ida Creek, and bounded on the north by Mount Ida Creek so far as the centre of that road dividing allotments 24 and 23; thence by the centre of that road between allotments 24 and 23 and between allotments 21 and 20 to the south-west angle of allotment 15; thence by that road south of allotment 15 to the Wild Duck Creek; thence by the Wild Duck Creek to the south-west angle of Speed's pre-emptive section; thence to the south-east angle of Speed's pre-emptive section; thence by the parish boundary to the boundary of the Borough of Heathcote; thence by the borough boundary to the Caledonian Gully; thence by a straight line in a south-westerly direction to the junction of Pohlman's Creek with the Wild Duck Creek; thence by the Wild Duck

**RULES OF THE DAYLESFORD DISTRICT HOSPITAL
AND BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.**

THAT the object of the institution be to afford medical and surgical aid to poor persons requiring it, irrespective of creed, country, or color, and for casualties; but no person who shall meet with casualties and shall be found able to pay for aid elsewhere, shall receive other than temporary assistance.

That the object of the Benevolent Asylum be to relieve the aged, infirm, disabled, and destitute, and to minister to their necessities according to the ability of the institute.

That a portion of the building be set apart for the purposes of the hospital, and the remainder for the purposes of the benevolent asylum at the discretion of the committee.

2. That in the event of any person in a position to pay for medical or surgical advice elsewhere being detected in the receipt of the charity of the institution, such patient be held accountable for all expenses incurred on his or her behalf.

3. That the institution shall consist of a president, two vice-presidents, and treasurer, and seven committee men.

4. That the above officers be elected by the governors and annual subscribers of one pound, as provided by Act CCXX, 2nd June, 1864.

**QUALIFICATIONS AND PRIVILEGES OF GOVERNORS AND
SUBSCRIBERS.**

5. That every benefactor of £20 or upwards be a life governor, and every annual contributor of £3 an annual governor, with liberty of voting at all general meetings, and of having one in-patient or one out-patient always on the books of the hospital, subject to the approval of the committee of management hereinafter mentioned; provided there are vacant beds, and the funds of the hospital admit of the reception of such patients.

Any application for admission to the benevolent asylum must be accompanied by a recommendation in the usual form signed by three (3) governors. Two of the medical staff shall report whether the case is curable or not, and it shall then rest with the committee (who shall be specially called together for the purpose) to decide whether the application be entertained or not.

6. That every executor (first named) under any will paying to the institution a bequest of £20 or upwards, and every minister raising by one or more collections in his church, in any one year, the sum of £20 or upwards, and that every other person elected at a general meeting of governors and subscribers, at the recommendation of the committee of management, in consideration of special services rendered to the institution, be respectively honorary governors, with all the rights and privileges of life governors; and any person (with the exception of the paid collector) collecting by subscriptions in any one year the sum of £10 or upwards, shall have the right and privileges for that year only. That the chairman, or representative of any public body or society, voting the sum of Ten pounds (£10) or upwards be an annual governor.

7. That every benefactor of £10 or upwards be a life subscriber, and every contributor of £1 per annum, an annual subscriber, with liberty of recommending two out-patients in every year, and voting at all public meetings.

8. That every annual contributor of any amount less than £5 be entitled to one vote; of £5 and under £10, two votes; of £10 and upwards, three votes. Honorary and life governors, as such, one vote.

9. That the annual subscriptions must be paid in advance for the current year, such year to be computed from the day on which such subscription is paid; and no governor or subscriber will be entitled to any privilege until the subscription is paid.

10. That no person shall vote as a governor or subscriber while he is a salaried officer or pupil of the hospital, nor any new governor or subscriber, unless his subscription shall have been paid three days preceding.

11. That no new law or regulations, or any repeal or alteration in the existing laws, shall be valid, unless the same shall have been passed at a special meeting of the committee.

12. The committee of management shall consist of the president, two vice-presidents, treasurer, and seven other elected members.

ADMISSION AND DISCHARGE OF PATIENTS.

13. That accidents, and such cases as may be deemed of decided emergency by the resident-surgeon, be received at any time; but the admission of patients in ordinary cases, on the recommendation of a governor or subscriber, be restricted to twelve noon of each day. No pregnant female, for the purpose of confinement, no child under four years of age, no insane person, no person afflicted with syphilis or any infectious disease, or suffering from chronic paralysis, or any person who, in the opinion of the resident-surgeon or house-committee, is unsuitable to be admitted, shall be received as an in-patient under any circumstances; and the cause of the refusal of any patient so refused admittance shall be stated to the next meeting of the committee of management by the resident-surgeon. That the admission of benevolent asylum cases be regulated by rule 5: Provided always that no person so admitted and relieved be allowed to remain in the Benevolent Asylum for a longer period than six months from the date of his or her admission, unless fresh application, as prescribed by rule 5, be made on his or her behalf.

14. That no patient shall be discharged without a reference to the honorary medical officer in charge of the case, with the exception of patients guilty of gross misconduct, who may be summarily dismissed by the resident-surgeon, such dismissal to be reported to the house-committee at their next meeting.

15. Previous to the departure of patients, who may leave the hospital at their own desire, they shall sign a declaration to that effect.

16. All recommendations must be in accordance with the form appended (see page 4).

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

17. The committee of management shall direct the general business of the institution; shall frame bye-laws for its internal regulation, the same not being contrary to the general rules; and appoint and discharge all paid officers and servants of the institution. They shall meet on the first Friday at 4 p.m. in every month; or on such days as they may appoint. They shall have the power to admit patients, and to make regulations respecting them. The chairman of committees to have a casting vote but no deliberative vote.

18. The committee of management shall choose from among themselves three members, who with the four *ex officio* members shall form a house-committee of seven, three to form a quorum, who shall meet on such day and hour in each week as they may appoint, and have power to audit the house accounts, engage and discharge servants, and to regulate the internal management of the institution.

19. The house-committee shall at each of their meetings examine all recommendations for patients received since their last meeting, and shall have power to discharge any patient who they are of opinion is not a fit and proper person to receive the benefits of the institution.

20. The committee of management shall present a general report of the affairs of the institution at the annual meeting of subscribers and governors, in January of each year.

21. That no member of the committee of management, or officers of the hospital, shall become security for any contractor directly or indirectly.

22. That any member of the committee of management neglecting his duty for four successive meetings, without reasonable cause, shall cease to be a member of the institution, and another officer be appointed in his stead, as provided by the Act.

TEASURER.

23. All moneys received on account of the hospital shall be paid to the treasurer, and appropriated by him to the purposes of the institution under the direction of the committee of management.

24. Previously to making any payment the treasurer shall require a warrant of the committee of management authorizing such payment, which shall be signed by the president or one of the vice-presidents, and one other member of the committee, and counter-signed by the secretary.

OFFICERS.

25. That there be three honorary medical officers, together with resident-surgeon, secretary, collector, house-steward, and wardman, matron and nurses.

HONORARY MEDICAL AND SURGICAL OFFICERS.

26. They shall consist of three legally qualified medical and surgical officers, subject to removal by the committee of management for malpractice, misconduct, or neglect of duty.

27. That one of the honorary medical officers shall attend the hospital when required by the resident surgeon.

28. The honorary medical officers shall have access to the institution at all times.

RESIDENT-SURGEON.

29. He shall live in the house, and shall not absent himself any day between nine and twelve, without the sanction of the committee of management.

N.B.—He and the matron shall never be absent at the same time.

30. He shall have the charge of the in-patients, and shall have ordinary charge of all out-patients. He shall make a special report to the house-committee of every patient who may have been two months in the hospital, and he shall report any case that may be considered incurable by the medical or surgical staff, to be dealt with as the committee may see fit. He shall report upon cases in the Benevolent Asylum as provided in rules 5 and 13.

31. He shall have the immediate superintendence of the wardsmen and nurses; he shall preserve order, sobriety, and, in case of insubordination, or gross default of duty on the part of any nurse or wardman, he may suspend such servant until the next meeting of the house-committee, and if necessary he may provisionally hire a substitute for such servant so suspended, and he shall report his having done so, with the cause of such suspension, to the house-committee at their next meeting.

32. He shall have the charge of the surgical instruments, and shall make an inventory of the same in a book to be kept for that purpose; the receipt, expediture, loss and breakage of such instruments; and shall prepare a list of the stock in hand, to be submitted to the committee of management on the last days of March, June, September, and December.

33. He shall enter regularly in proper books to be kept for such purpose, the names of the patients as they are admitted and discharged, and note the nature and history of their diseases while under treatment; loss or breakage of surgical instruments or other things in his charge; and he shall have such books ready at all times for the inspection of the committee, and shall attend the weekly meetings of the house-committee, and lay before them all recommendations for patients received since their last meeting; and he shall receive all moneys and other property belonging to the patients, and shall account for the same weekly to the committee.

34. He shall accompany the medical and surgical officers every day through the wards, and report to them the state of the patients, and shall enter in a book to be kept for that purpose the prescriptions of the surgeons; he shall also visit each patient every morning and evening, and inquire if the treatment prescribed has been attended to, and if any cause of complaint exists; and should any patient have any complaint to prefer, he shall enter the same in the patient's complaint-book immediately, in the presence of the wardman or nurse of the ward, and shall lay such book before the house-committee at each meeting.

35. He shall, on his visits to the wards, examine their condition with respect to cleanliness, temperature, and ventilation, and observe if the wardman and nurses have done their duty.

36. He shall affix to the bed of each patient his name, age, disease, the date of his admission, the name of the governor by whom he has been recommended, and the diet ordered by the medical or surgical officer in charge.

37. He shall perform all the minor operations of surgery, and the *post-mortem* examinations not performed by the medical or surgical officers, and shall keep the key of the dead-house.

38. In the absence of the medical or surgical officers, in all cases of emergency, he shall cause immediate notice of such emergency to be given to them, being authorized in the meantime to act to the best of his judgment, avoiding as far as possible any unnecessary interference with the duties of those officers.

39. He shall give due notice to the honorary medical or surgical officers when a consultation is to be held or an operation to be performed.

DISPENSER AND HOUSE-STEWARD.

40. He shall be subject to the same regulations respecting living in the house, and absence therefrom, as are laid down for the guidance of the resident medical officer.

N. B.—He and the house surgeon shall never be absent at the same time.

41. He shall carefully examine all drugs and chemicals brought into the house, both as to quality and quantity, and report any defects in either respect to the house-surgeon. He shall be responsible for all articles used in his department, and likewise for the accurate and prompt dispensing of the medicines ordered by the medical officers, and have prepared and at all times in readiness such as are required to be kept for the ordinary practice of the house.

42. He shall always be present in the dispensary during the hours occupied in supplying medicines to the out-patients, and shall furnish them with all useful instructions, and see that their forms of recommendation are properly filled in.

43. He shall have the immediate superintendence and general control of the domestic servants of the hospital, and shall have the power of hiring and discharging such servants, subject to the sanction of the house-committee.

44. He shall see that the wards and all other parts of the house and grounds are kept in a proper state of cleanliness and order, and that the servants generally do their duty.

45. He shall inspect the diet of the patients, and see that it is of good quality and properly prepared, and such as is ordered in the diet-book to be kept for that purpose.

46. He shall keep an inventory of the articles in use in each ward, and shall monthly, or oftener if required, inspect the same to see what things may be deficient; and shall in no case allow a wardman to leave till he has compared the outfit of his ward with the inventory.

47. He shall have the charge of, and be accountable for the bedding, linen, glass, cutlery, cooking and kitchen utensils, and make an inventory of the same in a book to be kept for that purpose, in which he shall regularly enter the receipt, loss, or breakage of each article; and he shall in the months of January, April, July, and October in each year, prepare and submit to the house-committee a list of such articles as may be required in his department for the ensuing quarter.

48. He shall receive the stores and supplies furnished by the contractors and tradesmen, and see that they correspond in description, quality, and quantity, with the tenders and orders; and in case they do not, he shall have the power to return the same; and he shall weigh or measure out the provisions and other necessaries required for daily consumption, and shall superintend the appointing of the diets before the delivery to the wardsmen and nurses, entering the amount consumed regularly in a book to be kept for that purpose; and he shall not suffer any of the provisions, utensils, or stores, to be carried away from the hospital.

SECRETARY AND COLLECTOR.

49. He shall attend all special, general, and committee meetings; he shall take minutes of the proceedings, and transcribe them carefully into books kept for that purpose; and he shall carry out the directions of such meetings in the particulars incident to his department.

50. He shall collect subscriptions and all moneys due to the institution, and in all cases give receipts for such subscriptions; and pay over the same to the treasurer once in every week, and render account of the amount by him received since the last payment.

51. He shall conduct the correspondence and other clerical business of his department, and he shall enter and keep the accounts of the institution under the direction of the committees.

52. He shall compile all reports that may be ordered by the committee, fill up all cheques, and perform the clerical duties connected with the office of treasurer.

HEAD NURSE.

53. The head nurse shall live in the house, and shall not leave it for any length of time without the consent of the resident surgeon.

54. In case of any misbehaviour or disobedience on the part of the female patients, she shall report the same to the house-surgeon.

55. She shall visit the wards every day, and ascertain if they and the beds, bedding, and clothes of the patients are clean and neat, causing such of the beds, bedding, and clothes as require it to be replaced with others and thoroughly cleansed.

WARDSMEN AND NURSES.

56. The wardsmen and nurses and servants shall be constantly in their wards, and regular in their attendance upon patients.

57. They shall obey the resident surgeon, and shall behave with tenderness to all patients, with civility and respect to strangers; they shall withdraw from the wards when the house-committee enter them, unless particularly requested to remain; and they shall take no presents or gratuity, in money or otherwise, from the patients, their friends, or strangers who may visit the institution, on any pretence whatever.

58. No wardman, nurse, or servant shall leave the institution without permission of the resident-surgeon.

59. The wardsmen, nurses, and servants shall be particular to observe personal cleanliness; they shall have their respective wards sweet, scrubbed, and thoroughly cleansed, and all dirt and rubbish removed from them by seven o'clock in the morning in summer and before eight o'clock in the morning in winter.

60. They shall serve up breakfast to the patients at half-past eight o'clock in the morning.

61. They shall have the several chamber utensils scalded every morning before 8 a.m., and scoured as often as may be necessary, and kept out of the wards during the day, unless specially required.

62. They shall pay great attention to the bedding of patients, and have the mattresses thoroughly aired and dried when necessary, and the sheets and blankets and counterpanes renewed as often as may be required.

63. They shall not allow clothes to be hung, nor dirt to be thrown out of the windows.

64. They shall administer to patients, at the times directed, the medicines and diet prescribed, and they shall not suffer them to take any which are not prescribed, and they shall be careful to explain to the patients the instructions of the honorary medical officer and resident-surgeon.

65. They shall not permit patients to receive from visitors, medicines, victuals, tobacco, or liquor of any kind; nor allow any portion of medicine or diet, nor anything to be removed from the wards by the patients or visitors, without an order from the resident-surgeon.

66. They shall be careful to collect and carry to the resident-surgeon all empty phials, callipots, bandages, &c., and they shall attend at the dispensary at the time appointed to receive medicines and instructions.

67. They shall watch attentively the state and symptoms of the patients, more especially in urgent or uncommon cases, and report to the resident-surgeon, or in his absence to the dispenser.

68. They shall not admit any stranger into any ward without permission of the resident-surgeon (except on visiting days).

69. All wardsmen, nurses, and servants shall be obedient to the regulations of the institution, and they shall report immediately to the resident-surgeon any impropriety of conduct or infringement of them by any patient, visitor, or other person; and if such complaint be not properly attended to they shall report the same to the house-committee at its next meeting.

PATIENTS.

70. Patients shall conduct themselves orderly, and shall strictly observe all the directions of the honorary medical officers, resident-surgeon, house-steward, wardsmen, and nurses.

71. They shall take their medicines at the time directed, and they shall take no other medicines than those prescribed; and they shall not conceal nor put away any portion of the medicine, or diet administered to them.

72. No one shall leave his or her ward and go into another ward or apartment, nor leave the house, nor remain out for a longer time than is granted, nor shall introduce visitors, nor receive medicines, victuals, liquors, or tobacco, or anything without the express leave of the resident-surgeon.

73. They shall not gamble or smoke in the wards, nor spit on the floor, nor deface or injure any part of the wards, nor any furniture, bedding, or clothing therein, or sing, blaspheme, or use rude or indecent language.

74. No patient shall give reward or gratuity to any of the wardsmen, nurses, or other servants.

75. Any patient having any cause of complaint shall make the same known to the resident-surgeon, whose duty it shall be to enter such complaint immediately in the presence of the nurse or wardman of the ward in a book kept for that purpose, which book shall be laid before the house-committee at each meeting.

76. Patients judged by the resident-surgeon sufficiently convalescent to be able to assist in the work of the institution, in the improvement of the reserve, or otherwise in any way for the benefit of the institution, may at the discretion of the resident-surgeon be so employed.

77. Patients shall not sit up after eight o'clock in winter, or nine o'clock in the summer; and all patients considered by the resident-surgeon able to do so shall rise at seven o'clock in the summer, and before eight o'clock in the winter.

VISITORS.

78. Visitors are admitted into the institution on Sunday, Wednesday, and Saturday in each week, between the hours of One and Four o'clock in the afternoon; but no visitor is allowed to remain more than two hours.

79. Visitors may be admitted on special occasions by a written order from a member of the committee addressed to the resident-surgeon.

80. Visitors will not be allowed to go into any ward without the leave of the resident-surgeon; and visitors must retire when requested.

81. They will not be permitted to give to, or leave with, any patient medicine, food, tobacco, or liquor of any kind, nor any other thing without the express sanction of the resident-surgeon.

82. No visitor shall give to any servant of the institution any money or gratuity of any kind.

83. Visitors are requested not to interfere with the wardsmen, nurses, or servants, and not to disturb the patients by loud talking or unnecessary noise.

84. Any visitor violating any of the regulations of the institution, or behaving with impropriety, will be compelled to retire, and will not be re-admitted without special leave from the resident-surgeon or house-committee.

LIBRARY.

The friends of the institution are informed that there is a library forming for the use of the patients, and that the committee will thankfully receive donations of books, periodicals, &c.

FORM OF BEQUEST TO THE DAYLESFORD DISTRICT HOSPITAL AND BENEVOLENT ASYLUM, WHICH MAY BE INTRODUCED INTO A WILL.

I give and bequeath to the Daylesford District Hospital and Benevolent Asylum the sum of £ , to be applied as the committee of management for the time being thereof may direct; for which sum the receipt of the treasurer for the time being of the said institution shall be a sufficient discharge.

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT OF THE DAYLESFORD DISTRICT HOSPITAL AND BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

STANDING RULES AND ORDERS.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1. The business of the committee shall commence at the hour appointed, or as soon after as a quorum shall be present.
2. The presence of four members shall constitute a quorum of the general-committee, and three of the house-committee.
3. If at the expiration of thirty minutes from the time appointed for the committee to meet there is not a quorum, such meeting shall stand adjourned, and such circumstance, together with the names of the members present, shall be recorded in the minute-book.
4. The minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed shall be read as the first business at all meetings of the committee, in order to their confirmation; and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon, except as to their accuracy as to the record of the proceedings.
5. The reading of the correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, and the bringing up of reports of committees and notices of motion, shall have precedence in the order of business, but shall not be introduced during the consideration of the orders of the day.
6. Orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the committee, or any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration; and such orders shall take precedence in the rotation in which they stand in the minute-book.

NOTICES OF MOTION.

7. No member shall make any motion for reconsidering a motion previously disposed of except in pursuance of a notice given at a previous meeting of the committee, and such notices must be given either previous to the committee entering upon the orders of the day, or after such orders shall have been disposed of.
8. Every member, on giving notice of motion, shall read it aloud, and deliver to the chairman a copy of such notice, together with his name, and the day proposed for bringing on such notice.
9. A member may give notice for any other member not then present, by putting the name of the member for whom the notice is given on the notice of motion.
10. No motion entered on the notice-paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorized by him, be present when the business is called in order. Notices so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.
11. Any motion not seconded shall not be further debated, but shall lapse.
12. A member who has proposed a motion may withdraw the same by leave of the chairman, but should such a motion be seconded, such leave can only be granted provided there be no negative voice.
13. The chairman may order a complicated question to be divided.
14. So soon as a debate upon a question shall be concluded, the chairman shall put the question to the committee in a distinct and audible manner.
15. The question being put, shall be resolved in the affirmative or negative by a show of hands.
16. No question or amendment, which is the same in substance as any question which has been resolved in the affirmative or negative, shall be a resolution of the committee unless carried by two-thirds of the members present.

AMENDMENTS.

17. A question having been proposed, may be amended by leaving out, substituting, or adding words, and such amendments shall be resolved by a majority of votes.
18. An amendment proposed, but not seconded, will not be entertained nor entered on the minutes.
19. Amendments may be proposed to an amendment as if such amendment were an original question.
20. When amendments have been resolved, the main question as amended shall be put.
21. When amendments have been lost, the original question shall be put.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

22. Any member desirous to propose a motion or amendment, or of discussing any matter under consideration, must rise and address the chairman; and no member when speaking shall be interrupted, unless called to order, when he shall sit down; in which case the member calling to order shall be heard thereon, in preference to any other speaker, and the question of order shall be disposed of before the subject is resumed, or any other subject entered upon.
23. No member may speak to any question after the same has been put by the chairman, and the voting has been given in the affirmative or negative thereon.
24. When two or more members rise to speak, the chairman shall call upon the member who, in his opinion, rose first in his place.
25. A motion may be made that any member who has risen "be now heard," or "do now speak."

26. A member may speak once to any question before the committee, and upon any amendment to be proposed by himself, or upon a question of order arising out of the debate, but not otherwise.

27. That any member proposing or seconding a resolution shall be held to have spoken, and the mover only shall have the right of reply.

28. Whenever the chairman rises during the debate, any member then speaking, or offering to speak, shall sit down, so that the chairman may be heard without interruption.

29. Any member having used objectionable words; and not explaining or retracting the same, or offering an apology for the use thereof to the satisfaction of the committee, will be censured by the committee, and shall not be allowed to hold his seat or vote on any question until the offensive words shall have been retracted by him, and an apology rendered to the satisfaction of the committee.

SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS.

29. It shall be competent, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, for the committee to suspend any standing order herein contained, provided the effect of such suspension shall not be the rescinding of any resolution previously adopted by the committee.

SUB-COMMITTEES.

31. That the foregoing rules and orders shall, so far as practicable, also regulate the proceedings of all sub-committees.
