INVESTIGATOR STRAIT AND GULF OF ST. VINCENT.

The following remarks on the navigation of the north coast of Investigator Strait and Gulf of St. Vincent from Troubridge Shoals to Glenelg are by Commander John Hutchison, R.N., in charge of the South Australian Coast Survey, 1868. (All bearings are magnetic. Variation 5° easterly in 1869).

Hillock Point.—The cliffs extend from the eastern point of Marion Bay, E. by S. one and a half miles, when the coast becomes sandy, trending S.E. by E. three-quarters of a mile to Hillock Point, which is low and rocky, with a small hillock at its extreme. After S.W. gales, the sea breaks heavily off this coast, and for more than half a mile from the shore the bottom is rocky and uneven; a sounding of five fathoms has been obtained a mile south of the point. From Hillock Point the land trends E. one and a half miles, then E.N.E. two and a half miles; it forms a small bay on the east side of Hillock Point, four cables across, and then becomes cliffy and rugged, with low rocks in front, on which the sea breaks heavily.

Yorke Point, a high point, 180 feet above the sea, with a small islet off it close under the cliff, lies near the centre of this rugged coast. The water is deep off York Point, there being eight fathoms within half a mile of the shore.

Foul Bay.—E.N.E., one mile from Yorke Point the coast trends N.E. by E. for eight miles, forming a shoal bay about two miles deep, and ending in a low sandy point; from the south-west point of the bay the coast is cliffy for a mile to the northward, after which the coast line becomes a low sandy beach; the soundings in the western part of Foul Bay decrease gradually towards the shore, there being three fathoms at from one half to a mile off; but at the head of the bay and towards the northern horn, called Sandy Point, the soundings become very irregular, with rocky patches of from two to three fathoms, more than one and a half miles off shore. There is a good snapper fishing ground, in eleven fathoms off the south-west point of the bay, with Yorke Point bearing W. by N. three miles. The southerly swell sets into Foul Bay; but in fine weather there is no surf on the beach.

Tides.—The flood stream sets N.N.E. one and a half miles an hour into Foul Bay, and the ebb stream S.W.

Sandy Point, forming also the west extreme of another large bay, is very low and not easily made out from the southward, being merely a point in the beach. At low water the sand dries for half a mile off the point, and a triangular shaped shoal, separated from the point by a narrow channel with five and six fathoms in it, extends S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. for three miles, with less than eighteen feet water, from thence it trends E. by S. for one mile, with four three-quarters fathoms on the outer edge, when the water deepens to seven fathoms. Sandy Point Shoal consists of light sand, with large patches of weed; it is two miles broad at the base, which lies towards the shore, and has a rocky patch, with only eleven feet water, on which the sea occasionally breaks, lying S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., one and a half miles from the point.

Sturt Bay, fourteen three-quarters miles wide and four miles deep, lies between Sandy Point and Troubridge Hill, the hill bearing from Sandy Point E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. The coast trends at first N.N.W. for half a mile, and then rounds to the north-eastward and afterwards to E.S.E., being a sandy beach for eight and a half miles as far as Gilbert Point.

Gilbert Point may be known by three grassy sandhills, and some patches of low limestone cliff running one and a half miles to the eastward, backed by high sandhills, and fronted by a rocky ledge drying at low water, and extending about a quarter of a mile off shore. From this the shore is a sandy beach, trending E.S.E. for two miles; it then turns S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., becomes bold and cliffy, as far as Troubridge Hill, with high sandhills about 140 feet above the sea behind, and sandy beaches at the foot of the cliffs.

Cootes Hill is a grassy rise at the head of Sturt Bay, about seven miles N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. from Sandy Point; although only ninety-one feet high, this hummock is conspicuous from its shape and the lowness of the land in the vicinity, which forms in salt swamps, extending inland nearly across to Hardwicke Bay.

The soundings in Sturt Bay decrease regularly towards the shore, the five fathom line being about a mile from the beach; within three and a half miles of Troubridge Hill the depth increases, their being seven fathoms within a quarter mile of the shore.

Anchorage.—Sturt Bay affords good anchorage to the north-east of Sandy Point in five fathoms, with the point bearing S.W. one mile. Good holding ground, fine sandy clay. This anchorage gives shelter in all winds from N.E. round by N., and W. to S.E. by S.; Sandy Point Shoal completely breaking the swell from the S.W. With the wind strong between S.E. and N.E. a short sea sets in, which is rendered more unpleasant by the set of the tide, the ebb setting S., and flood N.E. by N.

Directions.—Eastward of Marion Bay, about three miles inland, the land rises to a level scrub-covered range nearly 300 feet high, which runs nearly parallel to the shore to about the centre of Sturt Bay, when it abruptly terminates, forming a well-defined shoulder 270 feet high. This shoulder bearing just westward of N. will lead up into Sturt Bay and eastward of the Sandy Point Shoal in five fathoms. Yorke Point kept W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. clears the south end of Sandy Point Shoal in eight or nine fathoms. In making for the anchorage it is advisable not to haul in for the land until Sandy Point is made out, bearing W.S.W.

Troubridge Hill, on the east point of Sturt Bay, 105 feet above the sea, makes an island from the westward; it presents a cliff face to the sea, but on the landward side is grassy and sloping.

Troubridge Point is E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. two miles from Troubridge Hill, the coastline between being a low cliff, with no danger more than a cable from the shore, and may be approached within half a mile in ten or eleven fathoms. From this point the coast, a series of broken cliffs, trends N. by E. one mile; the cliffs are then succeeded by a sandy beach running N.E. for about five miles, fringed by a flat of sand and rocks drying at low water, and extending from one-half to three-quarters of a mile off shore.

Hungry Point is a low point at the termination of this sand flat, from it the beach trends N.W. by W. for a mile, to some low cliffs which trend northward and form the rounding De Mole Point; the coastline then runs N. by E., N., and N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. to the entrance of Salt Creek.

Salt Creek, which is four miles from Hungry Point, is dry at low water, being merely a channel for the sea to flow into a salt lagoon at high water, but the bay at its mouth serves as the landing place for the stores, &c., brought by coasters from Adelaide for the sheep stations in this part of the peninsula. This bay is two miles across from De Mole Point and nearly one and a-half miles deep; but the greater portion of this space is a sand and mud flat drying at low water springs, and in no part of the bay inside the line from point to point is there more than six feet water.

Giles Point, forming the north extreme of this bay, is a rounding point, low and grassy to the southward and cliffy to the northward, the end of the cliff lying N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. four and a-half miles from Hungry Point and N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. five and a-quarter miles from Troubridge Lighthouse; a rocky ledge dries about a cable from the point, and shoal water extends over half and three-quarters of a mile to the eastward and south-eastward respectively.

Troubridge Shoals extend nearly four miles eastward from Hungry Point, and consist of three large sandbanks, which dry in patches at low water springs, and a reef of rocks, lying about three-quarters of a mile to the southward of the sandbanks. The eastern and outer shoal is nearly one and three-quarters miles long N.W. by N. and S.E. by S., and three-quarters of a mile broad in its widest part, with a small sandy island, three cables long and 100 feet wide lying parallel to, and about three cables from the eastern edge of the bank. On the south end of this islet, which is fifteen feet above high water, and covered with bushes, a lighthouse is erected.

The western and inner shoal lies W.N.W. and E.S.E., two and a-quarter miles long by little more than a mile broad, separated from Hungry Point by a narrow channel, with only seven feet water between the rocky patches at its southern entrance, on which the sea breaks with southerly winds. A semicircular reef, known as the Sultana Reef, that dries at half tide, lies near the eastern, and there is a solitary rock on the western end of the bank. The third shoal is a small bank of a similar nature, lying between and to the south-eastward of the other two.

Light.—The lighthouse on the Troubridge Shoals shows, at an elevation of eighty feet above high water, an *intermittent* white light, visible for twenty-four seconds in every minute, and should be seen in clear weather at a distance of sixteen miles. The tower is iron, striped red, and white horizontally, with a white top, and rises from the keeper's dwelling.

Marion Reef, a rocky ledge nearly a mile long, having in some places not more than six feet water over the rocks, runs east and west, lying about three-quarters of a mile southward of the sandbanks, its centre bearing S. by W. about two and a half miles from the lighthouse. One mile southward of these rocks the water deepens to eight or nine fathoms, inside which the bottom is rocky. The sea does not break in fine weather on the Marion Reef, or on the south side of these shoals.

Tides.—It is high water, full and change, at Hungry Point, Troubridge, at 4h. 18m.; springs rise seven feet and neaps four to six feet. An investigation of the observations made between 17th February and the middle of April showed that the p.m. tides were the highest from the second or third day after full and change until the irregular tides had passed, when they became the lowest. From observations made at Koolley Wurta, thirty miles to the northward, in the months of August and September, it is probable that during the winter months the reverse of this may be found to be the case. At the Troubridge Shoals the tidal stream turns about forty-five minutes before high or low-water by the shore. The tide flows close round Hungry Point between three and four knots per hour at springs, the flood coming from the southward.

Tapley Shoal is a bank of from three to five fathoms over sand and weed, it extends N. by E. for five miles, nearly a mile wide at its south end, but only a quarter of a mile wide near the north end. On the east-side of this shoal the water deepens quickly

to ten and twelve fathoms, and the south end bears E. by N. three and a quarter miles from Troubridge lighthouse.

McDonnell Sound lies between Troubridge and Tapley Shoals and the land, the general depth of water being from five to eight fathoms. The best anchorage in McDonnell Sound is in five and a half fathoms fine sand, with the lighthouse S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. two and a half miles, and Hungry Point S.W. two and three-quarters miles.

Wool Beach.—From Giles Point the coast, an unbroken cliff, trends N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. three miles as far as Wool Beach, which is about three cables long, with a high cliffy bank behind it. During the wool season, upwards of 2000 bales of wool are here shipped into coasters for Port Adelaide. The coasters lie about a quarter of a mile from the beach in two fathoms. A large ship may anchor off Wool Beach in six fathoms, with the north end of the beach W. by N. one and a quarter miles, and Giles Point S. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. three miles.

Caution.—A sandy shoal of from two and a half to three fathoms, running E.S.E. and W.N.W., about two miles long and half a mile broad, lies in front of Wool Beach, the N.W. end bearing E.N.E. three miles from its north extreme. There is a depth of six fathoms between the shoal and Wool Beach, the water deepening to four fathoms to the northward, after which it gradually shoals.

Oyster Point. N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. five and a quarter miles from the north end of Wool Beach, is low and sandy, jutting out to the eastward from the general line of coast for about half a mile. The point is not easily distinguished, but its position is marked by some four or five huts on the grassy slope inside it. The coast between Giles and Oyster Points presents a line of cliffs from sixty to ninety feet high, till within a mile of Oyster Point. The back land is but slightly elevated above the cliffs and has a flat wooded outline.

South Spit is a long sand spit drying in patches at low water, and running off Oyster Point to the north-eastward, curving to the northward, and forming Oyster Bay. The extreme of the spit is N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. three miles from Oyster Point. The bay affords good shelter for coasters from all winds in two fathoms, with Oyster Point S. by W. or S. by $\frac{1}{2}$ W., and Beach Point, the northern point of the bay, W.N.W. to N.W. by W. Northward of Oyster Point the coast again takes a cliffy form, but the cliffs are much lower than those southward of the point.

Beach Point, about two and a half miles N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. from Oyster Point, may be known by a short high patch of white sand in a gully, with a small rocky point on its north side; this point, being kept on a bearing of west, leads a quarter of a mile to the northward of the South Spit.

Surveyor's Point, bearing N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., distant eight and a half miles from Oyster Point, is of a similar formation, having a sand spit running off it, about two and a half miles long by half a mile broad, called Middle Spit, curving to the northward, and drying in patches at low water. The coast continues cliffy till within a mile of Surveyor's Point, with two or three houses and some cultivated ground.

A beach extends a mile northward of Surveyor's Point, when a cliffy coastline again commences, and three quarters of a mile further is Streak Point, so called from a narrow white mark which runs down the face of the cliff; this point bearing W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., clears the end of Middle Spit in two fathoms.

Port Vincent forms a good anchorage for small vessels inside Middle Spit, in two and a half fathoms, with Streak Point bearing N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. and the first cliff point to the southward, just inside Surveyor's Point, bearing S.S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. A third projection of the same nature, known as North Spit, lies N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. four and a quarter miles from Surveyor's Point. The spit, however, is smaller, its end being N.E. one and a half miles from the point off which it runs, and the bay formed by it is very shoal.

Kooley Wurta, or Black Point, is a low beach point, bearing N. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. nine and three-quarters miles from Surveyor's Point, with a spit of sand and weed, which barely dries in patches at low water springs, running off the point to the north-eastward. The end of this spit bears N.E. one and a half miles from the point. Black Point is in latitude $34^{\circ} 37' 32''$ S., longitude $137^{\circ} 56' 0''$ E.

Port Alfred.—The beach trending back W.N.W. one and three-quarters miles from the north side of Kooley Wurta forms with the sand spit a small bay that has been called Port Alfred, affording shelter for small vessels in two and a quarter fathoms sand and marl, with Kooley Wurta bearing S.S.E., a gap in the cliff west, and the end of the spit E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. The land behind is level and covered with scrub, with one slight rise about 300 feet above the sea; this rise kept W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., or open of the northern end of a line of cliffs on the western shore of the port, clear the end of the spit in three and a half fathoms.

Tides.—It is high water at full and change of the moon at 4h. 37m. The springs rise eight feet, and neaps five to six feet.

Orontes Bank.—A large flat with a general depth of six fathoms, but having in some parts as little as nine feet water on it, extends in front of this coast, from Wool Beach to Kooley Wurta, and runs off for a distance of about seven miles to seaward, where the water deepens suddenly to ten or twelve fathoms. The shoalest part lies E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., distant three and a half miles from Surveyor's Point; its margin can frequently be distinguished in fine weather by the change in the color of the water, the bottom, which is weedy with bare sandy spots, being at times distinctly visible, and in rough weather by the sea becoming suddenly smooth.

The Coast between Oyster Point and Kooley Wurta is a mixture of low cliffs and sandy beaches, with few prominent marks to which the attention may be directed; if the sun is not shining on the cliffs the land presents a dark flat outline, gradually rising towards Kooley Wurta. There is a grassy rise, 400 feet high, W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. from Surveyor's Point, but being more than seven miles inland it does not appear much higher than the rest of the back land. On a bright forenoon, the white sand and limestone spots on Dowser's Bluff, one and a half miles north of Surveyor's Point, and also the two red cliffs, one north and the other south

of North Spit Point, are conspicuous objects about seven miles off shore.

North of Kooley Wurta the coast trends W.N.W. one and three-quarters miles and then north six miles, it is rocky with red and yellow cliffs and small sandy beaches, with a remarkable red cliff 104 feet high rising near the centre. A sandy, and in some places a rocky, flat, drying at low water, extends from one to three cables in front of the coast.

Perara.—When seven miles northward of Kooley Wurta a sandy beach takes the place of the cliffs for four miles, forming two small points, the northern one, on which there are two houses, is called Perara. The ridge of high land here approaches the coast, the scrub has almost disappeared, and the hills, covered with grass, are about 300 feet high. About one and a half miles north of Perara the last red cliffs on this part of the coast commence, they are eighty feet high, with a gap in the centre, and extend for two miles in a N.N.E. direction, the land is then very low, with a sandy beach trending N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. five miles, when it curves round to Mangrove Point, the western point of entrance to Port Wakefield. The land behind and to the northward of the red cliffs is thickly covered with scrub, and when well out in the gulf a hill, bearing N.W. by N. nine and a half miles from Perara, is conspicuous, rising above the nearer land.

Water, &c.—There are wells of good water at Hungry Point, Surveyor's Point, and Kooley Wurta, but fresh water is scarce along the coast in summer. Kangaroo abound in the southern part of Yorke's Peninsula, and fish is abundant along the coast during certain seasons. A fishery is established at Hungry Point.

Hummock Mount.—From Perara the ridge of high land runs about N. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., parallel to, and at an average distance of two to three miles from the coast, forming a level range of scrubby hills about 400 feet above the sea, rising gradually towards Hummock Mount, the summit of which being 1,064 feet high, is a good mark for vessels running up the Gulf of St. Vincent. Hummock Mount lies six miles N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. from the head of Port Wakefield.

Port Wakefield, which forms the head of the Gulf of St. Vincent, extends from its entrance between Mangrove and Sandy Points, eight miles to the northward, and is six miles wide. Its shores are low and lined with mangroves, the northern part of the western, and all the eastern shore being swampy, and fronted by a flat of sand, mud, and weed, about a mile broad, covered at half tide. Although so spacious, Port Wakefield is so much occupied by sand and mud flats as only to leave a comparatively small space available for shipping, the three-fathom line barely extending two miles within the entrance.

Wakefield Creek, lies on the eastern side of the port, about four and a half miles northward of Sandy Point. The entrance of the creek is very shallow, and is fronted by a flat more than a mile in extent, uncovered at low water springs, but at a rise of six or seven feet above the lowest tide, a loaded barge can cross the bar. Operations are about to be carried on by the Colonial Government which will considerably increase the depth of water.

The rising township of Wakefield exports large quantities of grain and wool, firewood is plentiful, but water is very scarce in summer; vessels are therefore recommended to get a sufficient supply at Adelaide, if touching there on their way up the Gulf.

Clinton.—On the western side of Port Wakefield, about three miles northward of Mangrove Point, a jetty has been built 713 feet long, with a tramway, but it is now not used, the flat drying beyond it. The place may be known by a single white house which shows out well against the dark scrub behind.

White Creek.—The night between Mangrove Point and Clinton jetty is filled by a shoal flat intersected by Wills Creek, a narrow five feet channel which from its mouth, at one and a half miles N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. of Mangrove Point, trends S.S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. two and a quarter miles into an opening in the mangroves.

Sandy Point, the eastern point of entrance to Port Wakefield, lies E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. six miles from Mangrove Point; it is a low mangrove point, fronted by a sand spit which dries out nearly two miles at low water. A low wooded range rising above the mangrove swamp between this and Wakefield township terminates in a shoulder called Bald Hill, bearing N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. from Sandy Point.

Bald Hill Beacons.—Two triangular beacons have been placed on Bald Hill as anchoring marks for large vessels. The upper triangular beacon, about fifty feet above high water mark, is painted red, sixteen feet high, and distant 322 yards E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. from the lower triangular beacon, which is painted white, and twenty feet in height.

Bald Spit Buoy.—The shoal water off Sandy Point extends to the westward, the three-fathom line being over two miles from the extreme of the mangroves. A large red nun-buoy is moored in seventeen feet water with Bald Hill beacons bearing N.E. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. Wakefield Mill N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., and the house at Clinton N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. There are three and a half fathoms at one cable, and five fathoms at one-third of a mile west of the buoy.

Channel Beacons.—A channel leading through the mud to the creek has been recently made, and beacons have been placed on its edges; the western side of the entrance is marked by a black beacon with a round top, and the eastern side by a red beacon having a lozenge-shaped head; a similar black beacon and a red beacon are placed inside.

Anchorage.—Large vessels approaching this anchorage should shorten sail off the Bald spit buoy, and anchor in four fathoms low water, with Bald Hill beacons in line. Sandy Point, the end of the low mangrove swamp under Bald Hill, S.E. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., and the Spit buoy S. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

Should a vessel anchor in such shoal water in Port Wakefield as to touch the ground, no injury is likely to occur, if care be taken to keep the vessel clear of her anchor, as the bottom is generally composed of sand and mud, and there is no sea.

Tides.—It is high water in Port Wakefield, full and change, at four hours forty minutes; springs rise eleven feet. But the tides are very irregular, and much affected by prevailing winds, with strong westerly winds the rise is much greater whilst the fall is

considerably diminished. With westerly winds, there will often be a higher tide at neaps than at springs. In fine weather and south-east winds, when the tides are at the lowest, the rise at springs is much reduced, and at neaps the rise is almost imperceptible, the time of high water being very irregular. Off Bald Spit buoy the flood stream sets N. by W. and the ebb S.S.E. one to two knots at springs.

Great Sandy Point.—The coast southward of Sandy Point is a continuous low sandy beach, trending into the eastward at first for two miles and then running nearly S.S.E. for twelve miles to Great Sandy Point, forming by the way one promontory, S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. seven miles from Sandy Point. Great Sandy Point is a low rounding point, with a long spit, which dries at low water springs for three miles, running in a S.W. by W. direction from the point. The land at the back is flat and swampy for a long distance from the beach, the distant hills being too far off to be used as landmarks for a vessel in the fairway of the gulf. A sand flat extends from one and a-half to two miles from the beach, outside which the water deepens slowly, the three-fathom line being about three and a-half miles off shore, except off the Great Sandy Point, where it runs out to a distance of seven and a-half miles from the point in a W.S.W. direction.

Long Spit Buoy is a small flat buoy, painted red, but usually much whitened by sea birds, with a pyramidal grating, the apex of which is about eight feet above the water. It is moored in nineteen feet water, on the shoalest part of a detached bank, lying off the long spit from Great Sandy Point, and four miles to the southward of it. From the Long Spit buoy, Mount Lofty bears S.E. by E., New lighthouse, Port Adelaide, S.E. by E. twenty-two and a quarter miles, Hummock Mount N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., Bald Spit buoy N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. seventeen and a-half miles, High Red Cliff, north of Kooley Wurta, west eleven and a-quarter miles, and Great Sandy Point N.E. 9.4 miles. W.S.W. two miles from the buoy the water gradually deepens to five fathoms, the same water being found after two and a-half miles on a south course. To the northward there is seven fathoms within half a mile. The three-fathom edge of the Long Spit bears N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. four miles, and the five-fathom edge N.W. by N. three miles.

To the eastward of Long Spit buoy the soundings are uneven, between three and a-half and four and a-half fathoms over a rocky bottom, with a narrow channel of five and three-quarters to seven fathoms, between the buoy and the shoal water, extending from the land. From the Long Spit buoy, the low land forming the east coast of the gulf is not visible from a vessel's deck, unless much raised during hot weather by refraction. The land on the west side of the gulf can be plainly seen, and during the forenoon, if the sun be out, the high red cliff north of Kooley Wurta is easily distinguished.

The Coast.—The sandy beach continues seven miles S.E. from Great Sandy Point, when it is succeeded by a mangrove coast, running in the same direction for three and a-half miles, with several small creek openings through the mangroves, at the S.E. end of which is a sandy beach a mile long, followed by a low mangrove point, and then another beach two miles long, at the S.E. end of which the mangroves forming Port Gawler Point commence. The coast inside the beaches is very low and swampy. A sand flat runs off this part of the coast two miles wide in front of the beaches and three-quarters of a mile off Port Gawler Point.

Port Gawler.—Point Gawler, formed by low mangrove bushes lies S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. fifteen miles from Great Sandy Point. A line of high trees, apparently marking the course of a creek, stands out above the mangroves S.E. of Great Sandy Point, their western end lying E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., two and a-half miles from the north end of the mangroves. A large grove of much higher trees gradually rising to the centre, appear to the eastward of Point Gawler, the apex being E.N.E., two and three-quarter miles from the entrance of Port Gawler Creek, for which it forms a leading mark on the same bearing.

The entrance of Port Gawler Creek is not easily distinguished from seaward, as the mangroves overlap. It is half a mile S.E. from Port Gawler Point, and about one quarter mile north-west of a sandy beach which shows through the mangroves, being less than fifty yards across, and an ordinary rowing boat cannot cross the flat of sand and mud, which is three-quarters of a mile wide, till half-flood.

The first reach is not more than a cable long, running about N. by E., the creek then turns sharp round to E. by S. On the north side of this reach, and four cables from the entrance, is a substantial wharf, lately built by the Government, with two or three feet water alongside at low water. A good macadamized road is carried across the mangrove swamps at the back of the wharf to Two Wells, the nearest township. From Port Gawler the coast trends nearly south-east for four miles, and then E.S.E. two miles to St. Kilda beach, which has some bathing-houses on it.

Torrens Island, the north point of which is S.W. by S., one mile from the bathing houses on St. Kilda, is low, about three miles long, and one and a-half broad across the south end, tapering towards the northern end. Southward of St. Kilda beach the coast forms the east side of the channel between Torrens Island and the main land, this channel narrows gradually, till at S.S.E. three and three-quarters miles from St. Kilda it is only three cables across at high water; it dries at low water springs, and is only used by small boats and barges. On the south side a narrow channel, called the North Arm, separates Torrens Island from the main.

The east and south sides of Torrens Island are nearly entirely covered with mangroves, as are some parts of the west side. There is also a range of sand hills in the south-west part of the island.

From the north end of Torrens Island a sand spit, drying at low water, extends for about three miles to the westward in the form of a fish-tail, the north extreme being W.N.W. two and three-quarters miles, and the south extreme S.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. two and a-half miles, from the north end of Torrens Island; a small bank about half a mile long lies southward of the south

extreme, round the southern end of which is the entrance into Port Adelaide Creek.

Port Adelaide is the chief port of South Australia, and is only six miles from Adelaide, the capital. The township, stores, and wharfs are situated on the south side of the creek, and five miles from its entrance, to which there is a winding passage three miles long between sandbanks.

Port Adelaide Creek.—The outer part of the channel leading into Port Adelaide runs between the sand bank from Torrens Island and another which dries to the shore; it is less than a cable across at the entrance, but widens about the island to two and a-half cables.

Light.—A fixed white light is exhibited from an iron tower fifty feet above high water, visible in clear weather from a distance of fourteen miles. The tower is built on piles in seven feet at low water, about two cables westward of the western point of the southern sand bank.

Buoys.—The entrance to Port Adelaide Creek is marked by two buoys. The western, a black buoy, is in ten feet low water, distant one and a half cables west from the lighthouse; the eastern, a red buoy, lies E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., distant eighty yards from the same point. There is thirteen feet at low water between these buoys, but the channel inside deepens to twenty and twenty-four feet, shoaling again at the inner bar off the north point of Torrens Island to ten feet. The western side of the channel is marked by black beacons for about two-thirds of a mile, as far as the boat channel that divides the small bank before mentioned from the shoal extending from Torrens Island. The eastern side, which is steep to, is marked by red buoys and beacons as far as Snapper Point, a distance of about three miles. That part of the creek inside the boat channel is known as Light's Passage, in which are three mooring buoys in nineteen, twenty, and twenty-one feet at low water.

Snapper Point, a low sandy beach point, forming the north-east corner of a low tongue of land known as Le Fevre's Peninsula, bears S. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., half a mile from the north end of Torrens Island. A large spar beacon with a white top marks the observation spot, which is in lat. 34° 46' 51" S., and lon. 138° 32' 42" E.

Port Adelaide Creek, at Snapper point, takes a sharp turn to the southward, between Torrens Island and Le Fevre's Peninsula; it is three cables wide at Snapper Point, and runs S. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. two miles, and then S. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., half a mile to a small creek called the North Arm at the south end of Torrens Island, the main creek then trends south half a mile, S.S.W. six and a half cables, and nearly south three-quarters of a mile to the township, which is built on the south side of a reach trending W. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 0.6 miles, about a cable wide. Opposite the township, near the north shore, are numerous mooring buoys.

After passing the mooring buoys in Light's Passage the depth gradually decreases to ten feet. Here commences the inner bar, extending for more than a mile over a limestone bottom. At present dredging operations are being carried on by the Government, with a view to obtain a channel with a depth of fourteen feet right through the bar. With the present appliances this will take seven or eight years to accomplish. Above the inner bar the depth increases to seventeen and eighteen feet, as far as the North Arm, in which there is fifteen feet water for about half a mile; the depth then rapidly decreases, till at two miles from the main creek it dries right across. The main stream is eighteen feet deep for three-quarters of a mile above the North Arm, and then shoals to fourteen feet, which is the depth right up to the moorings.

To the westward of the township the stream is crossed by a wooden bridge connecting the Port with Le Fevre's Peninsula, above which the stream is not navigable, and after running two or three miles ends in swamps inside the sand hills which line the coast. Close to the above-mentioned bridge, on the east side of the stream, are the smelting works of the "English and Australian Copper Company," the chimney of which is the best land mark for Port Adelaide; it is of red brick, and can be seen twelve or fourteen miles out at sea.

The township of Port Adelaide is of considerable size, and has more than half a mile wharfage, the depth alongside varying from twelve to eighteen feet at low water. There are three patent slips on the north side of the creek, the largest, called the "Dunniker Slip," belonging to Mr. H. C. Fletcher, is capable of taking up vessels of fifteen hundred tons register, another in the same yard is constructed for vessels of five hundred tons, while vessels of two hundred tons can be repaired on the smaller slip; extensive workshops are attached, where all sorts of repairs can be effected. There is a good turnpike road and railway between the Port and Adelaide. Tramways are laid down from the railway terminus along the wharfs. Fresh water is laid down at all the wharfs, so that a vessel can water alongside. Port Adelaide is in telegraphic communication with all parts of the colony, and also with Victoria and New South Wales.

Le Fevre's Peninsula is the tongue of low land, about seven miles long north and south, and one broad, between Port Adelaide Creek and the sea. From Snapper Point its north coast trends W. by N. nearly a mile to a low sandy point called "Pelican Point," and then about S. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. five miles to a rounding point known as "Malcolm Point;" the coast line is beach backed by sand hills about forty feet high.

Semaphore Jetty.—The Semaphore Jetty and signal station is three-quarters of a mile north of Malcolm Point, and about a mile from Port Adelaide, across the Peninsula. At the signal station the arrival of all vessels and the depth of water at the inner bar are signalized. The jetty is of wood, and nearly one thousand nine hundred feet long, with a cross head, forming a protection to the beach boats in bad weather; it runs out at right angles with the beach in a W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. direction, and has a tramway and truck running along its whole length.

Light.—From a wooden tower at the jetty end is shown a fixed red light, which in clear weather should be seen from a distance of six or seven miles; but being only intended as a guide to the roadstead and jetty, does not show when bearing from seaward to the northward of N.E. by E.

The sand flat in front of Le Fevre's Peninsula dries at low water springs nearly out to the Semaphore Jetty end, leaving barely room for the large boats employed by the boarding officers to moor inside the cross head. In fine weather the tug steamers, of which there are three at Port Adelaide, moor about a quarter of a mile off the jetty, ready to go out to any ship signaled. Until lately, pilot cutters were employed to put pilots on board ship down the gulf, but now vessels are boarded by boats from the jetty.

The Wonga Shoal is a tongue of shoal water which runs off Malcolm Point and curves to the northward; there is from nine to eleven feet on it for a mile off shore, outside which the water gradually deepens to three fathoms. The extreme is marked by a red buoy in three fathoms, lying W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. 1.3 miles from the Semaphore Jetty lighthouse, and S. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. 2.4 miles from Port Adelaide lighthouse.

Anchorage.—The general anchorage for large vessels when waiting spring tides to enter the creek is in from five and a-half to four and a-half fathoms, about a mile outside the Wonga shoal buoy, with the jetty lighthouse E.S.E. to S.E. by E., and Port Adelaide lighthouse N.E. to N.E.N. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

Glenelg Jetty.—The coast from Malcolm Point runs nearly straight S. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. eight miles to Glenelg Jetty, presenting a continuous line of sand hills, behind which the land is low and swampy for some distance. In fine weather the churches, town hall, and other prominent buildings of Adelaide are visible from a ship's deck, if not too close in, and on dark nights the gas lamps on the West terrace are distinctly seen. The jetty is a fine broad structure of iron, nearly one thousand three hundred feet long, with nine feet at low water springs alongside the end; it is furnished with cranes, a tramway, and trucks, which, however, are but seldom used.

Light.—A green fixed light is exhibited from a wooden tower at the jetty end, visible six or seven miles from seaward. The water deepens off this jetty much quicker than off the Semaphore, there being three and a-half fathoms at half a mile and five fathoms at one mile from the shore. The coast line about Glenelg Jetty makes a slight curve inland, and a creek which dries across the mouth at low water springs runs into the sea a short distance to the northward.

Holdfast Bay.—The anchorage off the jetty is known as Holdfast Bay, and was once the port for all vessels bound to Adelaide. It is now seldom used, Port Adelaide having been found more convenient and safer. Glenelg has therefore become merely a watering place for the citizens of Adelaide, and a place for landing and embarking the English Mails.

Mount Lofty is the highest part of a range which runs nearly north and south along the east side of St. Vincent's Gulf; it is two thousand three hundred and thirty feet high, and visible from any part of the gulf in clear weather, forming a good mark for vessels running up from the south-westward. The summit of the range is mostly thickly wood, but the spurs and lower slopes are grassy. A spur of this range runs south-westward from Mount Lofty, till it comes on the coast about three and a half miles south of Glenelg, entirely changing the character of the coast-line from low sandhills to abrupt cliffs.

Tides.—It is high water, full and change, at the Semaphore Jetty a 40m. Tidal observations were made at the end of the jetty from September 18th, 1867, to February 13th, 1868. During the above months it was found that the A.M. tides were generally the highest. Mean rise at springs eight feet six inches, and P.M. six feet ten inches. During the winter months it is said the reverse of this is the case. Neaps rise five feet to five feet seven inches. Westerly and north-westerly winds bring the highest tides.

Five days before full and change, the tides cease to flow regularly, there is then a very small rise and fall, and the first making tide of high-water generally occurs from one to two o'clock on the following morning, the tides then run in their usual course to springs. This peculiarity of the tides is met with in both St. Vincent and Spencer gulfs.

General Directions.—The fairway course up Investigator Strait from a position ten miles north of Cape Borda light is E.N.E., this course passing south of Althorpe Islands about nine miles, and the same distance south of Troubridge Hill and the lighthouse on the shoals. The old direction on the chart says keep Kangaroo Island in sight; but a vessel might be on shore anywhere on the north side of the Straits and still have the Island in sight. It is as well, however, to give the north side of the Strait a wide berth, the coast of Kangaroo Island having no off shore dangers, and being very high and bold. If obliged to stand over towards Yorke's Peninsula, do not go into less than thirteen fathoms, or when Yorke Point is in sight do not bring it to the southward of west. After passing to the eastward of Troubridge Hill, do not bring the hill southward of west until the lighthouse is well to the westward.

From nine miles south of Troubridge Light, a N.E. course leads to the Semaphore Jetty at Adelaide, but the tide must be allowed for. On approaching the east side of the gulf a bearing of Mount Lofty will be found useful.

A vessel intending to run into MacDonnell Sound from the westward should keep Troubridge Hill to the northward of west till the Troubridge Light bears north, then steer N.N.E. till it bears N.W., then north till it bears S.W., when a W. by N. course will lead to the anchorage, taking care on these courses not to go into less than four and a-half fathoms. Due allowance must be made for the tide, which sets round the shoals at a rate of from two to three knots at springs. South of the lighthouse, the tidal streams run E.N.E. and W.S.W., eastward of the lighthouse the streams run north and south.

Troubridge Light ought not to be approached when to the southward within three miles, but east and north of it, vessels may come as near as one mile. To clear the south end of Tapley Shoal keep the lighthouse to northward of W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S.

When bound from Port Adelaide to Port Wakefield, bring the Smelting Works Chimney at Port Adelaide on with Mount Lofty, bearing S.E. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., and steer N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.; a distance of about twenty-three miles on that course will bring

the Long Spit Buoy to bear N.E. two miles, and the Hummock Mount N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., the vessel being in about five and a-half fathoms. A course of N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. for the Hummock, for eighteen miles, will bring the Bald Spit Buoy to bear N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. one and a-half miles, when the vessel would be coming between Sandy and Mangrove Points and might proceed according to the Port Wakefield directions. The above courses are given irrespective of the tidal streams, which, especially in light winds, would throw a vessel considerably off her course, but in clear weather she would have Mount Lofty and the Hummocks to determine her position. In thick weather a N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. course might be continued on for seven or eight miles beyond the Long Spit Buoy, or until about three miles off Yorke's Peninsula; then run up the coast, keeping about that distance from the shore.

The soundings in the gulf between Glenelg and the Semaphore Jetty are eight to six fathoms three miles off shore, and sixteen to eleven fathoms ten miles off shore. In the centre of the gulf the depth is from eighteen to twenty fathoms west of Glenelg, fourteen to fifteen fathoms west of the Semaphore Jetty, and eleven fathoms between Kooley Wurta and the Long Spit Buoy, from which place it gradually shoals to eight and six, and five fathoms in mid-channel off Mangrove Point.

Coasting vessels in working up or down keep on the east side of the gulf, passing inside the Long Spit Buoy, the water being smooth on that side; square-rigged vessels should keep on the west side of the Gulf when to the northward of Kooley Wurta.

In thick weather, or in the middle of a summer day, when the sun is ahead, and objects are much affected by refraction, the lead should be carefully attended to in going either up or down the gulf. By maintaining a depth of five fathoms, the edge of the Long Spit may be avoided, and the buoy sighted.

The Winds during fine weather are, from sunrise to about 8 a.m., generally from east to E.S.E. In hot weather the wind in the morning may be from N.E., generally falling calm towards 8 a.m., the sea breeze setting in at about 11, it freshens about 5, and gradually moderates till sunset, when it veers round to the S.E., and dies away towards night. In winter the strongest winds are from the westward.

Weather.—The barometer falls rapidly with northerly winds, both in winter and summer, and generally precedes a change of weather from the westward. In summer, the change often occurs suddenly from the southward, when it blows hard.

THE following hydrographic remarks, made during a recent cruise of H.M.S. *Serpent* in Netherlands India, are published for general information.

(All bearings are magnetic. Variation $1^{\circ} 30' E.$)

ROTTI ISLAND, TIMOR.

Grimes Shoal.—On the Admiralty, Dutch, and other charts of Timor, there are shown, at the eastern entrance of Rotti Strait, two dangers. The southern of these called, on the new admiralty chart (No. 3 of the Eastern Archipelago), "Grimes Shoal," and placed in lat. $10^{\circ} 42' S.$, long. $123^{\circ} 39' 30'' E.$ does not exist in that position, a depth of 367 fathoms, ooze, having been obtained on the spot. Nor is any such shoal known to Mr. A. Waleon the Harbor Master of Koepang, who has been at considerable pains to ascertain by search and diligent inquiry whether these alleged dangers really exist. In the absence of any knowledge of the original source of information it has been concluded that this shoal is identical with the Beatrice.

Beatrice Shoal.—The northern shoal, in lat. $10^{\circ} 31' 30'' S.$ long. $123^{\circ} 35' E.$, does exist and is fairly placed on the charts. It was discovered by Commander John Hutchison of H.M. surveying vessel *Beatrice*, and subsequently Mr. Waleon succeeded in finding on it a knoll over which was only five feet water. This almost always breaks. The shoal, which has now been surveyed, is an oval shaped coral bank lying E.N.E. and W.S.W. half a mile in extent. Soundings of three to six fathoms are found on its central part (where probably the knoll is) deepening to eight and ten at either end where there is total anchorage; outside this the reef falls steeply into deep water. The centre of the shoal is on the following bearings:—N.E. point of Oessee Island (the island east of Landoe) W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. seven and a half miles; the conspicuous double hill over the point, W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.; the high flat-topped hill of Rotti, S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.; S.W. point of Timor (entrance to Semaio Strait) N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.; white cliffs of Timor, N.E. northerly.

ROTTI ISLAND.

East Coast.—When passing the N.E. point of Oessee the water was suddenly shoaled to five fathoms, the point then bearing N.W., one and a-third miles distant. The shoal was not examined.

West Coast.—An unexamined coral bank, on which the least water obtained whilst crossing it was fifteen fathoms, lies three and a half miles W.N.W. of Damo or Dana, the southernmost of the islands offlying Rotti. No examination was made of it.

Castle Rock.—The islands contiguous to the south and west points of Rotti are low, the southern ones particularly so. The exception is a rocky islet with steep cliffs, which is conspicuous at twenty miles distance, when all the neighboring land except the hills of Rotti has dipped. As it is difficult to recognize this useful landmark on most charts, it may be described as lying off the south-west point of Rotti, in the channel between Damo (or Dana) and the main.

Anchorage.—The only anchorage recommended about the islands is on the north side of Oessee.

SAVOU AND HOCKIE.

Savou and Benjoar.—The *Serpent* coasted along the south shores of these islands to verify their positions, and found them fairly correct. They are very bold, except that from the east point of Benjoar or Rai Diuwa a very extensive reef was seen, on which the sea was breaking heavily.

Hockie or Dana.—This island was surveyed. It is of coral, low and covered with scrub, having a ridge along its north-eastern side of about 120 feet elevation, the western part of

which is a detached knoll like a short horn. This latter is in lat. 10° 49' S., 121° 16' E. Under the ridge and facing the north-east is a broad sand beach, which is the only practicable landing-place in fine weather. Off the northern part of this beach is the anchorage in twelve fathoms, sand, with the knoll bearing S.W. and the east point S.E. Wild goats abound on the island, but no fresh water could be discovered.

BALI STRAIT.

Tafelhook is a cleat-shaped peninsula of table land bordered by a high broken cliff and a few small reefs. Though about 300 feet high, it may be styled low in comparison, for the country is mountainous. The western part is the higher and bolder; the eastern tapers into a low point, off which is a low island.

Soundings of twenty fathoms may be found west and south of the west cliff at a distance of a mile.

Badong Bay.—This open bay affords shelter from S.E. winds, with anchorage in eight to six fathoms, sand and mud, good holding ground; but there is little or no protection from the heavy ground swell that rolls in from the south.

S.E. Cape of Java is the extremity of a very low peninsula, on the northern side of which is a range of hills which terminates on the east at Cape Sloko. The points of the lowland dip at ten or twelve miles, causing a false point to be seen beyond that distance. An extensive coral reef borders the cape, but north of the Sloko ranges the shore is very steep, and a ship working through may stand in boldly.

Mount Ikan is an isolated flat-topped bluff, separated from the Sloko hills by a low isthmus, causing it at a distance to appear like an island. The charts show three hills, which is an error.

Prince of Orange Bank.—This bank has been surveyed. It is not a danger, nor has it ever been reputed one. It is of an irregular form, broader at its south part; it lies between the following bearings:—The low east extremity of Java, S. 2 W., and S. by W. westerly; eastern summit over Cape Sloko, S. W. by S. to S. W.; the summit of Mount Ikan, W. N. W. to N. W. by W. 2 W.

Banjoewangie, on the Java shore of Bali Strait, is a place of call for refreshments for vessels proceeding by some of the eastern passages. The water is good when the pipes are clean, otherwise it soon becomes fetid. This is the terminus of the electric telegraph. Banjoewangie is not always readily distinguished in the afternoon, when the sun is behind it; a good guide then is the triple-topped range on the Bali shore, from which it bears west.

It is not advisable to anchor a sailing vessel close in during the S.E. monsoon, for the difficulty in getting out may cause detention.

Vessels working through the strait will save time by taking a pilot, for the tides are complicated and difficult to comprehend.

Anchorage in seven or eight fathoms may be found all along the shore from Pakem Point to Pampang Bay. The extremity of Pakem Reef is marked by a black buoy with staff and ball.

The reef appeared to extend about half a mile in a north and south direction, and soundings were had in fifteen to eighteen fathoms water a quarter of a mile from its south end.

5.
