REGULATIONS UNDER "THE WATERWORKS ACT 1865."

THE Governor in Council in pursuance of the provisions contained in the 7th section of the Act No. 283, called *The Waterworks Act 1865*, has altered the Regulations of the 12th of July, 1869, relative to the supply of water from the Huntly Aqueduct, as follows, viz. :—

That portion of the Order in Council of 12th July, 1869, which fixes the rates to be charged for water supplied from the Huntly Aqueduct shall cease to have effect on and after Monday the 18th instant; and the rate to be charged for such water on and after that date shall be fourpence per thousand gallons.

SOUTH ENTRANCE TO MORETON BAY.

MASTERS of coasting steamers using this passage are cautioned that the entrance has shoaled one foot since the publication of the notice to mariners, dated 2nd July, there being now upon the bar only a depth of 12 feet at low water.

Care should still be taken not to cross the bar to the southward of the line of beacons, as, with the beacons thus open about four times their own width, the depth of water does not exceed some 8½ feet at low water.

Immediately the outer edge of the bar is crossed, a vessel should haul well up to the southward (dup allowance being made for tide), to clear the discolored water to the eastward of the North Break; when the beacons are opened to the southward about four or five times their own width, a vessel can keep away for the channel, and, after passing the North Break, gradually cross the line of beacons before reaching the South Spit. From thence a course can be steered for the red buoy as usual.

Until the banks become again stationary, and a better channel has formed, the bar should be taken only in smooth water, and under favorable circumstances.

On the bar of the new channel, which has opened out to the north-east, there is not a greater depth than seven feet at low water.

THE subjoined General Regulations, framed by the Board of Education, have been laid before the Governor in Council, and approved, in accordance with the provisions of the Act No. 149.

These Regulations will take effect from the 1st January, 1870, from which date all the Regulations previously approved by the Governor in Council shall be and are hereby rescinded.

GENERAL REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION—SEPTEMBER, 1869.

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GENERAL REGULATIONS.

I.—DISTRIBUTION OF PUBLIC MONEY.

No school shall receive aid from the Board of Education :—

1. Unless it shall be under the management of a local committee of not less than five persons either appointed before the 1st September, 1862, or, if at a subsequent period, who shall have been approved of or appointed by the Board. Conditions of aid.
Local committee of five members.
2. Unless it shall be kept open on each school day for at least four hours, two of which in the forenoon, and two in the afternoon, shall be consecutive and devoted to secular instruction alone.—(For course of secular instruction see Rules 105, 106, and 107.) Four hours of secular instruction.
3. Unless the head teacher and every assistant teacher shall have received a certificate of qualification from the Board or temporary permission to act. Qualifications of teachers.
4. Unless it be attended by a sufficient number of scholars, and satisfy the other requirements of the *Common Schools Act*. Sufficient number of scholars, and other requirements.
5. Unless the following conditions be complied with:—
 - (a.) That it shall at all times be open to inspection by the Board, or by any member thereof, or by any of its authorized officers. Conditions to be complied with.
Always open to inspection.
 - (b.) That such records be kept and such returns made as the Board may deem necessary, and that such records and returns be verified, when required, by a statutory declaration, made in accordance with any Act for the time being in force in the colony for regulating such declarations. Records to be kept and returns made.
 - (c.) That in the case of new buildings the school-room contain not less than eight square feet for each child in average attendance, and that the walls be not less than ten feet in height to the eaves; that in all cases the school-room be sufficiently warmed, ventilated, and drained; that there be proper and separate offices for both sexes; that there be a play-ground attached, or other satisfactory provision made for physical exercise; and that the school be properly provided with the amount of school furniture and apparatus—viz., desks, forms, black-boards, maps, books, &c.—necessary for the efficient conduct of such school. Building, furniture, &c., necessary.
 - (d.) That it be subject to all general regulations of the Board, and to such directions as may be necessary for carrying them into effect. Subject to general regulations.
6. Upon the report of the Inspector that the above regulations and conditions have been complied with, common schools will be qualified to receive aid, but not in any case, except by special order of the Board, to an amount exceeding £2 for every £1 raised by fees and local contributions. In the interpretation of this rule the same shall not be held to affect the payment of fixed salaries and augmentations for Honors made under the rules of the Board. Proportion of fees and contributions required.
7. No aid will be granted towards the building or repairing or furnishing of schools, unless the site shall have been vested for educational purposes in the Board, and the plans and specifications approved by them, Aid by way of building, &c., only granted to vested schools, and on approved plans and specifications.
8. The Board reserve to themselves the right to judge of the expediency of establishing or maintaining schools subject to the provisions of the *Common Schools Act*; and all grants must depend upon the funds placed at the disposal of the Board. Board to judge as to establishing or maintaining schools.

ALLOWANCES TO SCHOOLS.

1.—Salaries and Augmentations.

9. Head teachers of schools in connection with the Board will receive fixed salaries of £100 for males and £80 for females respectively, if certificated by the Board in the first Division of Competency; and of £75 for males and £60 for females respectively, if certificated in the second Division of Competency; and of £65 and £50 respectively, if acting under temporary permission only. Payment of these allowances will be made to the teachers monthly. Rates of salaries.
10. Head teachers classified in the first and second classes of honors, or equivalent, will be qualified to receive the following augmentations upon their fixed salaries:—

First-class Honors	Males £60, Females £40.
Second-class Honors... ..	Males £30, Females £20.

Augmentations.
11. These augmentations, however, will be paid upon the following scale:—

Where the average attendance is 40 and above, 10 per cent.
Where the average attendance is 50 and above, 20 per cent.
And so on, increasing 10 per cent. for every ten scholars in average attendance.

Scale of augmentations.
12. Certificated assistants, when employed, will not be paid at a higher rate than that provided for head teachers of the second division of competency under Rule 9; and if acting under temporary permission only, not higher than head teachers of the same class. Salaries of assistants.
13. In addition to the head teacher a pupil-teacher will be allowed for every twenty-five scholars in average attendance over the first twenty-five, or an assistant teacher for every fifty scholars over the first twenty-five, provided that there shall be one assistant teacher for every hundred scholars in average attendance; but in schools employing one or more pupil-teachers, should the attendance increase to such an extent as to entitle the local committee to substitute an assistant for a pupil-teacher, the full number of pupil-teachers already employed may be retained until a vacancy in the pupil-teachers' staff shall occur. Averages required for assistants and pupil-teachers.

- Workmistresses.** 14. A workmistress will be allowed in mixed schools where the head teacher is not a female, when the average attendance exceeds 30, and when the pupil-teacher is not a female, or is not competent to give instruction in needlework; and when the average attendance is from 75 to 100, the local committee may, with the approval of the Board of Education, employ a second pupil-teacher instead of an assistant, and retain the services of the workmistress, the salary of the workmistress to be £20 a year when the average attendance is below 36, and £30 a year when above that number; not less than one hour's instruction to be given in each school day.
- Averages below 25.** 15. In schools where the average attendance is below 25, the salary of the head teacher shall not exceed that allotted to the second division of competency.
- Applications for increased staffs.** 16. Applications for increased staffs will be received at any time, and staffs will be increased from the commencement of the month succeeding that in which the application is received, such increase being based upon the average attendance for the three months preceding the date of application, but no increase will be recognised unless the sanction of the Board shall have been previously obtained.
- When female assistant may be paid as head teacher.** 17. In the case of mixed schools, where the number of girls shall average 40, one of the female assistants may, at the discretion of the Board, be paid as a head teacher, without augmentation on classification.
- When female assistant may be paid as head teacher of infant class.** 18. In mixed schools where the attendance of infants shall average 40, and such infants shall be taught in a separate apartment, so constructed that the noise created by their proper management shall not interfere with the rest of the school, and where, moreover, they shall be taught upon a proper infant system, one of the female assistants may, at the discretion of the Board, be paid as a head teacher without augmentation; and none of the girls attending the infants' school shall be reckoned in estimating the attendance in the upper school, with a view to the payment as head teacher of any one of the assistants in such upper school.
- Augmentation in such cases.** 19. The augmentation on classification of the head teacher of a school in the cases referred to in the two preceding rules, shall be taken upon the average attendance of the whole school, including both upper and infants' departments.
- Mixed schools with one assistant.** 20. In mixed schools with one assistant, where the head teacher is a male, the assistant must be a female, unless a large proportion of the scholars be males, in which case the Board will sanction the employment of a male assistant, provided a workmistress be employed and paid by the committee, in which case she must receive not less than £30 a-year.
- Female assistants to teach needlework.** 21. All female assistants must be competent to give instruction in needlework, and no workmistress will be allowed when a female assistant is employed.
- Mixed schools with two or more assistants.** 22. In mixed schools where two or more assistants are employed, one of them must in every case be a female.
- Separate class-room for infants.** 23. In all schools having an average attendance of 100, or more than 100, in which there is an infant class reaching the average attendance of 25, a separate room, properly furnished, shall be set apart for the instruction of the infants, and the time-table shall be so arranged as to have the said infants constantly under the charge either of a teacher or of a pupil-teacher.
- Attendance of teachers to be recorded.** 24. The attendance of every teacher, workmistress, and pupil-teacher, shall be recorded in the roll-book in the same manner as the attendance of the scholars.

2.—*Payment by Results.*

- Result payments.** 25. In addition to the above payments the following allowances for *results* will be made to schools.
- Proportion to salaries.** 26. To each school such proportion of a sum hereinafter called the maximum increment as may be gained by it under the conditions specified in Rules 32-35.
- Maximum increment.** 27. The maximum increment shall be 45 per cent. of a salary assumed in the case of each school, according to the allotment of teachers, as shown in the following table:—

Infant schools not being departments of other schools, two-thirds of the above.

- Maximum increment where there are two or more departments, or an infant department.** 28. In schools consisting of two or more departments, the maximum increment shall be calculated on the school as a unit; and in distributing the amount earned as results, should there be an infant department, such infant department shall receive one-third ($\frac{1}{3}$) less than it would be entitled to as a boys' or girls' department.
- Scholars liable to examination.** 29. Every scholar who has attended during any part of the five weeks preceding the Inspector's visit shall be liable to examination, and if presented by the teacher shall be examined in the class with which he is taught, and on the roll of which his name and correct age have been entered.
- Calling the roll.** 30. Attendance morning or afternoon cannot be reckoned for any scholar who is not present at the calling of the roll: the time of calling the roll to be inserted in the time-table. The attendances must be marked on the roll in ink, and in every school a ruled slate must be

provided, on which the names of scholars who leave after the roll is called and before the school is closed must be entered.

31. Children under three years of age may attend schools, but no payment will be made on their account except in infant schools, nor will they be included in reckoning the average attendance. Children under 3 years of age.

32. Every scholar below seven (7) years of age presented in Class I. shall receive three (3) marks, subject to reduction or forfeiture should the class fail to satisfy the requirements of the examination specified on the programme. Scholars below 7.

33. Every other scholar presented shall receive one (1) mark for each subject in which he has passed the examination specified in the programme, and an additional mark shall be given for arithmetic in all classes above the second. Other scholars.

34. One-twelfth (1-12) of the marks gained by any class shall be deducted for each month by which the average age of the scholars (liable to examination) composing it exceeds the age specified in the programme. Average age.

35. The sum to which each school shall be entitled as payment for results shall bear the same ratio to the maximum increment as the total number of marks actually gained bears to the number which might have been obtained if all the children liable to examination had gained their full number, and one-twelfth (1-12) of this sum shall be paid monthly, commencing at the first day of the month following the day of examination. Sum to which school is entitled.

36. If at any time the attendance necessitate a change in the allotment of teachers; the monthly allowance for results shall, from the date of such change, be calculated upon the maximum increment corresponding to the new allotment. Change of allotment.

37. The amount gained under results is to be calculated by the Inspector in the school, and a record left by him in the Inspector's register, and any appeal against the Inspector's examination must be forwarded to the Board within one week, or the same will not be entertained. Results to be calculated by Inspector.

38. It shall be lawful for the Board at the commencement of any year, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council, to raise or reduce the percentage of the allotment which is to form the maximum increment, or to modify the average age of the classes shown in the programme, as the interests of education may require, or the amount voted by Parliament for payment under results may render necessary. Percentage of allotment may be raised or reduced.

39. After one month's notice the grant may be reduced or withdrawn upon the Inspector's report for faults of organization, instruction, or discipline on the part of the teacher, or for neglect in keeping the records of the school, or for failures on the part of the local committee to remedy any such defect in the school premises as seriously interferes with the efficiency of the school, or to provide proper furniture, books, maps, or other apparatus of elementary instruction. Reduction or withdrawal of grant.

40. Any local committee objecting to the Inspector's report upon the building, organization, instruction, or discipline, may appeal to the Board of Education, and every such appeal must be made within twenty-one days from the receipt by the local committee of notice of such report, and must state fully the grounds of appeal. Committee may appeal.

41. No grant will be made in respect of any teacher or teachers who shall at any time knowingly and wilfully present for examination or make any claims on behalf of any scholar who shall be by these rules disqualified from such presentation or claim, or who shall make a false entry respecting any child liable to examination, knowing the same to be false, or not knowing the same through gross negligence, and such disability shall continue for a period not exceeding five years from the date of the discovery of such false entry. Teachers how disqualified.

3.—Evening Schools.

42. No scholar shall be entered on the rolls of an evening school whose age is below twelve years, or who shall be in attendance at, or employed as a teacher or pupil-teacher in, any ordinary common school. Scholars eligible.

43. The maximum increment for an evening school having an average attendance below twenty shall be less than that allowed for an ordinary school of from twenty to twenty-four, and in the same ratio as the average attendance of said evening school is less than twenty. Maximum increment when less than 20.

44. The maximum increment for evening schools having an average attendance above twenty shall be the same as would follow the allotment in ordinary schools having the same average attendance. When more than 20.

45. Rules 32 and 34 shall not apply to evening schools, but no scholar may be twice presented for examination in the same class, and the classification of each scholar at his first examination must be approved by the Inspector. Not to be twice presented for same class.

46. The other regulations relative to payment of results in ordinary common schools shall apply to evening schools. Other rules to apply.

TRAINING.

47. A training institution will be established in connection with the Board, in which provision will be made for training teachers. Establishment of institution.

48. Lecture rooms and class rooms will be provided at the central schools, in which instruction will be imparted to students in training as hereinafter provided. Lecture and class rooms.

49. The central schools and such other schools in or near Melbourne as the Board may license will be employed as model and practising schools, in which teachers in training shall attend and take such part in the instruction of the classes as the superintendent of the training institution shall direct. Practising schools.

50. The Board shall have power to withdraw such license at any time should such schools not be conducted according to their requirements. Withdrawal of license.

* At the end of the year 1869, the balance, if any, of the amount appropriated by the Board for the payment of results, which may remain unexpended under the preceding rules, may, at the discretion of the Board, be distributed amongst all the schools, such distribution to be in the same proportion as the amounts which shall have been already expended.

Number and classes of students.	51. The number of students to be admitted will be fixed by the Board from time to time, and will be selected from the following classes of candidates :—
(1.) Teachers employed.	(1.) Teachers employed in common schools who are recommended by the Inspectors for a course of training and who shall pass the entrance examination in Appendix E.
(2.) Pupil-teachers.	(2.) Pupil-teachers who, having completed their course, have passed for the highest class of pupil-teachers, and have attained the age of eighteen years for males and seventeen years for females.
(3.) Other persons.	(3.) Other persons, not under the age of eighteen years for males and seventeen years for females, who shall forward to the Board a certificate of moral character as in Rule 82, and a certificate of sound health, signed by a licensed medical practitioner, and who shall pass the entrance examination in Appendix E before an officer appointed by the Board.
Intern and extern students.	52. The teachers in training will consist of intern and extern students; the former will reside in boarding-houses licensed by the Board, and the latter at their own homes, or with their relatives in houses approved by the Board.
Instruction free.	53. The instruction given in the training institution shall be free both to intern and extern students.
Teachers and pupil-teachers in boarding-houses.	54. In the case of teachers and pupil-teachers, as specified in Rule 51, who reside in licensed boarding-houses, the Board will contribute a sum not exceeding £40 a year for the maintenance of each male student in training, and not exceeding £35 for each female, which payments shall be supplemented by a further payment from each student at a rate not exceeding £15 per annum—the exact amount to be fixed from time to time by the Board. No payment for maintenance will in any case be made for a longer period than two years.
Other persons in boarding-houses.	55. In the case of other persons admitted to training who reside in licensed boarding-houses, the Board will contribute at a rate not exceeding £25 per annum for each, and each such student shall contribute a further sum not exceeding £30 per annum in the case of a male, and in the case of a female not exceeding £25 per annum.
Superintendent and assistants.	56. The Board will appoint and pay a superintendent, who shall have charge of the instruction and training of the students, and also such assistant teachers to act under his direction as they may deem necessary.
Half-yearly examinations.	57. Half-yearly examinations will be held of all students in training, and any student who is found not to have made sufficient progress will be liable to be dismissed from further attendance, and will forfeit all claim to aid.
Not required by students already in training.	58. Students at present in training will not be required to undergo any examination on entrance.
Details of examinations.	59. The details of the examinations will be found in Appendix E.
Inspection of boarding-houses.	60. The boarding-houses in connection with the training institution shall be subject to such inspection as the Board may direct, and in the event of any of the requirements of the Board, in connection with the moral discipline, board, lodging, instruction, and general comfort of the students, not being complied with, it shall be competent for the Board to withdraw the license on giving one month's notice.
Declaration, &c., required.	61. Every person entering the training institution shall be required to sign a declaration binding him to attend regularly through the course of training until he shall have obtained the lowest classification, or shall have received permission from the Board to discontinue attending such course, or shall have received notice of the withdrawal of the allowance for maintenance, and also binding him, should he successfully complete the required course, to teach in common schools for a period of not less than two years, and to accept any appointment which may be offered to him with the approval of the Board; and further binding him, in the event of his failing to comply with any of the above conditions, if an intern student, to refund to the Board any moneys which may have been paid on account of his maintenance, and if an extern student, to pay at the rate of £12 (twelve pounds) per annum for such time as he shall have been in training. In either case, whether of an intern or extern student, the Board may require a further guarantee for the payment of such moneys.

AID TO NEW SCHOOLS.

Provisions of section 10, regulating aid to new schools.	62. Attention is directed to section 10 of the <i>Common Schools Act</i> , as follows :— “No new school not being an infant school shall receive aid from the consolidated revenue which shall be established within two miles of a school already receiving aid from the consolidated revenue, unless there shall be such a number of pupils not being pupils of the first school whose parents shall undertake in writing that they shall attend the proposed school, as with the average number of pupils in attendance for six months at the school already receiving aid shall amount to two hundred, unless some natural obstacle shall intervene between the two schools which shall prevent the attendance of the pupils at such other school, or unless one of the two schools shall be for boys alone, and the other for girls alone. Provided that no school shall be an infant school within the meaning of this clause unless all the pupils be under the age of eight years.”
Vested and non-vested schools.	63. The existence in any locality of a school not vested in the Board shall not be regarded as a hindrance to the establishment of a vested school in that locality, should such be applied for, although the granting of aid by the Board to such school should, according to section 10 of the <i>Common Schools Act</i> , necessitate the withdrawal of aid from the non-vested school.
Terms of aid.	64. Subject to the provisions of the two preceding rules, aid may be granted on the following terms :— 1.— <i>Schools Vested in the Board.</i> —(a) <i>Buildings.</i>
Conditions of grant for building.	65. Before any grant is made towards building a school-house, the Board are to be satisfied that a necessity exists for such a school, that an eligible site has been granted by the Crown, or (if otherwise procured) that a satisfactory conveyance will be executed to the Board, and that

the applicants are prepared to raise by private contribution at least one-half of the whole sum which the Board deem necessary for the erection of the house, providing necessary furniture, &c., such furniture to be the property of the Board for the purposes of the school: but in order to facilitate the amalgamation of two or more schools, such schools having been previously vested in the Board, they may sell or otherwise dispose of such school property, and regard the whole or a part of the proceeds as local contributions; or should the Board retain one or more such schools, they may estimate the value of the property, and regard the whole or a part thereof as local contributions towards the outlay incurred for the purposes of such amalgamation.

66. The Board will determine from the information afforded the dimensions of the proposed building. Dimensions of building.

67. The Board will not contribute to the ornamenting of school-houses, but merely to such expenditure as may be necessary for having the children accommodated in plain substantial buildings. If buildings of another description be preferred, the whole of the extra expense must be provided by the applicants. Ornamentation not paid for.

68. The plans, estimates, and specifications must be satisfactory to the Board; when approved and sealed they may be returned to the promoters of the school for use, but must be lodged in the Education Office before a grant is paid. Plans, &c.

69. The private contributions must be paid to the credit of the Board of Education, at the Bank of Victoria, Melbourne. Private contributions.

70. Instalments at a rate, not exceeding £75 per cent. on the value of the works executed will be paid on the certificate of the committee and architect. Instalments on works executed.

71. The Board will require that within one month after the notification of a grant shall have been made, the local committee shall state definitely whether the grant is accepted or not; that within six months after the notification of the grant, the whole of the local subscriptions, or such portion as the Board shall deem sufficient for the purpose, shall have been paid in; and that within nine months after the notification of the grant, building operations shall have been actually commenced. In the event of failure in carrying out any of these conditions, the grant will lapse. Local committee to notify acceptance of grant.

(b) Repairs.

72. Before any grant is made towards repairing a school-house, the Board are to be satisfied that such repairs are necessary, and that at least one-half of the whole sum will be locally contributed. Conditions of grant for repairs.

73. The provisions of Rules 66-71 relative to buildings will apply to grants for repairs, except as to the payment of the final instalment in the case of repairs involving only a small expenditure, and when the Board do not deem the employment of an architect necessary. Rules 66-71 to apply, with exception.

2.—Schools not Vested in the Board.

74. The Board will entertain applications for aid to new schools not proposed to be vested in the Board; but this aid can only be granted under the rules for allowances to schools. Nature of aid.

75. Forms of application may be obtained on application to the Secretary. Forms of application.

II.—INSPECTION OF SCHOOLS.

76. For the purposes of inspection the colony will be divided into districts, to each of which an Inspector shall be appointed. Districts.

77. Inspectors will be required strictly to conform to the "Instructions to Inspectors of Common Schools" contained in Appendix G, and generally to carry out the instructions of the Board. Duties of Inspectors.

III.—EXAMINATION AND CLASSIFICATION OF TEACHERS.

78. The appointments and dismissal of all teachers in schools receiving aid from the Board rests with the local committees; but each teacher appointed must have his qualifications, both as to character and general fitness, approved by the Board, and the dismissal of any teacher must be sanctioned by the same. Appointments and dismissal.

79. Certificates of qualification will be divided into four classes, and will be granted upon examination by officers appointed by the Board, the details as to which will be found in Appendix C. But all teachers who have been classified, either under the late National, or the late Denominational Board, will be entitled, without examination, to a classification equal to that obtained by them under either of those Boards, and a certificate in accordance with this rule will be granted by the Board of Education; and teachers who have held schools under either of the late Boards previous to the 1st October, 1857, will be entitled, without examination, to a special certificate, equivalent to the first division of competency, upon obtaining a report from an Inspector that their schools are well conducted, and upon passing the examination in all the subjects of the "Art of Teaching" for that division; and teachers holding certificates of merit from the Committee of Council on Education in Great Britain, and the Commissioners of National Education, Ireland, who have actually received a recognition by either of the late Boards, will receive a similar recognition by the Board of Education, and will, without examination, be entitled to a certificate accordingly. Certificates of qualification.

80. The value of the certificates issued by the Board relative to those of the late National and Denominational Boards will be seen in the following table:— Relative value of certificates.

Recognition of home certificates issued since 1st March, 1864.

81. The certificates of teachers who have been classified in Great Britain or Ireland since the 1st September, 1862, will be recognised in accordance with the following scales, provided that each teacher shall have been actually engaged in teaching within two years of his application for recognition, and provided also that he shall satisfy the Board as to his being the person named in such certificate, and as to his moral character.

Examinations when and where held	82. Examinations will be held periodically at Melbourne, and such other central places as the Board may appoint (due notice of which will be given), when all candidates who present themselves for examination, and who produce certificates of moral character from a clergyman registered under the Marriage Act, chairman of a local committee, or justice of the peace, and of sound health signed by a licensed medical practitioner, will be entitled to be examined in the literary subjects required in Appendix C. Candidates must bear their own travelling expenses; and all candidates who are not actually employed as teachers, workmistresses, or pupil-teachers, will be required to pay a fee of ten shillings previous to examination.
Conditions of appointment.	83. The Board will not recognise the appointment of any teacher unless he has attained the age of 18 years, or in the case of females, 17 years; unless a certificate of moral character be produced, as provided in Rule 82; and unless notice of the appointment be sent to the Board within one week of the date of such appointment.
Agreements required.	84. A written agreement must be entered into between each teacher and his local committee, according to a form supplied by the Board, and a duplicate of such agreement must be deposited in the office of the Board within two months of the date of appointment, or in default thereof the Board will not recognise any claim for school payments for the time suffered to elapse beyond the said period.
Notification of dismissal.	85. Local committees shall notify to the Board their intention of dismissing any teacher, and shall also notify the same to the teacher, but they may in extreme cases suspend him from the performance of his duties during that period, such suspension, if approved by the Board, to annul the claim to a month's notice of dismissal.
Teachers not to take part in elections.	86. The Board will regard the taking part in elections for members of the Legislature except by voting as incompatible with the performance of the duties of teachers of common schools.
Terms of service to be completed before issue of 1st division certificate.	87. No teacher shall receive a certificate of the first division of competency unless he has been employed in a school for at least two years.
Conditions of honor examinations.	88. No teacher shall be allowed to attend an examination for honors (the conditions affecting which will be found in Appendix C) who shall not have been previously classified in the first division of competency, or who shall have had an unfavorable report recorded against him for the two preceding years.
Singing and drawing certificates.	89. Candidates for drawing and singing certificates will be examined in the programme as set forth in Appendix D.

IV.—PUPIL-TEACHERS.

Conditions for registration of pupil-teachers.	90. The Board of Education will not register a school for pupil-teachers unless it is reported to be— (1.) Under a head teacher holding a certificate equal at least to the second division of competency. (2.) Held in suitable premises. (3.) Well furnished and well supplied with books and apparatus. (4.) Instructed under a suitable time-table, which is strictly carried out. (5.) Under satisfactory discipline. (6.) Properly classified and instructed.												
Age, &c.	91. Pupil-teachers shall not be appointed under the age of 14 years for males and 13 for females; they must be of sound and healthy constitution, and free from any physical defect likely to impair their efficiency as teachers.												
Commencement of salaries.	92. Salaries will not be granted to pupil-teachers until they shall have passed the examination for the fourth or lowest class, and salaries when granted will date from the commencement of the month succeeding that in which the pupil-teachers pass such examination.												
Classes.	93. Pupil-teachers will be divided into four classes, and will be paid at the following rates per annum:—

Local contributions.	94. The local payments from school-fees and other sources towards pupil-teachers' salaries shall be, for the fourth class—males £10, females £8, per annum, and for all classes above the fourth—males £15, females £12, which must be paid in cash, and no other allowance, such as board or residence, will be allowed in lieu of cash payments.												
General examination.	95. A general examination of pupil-teachers will be held at the commencement of every year, both orally and by means of papers, when all pupil-teachers who have been appointed not less than six months will be required to attend under pain of forfeiting their salaries. At this examination they will be classed for the year.												

96. Every pupil-teacher will be expected to advance at least one class at each annual examination, and those who undergo two such examinations without promotion will forfeit their claim to aid altogether. Advancement on examination.

97. Head teachers will be required to give to their pupil-teachers, either personally or by competent assistants, instruction, outside of the four hours required by the *Common Schools Act* to be devoted to secular instruction, as follows:— Instruction.

In a school having but one pupil-teacher, five hours per week. In a school having more than one pupil-teacher, at least six hours per week; and the time for such instruction must in all cases appear on the time-table.

98. Pupil-teachers cannot, at their first examination, be placed in a class higher than the lowest, but at the annual examination they will be allowed to advance as many classes as they may show themselves competent for. Classes.

99. Pupil-teachers will not be examined for payments for results.

100. The services of pupil-teachers will be retained till the completion of their course, although the attendance would otherwise necessitate a reduction in the teaching staff of the school, but two pupil-teachers will always be considered equivalent to one assistant. Results.
Retention of services.

101. Pupil-teachers will be liable to dismissal without notice, for idleness, disobedience, or immoral conduct, subject to appeal to the Board as in the case of teachers. Causes for dismissal.

102. In every school registered for pupil-teachers, when a vacancy in the head teachership occurs, the new head-teacher must be one qualified to train and instruct pupil-teachers. Vacancies in head-teachership.

103. Bonuses will be paid to the head-teachers for every pupil-teacher who shall pass the annual examination for promotion, according to the following scale:— Bonuses.

For one pupil-teacher	£10
" two "	"	"	"	"	"	18

subject to a proportionate reduction for every pupil-teacher who shall fail to pass or attend the examination,* and no bonus will be paid for more than five pupil-teachers in any one school although a greater number may be employed.

104. The Board do not absolutely require that local committees shall enter into written agreements with the parents or guardians of pupil-teachers, but they recommend them to do so. Where the head teacher is classified in the second division of competency, the agreement should be for three years only, in order that the pupil-teacher may have an opportunity of completing the course under a teacher holding a first division certificate. Where the head teacher is in the first division of competency, the agreement should extend over four years. Forms of agreement can be obtained on application to the Secretary. Agreements.

105. Pupil-teachers must be of the same sex as the head teacher of the school or department of a school in which they are employed; but in mixed schools, or departments of schools, under a master and mistress, female pupil-teachers may receive instruction out of school hours from the master, on condition that some adult female, approved by the local committee and by the Inspector, be invariably present during the whole time that the lessons are being given by the teacher; provided also that the teacher and said adult female be not both young and unmarried. Supervision during instruction.

V.—COURSE OF SECULAR INSTRUCTION.

106. The course of instruction laid down in the programme of instruction in Appendix B shall be followed in all schools receiving aid from the Board; but the local committees may encourage the introduction of singing, drawing, and other branches of instruction, subject to the conditions stated in Rules 107, 111, and 112. Course of instruction.

107. At least two consecutive hours in the forenoon, and two in the afternoon, shall be given to instruction in the subjects embraced in the programme of instruction; and should other subjects beyond those embraced in the programme, and coming under the head of secular instruction, be introduced, they must be taught outside of these hours unless the special sanction of the Board be obtained to the contrary; such sanction can only be conditional on each class in the school receiving at least four hours' instruction (two in the forenoon and two in the afternoon) in the programme subjects, and this must be shown on the time-table. Instruction in programme subjects and in subjects below programme.

108. The subjects comprised in the programme of instruction must be taught in classes common to all on payment of the ordinary recognised school fees. Programme subjects to be taught in classes common to all.

VI.—SCHOOL FEES.

109. The rate of school fees will be regulated by the local committees, but is not to exceed *ten shillings a month or two shillings and sixpence a week*, unless with the special sanction of the Board, nor is it to be less than *three shillings a month or ninepence a week* for any single scholar. When more than one attend from the same family, the fee for each may be reduced to *sixpence*. In cases of children under eight years of age the fee may be reduced at the discretion of the local committee to *sixpence* per week. No child unless under eight years of age can be regarded as an infant. Rates of fees.

110. School fees must be paid in money, and should in every case be paid in advance, and amounts actually received during the year and none other will be taken into account in considering the amount which should be raised locally (Rule 6). Cash payments in advance.

* The reduction is thus calculated:—

If five pupil-teachers are employed in a school, and they all pass the examination, the school will be entitled to a bonus of £30; but if two fail, two-fifths will be deducted from £30, leaving the amount payable £18. Again, if three pupil-teachers are employed, and they all pass, the school will be entitled to £24; but if two fail, two-thirds of the £24, or £16, will be struck off, leaving only £8 payable.

SINGING AND DRAWING AND OTHER EXTRA BRANCHES.

- Payments for.** 111. Any local committee desirous of having singing and drawing taught in their school, may, with the sanction of the Board charge a fee not exceeding *one penny* per week for singing, and *one penny* per week for drawing, to be paid to the teachers imparting such instruction (who must be approved by the Board), for every child above seven years old attending such school, in addition to the ordinary school fees, and the Board will supplement such payment with an equal amount.
- Scale of fees to be approved by the Board.** 112. Where other branches are introduced beyond those included in the programme of instruction, the scale of fees to be charged in addition to the ordinary rates sanctioned under Rule 109 must in each case have the approval of the Board.

VII.—DESTITUTE CHILDREN.

- Fees payable.** 113. In the case of destitute children, under which designation are included orphans and deserted children who have no means of paying the prescribed school fees, payments will be made by the Board according to the following scale:—
For a single scholar above eight years of age, 4½d. per week.
For a single scholar under eight years of age, 3d. per week. When more than one attend from the same family, per scholar, 3d. per week.
- Certificates required.** But in every case a certificate must be furnished to the local committee, signed by a justice of the peace, or registered clergyman, in form of A or B, Appendix F, and a copy thereof forwarded to the Board, and the Board will require to be satisfied that such case really exists. Every such certificate must be presented on the day of admission to the school, and must be renewed half-yearly.
- All certificated or paying children to be admitted.** 114. Every child holding a certificate, or paying the fee required by Rule 109, shall be entitled to admission to any common school, unless the local committee thereof shall assign reasons for refusing admission to be approved by the Board.
- Distance not to be considered.** 115. Destitute children are to be admitted to any common school irrespective of the distance of their residence, so long as accommodation is available.
- Menial services not to be required.** 116. Destitute children shall not be called upon to perform menial or other services which are not required from the scholars generally.

VIII.—DRILL AND GYMNASTICS.

- Classes formed.** 117. Teachers of schools who are desirous of becoming qualified instructors in military drill and gymnastics may, on application to the Board, obtain free admittance as pupils to a course of instruction in those subjects; to be given at the National Gymnasium; but all teachers availing themselves of this privilege must undertake to attend during the whole course of instruction, and to submit to an examination at its termination. The course of instruction will be determined by the Board of Education, and the time must be fixed so as not to interfere with the hours of secular instruction.
- Certificates to be issued.** 118. Certificates will be issued to teachers, who pass the examination, and they will be required to instruct their pupils in military drill, and (if practicable) in gymnastics also; and such instruction will be duly reported upon by the visiting inspector.
- Specified number required to form a class.** 119. No class will be formed unless a specified number of teachers, to be fixed by the Board, undertake to attend.

IX.—MISCELLANEOUS.

LOCAL COMMITTEES.

- Nominations received.** 120. The Board will receive nominations of members for local committees for approval or appointment.
- Appointments.** 121. The approval or appointment of local committees of common schools rests with the Board, who have also the power, with the consent of the Governor in Council, of removing such committees.
- Residence of members.** 122. Members of committee must ordinarily reside in the locality where the school is situated, or must live sufficiently near the school to take part in its inspection and management; but in schools vested in or connected with religious bodies, the minister of the denomination having pastoral charge of the district in which the school is situated may be a member of the committee.
- Resignation and removal.** 123. Local committees shall inform the Board of any vacancies in their number which may occur by death, removal from the district, or resignation.
- Notice of intention to appoint or remove.** 124. One month's notice of the intention of the Board to appoint or remove local committees or members thereof will be given in the *Government Gazette*, and all appointments of local committees or of members thereof will also be notified in the *Government Gazette*, and in some local newspaper, if any.
- Five members necessary to constitute a committee.** 125. A local committee must consist of not less than five members, of whom the correspondent must be one.
- Correspondent.** 126. The correspondent is the organ of the local committee, and should be appointed by them. He has not the power of taking independent action in any matter connected with the school, but must communicate with the Board in the name and on behalf of the committee.
- Duties of local committees.** 127. The duties of the local-committees will be:—
(a) To appoint the necessary number of teachers, enter into agreements with them, and remove them when requisite, subject to the provisions of the Act and of these regulations.
(b) To recommend to the Board the proportion in which the allowances made by them to schools shall be distributed between the head teacher and the other persons employed in the school.

- (c) To regulate (subject to the rules above laid down) the rate of school fees for children attending their school, to make arrangements for their collection, and to decide what proportion of them should be paid to the head teacher and the other persons employed in such school, and what proportion should be applied to other school purposes; such scheme of distribution to be approved by the Board.
- (d) To keep full and correct accounts of the total receipts and expenditure of their school, such accounts to be left in the school and to be produced when required by an Inspector of the Board.
- (e) To visit the school at short intervals, and record upon the school rolls the results of their visits, together with the number of children found present at the time of their visiting.
- (f) To take all possible care that the children whose school fees are paid by the State attend regularly at school, and that none are paid for unless they are really destitute of the means of education.
- (g) To make returns of destitute children, after having satisfied themselves that such children are fit objects of bounty.

SCHOOL-HOUSES.

128. Every school receiving aid from the Board must have the inscription "Common School" placed conspicuously on the exterior of the building, and no other inscription shall be permitted excepting the distinguishing number of the school, or one or more of the following terms:—Male, female, infant, the proper name of the city, town, street, or locality in which the school may be situated, or the name of the founder; but in cases of denominational designations, employed to indicate the connection of the school with a church or place of religious worship, such as St. Paul's, St. Francis', and the like, which have been in use before the 17th March, 1869, or where the term National has been in use, the Board will not require their removal.

In no case, however, shall any part of such inscription be more prominent or conspicuous than the words "Common School."

129. The Board will not permit schools vested in them to be used as places of public worship, nor will they allow any common school to be used for political purposes; but under the provisions of the Electoral Act schools may be used as polling-places when required by the Returning Officer.

SCHOOL BOOKS AND REQUISITES.

130. The Board will provide such books and school requisites as they may deem necessary or fit for the use of common schools, and these will be furnished at as low a rate as possible to local committees and teachers. Local committees may require the scholars to pay for them, but not at prices higher than those charged by the Board, plus the cost of carriage.

131. The Board will publish from time to time a list of books in stock, for the information of local committees and teachers.

HOLIDAYS IN COMMON SCHOOLS.

132. The following shall be the holidays observed in common schools:—

(1.) All Saturdays and Sundays.

(2.) Such other holidays as shall be determined by the local committees, but which must not exceed thirty days in one year.

133. Half-holidays may be granted by local committees when they think fit, but they must be counted against the holidays allowed by the preceding rule.

134. In all cases holidays, other than public holidays, should be notified to the Inspector.

135. If the number of thirty days be infringed, a *pro rata* reduction will be made from the fixed salaries and augmentations of all the teachers, unless the excess of holidays shall have been sanctioned by the Board.

GENERAL.

136. No part of the four hours for secular instruction required by the 11th section of the Common Schools Act shall be set apart before nine o'clock in the morning, nor after five o'clock in the afternoon.

137. No social distinctions can be permitted in common schools. The schools are open to all classes of Her Majesty's subjects, and all scholars attending are equally the subjects of the bounty of the State, and receive the benefits afforded on a footing of perfect equality.

138. All letters should be addressed as under, and in all cases prepaid, unless when franked envelopes are supplied.

139. The appendices to these regulations may be revised by the Board from time to time.

140. The Board are empowered under the Common Schools Act; from time to time, with the sanction of the Governor in Council, to revoke or alter any of the foregoing regulations as it shall seem to them either expedient or necessary.

141. These general regulations shall, except where otherwise specified, commence and take effect on and after the first day of January, One thousand eight hundred and seventy.

No. CXLIX.—An Act for the better Maintenance and Establishment of Common Schools in Victoria.
[18th June, 1862.]

Preamble.	WHEREAS there are now existing in the Colony of Victoria two Boards for the regulation of public education And whereas it is expedient to provide for the better maintenance establishment and management of Common Schools under a uniform system Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Victoria in this present Parliament assembled and by the authority of the same as follows—
Repeal of 15 Vic. No. 7.	I. From and after the commencement of this Act an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of this colony made and passed in the fifteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty intituled " <i>An Act to incorporate the Board of Commissioners for National Education</i> " shall be and the same is hereby repealed Provided always that all the real and personal estate and property whatsoever now vested in the Board constituted by that Act for the purposes of such Act shall vest in the Board hereinafter created.
Denominational School Board dissolved.	II. From and after the commencement of this Act all powers vested in a certain Board appointed by His Excellency the Governor of New South Wales in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and forty-eight for the temporal regulation and inspection of the respective Denominational Schools of the colony within the district of Port Phillip and known as the Denominational School Board shall cease and determine and the said Board shall be and the same is hereby dissolved.
All lands &c. held for educational purposes to continue vested in trustees.	III. To frame general regulations for the inspection of schools and the examination and classification of teachers to determine upon the course of secular instruction to be adopted in the schools to fix and from time to time to alter as the Board may think fit the fees to be charged to parents of children attending the schools and generally to do everything that may be necessary for carrying into effect this Act according to the true intent thereof. 3. To recommend to the Governor in Council for appointment or removal of such officers as shall be deemed requisite for the proper carrying out of the regulations framed by them. 4. No new school not being an infant school shall receive aid from the consolidated revenue which shall be established within two miles of a school already receiving aid from the consolidated revenue unless there shall be such a number of pupils not being pupils of the first school whose parents shall undertake in writing that they shall attend the proposed school as with the average number of pupils in attendance for six months at the school already receiving aid shall amount to two hundred unless some natural obstacle shall intervene between the two schools which shall prevent the attendance of the pupils at such other school or unless one of the two schools shall be for boys alone and the other for girls alone Provided that no school shall be an infant school within the meaning of this clause unless all the pupils be under the age of eight years.
Four hours' secular instruction daily.	XI. In every school receiving aid from the consolidated revenue four hours shall be set apart during each school day for secular instruction alone and of such four hours two shall be before noon two after noon and shall in each case be consecutive.

XII. No applicant shall be refused admission to any school receiving aid from the consolidated revenue on account of the religious persuasion of such applicant. No religious test.

XIII. Children whose parents or guardians are in destitute circumstances and unable to pay the ordinary school fees shall be entitled to admission into any Common School receiving aid from the consolidated revenue under such regulations and on such conditions as the Board may think fit. Destitute children entitled to gratuitous education.

XIV. No school shall receive aid from the consolidated revenue unless it be under the management of a local committee of not less than five persons who shall be approved of by the Board of Education and whose names shall be published in the *Government Gazette* and also in some local newspaper if any. Provided that no teacher shall be appointed to or dismissed from such school whose qualifications shall not be approved of or dismissal sanctioned by the Board of Education. Appointment of teachers.

XV. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in this Act all teachers who have been classified under either of the Boards hitherto in existence and known as the National and Denominational School Boards shall be entitled without examination to a classification equal to that enjoyed by them under either of the aforesaid Boards. Classification of present teachers.

XVI. Notice of all applications for aid to new schools shall be published in the *Government Gazette* one month previous to such aid being granted. Aid to new schools.

XVII. No grant from the consolidated revenue shall be made in aid of buildings or repairing school premises unless the site of such premises shall have been vested for educational purposes in the Board of Education. Aid to buildings.

XVIII. It shall be lawful for the Board of Education from time to time to appoint and remove local committees and to establish schools in such localities as the Board shall deem fit subject to the provisions of this Act. Provided that no local committee shall be removed without the consent of the Governor in Council. Provided also that where a local committee shall have been appointed for any school previously to the commencement of this Act the same committee shall until removed in manner aforesaid continue and be the committee of the said school under this Act. Provided further that one month's notice shall be given in the *Government Gazette* of the intention of the Board to appoint or to remove any local committee. Board may appoint local committees.

XIX. It shall be lawful for the Board of Education to sell or otherwise dispose of all school property which shall be or become vested in them and to re-invest the proceeds of such sale or disposal in the purchase of land or in the erection of buildings for educational purposes under the provisions of this Act. Board may dispose of school property vested in them.

XX. After the thirty-first day of December One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two no school whose average attendance shall for a period of six months be below forty pupils and after the thirty-first day of December One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two no school within a municipal district whose average attendance shall for a period of six months be below sixty pupils shall receive aid from the consolidated revenue unless it shall be at a distance of not less than two miles from the nearest school receiving aid from the consolidated revenue or unless some natural obstacle shall intervene between the two schools which shall prevent the attendance of the pupils at such other school or unless one of the two schools shall be for boys alone and the other for girls alone or unless one of the two schools shall be an infant school within the definition of infant schools hereinbefore contained. Number of pupils necessary to entitle schools to receive aid after 31st December, 1862.

XXI. The Board shall in the month of January in each and every year lay before the Governor in Council a report of the condition of the schools under their supervision and a general statement of accounts and copies of such reports and statements and accounts shall be laid before both Houses of Parliament within one month if Parliament be then sitting and if Parliament be not then sitting then within one month after the commencement of the next ensuing session thereof. Annual Report to be laid before Governor in Council and Parliament.

XXII. This Act shall commence and take effect from and after the first day of September One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two. Commencement of Act.

UPPER SIXTH CLASS.

Children above Fourteen.

- Reading.*—To read with fluency an ordinary book or newspaper, prose or poetry, and understand the subjects read.
Spelling.—To write from dictation, with correct spelling and fair punctuation, any ordinary paragraph from a newspaper.
Writing.—To write the dictation in a fair and neat running or mercantile hand.
Arithmetic.—To proportion, simple and compound, practice, vulgar and decimal fractions.
Grammar.—Syntax, and prefixes, affixes, roots, and derivations given in Morell, or equivalent, and analysis of an easy sentence.
Geography.—Of the world generally.
Needlework, for Girls.—To put work together, and do any kind of plain needlework, and darn and knit.

*Any class may be examined in a reading book higher than that set forth above, at the desire of the teacher, and each class is liable to examination in the subjects of any of the classes below it.

APPENDIX C.

PROGRAMME OF EXAMINATION FOR CERTIFICATES OF COMPETENCY, AND OF HONORS, AND FOR PUPIL-TEACHERS.

FIRST DIVISION OF COMPETENCY FOR HEAD TEACHERS OF SCHOOLS IN WHICH ONE OR MORE ASSISTANTS ARE EMPLOYED.

Reading.—To read fluently, and with proper expression and emphasis, both prose and poetry.

Writing and Composition.—To be able to write from dictation, with correct spelling and punctuation, from an ordinary book or newspaper, and to compose a short essay on some given subject from, or reproduce the substance of, some lesson in the Fourth or Fifth Book.

Grammar.—Morell's Grammar and Analysis.

Geography.—Descriptive geography of the four continents, Australasia, and Victoria, and to have a fair knowledge of the products, governments, and manners of the various nations, and the mathematical and physical geography or Sullivan's "Geography Generalized," or equivalent.

Arithmetic.—The simple and compound rules, practice, proportion, interest, principles of mental arithmetic, vulgar and decimal fractions, elements of book-keeping. Females to mental arithmetic only, inclusive.

Art of Teaching—Penmanship.—To set fair copy head-lines, in large and small hands.

Time-table.—To draw up a time-table.

Notes of a Lesson.—To compose the notes of a lesson.

School Management.—To give a collective lesson in the presence of the Inspector, and to keep all classes fully employed in accordance with the time-table and in proper discipline.

SECOND DIVISION OF COMPETENCY FOR HEAD TEACHERS OF SCHOOLS IN WHICH NO ASSISTANTS ARE EMPLOYED, AND FOR ASSISTANT TEACHERS.

Reading.—To read clearly, fluently, and with proper emphasis.

Writing and Composition.—To write from memory neatly, with correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation, the substance of a short narrative read aloud.

Grammar.—To parse an easy sentence in prose.

Geography.—The elements of mathematical and physical geography, and the principal features on the maps of the World, Europe, Australasia, and Victoria.

Arithmetic.—The simple and compound rules, practice, proportion, principles of mental arithmetic, interest, vulgar and decimal fractions. Females to mental arithmetic only, inclusive.

Art of Teaching.—To give a satisfactory lesson to a class in reading, writing, arithmetic, grammar, or geography; to understand class drill, and to keep a class in order, attention, and activity.

FOR THE THIRD CLASS.

Reading.—To read the Irish National Board's Fourth Book of Lessons, or some book equivalent to it, with fluency and proper emphasis, and to be acquainted with the subjects contained in the Third Book (or equivalent), except stories, fables, and poetry.

Writing and Composition.—To write from dictation, neatly and in a small hand, with correct spelling and fair punctuation, any passage from the Fourth Book of Lessons, or its equivalent.

Grammar.—To know the first part and first two chapters of the second part of Morell's Grammar, or their equivalent.

Geography.—The geography of Australasia.

Arithmetic.—To know simple proportion and practice, with the elements of mental arithmetic.

Art of Teaching.—(1.) Ability to give a class a reading lesson, and to examine on the meaning of what has been read.

(2.) Ability to drill a class in marching and exercises, and to conduct it through the movements necessary for preserving order.

Needlework.—Girls to instruct the younger ones in sewing and knitting.

FOR THE SECOND CLASS.

Reading.—To read with fluency and proper emphasis; to know the subjects of the Irish National Board's Fourth Book of Lessons, or its equivalent.

Writing.—To write from memory, neatly and in small-hand, with correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation, the substance of a narrative read aloud.

Grammar.—To know the first two parts of Morell's Grammar, or their equivalent, and the elements of parsing.

Geography.—The geography of Europe, and the first four chapters of Sullivan's "Geography Generalized," or equivalent.

* Scholars who have passed the examination for the fifth class in the Programme Appendix B, will be qualified for fourth-class pupil-teachers without undergoing this examination.

Arithmetic.—To vulgar and decimal fractions, and mental arithmetic.

Art of Teaching.—To teach a class the rudiments of grammar and arithmetic, and to keep the class in attention, order, and activity.

Needlework.—Girls to exhibit increased skill in needlework.

FOR THE FIRST CLASS.

Reading.—To read with ease and expression either prose or poetry, and to know the subjects of the Fifth Book of Lessons, or its equivalent.

Writing and Composition.—To write from memory, neatly and in small hand, with correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation, the substance of an easy essay previously read.

Grammar.—The whole of Morell's Grammar, or its equivalent.

Geography.—The geography of the world, and the mathematical and physical geography of Sullivan's "Geography Generalized," or its equivalent.

Arithmetic.—To vulgar and decimal fractions, interest, mental arithmetic, and the elements of book-keeping.

Art of Teaching.—Ability to give a gallery lesson.

Needlework.—Girls to exhibit some skill in fancy work, and to do plain work well.

APPENDIX D.

MUSIC AND DRAWING.

EXAMINATION OF TEACHERS OF MUSIC AND DRAWING.—PROGRAMMES OF EXAMINATION.

Certificates will be granted to teachers of music and drawing upon examination.

Teachers will be classified in two divisions, viz., Second Division of Competency, First Division of Competency, according to the details set forth in the following programmes:—

Programme of Examination of Teachers of Music.

Second Division.

Reading.—To read at sight an exercise consisting of diatonic intervals, easy modulations only being admitted.

Writing.—To write a short and simple passage composed of minims sung in the presence of the candidate.

Theory of Music.—Notation in the various clefs, time, accent, the major and minor scales, the common chord and its inversions.

Teaching.—To be able to teach a class properly.

First Division.

Reading.—To read at sight any ordinary passage from an oratorio or opera.

Writing.—To write in correct time an ordinary passage from an oratorio or opera.

Theory of Music.—To know the theory and practice of harmony and thorough bass, and to understand the formation of the voice.

Teaching.—To be able to teach a class properly. To produce a class taught by the candidate for a period of twelve months which shall pass a satisfactory examination.

Programme of Examination of Teachers of Drawing.

Second Division.

Drawing from the Flat.—Pure outline of geometric form. Outline of human head.

Drawing from the Round, with light and shade.—A geometric solid. A group of common things, such as vases, lamps, &c.

Perspective.—An elementary knowledge.

Practical Geometry.—Polygons, circle, ellipse.

Teaching.—To be able to teach a class properly.

First Division.

Drawing from the Flat.—Pure outline of geometric form. Outline of human head. To copy a given lithograph.

Drawing from the Round, with light and shade.—Plaster model of head, hand, or foot of human figure.

Perspective.—First six lessons of Burchett's Perspective, or its equivalent.

Practical Geometry.—Gleig's series, or its equivalent.

Teaching.—To be able to teach a class properly, and to produce a class taught by the candidate for twelve months which can pass a satisfactory examination.

APPENDIX E.

SYLLABUS OF SUBJECTS ON WHICH CANDIDATES IN TRAINING WILL BE EXAMINED.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

Persons desiring admission to training must be examined and pass in the following subjects:—

Reading with tolerable fluency.

Spelling, from dictation, with tolerable correctness.

Pennmanship.—To write a fair running-hand.

Grammar.—To know the parts of speech, the cases of nouns, and the tenses and moods of verbs, and to know the government of the verb and nominative case, the verb and objective, and the syntax of adjectives.

Geography.—The outlines of the map of the World.

Arithmetic.—The four simple rules.

Teaching.—To manifest some natural ability therein.

FIRST YEAR.

Reading and Repetition from Memory.

To read a passage in prose, and another in verse, with a distinct utterance, and due attention to the punctuation and just expression, [Each candidate must have learned at least 300 lines of poetry, some of which he will be called upon to repeat.]

Penmanship.

1. To write a specimen of the penmanship used in setting copies of text-hand and small-hand.
2. The general character of the writing in the examination papers.

Composition.

1. To convert a passage of poetry into the order of prose, and to paraphrase part of it.
2. To write plain prose upon a given subject.

Grammar.

1. The elements of grammar, including orthography, etymology, and elementary syntax.
2. To parse a simple passage from the first book of Wordsworth's "Excursion."

Geography.

1. To be able to draw and describe the maps of the four quarters of the globe, and of Australia, Tasmania, and New Zealand.
2. To answer questions on the physical, political, and commercial geography of one quarter of the globe, the particular quarter being named to the candidates six months prior to examination.

Arithmetic.

1. To work sums, both mentally and on paper.
2. To prove the rules and exhibit a knowledge of their principles.

School Management.

1. To answer questions on the methods of instruction in reading, spelling, writing, and other elementary subjects.
2. To draw up time-tables for use in a school under given circumstances.

History.

The outlines of the History of England.

Euclid.

The first two books, with simple propositions deducible therefrom.

Drawing.

The candidate may select any two of the following exercises, but not more than two.

1. Drawing free-hand from flat examples.
2. Linear geometry by aid of instruments.
3. Linear perspective.
4. Shaded drawing, from objects.
5. Objects from memory.

Vocal Music.

1. Notation in the treble and bass clefs, time, accent, and the major and minor scales.
2. To write down in correct time short and simple passages played in the presence of the candidate.

APPENDIX G.

INSTRUCTIONS TO INSPECTORS OF COMMON SCHOOLS.

- The year is divided into two terms, commencing on 1st January and 1st July respectively. During each half-year an average of 27 hours per week must be given, irrespective of all other work, to effective inspection in schools and the travelling necessary to pass from one school to another.
- The schools are divided into three schedules—
 - Schools accessible for inspection from home within the day.
 - Schools accessible only on tours of inspection.
 - Such distant and inaccessible schools as the Board may, from year to year, place in this schedule.
- You will be required to visit and examine for results each school in your district once in each year, at the times specified in your programme. You will give at least two or three days' notice of such visits, specifying, if possible, the exact day ; and if, from bad weather or other reasonable causes, more children are absent from school than is ordinarily the case, you may allow the teacher two, or at most three, hours to assemble his scholars. You will, however, in all such cases, assure yourself that those who are thus brought in are *bonâ fide* attendants of the school. You will not visit any school for results during the month of January.
- You will also be required to pay an additional visit to, and report upon Form H, all schools in Schedules A and B. You will make these visits as unexpectedly as possible.
- You will not omit visiting any school in your district in consequence of hearing reports that it has been closed or withdrawn from its connection with the Board. You will go to the place and make enquiry into the circumstances, reporting upon them, and also upon the school and records so far as may be possible, which must also be done in the case of schools

unexpectedly closed at the time of your visit. This rule will not, however, prevent your deferring or altering the time of your visit, should such a course appear desirable, subject to the approval of the Board.

6. Schools in Schedule C need only be visited once in the year, unless special instructions to the contrary are received; but a complete inspection, in addition to the examination, will have to be made at that visit.

7. As many abuses may be prevented or corrected by incidental visits to schools, you will be required to make as many such as possible, noting specially whether former suggestions have been attended to, whether the school records are reliable and in proper order, and the Board's rules observed, and reporting in all cases on Form H 2.

8. When, from unavoidable causes—and such must be clearly accounted for—you may not be able to complete the inspection of all schools within the term, you will, in the succeeding term, visit those first which may have been so left in arrear. Any departure from this rule, or the existence of arrears, unless accounted for as above, will be regarded as a serious neglect of duty.

9. You will not visit schools during the ordinary vacation or on any specified holidays, and you will be required to make yourself acquainted, in the case of every school in which the latter are observed, with the days alluded to, and to see that they are specified in the time-table. (The names of the holidays need not be entered; the dates will suffice.)

10. When two schools are in the same house, or immediately contiguous, you should not defer visiting the second until you have completed your inspection of the first; but you should pass rapidly from one to the other, remaining in or returning afterwards to the one you mean first to examine.

11. You will be expected, consistently with the above instructions, so to arrange your travelling that the least possible time available for inspection may be expended in passing from school to school, and the most possible to actual inspection.

12. On entering a school with a view to its inspection, and after having introduced yourself to the teacher, if a stranger, or, if otherwise, having suitably addressed him—

- (1.) You will note in the Inspector's Register the time of your entrance, and, immediately before leaving, you will note the time of your departure.
- (2.) You should observe whether the business which is going on corresponds with that assigned to that particular hour on the time-table, and generally whether the course of instruction set forth on that document is judiciously arranged, and above all, whether the arrangements which it indicates are really carried out in practice.
- (3.) You should then examine the records and accounts, and in every case where you have reason to suspect unfaithfulness or incorrectness, adopt the most effective means in your power, compatible with due delicacy towards the teacher, and his position in relation to the children, to ascertain the nature and amount of the irregularity.
- (4.) The state of the school in regard to furniture and apparatus, and the supply of books, slates, and other requisites in the hands of the children should next be attended to.
- (5.) Observation of the teaching, and generally of the tone and spirit pervading the school, should follow; also, whether the bearing, manners, and language of the teacher, his command over his pupils, and their deportment towards him, be such as ought to be observed.
- (6.) Having prepared, or, if this has been done by the teacher, revised, the list of children, you should next proceed with the examination.
- (7.) Observation and enquiries needed for the purely statistical part of your report, also as to the nature and state of repairs of the buildings and furniture, nature and amount of extra instruction given to pupil-teachers or monitors, and other matters for the completion of your report, should be made at such times after the examination, and in such order, as may be most convenient.

N.B.—When the visit is for examination for results only, much of the above will be omitted; but the time-table, accounts, and records should always be examined, and anything in them, or otherwise in connection with the school, which may call for special remark, should be reported on Form H 2.

13. In your intercourse with the teachers you are to treat them with the utmost kindness and respect, counselling them privately on whatever you may deem defective or faulty, but by no means addressing them authoritatively or animadverting on their conduct in the hearing of the pupils. To the pupils also you are to exhibit a considerate and affectionate manner, carefully guarding against peevishness, harshness, or abruptness in your communications with them; and should the exercise of discipline be necessary, it should invariably be through the teacher.

14. After the inspection, you will point out and explain to the teacher any faults and differences you may have observed, and will generally advise him where necessary and desirable, marking in the Inspector's Register such entries as may be required for the guidance of the teacher, or for your own information at subsequent visits. This will be independent of the summary forwarded to the Correspondent from the office.

15. You will report to the Board the result of each inspection within fourteen days of its being made; you will use every care and diligence in ascertaining the state of instruction, discipline, organization, and the methods pursued in every school you inspect, and you will record the results on forms G, H, or H 2.

16. In performance of your duty as Inspector of Common Schools under the Board of Education, you will bear in mind that the Board's superintendence extends only to the temporal regulation and secular efficiency of schools. You will therefore carefully avoid all interference or expression of opinion either to the teacher or local committee respecting their arrangements, if they have any, for imparting religious instruction.

17. You will be careful, however, to report to the Board, without delay, any infraction of the XI. section of the Common Schools Act.

18. You will enquire into and report on applications for aid to new schools, and special references at such times as the course of your inspection brings you into the neighborhood in question, unless you are specially instructed to pay an earlier visit.

19. When applications for aid to new schools are referred to you, you are to have an interview with the applicant, and also communicate with the inhabitants in the neighborhood, with a view of ascertaining their opinions on the application, and whether they have any, and what, objections thereto. In reporting on new schools you will use the forms contained in Appendix F.

20. You will supply the Board of Education with such information respecting localities in your district as they may from time to time require, and act as their agent in all matters in which they may employ you; but you are not invested with authority to decide upon any question affecting the establishment of, or withdrawal of aid from, a Common School.

21. You will keep a diary of all your transactions in connection with the Board, a copy of which you will forward weekly (i.e., on Saturday) to the office, in the form supplied by the Board.

22. At the end of each year you will prepare an annual report upon the condition of education in your district, which will, at the discretion of the Board, be published as an Appendix to their Annual Report.

23. In each year you will attend at the office of the Board, with the view of conferring with the other officers of the Board upon the improvements which might be made in matters pertaining to inspection generally.

24. You will not leave your district without the permission of the Board.

25. You are expected to avoid all indiscreet discussion of religious or political subjects, and scrupulously to avoid everything calculated to lessen confidence in your own impartiality, or detract from the influence of the Board under which you are employed.

26. In all your correspondence with the office, whether employed in drawing up your ordinary reports or making out returns of whatever kind, you should express yourself with clearness and precision, and in plain and legible handwriting, and all statistical returns should be carefully checked.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1862* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold-field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold-fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common, respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim or increase (as the case may be) the Commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land a farmers' common; when one-eighth part of any agricultural area has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim any unselected and unleased portion of such agricultural area, not exceeding twice the quantity so selected and leased, to be a temporary common for the use of such selectors and lessees; and it is also enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now reciting Act: Now therefore I, the Governor

of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above recited Act, that is to say:—

WAHRING AGRICULTURAL AREA COMMON.—The Wahring Agricultural Area Temporary Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 6th day of April, 1868, is hereby increased, by adding thereto the allotments and parts of allotments of land hereinafter enumerated, and comprising an area of 4055 acres, more or less, viz.:—Parish of Wahring, allotment 9a, part of allotment 9b, allotment 18, parts of allotments 25a, 25b, 26, 27b, allotments 33, 41, 42, 44, 46b, 47a, part of allotment 47b, allotments 49, 50, 51, 51a, 51b, 51c, 54, 54a, 54b, 54c, 55, 56, 57, 57a, 65, and parts of allotments 66a, 67, 68a, 68b, and 69b.—(69.T.15255.)

PITFIELD CEMETERY.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE PITFIELD GENERAL CEMETERY.

THE cemetery shall be open to the public daily from sunrise to sunset.

2. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

3. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

4. Orders of interment to be given at the office of the trustees; such notice to be given before the hour of five p.m. the previous day.

5. Application for permission to make a vault or erect a monument to be made at the office of the trustees; a certificate of permission will be granted to the party applying for such permission on payment of the proper charges.

6. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on a certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relatives or friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

7. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but the parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to

construct them under the direction of the trustees; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent, in writing, of the party entitled thereto, must be left with the order.

8. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased must be stated at the time of giving the order.

9. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from ten a.m. to six p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from ten a.m. to four p.m. in the other four months.

10. All monuments, vaults, graves, and grave-stones to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

11. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered in to the satisfaction of the trustees.

12. A plan of every monument or tombstone proposed to be erected and placed, shall be exhibited to the said trustees before permission for the erection thereof is given, and the said trustees shall be at liberty to withhold such permission and prevent the erection of any monument or tombstone which shall appear to them inappropriate or unbecoming, and shall determine and fix the position of any monument or tombstone which may be proposed to be erected, according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan of ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner.

13. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in duty on behalf of the trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

14. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, is kept at the office, and a register of all grants is kept by the secretary.

15. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.
