THE SUBDIVISIONS OF THE ECHUCA ROAD DISTRICT.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the thirteenth day of October, 1869.

WHEREAS by The Local Government Act 1863 it is amongst other things enacted that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board for any

original or proclaimed district (hereinafter sometimes called "single district"), the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall, within three months after the receipt of the same, divide the district into two or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions (hereinafter called subdivisions), by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the eighth day of February, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, a road district was proclaimed under the designation of "The Echuca Road District." And whereas by another Proclamation bearing date the twenty-second day of June, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, the said road district was enlarged: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by not less than twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said road district, praying for the division of the same into subdivisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order divide the Echuca Road District into two separate electoral subdivisions in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned, to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

THE EASTERN SUBDIVISION.—Commencing at the junction of the Goulburn and Murray rivers, and bounded on the north and east by the Murray and the Owens rivers to the junction of Peechelba and Killewarra runs; and thence by the boundaries of Peechelba, Saint James, Yabba-yabba, Katandra, and Tallygroomna, including those runs, and by the Goulburn River to the point of commencement.

THE WESTERN SUBDIVISION.—Commencing at the junction of the Campaspe River with the northern boundary of allotment 4, section 8, parish of Elmore, and by the northern boundaries of allotments 4, 5, and 1, to the north-west angle of allotment 1 of the same parish; thence southerly six chains eighty-three links by the western boundary of the said allotment 1; thence about eleven hundred and sixty-six chains by a line 27° 30' the bearings here and hereinafter described being right-handed from true north, to a line 8° 30' from the south-west angle of allotment 12, section 20, Huntly parish; thence in that last direction to Mount Hope Creek, and by that creek to its junction with Kow Swamp, and by the eastern margin of Kow Swamp to its junction with a creek which bears from the said junction with Mount Hope Creek about 29°; thence easterly by the creek last reached to its junction with a creek running by Wanilla and Rowan's Seventeen-mile Hut; thence north-westerly by the last creek to a creek leading easterly to the Murray River, called on old maps Yuluk Creek (the distance between the last four points of junction would be in straight lines about 8, 5, and 3 miles respectively); thence by the Murray and Goulburn rivers to the junction of the Goulburn River with the north boundary of Ardpatrick run; thence by a straight line to the south-east angle of Rochester village reserve, and by the southern boundary of that reserve and the Campaspe River to the point of commencement.

And the Honorable Francis Longmore, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Australia, N.E. Coast, Chart 2354, Sheet 21, Shellburne Bay.

NUMEROUS Reefs have been discovered in this Bay, situated between the Macarthur Islands and the main land, entirely closing the channel which at present appears to exist there on the Admiralty Chart.

Vessels passing this way are therefore warned not to pass to the westward of a line drawn from the centre of Round Point to the centre of Hannibal Island, and extended from that to the mainland.

Raine Island Entrance, and the Blackwood Channel.

Vessels using this entrance will find a good guide for clearing the middle bank and Salamander Patch, in getting the summit of the centre, Sir Charles Hardy Island, to bear S.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., taking care not to go to the northward of that line of bearing.

Chart 2353, Sheet 20, Lloyd Bay, Melanie Reef.

A sunken Reef, having one fathom at low water on it, has been found in the north part of this Bay, and has been named the "Melanie Reef."

Melanie Reef is situated in latitude 12 degrees 39 minutes 30 seconds S., and longitude 143 degrees 27 minutes 40 seconds E.

Edwards Reef.

A similar Reef has been found in the south part of the Bay, and has been named the "Edwards Reef."

Edwards Reef is situated latitude 12 degrees 48 minutes 20 seconds S., and longitude 143 degrees 29 minutes 40 seconds E.

These Reefs are three cables in diameter. It is believed that, on further searches being made, more reefs of a similar nature will be found in this Bay, vessels passing should keep on the recommended Admiralty course.

SPECIAL NIGHT SIGNALS, NEW PLYMOUTH.

From the Shore.

A Boat will come off.—Two red lights vertical (instead of white lights, as appointed by the General Harbor Regulations 1863.) See Notes A and B.

From Vessels in the Roadstead.

A Pilot wanted.—Two white lights horizontal, with one red over, forming a triangle. See Notes A and B.

SPECIAL NIGHT SIGNALS, WAITARA.

From the Shore.

Take the Bar.—Two red lights, vertical. See Notes A and C.
Bar Dangerous.—Two lights vertical, red over white. See Notes A and D.

From Vessels off the Waitara.

Want to come in before Daylight.—Two white lights horizontal, with one red over, forming a triangle. See Note B.

NOTE A.

In all signals described in the general regulations and in these special regulations as two lights vertical (of whatever color), the two lights will be so arranged as to serve for leading lights, the upper light on the flagstaff in each case, and the lower light at some distance in front of it.

At New PLYMOUTH the two lights will appear vertical when a vessel is in the line of the anchorage, the flagstaff bearing S. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. magnetic.

At the WAITARA the two lights will appear vertical when the centre of the channel is in line with the flagstaff, the post carrying the lower light being shifted in accordance with the shifting of the channel.

The ordinary signal "Wait for Daylight," white over red, will be kept up when vessels are expected or are seen approaching the ports of New Plymouth and Waitara.

NOTE B.

Vessels approaching New Plymouth at night and requiring a pilot, or approaching the Waitara and wanting to come in before daylight, should fire a gun and burn blue lights, if possible, to secure attention.

NOTE C.

The signal "Take the Bar" will not be shown except in answer to a signal from the vessel "Cannot wait" or "Cannot keep to sea" (see General Regulations), unless there is reason to expect very bad weather before morning.

In that case it will be put up as soon as the bar is fit to take, but masters of vessels must in all cases use their own judgment as to whether they will come in by night or not.

When the signal "Cannot wait" or "Cannot keep to sea" is made from a vessel approaching the Waitara at night before the tide serves for the bar, it will be acknowledged by covering the lower light of the signal which is up at the flagstaff for a short time. The signal "Take Bar" will then be made as soon as the tide serves; but if there is any great risk in coming in, the signal "Bar dangerous" will be hoisted immediately before "Take the Bar," and the two together will mean that the tide is right but the bar is unsafe.

NOTE D.

The signal "Bar dangerous" means, either that the bar is rough, or that a strong fresh is running out.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1862* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold-field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold-fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common, respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim, increase, or diminish (as the case may be) the Commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

BUNDALAGUAH FARMERS' COMMON.—The Bundalaguh Farmers' Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 15th day of July, 1861, is hereby diminished by deducting therefrom the portion thereof lying north-west of a line drawn from the south angle of allotment 39b, in the parish of Bundalaguh, and bearing S. 63° 10' W. to the River McAlister, comprising an area of about six hundred acres: as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(69.T.7018.)

MAFFRA TOWN COMMON.—The unappropriated Crown land within the town of Maffra, and within the boundaries hereinafter described, shall be and constitute a Town Common for the use of all householders of the said town, viz.: Commencing on the left bank of the River McAlister at the point where the south boundary of the town of Maffra abuts thereon; thence by that boundary bearing east eight chains, more or less, to the north-west angle of allotment 40a, parish of Bundalaguh; thence by allotments 40a, 40b, 39a, and 39b, bearing south-

WHEREAS by the *Amending Land Act 1865*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land a farmers' common; when one-eighth part of any agricultural area has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim any unselected and unleased portion of such agricultural area, not exceeding twice the quantity so selected and leased, to be a temporary common for the use of such selectors and lessees; and it is also enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now reciting Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above recited Act, that is to say:—

If from any cause injury would accrue to the public service by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of station, will have the power to reject such articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense (if any) will be charged as in condition 6.

8. A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

9. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

10. In the event of any alteration in the Tariff affecting any of the items included in these Contracts, the Government, or the contractor, as the case may be, will make a proportionate allowance by way of deduction from or increase of, the price of the item so affected.

11. It will be competent for the Secretary to the Tender Board on behalf of the Government, or the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three full calendar months; it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made.
