MINING OPERATIONS WITHIN RESERVED LANDS AUTHORIZED.

THE Governor in Council, in pursuance of the 15th section of the *Mining Statute* 1865, has authorized the holders generally of miners' rights to mine on and within the reserve known as the Talbot Racecourse, situate at Black Creek, Amherst, and particularly described in a notice published in the *Government Gazette* of 24th December, 1861, page 2478, subject to the conditions, restrictions, and limitations hereinafter mentioned, namely:-

1. The extent of claims allowed shall be such as is prescribed by the bye-laws of the district for the class of mining operations required.

2. The surface of the ground shall not be occupied for purposes of residence.

3. During the progress of mining operations, all excavations and heaps of headings shall be securely enclosed by a substantial fence.

4. The workings shall be open at all times to the inspection of any mining surveyor or other officer authorized, in writing, by the Minister of Mines, and in cases where the mining surveyor or other authorized officer is required to descend the shafts and inspect the drives, the expenses of such inspection shall be paid by the persons authorized to mine.

5. No shafts shall be sunk nor underground workings allowed within fifty feet of the running ground.

6. Before commencing mining operations, the persons authorized to mine shall pay into the hands of the receiver and paymaster of the district, for each acre of ground taken up, the sum of Five pounds sterling, as a guarantee that they will observe and fulfil these conditions.

7. All shafts and drives shall be timbered in the usual manner, and on the discontinuance of mining operations the persons authorized to mine as aforesaid, shall notify to the mining surveyor of the division their intention to abandon their claim and shall then, in the presence of the mining surveyor, fill in all shafts on the ground worked by them to his satisfaction, leaving all timber and props in the drives and shafts, and thereupon the mining surveyor shall give a certificate to that effect, and on the production of such certificate to the receiver and paymaster, one moiety of the deposit shall be payable to the holder thereof, and the other moiety shall be payable after the expiration of twelve months following, on the production of a certificate from the mining surveyor that all depressions have been levelled by the person or persons presenting it; but if any of the conditions herein be not fulfilled—of which the warden shall be the sole judge—then the whole of one or both moieties of the deposit shall be forfeited.

8. The Minister of Mines, or any person by him authorized in writing, shall have at any time power to order the immediate discontinuance of any mining operations within the reserve.

9. In case any person or persons so mining shall in any way violate any of the above conditions, all sums of money deposited by him or them by way of guarantee, shall be forfeited, and it shall not be lawful for him or them to mine any longer within the limits of the reserve aforesaid.

BALLARAT MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAW OF THE MINING BOARD OF THE MINING DISTRICT OF BALLARAT, No. VIII.

AT a meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Ballarat, begun and holden at Ballarat, in the said district, on the sixth day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, it is ordained by the said Board as follows, that is to say:—

1. *Repealing clause.*—The clause numbered 24 of the bye-law of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Ballarat, published in the *Government Gazette* on the 17th day of August, 1866, numbered III., and the clause numbered 3 of the bye-law of the mining board aforesaid, published in the *Government Gazette* on the 19th day of May, 1868, and numbered V. shall be and the same are hereby repealed, always saving and excepting the rights of persons thereunder and existing prior to and at the time of this bye-law coming into operation.

2. *Claims may be held in reserve.*—When any person or company holding a claim requires to suspend operations thereon for the purpose of procuring, erecting, or repairing machinery, or when by reason of any influx of water, or any other sufficient cause the works upon a claim are unavoidably suspended, such person or company, or some person duly authorized in his or their behalf, may make a statutory declaration in the form in the schedule numbered 8 to the bye-law hereinbefore mentioned numbered III., setting forth fully the reasons for desiring to suspend, or the cause of having suspended the works upon the claim, and shall deliver such declaration to the mining registrar; and the said registrar shall, upon the receipt of such declaration, register such claim to be held in reserve and unworked for any period not exceeding three months; and shall deliver to the person or company aforesaid, a notice in the form in the schedule numbered 9 to the bye-law hereinbefore mentioned numbered III., stating that such claim is protected from forfeiture for a certain period to be named therein, and it shall be the duty of such person or company to cause such notice to be posted on some conspicuous part of the claim or claims to which it relates during the term of the protection; and at the expiration of such term such protection may be renewed for a further term of three months, the proceedings to be had in the case of renewal being in every respect similar to the proceedings to be had as aforesaid in obtaining protection in the first instance; and provided the causes or reasons assigned in such declaration be true and sufficient, any claim or claims which shall have been registered as aforesaid, shall, during the time of such protection be exempt from fine or forfeiture for non-performance of work.

3. *Special protection.*—In the event of any company or persons now holding a claim being unable to collect from the holders of the shares or interests in such claim the calls necessary for prosecuting the works upon such claim, and in the event of the market value of a share or interest in such claim being less than the amount of capital called up in respect of such share or interest, then (that is to say upon the conjunction of both the events aforesaid), on production of a statutory declaration made in the form hereinbefore mentioned by the manager of a company, or by any other person duly authorized in that behalf, to the effect that such company or persons are unable to collect calls necessary for carrying on the operations upon such claim, and that the shares or interests respectively in such claims cannot be sold for so much money as has been called up in respect of each such share or interest, the mining registrar shall register the claim of such company or persons to be held in reserve and unworked for any period not exceeding six months, and every such registration shall be deemed a special protection to such company or persons as aforesaid, and provided the statements contained in the declaration be true the claim shall be exempt from fine or forfeiture for non-performance of work during the continuance of such special protection: Provided

always that all claims held at the date on which this bye-law becomes law shall in the events aforesaid be entitled to such special protection, notwithstanding the title to such claim shall hereafter be or have been assigned, transferred, re-registered, or otherwise dealt with.

4. *Events in which mining tenements shall be forfeitable.*—Any claim or other mining tenement (except a residence or business area) upon or in connection with which work shall not be *bond fide* commenced within fourteen days after completion of the registration thereof, or any claim or other mining tenement as aforesaid upon which work having been commenced shall (except as provided in the clauses thereof numbered respectively 2 and 3, and in the clause numbered 4 of the bye-law hereinbefore mentioned numbered V.) be suspended for a space of fourteen days, or any claim or other mining tenement as aforesaid which shall be held in reserve and unworked under protection registration (as provided in the clause hereof numbered 2), if it shall appear to a court of competent jurisdiction that the reasons assigned in the declaration under which such protection registration was obtained were insufficient, or that the declaration under which such protection registration was obtained was untrue, or any claim or other mining tenement as aforesaid which shall be held in reserve and unworked under special protection registration (as provided in the clause hereof numbered 3), if it shall appear to a court of competent jurisdiction that the declaration under which such special protection registration was obtained was untrue, shall in any or either of the cases aforesaid be forfeitable, and may by a competent court be declared forfeited; provided always that such court may for the first offence inflict by way of fine in lieu of forfeiture a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

NOTE.—The Melbourne Hospital is in Melbourne Proper, the Benevolent Asylum in North Melbourne and Carlton, the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum in Jika-jika parish (remainder of), and the Industrial Schools in South Yarra and Prahran.

* This calculation is made upon the population at the last census, instead of the present population, as there are no means of estimating the changes which have taken place in the different sub-districts since the census was taken. It is believed that the present population of the whole district of Melbourne and suburbs amounts to 175,000. If this be correct, the mortality of the month under review would indicate a proportion of 1.70 deaths to every 1000 persons living.

The mortality of Melbourne and suburbs, together with the mean temperature in the shade and the mean atmospheric pressure, during the month of September for the last ten years, were as follow:—

More deaths occurred in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of September, 1869, than in the same month of any of the nine previous years. The least mortality in any September during that term was in 1864, when the deaths were fewer by 90 than they were in the month under review.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory was 77.8° on the 15th, and the lowest was 34° on the 6th. The mean temperature of the month was 1.2° below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (36.8°) took place on the 25th, viz.:—from a maximum of 76.8° to a minimum of 40°. The least range (10.4°) was on the 17th, viz.:—from a maximum of 62.6° to a minimum of 52.2°.

Males contributed 58 per cent. and females 42 per cent. to the total mortality. Children under 5 years of age contributed 33 per cent. against against 37 per cent. in September, 1868; 40 per cent. in September, 1867; 41 per cent. in September, 1866; 51

per cent. in September, 1865; 38 per cent. in September, 1864; 33 per cent. in September, 1863; 43 per cent. in September, 1862; 40 per cent. in September, 1861; and 53 per cent. in September, 1860.

As many as 12 persons over 75 years of age died during the month. Of these, no fewer than 8 were octogenarians, viz.:—A female, aged 80, 2 females, aged 81, a female, aged 83, a male, aged 84, and a male, aged 88, who died of old age; a male, aged 83, who died of injury to the skull; and a female, aged 83, who died of paralysis. The remaining 4 were between 75 and 80, viz.:—Three males, aged respectively 77, 78, and 79, who died of old age; and a female, aged 77, who died of nervous debility.

The deaths from external causes numbered 14, of which 2 were attributed to suicide and the remainder to accident. Of the suicidal deaths, one was that of a member of the Civil Service who poisoned himself with opium, and the other was that of a gentleman, confined in the Cremorne Lunatic Asylum, who strangled himself. The following is an account of the accidental deaths:—A male child, aged 2½, was killed by a stone window-sill falling upon him; a bricklayer, aged 14, died of a fractured skull caused by a fall; a coachbuilder, aged 21, of an injury to the spine; a compositor, aged 28, of a fracture of the neck caused by diving into shallow water whilst bathing; a female, aged 35, of extravasation of blood on the brain resulting from a fall; a cabdriver, aged 38, of fracture of the ribs caused by a fall from his cab; a male, aged 83, of an old injury to the skull; a male, aged 21, of tetanus caused by a rusty nail running into the foot; a carrier, aged 46, of a wound in the leg; and a plasterer, aged 71, of a burn received whilst drunk. A female infant, aged 4 days, was suffocated in bed; and a female infant, aged 1 month, was suffocated in the mother's arms.

Sixty-eight deaths, or nearly 23 per cent. of the whole, occurred in public institutions, viz.:—44 in the Melbourne Hospital, 3 in the Lying-in Hospital, 11 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Immigrants' Home, 1 in the Immigration Hospital, 3 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 2 in the Carlton Lunatic Asylum, 1 in St. Vincent de Paul's Orphanage, and 1 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 98, of which 50, or about 51 per cent., were of males, and 48, or nearly 49 per cent., were of females; of those dying, 60 were under one year of age, 17 were between one and two years, 11 were between two and three, 5 were between three and four, and 5 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 199, of which 122, or about 61 per cent., were males, and 77, or nearly 39 per cent., were females; 15 were between five and ten, 6 were between ten and fifteen, 5 were between fifteen and twenty, 7 were between twenty and twenty-five, 14 were between twenty-five and thirty, 17 were between thirty and thirty-five, 19 were between thirty-five and forty, 24 were between forty and forty-five, 25 were between forty-five and fifty, 21 were between fifty and fifty-five, 6 were between fifty-five and sixty, 10 were between sixty and sixty-five, 9 were between sixty-five and seventy, 9 were between seventy and seventy-five, 4 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 8 were eighty and upwards.

THE SUBDIVISIONS OF THE SHIRE OF BRIGHT.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the eighteenth day of October, 1869.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board for any original or proclaimed district (hereinafter sometimes called "single district"), the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect, signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall, within three months after the receipt of the same, divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions (hereinafter called subdivisions), by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district; and it is also enacted that every shire shall after the proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such proclamation, and save as aforesaid and save where therein otherwise expressly provided, all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue and be of full force and effect with regard to such shire and be read accordingly: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the eighteenth day of June, 1866, the Shire of Bright was constituted: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by not less than twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said shire, praying for the division of the same into subdivisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth, by this present Order, divide the Shire of Bright into three separate electoral subdivisions, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

THE WEST RIDING.—Commencing at a point on the Great Dividing Range near Mount Smythe, the southern boundary of the Shire; thence along the summit of the range between the watersheds of the Buckland River and its tributaries, and the Ovens River and its tributaries to the head of the northern branch of the Two-mile Creek; thence by a direct line northerly to the Ovens River bridge; thence by the centre of the Buckland Main Road to the north-west angle of Trapp's special allotment; thence by a line bearing north to the northern boundary of the shire at Myrtle Creek; thence by Myrtle Creek to its junction with the Ovens River; thence by the Ovens River to its junction with the Buffalo River; thence by the Buffalo River to its source; thence by a line bearing southerly along the summit of the Dividing Range to the Great Dividing Range; thence easterly by the Great Dividing Range to the point of commencement.

SHIRE OF BENALLA.

STANDING ORDERS.

THE business of the council at all ordinary meetings shall be conducted with open doors, unless it may become necessary to exclude strangers on account of their disorderly conduct.

Clause 2. The ordinary meetings of the council shall be held on every alternate Wednesday, at half-past two o'clock p.m.

Clause 3. Should a quorum not be present within one hour after the time appointed, the names of the members present shall be entered in the minute-book.

Clause 4. The first business of all meetings of the council shall be the reading and confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings; after confirmation such minutes shall be signed by the president.

Clause 5. Special meetings of the council shall, on the requisition of three or more members, be convened by the secretary; the object of such meeting being set forth in the requisition.

Clause 6. At the ordinary meetings of the council, after the confirmation of the minutes, the following shall be the order of business, viz.:-

1. Reading and ordering on correspondence.
2. Reading and considering petitions and memorials.
3. Reading and ordering on reports of committees and officers.
4. Orders of the day arising out of former minutes, and any business the day arising may bring before the meeting.
5. Motions of which notice shall have been given in writing.
6. Examination and passing of accounts.
7. Notices of motion.

Clause 7. Every petition addressed to the council shall be presented by one of the councillors, who shall be responsible for its being properly and respectfully worded.

Clause 8. No motion shall be proceeded with unless the councillor who gave notice thereof, or some other councillor duly authorized by him in writing, be present when called upon to proceed with the same. Notices of motion not so proceeded with shall be considered as having lapsed.

Clause 9. The mover of any motion which may be referred to a committee shall, for that occasion, be a member of such committee.

Clause 10. No motion or amendment shall be entertained or discussed until it has been seconded, and one amendment only shall be discussed at one time; but if lost, any other may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote.

Clause 11. No person, not being a councillor, shall be permitted to address the council without the consent of the majority of the council then present, and without giving notice in writing to the secretary of the council seven days previously, stating the subject matter of his address.

Clause 12. Every councillor including the president shall stand while addressing the council.

Clause 13. The ruling of the president shall be final on all points of order or practice, and shall be given without comment or argument.

Clause 14. Every motion or amendment shall be committed to writing by the secretary, if required, with the signature of the mover and seconder, and no motion or amendment shall be withdrawn without the consent of the council.

Clause 15. Any councillor may require the secretary to take down the particular words used by a councillor immediately on the same being uttered.

Clause 16. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment. If the motion be carried, the business undisposed of shall have precedence at the next ordinary of the council; but if lost, the subject previously under consideration, or the next in order, shall be discussed before a subsequent motion for adjournment be entertained.

Clause 17. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, except in reply or personal explanation.

Clause 18. Any councillor who shall refuse to obey when called to order by the president, or shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, and who shall refuse to withdraw such expression and make a satisfactory apology when required to do so by the president, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, to be recovered before any two justices of the peace.

Clause 19. The voting shall in every case be by show of hands for and against the motion or amendment. Every motion or amendment, with the name of the mover and seconder, shall be entered in the minutes, and the votes shall be recorded if required by any councillor.

Clause 20. The original manuscript of every motion or amendment, if required, be laid on the table at the meeting at which it is to be confirmed, and may be destroyed after the minutes containing the said motions or amendments are confirmed.

Clause 21. Any councillor may protest against any resolution of the council by delivering the said protest in writing to the secretary duly signed, stating his reason or reasons for protesting against such resolution, and the secretary shall make an entry of the same in the minute-book.

Clause 22. Any councillor may, without previous notice, move a call of the council for the consideration of any subject; and upon such motion being carried, the secretary shall give notice thereof to each councillor six clear days at least before the meeting for which such call is made, such notice to state the subject for consideration and the date and hour of meeting.

Clause 23. No motion, the effect of which shall be to rescind a former resolution of the council, shall be entertained unless notice thereof, in writing, be given at a preceding meeting, and a call of the council made for the purpose.

Clause 24. It shall be competent for a majority of the council to suspend at any meeting one or more of the standing orders herein contained, except the purport of such suspension be the rescinding of any motion previously adopted.

Clause 25. All contracts amounting to £10 shall be made by tender, and advertised not less than twice in some paper circulating in the district, and notices calling for tenders shall also be posted on the Police Court and Post Office.

Clause 26. Every tender must be accompanied by a deposit of a sum equal to 5 per cent. of the gross amount of the tender, which sum shall be returned in the event of the tender not being accepted; but should the tender be accepted, such sum to be absolutely forfeited to the council if the tenderer fails to take up his contract within fourteen days after his tender has been accepted, but to be refunded to the contractor upon the certificate of the engineer of the satisfactory completion of the contract. In the event of the non-performance of the works from any cause whatsoever, the council shall be entitled absolutely to retain such deposit as liquidated damages for breach of contract and to appropriate the same.

Clause 27. When any tender shall have been accepted by the council, a contract bond shall be entered into, signed by the contractor and also by the president and one other councillor, and the contractor shall also be required to sign the plans and specifications of the work for which his tender has been accepted.

Clause 28. Every tender to be addressed to the president of the council, and endorsed "Tender for ——" and to be placed in a box specially provided and affixed to the council chambers, so that tenders may be dropped into it from the outside. This box to have "Tender-box" painted on it, and to be secured with a patent lock of approved quality, the key of which shall be kept by the president, and such box not to be opened except at a meeting of the council.

Clause 29. Every tender must be on the printed form to be obtained at the council chambers, and must be filled up in accordance with the schedule attached to the specification, and no tender will be recognised unless made out in compliance with these conditions.

Clause 30. In the event of the contractor not completing his contract within the term stipulated in the conditions thereof, the engineer shall immediately report thereon to the council.

Clause 31. All payments shall be made by cheque, signed by the president and one other councillor, and countersigned by the treasurer; and no cheque shall be given unless the account for which it is payable shall have been passed at a meeting of the council or by a committee duly empowered to do so.

Clause 32. The secretary, engineer, and every other officer and servant shall, when called upon, furnish official reports to the council. The collector shall also furnish detailed monthly reports showing the amount of the rates received by him during the month immediately preceding, the moneys paid to the treasurer, and the amount of uncollected rates.

Clause 33. In all cases it shall be sufficient for the collector to apply once either personally or by letter for any rate due, and at the time of such application he shall furnish the party owing such rate with a written notice, showing the amount of rates due, describing the property on which the rates are owing, and demanding payment of such sum at the council chambers within 21 days after service of notice, and stating that in default of payment legal proceedings for the recovery will be taken.

Clause 34. The collector shall every seven days pay over to the treasurer all moneys collected by him, and obtain a receipt for each separate payment.

Clause 35. RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE FARMERS' COMMON IN THE AGRICULTURAL AREA OF CALLAWADDA.

EVERY farmer, or tenant-farmer, and selector of land within the above-named area, also any holder of a business license, publican's license, or splitter's license, upon or within the boundaries of the said area of Callawadda, shall be entitled to depasture on the said common such description of stock as may be decided by the managers: Provided always that no selector of land or licensee under the 42nd clause of *The Land Act 1865*, shall be in said area allowed, or be eligible to depasture stock on said common, unless such selector or licensee shall previously have commenced to fence in and occupy the land so held by him in a *bond fide* manner according to the terms of his lease or license, and in accordance with the provisions of *The Land Act of 1865*.

II. Every person so entitled as in the preceeding clause to commonage, shall be permitted to depasture horses, cattle, or sheep on the common, according to the following scale, viz.:—One horse, or one head of cattle, or four sheep or goats to every ten acres owned or tenanted by him or held under license. The holders of business, publican's, or splitter's license, two head of cattle, or two horses, or their equivalent in other stock.

III. The assessment of stock depasturing on the above common to be as follows:—

For every horse or mule over 12 months old, 6s. per annum.

For every head of cattle over 6 months old, 4s. per annum.

For every sheep or goat over 6 months old, 8d. per annum.

IV. Travellers depasturing stock on the said common shall be allowed to run the same free of charge for twenty-four hours, but shall be liable to pay 6d. per head for horned cattle or horses, and one penny per head for sheep or goats, for every day beyond that time. The manager shall always have power to prevent travelling stock from remaining on the common for a longer period than twenty-four hours, and in no case shall the same horses, cattle, or sheep be allowed to recross the common within the space of one month from the time of their having last depastured thereon.

V. No stock of any kind shall be allowed to enter on the common without twenty-four hours' notice having previously been given to the manager or herdsman.

VI. All assessments to be paid half-yearly in advance. The half-year to commence on the first day of February and the first day of August in each year.

VII. All holders of stock depasturing on the common shall muster them at a time and place appointed by the managers or herdsman, of which due notice will be given them for the purpose of branding the same with the brand of the common, should the managers or herdsman require such to be done. Horses and mules to be exempted from common brand.

VIII. All stock on which assessment fees are not paid within seven days after the time when due, or which have not been mustered at the time and place appointed by the managers or herdsman, may be impounded.

IX. All entire horses or bulls over six months old found running on the common without a written consent from the managers shall be impounded.

X. The managers or herdsman will not be responsible for any stock that may be depastured on the common.

XI. The manager shall give a printed receipt in each case, showing the number and description of stock, and the amount paid in respect thereof.

XII. All dead or diseased cattle found on the common, the owners of which neglect or refuse to remove the same within twenty-four hours after receiving notice of same from the herdsman or managers, shall be burnt, removed, or impounded, and the owner shall be liable to the penalty mentioned in clause No. 129 of *The Land Act 1862*.

XIII. Should the managers at any time consider the herdsman incompetent or negligent in the fulfilment of his duties, they may remove or discharge him forthwith, or after one week's notice, as the exigency of the case may require.

XIV. A record is to be kept by the managers or herdsman, showing the number and description of stock, and the amount paid in respect thereof.

XV. Special licenses may be granted by the managers when considered necessary with the sanction of the council.

XVI. The managers to meet at least once every month for the transaction of any business that may come before them.

XVII. The managers to hand in to the secretary of the shire, on the third Wednesday in August each year, the various books of account kept by them in respect of the commons, together with a statement showing the receipts and expenditure for the past year, for the purpose of being audited by the shire auditors.

XVIII. All moneys received by the managers to be paid to the treasurer of the shire half yearly, within one month after collection of the same, less expenses.

XIX. The managers shall furnish such security as the council may determine.

XX. The managers of the common for the time being may have a discretionary power to increase or decrease the number of stock to be carried according to the capabilities of the common, such increase or decrease to be regulated in accordance with rule 3 as to the number of sheep, &c., which each party shall be entitled to depasture.

XXI. The herdsman, managers, or servants of the managers may have the power to impound all straying unauthorized stock, a registry of which the herdsman will be required to keep, so that all damages or fees arising therefrom may be properly accounted for.
