CAUTION AGAINST THE INTRODUCTION OF CONVICTS AND VAGRANTS INTO INDIA.

THE subjoined extracts from an Act of His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor-General of India in Council, entitled *The European Vagrancy Act 1869*, are at the instance of the Government of India published for general information.

In the 25th section provision is made for the imposition of penalties on shipmasters bringing European Convicts to India; and the 31st section indicates the liability incurred in importing Europeans who become vagrants within one year after being so imported.

"No. 21. *An Act to provide against European Vagrancy.*—
[Passed 18th September, 1869.]

SECTION 2.

"Commencement and extent of Act.—Sections 25, 26, and 31 shall come into operation on the first day of January, 1870, and shall extend to the whole of British India and to the said dominions [i.e. the dominions of Princes and States in India in alliance with Her Majesty].

SECTION 3.

"Interpretation clause.—In this Act—

'Person of European extraction' includes *Americans and Australasians*;

'Vagrant' means a person of European extraction found asking for alms, or wandering about without any employment or visible means of subsistence;

'Master of a ship' includes any person in charge of a decked vessel;

And in parts III. and V. of this Act 'Magistrate' means within the limits of the towns of Calcutta, Madras and Bombay, a magistrate of police, and, outside those limits, a person exercising powers under the Code of Criminal Procedure not less than those of a subordinate magistrate of the first class.

SECTION 25.

"Penalty on shipmaster bringing European convicts to India.—Every master of a ship landing or allowing to land in any part of British India any person of European extraction who has been convicted in any other part of Her Majesty's dominions of felony or of an offence which, if committed in England, would be felony, shall, on conviction before a magistrate, be liable, for every person so landed or allowed to land, to pay a fine not exceeding five hundred rupees and not less than one hundred rupees, and, in default of payment, to imprisonment for any term not exceeding two months, unless the defendant shall satisfy the magistrate by evidence (which the defendant is hereby declared competent to give), that he had made due enquiry as to the person so landed or allowed to land, and that he had no reason to believe that such person had been convicted as aforesaid.

"Power to exempt certain shipmasters.—The Governor-General of India in Council may from time to time, by notification in the *Gazette of India*, exempt from the operation of the former part of this section the masters of any class of ships, on such terms as to the said Governor-General in Council shall seem fit, and whether in respect of all or of any part of the persons on board such ships.

"The said Governor-General in Council may in like manner revoke any exemption made under this section.

SECTION 31.

"Liability of importers of Europeans or employers of soldiers becoming vagrants.—Whenever any person of European extraction lands in India, or, being a non-commissioned officer or soldier in Her Majesty's Army, leaves that army in India, under an engagement to serve any other person, or any company, association or body of persons in any capacity, and becomes chargeable to the State as a vagrant within one year after his arrival in India or leaving the army, as the case may be, then the person, or company, association or body, to serve whom he has so landed in India or left the army, shall be liable to pay to the Government the cost of his removal under this Act and all other charges incurred by the State in consequence of his becoming a vagrant.

"Recovery of charges.—Such costs and charges shall be recoverable by suit as if an express agreement to repay them had been entered into with the Secretary of State for India in Council by the person, company, association or body chargeable."

UNION UNDER "THE WEIGHTS AND MEASURES STATUTE 1864."

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament of Victoria, passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, called *The Weights and Measures Statute 1864*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, at the request of and pursuant to any agreement made by the councils or boards of any two or more of any adjoining boroughs, shires, and road districts, may proclaim such boroughs, shires, and districts to be a "Union" for the purposes of the said Act, and by such Proclamation fix the proportion in which the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act shall be borne by the several bodies-corporate of such boroughs, shires, or districts: And whereas the Councils of the Borough of Wangaratta, and the Shires of Oxley and North Ovens, have requested that the said borough and shires may be proclaimed a "Union," and that the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act may be borne in the proportion of one-half by the Borough of Wangaratta, one-fourth by the Shire of Oxley, and one-fourth by the Shire of North Ovens: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do proclaim the Borough of Wangaratta and the Shires of Oxley and North Ovens to be a "Union" for the purposes of the said Act, and do fix the proportion in which the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act shall be borne by the Councils of the said Borough of Wangaratta and the said Shires of Oxley and North Ovens, as follows:—

One-half by the Council of the Borough of Wangaratta, one-fourth by the Council of the Shire of Oxley, and one-fourth by the Council of the Shire of North Ovens.

COMMONS ALTERED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1862* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold-field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold-fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

BET-BET No. 1 FARMERS' COMMON.—The Bet-bet Number One Farmers' Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the fourth day of March, 1861, is hereby increased by adding thereto the unappropriated Crown land within the boundaries described as follow, viz.:—Commencing at the north-

east angle of the existing common; being a point on the road forming the west boundary of allotment 15 of section 9, parish of Waanyarra; thence by that road bearing northerly sixty-four chains five links to a point bearing west from the south-west angle of allotment 12; thence by a line bearing west two miles, more or less; thence by a line bearing south sixty-four chains five links to the north-west angle of the existing common aforesaid; and thence by the north boundary of that common bearing east two miles, more or less, to the point of commencement; as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne. Area, about 1000 acres.—(64.L.5442.)

LADDERS.

The Ladders are to be of Red or Yellow Baltic Fir, free from large or loose knots, and perfectly straight in grain, sound and free from heart and sap. The rounds are to be cleft, of young and fresh Hickory, English Ash, or English Oak, straight in grain, and turned to 1½ inch diameter in centre and for ¾ inch holes at ends. The sides of the Ladders are to be bored to receive the rounds, and the holes are to be tapered outwards, so as to admit of the round being opened and wedged. All the rounds are to well fill the holes, and be wedged with glue into the sides, previously having received a coat of wet white lead. Every eighth round a tie bolt ¾ inch diameter, with collar at each end 1½ inch diameter, is to be inserted below the round, with nut and washer at each end, the rounds to be 9 inches apart, centre to centre. The ladders are to be finished with three coats of good lead and oil paint, of such color as may be ordered.

The 36-foot ladders are to spread at bottom 18 inches clear between the sides, which are to be 4½ inch x 2½ inch; and at top 24 inches clear, and sides 24 inches x 1½ inches.

The 30-foot ladders 18 inches clear at bottom, with sides 4½ inches x 2½ inches; and at top 19½ inches clear, and sides 24 inches x 1½ inches.

The 24-foot ladders 16 inches clear at bottom, and sides 4½ inches x 2 inches; at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1½ inches.
