## SUPPLEMENTARY COMMISSION OF THE GOVERNOR.

THE Governor has directed the Despatch and Supplementary Commission hereto subjoined to be published:—

Sir,—With reference to the circular despatches of the 20th June 1868 and 25th August 1869, and to certain questions which have been raised as to the payment of salary to a Governor during his temporary absence from the colony under his charter, for the purpose of visiting any neighboring colony, I have now to inform you that, after further consideration of the subject, it has been thought expedient to provide, by additional letters patent, that the powers of the Governor, instead of vesting, as hitherto, immediately upon the absence of the Governor, in the Lieutenant-Governor, or other officer appointed by Her Majesty to administer during such absence, shall not so vest until the officer has been sworn in.

The practical result of this will be that the salary granted by the local Acts to the Officer administering the Government will not be claimable by him until he has taken the oaths of office, and that the Governor will thus be enabled to receive full salary during the short absences which it has been considered desirable he should take for the purpose of visiting any neighboring colony.

I apprehend that no practical injury can accrue from this change, as, under ordinary circumstances, there would be no difficulty in making the necessary arrangements for carrying on the public service during these limited absences of the Governor, while, should any emergency arise requiring the presence on the spot of an officer with full powers of government, the

Lieutenant-Governor or other officer can at once take the oaths of office, and proceed to administer the government.

I transmit the letters patent to which I have above referred, and request that they may be published at your earliest convenience in the colony.

## VICTORIA.

*Supplementary Commission passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, providing that the powers of the Governor shall not vest in the Lieutenant-Governor or Officer administering the Government of Victoria until he has taken the Oaths of Office.*

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, to our right trusty and well-beloved Cousin, John Henry Thomas, Viscount Canterbury, Knight Commander of our Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Greeting:

WHEREAS we did, by certain letters patent, under the Great Seal of our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland bearing date at Westminster, the twenty-third day of May 1866, in the twenty-ninth year of our reign, constitute and appoint you the said John Henry Thomas, Viscount Canterbury (then John Henry Thomas Manners Sutton, Esquire, commonly called the Honorable John Henry Thomas Manners Sutton), to be, during our pleasure, our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over our Colony of Victoria, and did further declare our pleasure to be, that, in the event of your death, incapacity, or absence out of our said Colony of Victoria, all and every the powers and authorities therein granted to you should be, and the same were thereby, vested in such person or persons as might by us be appointed by warrant under our Sign Manual and Signet to be the Lieutenant-Governor of our said colony, or to administer the government of the same, and in case there should be no person or persons within our said colony so appointed by us, then in the Senior Military Officer for the time being in command of our Regular Troops in our said colony; and that such Lieutenant-Governor, or such other person or persons who might by us be appointed to administer the government of our said colony, or such officer as the case might be, should have and exercise all and every the powers and authorities therein granted until our further pleasure should be signified therein.

Now we do declare our pleasure to be that in case of your absence out of our said colony, the powers and authorities granted to you by our said Commission shall not be vested in such Lieutenant-Governor, or such other person or persons as may from time to time be appointed by us to administer the government of our said colony, or in such Senior Military Officer as aforesaid, until such Lieutenant-Governor or other person or persons, or Senior Military Officer as the case may be, has or have taken the oaths appointed to be taken by the Governor of our said colony, and in the manner provided by the instructions accompanying our said Commission.

In witness whereof we have caused these our letters to be made patent.

Witness ourself at Westminster, the eleventh day of March, in the thirty-third year of our reign.

## CONVENTION OF COMMERCE BETWEEN HER MAJESTY AND THE EMPEROR OF AUSTRIA.

Signed at Vienna, 30th December 1869.

[Ratifications exchanged at Vienna, 23rd February 1870.]

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the one part, and His Majesty the Emperor of Austria, King of Bohemia, &c., and Apostolic King of Hungary, on the other part, have resolved to conclude the following Convention in lieu of the Supplementary Convention stipulated in Article V of the Treaty of Commerce of the 19th December 1865, and have named for their Plenipotentiaries, that is to say:

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honorable John Arthur Douglas, Baron Bloomfield of Oakhampton and Redwood, a Peer of Ireland, a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Her Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to His Imperial and Royal Apostolic Majesty; and

His Imperial and Royal Apostolic Majesty, Frederic Ferdinand Count Beust, His Imperial Majesty's Privy Councillor, Chancellor of the Empire, and Minister of the Imperial House and of Foreign Affairs, Grand Cross of the Orders of St. Stephen and Leopold;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found to be in due and proper form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

## ARTICLE I.

During the continuance of the present convention, British produce and manufactures shall be admitted upon importation into both the dominions of His Imperial and Royal Apostolic Majesty, at the rates of duty enumerated in the tariff annexed to the Treaty of Commerce between His Imperial and Royal Apostolic Majesty and His Majesty the King of Prussia representing the Sovereign States and territories united to the Prussian system of Customs and Contributions, of the 9th of March 1863.

## ARTICLE II.

His Imperial and Royal Apostolic Majesty further engages that, on and after the 1st of January 1870, the following articles of British manufacture shall be admitted upon importation into both the dominions of His Imperial and Royal Apostolic Majesty, at the rates of duty hereinafter specified:—

IHRE Majestät die Königin des vereinigten Königreiches von Grossbritannien und Irland, auf der einen Seite, und Seine Majestät der Kaiser von Oesterreich, König von Böhmen, u.s.w., und Apostolischer König von Ungarn, auf der andern Seite, sind übereingekommen, an Stelle der im Artikel V des Handels-Vertrages vom 16. Dezember, 1865, stipulirten Nachtrags-Convention die folgende Convention abzuschliessen, und haben zu diesem Ende zu Ihren Bevollmächtigten ernannt, nämlich:

Ihre Majestät die Königin des vereinigten Königreiches von Grossbritannien und Irland, den sehr ehrenwerthen Johann Arthur Douglas, Baron Bloomfield von Oakhampton und Redwood, Pair von Irland, Mitglied Ihrer Britischen Majestät höchst ehrenwerthen Geheimrathes, Grosskreuz des höchst ehrenwerthen Bath-Ordens, Allerhöchst Ihren ausserordentlichen und bevollmächtigten Botschafter bei Seiner Kaiserlichen und Königlich-Apostolischen Majestät; und

Seine Kaiserliche und Königlich-Apostolische Majestät, den Herrn Friedrich Ferdinand Grafen von Beust, Allerhöchst Ihren Geheimen Rath, Reichskanzler und Minister des Hauses und der auswärtigen Angelegenheiten, Grosskreuz des St. Stefan und des Leopold-Ordens;

Welche, nach gegenseitiger Mittheilung ihrer in guter und gehöriger Form befundenen Vollmachten, die nachstehenden Artikel vereinbart und abgeschlossen haben:—

## ARTIKEL I.

Die Artikel britischer Erzeugung und Manufactur sollen während der Dauer der gegenwärtigen Convention zur Einfuhr in die beiden Staatsgebiete Seiner Kaiserlichen und Königlich-Apostolischen Majestät gegen Entrichtung der Eingangszölle zugelassen werden, welche in dem Tarif zum Handels-Vertrage zwischen Seiner Kaiserlichen und Königlich-Apostolischen Majestät und Seiner Majestät dem Könige von Preussen in Vertretung der dem preussischen Steuer- und Zollsystem beizutretenden Souverainen Staaten und Territorien vom 9. März, 1863, angeführt sind.

## ARTIKEL II.

Seine Kaiserliche und Königlich-Apostolische Majestät versprechen ferner, dass von und nach dem 1. ### ARTICLE III.

The IIIrd, IVth, and Vth Articles of the Treaty of Com-  
merce between Her Britannic Majesty and His Imperial and  
Royal Apostolic Majesty, of the 16th of December 1865, and  
the IInd and IIrd Articles of the Final Protocol annexed to  
that Treaty, are hereby suppressed.

### ARTICLE IV.

This Convention shall have the same duration as the Treaty  
of the 16th of December 1865.

### ARTICLE V.

The present Convention shall be ratified, and the ratifications  
shall be exchanged at Vienna within six weeks, or sooner if  
possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have  
signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

Done at Vienna, this thirtieth day of December, in the year  
of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine.

Sir,—At the instance of the Secretary of State for India, I transmit to you copies of an advertisement of the Indian Government, offering prizes for the best machine and the best process for the preparation of the fibre derived from the rhea or China grass; and the Governor-General of India is desirous that this notification should obtain publicity in the colonies, and I shall be obliged to you to take such steps as are in your power for this purpose.

I transmit at the same time, for your information, copies of two circular despatches (30th March 1867, 25th October 1867), which were addressed to the Governors of those colonies in which it was conceived that this plant might be successfully cultivated, and which afford information with regard to the cultivation of the plant and the working of the fibre.

## RHEA OR CHINA GRASS FIBRE.

### NOTIFICATION.

The Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the following advertisement:—

#### Advertisement.

1. The Government of India, after communication with various agricultural and horticultural societies in India, and with persons interested in the subject, has arrived at the conclusion that the only real obstacle to the development of an extensive trade in the fibre of rhea, or China grass, is the want of suitable machinery for separating the fibre and bark from the stem, and the fibre from the bark, the cost of effecting such separation by manual labor being great.

2. The demand for the fibre is now large, and no doubt might be extended with reduced prices, and there is a practically unlimited extent of country in India where the plant could be grown.

3. The requirements of the case appear to be some machinery or process capable of producing, with the aid of animal, water, or steam power, a ton of fibre of a quality which shall average in value not less than £50 per ton in the English market, at a total cost, all processes of manufacture and allowance for wear and tear included, of not more than £15 per ton. The said processes are to be understood to include all the operations performed after the cutting and transport of the plant to the place of manufacture, to the completion of the manufacture of fibre of the quality above described. The machinery must be simple, strong, durable, and cheap, and should be suited for erection at, or near, the plantations, as the refuse is very useful as manure for continued cultivation.

4. To stimulate the invention or adaptation of such machinery or process, the Government of India hereby offers a prize of £5000 for the machine and process that best fulfils all the requirements named above.

5. Rewards of moderate amount will be given for really meritorious inventions, even though failing to meet entirely all the conditions named.

6. Arrangements will be made by the Government of India for the supply of carefully-dried stems, and specimens of fibre separated from the bark, but subjected to no other process, to mechanical firms and others desirous of competing, on application to the Secretary to the Government of India in the Home Department.

7. All machinery, &c., must be brought by the competitors, at their own charge, to a locality which will be notified hereafter, probably in the North-West Provinces or the Punjab, and there worked under the supervision of their own representatives for a sufficient time to enable the judges appointed by Government to determine whether all the conditions named have been complied with. The prize machine is to be transferred, if required, to Government at 5 per cent. above cost price; the patent right in any such machine to be also transferred, if required, to Government, on the latter securing to the patentee a royalty of 5 per cent. on the cost price of all machines manufactured under the patent during its currency.

8. One year from the date of this advertisement will be allowed for the preparation of the machines and their transport to the locality named for the competition, and the trials will then be made, and the decision of the judges announced. Lord Stanley has ascertained, through the Bradford Chamber of Commerce, that the importance attached by the writer of this report to the China grass is not exaggerated, and that nothing but the high price of the article prevents its being largely consumed.

Under these circumstances, Lord Stanley would recommend to the consideration of Lord Carnarvon, whether it might not be useful to forward copies of their report to such of Her Majesty's officers in the British colonies as reside in localities favorable to the cultivation and export of this grass.

[Report by Mr. McClintock, American Vice-Consul at Bradford, respecting the manufacture of "China grass."]

Consulate of the United States, Bradford,  
15th December 1865.

The Chinese have for centuries made, by hand labor, various descriptions of "grass cloth," well known in America and Europe, and often of great strength and beauty, from the fibre of the *Bahmeria cordata*, or *Urtica nivea*, known in commerce as Chinese grass.

Large quantities of the grass have at various times been brought over to England, and probably also to the United States, in the hope of finding a market among the dry goods manufacturers, who are always on the look out for new materials; but it has hitherto been, and it is even now, found impossible to produce a true "grass cloth" by machinery. The fibre is rather brittle, though very strong, and it is found that the China grass cloth of commerce is only to be woven by hand labor, in which, of course, the Chinese themselves are beyond the reach of competition. Large quantities of the grass have, therefore, been in store in London and elsewhere for years. Some enterprising manufacturer would occasionally purchase a few tons with which to make experiments, but the only result for a long time was that he who experimented the most lost the most. Thousands and even tens of thousands of pounds were sunk by one and another, who each fancied for a time that he had discovered the true method of working up this intractable substance. Whether it was tried in the United States or not I do not know, but the concurrent testimony of my American friends in the trade is that no one is now successfully working it at home. Within two or three years past, however, several firms in this neighborhood have succeeded, by chemical means, in bringing the fibre into a state most closely resembling the best mohair or other bright worsted, and have worked up great quantities of the refined material as a substitute for worsted in many kinds of stuff goods, always, however, in combination with cotton (the warp being of cotton and the weft of the China grass), as they have not yet been able to work it properly alone.

The manufacture of worsted goods—that is, of goods made of long-staple wool, as distinguished from short-staple or ordinary wool—has become an immense trade, of which Bradford has at present almost a monopoly, although the manufacture has lately been extending in many parts of New England. Four-fifths of these goods are of a mixed material—that is, are made with cotton warps. And for many articles of the kind, especially for those requiring a stiff, strong, and cool texture, combined with a glossy, silky appearance, it is found that the prepared China grass makes the very best material.

Of course, the grass manufacture is yet in very few hands, but its development already, even within the last few months, has been signally rapid. The market value of the raw material has for some years past maintained itself at the very high rate of about £30 per ton, which price it is supposed cannot be much lessened for many years to come. Two things are certain in this respect—one, that there is now, and will be here, a practically limitless market for all the raw "grass" that can be

imported at from £70 to £80 per ton; the other, that under any fluctuations of the market the material is intrinsically so valuable that it will always in the future command a price as high as that of cotton, and nearly or quite as high as that of worsted itself, if not even higher.

Here, then, is a great and rapidly increasing market for a certain vegetable production at a very high price. In America we have, on the other hand, vast tracts of country which, being in the same latitude and with very much the same climate as those districts of China of which the grass is native, should be able to grow this production to great advantage. Why not, then, introduce its culture?

It seems certain that the manufacture of the grass fibre will be established in our country at no distant day; but in the meantime there is a market in England for all we can conveniently grow. It is, for our planters, simply a question of experiment with the seed, having in view the market price of the raw product. Successful experiments have been made very recently in Java and in India, proving that the grass will grow in any climate warm enough for the culture of cotton and sugar, provided the ground chosen be sufficiently moist.

I venture to suggest that further information, as well as quantities of the seed, &c., can doubtless be furnished by our consular officers in China, especially, perhaps, by the Consul at Hankow, that place being the chief market for the grass, which is brought thither from the interior, and often from a great distance.

[Dr. Hooker to Mr. Adderley.]

Royal Gardens, Kew, 8th March 1867.

Sir,—In reference to your letter of 5th March, I have to inform you that the value of the China grass fibre was recognized by the late director of these gardens in 1851, who then introduced plants, and distributed them to the colonies and elsewhere. There was then, however, no demand for the fibre, and I am not aware whether any plants remain in the colonies.

The China grass cloth is the rhea of India, a shrub closely allied to the nettle. It is extensively cultivated in Assam and East Bengal; grows so rapidly that it is cut for fibre four or five times a year, and requires little skill or labor in production.

I should recommend that the cultivation of this plant be recommended at such of our colonies in warm, temperate, and hot latitudes as have botanical gardens, especially Natal, Trinidad, Jamaica, Mauritius, Ceylon, Queensland, &c., and that the respective garden superintendents be instructed to report concisely to the Governor, six months after the receipt of plants, the result of the experiment.

The rhea has for many years been cultivated at Kew in the open air; but I fear that last January's cold may have killed it. I shall write by next mail to India for young plants, with a view of transmitting them to our colonies and foreign possessions, and at the same time make enquiries of the colonies themselves as to which still possess the plant, and direct their garden superintendents' attention to its cultivation.

As the information required is to be found only in various volumes of the "Reports of the Agri-Horticultural Society of Bengal," a work not accessible in the colonies, I have extracted from them the accompanying passages, which contain the necessary instructions; and I would take the liberty of suggesting, for the information of the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that it would be very advisable that these passages should be printed and circulated to the colonies in which the aforesaid circular was sent.

*Instructions relative to the Cultivation and Preparation of the Fibre of Chinese Grass Cloth (Bahmeria nivea).*

I.—ON THE CULTIVATION AND PREPARATION OF RHEA FIBRE, OR CHINA GRASS. (Communicated by Dr. D. J. Macgowan to vol. VI., part IV., of the Journal of the Agri-Horticultural Society of India.)

*Planting the seeds.*—In China this takes place in May. Great care is first taken in the selection of seeds, and in the preparation of the soil. The seed should be gathered on the appearance of frost; those produced from a recent root are the best. After being dried, they are stowed away in a basket or

jar mixed with sand or dry earth; others say moist earth. The jar is then covered with straw to protect the seeds from the cold, as, if exposed to its influence, they yield an imperfect plant. Before planting, the seeds are tested by an immersion in water; those which float are to be rejected, those at the bottom to be planted. A loose, dry soil is to be selected, if near a canal or rivulet it is preferable. The ground is to be well ploughed or broken finely, manured, and then divided into beds about eight yards long and one wide; the beds are to be raked, and afterwards made compact with a hoe. After this it is watered and left for a night; on the following day raking up and pressing down is repeated. The beds being smooth, two or three table-spoonful of seed are mixed with a bowl of earth and sown broadcast over half-a-dozen beds; then they are swept with a broom to cover the seeds. In some places the seeds are first made to sprout, and then planted in drills, which are carefully filled up. Just before the blades appear, a framework is to be constructed over the beds, on which mats should be spread to protect them from the heat of June and July. The matting must be kept moist by day, and removed at night that the blades may receive the dew of heaven. The beds are to be constantly weeded. When the plant is about two inches high, the framework and matting may be removed. When three inches high, it should be transplanted, having been well watered the night before; the blades should be taken up separately, with a portion of earth, and planted in a field, far removed from mulberry trees, about four inches apart. It may form a border to the cerealia and vegetables, protecting them from the depredations of domestic animals, which all avoid the "má." In dry weather the field is to be watered every three or four days until the second decade, when it may be watered every tenth day.

In November and December manure it with horse or buffalo dung, earth, straw, or any rubbish, a foot or more thick, to protect it from cold. In March rake it away and expose the plant, watering it in dry weather, and using rubbish of any kind for manure. A caution is given never to use swine's dung, as it is salish and hurtful to the "má." In the third or fourth year, some say in the second, the plant may be cut and used.

*Planting the roots.*—The roots are to be cut in pieces of three or four fingers' length, and are to be planted in May, half a yard apart, and watered every three or four days. On the appearance of the blades, use the hoe and water them; they will be mature for cutting in the second year. In the course of ten years the roots become unfruitful; the shoots may then be cut off, and, if enveloped in earth and covered with matting, can be transplanted in places thirty or forty inches distant. The ground should be first well prepared with manure, and freely manured afterwards, the manure being half water. Here, as before, the plants should be hoed from time to time. In many cases fresh earth, pulverized bricks, ashes, &c., are used for manure. Some years the husbandman has his crop injured by worms; he needs, therefore, to seek for and destroy them as they appear, by picking them off. It not unfrequently happens that the crop is in some places remarkably small, and sometimes the produce is very great without assignable cause.

*Cutting the má.*—It yields three crops every year. The first cutting takes place in June. Care is to be taken not to cut the young shoots; keep, therefore, an inch from the ground. In a month or two the shoots are 7 or 8 feet high, when the second cutting takes place—do not cut the original stem. During the latter part of September, or in October, the last cutting is performed, from which the finest cloth is made, the first being inferior, coarse, and hard. After each cutting the plant is to be covered with manure and watered, but not day by day unless it be cloudy. At Canton the plant is pulled up by the roots every year, from which it is evident that it differs widely from the "má" just described.

*Peeling the má.*—On being cut, the leaves are carefully taken off with a bamboo knife, by women and children generally on the spot. It is then taken to the house and soaked in water for an hour, unless it is already wet by recent showers; in cold weather the water should be tepid. After this the plant is broken in the middle, by which the fibrous portion is loosened, and raised from the stalk; into the interstice thus made the operator, generally a woman or child, thrusts the finger-nails, and separates the fibre from the centre to one extremity, and then to the other. The steeping process is very easy. It appears to be difficult to remove the fibres from the Canton "má," as it is soaked in water for more than forty-eight hours before peeling, which is done by men. They first cut off the roots, and then, separating the fibre from the stalk, strip it off by drawing it over a pin fixed in a plank. In either process half of the fibre is taken off at one stroke. The next process is scraping the hemp, to facilitate which the fibre is first soaked in water. The knife or scraper is about two inches long; its back is inserted in a handle of twice its length. This rude implement is held in the left hand; its edge, which is dull, is raised a line above the index finger. Strips of hemp are then drawn over the blade from within outwards, and being pressed upon by the thumb, the pilous portion of one surface, and the mucilaginous part of the other, are thus taken off. The hemp then "rolls up like boiled tendon." After being wiped dry, it is exposed to the sun for a day, and then assorted, the whitest being selected for fine cloth.

*Bleaching and dividing.*—A partial bleaching is effected on the fibres before they undergo further division, sometimes by boiling, and at others by pounding on a plank with a mallet. These are in some places repeated. After being dried in the sun, an important operation then succeeds by splitting the fibres, which they do with their finger-nails. Expert hands are able to carry this division very far. When this process has been preceded by hacking, the shreds are finer and softer. The threads are formed into balls, and subjected to frequent soaking and washings. The ashes of the mulberry leaf are recommended to be put into the water with the hemp; others use lime for a whole night. Some simply expose it to dew and sun. In rainy and cloudy weather it should be exposed to a

current of air in the house; moisture darkens it. The threads are now ready for splicing, the work of women and children, the labors of the agriculturist being concluded when the threads are rolled into balls, after being sized or stiffened with rice-water. Before the thread is ready for the weaver, the balls are steamed over the vapor of boiling water in a closed oven. They are then spread out to dry. The subsequent stages, until the cloth is removed from the loom, includes nothing which interests, or at least instructs, artisans in the west.

**II.—ON THE RHIRAS, OR NETTLE GRASSES OF ASSAM.** By Major F. S. Hanney. (From vol. VII., part I., of the Journal of the Agri-Horticultural Society of India.)

*Cutting and removing the fibre from the stalks.*—The stalks are considered fit for cutting when they have become of a brown color for about six inches above the roots. To cut them the doer seizes the leaves at the upper end with his left hand, and, passing the right hand down to the root, strips off the leaves, and cuts the stalk close to the ground. The stalks are made up into bundles, and the scraping off the outer bark commences at the same time, or this operation is deferred until the whole crop of the plot has been cut. The scraping off of the fibre from each stalk is a very tedious operation, and is performed with a blunt-edged knife. All that is left is the fibre and the woody part of the stalk, which are exposed to a hot sun for two or three days to dry. The third morning, after having been exposed to the dew for several hours, the fibre is drawn off. This is done by breaking the woody stalk right through towards the thicker end, and then separating the fibre therefrom, drawing it off slowly towards the small end, some care being required in giving the same a peculiar twist, so as to draw off as much as possible. Having finished with the smaller end, what remains on the thicker end of the stalk is pulled off in the same manner. It will be seen that this is a very clumsy way of extracting the fibre; and, as far as I can judge, one-fifth of the fibre still remains on the stalk, which may be taken off, however, at a second breaking; but the dooms are not particular, so long as they get what they require. The hanks of fibre are then separately twisted at the upper end, and tied up in bundles of long hanks of about one seer in weight, if to be kept for sale. As the fibre, however, thus extracted is quite ready for the purpose of net-making, little or nothing more is done than to open out and prepare the threads for spinning, which is done first by drawing the single hanks several times with a blunt-edged slip of bamboo held in the right hand. This softens and strengthens the fibres, and they are more easily opened out to the required fineness with the fingers and thumb-nails, and then made up into small hanks ready for the spinning process, the first stage of which is performed by the women with the common *takro*, or spindle, in general use throughout India, the hanks having been well opened out and spread over the top of a high circular open bamboo frame, set end-ways on the ground. The further operations of spinning the first threads to the requisite thickness, and the weaving of the nets, is performed by the men.

NOTE.—The Melbourne Hospital is in Melbourne Proper, the Benevolent Asylum in North Melbourne and Carlton, the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum in Jika-jika parish (remainder of), and the Industrial Schools in South Yarra and Prahran.

\* This calculation is made upon the population at the last census, instead of the present population, as there are no means of estimating the changes which have taken place in the different sub-districts since the census was taken. It is believed that the present population of the whole district of Melbourne and suburbs amounts to 175,000. If this be correct, the mortality of the month under review would indicate a proportion of 2.22 deaths to every 1000 persons living.

The mortality of Melbourne and suburbs, together with the mean temperature in the shade and the mean atmospheric pressure, during the month of April, for the ten years 1860-1869 were as follow:—

The deaths in April outnumbered those in March by 5, and exceeded, by 56, the average of April in the previous ten years. The mortality is, however, below the average, as, in this calculation, no allowance has been made for the increase of population during the period.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 87° on the 2nd, and the lowest was 44°2' on the 30th. The mean temperature of the month (60°8') was nearly two degrees above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (36°) took place on the 2nd, viz.:—from a maximum of 87° to a minimum of 51°. The least range (3°8') was on the 14th, viz.:—from a maximum of 60° to a minimum of 56°2'. The mean atmospheric pressure (29°67 inches) was a fraction below the average.

Forty-nine per cent. of the deaths were of males, and 51 per cent. were of females. The number of deaths of children under 5 was exactly equal to that of persons above that age. In April 1869, the deaths of children under 5 amounted to 47 per cent. of the whole; in April 1868, to 52 per cent.; in April 1867, to 56 per cent.; in April 1866, to 54 per cent.; in April 1865, to 60 per cent.; in April 1864, to 62 per cent.; in April 1863, to 58 per cent.; in April 1862, to 53 per cent.; in April 1861, to 53 per cent.; and in April 1860, to 61 per cent.

A male aged 77 and another aged 86 died during the month of old age; a third, aged 80, died of valvular disease of the heart.

Eleven violent deaths took place during the month, viz.:—Those of a laborer aged 33 of a fractured skull; of a drayman aged 37 of compression of the brain resulting from a fall; of a female child aged 2 of scalds caused by falling into a pot of boiling water; of a girl aged 8 of burns caused by her clothes catching fire; of an ironmonger aged 36 of burns; of a slater aged 34 of drowning in the Yarra; of a painter aged 57 of drowning in Hobson's Bay; of an infant aged 5 days and another aged 12 weeks of suffocation in bed; of a new-born infant who was murdered by strangulation; and of a male aged 55 who committed suicide by hanging.

The deaths in public institutions numbered 73 or 19 per cent. of the whole, viz.:—43 in the Melbourne Hospital, 2 in the Lying-in Hospital, 6 in the Benevolent Asylum, 10 in the Immigrants' Home, 8 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, and 4 in the Industrial Schools.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 194, of which 90, or about 46 per cent., were of males, and 104, or nearly 54 per cent., were of females; of those dying, 130 were under one year of age, 44 were between one and two years, 11 were between two and three, 4 were between three and four, and 5 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 194, of which 101, or about 52 per cent., were males and 93, or nearly 48 per cent., were females; 14 were between five and ten, 12 were between ten and fifteen, 6 were between fifteen and twenty, 13 were between twenty and twenty-five, 15 were between twenty-five and thirty, 18 were between thirty and thirty-five, 26 were between thirty-five and forty, 23 were between forty and forty-five, 20 were between forty-five and fifty, 12 were between fifty and fifty-five, 8 were between fifty-five and sixty, 6 were between sixty and sixty-five, 12 were between sixty-five and seventy, 6 were between seventy and seventy-five, 1 was between seventy-five and eighty, and 2 were eighty and upwards.

Zymotic diseases caused 119 deaths, against 99 in March. The chief increase was in those from typhoid and infantile fever, which numbered 32, against 17. Deaths from diarrhoea and dysentery fell from 61 to 56. Most deaths were again caused by diseases of the local type.
