PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honourable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTEBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Justices of the Peace Statute 1865*, it is amongst other things enacted that Courts of General Sessions of the Peace shall be holden in and for such places or districts within Victoria as the Governor in Council appoints; and the Governor in Council may from time to time define and appoint the limits and boundaries of the places or districts within which all such courts shall have jurisdiction respectively, and the places and times at which such courts shall be holden: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby appoint the Courts of General Sessions of the Peace at the undermentioned place, to be holden on the day hereinafter mentioned, for and in lieu of certain days appointed by a former Proclamation for the holding of the said courts, that is to say:—

At Jamieson, on Saturday the seventeenth day of September, in lieu of the seventeenth of August.

At Wood's Point, on Friday the twenty-third day of September, in lieu of the twenty-third of August 1870.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this eighth day of August, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy and in the thirty-fourth year of Her Majesty's reign.

WHEREAS by *The Boroughs Statute* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor may, if he shall be thereunto requested by the council of the borough, and if he shall see fit so to do, and upon such terms and conditions as shall appear to him to be reasonable and just, annex to any borough or to any ward, or in separate parts to any two or more wards of any borough if divided into wards, any portion of Victoria adjoining to such borough and forming therewith one continuous area, and not lying within the limits of the city of Melbourne or the town of Geelong; and every such portion shall thereupon become and be part of such borough, and so much thereof as shall have been added to any ward of such borough shall be part of the ward to which it shall have been so added, and such borough and ward after such annexation shall save where herein otherwise provided be deemed to be the same borough and ward respectively after such annexation as before: Provided that notice of the time when it shall please the Governor to order that any such requested annexation be taken into consideration by his Executive Council shall be published by the Minister in the *Government Gazette*, and in at least one newspaper generally circulating in the portion to be annexed, at least one month before any such annexation shall be made: And whereas notice of the intended annexation of an outlying district to the Borough of St. Kilda has been published in the manner directed by the said Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order annex to the Borough of St. Kilda the portion of land hereinafter described; the said portion of land adjoining to such borough and forming therewith one continuous area, and not lying within the limits of the city or town in the said Act mentioned, that is to say:—

Commencing at the southernmost point of the boundary of the Borough of St. Kilda on the shores of Port Phillip bay; thence northwards along the centre line of Barkly street to its intersection with the Glen Huntly road; thence eastwards along the centre line of the Glen Huntly road to its intersection with a street or road dividing North Elwood from the village reserve of Elsternwick, and known as St. Kilda street; thence southwards along the centre line of said street to its intersection with Park street; thence along the centre line of said Park street westwards to the shores of Port Phillip bay; thence north-westerly along the shores of the said bay home to the commencing point at St. Kilda boundary aforesaid.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Light on Cape Campbell (eastern entrance to Cook's Straits).
NOTICE is hereby given that, on and after the 1st August 1870, a light will be exhibited from a lighthouse erected on a knoll at the extreme end of Cape Campbell, in lat. 41 degrees 43 minutes 15 seconds south, and long. 174 degrees 18 minutes 30 seconds east.

The tower is an open-framed structure of timber, 73 feet in height from the base to the top of the lantern, and is painted in alternate bands of red and white.

The light is elevated about 155 feet from the sea-level, and may be seen in clear weather at a distance of 19 nautical miles, allowing 15 feet for the height of the observer's eye.

It is a revolving white light, of the second order dioptric, attaining its greatest brilliancy once a minute, and will be seen all round from seaward between the magnetic bearings of N. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. and E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

Persons failing to take up their contracts will be disqualified from tendering for Government supplies for a period of twelve months.

All tenders must be enclosed in a separate envelope, marked "Tender for —" (as the case may be) and be deposited in the Tender-box at the Tender Board Offices, Treasury; or (if sent by post) must be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Tender Board Offices, Treasury, Melbourne.

CONDITIONS.

1. The whole of the articles required for the service of the Victorian Railways are to be in accordance with the samples and specifications, and in every respect to be of the very best description, quality, and manufacture, subject to the approval of the Engineer-in-Chief, the Traffic Manager, and the General Overseer of Locomotives. The Goods will be subject to the examination and test of an Inspecting Officer appointed by any of the above. The Government will not be bound to issue orders upon the contractor for all the articles enumerated in schedules, but only for such articles and such quantities of those articles as the Government may order from the contractor from time to time; neither will the Government be bound to take from the contractor any larger supply of any of the articles than the orders which have been issued during the year; nor will they be bound to take any of the articles enumerated in the schedules for which orders have not been issued. Should the Government require a larger supply of any article than the quantity stated in the schedules, or should articles of a particular manufacture be ordered, the contractor will be bound to supply the same at the contract rate.

2. All orders for supplies under these contracts must issue from the Secretary for Railways, and all goods must be delivered free of charge to the Stores or other part of the Railway premises, Williamstown, unless otherwise directed by the Secretary.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service of the Victorian Railways, or by the exercise of the right to purchase reserved in the specification or the special conditions to any of the schedules, or by the purchase of articles manufactured in the penal or other Government establishments, or the manufacture of articles by the department.

4. Delivery, as a rule, is to be of the full quantity ordered at one time; but all deliveries must be accompanied with detailed invoices or bills of parcels in duplicate, showing quantity, rate, and value, also the number of the order for the goods, otherwise the goods will not be received. Delivery will not be deemed to have been made until the goods have been approved of.

5. In the event of supplies ordered under these contracts not being delivered within forty-eight hours, it will be competent for the Railway Storekeeper, on the order of the Secretary, to cancel the order and purchase the same, or such articles as may be suitable for the service, at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price will be deducted.

6. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly, in the prescribed form, and render the same to the Railway Storekeeper for certification, previously to payment at the Treasury.

7. The Railway Storekeeper will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior character, or not in accordance with the specification, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged to him.

8. All rejected goods must be removed by the contractor within twenty-four hours after notice has been given of such rejection, and, if not so removed, the Railway Storekeeper is hereby empowered to send same to Melbourne, there to be stored at the contractor's risk and expense.

9. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the head of the department requiring the supply, as to the quality, the same is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the Government, and the decision of the board is to be considered final. Any expense incurred on account of the rejection of supplies by a board of survey will be charged to the contractor.

10. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged to the contractor.

11. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Railway Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

12. It will be competent either for the contractor, on his own behalf, or for the Secretary for Railways on behalf of the Government, to terminate the contract, by giving a notice in writing of three full calendar months to the opposite party, it

being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made.

13. In the event of any alteration in the Tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Government, or the contractor, as may be the case, will make a proportionate allowance by way of deduction from, or increase of, the price of the item so affected.

14. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and may be forwarded (if by post, prepaid), addressed to the Honorable the Postmaster-General, with the words "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails" endorsed on the cover, or placed in the tender-box at the General Post Office.

Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire service as called for. The amount of the tender must be stated in words as well as figures.

Every tender must bear the *bond fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to twenty per cent. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, on the bond and contract being completed.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them on application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.

Persons tendering are requested to state the description of the vehicle they intend to use, and the number of horses by which it is to be drawn.

Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and may be forwarded (if by post, prepaid), addressed to the Honorable the Postmaster-General, with the words "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails" endorsed on the cover, or placed in the Tender-box at the General Post Office.

Tenders are requested to describe by their numbers as below the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire service as called for.

Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signature and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to twenty per cent. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them on application, on the bond and contract being completed.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them on application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.
