## CONVENTION WITH THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA UNDER "THE NATURALIZATION ACT 1870."

THE Governor has directed the subjoined Order of Her Majesty in Council, declaring the making of a Convention with the United States of America, under *The Naturalization Act 1870*, to be published for general information.

PRESENT:

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by *The Naturalization Act 1870* it is enacted that where Her Majesty has entered into a Convention with any foreign State to the effect that the subjects or citizens of that State who have been naturalized as British subjects may divest themselves of their status as such subjects, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, to declare that such Convention has been entered into by Her Majesty; and from and after the date of such Order in Council any person being originally a subject or citizen of the State referred to in such order who has been naturalized as a British subject may, within such limit of time as may be provided in the Convention, make a declaration of alienage, and from and after the date of his so making such declaration such person shall be regarded as an alien, and as a subject of the State to which he originally belonged as aforesaid: And whereas on or about the 13th day of May last past a Convention between Her Majesty and the President of the United States of America was duly signed at London, the ratifications whereof were duly exchanged at London the 10th day of August instant, whereby the subjects or citizens of the United States of America who have been naturalized as British subjects are at liberty to renounce their naturalization and divest themselves of their status as such British subjects, provided that such renunciation be publicly declared within two years after the exchange of the ratifications of the said Convention: Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby declare that Her Majesty has entered into a Convention with the said United States of America to the effect that the subjects or citizens of those States who have been naturalized as British subjects may divest themselves of their status as such subjects.

**ARTILLERY CORPS.**

EVERY person desirous of being registered as a Candidate for enrolment in the Artillery Corps, with the view of obtaining subsequent employment in the Police, Penal, or Gaol Departments, must present personally a written application for enrolment, at the Victoria Barracks, in the St. Kilda road.

Such applications must be in the handwriting of the applicant, and will be receivable between the hours of 10 and 11 a.m. on the Tuesday in each week, when the applicant, if considered suitable, will be examined by the Board appointed by the Government for the purpose.

As no exceptions will be made to the rule above set forth, it will be useless to make application for admittance into the Force in any other manner or place than as above prescribed.

Candidates will not be appointed if over the age of thirty; they must be at least five feet nine inches in height, smart and active, of a strong constitution, and free from any bodily complaint or defect, for the ascertaining of which they will undergo a strict medical examination.

They must be able to read and write well, and must produce satisfactory testimonials of character. Those candidates who have served in any other force or Government department must also produce their discharge therefrom.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Justices of the Peace Statute 1865* it is amongst other things enacted that Courts of General Sessions of the Peace shall be holden in and for such places or districts within Victoria as the Governor in Council appoints; and the Governor in Council may from time to time define and appoint the limits and boundaries of the places or districts within which all such courts shall have jurisdiction respectively, and the places and times at which such courts shall be holden: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby appoint the Court of General Sessions of the Peace at the undermentioned place to be holden on the day hereinafter mentioned, for and in lieu of the day appointed by a former Proclamation for the holding of the said court, that is to say:—

At Wood's Point, on Friday the fourth day of November, in lieu of the first of November 1870.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it is directed that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons shall be published and all objections thereto shall be heard in the manner set forth in the One hundredth section of the said Act: And whereas all objections respecting the union of the commons hereinafter mentioned have been heard as directed by the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby unite the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE CLARENDON AND BUNINYONG UNITED TOWN AND FARMERS' COMMON.—The Clarendon and Burnt Bridge Town Common described in two several Proclamations bearing date respectively the 18th day of February 1861 and the 26th day of October 1863, the Buninyong Farmers' Common described in two several Proclamations bearing date respectively the 25th day of February 1861 and the 4th day of February 1867, and the Buninyong near Clarendon Farmers' Common described in two several Proclamations bearing date respectively the 4th day of April 1861 and the 3rd day of August 1869, are hereby united and proclaimed under the designation of the Clarendon and Buninyong United Town and Farmers' Common, and the said united common shall be for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on any of the abovementioned commons.—(70. W. 19686.)

WHEREAS by The Shires Statute (33 Vict. No. 358, § 340), it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the council to demand, receive, and have of and from every person exposing or offering for sale or selling any corn, grain, hay, straw, meat, poultry, eggs, milk, butter, vegetables, or other provisions, or any cattle in any market provided thereunder, or who shall rent or use any stall or standing-place in such market and also from every person who shall use any building, place, or machine provided by the council for the weighing of carts, and from every person who shall at any time use for the sale of cattle any yards or premises within the shire and outside the market provided thereunder, such sums of money as and for stallages, rents, tolls, and dues as shall be appointed by special order of the council in such behalf respectively, but not exceeding such amounts as shall be authorized by the Governor by general regulations to be from time to time made for the purpose: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, doth by these general regulations authorize sums of money not exceeding the amounts hereinafter specified to be demanded, received, and had by the council of any shire as and for stallages, rents, tolls, and dues, of and from every person exposing or offering for sale or selling in any market the articles and animals hereinafter mentioned, and for the use of any building, place, or machine provided by the council of any shire for the weighing of carts, and for the use for the sale of cattle of any yards or premises within such shire, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore recited Act, that is to say:—

FOR EXPOSING FOR SALE OR SELLING IN ANY MARKET.

*Vegetables.*  
 For every cart or dray loaded, in whole or in part, with vegetables or esculent roots } 1s. per day.  
 For every wheelbarrow loaded, ditto ... 6d. "  
 For every hand-basket, ditto ... 6d. "

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled *An Act for Hospitals and Charitable Institutions*, it is amongst other things enacted, that any institution established for the cure of disease, or for the relief of diseased, aged, incurable, or destitute persons, and supported in whole or in part by the voluntary contributions of not less than fifty persons, each of whom shall have paid not less than One pound per annum or Twenty pounds in one donation, may be incorporated as thereinafter mentioned, and all persons who shall have paid as aforesaid shall be deemed contributors within the meaning of the said Act; and it is also enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than twenty-five of the said persons praying that such institution may be incorporated to cause the substance or prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition, signed by an equal or greater number of such persons, shall have been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication) the Governor in Council may declare the contributors for the time being to such institution to be, and they shall thereupon become and continue, a body politic and corporate by the style and title named in the Order in Council, and shall have perpetual succession and a common seal: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by not less than twenty-five contributors to the institution known as the Mansfield Public Hospital, praying that the said institution may be incorporated: And whereas the substance or prayer of the said petition has been published in the *Government Gazette*, and no counter-petition has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order declare the contributors to the said institution to be a body politic and corporate in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, in manner following, that is to say:—

The contributors for the time being to the institution called and known as the Mansfield Public Hospital, situate at Mansfield in the Colony of Victoria, are hereby declared to be a body politic and corporate by the style and title of "The Mansfield Public Hospital."

No. 358, § 22) it is amongst other things enacted, that if the whole or a majority of the ratepayers of any part of a shire or road district in which an annual or general election or first appointment of members has taken place, shall, by petition under their hands, describing such part by metes and bounds, pray the Governor that such part be severed from such shire or road district, or if any part of any shire or road district shall not have been alienated from the Crown and be unoccupied, it shall be lawful for the Governor, if he shall think fit so to do, to order that such part, or so much thereof as the Governor shall think proper, be severed from such shire or road district respectively, and by the same or any other order to direct that the portion so severed from such shire or road district respectively shall be attached to any other shire, borough, road district, riding, or subdivision to be named in such order, and the same shall take effect upon the publication of such order in the *Government Gazette*: And whereas the powers conferred upon the Governor by the section of the Act above recited are now exercised upon a petition of a majority of the ratepayers of a part of the Shire of Ripon therein described; and notices of such petition have been published in the manner prescribed in the twenty-ninth section of the same Act, and no counter petition has since been presented to the Governor, praying him not to grant the prayer of the petition above mentioned: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order, direct that the part of the Shire of Ripon which is described in the petition hereinbefore mentioned, viz.:—“Commencing at the north-eastern corner of allotment 127, parish of Burrumbeet; thence south to Lake Burrumbeet; thence by the northern shores of the said lake to the north-west bend; thence north to the Main Ararat road; thence to the commencing point” shall be severed from such Shire of Ripon, and shall be attached to the South Riding of the Shire of Ballarat; and the Governor, with the advice aforesaid, doth hereby set forth the altered boundaries of the said South Riding of the Shire of Ballarat, and of the North Riding of the said Shire of Ripon in manner following, that is to say:—

THE SOUTH RIDING OF THE SHIRE OF BALLARAT.—Commencing at a point on the western boundary of the parish of Ballarat where it is intersected by the centre of the main road from Ballarat to Avoca; thence north-westerly by the centre of said main road to the centre of a road forming the boundary between 44 and 67, parish of Burrumbeet; thence westerly by the centre of said road to a point opposite the north-west angle of section X, parish of Ercildoun; thence by a line bearing south to the centre of the Ballarat to Ararat main road; thence by the centre of the said road easterly to a point north of the most westerly portion of the north-west bay of Lake Burrumbeet; thence directly south to that point; thence by the northern and eastern shores of Lake Burrumbeet to the junction of the Burrumbeet Creek; thence south-easterly by the centre of said creek to a point due north of the eastern boundary of section VIII, in the parish of Haddon; thence due south by the said eastern boundary and a direct line to a point in the centre of the road from Carngham to Ballarat; thence northerly and easterly by the centre of the said road to a point in its centre due north of the eastern boundary of section III, parish of Cardigan; thence south to the southern side of the road from Smythe's Creek to Ballarat, where it is intersected by the east boundary of section V, parish of Cardigan; thence by the southern side of said road easterly to the southern boundary of the borough of Ballarat; thence by part of the southern and western boundary of said borough westerly and northerly to the western boundary of the parish of Ballarat; thence by the western boundary of the parish of Ballarat northerly to the commencing point.

\* This calculation is made upon the population at the last census. Instead of the present population, as there are no means of estimating the changes which have taken place in the different sub-districts since the census was taken. It is believed that the present population of the whole district of Melbourne and suburbs amounts to 180,000. If this be correct, the mortality of the month under review would indicate a proportion of 1.18 deaths to every 1000 persons living.

The deaths in September 1870 were fewer by 96 than those in August, they were also fewer by 25 than the average of September during the previous ten years.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 71.0 on the 5th, and the lowest was 35.6 on the 21st. The mean temperature of the month (51.5°) was 2.4° below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (31.2°) took place on the 1st, viz.:—from a maximum of 67.3° to a minimum of 36.1°. The



least range (29) was on the 7th, viz.—from a maximum of 59°2' to a minimum of 56°3'. The mean daily range was 16°30'. The mean atmospheric pressure (29·925 inches) was a fraction above the average.

Fifty-six per cent. of the deaths were of males and 44 per cent. were of females; 32 per cent. were of children who had not attained their fifth year against 33 per cent. in September 1869, 37 per cent. in September 1868, 40 per cent. in September 1867, 41 per cent. in September 1866, 51 per cent. in September 1865, 38 per cent. in September 1864, 33 per cent. in September 1863, 43 per cent. in September 1862, 40 per cent. in September 1861, and 53 per cent. in September 1860.

Five persons of 75 years of age or upwards died during the month, viz.:—A male aged 84 of heart disease, a male aged 94 and three females, aged respectively 75, 76, and 93, of old age.

Thirteen violent deaths occurred during the month, viz.—The death of a shipwright aged 52 of injury by a fall; that of a gentleman aged 52 of the effects of a fall down stairs; of a cabman aged 64 from injuries caused by a cab-wheel passing over him; of a carpenter aged 67 of a fractured thigh; of a soldier aged 29 of drowning in Hobson's Bay; of a stonemason aged 33 of drowning in the Yarra; of a child aged 16 days and of another aged 16 weeks of suffocation; of a newborn infant and of a boy aged 2 who were murdered; of a farm laborer aged 24 and of a female aged 43 who drowned themselves in the Yarra; and of a carpenter aged 35 who cut his throat while intoxicated.

Thirty-six deaths, or 17 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—22 in the Melbourne Hospital, 1 in the Lying-in Hospital, 5 in the Benevolent Asylum, 1 in the Immigrants' Home, 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, and 1 in the Carlton Lunatic Asylum.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 68, of which 41, or 60 per cent., were of males, and 27, or 40 per cent., were of females; of those dying, 62 were under one year of age, 7 were between one and two years, 5 were between two and three years, 1 was between three and four years, and 3 were between four and five years.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 144, of which 78, or 54 per cent., were males and 66, or 46 per cent., were females; 13 were between five and ten, 5 were between ten and fifteen, 5 were between fifteen and twenty, 13 were between twenty and twenty-five, 13 were between twenty-five and thirty, 5 were between thirty and thirty-five, 15 were between thirty-five and forty, 17 were between forty and forty-five, 8 were between forty-five and fifty, 12 were between fifty and fifty-five, 7 were between fifty-five and sixty, 9 were between sixty and sixty-five, 9 were between sixty-five and seventy, 8 were between seventy and seventy-five, 2 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 3 were eighty and upwards.

At a Meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Sandhurst, begun and holden at Sandhurst, in the said district, on the 21st day of October One thousand eight hundred and seventy, it is ordained by the said Board as follows, that is to say:—

That clauses 5 and 9, section IV., of General Bye-law No. 8, passed by the Sandhurst Mining Board on the 13th day of January One thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, is hereby repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—

5. *Special claims.*—For the better and more economical working of quartz it shall be lawful for any miner or miners to take up a quartz claim on any line of reef exceeding eighty (80) yards and not exceeding three hundred and twenty (320) yards in length by a width not exceeding one hundred and fifty (150) yards, subject to the following special conditions:—That the owners of any such claim shall within forty-eight (48) hours after marking off commence to work the claim in a *bona fide* manner, and shall for the first six (6) months thereafter keep constantly employed thereon every lawful day not less than two (2) men, after which and so long as they continue to hold it not less than one (1) man for every forty (40) yards or portion thereof. The erection of machinery for the working of the claim shall be deemed equivalent to manual labor in the following ratio:—£150 shall be deemed equivalent to the labor of one (1) miner for one (1) year, and in a like ratio for every £150 expended *bona fide* for the same purpose in any year; and the net cost of all machinery erected on or in conjunction with such claim may be assessed by a competent surveyor or engineer, and a statutory declaration to such effect, with the amount of capital expended on such machinery specified therein, shall be lodged with the Mining Registrar. Ten per centum per annum of such cost of machinery shall be reckoned as equivalent to manual labor in the ratios hereinbefore provided. Provided that the owner of any such claim shall be entitled to exemption from the aforesaid labor basis for one (1) month for each six (6) months' labor continuously done, such exemption to be recorded in manner as provided for in schedule 2. But in the event of the conditions imposed by this clause not being fulfilled, any claim held under the same shall be liable to forfeiture.

9. *Amalgamated claims, or when labor is found to be inadequate.*—It shall be lawful for the owner of any number of adjacent quartz claims which cannot be worked by manual labor, and the length of which in the aggregate shall not exceed three hundred and twenty (320) yards, and any one of such claims

having worked two hundred and twenty (220) feet below the surface or to the original water-level, to amalgamate their claims into one area, which shall be called a working area, so that such amalgamated claims may be worked from one main shaft and drives; and the working of any one of such amalgamated claims shall be considered equivalent to working the whole of said claims. Or the said claimholders may permanently amalgamate their interests in the said claims, which shall then be registered and held under the same conditions as a special claim (clause 5) under this section IV. Provided always that there shall be one (1) miner employed to every eighty (80) lineal yards contained within such area; and also that such an amalgamation as aforesaid shall not in any way invalidate or interfere with any right, title, or interest of any claimholders, or part claimholders, that may have existed prior to its formation. But no working area shall be considered legally formed until a survey and plan have been made showing the boundaries of all the claims proposed to be amalgamated within said area. And further, the holders of any claim may withdraw the same from any working area three (3) months after they have given to the Mining Registrar and to the manager of the area notice in writing of their intention so to do. Provided that the said claimholders shall have paid their share of all the expenses incurred, and of all the expenses they have agreed to incur, by the execution of any work that they have consented to have done for the benefit of the whole of the said area; but the withdrawal of any claim from any working area shall not deprive the owners of the claims which have not been withdrawn from the free use of any shafts or drives in the said withdrawn claims that may have been made at the joint expense of the claimholders within the said area. **REGULATIONS FOR DIPPING SHEEP UNDER  
"THE SCAB ACT 1870."**

**WHEREAS** by section 36 of *The Scab Act 1870* it is enacted that every owner of infected sheep shall (under the penalty thereby provided) within fourteen days after he has become aware that such sheep are infected, dip them in a suitable manner and with improved medicaments, as provided by section 73 of the said Statute; and whereas by section 78 of the said Statute it is enacted that the Governor in Council may make regulations for prescribing the mode of dipping and the medicaments to be used for the same, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has made the regulations following:—

1. *Mode of Dipping.*—Two immersions (in the medicaments specified by Regulation 3), with not less than seven nor more than fourteen days between each immersion. Each immersion to be for not less than one minute, and the neck and head of the sheep to be saturated on each immersion.

2. *Medicaments to be used for Dipping.*—The mixture commonly known as "Tobacco and sulphur sheep-dressing stuff," at a strength of not less than one pound of good manufactured tobacco and one pound of sulphur to five gallons of water; or the mixture commonly known as "Lime and sulphur sheep-dressing stuff," at a strength of not less than two and a quarter (2½) ounces of good roche lime and two and a quarter (2¼) ounces of sulphur to one gallon of water. The mixture in either case to be at a temperature of not less than one hundred degrees Fahrenheit at the time of dipping therein.

Second quality to be made of flour known in the trade as "best seconds," and the third quality (that issued for prisoners of the Crown) to be made of flour, the produce of prime wheat, from which twelve per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Milk. The milk must be pure and of the best quality.

4. Fresh meat is to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and, when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately, also buttocks only when ordered. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than ten inches, must have been cut off. The sticking pieces must be removed from the fore quarters of beef.

5. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department concerned.

6. The order issued by the head of department must accompany the goods, and the account is to be rendered simultaneously with delivery of the supplies. In other cases the account is to be rendered monthly. The rates or quantities quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

7. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order they will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account.

8. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final. In the event of the decision being against the contractor, the survey fees and expenses, if any, will be deducted as in clause 7.

9. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor; failing which, it will be procured by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 7.

10. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the person to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor in waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead; failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 7.

11. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report of the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government to terminate the contract forthwith.
