RULES OF THE SUPREME COURT.

UNDER THE INSOLVENCY STATUTE 1871.

WHEREAS by *The Insolvency Statute* 1871, section 25, it is provided that the Judges of the Supreme Court may make rules in the same way as rules of the Supreme Court might then be made for the purpose of giving effect to the said Act in all matters in which jurisdiction is thereby given to the Supreme Court, or a judge thereof: Now we, the Judges of the Supreme Court, in pursuance of the said enactment, make the following rules:—

1. That the primary judge will hear appeals under the 12th section of the said Act on every Thursday during the year, except in the interval from the 25th of December to the 31st of January (both inclusive), the times appointed for the sittings of the full Court in equity appeals, the sittings of the Chief Judge of the Court of Mines, and the several holidays mentioned in the Common Law Procedure Statute 1865, and also such other days as the Judge may appoint for special business. And every appeal shall be heard on such day of hearing as shall occur first after one clear week from the notice of appeal, or such day or days of adjournment as the Judge shall appoint; and the full Court will hear appeals from a single Judge during the time appointed for equity appeals.

2. That the officer of the Supreme Court to whom the judge shall forward his notes of evidence and statement of reasons under the 12th section, shall be the associate of the primary judge for the time being.

3. That notice in writing of intention to oppose an order nisi, for compulsory sequestration, and of the grounds of opposing the same under section 45 of the said Act, shall be filed in the office of Alexander O'Grady Rose, now the associate of the primary judge, or the associate of the primary judge for the time being.

4. That the said associate of the primary judge for the time being shall tax the costs awarded by any order of the Supreme Court, or any judge thereof under the said Act subject to review.

5. That the associate of the primary judge, or of any judge of the Supreme Court making an order nisi for sequestration under the fourth part of the said Act, may sign office copies thereof for service under the 44th section of the said Act.

WHEREAS by *The Electoral Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted that where any accidental or unavoidable impediment, misfeasance, or omission shall have happened in the preparation or transmission or printing of any general roll or supplementary roll or ordinary electoral roll or roll of ratepaying electors, the Governor in Council may take all such measures as may be necessary for removing such impediment or rectifying such misfeasance or omission, or may declare any such roll valid as to and notwithstanding such impediment, misfeasance, or omission; and every such Order in Council shall state specifically the nature of the impediment, misfeasance, or omission, and shall be forthwith published in the *Government Gazette*: And whereas the names of certain electors were accidentally omitted from the Roll of Ratepaying Electors for the Yan Yean Division of the Electoral District of Evelyn: And whereas the said divisional roll has since been corrected: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power in him vested by the 68th section of the Act No. 279, doth declare valid the roll of ratepaying electors for the division of the district hereinbefore mentioned so corrected as aforesaid.

And the Honorable Sir James McCulloch, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

VICTORIAN RAILWAYS.—STORE REGULATIONS.

THE Governor in Council has approved of the cancellation of Regulations 17, 18, and 19 of 12th October 1863, and the substitution of the following in lieu thereof.

17. It will be the duty of the railway storekeeper frequently to inspect the stores under his control at Williamstown, Melbourne, and all up-country stations; making such inspections without previous notice, checking the stock of certain items by ascertaining the weight, tale, or measurement thereof, and generally taking means to ensure the correct record of receipts and issues in the railway store books.

18. Articles liable to loss in quantity from shrinkage, leakage, or other cause, shall be examined yearly at 31st December, as to the actual stock on hand; and the stock of all other articles under the railway storekeeper's control shall be similarly ascertained at least once in three years, by means of the inspections above mentioned, the dates of such inspections being recorded in the store books.

19. Stock of all articles shall be taken by account at 31st December in each year, and the return thereof, showing the quantity and value of each item, shall be certified by the railway storekeeper, and forwarded for the use of the railway accountant.

CENSUS DISTRICTS.

IN pursuance of the provisions of the 4th section of *The Census Act for 1871*, the Governor in Council has defined the districts, hereinafter described, for which Enumerators shall act; such districts to be in lieu of those appointed by Order of 9th December 1870, and numbered 27, 45, and 46, and designated the East Murray, the Warrnambool, and the Belfast districts, viz.:-

No. 27a.—Upper Murray.

No. 46.—Belfast.

If this be correct, the mortality of the month under review would indicate a proportion of 2.07 deaths to every 1000 persons living.

The deaths in December 1870 exceeded those in November by 118. They were however fewer by 24 than the average of December during the previous ten years.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 97.5° on the 17th, and the lowest was 40.0° on the 4th. The mean temperature of the month (63.6°) was 4° above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (44.3°) took place on the 16th, viz.:—from a maximum of 92.0 to a minimum of 47.7°. The least range (6.5°) was on the 31st, viz.:—from a maximum of 62.5 to a minimum of 56.0°. The mean daily range was 21.66°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.876 inches) was a fraction above the average.

Sixty per cent. of the deaths were of males and 40 per cent. were of females, 52 per cent. were of children who had not attained their fifth year against 53 per cent. in December 1869, 55 per cent. in December 1868, 54 per cent. in December 1867, 69 per cent. in December 1866, 65½ per cent. in December 1865, 63 per cent. in December 1864, 47 per cent. in December 1863, 66 per cent. in December 1862, 50 per cent. in December 1861, and 73 per cent. in December 1860.

Eight persons of 75 years old or upwards died during the month, viz., a cooper aged 75 of apoplexy, a wheelwright aged 76 and a banker's clerk aged 76 of disease of the brain, a forester aged 78 of pneumonia, a laborer aged 80 of old age, a laborer aged 86 of pericarditis, a female aged 78 of cirrhosis, and a female aged 80 of old age.

Seventeen violent deaths occurred during the month, of which the following are the particulars:—a grocer aged 21 died of injuries resulting from a fall from a horse; a miller aged 28 of injuries resulting from becoming entangled in machinery; a seaman aged 24 of accidental injuries to the head; a plasterer aged 41 of the effects of falling from a scaffold; a laborer aged 56 of fracture of the leg caused by the fall of a tree; a domestic female servant aged 14 of burns arising from her clothes taking fire; a laborer aged 39 of poisoning by an excessive dose of morphia; a girl aged 10, a brickmaker aged 18, a seaman aged 22, an undescribed male aged 30, and a publican aged 41, of accidental drowning; a tailor aged 30, a female aged 32, a commission agent aged 41, a clerk aged 50, and a shoemaker aged 55, of suicidal drowning.

Fifty-eight deaths, or 16 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—33 in the Melbourne Hospital, 2 in the Lying-in Hospital, 9 in the Benevolent Asylum, 2 in the Immigrants' Home, 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Carlton Lunatic Asylum, 3 in the Industrial Schools, 1 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 1 in the Pentridge Stockade.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 197, of which 113, or 57 per cent., were of males, and 84, or 43 per cent., were of females; of those dying, 148 were under one year of age, 32 were between one and two years; 9 were between two and three years, 4 between three and four years, and 4 were between four and five years.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 176, of which 109, or 62 per cent., were males, and 67, or 38 per cent., were females; 5 were between five and ten, 6 were between ten and fifteen, 6 were between fifteen and twenty, 15 were between twenty and twenty-five, 14 were between twenty-five and thirty, 23 were between thirty and thirty-five, 13 were between thirty-five and forty, 19 were between forty and forty-five, 18 were between forty-five and fifty, 14 were between fifty and fifty-five, 10 were between fifty-five and sixty, 12 were between sixty and sixty-five, 8 were between sixty-five and seventy, 5 were between seventy and seventy-five, 5 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 3 were eighty and upwards.

QUARANTINE DISTRICT UNDER "THE SCAB ACT 1870."

IN pursuance of the 64th section of *The Scab Act 1870* the Governor in Council has ordered that the portion of Victoria, whereof the boundaries are hereinafter defined, and which is known as the Narraport run, shall be a Quarantine District within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:—

NARRAPORT RUN.—Commencing at the north-west angle, and bounded on the north by the Karyrie run, bearing easterly about eight miles; thence southerly about eight miles twenty-six chains; thence westerly to the eastern boundary of the Morton Plains run about two miles and a-half; thence by the north-eastern boundary of Morton Plains to the eastern boundary of Wirumbirchip, bearing north-westerly about seven miles and a-half; and thence by the eastern boundary of Wirumbirchip run, bearing northerly about three miles to the commencing point.

QUARANTINE DISTRICTS UNDER "THE SCAB ACT 1870."

IN pursuance of the 64th section of *The Scab Act 1870*, the Governor in Council has ordered that the portions of Victoria whereof the boundaries are hereinafter defined, shall be Quarantine Districts within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:—

BARTON RUN.—Commencing at the point where the Lexington run crosses the summit of the Mount William Range; thence by that range and a line, being the eastern boundary of the Mount Burchet run, bearing southerly and south-westerly to the Wannon run; thence by that run bearing south-easterly to the Yarram-yarram run; thence by that run bearing south-easterly to the Mount William run; thence by that run bearing north-easterly and easterly to the Mount William Plains run; thence by that run and by the Burrumbeep run, bearing north-easterly to the Lexington run aforesaid; and thence by that run westerly to the point of commencement: as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.
