DISCONTINUING THE QUARANTINING OF VESSELS, ETC., ARRIVING FROM THE DUTCH EAST INDIES.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under my hand and the seal of the colony, bearing date the fifth day of September in the year One thousand eight hundred and seventy, and issued with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance of the provisions of *The Public Health Statute* 1865 (28 Victoria No. 264), I did notify that the Settlements of the Dutch in the East Indies were infected with cholera and other infectious or contagious diseases, and that it was probable such diseases might be brought from such places to Victoria; and that all vessels therefrom arriving at this port should perform quarantine until relieved by the health officer of Port Phillip: And whereas the said health officer has reported that vessels lately arrived from the before mentioned Settlements have been free from disease, and that intelligence has been brought by the same vessels that contagious disease of any nature to be apprehended here has ceased to exist at the said Settlements: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke my Proclamation of the fifth day of September 1870 hereinbefore referred to, and do notify that vessels arriving from the Settlements of the Dutch in the East shall no longer be required to perform quarantine in compliance with my said Proclamation.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the session held in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign (No. 265), called *The Police Offences Statute* 1865, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* extend all or any of the provisions contained in Part I. of the

said Statute to any city, town, district, or place in Victoria, and may define the limits of any such city, town, district, or place, and vary and alter such limits, and may revoke any such Proclamation; and upon any such Proclamation the provisions so proclaimed shall extend to and be in force in such city, town, district, or place: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, do, with the advice of the Executive Council, by this my Proclamation, extend all the provisions contained in Part I. of the said Statute to the township hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the power conferred by *The Shires Statute* (33 Vict. No. 358), has, by Orders made on the 4th day of April 1871, directed that the undermentioned Shire Councils shall, within the times by the said Orders appointed, execute the works on the Main Roads hereinafter named and described, as provided by the 294th section of the said Act, according to a sufficient plan deposited with the Minister administering the said Act, that is to say:-

* This calculation is made upon the population at the last census, instead of the present population, as there are no means of estimating the changes which have taken place in the different sub-districts since the census was taken. It is believed that the present population of the whole district of Melbourne and suburbs amounts to 180,000. If this be correct, the mortality of the month under review would indicate a proportion of 1.98 deaths to every 1000 persons living.

The deaths in February were fewer by 23 than those of January. They were also fewer by 9 than the average of February during the previous ten years.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 68°8' on the 19th, and the lowest was 49°3' on the 2nd. The mean temperature of the month (66°7") was 1°2' above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (35°9') took place on the 13th, viz.:—from a maximum of 87°3' to a minimum of 51°6'. The least range (5°8') was on the 25th, viz.:—from a maximum of 67°3' to a minimum of 61°5". The mean daily range was 20°5". The mean atmospheric pressure (29°850 inches) was a fraction below the average.

Males and females contributed 53 and 47 per cent. respectively to the total mortality. Children who had not attained their fifth year contributed 65 per cent. against 55 per cent. in February 1870, 60 per cent. in February 1869, 57 per cent. in February 1868, 74 per cent. in February 1867, 58 per cent. in February 1866, 64 per cent. in February 1865, 62 per cent. in February 1864, 65 per cent. in February 1863, 68 per cent. in February 1862, and 66 per cent. in February 1861.

Four persons of 75 years of age or upwards died during the month, viz., a male aged 86 of old age, a female aged 75 of apoplexy, a female aged 81 of heart disease, and a female aged 83 of old age.

Sixteen deaths resulted from violence during the month, of which the following are the particulars:—A girl aged 3 died of an injury to the head arising from a fall; a boy aged 12 was killed by being accidentally struck by a quoit; a laborer aged 24 died of fracture of the skull caused by a fall from a tree; a carter aged 27 was killed by a dray wheel passing over him; a teacher aged 46 died of fracture of the skull caused by a fall; a female aged 46 of injuries caused by falling from a cab; a female aged 68 of fracture of the thigh caused by a water-cask falling on her; a tailor aged 22, a farmer aged 26, and a lunger aged 35, were accidentally drowned; two female infants aged respectively 4 weeks and 3 months were suffocated in bed; a manager of an insurance company aged 57 died of shock to the nervous system; a newly-born female infant was murdered by strangulation; an accountant aged 48 poisoned himself, and a laborer aged 42 hanged himself.

Fifty-four deaths, or 15 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—33 in the Melbourne Hospital, 2 in the Lying-in Hospital, 4 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Immigrants' Home, 3 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 7 in the Industrial Schools, 1 in the Pentridge Stockade, 1 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 231, of which 116, or 50 per cent., were of males, and 115, or 50 per cent., were of females; of those dying, 164 were under one year of age, 50 were between one and two years, 8 were between two and three, 6 were between three and four, and 3 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 126, of which 72, or 57 per cent., were males, and 54, or 43 per cent., were females; 5 were between five and ten, 5 were between ten and fifteen, 7 were between fifteen and twenty, 9 were between twenty and twenty-five, 9 were between twenty-five and thirty, 10 were between thirty and thirty-five, 13 were between thirty-five and forty, 16 were between forty and forty-five, 14 were between forty-five and fifty, 4 were between fifty and fifty-five, 13 were between fifty-five and sixty, 9 were between sixty and sixty-five, 5 were between sixty-five and seventy, 3 were between seventy and seventy-five, 1 was between seventy-five and eighty, and 3 were eighty and upwards.

The number of deaths from zymotic diseases (125) was the same in February as in the previous month; dysentery and diarrhoea were, however, less fatal in February than in January, the numbers being 66 against 80. BYE-LAWS OF THE KINETON HOSPITAL.

THE Bye-laws and Rules till now existing for the management of the hospital shall be and are hereby repealed.

1. *Object.*—The hospital shall be for the purpose of affording medical and surgical relief in accident or disease, under such conditions as the committee shall from time to time determine.

PRIVILEGE OF CONTRIBUTORS.

2. Every benefactor of £20 and upwards, and every annual contributor of £1 and upwards, shall be regarded as "contributors for the time being," under the second section of the Act of Incorporation, and be eligible to be members of committee.

3. Every such contributor shall have power for twelve months from the date of his subscription to recommend patients for the hospital, at the rate of one patient for every pound sterling subscribed, subject to the approval of the committee; and shall also be entitled to one vote at the meetings of contributors.

4. *Life Governors.*—The sum of twenty pounds sterling, or more, paid by one person in any one donation in any one year, shall entitle the donor to be placed on the list of life governors. That life governors have the same privileges, in respect of recommending patients, as annual subscribers of three pounds, and that they be eligible for election as members of committee, or for any honorary office.

MEETINGS OF CONTRIBUTORS.

5. *Annual meeting.*—The annual meeting shall be held the second Thursday in January of each year, at which the report of the committee and balance-sheet shall be submitted for the approval of contributors. At the commencement of the business of such meeting three contributors shall be appointed to try the validity of all disputed elections during the year. Two contributors shall also be elected as auditors for the year, and any vacancies occurring in the said offices during the currency of the year shall be filled up by the committee for the time

being. All matters pertaining to the hospital shall be open to discussion; and resolutions may be passed on any such matters, and any business brought before it (which may, consistently with the Act of Incorporation and the bye-laws, be transacted at it) may be absolutely decided upon. That the balance-sheet be published in each newspaper prior to the annual meeting.

6. *Chairman.*—At all meetings of contributors the meeting shall choose its own chairman, who shall have a casting vote only.

7. *Candidates.*—At all elections for members of committee no contributor shall be allowed to propose a candidate as a member of committee unless he has previously obtained his consent in writing to act if elected on such committee.

8. *Special Meetings of Contributors.*—It shall be competent for the general committee, by vote, or any twelve or more contributors by writing under their hands, to require the secretary to summon a special meeting of contributors at any time or times between the annual meetings; the occasion of calling every such meeting shall be specified in the requisition, and no other business shall be transacted thereat; and every such meeting shall, with an intelligible reference to its object, be called by the secretary, by advertisement in one or more of the local newspapers, at least one week before the day of meeting, the business of such meeting being fully set forth in such advertisement.

9. At all meetings of contributors, twenty present shall form a quorum, and that in the event of there being no quorum, the majority present shall appoint a subsequent day (not more than fourteen days after), for the meeting to be held.

MANAGEMENT.

10. *Committee.*—The affairs of the hospital shall be managed by a committee consisting of a president, vice-president, treasurer, twelve (12) ordinary members, and three honorary medical officers, who shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting of contributors, or at a meeting of contributors especially called for that purpose, and who shall retire in the following order, viz. :—The president, vice-president, treasurer, and honorary medical officers (who shall be three in number, and shall reside within ten miles of the town of Kyneton) annually, and ordinary members in accordance with clause 11 of Act 220, 27 Vic. But every retiring member shall be eligible for re-election; and any member of committee on being elected to any of the above offices, viz., president, vice-president, treasurer, or honorary medical officers, shall cease to be an ordinary member of committee, and the vacancy so made shall be filled up at the same meeting at which such officer is elected. No member of committee shall remain longer in office, without being re-elected.

11. *Powers of Committee.*—The general committee shall direct the business of the hospital, frame rules for its internal regulation (the same not being repugnant to the bye-laws), alter, repeal, amend, and make new rules, enter into contracts for the supply of provisions and other articles for the use of the hospital, direct payment to be made for the same, and appoint and discharge all paid officers and servants of the institution. They shall meet once in every month, and on such other days as they may appoint by way of adjournment, or otherwise, and four shall form a quorum. As soon as a quorum shall be present the chair shall be taken by the president, or, in his absence, by the vice-president, or, in the absence of both, by a chairman appointed by the members then present; but if no quorum shall be present within thirty minutes of the time named such meeting, as well as every special meeting hereinafter authorized, shall stand adjourned to such day as the members present may determine. All new rules made by the committee shall be embodied in their report to the contributors.

12. The president shall be an *ex officio* member of all sub-committees.

13. *Special Meetings of Committee.*—The general committee by vote, or three members thereof by writing under their hand, shall be at liberty at any time to require the secretary to summon a special meeting of the general committee, three clear days notice of which shall be given to each member and the object specified.

14. No member of committee shall vote on any question in which he shall have any pecuniary interest.

15. All paid officers and servants shall be appointed and dismissed by the general committee, and shall find such security as may be required.

16. *Treasurer.*—The treasurer shall receive all moneys on behalf of the hospital, and deposit the same in such bank as the committee shall direct to the credit of the hospital. He shall pay all accounts passed by the committee, by drafts on the bank, signed by the president or by himself, to be countersigned in each case by the secretary.

17. *Honorary Medical Officers.*—The honorary medical officers shall have access to the hospital at all times. They and the resident surgeon shall perform all surgical operations in such order as may be agreed upon among themselves, but no such operation shall be performed without a previous consultation of as many of the medical staff as can be obtained, except in cases of emergency, and they shall regularly consult in all cases of importance or protracted continuance in the hospital.

18. *Secretary.*—The secretary shall attend all annual, special and general committee meetings, take minutes of all the proceedings transacted at such meetings, and transcribe them carefully into the books kept for that purpose, and carry out all the directions of such meetings in all particulars incident to his office.

19. *Collector.*—The collector shall canvass for and collect subscriptions, and all moneys due to or receivable by the institution, in all cases giving receipts, and shall within seven days of the time of receipt of such moneys pay over the same into the bank in the name of the treasurer to the credit of the hospital, and submit at each meeting of the general committee an account of the sums so received, and the bank book.

20. *Admission and House Committee.*—There shall be a sub-committee to regulate the admission of patients, who shall act

as a house committee, and shall report to the general committee as to the want of the hospital, and make such purchases to the extent of £5 as may be urgently required, or such goods as may be authorized by the general committee, and such committee shall consist of the honorary medical officers, resident surgeon, and two ordinary members of the general committee (the latter to be chosen in alphabetical order, and to serve one month), two to form a quorum, and any member who cannot attend during his month of office may nominate any other member of committee who will consent to act, and shall attend at the hospital on Tuesday and Friday in each week, between the hours of twelve and two o'clock, to regulate the admission and discharge of patients, &c.

21. *Finance Committee.*—There shall be a standing finance committee, consisting of three members and the treasurer, who shall examine all accounts prior to the monthly meeting, and certify to their correctness, two members to form a quorum, and that in the event of the finance committee not having passed the accounts prior to the meeting, the committee shall have power to appoint two of their number present to examine the accounts, and upon their report the said accounts shall be dealt with by the committee.

PATIENTS.

22. *Form of Application for Admission.*—All applications for admission must, in ordinary cases, procure a recommendation from a contributor before being allowed the benefits of the hospital; the fitness of all applicants for relief to be determined by the sub-committee, and in the absence of the other members by the resident surgeon. Every applicant for treatment must also sign the following declaration on the back of the recommendation form:—

I, A.B., hereby certify that I am in such indigent circumstances as to be unable to pay the sum of not less than One pound per week for my maintenance and relief whilst an inmate of the hospital.

(Signed) A.B., applicant.

23. *Cases for treatment.*—Cases of emergency or of severe accidents shall be admitted without requiring a recommendation, and the sub-committee shall have the power of dispensing with the recommendation papers in special cases. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement, no person afflicted with any infectious disease, or suffering from chronic paralysis, nor any person who in the opinion of one of the medical or surgical officers and resident surgeon, or house committee, is unsuitable to be admitted, shall be received as an in-patient under any circumstances; and the cause of the refusal to any applicant so refused admittance shall be stated by the resident surgeon in his report to the next meeting of the general committee.

24. *Payments of Patients.*—All patients shall be required to pay the actual expenses of their maintenance, as far as their circumstances may enable them; and all property found on deceased patients shall be handed to the legal representatives or the Curator of Intestate Estates, and an account rendered to the said curator for the amount due for the patients' maintenance and burial.

25. *Out-door relief.*—The resident surgeon shall receive all out-door patients, previously admitted for medical treatment, on Tuesdays and Fridays, between the hours of Twelve and Two o'clock. Previous to the departure of patients, who may leave the hospital of their own desire, they shall be required to sign a declaration to that effect.

26. *Religious services.*—Ministers of religion or persons certified by them in writing to be qualified, and no other, shall have access to sick persons of their respective denominations at all reasonable times, for the purpose of religious instruction. Every clergyman or religious instructor shall confine his visits to the sick patients who belong to his religious communion, unless his services are specially requested by any of the patients, and shall impart religious instruction at the bedside of the patient in such a way as to be as little overheard as possible by the surrounding patients. It is not allowable to read in a loud voice or conduct public religious service in the sick wards of the hospital, but the board-room of the hospital shall be available for public worship among the convalescents of each religious persuasion, as far as the same may be practicable, subject to the approval of the general committee.

CONTRACTS.

27. *Period of Contracts.*—The general committee shall not have power to enter into agreements with the paid officers or servants, or into any contracts for the supply of goods for a period extending over the hospital year.

28. *Tenders.*—That no member of committee shall be allowed to supply any article whatsoever for the use of the hospital, either by tender or otherwise.

29. *Security.*—All goods shall, where practicable, be supplied by contract, and all tenders for the supply of goods shall be accompanied with a cash deposit as security, for the due fulfilment of the contract, to such amount as the general committee shall from time to time direct.
