AID TO BUILDING FUND OF FREE LIBRARIES, 1871.

APPLICATION for a share in the sum of £1000 granted by the Legislature in Aid of the Building Fund of Free Libraries in the up-country districts will be received at this office until the 20th of May next.

N.B.—To entitle any institution to share in this Grant, such institution must be *bona fide* a free library, that is, a library open to the public daily free of charge, as is the case with the Melbourne Public Library.

The following particulars must be furnished, viz. :—

1. The name of the institution, which should clearly indicate that it is a Free Library.
2. The amount expended in the erection or purchase of the building, and the materials of which it is constructed.
3. The amount already contributed by the Government.
4. The amount locally subscribed, *now in hand*.
5. Whether the land is the property of the institution, and whether granted by the Crown or purchased.
6. The number of books.
7. The number of visitors during 1870.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it is also enacted that the Governor may from time to time increase, and after one month's notice in the *Government Gazette* diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of the said Act; and it is directed that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons shall be published and all objections thereto shall be heard in the manner set forth in the One hundredth section of the said Act: And whereas the notices prescribed by the said Act have been given: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby abolish the Omeo Goldfield Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-fourth day of October 1864, and with the advice aforesaid I do hereby proclaim another common in lieu thereof, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:-

THE OMEO GOLDFIELD COMMON.—The unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries hereinafter described shall be and constitute the Omeo Goldfield Common, viz.: Commencing at the junction of Wilson's Creek with Livingstone Creek; thence by Wilson's Creek bearing easterly to the road from Tongio to Hinnomungie; thence by that road bearing southerly to the north-east angle of allotment 138, parish of Cobungra; thence by a line bearing south-westerly fifty-four chains, more or less, to the south-west angle of allotment 134; thence by a line bearing south-westerly twenty-seven chains, more or less, to the crossing of Day's Creek by the road from Omeo to the Splitting Forest; thence by that creek bearing south-easterly to the Camping-ground Creek; thence by that creek bearing southerly to the north boundary of allotment 230; thence by that allotment and a line bearing west twenty-seven chains, more or less, to the south-east angle of allotment 221; thence by the road bounding allotments 220, 218, 217, 214, 213, 211, 210, 109, 106, 105, and 103, bearing southerly, westerly, and north-westerly to the west angle of the last-named allotment; thence by a line bearing north-westerly seventy-two chains, more or less, to a point on Livingstone Creek bearing east from the junction of Dryhill Creek therewith; and thence by Livingstone Creek bearing northerly to the point of commencement: as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne. Area available for commonage about 4300 acres.—(69. V. 22024.)

DISTRICTS WHERE CERTIFICATES MAY BE GRANTED FOR PUBLICANS' LICENSES CHARGEABLE WITH FEE OF £10.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Wines, Beer, and Spirits Sale Statute 1864 Amendment Act* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council upon the application in writing of the council of any shire or road district to proclaim any part of such shire or road district to be defined by such council and not being in or within one mile of any city or town a part within which the licensing magistrates for such district may grant certificates for publicans' licenses as aforesaid for which shall be charged the annual license fee of Ten pounds, and on the like application of the council of any borough not being within fifty miles of the city of Melbourne, the Governor in Council may if he shall think fit proclaim any portion of such borough as a part within which the licensing magistrates for the district may grant certificates for such publicans' licenses, and for which license shall be charged a like fee of Ten pounds, and the said Governor in Council may from time to time revoke any such proclamation, such revocation to take effect from the time of the expiration of the last issued license under such proclamation: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the several Boroughs and Shires and parts thereof specified in the annexed Schedule, with the exemptions specially therein named, to be districts respectively within which Licensing Magistrates may grant Certificates for Publicans' Licenses for which shall be charged the annual License Fee of Ten pounds, that is to say:—

SCHEDULE.

Names of Boroughs and Shires.	Portions exempted.
Borough of Castlemaine. Twenty chains distant by any road, street, or highway beyond so much of the borough as is described by the following boundaries:— Commencing by a point at the intersection of the east side of Kennedy street and the south side of Dove-ton street, bearing eastward to the intersection of Dove-ton street and Urquhart street; thence on the west side of Urquhart street southward to the intersection of Urquhart street and Forest street; thence on the north side of Forest street westward to the intersection of Forest street and Kennedy street; thence on the east side of Kennedy street to the point of commencement.	
Borough of Maryborough ...	The area comprised within a radius of one mile from the Post Office in the Borough of Maryborough.
Shire of Corio. "The Lara Riding" and also "The Moorpanyal Riding" of that shire	The area comprised within a circuit of one mile around the boundaries of the town of Geelong.
Shire of Glenelg ...	The townships of Casterton, Merino, and Sandford, and also those portions of the townships of Coleraine and Digby, being within the Shire of Glenelg, and with the further exception of the areas comprised within a circuit of two miles around those townships and portions of townships respectively.
Shire of Wimmera ...	The townships of Horsham, Dimboola, and Lawloit, and the areas comprised within a circuit of five miles around the boundaries of those townships respectively.

PART II. OF "THE PUBLIC HEALTH AMENDING STATUTE 1867" EXTENDED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the thirty-first year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled *An Act to amend the Laws relating to or affecting Public Health* (31 Vict. No. 310), it is amongst other things enacted, that this Part (that is to say, Part II.) of this Act shall apply to all places where the Part of the Act thereby repealed, or any portion thereof, has been in force, and all or some of the provisions of this Part shall also apply to every such city, town, borough, shire, district, or place in Victoria as the Governor in Council shall by Proclamation direct; and the Governor in Council may at any time, and from time to time, alter, repeal, or revoke any such Proclamation theretofore or thereafter made: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation direct that all the provisions of Part II. of the above recited Act, 31 Victoria No. 310, shall apply to the respective Shires and Road District hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

THE SHIRE OF BET-BET,
THE SHIRE OF WARRENAMBOOL,
THE MELTON ROAD DISTRICT.

* This calculation is made upon the population at the last census, instead of the present population, as there are no means of estimating the changes which have taken place in the different sub-districts since the census was taken. It is believed that the present population of the whole district of Melbourne and suburbs amounts to 180,000. If this be correct, the mortality of the month under review would indicate a proportion of 1.93 deaths to every 1000 persons living.

The daily average of mortality in March was not so great as it was in February, the numbers being 11.23 and 12.75. The total deaths in March were also fewer by 14 than the average of the month in the preceding ten years.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 86.9° on the 27th, and the lowest was 44.0° on the 19th. The mean temperature of the month (60.2°) was 3.9° below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (37.9°) took place on the 27th, viz.:—from a maximum of 86.9° to a minimum of 49.0°. The least range (8.3°) was on the 10th, viz.:—from a maximum of 66.5° to a minimum of 58.2°. The mean daily range was 21.9°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.905 inches) was a fraction above the average.

Fifty-five per cent. of the deaths were of males, and 45 per cent. were of females; 52 per cent. were of children who had not attained their fifth year, against 47 per cent. in March 1870, 43 per cent. in March 1869, 61 per cent. in March 1868, 63 per cent. in March 1867, 57 per cent. in March 1866, 59 per cent. in March 1865, 53 per cent. in March 1864, 57 per cent. in March 1863, 58 per cent. in March 1862, and 65 per cent. in March 1861.

Nine persons of 75 years of age or upwards died during the month, viz.:—A male aged 75 of apoplexy, a male aged 75 of old age, a male aged 75 of a fractured thigh, a male aged 83 of cancer of the stomach, a male aged 81 of old age, a male aged 87 of old age, a female aged 78 of dysentery, a female aged 78 of constipation, and a female aged 85 of old age.

Twenty-one violent deaths occurred, of which 15 were referred to accident, 1 to homicide, and 5 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A girl aged 12 died of concussion of the brain caused by a fall; a bootmaker aged 15 of mortification resulting from injuries to the arm; a compositor aged 19 of a crushed forearm; a farm laborer aged 27 of internal injuries; a merchant aged 39 of rupture of the liver caused by violence; a woollen manufacturer aged 75 of fracture of the thigh caused by a fall; a girl aged 7 of a burn; three boys aged respectively 11, 6, and 9, a seaman aged 23, and two females aged 34 and 37, of drowning; a notary public aged 43 was found drowned in the River Yarra; and a female infant aged 12 weeks of suffocation from being overlain. The homicidal death was that of a male infant aged 18 days of pneumonia, the result of neglect by the mother (verdict of the jury manslaughter.) The suicidal deaths were those of a publican aged 28, a female servant aged 42, and a produce merchant aged 47, who poisoned themselves; of a male aged 33, who drowned himself; and of an insane female aged 61, who committed suicide by placing herself in front of a railway train.

Sixty deaths, or 17 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—33 in the Melbourne Hospital, 2 in the Lying-in Hospital, 6 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Immigrants' Home, 9 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 6 in the Industrial Schools, and 2 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 180, of which 96, or 53 per cent., were of males, and 84, or 47 per cent., were of females; of those dying, 122 were under one year of age, 39 were between one and two years, 7 were between two and three, 5 were between three and four, and 7 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 168, of which 96, or 57 per cent., were males, and 72, or 43 per cent., were females; 15 were between five and ten, 5 were between ten and fifteen, 7 were between fifteen and twenty, 12 were between twenty and twenty-five, 19 were between twenty-five and thirty, 17 were between thirty and thirty-five, 21 were between thirty-five and forty, 13 were between forty and forty-five, 13 were between forty-five and fifty, 16 were between fifty and fifty-five, 9 were between fifty-five and sixty, 10 were between sixty and sixty-five, 5 were between sixty-five and seventy, 6 were between seventy and seventy-five, 5 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 4 were eighty and upwards.

TARNAGULLA PUBLIC CEMETERY.

REGULATIONS made by the Trustees of the Tarnagulla Cemetery for the management thereof.

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. Any person making a vault or erecting or placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the consent of the trustees, under these rules, and upon the payment of the proper charges, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the tenor of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons, and his or their representatives for ever, from the date of such permission being given.

3. Application for such permission to be made to the said trustees. A certificate of permission, in the form set out in the schedule hereunder written, will be granted to the party applying for such permission, on payment of the proper charges.

4. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any poor person in such cemetery on the certificate of a minister of religion, justice of the peace, or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the said trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relatives or friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

5. The said trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct the same, under the direction of the trustees or their surveyor; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent (in writing) of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

6. The time fixed for the funeral is to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

7. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from Ten a.m. to Six p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to Four p.m. in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the usual and only hours for funerals will be from Nine a.m. to Five p.m. throughout the year.

8. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones to be kept in repair and in proper condition at the expense of the owners.

9. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.

10. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, to be submitted to the trustees for approval, who shall determine and fix the position of any unobjectionable monument according to the description, size, or character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner. In the erection of tablets copper cramps must be used.

11. The plan of all the fences to be submitted to the trustees.

12. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the said trustees, will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

13. The ground will be opened daily to the public, from sunrise to sunset.

14. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, shall be kept at the secretary's office.

15. By *The Cemeteries Statute 1864* it is provided that any person who shall wantonly or wilfully destroy, or do or cause to be done any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree or plant, shall on conviction before any two or more justices of the peace forfeit and pay a sum as a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

16. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these regulations.

17. No dogs will be allowed to enter the cemetery, nor will smoking be permitted.

18. The certificate form in Schedule A to be signed by the chairman of the trustees, and countersigned by the secretary.

19. Any person upon giving an order for interment shall answer the questions contained in Schedule B.

2. That no enclosing wall, fence, building, monument, or tombstone shall be erected or placed on the said piece of ground until a plan thereof has been exhibited to the said trustees, and their authority given for the erection thereof.

3. That the said grave or vault, and the said wall, fence, building, monument, or tombstone, shall be maintained and kept by the said _____ and _____ representatives in proper repair, to the satisfaction of the said trustees.

4. That the said _____ and _____ representatives shall, in the use of the said piece of ground, have access thereto, and be subject in every respect to such rules and regulations as the trustees may from time to time make; and shall not be entitled to exercise the right to bury or inter therein except on payment of such charges as shall from time to time be established by the said trustees.
