A PROCLAMATION

FOR giving Currency to Gold Coins made at the Branch Mint at Sydney, New South Wales, of the like designs as those approved for the corresponding Coins of the Currency of the United Kingdom.

VICTORIA R.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council bearing date the fourteenth day of January, One thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, We have thought fit to order that the designs for gold coins to be coined at the Sydney Branch of Our Royal Mint, pursuant to Our Order in Council of the nineteenth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, establishing the said Branch of Our Royal Mint at Sydney, should be the like designs as now are and from henceforth may be from time to time approved by Us, and in force for the corresponding coins of the currency of this Realm: And whereas in pursuance of the said Order in Council, it is provided that a coinage of gold coins in accordance with the standards of weight and fineness of the various coins of the currency of this Realm, and of the designs aforesaid, shall be made at the said Sydney Branch of Our Royal Mint: And whereas pieces of money of the above descriptions will be coined at the said Branch of Our Royal Mint, in pursuance of Orders issued and to be issued by Us; We have therefore, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do ordain, declare, and command, that from and after the publication of this Our Proclamation in the *London Gazette*, all the said pieces of money so to be coined shall be current and lawful money within the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland; and that from and after the promulgation of this Our Proclamation by the Governors or Officers administering the Government of the hereinafter-mentioned Colonies and Possessions respectively, that is to say:—

A PROCLAMATION

FOR giving currency in certain Colonies to Gold Coins made at Sydney, New South Wales, of the like designs of those approved for the corresponding Coins of the Currency of the United Kingdom.

VICTORIA R.

WHEREAS, in pursuance of Orders issued and to be issued by Us, a coinage of Gold Coins, in accordance with the Standards of Weight and Fineness of the Coins of the Currency of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the like designs as now are and from henceforth may be from time to time approved by Us and in force for the corresponding Coins of the Currency of the said United Kingdom, is being or will be made at the Sydney Branch of Our Royal Mint, We have, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation. And We do Ordain, Declare, and Command that upon and from and after the promulgation thereof by the respective Governors or Officers administering the Governments of Our Colony of Victoria and all or any other of Our Colonies and Possessions wherein Gold Coins, issued from our Mint in London, are a legal tender, other than the Colonies and Possessions specified in the Proclamation promulgated in pursuance of Our Order in Council of the fourteenth January, One thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, relating to the aforesaid Gold Coins, all the said pieces of Gold money so coined or to be coined shall be, and shall pass, and be received as current and lawful money, and be a legal tender for payments in Our said Colony of Victoria and Our said other Colonies and Possessions respectively from the times aforesaid, at the like values and by the like names as the corresponding Coins of the Currency of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and concurrently with any coins now current in the said Colony of Victoria and the said other Colonies and Possessions respectively.

#### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Wines, Beer, and Spirits Sale Statute 1864 Amendment Act* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council upon the application in writing of the council of any shire or road district to proclaim any part of such shire or road district to be defined by such council and not being in or within one mile of any city or town a part within which the licensing magistrates for such district may grant certificates for publicans' licenses as aforesaid for which shall be charged the annual license fee of Ten pounds, and on the like application of the council of any borough not being within fifty miles of the city of Melbourne, the Governor in Council may if he shall think fit proclaim any portion of such borough as a part within which the licensing magistrates for the district may grant certificates for such publicans' licenses, and for which license shall be charged a like fee of Ten pounds, and the said Governor in Council may from time to time revoke any such proclamation, such revocation to take effect from the time of the expiration of the last issued license under such proclamation: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the Borough specified in the annexed Schedule, with the exemptions specially therein named, to be a district within which Licensing

Magistrates may grant Certificates for Publicans' Licenses for which shall be charged the annual License Fee of Ten pounds, that is to say:—

## PUBLIC WORSHIP REGULATIONS.

THE following Regulations respecting the mode of applying for balances unappropriated under previous regulations, have been approved by the Governor in Council, under the powers conferred by the 63rd section of the Constitution Act.

1. When in any year after the year 1870 any moneys to which any denomination shall be entitled for the current year shall remain unappropriated by such denomination, under the regulations of the 12th day of January 1861, the head or recognized organ of communication with the Government of such denomination may receive such unappropriated balance for the purposes of such denomination on applying for the same in the form in the schedule hereto.

2. Every such application shall state whether the moneys so applied for are to be appropriated to promote the erection of buildings or to promote the maintenance of ministers of religion, or to both of such purposes, but so that taking into account the proportion in which the part of the grant in aid for the year

received by such denomination, under the regulation of the 12th day of January 1861, has been applied to such purposes, not more than one half of such grant for the year shall be applied in aid of stipends.

3. All monies received upon any such application as aforesaid, shall be held by such head or recognized organ of communication upon trust to appropriate the same to the purposes specified for the benefit of the denomination.

4. The head of the denomination shall from time to time, at the request of the Governor in Council, furnish a true and particular account of the details of the expenditure of any balance received under these regulations.

5. Nothing in these regulations shall be construed or taken as recognizing any claim on the part of any denomination to receive any portion of the said grant accruing due to them in any year before the year 1870, but not claimed by them in the year in which such portion became due.

\* The compilation of the recent census is not sufficiently advanced to allow a correct estimate of the present population of all the sub-districts to be made. It is believed that the population of the whole district of Melbourne and suburbs amounts to 190,000, which indicates a proportion of 1.66 deaths to every 1000 persons living.

The mortality of Melbourne and suburbs, together with the mean temperature in the shade and the mean atmospheric pressure, during the month of May for the ten years, 1861-1870, were as follow:—

The deaths in May were fewer by 11 than those in April. The mortality was also lower than the average of May during the previous ten years, and this notwithstanding the increase of population which has taken place during the period.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 73.0° on the 8th, and the lowest was 40.0° on the 18th. The mean temperature of the month (54.7°) was 1.8° above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (30.4°) took place on the 18th, viz.:—from a maximum of 70.4° to a minimum of 40.0°. The least range (6.2°) was on the 10th, viz.:—from a maximum of 60.4° to a minimum of 54.2°. The mean daily range was 16.3°. The mean atmospheric pressure (30.005 inches) was a fraction above the average.

Fifty-eight per cent. of the deaths were of males, and 42 per cent. were of females; 39 per cent. were of children who had not attained their fifth year, against 38 per cent. in May 1870, 43 per cent. in May 1869, 45 per cent. in May 1868, 48 per cent. in May 1867, 47 per cent. in May 1866, 56 per cent. in May 1865, 58 per cent. in May 1864, 52 per cent. in May 1863, 54 per cent. in May 1862, and 53 per cent. in May 1861.

Six persons of 75 years of age and upwards died during the month, viz.:—A male aged 77 of bronchitis, a male aged 79 of diarrhoea, three males aged respectively 76, 83, and 94, and a female aged 86 of old age.

Fifteen violent deaths occurred, of which the following are the particulars:—A boy aged 8 died of hæmorrhage from the colon caused by a fall; a boy aged 10 was killed by a fall from a horse; a surveyor's assistant aged 22 died of fracture of the skull, caused by a fall from a horse; a machinist aged 25 died of injuries received by the explosion of a mine; a laborer aged 26 died of a fractured skull caused by a kick from a horse; a master mariner aged 55 died of fracture of the leg resulting from a fall; a publican aged 55 died in consequence of amputation of leg; a girl aged 5 died of accidental burns; an engineer aged 48 died of burns caused by an explosion of gas; a merchant aged 55 died from the effects of chloral administered to induce sleep; a laborer aged 41 and a tailor aged 53 were accidentally drowned; a male infant aged 8 weeks and a female infant aged 13 weeks were suffocated in bed; a female aged 47 poisoned herself.

Seventy-six deaths, or 24 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—44 in the Melbourne Hospital, 3 in the Alfred Hospital, 2 in the Lying-in Hospital, 4 in the Benevolent Asylum, 8 in the Immigrants' Home, 11 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Carlton Lunatic Asylum, 1 in St. Vincent de Paul's Orphanage, and 2 in the Industrial Schools.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 124, of which 65, or 52 per cent., were of males, and 59, or 48 per cent. were of females; of those dying, 80 were under one year of age, 32 were between one and two years, 5 were between two and three, 5 were between three and four, and 2 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 192, of which 117, or 61 per cent., were males, and 75, or 39 per cent., were females; 14 were between five and ten, 5 were between ten and fifteen, 5 were between fifteen and twenty, 10 were between twenty and twenty-five, 12 were between twenty-five and thirty, 15 were between thirty and thirty-five, 21 were between thirty-five and forty, 23 were between forty and forty-five, 17 were between forty-five and fifty, 18 were between fifty and fifty-five, 12 were between fifty-five and sixty, 7 were between sixty and sixty-five, 17 were between sixty-five and seventy, 10 were between seventy and seventy-five, 3 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 3 were eighty and upwards.

Deaths from whooping-cough fell from 14 in April to 11 in the month under review, and deaths from dysentery and diarrhoea fell from 34 to 17. On the other hand, deaths from typhoid and infantile fever increased from 12 to 20. Local diseases were more fatal than those of any other class, both in April and May, especially those of the nervous system and those of the organs of respiration and digestion.

Whereof the Judges and Officers of all the Courts of Justice in Her Majesty's dominions from which an Appeal lies to Her Majesty in Council, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

I. All Cases, Records, and other proceedings in Appeals, or other matters pending before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, are henceforth to be printed in the form known as DEMY QUARTO, and not in demy folio, as hath heretofore been used.

II. The size of the paper used is to be such that the sheet, when folded, will be eleven inches in height and eight inches and a half in width.

III. The type to be used in the text is to be Pica type, but Long Primer is to be used in printing accounts, tabular matter, and notes.

IV. The number of lines in each page of Pica type is to be forty-seven, each line being five inches and three-quarters or 146 millimetres in length.

V. The foregoing Rules do not apply to cases now pending in which the printing of the Record is begun before the receipt of this Order, but in all cases printed after the receipt of this Order the form and type herein prescribed are to be used exclusively.

VI. The price in England for printing 75 copies in the form herein established is to be thirty-eight shillings per sheet (eight pages) of pica, with marginal notes, not including corrections, tabular matter, and other extras.

VII. The form of paper and type of the present Order in Council, with the pages hereunto annexed, are to serve as a specimen sheet or pattern for the printing of the proceedings before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council.

RECORD. 1825 ; but there is nothing in the donation to show that Pierre Roy had any idea of curtailing the powers which by his will he had previously given to his son. The reasons for giving those powers were as cogent at the date of the donation as at the date of the will. And the confidence which the father reposed in the prudence and discretion of his son appears not to have decreased, but on the contrary to have increased, in the period that intervened between the will and the donation. The object of the donor as expressly avowed in the donation was to acknowledge "les bons et essentiels services" which Joseph Roy has rendered to his father, and to recompense him for those services, "l'en récompenser," and this object was carried out by giving to Joseph Roy the power to appropriate to himself during his father's lifetime such portions of the property mentioned in the donation as he might require for building lots, and by giving him an irrevocable title to the deed of donation to the property therein mentioned, of which previously he had only an expectation under his father's will. And yet it is contended that although the will affords proof of the father's confidence in his son having increased, and although the avowed and direct object of it was to recompense him for the important services which he rendered to his father, yet that it indirectly deprived him, in the event of his not having children, of the power respecting his father's property which under the will he was to have had in that case.

I am aware that the bank is suing on the promissory note for five thousand pounds; that transaction went through my hands. The last endorser (Nany

Tamby) gave me the note for the purpose of discounting, it was brought to me before Nany Tamby brought it to me. Sinne Lebbe Brothers brought it to me. The representative of the firm at Colombo brought it to me.\*

I cannot say when the note was first brought to me. When it was brought  
10 it was drawn by Sinne Lebbe Brothers, and endorsed by the Defendants. Sinne

Nos. 292, 291, 290, 275, 474, 263, 264, 265, 261, 260, 269, 254, 252, 245, 242, 241, 217, 216, 215, and 447.

Lebbe brought it to the bank for discount. I objected to it at that time. I said it was not strong enough, and that he as the maker could not get the money.

I suggested that he should get a third name to it. He took it away and brought it back endorsed by Nany Tamby, then reputed to be a very wealthy native.

I discounted the promissory note. I gave the money, five thousand pounds, the full five thousand, to Nany Tamby, by putting it to his credit. I have no recollection of anyone being present on behalf of Sinne Lebbe Brothers when  
20 this was done. I advanced this on the security of the names of Defendants and Nany Tamby.

I never saw Tatham before the bill was discounted.

I had no discussion with him before it was drawn.

I don't remember having said to Mr. Tatham, "I wish you would sign a  
"promissory note for Sinne Lebbe Brothers." I knew that Mr. Tatham was negotiating a loan of fifty thousand pounds to Sinne Lebbe Brothers. I don't recollect having said to Mr. Tatham, If negotiations go on the note will be all right, if not I will make other arrangements. It would have been a temporary affair if the other arrangements had been carried out. If Mr. Tatham had  
30 carried out the arrangements by advancing the fifty thousand pounds, the five thousand pounds would have been retired; that is, he would have paid the five thousand pounds to the bank and take up his note.

If the fifty thousand pounds had not been advanced, I should have looked to the parties whose names were on the note for the amount thereof. The note was to be paid in any event.

And the said Francis Wharton Le Marchand being then and there cross-examined by the said Mr. Philbrick on the part of the Defendants, the following were the answers given on such cross-examination:

There was no particular or special arrangement that the note was to be  
40 paid in any event.

The firm of Sinne Lebbe and Co. was then largely indebted to the bank, and also to Tatham's firm.

I had many conversations with Tatham as to keeping Sinne Lebbe's firm on foot. The business to be done was very large, and the agency valuable. Whoever lent the money was to have Sinne Lebbe's business. Tatham was interested in keeping Sinne Lebbe's firm on foot. We, as bankers, were applied to for money for that purpose. Several estates belonging to Sinne Lebbe

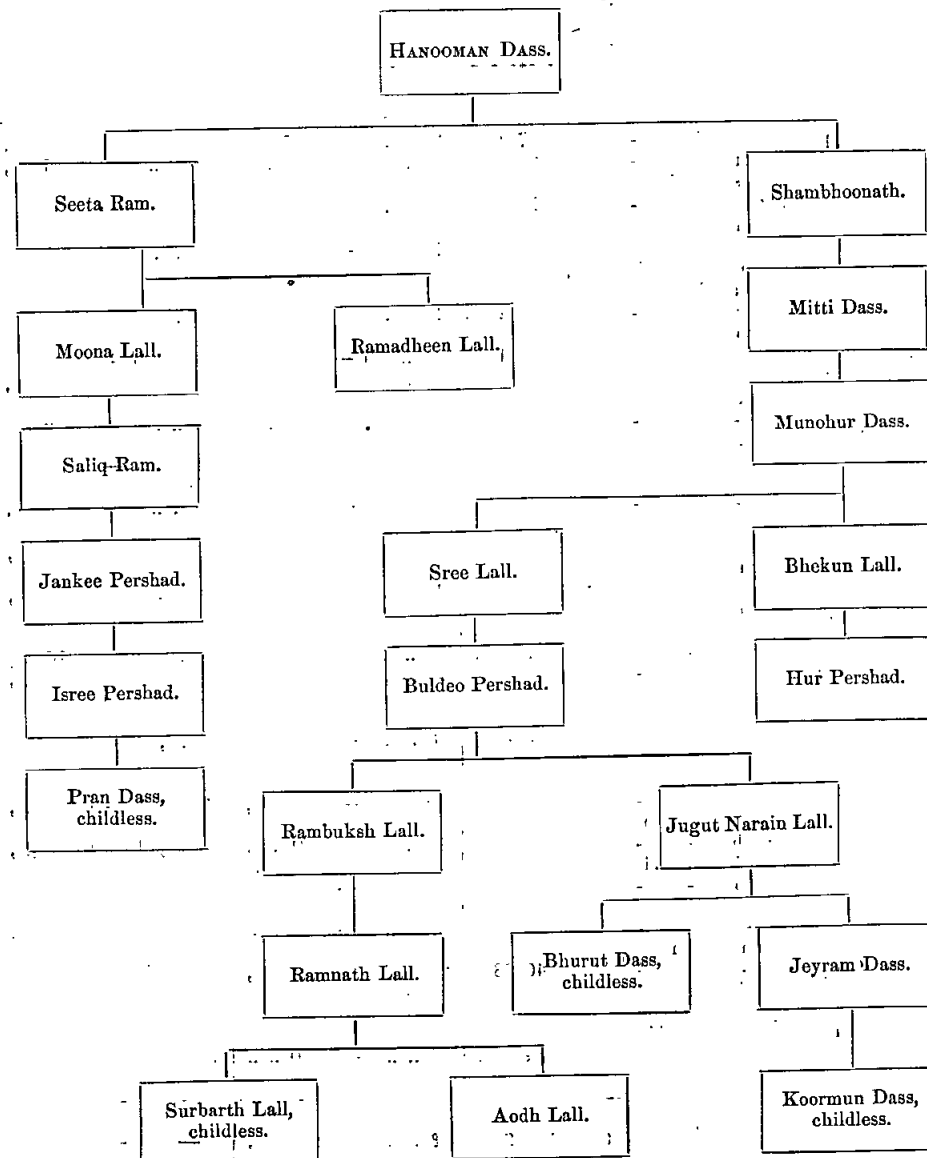

## THE SHIRE OF DAREBIN DIVIDED ANEW.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the fourteenth day of June 1871.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor

**WHEREAS** by *The Shires Statute* (33 Vict. No 355, § 23) it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by not less than one third of the number of persons whose names appear on the voters' rolls of any one or more ridings of a united shire for all ridings of which a voter's roll shall be in force, to divide anew such united shire into such separate ridings as to him may seem fit by such names and with such boundaries as shall in and by such Order in Council be assigned to the same and equal in number to the whole number of councillors hereby or hereunder assigned to such united shire divided by three, and such new ridings shall be in lieu of the original ridings which shall have become such upon the union: And whereas by an Order in Council made on the twenty-sixth day of September One thousand eight hundred and seventy the united Shire of Darebin was constituted and the boundaries thereof were therein described: And whereas the powers conferred upon the Governor by the section of the Act above recited are now exercised upon a petition signed by not less than one-third of the number of persons whose names appear on the voters' rolls of the said united shire: And whereas notices of such petition have been published in the manner prescribed in the twenty-ninth section of the same Act, and no counter petition has since been presented to the Governor: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by this present Order, and in compliance with the prayer of the petition hereinbefore mentioned, doth divide anew the said United Shire of Darebin into six several ridings, and, with the advice aforesaid, doth hereby set forth the names and boundaries of such ridings in manner following, that is to say:—

1st. **THE NORTHCOTE RIDING.**—Commencing at the north-west angle of portion 136 in the parish of Jika-jika; thence east to the Darebin Creek; thence southerly by the centre of that creek to the north angle of portion 119 of the aforesaid parish; thence westerly to the north-west angle of portion 113 of the same parish; thence southerly to the south-east angle of portion 89 of the said parish; thence west to the south-west angle of the same portion; thence south to the Merri-merri Creek; thence northerly by the centre of that creek to the commencing point.

2nd. **THE PRESTON RIDING.**—Commencing at the south-east angle of section 1 in the parish of Woollert; thence east to the Darebin Creek; thence by the centre of that creek southerly and by the western boundary of the Gowerville Riding to the south-east angle of portion 139 in the parish of Jika-jika; thence west to the Merri-merri Creek; thence by the centre of that creek northerly to the north-west portion of 139; thence east to the south-west angle of portion 144 in the last-named parish; thence north to the north-west angle of portion 147 of the same parish; thence west to the Merri-merri Creek; thence by the centre of that creek to the point of commencement.

3rd. **THE GOWERVILLE RIDING.**—Commencing at the south-west angle of section 7 in the parish of Morang; thence east to the Plenty River; thence southerly by that river and the boundary line of the late Morang Road District to the south-east angle of portion 138 in the parish of Jika-jika, being a point on the Darebin Creek; thence west to the south-west angle of the same portion; thence by the centre of the Epping road, and further north-easterly to the south-east angle of section 14 in the parish of Keelbundoora, being a point in the Darebin Creek; thence by the centre of the said creek northerly to the north-west angle of section 27 in the last-named parish; thence east to the south-east angle of section 1 in the parish of Morang; and thence north to the starting point.

4th. **THE MORANG RIDING.**—Commencing at the north-west angle of section 10 in the parish of Yan Yean; thence east by the centre of the Yan Yean road to a point on the Plenty River; thence southerly by the centre of the said river to the north-west angle of portion 4 of the aforesaid parish; thence east to a point on Arthur's Creek; thence southerly by the centre of that creek to a point directly east of the north boundary of portion 13 in the parish of Morang; thence west to the north-west angle of the last-named portion to another point on the Plenty River; thence again by the centre of that river southerly to the south-east angle of portion 6 of the last-named parish; thence west to the south-west angle of portion 7 of the same parish; thence north to the commencing point.\*

5th. **THE EPPING RIDING.**—Commencing at the south-east angle of section 1 in the parish of Yan Yean; thence west to the north-west angle of section 16 in the parish of Woollert, being a point on the Merri-merri Creek; thence southerly by the centre of that creek to the south-west angle of section 2 in the last-named parish; thence east to the south-east angle of section 1 in the parish of Morang; and thence north to the commencing point.

6th. **THE WOODSTOCK RIDING.**—Commencing at the north-west angle of section 25 in the parish of Merriang; thence north to the centre of the road; thence by the centre of that road to half a chain north from the north-east angle of section 31 of the same parish; thence south to the north-east angle of section 18 of the same parish; thence east to the north-east angle of allotment 2 of section 9 in the parish of Toorowrong; thence south

to the south-west angle of section 2 in the parish of Yan Yean; thence west to the south-west angle of section 4 in the parish of Kal-kallo; thence north to the north-west angle of section 9 in the last-named parish; thence west to the south-west angle of section 15 in the same parish; thence north to the Merri-merri Creek; thence by the centre of the said creek to the south boundary of section 9 in the parish of Merriang; thence west to the south-west angle of the said section 9; and thence north to the point of commencement. The Woodstock Riding being identical with the late Road District of Woodstock.

And the Honorable William Wilson, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

## WILLIAMSTOWN LINE.

Melbourne to Williamstown ... 1s. per bale.

The rate to Williamstown will only apply to wool for shipment. Vessels loading wool, &c., at the Williamstown Pier, will be required to take same from the trucks in preference to receiving from lighter or other craft, otherwise the demurrage charge of 6s. per truck per day will be strictly enforced after 24 hours from arrival; furthermore, the department will not be responsible for any damage that may occur to loading so detained. Wool will not be received at Melbourne, consigned for shipment at Williamstown, unless the vessel is ready to receive it.

Wool not promptly removed from the Melbourne or Geelong sheds will be sent to store at the risk and expense of the owner. All wool is carried at owner's risk as to condition, and will be signed for accordingly. If detailed weight-lists are furnished by the department for the use of consignees, the charge for weighing wool is Fourpence per bale.

All previous wool rates are now cancelled.

**NARRAPORT RUN.**—Commencing at the north-west angle, and bounded on the north by the Karyrie run, bearing easterly about eight miles; thence southerly about eight miles twenty-six chains; thence westerly to the eastern boundary of the Morton Plains run about two miles and a-half; thence by the north-eastern boundary of Morton Plains to the eastern boundary of Wirumbirechup, bearing north-westerly about seven miles and a-half; and thence by the eastern boundary of Wirumbirechup run, bearing northerly about three miles to the commencing point.

# QUARANTINE DISTRICTS UNDER "THE SCAB ACT 1870."

IN pursuance of the 64th section of *The Scab Act 1870*, the Governor in Council has ordered that the portions of Victoria whereof the boundaries are hereinafter defined, shall be Quarantine Districts within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:—

**BARTON RUN.**—Commencing at the point where the Lexington run crosses the summit of the Mount William Range; thence by that range and a line, being the eastern boundary of the Mount Burchet run, bearing southerly and south-westerly to the Wannan run; thence by that run bearing south-easterly to the Yarram-yarram run; thence by that run bearing south-easterly to the Mount William run; thence by that run bearing north-easterly and easterly to the Mount William Plains run; thence by that run and by the Burrumbeep run, bearing north-easterly to the Lexington run aforesaid; and thence by that run westerly to the point of commencement: as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to approve of the undermentioned Amended Rules and Regulations made by the Pilot Board being substituted for Rules 26, 27, and 28, published in the *Government Gazette* of the 13th October 1865, in conformity with the provisions of the 64th section of *The Passengers, Harbors, and Navigation Statute 1865*.

## Rule 26 amended.

The sea pilot, before anchoring any vessel in the bay, shall ascertain from the master whether the vessel is to be taken alongside any of the wharves, or piers, or moored in the Inner Harbor, if so, he is to be guided by the master's instructions, unless she has gunpowder on board, when he shall anchor her in accordance with the rules of the port, and may subsequently take her to her final destination.

## Rule 27 amended.

The sea pilots may also pilot all ships proceeding to the outer anchorage and ships bound direct to sea from the berth they occupy in the Inner Harbor, provided such ships are ready for sea.

## Rule 28 amended.

The harbor pilots may take charge of such vessels on their arrival, as from having gunpowder on board or from other reasons may not be prepared to go to their final destination, and shall berth and moor the same in such situation in the Inner Harbor as the master or officer may direct, subject to the regulations of the port. They shall also remove all vessels in the Inner Harbor not included in the sea pilot's duty.
