THE following description of, and sailing directions for, Opunake Bay, furnished by the Chief Harbor Master of the Province of Taranaki, are published for general information.

HENRY SEWELL.

OPUNAKE BAY.

This bay is five (5) miles N.W. of Otumutua Point and one (1) mile S.E. of Te Nama Pa, as marked on the chart. (This pa is no longer there.) It is of horseshoe shape, and about one-third of a mile deep, with high cliffs round the bay. The N.W. head extends 600 feet seaward of the S.E. head.

A reef extends off the N.W. head for half a mile in a southerly and south-westerly direction; also off the S.E. head in a south-westerly and westerly direction about one-third of a mile. These two reefs shelter the bay at low water in bad weather, as much of the sea is broken before reaching the beach.

The channel into the bay is one-third of a mile wide between the reefs, with a depth of water of 8, 7, 6, 5, to 4 fathoms at low water. The distance at low water from head to head is about one-third of a mile.

There is a good sandy beach in the centre of the bay, over which the tide ebbs and flows a distance of 750 feet. Some detached rocks lie under water 300 feet from low water-mark, and 800 feet from the N.W. shore. There is four feet of water on them at low water; they are well out of the way of the anchorage. Small vessels can beach in fine settled weather; then the beach is remarkably smooth. The bay is well sheltered from all winds between S.E. round by E. to N.W., and exposed to all other winds.

Two black beacons are erected on the N.W. side of the bay to show the best place to anchor; the upper one is 20 feet and the lower one 10 feet above the ground, and are 380 feet apart, and bear from each other N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. and S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. When these two beacons are in a line, a vessel is sufficiently close in to have good swinging room.

A red beacon is placed 96 feet in front of the Flagstaff and is 10 feet above the ground, and is intended as a leading mark into the bay; it bears from the Flagstaff S.S.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. This beacon kept in line with the Flagstaff leads a vessel between the reefs in deep water, carrying a depth of water in at low water from 8, 7, 6, 5, to 4 fathoms.

Sailing Directions.

A vessel bound for Opunake should keep about two miles off shore until the Flagstaff (which is situated at the head of the bay) bears N.N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. then steer in on that bearing until the red beacon in front of the Flagstaff is seen; keep this beacon and Flagstaff in line, bearing N.N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., until the two black beacons on the port hand are in line, bearing N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.; then let go the anchor in four fathoms, stony bottom; but should the wind be strong from S.E. or N.W., keep a ship's length to windward, where will be found the smoothest water, with good 90 fathoms swinging room.

This anchorage is only intended for steamers (or small sailing vessels in fine weather).

Sailing vessels of fifty tons or upwards should anchor about three-quarter mile off the Heads in 10 fathoms, rocky bottom, on the following bearings:—Otumutua Point S.E. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., and the Flagstaff N.N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.; and should be prepared to go to sea on the first appearance of strong in-shore winds.

It is high water full and change at 9.45; range of tide, 7 to 10 feet; length of beach between high and low water spring tide, 750 feet.

The accommodation for landing and shipping at present consists of one cargo boat capable of carrying six tons in moderate weather, and is in charge of the signalman, who picks up a crew of natives when required. The boat is worked the same as at New Plymouth—with a rope attached to the warping buoy.

The following signals will be used at Opunake:—

You may stand in with safety—Four balls horizontal on yard, two on each side of mast.

Anchorage in the bay unsafe, but you can anchor outside and a boat will be sent off—Three balls horizontal on yard, two on one side of mast and one on the other.

Bay dangerous, keep to sea—Two balls horizontal on yard on either side of mast.

Night signals—

White light over red—Wait till day light, anchorage safe.

Red light over white—Bay dangerous, keep off.

All bearings magnetic.

REGULATIONS FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF
NAVAL PRIZE MONEY, ETC.

BY THE QUEEN.
A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA R.

WHEREAS by Our Order in Council of this day's date We were graciously pleased to annul, from and after the thirtieth day of September next, Our Royal Proclamation of the nineteenth day of May One thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, relating, according to the scheme set forth therein or recognized thereby, the distribution of the net proceeds of prizes captured from the enemy, of captures and seizures under the several Acts of Parliament passed relating to the revenues of customs and to trade and navigation, for the abolition of the slave trade, for the capture and destruction of pirates and piratical vessels, and of the rewards conferred for the same, as also of the awards for all salvage granted to the crews of Our ships and vessels of war, when not otherwise specially apportioned by the terms of the respective awards and allowances, and in consequence of certain alterations in the apportionment and classification of the shares being desirable, it is expedient that provision should be made for the future distribution of such net proceeds and salvage not otherwise specially apportioned, and all other moneys whatsoever granted to be shared among the officers and crews of Our ships and vessels in the manner of prize money:

We do therefore now make known to all Our loving subjects, and to all others whom it may concern, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the advice and consent of Our Privy Council, that Our royal will and pleasure is, and we do hereby direct that ships or vessels being in sight of a prize, as also of the captor, under circumstances to cause intimidation to the prize and encouragement to the captor, shall be alone entitled to share as joint captors, and that the distribution of all such net proceeds of prizes, rewards, allowances, salvage awards, and of all bounties and grants whatsoever distributable to Our royal navy in the manner of prize money, shall be made as follows, to-wit:—

That the flag officer or officers shall have one thirtieth part of the whole net proceeds arising from prizes captured from the enemy, and from all other captures and seizures, &c., as aforesaid, made by any of the ships or vessels under his or their command, and of the rewards conferred for the same, according to the following conditions and modifications, save and except as hereinafter provided and directed, that is to say—

When there is but one flag officer he shall have the entire one thirtieth part; when two flag officers shall be sharing together, the chief shall have two thirds, and the other flag officer shall have the remaining one third of the one thirtieth part; and when there shall be more than two flag officers, the chief shall have one half of the said one thirtieth part, and the remaining half shall be equally divided among the junior flag officers; commodores of the first class and captains of the fleet to share as flag officers: Provided always, that no flag officer, unless actually on board any of Our ships or vessels of war, and at the actual taking, sinking, burning, or otherwise destroying any ship or ships of war, privateer or privateers belonging to the enemy, shall share in the distribution of any head money or bounty money granted as a reward for the taking, sinking, burning, or otherwise destroying any such ship or vessel of the enemy.

That no flag officer, unless actually present at the capture or destruction of any pirates or piratical ship, vessel, or boat, shall share in any distribution of the proceeds or bounty in respect of such pirates, or of the crews of such piratical ship, vessel, or boat.

That no flag officer shall share in any remuneration or reward conferred or awarded to the crew of any of Our ships or vessels as salvage, unless he shall have been actually on board the ship or vessel to which the award shall be made, or have personally aided and assisted in the transaction at the time the service was rendered.

That no flag officer commanding in any port in the United Kingdom shall share in the proceeds of any prize captured from the enemy, or in other captures, seizures, rewards, or any distributive proceeds as aforesaid, made by any ships or vessels which shall sail from or leave such port by order of the Lord High Admiral, or of Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral.

That when ships or vessels under the command of several flag officers belonging to separate stations shall be joint captors, &c., each flag officer shall receive a proportion of the one thirtieth part, according to the number of officers and men present under the command of each such flag officer; and when ships or vessels under orders from the Lord High Admiral, or from Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral, are joint captors, &c., with other ships or vessels under a flag or flags, the like regulations as to the apportionment of the flag share to the flag officer or officers are to be observed.

With reference to flag officers it is to be noted—

That when an inferior flag officer is sent to reinforce a superior officer on any station, the superior flag officer shall not share in any prize taken by the inferior flag officer before he has arrived within the limits of that station, unless the inferior officer shall have received some order directly from, and shall be acting in execution of some order issued by, such superior flag officer.

No chief flag officer quitting any station, except upon some definite urgent service and with the intention of returning to the station as soon as such service is performed, shall share in any prize taken by Our ships or vessels left behind after he has passed the limits of the station, or after he has surrendered the command to another flag officer appointed by the Admiralty to command in chief upon such station.

An inferior flag officer quitting any station (except when detached by orders from his commander-in-chief upon a special service, accompanied with orders to return to such station as soon as the service has been performed) shall have no share in prizes taken by the ships and vessels remaining on the station after he has passed the limits thereof.

In like manner flag officers remaining on such station shall not share in the prizes taken by such inferior officer, or by ships or vessels under his immediate command, after he has quitted the limits of the station, except he has been detached as aforesaid.

A commander-in-chief or other flag officer belonging to any station shall not share in any prize or prizes taken out of the limits of that station by any ship or vessel under the command of a flag officer of any other station, or under orders from Our Commissioners of the Admiralty, unless such commander-in-chief or flag officer is expressly authorized by Our said Commissioners to take the command of that station in which the prize or prizes is or are taken, and shall actually have taken upon him such command.

Every commodore having a captain under him shall be esteemed a flag officer with respect to the thirtieth part of prizes taken, whether he be commanding in chief or serving under command.

The first captain to the admiral and commander-in-chief of Our fleet, and also the first captain to any flag officer appointed to command a fleet of ten ships of the line or upwards, shall be deemed to be a flag officer for the purpose of sharing in prize, and shall be entitled to share therein as the junior flag officer of such fleet.

Any officer on board any of Our ships of war at the time of capturing any prize or prizes who shall have more commissions than one shall be entitled only to share in such prize or prizes according to the share allotted to him by the above-mentioned distribution in respect of his superior commission or office.

And with reference to these regulations it is to be noted, that a captain, commander, or other commanding officer of a ship or vessel shall be deemed to be under the command of a flag when he shall actually have received some order from, or be acting in the execution of some order issued by, a flag officer, whether he be or be not within the limits of the station of such flag officer; and in the event of his being directed to join a flag officer on any station, he shall be deemed to be under the command of such flag officer from the time when he arrives within the limits of the station, which circumstance is always to be carefully noted in the logbook; and it shall be considered that he continues under the flag officer of such station until he shall have received some order directly from, or be acting in the execution of some order issued by, some other flag officer, duly authorized, or by the Lord High Admiral, or Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral.

And We hereby direct that the captain, commander, lieutenant commanding, staff commander commanding, navigating lieutenant commanding, or any other officer duly commanding any ship, sloop, or vessel of war, singly making a capture or seizure, or otherwise entitled to the distributive benefit arising from any proceeds, reward, grant, bounty, salvage, or other award as aforesaid, that is to say, the officer actually in command at the time shall have one tenth of the remainder, or if there is no flag, one tenth of the entire net proceeds, except that if the single capturing ship be a rated ship having a commander under the captain the commander shall take a portion of the one tenth part as if he were commander of a sloop according to the proportion hereinafter set forth; and if more than one commanding officer of the same rank of command shall be entitled to share as joint captors, &c., the one tenth shall be equally divided between them; but when captains, commanders, lieutenants, staff commanders, and navigating lieutenants, commanding respectively Our ships and vessels of war, and commanders under captains in rated ships, shall share together in whatever variety of combination, the one tenth shall be so divided into parts for a graduated apportionment as to provide for each captain receiving six parts; each commander of a sloop, or commander under the captain in a rated ship, three parts; and each lieutenant commanding, staff commander commanding, or navigating lieutenant commanding, or other officer actually commanding a small vessel of war, two parts; which We hereby direct shall be the proportion in which they shall respectively share; commodores of the second class and field officers of marines (artillery or light infantry) or of land forces serving as marines, doing duty as field officers, above the rank of major, to share as captains; and field officers of marines (artillery or light infantry) or of land forces serving as marines, and doing duty in the rank of major, to share as commanders of sloops. And We further direct, That after provision shall thus have been made for the flag share (if any), and for the portion of the commanding officer or officers and others as above specified, the remainder of the net proceeds shall be distributed in ten classes, so that each officer, man, and boy composing the rest of the complements of Our ships, sloops, and vessels of war, and actually on board or absent on duty in a prize (who it is Our will and pleasure shall be the only absentees entitled to share)

at the time of any such capture, seizure, &c., as aforesaid, and every person present and assisting, shall receive shares, or a share, according to his class, as set forth in the following scale:—

- First class: Inspector-general or deputy inspector-general of hospitals and fleets, when embarked with a fleet, inspector of steam machinery afloat, when embarked with a fleet, staff captain, secretary to admiral of the fleet or commander-in-chief, paymaster-in-chief, in the event of such officer being employed afloat, forty-five shares each.
- Second class: Senior lieutenant of a rated ship, not bearing a commander under the captain, staff commander, staff surgeon, paymaster over fifteen years seniority, chief engineer over fifteen years seniority, secretary to an admiral or to a commander first class not commanding in chief, thirty-five shares each.
- Third class: Sea lieutenant, navigating lieutenant, captain of marines (artillery or light infantry) or of land forces doing duty as marines, whether having higher brevet rank or not, surgeon, secretary to commodore second class, paymaster under fifteen years seniority, chief engineer under fifteen years seniority, chaplain, thirty shares each.
- Fourth class: Lieutenant or quartermaster of marines (artillery or light infantry), lieutenant, quartermaster, or ensign of land forces doing duty as marines, naval instructor, sub-lieutenant, chief gunner, chief boatswain, chief carpenter, assistant surgeon, navigating sub-lieutenant, assistant paymaster in charge, assistant paymaster, engineer, assistant engineer, gunner, boatswain, carpenter, twenty shares each.
- Fifth class: Midshipman, navigating midshipman, pilot, clerk, master-at-arms, chief gunner's mate, chief boatswain's mate, chief captain of the fore-castle, admiral's coxswain, chief quartermaster, chief yeoman of the signals, chief carpenter's mate, naval schoolmaster, writer, engine room artificer, chief stoker, ship's steward, ship's cook, chief bandmaster, and all chief petty officers, sergeant major, and quartermaster sergeant of marines (artillery or light infantry) or of land forces doing duty as marines, twelve shares each.
- Sixth class: Naval cadet, navigating cadet, assistant clerk, ship's corporal, gunner's mate, boatswain's mate, captain's coxswain, captain of the fore-castle, quartermaster, yeoman of the signals, coxswain of the launch, captain of the main top, captain of the fore top, captain of the quarterdeck men, captain of the hold, sailmaker, ropemaker, carpenter's mate, caulker, blacksmith, armourer, plumber, painter first class, leading stoker, sick berth steward, bandmaster, head krooman in rated ships, and all first-class petty officers, sergeant of marines (artillery or light infantry) or of land forces doing duty as marines, ten shares each.
- Seventh class: Coxswain of the barge, coxswain of the pinnace, captain of the mât, second captain of the fore-castle, second captain of the main top, second captain of the fore top, signalman, second captain of the quarterdeck men, captain of the mizen top, sailmaker's mate, coxswain of the cutter, cooper, caulker's mate, painter second class, plumber's mate, sick berth attendant, musician, head krooman in ships below sixth rates, and all second-class petty officers, leading seamen, corporal of marines (artillery or light infantry) or of land forces doing duty as marines, bombardier of marine artillery, seven shares each.
- Eighth class: Shipwright, stoker and coal trimmer, yeoman of store rooms, second captain of the hold, second and third class signalmen, sailmaker's crew, blacksmith's crew, tinsmith, armourer's crew, carpenter's crew, plumber's crew, stoker second class, cooper's crew, able seaman, bandman, tailor, shoemaker, butcher, second head krooman, lamp trimmer, flag officer's steward, cook, and domestic, captain's steward and captain's cook in all rated ships, ward room steward and ward room cook in first, second, third, and fourth rates, and all first-class domestics, ship's steward's assistant, ordinary seaman, dock and victualling yard apprentices, private of marines, drummer and bugler of marines (artillery or light infantry) or of land forces doing duty as marines, gunner of marine artillery, four shares each.
- Ninth class: Captain's steward and captain's cook in vessels below sixth rates, ward room steward and ward room cook in vessels below fourth rates, gun room steward, gun room cook, assistant sick berth attendant, engineer's cook, engineer's servant, captain's servant, commander's servant, secretary's servant, warrant officer's cook, cook's mate, barber, second-class ordinary seaman, captain's cook's assistant, ward room servant, ward room cook's assistant, ward room officer's servant, gun room servant, warrant officer's servant, and all second and third class domestics, krooman, supernumeraries, except as hereinafter provided,* persons borne merely as passengers, and not declining to render assistance on any occasion of capture, seizure, &c., two shares each.
- Tenth class: Ship's steward's boy, signal boys, bugler boys, boys first and second class, one share each.
- * And with respect to supernumeraries, We do hereby direct:—
- 1st. That all supernumeraries holding ranks in the service above the ranks or ratings specified in the fifth class of this Our Proclamation who have been ordered to do duty in any of Our ships and vessels by the Lord High Admiral, by Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral, by the senior officer of the fleet or squadron, or if none senior then by the captain or commanding officer of the capturing ship or vessel, if not by special authority employed in higher capacities, shall share according to the ranks which they respectively hold in the service; but in all cases, to qualify them for so sharing, and not merely as supernumeraries in the ninth class, due notation of their being thus respectively ordered to do duty must be made on the victualling lists and prize lists.
- 2nd. That all supernumeraries holding ratings in the service below the denominations of those specified in the fourth class of this Our proclamation, and who at full victuals

are engaged in the ordinary duties of the ship, shall always share according to the ratings which they bear in the service.

- 3rd. That no interpreter shall share in any proceeds, bounties, or awards as aforesaid, except by the special permission of the Lord High Admiral, or Our Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral for the time being.

And in order that Our royal intentions herein may be duly carried into effect, We further direct that when any capture or seizure is made, or service performed for which a distributable grant or reward is to be made, or is expected to be conferred or awarded to any of Our ships or vessels of war, the captain or commanding officer shall transmit or cause to be transmitted, as soon as may be, to the Secretary of the Admiralty, a true and perfect list of all the officers, seamen, marines, soldiers, and others who were actually on board on the occasion, with a notation thereon stating whether any other of Her Majesty's ships or vessels was in sight at the time of the capture, accompanied by a separate list containing the names of those belonging to the crew who were absent on duty or otherwise at the time, specifying the cause of such absence, each list to contain the quality of the service of each person with their several ratings, and to be subscribed by the captain or commanding officer, and three or more of the chief officers on board.

And when the list of those actually on board, with the separate list of persons absent, though belonging to the ship or vessel, shall have been verified on examination with the ship's books lodged as official records, the Accountant-General of Our Navy and Comptroller of Navy Pay shall grant a certificate that such lists are correct or have been corrected as occasion may require, in order that distribution of the respective prize or other proceeds payable as prize or salvage money may be duly made in the department of the Accountant-General of Our Navy, and Comptroller of Navy Pay.

And in the event of difficulty arising with respect to any of the regulations hereby ordered, or if any case should occur not herein provided for, or not sufficiently provided for, We are pleased hereby to authorize the Lord High Admiral, or Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral for the time being, to issue such directions thereupon as may appear just and expedient; which directions shall have the same force and effect as if specially provided for in this Our Royal Proclamation: Provided always, and the distribution hereinbefore ordered shall take effect only with respect to the proceeds of captures, seizures, and services as aforesaid which shall be made and performed on and after the first day of October One thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and that the proceeds arising from all captures, seizures, and services as aforesaid made or performed prior to that date shall be distributed in accordance with any proclamation or proclamations now in force, or in force at the time of such captures, seizures, or services respectively and applicable thereto, which We are pleased hereby to direct accordingly.

Given at Our Court at Windsor, this sixteenth day of May in the Year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in the thirty-fourth year of Our reign.

PORTS AND HARBORS OF VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTEBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTSFORD, of Botsford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Passengers Harbors and Navigation Statute 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council, by Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette*, may from time to time define the limits and boundaries of ports in Victoria, and frame rules and regulations for the governance and preservation of the said ports respectively, and for the regulation of the shipping in the same, and also for the due protection and preservation and good government and management of all public wharfs, and may appoint officers to carry out and enforce such rules and regulations, and from time to time in like manner may alter, amend, or repeal any such limits, boundaries, rules and regulations, and substitute others in their stead: And whereas by a Proclamation bearing date the thirteenth day of May in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers vested in him by the above-recited Statute, did define the limits and boundaries of ports in the said colony, and did proclaim and declare that certain rules and regulations therein specified for the governance and preservation of the said ports, and for the regulation of shipping in the same, should be substituted for other rules and regulations formerly in force: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do repeal rules or clauses numbered 14, 29, 31, 60, and the 3rd condition to rule or clause numbered 63 of the rules and orders contained in the above-recited Proclamation, and do hereby frame the following rules, and which shall be substituted for and be in the place and stead of the clauses or rules hereby repealed:—

In lieu of the said clause or rule 14 the following shall be substituted:—

14. *Vessels moored*.—Vessels moored with two anchors are always to have both cables clear. (1.) Vessels lying at single anchor are to have the second anchor clear. (2.) In both cases the cables must be kept in readiness to be slipped, veered, or hove in, in case of fire or other accident.

In lieu of clause 29 the following shall be substituted:—

29. *Watch on board.*—All vessels in port shall always have at least one seaman as watch on deck, with the following exceptions:—(1.) Vessels laid up, coal hulks, ballast or other lighters lying within such limits as the harbor master authorized them to occupy; such vessel or vessels shall always have one person on board. (2.) Vessels and boats lying within the limits marked A are not required to keep a person constantly on board. All persons aforesaid, and all persons in charge of boats, shall answer the challenge of the water police or other public officer.

29A. *Anchor lights.*—All vessels and boats at anchor within Hobson's Bay must, from sunset to sunrise, exhibit a bright white light in a globular lantern of eight inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light visible all round the horizon, and at a distance of at least one mile, except ships and boats moored to the shore, or to any wharf, pier, or jetty, or within the limits marked A.

Limits marked A.

1. A line drawn from the end of the Sandridge town pier to the south end of the steamboat jetty on the east side of the Sandridge railway pier.

2. A line drawn from the south end of the steamboat jetty on the west side of the Sandridge railway pier to the red dolphin at the northern side of the entrance of the River Yarra.

3. A line drawn from the black dolphin at the southern side of the entrance to the River Yarra to the end of the Ann street wharf, and thence to the ends of the railway and breakwater piers at Williamstown.

In lieu of the said clause or rule 31 the following shall be substituted:—

31. *Gangway ladder or stage.*—Every vessel lying in the bay and not alongside any pier shall be provided with a good and sufficient gangway ladder. Every vessel lying alongside any pier or wharf shall be provided with a good and sufficient stage for the use of persons coming from or going on board such vessel, and every such stage shall be made of not less than two (2) inch planks, and be at least three (3) feet broad, with cross battens and ropes on both sides from the vessel to the wharf, supported by wooden or iron slanchions not less than three (3) feet high, and also with a good and sufficient net of not less than the following dimensions placed underneath the stage to prevent accidents, viz.:—length eighteen (18) feet, breadth eight (8) feet, to be made of one and a half (1½) inch rope, to be seven and a half (7½) inches from seizing to seizing so as to form fifteen (15) inch meshes.

In lieu of the said clause or rule 60 the following shall be substituted:—

60. For the preservation of good order, and for the convenience of the shipping generally, all watermen, stevedores, porters, carters, and others engaged on any wharf, jetty, or pier shall obey the lawful orders of the harbor or pier master; and no carriage, cab, dray, or other vehicle drawn by horses or other animals, nor the owner nor driver thereof, shall ply on any pier or jetty without the permission of the harbor or pier master; nor shall any person without such consent as aforesaid leave any carriage, cab, dray, or other vehicle, or any horse upon such pier or jetty.

In lieu of the said 3rd condition to said rule or clause 63 the following shall be substituted:—

3rd. A fee of twenty shillings (20s.) shall be paid for each survey of an engine, and a fee of twenty shillings (20s.) for each person so examined and passed.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor may make and proclaim reserves for the preservation and growth of timber, and may from time to time, after one month's notice shall be given in the *Government Gazette*, alter and revoke any such Proclamation, and the Board of Land and Works may issue Licenses to cut timber upon such reserve or any part thereof on such terms and conditions, and subject to the payment of such license fee, as shall from time to time be approved of by the Governor, and be set forth in such license: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the third of October 1870, two areas therein described were reserved for the preservation and growth of timber: And whereas it is expedient to revoke the reservation of the area hereinafter mentioned: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke so much of the said Proclamation as relates to the

reservation of Two hundred and seventy-eight acres two roods twenty-seven perches, county of Grant, parish of Buninyong, for the preservation and growth of timber, in accordance with the provisions of the 53rd section of the above-recited Act.—(70 & 23355.)

REGULATIONS UNDER "THE WINES, BEER, AND SPIRITS SALE STATUTE 1861 AMENDMENT ACT."

PURSUANT to the provisions of section thirty-four of the *Act to amend the Wines Beer and Spirits Sale Statute 1861*, the following regulations (in lieu of the regulations of 23rd January 1871) are hereby made by His Excellency the Governor in Council:—

I. *Licensing districts defined*.—Every city, town, or borough, which may on every side be bounded by other cities, towns, or boroughs (as the case may be), shall be a licensing district for the purposes of the said Act.

II. Each and every other licensing district shall be an area of which the building wherein any court of petty sessions is now or may hereafter be held shall be the centre; and each such licensing district shall radiate and extend in every direction (except as hereinafter mentioned) from such centre to a point midway between such centre and any other centre being the nearest building in which any neighboring court of petty sessions is now or shall hereafter be held. Provided that wherever on any side a district outside of any city, town, or borough shall abut upon, or, if extended as aforeaid, would include any portion of a boundary line of any city, town or borough, then on every such side such boundary shall be the limit between each of such districts. Provided also that any city, town, or borough which abuts on any other city, town, or borough, and which in any other part is next to a licensing district that is outside of a city, town, or borough, shall, at the part so abutting on, be bounded by such neighboring city, town, or borough, and shall in every other part be bounded by a point midway between the respective buildings hereinbefore specified.

III. *Places for nominating elective justices*.—The respective places at which two justices of the peace shall be nominated as licensing magistrates, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth section of the said recited Act, shall be the several places at which courts of petty sessions are now or may at any future time be appointed to be held, subject, however, to the proviso that in the event of petty sessions being discontinued at any place, the rights, powers, privileges, and duties of the licensing bench at such place shall thereby be determined. In the event of any such place being re-appointed for the holding of petty sessions, such an occurrence shall in respect of that place be regarded as causing a vacancy within the meaning of section ten of the said Act. Provided further that on the first appointment of any place for the holding of petty sessions, the licensing magistrates for the district shall be appointed under the proviso to the section next hereinbefore mentioned.

IV. *Manner of election*.—The election of the aforesaid two licensing justices at the several courts of petty sessions shall be conducted (in such manner as may be determined upon before proceeding to the election) by the justices of the peace who may be present at the usual sitting of the respective courts.

V. *Election to be notified and gazetted*.—*Notification of non-election*.—Immediately after every election of such two licensing justices the clerk of petty sessions shall notify their names and addresses to the Minister of the Crown having charge of the administration of the recited Act, and the said particulars shall be forthwith notified in the *Government Gazette*. In the event of no election taking place, the same shall be notified to such Minister not later than the day following that on which the election should have taken place.

VI. *Who to be the stipendiary licensing magistrates*.—The stipendiary licensing magistrates at the various courts of petty sessions shall be the police magistrates who for the time being may be appointed to act at such places throughout Victoria as now are or may hereafter be appointed places for the holding of courts of petty sessions; and the stipendiary licensing magistrate for any such place as may not be visited by a police magistrate shall be such police magistrate as may be required to act in that capacity by the Minister of the Crown hereinbefore mentioned.

VII. *Day and hour of sitting of licensing bench*.—The licensing bench at each place appointed for the holding of courts of petty sessions shall sit on such day and at such hour in the respective months prescribed by section thirteen of the recited Act as may be notified to the elective licensing justices by the stipendiary licensing magistrate appointed to act at the several places at which courts of petty sessions are then held.

VIII. *Mode of voting at licensing meeting*.—The votes of the licensing magistrates shall be taken in such manner as the respective licensing benches may determine on any quarterly licensing day. Provided nevertheless that such determination shall be arrived at prior to the licensing bench entering upon the consideration or hearing of any matter or thing to be brought before the said bench.

IX. *Resignation of licensing magistrates*.—In the event of any licensing magistrate coming within any of the disabilities specified in section ten of the recited Act, he shall forthwith resign the office of licensing magistrate.

X. *Removal of licenses*.—The licensing benches, in dealing with applications for removals of licenses, shall require applications for and objections to the granting of such removals to be made in the same manner as if the applications had been for licenses in the first instance. Before sanctioning any removal, the licensing bench shall be satisfied that the premises to which it is proposed to remove a license are in the same city, town, borough, shire, or road district (as the case may be) as those from which it is proposed to remove such license, and shall further be satisfied that no covenant is contained in any lease entered into between the lessor and lessee of such premises against removing the license to any other house or premises. The sanctioning of any removal shall be effected by endorsement on the original license.

XI. *Notification of transfers, removals, &c.*—Every transfer, removal, or forfeiture of a license shall, within seven days of such transfer, removal, or forfeiture, be reported by the clerk of petty sessions to the person who issued the license or to his successor in office under a penalty for any omission to so report not exceeding Five pounds, which penalty shall be determined by the Minister of the Crown hereinbefore mentioned, and may be deducted from any salary or allowance payable to such clerk.

XII. *Transmission of notices of application*.—Whenever any clerk of petty sessions shall, under the provisions of section seven of the said recited Act, receive a notice of application relating to premises that are situated within a licensing district other than that pertaining to the court of petty sessions for which such clerk is appointed, he shall forthwith transmit the aforesaid application to the clerk of petty sessions for the court within the licensing district of which the said premises are situated, and such last-mentioned clerk shall post the notice in the manner prescribed by the said seventh section. The said first-mentioned clerk shall at the same time inform the applicant that his notice has been transmitted as herein provided.

XIII. No fee other than the Two pounds prescribed by section twenty of the said recited Act shall be payable for or in respect of the transfer of any license under the provisions in regard to transfers, notwithstanding the conversion of the transferred license into an original license by the operation of that section.

XIV. With a view to the more effectual carrying out of the provisions of section three of the recited Act a notice shall be given in the *Government Gazette* of all applications made under that section, and no determination shall be arrived at in respect of any such applications until after the publication of such notice specifying a date up to which the Minister hereinbefore mentioned will receive representations in regard to any such applications.

IRON CASTINGS.
