COMMON ADDED TO.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTEBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it is directed that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons shall be published and all objections thereto shall be heard in the manner set forth in the one hundredth section of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby add to the Common hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

KANGAROO GROUND FARMERS' COMMON.—The Kangaroo Ground Farmers' Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 15th day of July 1861, and increased by a Proclamation bearing date the 16th day of December 1862, is hereby increased by adding thereto the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries described as follow, viz.: Commencing at the north-west angle of allotment 12, parish of Greensborough, being a point on Diamond Creek; thence up that creek to the Diamond Creek pre-emptive section; thence by that section and by the land licensed to William Watkins to the north-east angle of that land; thence by a line bearing east to the range which divides the waters of Diamond Creek aforesaid from the waters of Watson's Creek; thence by that range bearing south-westerly to the north angle of the existing common; and thence by that common bearing westerly to the point of commencement. Area available for commonage, about 2000 acres. Also, commencing on Watson's Creek, at the point where it is crossed by the road from Melbourne to Healesville; thence by the existing common bearing westerly and northerly to the south angle of the Saint Andrew's Gold-field Common; thence by that common bearing east one hundred and ninety-five chains, more or less; thence by a line bearing south to Watson's Creek aforesaid; and thence down that creek to the point of commencement. Area available for commonage, about 2000 acres.—(72.H.16641.)

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor may from time to time by a notice in the *Government Gazette* proclaim as a street or road or as a town or village any portion or portions of Crown lands, and the lands in such town or village shall be sold by auction in the manner therein provided for the sale of Crown lands by public auction, and the lands upon which such street or road shall have been proclaimed shall be and be deemed to be thenceforward dedicated to the public: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this notice proclaim as a town the portion of Crown lands hereinafter described, viz.:—

TOWN IN THE PARISH OF BYADUK.—Ninety-nine acres one rood thirty-two perches, county of Normanby, parish of Byaduk, being allotment 5 of section 17: Commencing at the south-east angle of allotment 4, being a point on the western side of the road from Belfast to Hamilton *via* Macarthur; bounded thence by that allotment and allotment 3 bearing N. 71° 35' W. twenty-two chains seventeen links, N. 79° 17' W. twenty-five chains forty-eight links, and S. 72° 34' W. seven chains eight links; thence by a line bearing south about twenty-one chains to the north-west angle of allotment 1 of section 18; thence by that section bearing east fifty-six chains seventy-nine links to the road aforesaid; and thence by that road bearing N. 32° W. one chain fifty-three links and N. 18° 34' W. ten chains fifty-two links to the commencing point. The bearings are from the true meridian.—(72.H.23699.)

TIMBER RESERVE AT BALLARAT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTEBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor may make and proclaim reserves for the preservation and growth of timber, and may from time to time, after one month's notice shall be given in the *Government Gazette*, alter and revoke any such proclamation, and the Board of Land and Works may issue licenses to cut

timber upon such reserve or any part thereof on such terms and conditions, and subject to the payment of such license fee as shall from time to time be approved of by the Governor and be set forth in such license: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim as a Reserve made for the preservation and growth of timber, in accordance with and subject to the provisions of the 53rd section of the above-recited Act, the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries hereinafter described (excepting the portions thereof which may have been applied for under the 19th or 49th section of the said Act, prior to the date of this Proclamation, and for occupation of which portions licenses may hereafter be granted), viz. :—

BALLARAT STATE FOREST.—One thousand two hundred acres, more or less, county of Grant, town of Ballarat East, and parish of Ballarat: Commencing at the junction of the southern side of Eureka street with the western boundary of the parish of Warrenheip; thence by that street westerly to the north-east angle of allotment A of section 209 in the said town; thence by a line bearing south about one hundred and forty-seven chains to Henry W. Lyte's licensed land in the parish of Ballarat; thence by that land and James Simson's land bearing S. 43° 35' E. about seven chains, S. 46° 25' W. thirteen chains thirty-five links, N. 77° 35' W. fifteen chains, N. 62° 54' W. eight chains thirty-four links, N. 43° 35' W. fourteen chains fourteen links, and N. 33° W. seven chains to the west angle of Simson's land; thence by a line bearing southerly about fifty-two chains to the north-east angle of Thomas Howell's land; thence by that land, by a line, and by Henry Shank's land bearing south about thirty-five chains to George Nicholson's land, being allotment 4 of section 17; thence by that allotment bearing east twenty-seven chains seventy-four links and south nineteen chains; thence by a road from Sebastopol towards Mount Buninyong bearing easterly to a point south of the west boundary of Patrick Mitchell's land; thence by a line by that land and a line bearing north about twenty-eight chains to the north side of the road bounding Mitchell's land on the north; thence by that road bearing east about six chains fifty links to Edward Byrne's land; thence by that land and that of John O'Keefe and John Powell, and by a line bearing north sixty-one chains fifty links to the north side of the road bounding Powell's land on the north; thence by that road bearing east twenty chains to the aforesaid parish boundary; and thence by that boundary line bearing north about one hundred and thirty-seven chains to the commencing point; as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(72 H. 22884.)

MINING ON THE RAILWAY RESERVE, CASTLEMAINE DISTRICT, AUTHORIZED.

THE Governor in Council has authorized Daniel Donovan, hereinafter styled Daniel Donovan and party, subject to the conditions, restrictions, and regulations hereby imposed and made by the Governor in Council, and subject to conditions, restrictions, and regulations imposed and made by the Board of Land and Works in an instrument of even date herewith, to occupy for mining purposes the piece of land described in the schedule hereto, which forms a part of the lands reserved or set apart or used for railway purposes.

1. The said Daniel Donovan and party shall not nor will sink shafts upon or otherwise break the surface of the said land, or use or occupy the surface thereof in any way, unless and until they shall have obtained the permission in writing of the Commissioner of Railways and Roads.

2. The said Daniel Donovan and party shall erect a fence or wall, or other artificial work, on the several sides bounding the area described in the schedule hereto, of such materials and in such manner as shall be directed by the Engineer-in-Chief of Railways; and Daniel Donovan and party shall not commence mining operations until the Engineer-in-Chief of Railways or some officer appointed by him shall have inspected and approved of such fence, wall, or other artificial work.

3. It shall be lawful at any time for any officer authorized by the Commissioner of Railways and Roads or by the Minister of Mines, together with such person or persons as such officer may require for assistance, to visit and examine the shafts, galleries, drives, airways, and waterways on, under, or in connection with any workings within the said land, and to use any machinery therewith connected, whether the shafts, galleries, drives, airways, and waterways be within the said land or not, so that they be connected with any workings on or within the said land; and all persons employed in connection with such workings shall afford all necessary facilities to such officer and his assistants as may be required for the purposes of and with a view to such inspection.

4. The Engineer-in-Chief of Railways, or other officer authorized as aforesaid, may order that the galleries, drives, ways, passages, &c., be stowed if necessary, or may order that such masonry or other works of art be made and erected at the cost of the said Daniel Donovan and party as in his opinion may be required for the support of the surface or as a precaution against any contingent damage to the railway; and thereupon the said Daniel Donovan and party shall cause the work so ordered to be well and truly done with all reasonable speed.

5. 1. The said Martin Reinheimer and party shall not nor will sink shafts upon or otherwise break the surface of the said land, or use or occupy the surface thereof in any way, unless and until they shall have obtained the permission in writing of the Commissioner of Railways and Roads.

2. It shall be lawful at any time for any officer authorized by the Commissioner of Railways and Roads or by the Minister of Mines, together with such person or persons as such officer may require for assistance, to visit and examine the shafts, galleries, drives, airways, and waterways on, under, or in connection with any workings within the said land, and to use any machinery therewith connected, whether the shafts, galleries, drives, airways, and waterways be within the said land or not, so that they be connected with any workings on or within the said land; and all persons employed in connection with such workings shall afford all necessary facilities to such officer and his assistants as may be required for the purposes of and with a view to such inspection.

4. The Engineer-in-Chief of Railways, or other officer authorized as aforesaid, may order that the galleries, drives, ways, passages, &c., be stowed if necessary, or may order that such masonry or other works of art be made and erected at the cost of the said Martin Reinheimer and party as in his opinion may be required for the support of the surface or as a precaution against any contingent damage to the railway; and thereupon the said Martin Reinheimer and party shall cause the work so ordered to be well and truly done with all reasonable speed.

5. Previous to occupying any portion of the said land the said Martin Reinheimer and party shall deposit in the hands of the Receiver and Paymaster at Castlemaine the sum of Fifty pounds sterling as a guarantee that they will observe and fulfil these conditions; such deposit to be retained until the said persons shall relinquish the land described in the schedule and discontinue mining operations; and if the said conditions, restrictions, and regulations shall then have been observed and fulfilled, the said deposit shall be returned to the depositors, but if any of them shall not then have been fulfilled or observed, then the whole, or such part of the sum so deposited as aforesaid as the Governor in Council shall think fit, shall by an Order of the Governor in Council be declared forfeited, and shall thereupon become public money, and be applied accordingly.

7. The deaths in October exceeded the deaths in September by 22. They also exceeded the average of October in the previous ten years by 36. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been less than the average of October by 47.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 84°6' on the 28th, and the lowest was 39°6' on the 1st. The mean temperature (57°) of the month was six-tenths of a degree above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer (34°2') in any one day took place on the 20th, viz., from a maximum of 77°4' to a minimum of 43°2'. The least range (8°) was on the 29th, viz., from a maximum of 61° to a minimum of 53°. The mean daily range was 20°1'. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.919 inches) was slightly above the average.

Fifty-nine per cent. of the deaths were of males, and 41 per cent. were females; 37 per cent. were of children under five years of age, against 41 per cent. in October 1871, 32 per cent. in October 1870, 40 per cent. in October 1869, 45 per cent. in October 1868, 40 per cent. in October 1867, 51 per cent. in October 1866, 52 per cent. in October 1865, 41 per cent. in October 1864, 37 per cent. in October 1863, and 40 per cent. in October 1862.

Three persons of 75 years and upwards died during the month, viz.:—A female aged 82 of senile apoplexy, a male aged 81 of emphysema, and a male aged 89 of old age.

Nineteen violent deaths occurred during the month, viz.:—That of a laborer aged 25 of a fractured spine, of a hawker aged 36 of concussion of the brain caused by jumping out of a cart, of a cab proprietor aged 69 of a fracture of the ribs, of a female child aged 13 months of laceration of the hand and arm, of a laborer aged 15 of injuries received from the explosion of a boiler, of five males aged respectively 25, 32, 35, 40, and 45, who were accidentally drowned; of a female infant of suffocation during birth, of a male infant of pressure during birth, of a male child aged 1 month, and of a washerwoman aged 27 of accidental suffocation, of a male aged 24 of hæmorrhage from a self-inflicted wound in the throat, of an undescribed male aged 50 and of a male cook aged 60 of suicidal poisoning, of a carpenter aged 63 and of a farmer, a patient in the Yarra Bend Asylum, aged 51 who committed suicide by hanging.

Sixty-five deaths, or about 23 per cent. of the total number, occurred in public institutions, viz.:—32 in the Melbourne Hospital, 4 in the Alfred Hospital, 6 in the Benevolent Asylum, 6 in the Lying-in Hospital, 2 in the Melbourne Gaol, 2 in the Industrial Schools, 5 in the Immigrants' Home, 1 in the Sailors' Home, 5 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, and 2 in the Pentridge Stockade.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 104, of which 59, or 57 per cent., were males, and 45, or 43 per cent., were females. Of those who died, 65 were under one year of age, 15 were between one and two years, 6 were between two and three, 9 were between three and four, and 9 were between four and five years.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 176, of which 105, or 60 per cent., were males, and 71, or 40 per cent., were females; 14 were between five and ten, 5 were between ten and fifteen, 8 were between fifteen and twenty, 9 were between twenty and twenty-five, 13 were between twenty-five and thirty, 16 were between thirty and thirty-five, 19 were between thirty-five and forty, 23 were between forty and forty-five, 14 were between forty-five and fifty, 16 were between fifty and fifty-five, 13 were between fifty-five and sixty, 13 were between sixty and sixty-five, 7 were between sixty-five and seventy, 2 were between seventy and seventy-five, 3 were eighty and upwards, and one, an adult, whose age was not specified.

WHROO PUBLIC CEMETERY.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE WHROO CEMETERY.

ALL charges must be paid to the treasurer or secretary when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. Orders for interment must be given to the secretary on the previous day between the hours of Eight o'clock a.m. and Seven o'clock p.m.; if not an extra charge will be made.

3. By the 9th section of *The Cemeteries Statute 1864*, any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees under these rules, and upon the payment of the proper charges,

is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons and his and their representatives for ever.

4. Application for such permission must be made to the trustees through intimation to the secretary. A certificate of permission, in the form set out in Schedule A, will be granted to the party applying for such, on payment of the proper charges.

5. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in the cemetery, on evidence adduced to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relatives of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

6. The trustees will cause all ordinary graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will require to construct them under the direction of the trustees, and in case an interment is to be made in any private grave or vault the consent of the party owning the same must be left with the order.

7. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased must be stated at the time of giving the order (see Schedule B).

8. The time named for the funeral must be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

9. The hours fixed for the performance of funerals are from Eight o'clock a.m. to Six o'clock p.m.

10. All vaults, monuments, headstones, fences, graves, and other structures must be kept in repair and proper condition by and at the expense of the owners, and all wooden fencing not kept in repair shall be removed by order of the trustees.

11. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave must be covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron, and laid in a bed of good cement.

12. A drawing or sketch of every fence, headstone, or tombstone, pedestal, and a plan of every monument or tablet or other structure proposed to be erected, and a copy of every epitaph or inscription, must be submitted to the trustees for approval, who are required by the 8th section of the Act to determine and fix the position of unobjectionable structure or monument, according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner. In the erection of tablets copper cramps must be used.

13. The ground will be opened daily to the public from sunrise to sunset.

14. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees, will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

15. Any person who shall wantonly or wilfully destroy, or do or cause to be done any damage to any monument, vault, headstone, fence, or other structure, shrubs, trees, plants, or flowers, will be proceeded against as the Act directs.

16. A plan of the cemetery and a register shall be kept by the secretary, which may be inspected.

17. No dogs will be allowed in the cemetery.

18. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations, from time to time, in these regulations and charges.

The foregoing rules and regulations were agreed to by us, at a meeting held at Whroo on the 7th day of October 1872.

2. The supplies are to be according to sample and of the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule of tenders. In the case of different makers' goods, the contractor will be required to supply the kind ordered. In other cases the supplies are to be the best quality of their several kinds or manufacture. A preference will, however, be given to goods of Victorian manufacture, provided the quality is equal to the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule.

3. MEDICINES, CHEMICALS, ETC.

COAL.

SHIRE OF COLAC.

BYE-LAW No. 29.

A Bye-law of the Council of the Shire of Colac, repealing all former Bye-laws, and for providing for the due Management of the Affairs and Proceedings of the Council.

IN pursuance of Part 12 of the Shires Statute, the Council of the Shire of Colac ordain that the bye-laws heretofore existing be, and the same are hereby repealed, that is to say:—
The bye-laws numbered 1 to 28 inclusive, intitled Bye-laws of the Council of the Shire of Colac.

And, in pursuance of said Part 12 of the Shire Statute, the Council of the Shire of Colac ordain as follows, that is to say,
At every ordinary meeting of the Council, the first business thereof shall be the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting for confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of proceedings.

At all meetings of the Council the reading, considering, and ordering upon correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, the receiving and reading of petitions and memorials, bringing up reports of committees and of officers, and ordering payments of accounts, shall have precedence of regular business.

Any petition or memorial addressed to the Council must be presented by a Councillor, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded, and no debate shall take place thereon except as to its being received and taken into consideration after the orders of the day, or at any future meeting, or, if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.

The Orders of the Day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the Council, all business of which due notice has been given, and any subject which the president may think fit to bring under consideration.

No motion entered on the Notice Paper shall be proceeded with unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some one authorized by him, be present when the business is called on. Notices not proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

Every councillor, including the President, shall stand while addressing the Council.

The President's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice.

One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but, if lost, another may be moved before the original is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried it shall be competent for any councillor to move one other amendment thereon.

Any councillor moving any motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that motion or amendment.

No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, excepting by way of explanation or reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of an amendment last proposed; and after the reply, the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

Any councillor, when proposing a motion or amendment, or if speaking on any matter, shall address the President, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall be silent until the councillor calling to order shall have been heard, and the question of order decided; the councillor in possession of the chair shall then proceed with the subject.

Any councillor who shall refuse to obey when ruled out of order, or who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, and who, if required by the president, shall refuse to withdraw such expression and make a satisfactory apology, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

Any councillor may require the secretary to take down any particular words used by a councillor, immediately upon the same being used.

Any councillor may enter his protest against any resolution of the Council. Notice of intention to protest must, however, be given in every case on the adoption of the resolution to be protested against; and the protest signed by the councillor or councillors protesting, and specifying the reasons for protesting, shall be entered in the minute book.

No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the Council; but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the Notice Paper shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment be carried. The business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the Council.

No election to any vacant office at the disposal of the Council, the yearly emolument of which shall exceed £25, shall take place until six clear days' public notice shall have been given by advertisement.

All tenders shall be addressed to the president, and only opened at the time of their consideration by the Council; the respective amounts, together with the names of the parties tendering, to be entered in every case on the minutes of the Council. No officer or councillor shall have any pecuniary interest, either directly or indirectly, in any contract under the Council.

The valuers shall, after having valued the rateable properties in the Shire, give notice to the occupants or owners thereof of the amount at which such properties are valued, at least seven days before the day appointed by the Council for striking the rate on such valuation.

In all cases it shall be considered sufficient for the collector to call once for payment of amount due on the assessment roll; and in event of any such amount not being paid to him a notice shall be left stating that unless the amount be paid before the expiration of fourteen days from the date thereof legal proceedings shall be taken for its recovery. The collector shall, once a week at least, furnish the secretary with an account of such moneys, and at each ordinary meeting report the same to the council.

The secretary shall present a statement of the monetary affairs of the council at each ordinary meeting of the council.

Any bye-law may be suspended *pro tem*, in case of emergency, with the consent of the majority of the council present at any meeting.
