## FURTHER PROROGUING THE PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Constitution Act* it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he may think fit; and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he shall deem it expedient: And whereas the said Council and Assembly, called "The Parliament of Victoria," now stand prorogued until Wednesday the thirty-first day of December instant, and it is expedient to prorogue the same further: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation further prorogue the said Parliament of Victoria from Wednesday the thirty-first day of December instant until Saturday the thirty-first day of January in the year One thousand eight hundred and seventy-four.

### TREATY FOR THE MUTUAL SURRENDER OF BRITISH AND SWEDISH CRIMINALS.

THE Governor has directed the subjoined Despatch and Order of Her Majesty in Council to be published for general information.

SIR,—I have the honor to transmit to you, for publication in the Colony under your Government, a copy of a Treaty between Her Majesty and the King of Sweden and Norway for the mutual surrender of fugitive criminals, as well as a copy of the Order in Council of the 30th ultimo for carrying into effect that Treaty.

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled *An Act for amending the Law relating to the Extradition of Criminals*, it was amongst other things enacted, that where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Act shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and

restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient :

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the twenty-sixth day of June last between Her Majesty and the King of Sweden and Norway for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following :—

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and His Majesty the King of Sweden and Norway, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice, and to the more complete prevention of crime within the respective countries, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up; their said Majesties have named as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Treaty for this purpose, that is to say :

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Honorable Edward Morris Erskine, a Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to His Majesty the King of Sweden and Norway;

And His Majesty the King of Sweden and Norway, Henrick Wilhelm Bredberg, Grand Cross of the Order of the Polar Star, His Majesty's Councillor of State and Acting Minister for Foreign Affairs;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles :—

#### ARTICLE I.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other those persons who, being accused or convicted of a crime committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party, under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty.

#### ARTICLE II.

The crimes for which the extradition is to be granted are the following :—

1. Murder (child murder and poisoning included) or attempt to murder.
  2. Manslaughter.
  3. Counterfeiting or altering money, uttering or bringing into circulation knowingly counterfeit or altered money.
  4. Forgery or counterfeiting or altering or uttering what is forged, or counterfeited, or altered, comprehending the crimes designated in the Swedish and Norwegian penal codes as counterfeiting or falsification of paper money, bank notes, or other securities, forgery or falsification of other public or private documents, likewise the uttering or bringing into circulation or wilfully using such counterfeited, forged, or falsified papers.
  5. Embezzlement or larceny.
  6. Obtaining money or goods by false pretences, except, as regards Norway, cases in which the crime is not accompanied by aggravating circumstances according to the law of that country.
  7. Crimes by bankrupts against bankruptcy law.
  8. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, or director, or member or public officer of any company, made criminal by any law for the time being in force.
  9. Rape.
  10. Abduction.
  11. Child stealing.
  12. Burglary or housebreaking.
  13. Arson.
  14. Robbery with violence.
  15. Threats by letter or otherwise with intent to extort, except, as regards Norway, cases in which this crime is not punishable by the laws of that country.
  16. Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting to do so.
  17. Assaults on board a ship on the high seas, with intent to destroy life or to do grievous bodily harm.
  18. Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the master; except, as regards Norway, conspiracy to revolt.
- The extradition is also to take place for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both the Contracting Parties.

#### ARTICLE III.

No Swedish or Norwegian subject shall be delivered up to the Government of the United Kingdom; and no subject of the United Kingdom shall be delivered up to the Swedish or Norwegian Government.

#### ARTICLE IV.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial in the country where he has taken refuge, for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed should be under examination for any other crime in the country where he has taken refuge, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

#### ARTICLE V.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution, or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the country where the criminal has taken refuge.

#### ARTICLE VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a

political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has in fact been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

#### ARTICLE VII.

A person surrendered by either of the High Contracting Parties to the other, cannot, until he has been restored or had an opportunity of returning to the country from whence he was surrendered, be triable or tried for any crime committed in the other country other than that on account of which the extradition shall have taken place.

This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

The requisitions for extradition shall be made through the Diplomatic Agents of the High Contracting Parties respectively.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

The requisition ought, as far as possible, to be accompanied by a description of the person accused or convicted, in order to identify him.

A requisition for extradition cannot be founded on sentences passed in *contumaciam*.

#### ARTICLE IX.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

The prisoner is then to be brought before a competent magistrate, who is to examine him and to conduct the preliminary investigation of the case, just as if the apprehension had taken place for a crime committed in the same country.

The extradition shall not take place before the expiration of fifteen days from the apprehension, and then only if the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition.

#### ARTICLE X.

In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as entirely valid evidence the sworn depositions or statements of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, provided such documents are signed or certified by a judge, magistrate, or officer of such State, and are authenticated by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of State.

#### ARTICLE XI.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, he shall be set at liberty.

#### ARTICLE XII.

All articles seized, which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension, shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery thereof, be given up when the extradition takes place; and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

#### ARTICLE XIII.

Each of the High Contracting Parties shall defray and bear expenses incurred by it in the arrest, maintenance, and conveyance of the individual to be surrendered till placed on board ship, as well as in keeping and conveying the articles which are to be delivered up in conformity with the stipulations of the preceding article.

The individual to be surrendered shall be conveyed to the port specified by the applying Government, at whose expense he shall be taken on board the ship to convey him away.

If it be necessary to convey the individual claimed through the territories of another State, the expenses incurred thereby shall be defrayed by the applying State.

#### ARTICLE XIV.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the colonies and foreign possessions of the two High Contracting Parties.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in a colony or foreign possession of either party, shall be made to the Governor or Chief Authority of such colony or possession by the Chief Consular Officer of the other in such colony or possession; or, if the fugitive has escaped from a colony or foreign possession of the party on whose behalf the requisition is made, by the Governor or Chief Authority of such colony or possession.

Such requisitions may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, to the provisions of this Treaty, by the

respective Governors or Chief Authorities, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender, or to refer the matter to their Government.

Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of Swedish and Norwegian criminals who may there take refuge, on the basis, as nearly as may be, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

#### ARTICLE XV.

The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the

And whereas the ratifications of the said Treaty were exchanged at Stockholm on the twenty-eighth ultimo:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said recited Act, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the seventeenth day of October, One thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, the said Act shall apply in the case of the said Treaty with the King of Sweden and Norway.

#### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby add to the Common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

THE BRIGALONG COMMON, proclaimed on the 17th day of April 1871, is hereby increased by adding thereto allotments 64, 65, 66, 67, 68, and 69, parish of Briagolong, allotments 5 and 6, parish of Bow-Worrung, and the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries described as follow, viz.:—Commencing at the north-west angle of allotment 38, parish of Briagolong; thence by a line bearing west to Freestone Creek; thence up that creek to Saint George's Creek; thence by a line bearing east to Sawpit Creek; thence down that creek to the north boundary of the parish of Stratford; thence by that boundary bearing west about one hundred and thirty-four chains to the south-east angle of allotment 1, parish of Bow-Worrung; thence north one hundred and sixty-two chains to the south-east angle of allotment 5; thence by a road bearing west forty chains; thence by a road bearing north one hundred and twenty-two chains; and thence by a line and the north boundary of allotment 38, parish of Briagolong, aforesaid, bearing west sixty-eight chains eighty links to the point of commencement. Area of extension, about 4,500 acres.—(73.M.19687.)

#### PUBLIC STREETS IN THE CITY OF SANDHURST.

#### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Boroughs Statute* (33 Vict. No. 659) it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time upon the request of the council by notice in the *Government Gazette* to proclaim any land reserved or used for a street, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley, or right-of-way to be a public street within the meaning of the said Act, and such land reserved or used for a street, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley, or right-of-way shall thereupon and thenceforth from the date of such proclamation become and be absolutely dedicated to the public and reserved for public use as a public street within the meaning of any law now or hereafter in force; provided that no such proclamation

shall be deemed to be a proclamation as a main road as therebefore provided; and provided further that every and any such proclamation may be at any time revoked, if necessary, by the Governor: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this notice proclaim to be public streets within the meaning of the said Act the lands reserved or used for the streets, highways, or thoroughfares in the City of Sandhurst which are hereinafter described (subject to existing rights), that is to say:—

ARTICLE XVI.  
The present Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Stockholm, as soon as may be possible. In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto their seals.

Done at Stockholm, the twenty-sixth day of June, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy-three.

WHEREAS by *The Boroughs Statute* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor may, if he shall be thereunto requested by the council of the borough, and if he shall see fit so to do, and upon such terms and conditions as shall appear to him to be reasonable and just, annex to any borough or to any ward, or in separate parts to any two or more wards of any borough if divided into wards, any portion of Victoria adjoining to such borough and forming therewith one continuous area, and not lying within the limits of the city of Melbourne or the town of Geelong; and every such portion shall thereupon become and be part of such borough, and so much thereof as shall have been added to any ward of such borough shall be part of the ward to which it shall have been so added, and such borough and ward after such annexation shall save where herein otherwise provided be deemed to be the same borough and ward respectively after such annexation as before: Provided that notice of the time when it shall please the Governor to order that any such intended annexation be taken into consideration by his Executive Council shall be published by the Minister in the *Government Gazette*, and in at least one newspaper generally circulating in the portion to be annexed, at least one month before any such annexation shall be made: And whereas notice of the requested annexation of an outlying district to the Borough of Sale has been published in the manner directed by the said Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order annex in separate parts to the North and South Wards of the Borough of Sale a portion of Victoria adjoining to such borough, and forming therewith one continuous area, and not lying within the municipal limits in the said Act referred to, but constituting the area comprised in the separate parts hereby annexed to the said wards, that is to say:—

ADDITION TO THE NORTH WARD.—Starting at the intersection of the west boundary of the parish of Sale with the Thomson River; thence along said boundary to the Flooding Creek; down said creek to the south-east angle of allotment 100, parish of Sale; thence direct to the south-west angle of the Sale Cemetery and around the cemetery to the same point; south to and down Flooding Creek to a point west of the north boundary of allotment 74, parish of Sale; east to the north-west angle of said allotment; south to Flooding Creek, down said creek to the intersection of the centre of Cunninghame street; thence south-westerly by centre of road to the Thomson River at intersection of centre of main Melbourne road, and up the Thomson River to starting point.

## WASTE OF YAN YEAN WATER.

THE Board of Land and Works begs to direct attention to the urgent necessity that exists for checking Waste of Yan Yeau Water.

The loss of pressure occasioned by this waste during the summer months is greater than the main pipe is able to afford, and, unless stringent means are used to restrict it, citizens generally will suffer serious inconvenience from the great reduction in the supply, while those residing in the higher parts of the city and suburbs will be entirely deprived of water, as the constant discharge by unnecessary waste renders supply at high levels practically impossible.

Under these circumstances, the Board has no alternative but strictly to enforce the operation of the 11th bye-law, which provides a penalty of Five pounds in cases where water is allowed to run to waste.

The provisions of the Public Works Statute will also be rigidly carried out; every person using the water for irrigation without permission, and without affixing a meter, will be prosecuted. The service pipe will likewise be cut off, without notice, in all instances where water is wasted, misused, or unduly consumed.

The Board earnestly trusts that the public generally will assist the police and the officers of the department in abating an evil which causes such serious inconvenience to so large a number of citizens.

## BOARD OF LAND AND WORKS.

## BYE-LAWS.

## GEE LONG WATER SUPPLY.

THE Board of Land and Works doth hereby, pursuant to, and in exercise and execution of, the powers and authorities conferred on such board by *The Public Works Statute 1865*, make the Bye-laws following:—

1. The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the board, that is to say:—

- i. On every house or tenement of £10 annual value and under, Ten shillings per annum.
- ii. On every house or tenement above the annual value of £10 and not exceeding £100, a rate of Five pounds per centum on the amount of the valuation.
- iii. On every house or tenement above the annual value of £100 and not exceeding £300, a rate of Four pounds ten shillings per centum on the amount of the valuation.
- iv. On every house or tenement above the annual value of £300 and not exceeding £500, a rate of Four pounds per centum on the amount of the valuation.
- v. On every house or tenement above the annual value of £500, a rate of Three pounds per centum on the amount of the valuation.
- vi. Warehouses and stores not being dwellings shall be subject to a rate of Two pounds ten shillings per centum on the amount of the valuation.
- vii. Water troughs will be charged for at the rate of Twenty shillings per annum each.
- viii. For water supplied by the board by measure, except in cases of special agreement with the board, at the rate of One shilling per thousand gallons.
- ix. The rates to be charged for water supplied from stand-pipes shall be Twopence per hundred gallons.
- x. Horses will be charged for at the rate of seven shillings and sixpence each, per annum.
- xi. Water for steam boilers will be charged for at the rate of fifteen shillings per horse-power per annum.

2. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case where water is supplied by measure shall be (1), if for domestic and other than domestic purposes, the quantity of which the charge at 1s. per 1000 gallons would be equal to the amount of the assessed rate which would be payable for the premises so supplied if supplied otherwise than by measure; and (2) if for other than domestic purposes only, 25,000 gallons per quarter. Syphon-pumps will not be allowed unless the water is supplied by measure.

3. Any person receiving water from the board who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

4. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the board who shall take or carry away water from any drinking-tap, trough, or private or public service-pipe, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

5. Before any person shall affix any service-pipe to any pipe of the board, or alter, repair, or in any manner interfere with any pipe of the board, or any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipes of the board, he shall obtain from the board a license in that behalf to execute such works, and any unlicensed person affixing, altering, repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting as aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

6. Before any such license shall be granted by the board the person applying for same shall satisfy the board that he is a competent plumber.

7. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, who shall offend by opening any ground, so as to uncover any pipe or pipes the property of the board, without giving two days'

notice to the board of his intention so to do, or who shall in any way tamper with or alter any pipe the property of the board, without the permission in writing of the board being first obtained, or who shall wilfully or carelessly break, injure, or open any lock, cock, valve, pipe, work, or engine, the property of the board, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

8. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, who shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the board without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the board, or who shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of some officer of the board, or who shall lay any leaden or other pipe to communicate with the pipe of the board of a strength and material not sanctioned by the board, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the board. Wrought-iron piping of approved quality and lead-piping of the following weights only will be allowed to be fixed for either internal or external services:—

No service of a larger bore than  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch will be permitted unless by special consent of the board.

9. If any person shall neglect to repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the board into the premises of such person, after having received notice from any officer of the board that such service-pipe requires repairing, the board may stop the water from flowing into such premises, either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise as to the said board may seem fit, until the necessary repairs shall have been effected. The service-pipes from the main being the property of the owners or occupiers of the tenements supplied by such service-pipes, the occupier (if any), and if none, the owner, shall in every instance in which any damage shall be caused by reason of such service-pipe being leaky or otherwise out of repair or broken, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the board.

10. Any person supplied with water by the board who shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste, shall be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the board.

11. If any meter should cease registering, and during the time it is undergoing repairs, the board shall estimate and charge for the water consumed by taking an average of the quantity used during the previous quarter, or during the corresponding period of the preceding year.

12. Any person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, connecting any service-pipe, or branch service-pipe, with any steam boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds; and in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the board.

13. No meter shall be affixed unless the dial of the same is capable of registering (1,000,000) one million gallons.

14. Overflow-pipes to private baths will not be permitted.

15. Water closets will not be allowed to be supplied direct from the main, but from a cistern only, so constructed that the water cannot flow continuously, and that not more than two gallons can escape at each flush.

16. If any person supplied with water by the board does or causes to be done anything in contravention of any of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates when due, or fails to do anything which under any of these regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the board may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of injury remains or is not remedied.

17. The streets shall not be watered from hydrants or fire-plugs by means of a hose, but the water is to be applied to the streets by carts, or by manual labor, or by special stand-pipes of approved size and form.

18. The water supplied in the above district shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations, and not otherwise, through pipes and meters laid, placed, and being under and in accordance with the same regulations, and not otherwise.

19. In the construction of these bye-laws the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation, whether aggregate or sole; and the word "board" shall mean the Board of Land and Works.

The foregoing bye-laws were made and passed by the Board of Land and Works, and the Seal of the said Board of Land and Works was hereunto affixed the eleventh day of December 1873, in the presence of

#### VICTORIAN RAILWAYS.

##### REGULATIONS FOR WORKING THE NORTH-EASTERN LINE BY STAFF.

**T**HE Board of Land and Works, by virtue of the powers and authorities vested in it by *The Public Works Statute 1865*, doth order and direct that the following code of rules and regulations be, and the same is hereby approved and adopted, for the guidance and instruction of the officers and men in the service of the Board in or about the railways under the control of the Board, and that all former rules and regulations inconsistent with the same be cancelled.

The Board doth further order that every person in the service whose duties are affected by these regulations do keep a copy of them on his person while on duty, under a penalty of Five pounds for neglect of the same.

1. *North-eastern line beyond Newmarket to be worked by the staff system.*—On and after 17th December 1873 all trains running on the line between Newmarket and Wodonga shall be worked by the staff system as herein described.

2. *Line from Newmarket to Wodonga to be divided into nine sections. Station master solely responsible under these regulations.*—The North-Eastern line from Newmarket to Wodonga shall be divided into nine sections. A staff will be made, colored, and lettered for each section, with staff tickets to correspond; the staff tickets are to be kept by the station master in a box, self-locking by an inside spring. The train staff for the section is the key of this box; and the station master will be held solely responsible for the custody and use of the staff and staff tickets in accordance with these regulations.

3. *Limits of each section with the color of each staff and staff ticket.*—The sections are as follows, and each staff is lettered accordingly, the color of each staff being also that of the staff tickets:—

4. *Ticket boxes to be kept locked except when opened by station master with the staff.*—Each staff or staff ticket must be used solely for the section to which it relates, but to prevent mistakes the staff is made so as to open only the box containing the tickets for the section, and this box cannot be opened by any other staff. The station master must keep the ticket box locked so that no ticket can be obtained except the box is opened by the station master with the staff.

5. *Staff tickets to be filled up and signed by station master.*—The staff tickets will be numbered and show the station of departure and arrival, with space for the date and time of starting to be filled in by the station master. The tickets are to be also signed by him, and issued in the order of the progressive number.

6. *Order of starting a train from a staff station.*—When all train arrangements at a staff station are complete and the train or engine is ready to start, it is the duty of the station master to give the staff or a staff ticket to the guard, who must thereupon in the presence of the station master hand the same to the driver as the instruction to start the train. In the case of a light engine without a guard, the station master will hand the staff or staff ticket to the driver.

7. *No train to be started without a staff or staff ticket.*—No engine or train must under any circumstances leave a staff station unless the driver has received from the guard, or, if there is no guard, from the station master, the staff or staff ticket for the section.

8. *At other than staff stations the guard to give the signal to start.*—The only authority to start a train from a staff station is the delivery to the driver of the staff or staff ticket as directed by Rule 6; but at other than staff stations the driver must not start until the usual signal has been given by the guard.

9. *When the staff is despatched from a station no engine or train can be started in the same direction.*—Any number of trains required may be started by ticket from the same station and in the same direction, provided only the staff for the section is at the station; but when a train has been started carrying the staff, no other engine or train can leave in the same direction.

10. *Order upon arrival of train at a staff station.*—On the arrival of a train at a staff station the driver must hand the staff or staff ticket to the guard, who will deliver it to the station master.

11. *Station master the sole person authorized to start or receive trains at a staff station.*—The station master is the sole person authorized to deliver or receive the staff or staff ticket to or from the guard or driver as prescribed by these regulations.

12. *Neglect in certain cases will render the person at fault liable to dismissal.*—Neglect to deliver up a staff or staff ticket, the carrying of the same beyond the station at which it should be delivered, or the starting from a staff station without the staff or ticket, will render the person at fault liable to dismissal, although no accident may arise.

13. *Disposal of collected staff tickets.*—All tickets received by station masters on the arrival of trains at staff stations are to be marked "cancelled," and forwarded daily to the traffic manager.

14. *Care and judgment to be exercised as to whether a train is started by staff or staff ticket.*—The last train for the day from a staff station may be started either by a staff or ticket according to the requirements of the terminal stations of the section, as shown by the time table, or by any special instructions issued by the traffic manager. For example, if the first train for the day will be an arrival from the station to which the last train is despatched on the previous night, then that last train must

carry the staff, so that the station master to whom it is delivered may start next morning's train either with a ticket or a staff in accordance with these regulations. But if the first train for the day will be a departure in the same direction as the last train of the previous night, then that last train must be started by a staff ticket, so that the staff, being detained at the station, can be used to start next morning's train.

15. *As to trains started at midnight.*—Any train started at midnight will be held as the last train for the previous day.

16. *Stoppage of traffic by improper use of staff or staff tickets will subject the offender to fine.*—Each station master at a staff station must pay particular attention to the working of the staff and tickets in accordance with these regulations, and cause as little delay as possible to the traffic on both sides of him. For example, the starting of a train by ticket when it ought to have been started by staff, or vice versa, will cause a stoppage of traffic and will render the offender liable to fine.

17. *Trains with a staff ticket must carry a disk or extra tail lamp.*—All trains travelling on the authority of a staff ticket must carry a disk or extra tail lamp for the information of plate-layers, gatekeepers, and others along the line.

18. *Measures to be taken on a train carrying the staff becoming disabled.*—In the event of a train carrying the staff becoming disabled, the staff must be taken to the nearest station where assistance can be obtained, or where it can be applied for by means of the staff on the next section. On the line being clear, the staff of the disabled train must be taken without delay to its original destination.

19. *On upon a train carrying a staff ticket becoming disabled.*—If a train is disabled while travelling on a staff ticket, the firemen must go back 800 yards to the rear of the train with a danger signal while the guard procures assistance from the nearest station and telegraphs to prevent the despatch of other trains until the line is clear.

20. *Nature of special arrangements to be made when road is blocked for any considerable time.*—Should any accident occur of a nature to block the road for any considerable time, special arrangements must be made for working the trains to and from the point of obstruction on either side. The staff regulations to be carried out on that side where the staff happens to be at the moment of the accident. On the other side the traffic to be conducted by a pilotman. The station masters at the staff stations on each side will receive written instructions

as to the arrangements made, and these will continue in force until the line is clear.

21. *Of two engines with a train the one directly attached to carry the staff or staff ticket.*—When more than one engine runs with a train the engine directly attached and nearest to the train shall carry the staff or staff ticket.

22. *Certain trains not subject to these regulations.*—Ballast trains or engines working for contractors or under the Engineer-in-Chief are not subject to these regulations.

Printed forms of tender and conditions of contract may be obtained from the Secretary, Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne, or from the officer in charge of police at each station, by whom also any information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

Telegrams will not be entertained, and tenders should be upon the printed form.

Tenders will be received for either oats, bran, hay, or straw; but if all be included in one tender, it may be accepted for one article only, if advisable. The tender must show the particular kind of hay or straw offered.

Tenders must express the prices in words as well as in figures, and without alterations, erasures, or discrepancies.

As much forage as can be stored at any station where the storage is small, will, for the convenience of the contractor, be ordered at one time.

The price must be per cental of 100 lbs. (net weight), including delivery at the stations and all charges except the bags, which will remain the property of the contractor. At stations where the bags can be at once emptied, the contractor will be required to remove them when delivery is taken. At other stations notice will be sent to the contractor when the bags are empty. Bags to be removed at contractors' expense.

Tenders not complying with the terms of advertisement will not be entertained.

The successful tenderer will be required to enter into a bond for one-third of the estimated amount of the contract, within ten days after the acceptance is notified. Two approved securities are required for contracts amounting to £150 and upwards, and one surety for contracts under £150.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders, or failing to carry out their contract satisfactorily, will be ineligible to again hold contracts for Government supplies.

Tenders must be enclosed in an envelope, marked "Tender for Forage," and deposited in the Tender-box, Pay Office, Treasury, Melbourne; or, if sent by post, they must be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne. The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known by *Gazette* notice, and by letter to accepted tenderers.

#### CONDITIONS.

1. The hay to be good, sound, and sweet, and properly trussed; the straw to be wheaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats (Victorian grown) and bran to be sound and sweet and of the best description; maize to be sound and sweet.

2. The supplies are for police, telegraph, and other horses, and are to be delivered on the order of the officer in charge of the district or station. The quantities stated in the schedule being only approximate, it must be understood that the Government may draw either more or less than those mentioned; and should new telegraph stations be formed, or additional horses be required to be stationed at any of the stations the contractor will be required to supply the additional forage. Should the additional number of horses, however, exceed two, the contractor may, if he desire it, terminate the contract by supplying at once the whole quantity due at the station under the contract according to the foregoing schedule.

3. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by the particulars of quantity, showing the net weight, to be endorsed on the back of the order, which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

4. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the District, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

5. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours of the time specified in the order for delivery, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

6. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering the supply, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

7. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 5.

8. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 5.

9. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £30, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

10. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

11. It will be competent for the Secretary to the Tender Board, on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice can only be given from the 1st day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th September 1874; and in the event of a station being discontinued or any change in the supplies required, the contractor will receive the earliest possible intimation.
