## DATES FOR HOLDING GENERAL SESSIONS CHANGED.

### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Justices of the Peace Statute 1865* it is amongst other things enacted that Courts of General Sessions of the Peace shall be holden in and for such places or districts within Victoria as the Governor in Council appoints; and the Governor in Council may from time to time define and appoint the limits and boundaries of the places or districts within which all such courts shall have jurisdiction respectively, and the places and times at which such courts shall be holden: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby appoint the Courts of General Sessions of the Peace at the undermentioned places to be holden on the days hereinafter mentioned, for and in lieu of certain days appointed by a former Proclamation for the holding of the said courts, that is to say:—

At Ballarat, on Friday the twentieth day of March next ensuing, in lieu of the seventeenth of March aforesaid.

At Stawell, on Monday the sixteenth day of March next ensuing, in lieu of the twentieth of March aforesaid.

## INTRODUCTION OF CATTLE, ETC., FROM NEW ZEALAND.

### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under my hand and the Seal of the Colony bearing date the twenty-fourth day of October One thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, the introduction from New Zealand into Victoria was prohibited of all cattle, sheep, and pigs, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate the diseases which the Intercolonial Conference, held at Sydney in the year aforesaid, had it in view to guard against: And whereas the result of enquiries is that no disease among stock, not common to the other Colonies of Australasia, now exist in New Zealand: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the Proclamation hereinbefore referred to, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of October One thousand eight hundred and seventy-three.

## TOWN PROCLAIMED UNDER THE LAND ACT 1869.

### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor may divide into counties the territory not already included in any county, and may also subdivide any county into parishes and towns, and may divide into parishes and towns any territory not included in any county, and by proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette* may define the boundaries of such counties, parishes, or towns, and may distinguish each by a name; and after such proclamation the territory comprised within the boundaries of any of the said divisions shall thenceforward be recognized as a county, parish, or town, by the name so given as aforesaid: the Governor may from time to time at the request of the council of any shire or borough alter by proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette* the name of any such shire or borough, and may also from time to time by proclamation as aforesaid alter the name of any county, parish, town, township, land, area, goldfield, river, harbor, lake, bay, lagoon, swamp, mountain, glen, or other place or locality whatsoever within Victoria: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby

define the boundaries of the Town hereinafter described, and do distinguish the same by the name prefixed thereto, that is to say:—

TOWN OF WARATAH.—County of Bulsh-buln: Commencing at a point on the sea-coast at Waratah Bay, northerly about sixty-five chains from Painted Point; bounded thence by lines bearing respectively west about one hundred and thirty chains, north one hundred and twenty chains, and east about one hundred chains, to the sea-coast aforesaid; and thence southerly by the sea-coast to the commencing point.—(74.P.20663.)

#### THE SHIRE OF MEREDITH DIVIDED ANEW.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the ninth day of February 1874.

WHEREAS by *The Shires Statute* (83 Vict. No. 358, § 13) it is amongst other things enacted, that at any time not less than thirty days before or after an annual election, or general election, or first appointment of councillors, whether under the Act No. CLXXVI. hereby repealed or this Act, for any shire, the Governor may, if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by one-fourth of the number of voters on the voters' roll in such shire, and if he shall think fit so to do, divide anew the shire into two or into three ridings, by such names and with such boundaries respectively as shall by Order in Council be assigned to the same, and may from time to time, subject to the like conditions, alter, vary, or rescind such Order: And whereas the powers conferred upon the Governor by the section of the Act above recited are now exercised upon a petition to that effect signed by one-fourth of the number of voters on the voters' roll of the Shire of Meredith, and notices of such petition have been published in the manner prescribed in the twenty-ninth section of the same Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order rescind a previous Order in Council bearing date the eleventh day of April 1865, whereby the Shire of Meredith was divided into ridings; and doth hereby divide anew the said Shire of Meredith into three ridings, to be designated by the names and to be comprised within the boundaries which are hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, that is to say:—

THE SOUTH RIDING.—Commencing at the south-west angle of the parish of Banganie at the River Leigh; thence eastward along the southern boundary of said parish and parish of Coolebarghurk to the River Moorabool; thence northerly by the said River Moorabool to north-west corner of the parish of Darriwill; thence easterly along northern boundary of said parish to the intersection of Sutherland's Creek, south-east corner of block 1, parish of Durdidwarrah; thence northerly by Sutherland's Creek, and western boundary of the borough of Steiglitz to the intersection of the Steiglitz and Meredith road; thence westerly by said road to River Moorabool; thence southerly by said river to north-east corner of the parish of Coolebarghurk; thence westerly along the northern boundaries of said parish and parish of Banganie to Cargerie Creek; thence southerly by said creek and the River Leigh to the starting point.

THE NORTH RIDING.—Commencing at the south-west angle of the parish of Cargerie on the River Leigh; thence northerly by said river to the southern boundary of the Shire of Buninyong; thence eastward and northward by southern and eastern boundary of said shire to south-west corner of the boundary of Ballan shire; thence east by southern boundary of said shire to River Moorabool; thence south by River Moorabool to north-east corner of parish of Coolebarghurk; thence westerly by south boundary of parish of Meredith and Cargerie to Cargerie Creek; thence southerly by said creek to starting point.

THE EAST RIDING.—Commencing on Sutherland's Creek, at the south-east corner of block 1, parish of Durdidwarrah; thence northward by said creek and west boundary of the borough of Steiglitz to the intersection of the Steiglitz and Meredith road; thence westward by said road to the River Moorabool; thence northward by the said river to southern boundary of Ballan shire; thence east by the south boundary of Ballan shire to the south-east corner of said shire; thence southerly and easterly by the Little River, Corio shire west boundary, and north boundary of the parishes of You-ang and Darriwill to starting point, excising that portion of land contained within the borough of Steiglitz.

And the Honorable Duncan Gillies, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

## NOTICE.

WITH a view to prevent damage to the submarine cable between Singapore, Penang, and Madras, and under the provisions of the Indian Conservancy Act, the Master Attendant hereby gives notice that all vessels are strictly prohibited from anchoring in any part of the Madras Roadstead to the southward of the lighthouse. Vessels arriving from the colonies with horses should bring up in not less than 7 fathoms water, with the Madras lighthouse bearing due west to west by south, and nothing to the southward of the former bearings. Commanders infringing these directions will be prosecuted under the provisions of Act XXII. of 1855.

## REGULATIONS UNDER THE EDUCATION ACT 1872.

**W**HEREAS by the 18th section of *The Education Act* 1872 it is enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make and rescind regulations for all or any of the purposes therein mentioned: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this Order make the Regulations following:—

## II.—SALARIES OF TEACHERS.

1. Teachers will be paid as follows:—

Classified teachers will receive annual salaries according to the following scale:—

*Head Teachers.*

In schools where the average attendance is below 20, £80.

In schools where the average attendance is not less than 20 but under 30, £100.

In schools where the average attendance is not less than 30 but under 50, £110.

In schools where the average attendance is not less than 50 but under 75, £120.

In schools where the average attendance is not less than 75 but under 100, £130.

And so on, the salaries increasing £10 for each increase of 25 in the average attendance of scholars up to 350, after which the increase will be £10 for each increase of 50 in the average attendance.

*Assistant Teachers.*

1st assistants will receive £80, with £20 for every 100 scholars in attendance above the first 50.

2nd assistants will receive £80, with £10 for every 100 scholars in attendance above the first 150.

3rd assistants will receive £80, with £10 for every 200 scholars in attendance above the first 250.

4th assistants will receive £80, with £10 for every 300 scholars in attendance above the first 350.

5th assistants will receive £80, with £10 for every 400 scholars in attendance above the first 450.

Other assistants £80 only.

Unclassified teachers and assistants will receive annual salaries not exceeding £80.

Workmistresses will be paid at the uniform rate of £30 per annum.

Head teachers and assistant teachers, being females, will receive one-fifth less than the above scale.

*Note.*

Teachers will generally be employed in schools according to the following scale:—

To schools where the average attendance is below 30, 1 teacher.

To schools where the average attendance is not less than 30 but below 50, 1 teacher; 1 workmistress.

To schools where the average attendance is not less than 50 but below 75, 1 teacher; 1 workmistress; 1 pupil-teacher.

To schools where the average attendance is not less than 75 but below 100, 1 teacher; 1 assistant.

To schools where the average attendance is not less than 100 but below 125, 1 teacher ; 1 assistant ; 1 pupil-teacher.

To schools where the average attendance is not less than 125 but below 150, 1 teacher ; 1 assistant ; 2 pupil-teachers.

To schools where the average attendance is not less than 150, 1 teacher ; 2 assistants ; 2 pupil-teachers.

After which a pupil teacher and an assistant will be allowed alternately for each successive increase of 50 in the average attendance.

2. The number of teachers employed in any school may be increased or reduced at any time as the average attendance may render necessary ; but, unless their position in the school has been raised, the rate of payment to the teachers will only be altered at the commencement of a half-year, or at the first day of any month succeeding the visit of an inspector.

3. No person shall be employed as a head teacher or assistant teacher in a State School unless such person shall hold a certificate of competency or a license to teach, or shall, upon an inspector's recommendation, have obtained from the Minister temporary permission to act ; and no unlicensed teacher who shall, without sufficient excuse, be absent from an examination to which he has been summoned, or who shall fail to pass at such examination, shall continue in such employment more than two months thereafter, unless there be no eligible licensed teacher ready and willing to take the place of such teacher ; and all unlicensed teachers shall be summoned as early as possible after their appointment.

4. For the purpose of estimating salaries, according to the scale in this Regulation, the average attendance during the six months ending the 30th of April and the 31st of October in each year will be generally adopted as the basis of payment from the 1st of July and 1st of January respectively next ensuing ; but in cases where exceptional fluctuations in attendance have occurred, the average of any other month or months may with the sanction of the Minister be adopted.

5. The rates of payments determined under the preceding section will continue for six months, except under the following circumstances :—

- (a.) Improvement in the position of the teacher.
- (b.) Change in the amount payable for results, to take effect from the 1st day of the month succeeding that in which the examination for results is held.
- (c.) Any exceptional increase in attendance caused by the closing of a neighbouring school.

6. In the case of a new school, or a school becoming a State School, a staff of teachers will be allotted upon the expected attendance at the school, and the rate of payment based upon such allotment shall continue in force until the expiration of the half-year then current, or, in special cases, until the expiration of a further period of six months.

7. Teachers employed in the establishment of new schools, or the organization of existing ones, or temporarily employed in the place of other teachers, or otherwise specially employed, may be paid by fixed salaries only, at rates from £2 to £7 per week, the rates to be in each case determined by the Minister.

### III.—PAYMENTS BY WAY OF RESULTS.

1. In addition to their fixed salaries, payments will be made to head teachers and assistant teachers by way of results, upon examination of their schools by an inspector, in the subjects specified in Schedule I. of the Act.

The maximum payment which any teacher can obtain by way of results will be an amount equal to one-half of his fixed salary.

In order to entitle the teachers of any school to this maximum :—

- 1. Every scholar who has attended such school during any part of the five weeks preceding the inspector's visit must be presented for examination.
- 2. The inspector must be satisfied that all the scholars below seven years of age in class I. are under proper instruction and discipline.
- 3. That every other scholar has been satisfactorily instructed up to the standard of the class with which he is presented by the teacher, scholars over seven years of age in class I. being presented with class II.
- 4. That the scholars are classified and instructed in accordance with Regulation I.
- 5. That the average age of the scholars does not exceed in class II., nine years ; in class III., ten years and three months ; in class IV., eleven years and six months ; in class V., thirteen years ; and in class VI., fourteen years. But the ages of any scholars whom the teacher may present for examination as proficient to the full extent of the course of free instruction will be omitted in calculating the average age of class VI.

Any school complying with the above conditions will have the maximum number of marks awarded to it, viz.:—

- 3 marks for each scholar under 7 years of age in class I.
- 5 marks for each scholar over 7 years of age in class I., and for each in class II.
- 7 marks for each other scholar.
- 1 mark additional for each girl above 7 years of age where needlework is taught.

Marks will be withdrawn for individual scholars and for classes failing to comply with any of the above conditions, and the result payment made to the teachers will be in the same ratio to the maximum as the number of marks actually awarded is to that which might have been obtained.

2. In making payments for results until an examination shall have been held in 1874, the inspector's percentage of passes obtained at examination in the year 1872 will be taken as the basis of payment unless a higher percentage was obtained during 1873.

3. In new schools result payments will be based upon an inspector's percentage of 60 until the school shall have been examined for results; but the payments upon that percentage will cease from the last day of the month in which the examination takes place.

#### IV.—FEES FOR EXTRA SUBJECTS.

1. Fees payable by parents for subjects not included in the First Schedule to the Act, herein called extra subjects, will be at weekly rates not exceeding the sums mentioned in the following scale:—

For every subject not included in the above list the fee to be charged will be at the discretion of the teacher, but must not, in any case, exceed one shilling per week.

2. A percentage not exceeding 5 per cent. is appropriated for payments by results. The amount thus appropriated will remain in the hands of the head teacher till the school is inspected, when, if the inspector is satisfied with the instruction, it will be returned to the teachers; otherwise it must be remitted to the department for distribution amongst those in whose schools the instruction has been found satisfactory.

3. Instruction in extra subjects must not be given so as to interrupt the course of instruction in accordance with Rule I.

#### V.—EXAMINATION AND CLASSIFICATION OF TEACHERS.

1. Licenses to teach in State schools as assistants, or as head teachers in schools where no assistants are employed, will be granted to candidates upon examination.

2. Certificates of competency to teach in any State School will be granted to candidates upon examination.

3. Licenses will be issued to teachers classified in the second division of competency under the Act CXLIX., and certificates to those classified in the first division of competency under that Act.

4. Trained teachers, and those classified in honours, will have their additional qualifications entered upon their certificates.

##### FOR A LICENSE TO TEACH THE CANDIDATE WILL BE REQUIRED—

To read fluently, and with proper emphasis.

To write from memory neatly, with correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation, the substance of a short narrative read aloud.

To parse an easy sentence in prose.

To pass an examination in—

The elements of mathematical and physical geography, and the principal features on the maps of the World, Europe, Australasia, and Victoria.

The simple and compound rules; practice, proportion, principles of mental arithmetic, interest, and vulgar and decimal fractions. Females to mental arithmetic only, inclusive.

The art of teaching, that is to say—To give a satisfactory lesson to a class in reading, writing, arithmetic, grammar, or geography; to understand class drill;\* and to keep a class in order, attention, and activity.

*Needlework.*—Females to be able to cut out and do any kind of plain needlework.

##### FOR A CERTIFICATE OF COMPETENCY THE CANDIDATE WILL BE REQUIRED—

To read fluently, and with proper expression and emphasis, both prose and poetry.

To write from dictation, with correct spelling and punctuation, from an ordinary book or newspaper, and to compose a short essay on some given subject from, or reproduce the substance of, some lesson in the reading books used in State Schools.

To pass an examination in—

Morell's Grammar and Analysis.

Descriptive geography of the four continents, Australasia, and Victoria, the products, governments, and manners of the various nations, and the mathematical and physical geography of Sullivan's "Geography Generalized," or equivalent.

The simple and compound rules of arithmetic, practice, proportion, interest, principles of mental arithmetic, vulgar and decimal fractions, elements of book-keeping. Females to mental arithmetic only, inclusive.

The art of teaching, that is to say—

To set fair copy head-lines, in large and small hands.

To draw up a time-table.

To compose the notes of a lesson.

To answer questions in the methods of instruction and organization of schools; to understand class drill;\* and to give a collective lesson.

*Needlework.*—Females to be able to cut out and do any kind of plain needlework.

\* Knowledge of class drill is held to comprise: *Ability of a Teacher*.—1. When standing apart from his class (i.e., where he cannot touch the scholars), by word of command alone, without explanations, to move it from the desks into the body of the school-room and place it in a gallery, if there be one, or, if not, replace it in the desks. 2. To carry his class (by word of command) through a set of extension exercises. Also to be fully acquainted with and to put his class through so much drill as is comprised in the following words of command:—"Fall in;" "Number off;" "Prove;" "Stand at Ease;" "Attention;" "Eyes right;" "Eyes front;" "Dress;" "Dress—with intervals;" "Right close;" "Left close;" "Right turn;" "Left turn;" "Right about turn;" "Left about turn;" "Half right turn;" "Half left turn;" "Quick march;" "Halt;" "Mark time;" "Forward;" "Front;" "Right wheel;" "Left wheel;" "Right about wheel;" "Left about wheel."

## IN ORDER TO OBTAIN SECOND-CLASS HONOURS CANDIDATES WILL BE REQUIRED—

*If Males*—To have passed at any one examination at the Melbourne University in—

1. Logic.
2. Junior Latin.
3. Lower Mathematics.
4. Also in any one of the following subjects :—  
Junior Greek.  
Upper Mathematics.  
Chemistry, Mineralogy, and Botany.  
Ancient History.

*If Females*—To have passed as above in—

- History, as in the Matriculation Examination ;  
And also in three other subjects (one of which must be a language), which may be either any of those named above ; or—  
French and German, as in the Matriculation Examination ; or music, as in the programme of examination for a license to teach.

## IN ORDER TO OBTAIN FIRST-CLASS HONOURS CANDIDATES WILL BE REQUIRED—

*If Females*—To have obtained Second-class Honours, and to have passed in—

1. English Language and Literature ; and—
2. } In three other subjects of those named above for males, or for females, other than History as in the
3. } Matriculation Examination, two of which have not been previously taken up.
4. }

Application for permission to attend the University Examination, at the reduced fee, must be made to the Secretary, on or before 15th September and 22nd January in each year, on a form which will be supplied on application at the Education Office.

3. Examinations for licenses to teach and for certificates of competency will be held periodically at Melbourne, and such other places as the Minister may appoint, when all male candidates of eighteen years of age and female candidates of seventeen years who present themselves for examination, and who produce satisfactory certificates of moral character and health, may be examined in the literary subjects required.

4. Candidates must bear their own travelling expenses ; and all candidates who are not actually employed as teachers, workmistresses, or pupil-teachers, will be required to pay a fee of ten shillings previous to examination.

5. No teacher will be allowed to attend an examination for honours who shall not have previously obtained a certificate of competency, or who shall have had an unfavorable report recorded against him at any time during the two preceding years.

## PUPIL-TEACHERS.

6. Pupil-teachers will not be appointed under the age of 14 years if males and 13 if females ; they must be of good constitution, and free from any physical defect likely to impair their efficiency as teachers.

7. Pupil-teachers will be divided into four classes, the requirements for which will be as follows :—

## FOR THE FOURTH OR LOWEST CLASS.\*

*Reading*.—To read fluently the Irish National Board's Third Book of Lessons, or some book equivalent to it.

*Writing and Composition*.—To write out neatly in small-hand, with correct spelling, any passage dictated from the Third Book, or its equivalent.

*Grammar*.—To point out the parts of speech in a simple sentence.

*Geography*.—To have a knowledge of the elements of geography and the outlines of the map of the world.

*Arithmetic*.—To write from dictation sums in the first four rules of arithmetic, simple and compound, and work them correctly, and to know the tables of weights and measures.

*Needlework, for Girls*.—To sew neatly and to knit.

## FOR THE THIRD CLASS.

*Reading*.—To read the Irish National Board's Fourth Book of Lessons, or some book equivalent to it, with fluency and proper emphasis, and to be acquainted with the subjects contained in the Third Book (or equivalent), except stories, fables, and poetry.

*Writing and Composition*.—To write from dictation, neatly and in a small-hand, with correct spelling and fair punctuation, any passage from the Fourth Book of Lessons, or its equivalent.

*Grammar*.—To know the first part and first two chapters of the second part of Morell's Grammar, or their equivalent.

*Geography*.—To know the geography of Australasia.

*Arithmetic*.—To know simple proportion and practice, with the elements of mental arithmetic.

*Art of Teaching*.—(1.) Ability to give a class a reading lesson, and to examine on the meaning of what has been read.  
(2.) Ability to drill a class in marching and exercises, and to conduct it through the movements necessary for preserving order.

*Needlework*.—Girls to instruct the younger ones in sewing and knitting.

\* Scholars who have passed the examination for the fifth class in Regulation I. will be qualified for employment as fourth-class pupil-teachers without undergoing this examination.



## FOR THE SECOND CLASS.

*Reading.*—To read with fluency and proper emphasis; to know the subjects of the Irish National Board's Fourth Book of Lessons, or its equivalent.

*Writing.*—To write from memory, neatly and in small-hand, with correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation, the substance of a narrative read aloud.

*Grammar.*—To know the first two parts of Morell's Grammar, or their equivalent, and the elements of parsing.

*Geography.*—To know the geography of Europe, and the first four chapters of Sullivan's "Geography Generalized," or equivalent.

*Arithmetic.*—To work sums and answer questions up to vulgar and decimal fractions and mental arithmetic inclusive.

*Art of Teaching.*—To teach a class the rudiments of grammar and arithmetic, and to keep the class in attention, order, and activity.

*Needlework.*—Girls to exhibit increased skill in needlework.

## FOR THE FIRST CLASS.

*Reading.*—To read with ease and expression either prose or poetry, and to know the subjects of the Fifth Book of Lessons, or its equivalent.

*Writing and Composition.*—To write from memory, neatly and in small-hand, with correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation, the substance of an essay previously read.

*Grammar.*—To be able to parse, and answer questions from any part of Morell's Grammar, or its equivalent.

*Geography.*—To know the geography of the world, and the mathematical and physical geography of Sullivan's "Geography Generalized," or its equivalent.

*Arithmetic.*—To work sums and answer questions up to vulgar and decimal fractions, interest, and mental arithmetic inclusive, and to know the elements of book-keeping.

*Art of Teaching.*—Ability to give a gallery lesson.

*Needlework.*—Girls to exhibit some skill in fancy work, and to do plain work well.

The salaries attached to these classes will be :—

8. Salaries will not be paid to pupil-teachers until they shall have passed the examination for the fourth or lowest class. If they pass at the first examination to which they are summoned they will be paid from the date of appointment; if they fail, no payment will be made for any period anterior to the date at which they may subsequently pass.

9. A general examination of pupil-teachers will be held at the commencement of every year, both orally and by means of papers, and all pupil-teachers who have been appointed not less than six months will be required to attend thereat under pain of forfeiting their salaries. At this examination they will be classed for the year.

10. Every pupil-teacher will be expected to advance at least one class at each annual examination, and those who undergo two such examinations without promotion will be liable to dismissal.

11. Head teachers will be required to give to their pupil-teachers, either personally or by competent assistants, instruction outside of the four hours mentioned in the Act, as follows :—

In a school having but one pupil-teacher, five hours per week. In a school having more than one pupil-teacher, at least six hours per week; and the time for such instruction must in all cases appear on the time-table.

Pupil-teachers cannot, at their first examination, be placed in a higher class than the lowest, but at the annual examination they will be allowed to advance more than one class.

12. Pupil-teachers will not be reckoned as scholars in any examination under Regulation III. for payment by way of results.

13. Pupil-teachers will be liable to dismissal without notice, for idleness, disobedience, or immoral conduct.

14. A bonus of £6 will be paid to the head teacher for every pupil-teacher who shall pass the annual examination for promotion, and if no pupil-teacher in a school fails to pass, the head teacher will receive a sum of £6 in addition to the above bonuses.

## MUSIC.

1. Licenses to teach and certificates of competency will be granted upon examination.

## FOR A LICENSE TO TEACH, THE CANDIDATE WILL BE REQUIRED—

*Reading.*—To read at sight an exercise consisting of diatonic intervals, easy modulations only being admitted.

*Writing.*—To write a short and simple passage composed of minims sung in the presence of the candidate.

*Theory of Music.*—Notation in the various clefs, time, accent, the major and minor scales, the common chord and its inversions.

*Teaching.*—To be able to teach a class properly.

## FOR A CERTIFICATE OF COMPETENCY, THE CANDIDATE WILL BE REQUIRED—

*Reading.*—To read at sight any ordinary passage from an oratorio or opera.

*Writing.*—To write in correct time an ordinary passage from an oratorio or opera.

*Theory of Music.*—To know the theory and practice of harmony and thorough bass, and to understand the formation of the voice.

*Teaching.*—To be able to teach a class properly. To produce a class taught by the candidate for a period of twelve months which shall pass a satisfactory examination.

2. Licenses to teach will be granted without examination to all teachers who passed for the 2nd or 3rd class under, or who hold a second division certificate from, the Board of Education, and certificates of competency to all those who passed under the former National or Denominational Board, or who passed for 1st class under, or hold a first division certificate from, the Board of Education.

### XIII.—TRAINING.

1. The training institution will consist of a head training school in Melbourne, and of district training schools, not exceeding twenty in number, in various parts of the colony. The members of the training institution will be a superintendent, assistant-masters, associates, students, and pupils.

2. Training will be conducted in the head training school in Melbourne by the superintendent and assistant-masters, and in the district training schools by the associates.

3. The associated branches will be such State schools as the Minister may from time to time appoint for the purpose, and the head teacher for the time being of each such school shall hold the office of associate so long as his school continues to be a branch of the institution.

4. Associates will be required to train and adequately instruct all students and pupils placed in training with them by the Department, and to provide for their receiving not less than seven hours' instruction per week in the subjects of the certificate examination. They will also be required to train in the practice of teaching any teachers who may be temporarily transferred to their schools for that purpose. They may receive, on such terms as they may themselves arrange, other persons as candidates for licenses or certificates of competency.

5. Each associate of the training institution will receive a fixed sum of £50 per annum, and £10 for every candidate whom, after not less than six months' instruction in his school, he qualifies for admission to the second year's course of training.

6. Studentships will be awarded to candidates of approved character and exhibiting special promise as teachers. Students will be provided with board and lodging free of cost.

7. Every student will be required to enter into an agreement by himself and an approved surety not to relinquish his course of training without the permission of the Minister, and for four years after the termination of his studentship to teach in any school to which he may be appointed.

8. The course of instruction in the training institution will be free, and will extend over two years, the first of which will be passed in an associated school, and the second in the central establishment.

9. For admission to the first year's course of training candidates must be recommended by an inspector, and must be either—

- (1.) First-class pupil-teachers;
- (2.) Matriculated students at the University; or
- (3.) Persons who have passed the literary examination for a license to teach.

10. The literary instruction during the first year's course will have special reference to the subjects included in Schedule I. of the Education Act, and that during the second year's course to more advanced subjects; but the details of the course of study will be such as the Minister may from time to time direct. Instruction in the art of teaching will be continuous throughout the two years.

11. In order to complete the first year's course, pupils or students must pass a year in one of the associated schools as first-class pupil-teachers, or as assistants paid or unpaid, and must pass the literary examination for a certificate. No student will be entitled to be paid salary, whilst holding a studentship, for a longer period than one year.

12. Pupils already in training, or who, having passed the entrance examination in 1873, apply for admission before the 28th February 1874, may, at the discretion of the Minister, pass their first year at the institution in Melbourne on the same terms as to board heretofore in force.

13. The first year's course may be dispensed with—

- (1.) In the case of Exhibitioners under Regulation IX. who have passed the first ordinary examination for the B.A. degree at the University.
- (2.) On the recommendation of an inspector, in the case of persons who have passed the literary part of the examination for competency, and have further—
  - (a.) Completed their pupil-teacher course, including one year's service as first class pupil-teacher, or
  - (b.) Passed two years as certificated or licensed head teachers, or assistants in schools under the Education Act or the Common Schools Act.

14. Students who have completed their first year's course will, if their conduct has been satisfactory, be admitted to the second year's course as students.

15. Other pupils who have completed their first year's course, and persons in whose case the first year's course has been dispensed with, will be admitted as pupils in training for the second year; or, if there are vacancies, may be admitted as students upon the recommendation of an inspector, or by competitive examination.

16. Students who fail to pass the literary examination for competency at the end of their first year's course, may, at the discretion of the Minister, have their studentship suspended or forfeited altogether.

17. To complete the second year's course, students and pupils will be required to pass a satisfactory examination in the subjects prescribed for study during the second year.

18. Misconduct or idleness will be a sufficient ground for dismissing a student or pupil from the training institution.

19. All examinations of students and pupils in training will be conducted under the direction of the Inspector-General, who will from time to time report upon the training institution generally.

# QUARANTINE DISTRICTS UNDER "THE SCAB ACT 1870."

2. All orders for supplies under these contracts must issue from the Secretary for Railways, and all goods must be delivered free of charge to the Stores or other part of the Railway premises, Williamstown, unless otherwise directed by the Secretary.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service of the Victorian Railways, or by the exercise of the right to purchase reserved in the specification or the special conditions to any of the schedules, or by the purchase of articles manufactured in the penal or other Government establishments, or the manufacture of articles by the department.

4. 5. 11. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Railway Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

12. ## IRON CASTINGS.

The castings are required for locomotive engine work, carriage work, &c.

Whenever specially ordered the castings shall be run from the very best "cold-blast iron," and of such particular brand, quality, and mixture as may be described in the order; or of such other substituted mixture as may be approved or directed by the General Overseer of Locomotives, so as to produce a hard, close, soft, or other description of metal.

The castings are to be clean, sharp, free from surface scale, shell, cold shuts, blow holes, honeycomb, cinder, or any other imperfection, and are to be sound in every respect and thoroughly close in grain. When specially ordered the castings are to be run with heads or runners of such weight as may be requested, and no extra charge shall be made or allowed for same, and the contractor will be required to remove the head or runner from the casting where possible, and charge the casting at the net weight only, trimmed and cleaned. In cases where it is necessary to cut off the head in a lathe or machine, such head will be cut off by the Government, and returned to the Melbourne Station, there to be delivered to the contractor free of cost or carriage.

Whenever ordered, the castings are to be moulded in loam without a pattern, and loam price will be paid according to schedule, but no extra charge will be allowed for patterns, strickles, or loam boards. ### SHIRE OF MORNINGTON.

*Bye-Law No. 4.*

**A** BYE-LAW made under the provisions of Part XII, section 187 of the Shires Statute, for the regulation of bathing and for the good government of the shire.

Pursuant to the provisions of section 187 of the Shires Statute, the Council of the Shire of Mornington ordain as follows (that is to say):—

No male person above the age of ten years shall be allowed to use the beach of Port Philip Bay for the purpose of bathing between the point known as Fisherman's Point and the point known as Beloura Point, the same being within the shire of Mornington, unless it be before the hour of Half-past Seven in the morning and after the hour of Four in the afternoon; and any person offending against the provisions of this bye-law shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

### GENERAL RULES OF THE ST. ARNAUD DISTRICT HOSPITAL.

OBJECT.

1. The object of the institution shall be to afford surgical and medical aid to destitute persons, irrespective of color or creed.

CONSTITUTION.

2. The administration of the affairs of the hospital shall be entrusted to a general committee, to be elected according to the provisions of the act of incorporation and bye-laws, and shall consist of sixteen members, including the president, two vice-presidents, and treasurer.

3. The president, vice-presidents, and treasurer shall hold office for one year only, which shall become vacant in any of the ways in which the office of ordinary members of the general committee may become vacant under the twelfth section of the act of incorporation; and the president, vice-presidents, and treasurer shall go out of office (but may nevertheless be re-elected) on the second Thursday in the month of January in every year, at which time a fresh election shall be made by the contributors.

4. The committee shall direct the general business of the hospital, frame bye-laws for its internal regulation, the same not being repugnant to the general rules; enter into contracts for the supply of provisions and other articles for the use of the hospital, direct payment to be made for the same, and appoint and discharge all servants and paid officers of the institution. They shall meet at least once in every month, on such days as they may appoint. They shall superintend and give all necessary directions for the admission, discharge, and dismissal of patients, in accordance with the terms and spirit of the general rules. The chairman of the committee (who shall be the president if present; one of the vice-presidents in his absence, or some other member in their absence) shall have a casting vote in addition to a deliberative vote.

5. The committee of management shall choose from among themselves, at each monthly meeting, a visiting committee of three, who shall meet on such days and such hours each week as they may appoint; and have power to audit the house accounts, and, if necessary, suspend servants and temporarily appoint others in their places.

6. No person shall be a member of the general committee and a salaried officer of the hospital at the same time; nor

shall any salaried officer or servant be present at any committee meeting, except when required. And no member of committee shall be allowed, either directly or indirectly, to contract for any supplies required by the hospital.

7. It shall be competent at any time for the committee of management, at any meeting at which at least four members shall be present, or for twenty or more contributors by writing under their hands, to require the secretary to summon, at the expiration of not less than fourteen days, a special meeting of subscribers; the occasion of calling such meeting being stated in the requisition; and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned. And notice of every such meeting shall be advertised in the local paper at least one week before the day appointed for holding such meeting.

8. The committee shall present a general report of the affairs of the hospital at the annual meeting in January in each year, which report shall be prepared by the treasurer, secretary, and medical officers, and be presented at a special meeting of the committee for revision and approval at least one week before the day appointed for the annual meeting.

#### CONTRIBUTORS.

9. Every benefactor of £10 (Ten pounds) and upwards, and every annual contributor of One pound (£1) and upwards, shall be and be alone regarded as contributors for the time being (under the second section of the Act of Incorporation), and shall be eligible to be members of committee.

10. Benefactors and annual contributors shall, if the funds and accommodation of the hospital permit, be at liberty to recommend, in every current year, free patients, as follows:—That every benefactor of Twenty pounds (£20) and upwards be eligible for life to be a member of committee, and have the privilege of recommending in each year one in-door or two out-door patients; and every contributor of One pound (£1) per annum shall have the privilege of recommending in each year one in-door or two out-door patients.

11. Every executor paying to the institution a bequest of Fifty pounds (£50) and upwards, and every person, not being a paid collector, raising in any one year the sum of Fifty pounds (£50) and upwards, and every other person elected at an annual meeting, at the recommendation of the outgoing committee, in consideration of special services rendered to the institution, shall be entitled to recommend annually two in-door or four out-door patients.

12. Every benefactor of £10 (Ten pounds), or contributor of £1 (One pound) per annum, shall be entitled to one vote; every benefactor of £30 (Thirty pounds), or contributor of £3 (Three pounds) per annum, shall be entitled to two votes; and every benefactor of £50 (Fifty pounds), or contributor of £5 (Five pounds) and upwards per annum, shall be entitled to three votes at all general meetings of contributors.

13. Every firm or partnership becoming contributors shall exercise its privilege through some one member of the same only.

14. No person (medical officers excepted) shall hold or be eligible for any honorary office, or have any vote, or exercise any privilege connected with the institution during the current year for which his annual contribution shall not have been actually paid.

15. The current year shall mean with respect to each benefactor the period commencing on the first day of July, and ending on the thirtieth day of June next ensuing, both inclusive.

16. All votes at the annual and other meetings of the contributors shall be taken by a show of hands, unless a ballot shall have been previously determined on by a majority present, in which case the vote or votes referred to shall be by ballot. Voting by proxy shall be permitted, provided such proxy is in the form of Schedule A. appended to these rules.

#### HONORARY TREASURER.

17. The duties of the honorary treasurer shall be to receive all moneys from the collector, the Government, and others. He shall deposit all moneys received by him, whenever the same shall amount to Ten pounds (£10), in such bank as the general committee shall from time to time direct, and shall cause the different sums so deposited to be paid to the account of the St. Annand District Hospital; and all accounts shall be paid by cheque signed by any two members of committee, and countersigned by the secretary.

#### SECRETARY AND COLLECTOR.

18. The secretary and collector shall convene and attend all special, general, and committee meetings; he shall take minutes of the proceedings and transcribe them carefully into books kept for that purpose; and he shall carry out the directions of such meetings in the particulars incident to his department.

19. He shall collect subscriptions to the institution, and in all cases give receipts for such subscriptions, and pay over the same to the treasurer once in every fortnight, and render accounts of the amount by him received since the last payment; and shall provide a guarantee of some approved society to the amount of £100 (One hundred pounds) for the faithful discharge of his duties.

20. He shall conduct the correspondence and other clerical business of his department; and he shall enter and keep the accounts of the institution under the direction of the committee.

21. He shall compile all reports that may be ordered by the committee, fill up all cheques, and perform the clerical duties connected with the office of treasurer.

#### MEDICAL OFFICERS.

22. The honorary medical officers and the resident surgeon, all of whom shall be legally qualified practitioners, shall constitute the medical staff of the hospital.

23. The number of honorary medical officers shall be two, who shall hold office for one year only, and shall go out of

office (but may nevertheless be re-elected) on the second Thursday in the month of January in every year, at which a fresh election shall be made by the contributors.

24. The resident surgeon shall not be absent for more than six hours at any one time without the sanction of the visiting committee, nor for more than twelve hours without the consent of the general committee.

25. He shall have the immediate superintendence of the dispenser, wardsmen, and nurses; he shall preserve order and sobriety; and, in cases of insubordination or gross neglect of duty on the part of wardsmen or nurses, he shall immediately report to the visiting committee.

26. He shall receive the certificates from the applicants for admission, examine the nature of their cases, and decide on their fitness for admission, either as in-door or out-door patients, subject to the approval of the visiting committee, and he shall discharge all patients as soon as he considers them fit to be discharged.

27. He shall have charge of the patients in the hospital, and of their treatment; but in all cases of difficulty or danger, or long continuance in the hospital, he is requested to consult the honorary surgeons.

28. The honorary medical officers shall have admission at all times to the institution. They shall assist the resident surgeon in the performance of all capital surgical operations; but no such operation shall be performed without previous consultation of the medical staff; and they shall regularly consult in all cases of importance or of protracted continuance in the hospital.

29. If any honorary medical officer and the resident surgeon shall differ upon the mode of treatment in any case, the resident surgeon shall call a consultation of the medical staff, at which the treatment shall be decided by the majority present.

30. The medical staff shall hold a consultation on every contemplated surgical operation of a capital nature, except in great emergency; also upon every other case of importance or protracted continuance in the hospital; and also upon every suggested *post mortem* examination, save such as may be directed by the coroner of the district.

31. A consultation of the medical staff shall take place in all cases of capital surgical operations; but if any honorary medical officer shall not attend within a reasonable time after being duly summoned, or if, in the opinion of the house surgeon, the safety of the patient may be endangered by delay, the latter may forthwith perform the duty.

#### PATIENTS.

32. Every person claiming the benefit of the hospital, whether as an in-door or out-door patient, must produce a recommendation from a contributor. Accidents, however, and such cases of decided emergency as in the opinion of the resident surgeon admit of no delay, may be attended to and if necessary admitted at any time, whether recommended by a contributor or not.

33. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement, no child under five years of age, no person insane or having contagious, infectious, or other disease which in the opinion of the resident surgeon ought not to come within the operation of charity, shall be admitted to the hospital as an in-door patient; nor any person who in his opinion may receive equal benefit as an out-door patient. In the absence of satisfactory reasons to the contrary being offered to the general committee no person shall be allowed to remain in the hospital who in the opinion of the medical staff may receive equal benefit as an out-door patient. Every person obtaining the benefit of the institution under a plea, expressed or implied, of destitution who shall in the estimation of the general committee, upon a representation being made to them of the fact, be able to pay for such benefit, shall be liable for the same after the rate of £2 (Two pounds) per week; and every person admitted on the ground of emergency to the benefit of the hospital, and well able in the estimation of the general committee to pay for the same, will also be required to pay for the same after the same rate.

34. The general committee shall, if necessary, make provision for the reception and treatment of patients laboring under contagious, infectious, or other diseases on the hospital ground; but at a suitable and safe distance from the hospital itself.

35. Ministers of religion shall have access to sick persons of their respective denominations at such times as shall be appointed by the committee; and any minister may attend at any time when requested by such patients.

#### OUT PATIENTS.

36. Out patients will receive attendance on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays in each week, between the hours of Twelve noon and Two o'clock p.m.

#### VISITORS.

37. That Sunday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday in each week, between the hours of Two and Five o'clock p.m., be the days and hours set apart for persons desirous of visiting the hospital or any patients; but in cases of extreme danger the friends of such patients may obtain admission to the hospital by an order signed by a member of the general committee, or permission of the resident surgeon.

#### AUDITORS.

38. Two auditors (who shall not be members of the general committee) shall be elected at the annual general meeting in January in each year, in the same manner as provided for the election of members of general committee. Should any auditor refuse or neglect, for the space of fourteen days after having been called upon by the committee to perform such audit, or resign, or become incapable from any cause mentioned in the 12th section of the Incorporation Act with regard

to members of committee, then and in such case the committee shall appoint a fit and proper person to fill the office until the next annual meeting.

39. The accounts of the hospital shall be audited in the first week in January in each year by the auditors, who shall sign a statement of accounts, exhibiting a summary of receipts and expenditure for the preceding year.
