PROCLAMATION.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA, } Proclamation by His Excellency
to wit. } ANTHONY MUSGRAVE, Esquire,
Companion of the Most Distinguished
(L.S.) Order of Saint Michael and Saint George,
A. MUSGRAVE. Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and
over Her Majesty's Province of South
Australia, and the Dependencies thereof,
&c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation published in the *South Australian Government Gazette* on the seventeenth day of April, One thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and published in the *London Times* newspaper on the twenty-first day of August One thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, the introduction or importation into the Province of South Australia of any horned cattle, sheep, or pigs, shipped at any place or places beyond the limits of the Australasian Colonies was absolutely prohibited for a period of two years from the publication of the said Proclamation in the *London Times* newspaper aforesaid: And whereas it is necessary to revoke the said Proclamation so far as it relates to that portion of the Province of South Australia known as the Northern Territory: Now therefore I, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke and annul the aforesaid Proclamation so far as relates to the introduction or importation of horned cattle, sheep, or pigs into that portion of the Province aforesaid known as the Northern Territory, but in all other respects I hereby confirm the aforesaid proclamation of the seventeenth day of April One thousand eight hundred and seventy-three.

QUEENSLAND, } Proclamation by the Most Honorable GEORGE
to wit. } AUGUSTUS CONSTANTINE, Marquis of Normanby, Earl of Mulgrave, Viscount Normanby, and Baron Mulgrave of Mulgrave, all in the county of York, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; and Baron Mulgrave of New Ross, in NORMANBY, the county of Wexford, in the Peerage of Ireland; Governor, a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Queensland and its Dependencies.

WHEREAS by Proclamation under my Hand and Seal bearing date the 21st day of June A.D. 1872, published in the *Queensland Government Gazette*, 1, the Governor aforesaid, with the advice of the Executive Council, did thereby prohibit the introduction or importation by sea of any horned cattle from the colony of Victoria into the colony of Queensland, until the said Proclamation should be altered or revoked by a subsequent Proclamation: And whereas by *The Diseased Animals Act of 1866* it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor to revoke such Proclamation by a similar Proclamation: And whereas it is deemed expedient and desirable now to rescind and revoke the Proclamation hereinbefore mentioned: Now therefore I, GEORGE AUGUSTUS CONSTANTINE, Marquis of Normanby, the Governor aforesaid, in pursuance of the said recited Act, and of all other powers enabling me in that behalf, and by and with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation rescind and revoke my previous Proclamation of the 21st day of June 1872, prohibiting the introduction or importation by sea of any horned cattle from the colony of Victoria to the colony of Queensland.

DATE FOR HOLDING THE NEXT GENERAL SESSIONS AT WARRNAMBOOL CHANGED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir George Ferguson Bowen, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Justices of the Peace Statute 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that Courts of General Sessions of the Peace shall be holden in and for such places or districts within Victoria as the Governor in Council appoints; and the Governor in Council may from time to time define and appoint the limits and boundaries of the places or districts within which all such courts shall have jurisdiction respectively, and the places and times at which such courts shall be holden; Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby appoint the next Court of General Sessions of the Peace at the undermentioned place for the district of Warrnambool to be holden on the day hereinafter mentioned, for and in lieu of the day appointed by a former Proclamation for the holding of the said court; that is to say:—

At Warrnambool, on Wednesday the third day of June in the present year, in lieu of Tuesday the second of June aforesaid.

PUBLIC ROAD WITHIN THE SHIRE OF CORIO.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir George Ferguson Bowen, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Shires' Statute* (33 Vict. No. 358) it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time by notice in the *Government Gazette* to proclaim any land reserved or used for a road, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley, or right-of-way to be a public road within the meaning of this Act, and such land reserved or used for a road, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley, or right-of-way shall thereupon and thenceforth from the date of such proclamation become and be absolutely dedicated to the public and reserved for public use as a public road within the meaning of any law now or hereafter in force; provided that no such proclamation shall be deemed to be a proclamation as a main road as hereinbefore provided; and provided further that every and any such proclamation may be at any time revoked, if necessary, by the Governor: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this notice proclaim to be a public road within the meaning of the said Act the land reserved or used for the road, highway, or thoroughfare within the Shire of Corio, the limits of which are hereinafter described, viz.:—

The street known as Argyle street, in the township of Ascot.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir George Ferguson Bowen, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Electoral Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that no election shall be void in consequence only of there having been no Returning Officer at the time of the issue of the writ or of any delay in the return of the writ; and where any accidental or unavoidable impediment, misfeasance, or omission shall have happened, the Governor-in-Council may take all such measures as may be necessary for removing such impediment or rectifying such misfeasance or omission; or may declare any or all of the proceedings at or for any election valid as to and notwithstanding such impediment, misfeasance, or omission; and every such Order in Council shall state specifically the nature of the impediment, misfeasance, or omission, and shall be forthwith published in the *Government Gazette*: And whereas the Deputy Returning Officer for the St. Andrew's Division of the Electoral District of Evelyn, did adjourn the taking of the poll at Queenstown within the said division, from the date of polling named in the writ to the 27th instant, in consequence of his not having a sufficient number of ballot-papers supplied to him by the Returning Officer for the said district: And whereas an additional number of ballot-papers were supplied to the Deputy Returning Officer, and the poll was completed on the 27th instant as aforesaid: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, and under the authority given in and by the 131st section of *The Electoral Act 1865*, No. 273, do hereby declare that all the proceedings at or for such election shall be valid, notwithstanding such accidental omission or impediment as aforesaid.

VOLUNTEER FORCE.

THE Governor in Council has approved of the accompanying Regulations under the Volunteer Statute of 1865 (28 Vict. No. 266), and has cancelled all previous Regulations, with the exception of the Orders in Council dated 25th August 1866 and 13th October 1873.

REGULATIONS.

COURSE TO BE PURSUED FOR FORMATION OF CORPS.

1. Persons wishing to form a Volunteer Corps should place themselves in communication with the officer commanding the force, who will submit the offer for the consideration of Government.
2. In considering offers of the services of new corps, regard will be had to the number and description of corps already existing in the same district, to the circumstances of the locality, and to the limits imposed by the amount of the sums voted by Parliament.

DEFINITION OF THE WORD "CORPS."

3. The word "corps" means any body of volunteers enrolled under the Act, whose services have been accepted as a separate body by the Governor in Council.

PRECEDENCE.

4. The different arms rank in the following order, viz.:—
Naval.
Cavalry.
Artillery.
Engineer.
Torpedo and Signal Corps.
Rifles.
5. Relative precedence is determined by the date on which the Governor in Council has accepted the services of corps.

RULES FOR CORPS WHEN NOT ON ACTUAL SERVICE.

6. Rules proposed by a Volunteer Corps for the management of its affairs must be recommended by the officer commanding the force to the Governor in Council before approval.

MODEL RULES.

7. A model set of rules may be obtained for the guidance of corps, but the Governor in Council will not object to consider rules drawn up in a different manner, which may be duly submitted for approval by the officer commanding the force.

VOLUNTEERS SUBJECT TO REGULATIONS.

8. Volunteer Corps raised under the Volunteer Statute are subject to the provisions of the Act, and to all regulations made under it by the authority of the Governor in Council.

ESTABLISHMENT.

9. The establishment of every Volunteer Corps is to be as ordered from time to time by the officer commanding the force.

CORPS FORMED OF DETACHMENTS.

10. When corps are composed of detachments of men organized in different localities, or stationed on board vessels, such detachments shall be considered as separate corps for the purposes of the Volunteer Statute, and their services are accepted as such by the Governor in Council; but when mustered together, such detachments shall serve in the corps of which they form part. The officer commanding the force will determine such cases where this order is to apply, and will publish the same in brigade orders. He will also determine the number of effectives which each detachment must furnish, and the number of men in each detachment who must be present to constitute a parade or drill.

AGE.

11. No person below the age of seventeen is to be enrolled in a Volunteer Corps without special authority.

BOYS.

12. Boys may, if the authority of the officer commanding the Volunteer Force be first obtained, be enrolled for the purpose of being trained as buglers or trumpeters, but may not class as effectives.

APPRENTICES.

13. Apprentices are not to be enrolled without the consent of their masters.

VOLUNTEERS DISMISSED NOT TO BE ENROLLED WITHOUT SPECIAL SANCTION.

14. Persons whose services have been dispensed with, or who have been discharged from the Local Forces, are not in any case to be enrolled in another corps without the special sanction of the officer commanding the force.

VOLUNTEERS NOT TO BE ENROLLED IN TWO CORPS.

15. No member of a Volunteer Corps is to be enrolled in another corps until he has legally ceased to be a member of the former corps.

RECRUITS.

16. Recruits, before enrolment, shall take oath of allegiance, and shall attend such drills as the officer commanding the force

may direct, and shall pass in squad drill and the manual and firing exercises, unless he shall, at some previous time, have been in the army or a member of the Volunteer Force, in which case it shall be sufficient to attend such drills as the commanding officer of the corps may order, and to pass inspection.

CLASSIFICATION.

17. Enrolled members are classed as effectives or non-effectives.
18. In order to be reckoned as effective, an enrolled member must have fulfilled the conditions prescribed in the Orders in Council.

NON-EFFECTIVES.

19. All enrolled members who do not fulfil the conditions above referred to are reckoned as non-effectives.

SUPERNUMERARIES.

20. Supernumerary members are members enrolled beyond the establishment of a corps. They may be enrolled by special authority from the officer commanding the force.

DEFINITION OF EFFECTIVES.

21. At the commencement of any year the following volunteers, and no others, will be classed as effectives of the force, unless by special authority from the officer commanding the force:—

Cavalry.

- (a) Any volunteer who was enrolled before the 1st of October of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—
 - (1) Attended twelve mounted parades, one of which shall be an official inspection.
 - (2) Attended twelve other, either mounted or dismounted parades, or both.
- (b) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st October and 31st December of the year next preceding, and has during that year—
 - (1) Attended nine mounted parades, one of which shall be an official inspection.
 - (2) Attended nine other, either mounted or dismounted parades, or both.
- (c) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st January and 31st March of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—
 - (1) Attended six mounted parades, one of which shall be an official inspection.
 - (2) Attended six other, either mounted or dismounted parades, or both.

22. No mounted parades will count towards classification at which less than fifteen members shall have been present, and no other parades or drills will count at which less than ten members shall have been present.

23. Every troop shall parade for inspection three times in each year, on such days and at such hours as shall be appointed by the officer in command of the force.

24. No troop will be allowed to return more than thirty effectives, unless when a troop has horsed a gun at its own expense, when twelve extra effectives will be allowed. Any members in excess of this number are to be considered as supernumerary.

Artillery.—Field Batteries.

- (a) Any volunteer who was enrolled before the 1st October of the year next preceding, and who has gone through a course of musketry instruction for that year, and has also during that year—
 - (1) Attended two full battery parades of not less than six (6) guns fully manned.
 - (2) Attended and passed two parades for official inspection with guns.
 - (3) Attended thirteen other parades.
 - (4) Attended seven other, either parades or drills.
- (b) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st October and 31st December of the year next preceding, and has during that year—
 - (1) Attended two full battery parades of not less than six (6) guns fully manned.
 - (2) Attended and passed two parades for official inspection with guns.
 - (3) Attended nine other parades.
 - (4) Attended five other, either parades or drills.
- (c) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st January and 31st March of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—
 - (1) Attended one full battery parade of not less than six (6) guns fully manned.
 - (2) Attended and passed one parade for official inspection with guns.
 - (3) Attended seven other parades.
 - (4) Attended three, either parades or drills.

Artillery.—Garrison Batteries.

- (a) Any volunteer who was enrolled before the 1st October of the year next preceding, and who has gone through a

course of musketry instruction for that year, and has also during that year—

- (1.) Attended two battalion parades, or two full battery parades of not less than six (6) guns fully manned.
 - (2.) Attended and passed two parades for official inspection.
 - (3.) Attended thirteen other parades.
 - (4.) Attended seven others, either parades or drills.
- (b.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st October and 31st December of the year next preceding, and has during that year—
- (1.) Attended two battalion parades, or two full battery parades of not less than six (6) guns fully manned.
 - (2.) Attended and passed two parades for official inspection.
 - (3.) Attended nine other parades.
 - (4.) Attended five other, either parades or drills.
- (c.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st January and 31st March of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—
- (1.) Attended one battalion parade, or one full battery parade of not less than six (6) guns fully manned.
 - (2.) Attended and passed at one parade for official inspection.
 - (3.) Attended seven other parades.
 - (4.) Attended three other, either parades or drills.

Rifles.

- (a.) Any volunteer who was enrolled before the 1st October of the year next preceding, and who has gone through a course of musketry instruction for that year, and has also during that year—
- (1.) Attended two battalion parades.
 - (2.) Attended and passed two parades for official inspection.
 - (3.) Attended thirteen other parades.
 - (4.) Attended seven other, either parades or drills.
- (b.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st October and 31st December of the year next preceding, and has during that year—
- (1.) Attended two battalion parades.
 - (2.) Attended and passed two parades for official inspection.
 - (3.) Attended nine other parades.
 - (4.) Attended five other, either parades or drills.
- (c.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st January and 31st March of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—
- (1.) Attended one battalion parade.
 - (2.) Attended and passed at one parade for official inspection.
 - (3.) Attended seven other parades.
 - (4.) Attended three other, either parades or drills.

DEFINITION OF PARADES, DRILLS, ETC., FOR ARTILLERY AND RIFLES.

25. In the definition of an effective, a parade shall mean an assembly of a corps under arms in the open air, whereat not less than forty members are present for three-quarters of an hour at least. Should the corps, having assembled in sufficient numbers, be dismissed from inclement weather, before the three-quarters of an hour be passed, the officer commanding the force may allow the parade to be returned.

26. A drill shall mean any assembly of a corps for drill whereat not less than twenty members are present. Officers commanding corps may not return in any month more than four parades and four drills ordered by themselves.

27. For the purposes of battalion drill or inspection, the officer commanding the force may order other parades of corps in addition to the four specified in the preceding regulation, which may be returned by officers commanding corps.

28. A battalion parade shall mean an assemblage of two or more corps under the conditions of the regulations defining a parade.

Engineer Volunteers.

- (a.) Any volunteer who was enrolled before the 1st October of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—
- (1.) Attended two battalion parades.
 - (2.) Attended nine parades of the corps.
 - (3.) Attended and passed an official inspection.
 - (4.) Passed an official inspection in some branch of military engineering.
 - (5.) Attended eighteen musters of the corps for exercise and instruction, of which ten at least were for engineering instruction.
 - (6.) Gone through a course of musketry instruction.
- (b.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st October and 31st December of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—
- (1.) Attended two battalion parades.
 - (2.) Attended and passed an official inspection.

(3.) Passed an official inspection in some branch of military engineering.

(4.) Attended six parades of the corps.

(5.) Attended twelve musters of the corps for exercise and instruction, of which seven at least were for engineering instruction.

(c.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st January and 31st March of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—

(1.) Attended one battalion parade.

(2.) Attended and passed one parade for official inspection.

(3.) Attended five parades of the corps.

(4.) Attended nine musters of the corps for exercise and instruction, of which five at least were for engineering instruction.

ENGINEER RECRUITS.

29. No person shall be enrolled as a member of the Engineers unless he shall have been educated as an architect, surveyor, civil, mechanical, or mining engineer, or as an assistant to one or other of them, or be a skilled mechanic, or shall have served in the corps of Royal Engineers.

ENGINEER PARADES.

30. A parade shall mean an assembly of the corps under arms in the open air, for instruction in the field exercises and evolutions of infantry, at which twenty at least are present.

TORPEDO AND SIGNAL CORPS.

31. Professional men serving in this corps on the 30th June in each year, approved by the commandant, may classify as effectives on the 1st July, provided the number of effectives does not exceed thirty.

EFFECTIVES—STAFF, UNATTACHED, AND MEDICAL.

32. Officers and others serving in the force, but not attached to any particular corps, may classify as effectives should they have performed the duties required of them during the year.

33. Medical officers may classify as effectives, on having afforded such professional assistance as has been required of them during the year.

PENALTIES FOR NON-EFFECTIVES.

34. Any officer who does not qualify as an effective will not be allowed to retain his commission, unless it should be represented by the officer commanding the force that there are special reasons for a relaxation of this regulation.

35. Any non-commissioned officer who does not qualify as an effective will not be allowed to retain his grade, unless it shall appear to the officer commanding the force that there are special reasons for the relaxation of this regulation.

36. All privates not being effective, or absent without leave, are liable to be struck off the strength of their corps by the officer commanding the force, at the recommendation of their commanding officer.

ITEMS OF AUTHORIZED EXPENDITURE.

37. At the commencement of each year commanding officers will be credited for each effective member the sum granted by Parliament, to be expended by the said commanding officers, on behalf of their corps, on the following items:—

- Orderly room.
- Drill shed, or Drill ground.
- Magazine, or Armoury.
- Care and repair of arms.
- Ranges.
- Clothing and accoutrements.
- Cost of conveyance of men and guns to or from drill, field days, or reviews, and gun or rifle practice.
- Store rooms.
- Gun sheds.
- Expenses incidental to target practice, and prizes.
- Articles for repository exercises.
- Repair of expense magazines.
- Repairs of platforms, &c.
- Cost of all supplies received from military stores on repayment, or any other expenditure authorized by the officer commanding the force.

DISBANDMENT FOR NON-EFFECTIVENESS.

38. In the event of any corps or detachment failing to be entitled to the effective allowance for 50 per cent. of its maximum establishment, such corps or detachment shall be disbanded.

PAYMENT FOR SUPPLIES.

39. The sums due to the Government for supplies of cloth, ammunition, and other stores, and for repairs of arms, &c., will take precedence of other claims to be paid out of the effective grant.

RESPONSIBILITY OF OFFICERS FOR GOVERNMENT FUNDS.

40. Commanding officers are responsible to Government for the due custody and expenditure of the effective allowance grant, the whole or no portion of which is to pass from their control or be expended except by their direction. The Government grant

shall be kept as a special bank-account, and all books and accounts connected with the expenditure thereof shall be produced, when required, to inspecting officers, or such other persons as the officer commanding the force may direct. On the 1st of July in each year an audited balance-sheet of the past year's receipts and expenditure, signed by the commanding officer, and countersigned by one officer and non-commissioned officer, must be forwarded to head-quarters, before the annual grant, or any portion thereof, shall be issued.

COMMISSIONS.

41. The officers of the Volunteer Force are commissioned by the Governor.

PRECEDENCE OF OFFICERS WITH THOSE OF OTHER FORCES.

42. Officers of the Volunteer Force rank with officers of Her Majesty's regular and militia forces and officers serving regularly under the Discipline Act as juniors of their respective ranks, and rank with officers of the yeomanry force and officers occasionally serving under the Discipline Act according to the rank and date of their respective commissions in the respective forces.

SUBMISSION AND APPROVAL OF APPOINTMENTS AND PROMOTIONS.

43. All proposed appointments and promotions of officers are submitted for the approval of the Governor in Council by the officer commanding the force.

SUBMISSION AND ACCEPTANCE OF RESIGNATIONS.

44. All proposed resignations of officers are submitted for the acceptance of the Governor in Council by the officer commanding the force.

NOTIFICATION OF APPOINTMENT, ETC., IN THE "GAZETTE."

45. The appointments, promotions, and resignations of commissioned officers are inserted in the *Gazette*.

46. Such notification is to be framed strictly in the terms conveying the Governor's approval or acceptance of the appointment, promotion, or resignation concerned.

PRECEDENCE OF OFFICERS OF DIFFERENT CORPS HAVING COMMISSIONS OF SAME RANK AND DATE.

47. The relative precedence of officers holding commissions of the same rank and date is determined by date of previous commissions, and where there are none, by the order in the *Government Gazette* of appointment, which, unless the officer commanding the force otherwise directs, will be in accordance with classification in examinations.

BREVET RANK.

48. Officers having brevet rank are to do duty in camp and garrison in accordance with the rank so held, but they perform all corps duty according to their corps rank.

UNATTACHED LIST.

49. Any officer may, for past good service, without quitting the force, be placed on an unattached list.

50. The services of unattached officers are at all times to be at the disposal of the officer commanding the force.

51. Unattached officers will wear the uniform of the branch of the service to which they belong, without the number or badge of any particular corps.

52. Unattached officers are not to perform any military duty unless specially directed.

CAPTAIN COMMANDANT.

53. When a corps is under the command of a captain, he is allowed, on the recommendation of the officer commanding the force, to bear the designation of "captain commandant." This title does not confer any additional rank, and no separate commission is to be issued on account of it.

HONORARY CHAPLAINS.

54. The appointment of honorary chaplains is allowed on the recommendation of the officer commanding the force.

PRECEDENCE OF MEDICAL OFFICERS.

55. The relative precedence of medical officers in the Volunteer Force is regulated by the same rule as that prescribed for medical officers of the army.

56. No nomination for promotions made under clause 6 of the Volunteer Statute 1865 will be confirmed unless the candidates for promotion so nominated shall, previous to nomination, have passed an examination to be prescribed by the officer commanding the force.

57. The Board of Examiners will be appointed by the Governor in Council before each examination.

ACTING APPOINTMENTS.

58. Acting appointments, as officers and non-commissioned officers, may be given by the officer commanding the force; and persons holding such appointments shall exercise the same authority as though they were permanently appointed.

59. All commands belong to the senior combatant officer present, irrespective of the branch of the service to which he belongs. When corps or portions of corps are united, whether in camp, garrison, or quarters, the senior combatant officer, either by brevet or otherwise, is to command the whole.

60. For the purposes of the Volunteer Statute the commanding officer of a corps shall mean the senior combatant officer at the time doing duty with such corps.

61. The officer appointed by the Governor in Council to command the force is authorized by the Governor in Council to issue, from time to time, orders for the general government, discipline, management of such force, and the formation of corps into brigades, regiments, or battalions, provided that such orders shall not be *ultra vires* of the Volunteer Statute or the regulations made thereunder by the Governor in Council.

STAFF.

62. For the general government, discipline, and management of the Volunteer Force and the several corps thereof, His Excellency the Governor in Council constitutes a staff, which shall consist of—

(1.) General staff.

(2.) Volunteer staff.

63. Such staff shall be composed of persons belonging to any Naval and Military Force in the service of the local Government of Victoria.

64. The orders given by staff officers are to be obeyed with the same readiness as if delivered personally by the officer to whom such staff officers are attached.

APPOINTMENTS TO AND REMOVAL FROM STAFF.

65. All appointments to and removals from the Volunteer staff shall be made from time to time by the officer commanding the forces in general orders, and their duties shall be such as he may from time to time direct and define. Provided always that any officer so appointed shall hold a commission in the Volunteer Force generally, and not in any particular corps; and the cancelling of any such staff appointment shall in no wise affect such commission.

STAFF OFFICERS NOT TO TAKE COMMAND.

66. Except for the purpose of instruction, no staff officer is entitled, by virtue of his superior rank, to take the command of any single corps of volunteers; but this rule is not to apply to cases where different arms are brought together, or to such cases as the officer commanding the force may otherwise direct.

67. Non-commissioned officers and privates serving under the Discipline Act may be appointed to the staff, and attached to corps as instructors, or for other duty.

INSTRUCTORS NOT TO TAKE COMMAND.

68. Instructors of the rank of non-commissioned officers rank with Volunteer non-commissioned officers in the different grades, according to the date in their appointment in the force, but are not to take command of any portion of the force except for purposes of instruction; such orders as they may convey when attached to corps will always be by direction of the senior officer present with the corps.

DUTIES OF INSTRUCTORS.

69. The principal duty of an instructor is to attend to the drill and instruction and returns of the corps to which he is posted; but he may also, at the discretion of the commanding officer, be intrusted with the custody of the arms of the corps, or charged with such other military duties as usually devolve on a non-commissioned officer.

70. An instructor is not to be employed in holding or disbursing the funds of the corps to which he is attached.

OFFENCES OF INSTRUCTORS.

71. In the event of a non-commissioned officer or private of the staff attached to a corps being guilty of any offence of a grave nature, the officer commanding the corps will report the circumstances forthwith to head-quarters, and will place the non-commissioned officer or private in arrest, as defined in clause 78, and await orders as to his disposal.

SUPERVISION OVER INSTRUCTORS.

72. All non-commissioned officers and privates of the staff attached to corps are to be considered as under the supervision of the officer commanding the corps, and any irregularity of conduct, incompetence, or want of attention which such commanding officer may observe on the part of such non-commissioned officer or private shall be reported by him to head-quarters without delay.

INVASION AND MUTINY ACT.

73. In case of actual or apprehended invasion of any part of Victoria, Volunteer Corps may be assembled for actual military service; and whenever they are so assembled they will be liable to serve under the Mutiny Act in any part of Victoria.

AS TO RELEASE OF CORPS FROM ACTUAL MILITARY SERVICE.

74. After a Volunteer Corps has been called out for actual military service, the corps shall be deemed released from actual military service only by an order in writing, signed by the Governor in Council, and addressed and delivered through the officer commanding the force to the commanding officer of the corps; which order shall issue upon and as soon as may be after a proclamation of the Governor in Council declaring the occasion to have passed, and not sooner otherwise.

75. Before a Volunteer Corps is released from actual military service, the corps shall be returned to the locality to which it belongs.

AS TO DISCIPLINE OF VOLUNTEERS WHILE NOT ON ACTUAL MILITARY SERVICE.

76. With respect to the discipline of officers and volunteers, the following provisions shall take effect and be in force while they are not on actual military service:—

The commanding officer of a Volunteer Corps will recommend that the services of any volunteer be dispensed with for neglect of duty, or absence without leave; such volunteer shall, nevertheless, deliver up in good order, fair wear and tear only excepted, all arms, clothing, and appointments, being public property, or property of his corps, issued to him; and to pay all money due or becoming due by him, under the rules of his corps. But nothing herein shall prevent the Governor in Council from signifying his pleasure in such manner, and giving such directions with respect to any such cases, as to the Governor may appear just and proper.

If any such officer as aforesaid or any volunteer, while under arms or on march or duty with the corps to which he belongs, or any portion of the Volunteer Force—or while engaged in any military exercise or drill, or brigade or battalion formed for military purposes, either in uniform or plain clothes—or while wearing the clothing or accoutrements of any corps or regiment; and going to or returning from any place of exercise or assembly of such corps or regiment; disobeys any lawful order of any officer under whose command he then is, or is guilty of misconduct, the officer then in command, or any superior officer, may order the offender, if an officer, into arrest; and if not an officer, into the custody of any volunteer or of any non-commissioned officer of the staff—but so that the offender be not kept in such arrest or custody longer than during the time of the corps or regiment, or such portion of the Volunteer Force as aforesaid, then remaining under arms, or on march or duty, or assembled, or continuing engaged in any such military exercise or drill, as aforesaid.

77. Any volunteer may, for any offence against good order and discipline, be placed under arrest by his superior officer.

78. Arrest shall signify a suspension from all military duty; and members placed in arrest shall deliver up their arms and accoutrements and uniform to such person as the officer commanding the corps may direct.

COMMAND OF VOLUNTEERS AT RIFLE SHOOTING MATCHES, ETC.

79. When volunteers belonging to one or more corps are brought together under arms at rifle shooting matches, or on other occasions, either in or out of uniform, the senior officer present is to be considered, as in command of all the volunteers upon the ground; and although his position in this respect does not involve any authority for his interference in the arrangements of the meeting, yet he is held responsible for the due maintenance of order and discipline among the volunteers present.

CORPS NOT TO QUIT DISTRICTS.

80. A Volunteer Corps is not to quit, as a military body, the district to which it belongs, unless it have previously obtained the sanction, either special or general, of the officer commanding the district.

ASSEMBLY FOR ANY PURPOSE UNCONNECTED WITH MILITARY PARADE, ETC.

81. Volunteer Corps are not to assemble under arms for any purpose unconnected with military parade, drill, or rifle practice, except with the approval of the officer commanding the force.

COURTS OF INQUIRY.

Power to constitute courts.

82. The officer commanding the force may from time to time appoint three or five persons, being commissioned officers of the force, to be a court of inquiry to hear and determine all offences committed against the Volunteer Statute or the regulations made in pursuance thereof, and shall appoint one of the persons aforesaid to be president of such court. And the procedure of such court and all matters connected therewith shall be regulated by the rules made hereunder.

Power to take evidence and punish for contempt.

83. Every such court may hear, receive, and examine evidence, and shall have the same power of adjournment as a court of petty sessions has.

Proceedings at court—Right of challenge.

84. In all trials by such court, as soon as the president and other members appointed to serve thereon are assembled, their names shall be read over in the hearing of the accused, who shall thereupon be asked if he objects to be tried by the presi-

dent or by any of such members; and if the accused shall then object to the president, such objection, unless disallowed by a majority of the members so appointed to form the court, shall be referred to the decision of the authority by whom such president shall have been appointed; but if he object to any member other than the president, such objection shall be decided by the president and other members so appointed; and when the place of the president or other members in respect of whom any challenge shall have been made and allowed, shall be supplied by some member in respect of whom no challenge shall have been made or allowed; or if no challenge shall have been made, or if made not allowed, the declaration hereafter prescribed shall be administered by the president to the other members, and afterwards by any member who has himself made such declaration to the president.

Oath to be taken.

85. The president of every such court shall cause every witness or other person who shall be examined before such court in any matter relating to any proceeding before the same to take the declaration hereinafter prescribed:

Finding and recommendation.

86. Every such court shall report to the officer commanding the force, and in such report shall state whether in the opinion of such court the accused is guilty or not guilty of the charge or charges preferred against him, and make a recommendation as to the course to be followed towards the accused.

Forwarding proceedings.

87. When any such court has, by a majority of its members, decided upon and reduced to writing its report, the proceedings, drawn up in writing and signed by the president of such court, shall thereupon be forwarded to the officer commanding the force.

88. If in the opinion of the officer commanding the force such report is informal, or the recommendation contained therein not according to law or evidence, such officer may on receipt thereof, once and no more, remit such proceedings to the president of the court, with a memorandum attached stating in what respects such a report is in the opinion of such officer informal or erroneous; and thereupon such court shall reassemble, and reconsider its report, and may either amend or adhere to the same as to such court shall seem fit; and an amended report, or memorandum to the effect that such court, after reconsideration adheres to its original report, having been reduced to writing, and signed by the president shall be attached by him to the proceedings, and such proceedings again forwarded to the officer commanding the force.

89. The officer commanding the force, in case he shall not see fit to remit any such report as aforesaid for the reconsideration of the court on the receipt of the proceedings of the court, and in case he shall remit such report as aforesaid, on receipt of such proceedings with such amended report or memorandum attached, shall forward the same for the consideration of the Governor in Council, with his opinion as to the report or amended report, as the case may be.

90. Whenever it is intended to bring any volunteer serving under the Act to trial before any such court he shall receive notice thereof in writing from his superior officer, and if such person do not appear before the court he shall be deemed to have waived his right of challenge; and the proceedings shall be carried on as if the accused were present.

91. In all cases in which the same court tries more offenders than one, and they are arraigned upon separate and distinct charges, the members of the court shall make fresh declarations at the commencement of each trial, and the proceedings shall be made up separately and signed, as if each offender had been tried by a court composed of different members.

Declaration to be taken by members of a court.

92. I, A. B., do declare upon my honor that I will well and truly try and determine, according to the evidence in the matter now before me, and will duly administer justice according to the Acts in force in Victoria relating to the Volunteer Force and the regulations and orders thereunder, without partiality, favor, or affection, and if any doubt shall arise which is not explained by the said rules and regulations, or by the said Acts, then according to my conscience and the best of my understanding. And I will not divulge the report of the court, neither will I upon any account at any time whatsoever disclose or discover the vote or opinion of any particular member of the court, unless required to give evidence thereof as a witness by a court of justice in due course of law.

Declaration to be taken by a witness.

93. I, A. B., do declare upon my honor that the evidence which I shall give before this court will be the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth.

NATIONAL AGRICULTURAL EXHIBITION.

2nd. Having completed the first year of the course for the certificate of engineer in the Melbourne University. His age at time of entry must not exceed 23 years.

3rd. Having matriculated at the Melbourne or other recognized University; after passing in Algebra, Euclid, and Arithmetic; or passed the Civil Service Examination, including the subjects above-named; or produce such a certificate of competency in such subjects from the Board of Education of Victoria as shall satisfy this Department. His age at time of application must not exceed 22 years, nor be less than 16 years.

PERIOD OF SERVICE.

1st. An applicant of the first class will be required to pass six months in the offices of the Lands Department as a draftsman, and one year in the field under the direction of a departmental surveyor.

2nd. An applicant of the second class will be required to pass nine months in the offices of the Lands Department, and two years in the field under the direction of a departmental surveyor.

3rd. An applicant of the third class will have first to pass a probationary period of three (3) months in the offices of the Lands and Survey Department, after which period, if his progress is considered satisfactory, he will remain in the offices of the department as a draftsman for one year and nine months, when he will be examined in trigonometric computation by logarithms, including computation of areas and reduction of traverse surveys, plotting from field-book, plan drawing, including feature delineation; and, if he pass satisfactorily, will be required to spend two years in the field under the direction of a departmental surveyor.

Should the applicant of the third class consider himself competent to pass the above examination at the end of the first year, and his progress in plotting and mapping be considered satisfactory, he will be examined as before stated, and, if successful, he may pass into the field and serve three years under the direction of a departmental surveyor.

REMUNERATION.

1st. Applicants of the first class will be paid at the rate of £78 per annum during the period of six months passed in the offices of the department, and £91 during the year passed in the field.

2nd. Applicants of the second class will be paid at the rate of £52 during the nine months passed in the offices of the department, £65 for the first year in the field, and £91 during the last year in the field.

3rd. Applicants of the third class will not be remunerated for the first three months of probation, but during the remainder of the period spent in the offices (one year and nine months) will be paid at the rate of £52 per annum. The salary during the first year in the field will be £65, during the second £91. In the case of an applicant in this class passing the specified examination at the end of the first year, he will be paid during the first and second years in the field at the rate of £65 per annum, and for the third year in the field £91.

To obtain certificate of competency as a qualified surveyor it will be required of the candidate, after the end of the term spent in the field, that he pass two months in the Melbourne Observatory to acquire a knowledge of such branches of practical astronomy as are necessary in the duties he would be called on to perform as a departmental surveyor. He will also be required to make a traverse and topographical survey of a portion of land to be shown him; to establish the true meridian by transit observation from which meridian the bearings of his survey will be reckoned; to level over a line to be pointed out to him, and to make a subdivision also as pointed out. Then to produce plan showing construction lines, subdivision section line topographical features with areas and dimensions of subdivision, accompanied by regulation field-book of survey, and the various computations.

To obtain a certificate as qualified draftsman the applicant of the third class would have to pass the first two years as before specified; then six months in the field, the latter period at a salary of £52 per annum, and afterwards pass an examination in trigonometric computation by logarithms including areas and reduction of traverses, plotting from field-books, and their construction including feature delineation.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

The deaths in February were fewer than those in January by 51. They exceeded the average of the month in the ten previous years by 108. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, the excess over the average of February will be reduced to 38.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 101° on the 14th, and the lowest was 44° on the 10th. The mean temperature of the month (64.6°) was nearly a degree below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (41°) took place on the 14th, viz., from a maximum of 101° to a minimum of 60°. The least range (11.6°) was on the 24th, viz., from a maximum of 69.6° to a minimum of 58°. The mean daily range was 24.12°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.910 inches) was a fraction above the average.

Males and females died during the month in nearly equal proportions, the numbers being respectively 240 and 243. Fifty-four per cent. of the deaths were of children who had not attained their fifth year as against 53 per cent. in February 1873; 56 per cent. in February 1872; 65 per cent. in February 1871; 55 per cent. in February 1870; 60 per cent. in February 1869; 57 per cent. in February 1868; 74 per cent. in February 1867; 58 per cent. in February 1866; 64 per cent. in February 1865; and 62 per cent. in February 1864.

Five persons of 75 years of age and upwards died during the month, viz.:—A male aged 76 of dropsy, a male aged 76 of cancer of the pylorus, a female aged 75 of apoplexy, a female aged 78 of brain disease, and a female aged 85 of old age.

Eighteen violent deaths occurred during the month, of which 14 were set down to accident, 1 to homicide, and 3 to suicide. Of the accidental deaths, that of a blacksmith aged 28 was caused by injuries resulting from a kick of a horse; that of a miner aged 33 was caused by injuries received by the falling of a stone in a drive; that of a railway porter aged 34 resulted from his being crushed between two buffers; that of a storeman aged 41 resulted from his being struck by a lift; that of a tanner aged 56 resulted from injuries received from a steam-engine; that of a female aged 40 resulted from rupture of the liver, caused by a fall whilst drunk; that of a male infant aged 9 months resulted from a burn caused by his left in bed with a candle near him; that of a male infant aged 14 resulted from drowning in a boiler; that of a brewer aged 56 resulted from drowning whilst bathing; those of a ship carpenter aged 25 and of a mariner aged 33 resulted from drowning, supposed to be accidental; that of a male infant aged 15 minutes resulted from suffocation owing to pressure of the *funis* during birth, that of a male infant aged 5 months resulted from suffocation by overlying, that of a boy aged 7 resulted from suffocation in a manner not stated, a merchant aged 44 died of rupture of the liver and other injuries resulting from an explosion (verdict "wilful murder"), a housepainter aged 35 committed suicide by shooting, a musician aged 29 by stabbing himself in the belly, and a joiner aged 52 by cutting his throat.

Eighty-five deaths, or nearly 18 per cent. of the whole, occurred in public institutions, viz.:—54 in the Melbourne Hospital; 5 in the Alfred Hospital; 1 in the Lytton Hospital; 4 in the Benevolent Asylum; 9 in the Immigrants' Home; 1 in the Industrial Schools, 4 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum; 5 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, and 2 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 262, of which 125, or 48 per cent., were of males, and 137, or 52 per cent. were of females. Of those who died, 187 were under one year of age, 60 were between one and two, 7 were between two and three, 3 were between three and four, and 5 were between four and five.

The persons dying at more advanced ages than five years numbered 221. Of these 115, or 52 per cent., were males, and 106, or 48 per cent., were females; 17 were between five and ten, 9 were between ten and fifteen, 9 were between fifteen and twenty, 12 were between twenty and twenty-five, 15 were between twenty-five and thirty, 24 were between thirty and thirty-five, 20 were between thirty-five and forty, 27 were between forty and forty-five, 16 were between forty-five and fifty, 25 were between fifty and fifty-five, 18 were between fifty-five and sixty, 10 were between sixty and sixty-five, 6 were between sixty-five and seventy, 8 were between seventy and seventy-five, 4 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 1 was upwards of eighty.

SHIRE OF DANDENONG.

BYE-LAW No. 1, TO PROVIDE FOR CONDUCTING THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL.

BYE-LAW OF THE COUNCIL OF THE SHIRE OF DANDENONG, MADE UNDER AND IN PURSUANCE OF THE 187TH SECTION OF THE "SHIRES STATUTE."

THE Council of the Shire of Dandenong ordain as follows, that is to say:—

1st. The minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed shall be read first at all meetings, in order that they may be confirmed, and no discussion shall be allowed regarding them, unless as to their accuracy, and all correspondence not previously submitted to the council. Reports ordered to be brought up by the secretary or any officer, or by any councillor or sub-committee of the council, and petitions to be presented to the council, shall take precedence in the order named of the regular business of each meeting.

2nd. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings, and no councillor can bring any motion before the council having for its object the expenditure of a sum of money exceeding £25 without having given notice of it in writing at the previous meeting, and all motions of which such notice has been given shall be considered in the order in which they appear in the notice book.

3rd. Any councillor bringing forward a motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken to it except by way of explanation or reply, but no councillor merely seconding a motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken thereon.

4th. One amendment only shall be discussed at a time, and, if lost, another may be moved before the original motion is put from the chair; but if any amendment be carried, it shall be looked upon as the original motion, and it shall be competent to move thereon one other amendment, but not more.

5th. No motion or amendment shall be entertained by the council until the same be seconded, and no motion or amendment once brought forward shall be withdrawn without the leave of the council.

6th. Any councillor desirous of proposing a motion or amendment, or of discussing any matter under consideration, must rise and address the president; and no councillor shall address the council for more than ten minutes on any motion or amendment, and shall not be interrupted, unless he may be called to order, when he shall cease speaking until the question of order shall be disposed of.

7th. The president shall put each question first in the affirmative and then in the negative, and shall decide then and there which has the majority. Any councillor demanding a division, the same shall be taken.

8th. The ruling of the president shall be final on all points, and shall be given without argument or comment, except by way of citing precedent; and if two or more councillors rise to speak at the same time the president shall decide which has the first claim.

9th. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council; but if, on the motion being put, the motion for adjournment be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, or any other that may be allowed precedence by the president, shall

be discussed before any subsequent motion for adjournment be entertained, and if the motion for adjournment be carried then the business undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the council.

10th. Any councillor or councillors may protest respectfully against any resolution of the council, provided that at the time such resolution is passed the councillor or councillors so protesting shall give the secretary a written notice signed by him or them, stating the reasons for protesting, and the secretary shall notice the protest in the minutes of the council.

11th. Any councillor presenting a petition or other document shall be responsible for the propriety of its construction, and each councillor addressing the council shall do so in respectful and temperate language.

12th. Any councillor using language deemed by the council to be offensive to any other member of the council shall withdraw the same, and apologise therefor. Should the councillor so offending decline to withdraw the objectionable language, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

13th. It shall be competent for a majority of the council in session to suspend during the discussion of any subject any standing order herein contained, except the purpose of such suspension be the rescinding of any motion previously adopted by the council.


