TREATY OF COMMERCE AND NAVIGATION WITH FRANCE.

THE subjoined Despatch and Treaty of Commerce and Navigation with France are published for general information.

SIR,—I transmit to you for general information in the colony under your Government, a copy of the Treaty of the 23rd July 1873, and of the Supplementary Convention of the 24th January 1874, between Great Britain and France, relative to matters of Commerce and Navigation.

TREATY OF COMMERCE AND NAVIGATION BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND FRANCE.

Signed at Versailles, July 23, 1873.

[Ratifications exchanged at Paris, August 4, 1873.]

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the President of the French Republic, being equally animated with the desire to draw closer the ties of friendship which unite the two countries, and of placing on a satisfactory footing the commercial and maritime relations between the two States, have, with this object, determined to conclude a Treaty of Commerce and Navigation, and they have accordingly appointed their respective Plenipotentiaries, that is to say:

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honorable Richard Bickerton Pemell Lord Lyons, a Peer of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, one of Her Britannic Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council and Her said Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the French Republic, &c., &c., &c.;

And the President of the French Republic, M. le Duc de Broglie, Minister for Foreign Affairs, Vice-President of the Council, Chevalier of the National Order of the Legion of Honor, &c., &c., &c.;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I.

The Treaty of Commerce concluded on the 23rd of January 1860, between the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and France, as also the Supplementary Conventions of the 12th of October and 16th of November of the same year, are again put in force in all their stipulations and in their full tenor, and shall continue to have effect as before the Act of Denunciation of the 15th of March 1872.

The High Contracting Parties guarantee to each other reciprocally, as well in the United Kingdom as in France and Algeria, the treatment, in all respects, of the most favoured nation.

It is, therefore, understood that, in conformity with the stipulations of Article XIX. of the Treaty of Commerce, concluded on the 23rd of January 1860, and of Article V. of the Supplementary Convention of the 16th of November of the same year, each of the High Contracting parties engages to give the other, immediately and unconditionally, the benefit of every

Lesquels, après s'être communiqué leurs pleins pouvoirs, trouvés en bonne et due forme, sont convenus des Articles suivants:—

ARTICLE I.

Le Traité de Commerce conclu le 23 Janvier 1860, entre le Royaume Uni de la Grande Bretagne et d'Irlande et la France, ainsi que les Conventions Supplémentaires des 12 Octobre et 16 Novembre de la même année, sont, dans toutes leurs dispositions et teneur, remis en vigueur et continueront d'avoir leurs effets comme avant l'Acte de Dénonciation du 15 Mars 1872.

Les Hautes Parties Contractantes garantissent réciproquement, tant dans la Royaume Uni qu'en France et en Algérie, le traitement, sous tous les rapports, de la nation la plus favorisée.

Il est donc entendu, conformément aux dispositions de l'Article XIX. du Traité de Commerce conclu le 23 Janvier, 1860, ainsi que l'Article V. de la Convention Supplémentaire du 16 Novembre de la même année, que chacune des Hautes Parties Contractantes s'engage à faire profiter l'autre immédiatement et sans conditions de toute faveur ou immunité, de

favours or immunity, every privilege or reduction of Tariff in regard to the importation of merchandise, whether mentioned or not in the Treaty and Conventions of 1860, which have been or may be conceded by one of the High Contracting Parties to any foreign nation whatsoever, whether within or beyond Europe.

It is likewise understood that, in all that relates to transit, warehousing, exportation, re-exportation, local dues, brokerage, customs formalities, samples, designs for manufactures, and likewise in all matters relating to the exercise of commerce and industry, British subjects in France or in Algeria, and French in the United Kingdom, shall enjoy the treatment of the most favoured nation.

ARTICLE II.

British ships and their cargoes shall, in France and in Algeria, and French ships and their cargoes shall, in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, from whatever place arriving, and whatever may be the place of origin or destination of their cargoes, be treated in every respect as national ships and their cargoes.

The coasting trade, however, is excepted from the preceding stipulation, and remains subject to the respective laws of the two countries.

ARTICLE III.

The High Contracting Parties agree to settle by means of a Supplementary Convention, the ratifications of which shall be exchanged before the 31st of January 1874, such arrangements as may appear to them to be necessary in regard to Consular attributions, to transit and Customs regulations affecting entry of goods, expertise, samples, and any other matters of the like nature, and they agree, moreover, to substitute this Supplementary Convention for the stipulations about similar matters comprised in the Treaties and Conventions of 1860.

ARTICLE IV.

Mineral oils of British origin shall be admitted into France and Algeria from the 1st of January 1874, or sooner, if possible, at a Customs duty of 5 per cent., that is to say, at the rate of duty levied previously to the passing of the Law of the 8th of July 1871. It is, nevertheless, agreed that the said oils shall, in conformity with the stipulations of Article IX. of the Treaty of the 23rd of January 1860, again put into force by Article I. of the present Treaty, be likewise subject to the duty of 5 fr. or 8 fr. per 100 kilog. established on crude or refined oils by the Law of the 16th of September 1871, or that which may be hereafter levied on the like oils manufactured in France.

A Commission, consisting of one member on the part of each Government, shall meet at Paris immediately after the ratification of the present Treaty, in order to settle, as hereinafter directed, questions concerning duties levied in France on British mineral oils, as well as to consider and report on any other questions which the High Contracting Parties agree, or shall agree, to refer to it.

The benefit of the above provisions shall be extended to British mineral oils, to be supplied to persons in France under contracts entered into before the promulgation of the Law of the 8th of July 1871.

The Commission shall examine how far it would be possible to effect reimbursement of duties levied in excess of the duty of 5 per cent., and the tax of 5 fr. or 8 fr. per 100 kilog. above referred to, in the case of British mineral oils introduced into France since the promulgation of the Law of the 8th of July 1871, otherwise than in pursuance of contracts previously entered into.

In regard to the contracts above referred to, the settlement shall include indemnification for actions for breaches of contracts entered into before the enforcement of the Law of the 8th of July 1871.

The High Contracting Parties, before the exchange of the ratifications of the present Treaty, shall name some third person to act as Arbitrator in regard to any points in connection with the questions above referred to which relate to mineral oils and on which the Commissioners may themselves differ in opinion. The Commission shall refer any such points to the Arbitrator, whose decision shall be binding on the Commissioners, and shall be reported by them accordingly.

The High Contracting Parties shall forthwith carry out the decision come to by the Commission or by the Arbitrator.

ARTICLE V.

The present Treaty shall remain in force until the 30th of June 1877. In case neither of the two High Contracting Parties should have notified twelve months before the said date the intention of putting an end to it, it shall remain binding until the expiration of one year from the day on which either of the two High Contracting Parties shall have denounced it.

ARTICLE VI.

The President of the French Republic engages to apply to the National Assembly for the necessary authorization to ratify and give effect to the present Treaty immediately after its signature.

The ratifications shall be exchanged at Paris as soon as possible, and the Treaty shall immediately come into force.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the present Treaty, and have thereto affixed the seals of their arms.

Done in duplicate at Versailles, the 23rd day of July, in the year of our Lord 1873.

Il est également entendu que pour tout ce qui concerne le transit, l'entrepôt l'exportation, la ré-exportation les droits locaux, le courtage, les formalités de Douane, les échantillons, les dessins de fabrique, de même que pour tout ce qui a rapport à l'exercice du commerce et de l'industrie, les sujets Britanniques en France ou en Algérie, et les Français dans le Royaume Uni, jouiront du traitement de la nation la plus favorisée.

ARTICLE II.

Les navires Anglais et leur cargaison en France et en Algérie, et les navires Français et leur cargaison dans le Royaume Uni de la Grande Bretagne et d'Irlande, à leur arrivée d'un port quelconque et quel que soit le lieu d'origine ou de destination de leur cargaison, jouiront sous tous les rapports, du même traitement que les navires nationaux et leur cargaison.

Il est fait exception à la disposition qui précède pour le cabotage, dont le régime demeure soumis aux lois respectives des deux pays.

ARTICLE III.

Les Hautes Parties Contractantes conviennent d'établir, au moyen d'une Convention Supplémentaire dont les ratifications seront échangées avant le 31 Janvier 1874, les dispositions qui leur paraîtront nécessaires au sujet des attributions Consulaires, ainsi que du transit et des règlements de Douane relatifs à l'entrée des marchandises, à l'expertise, aux échantillons, et à toute autre matière analogue. Elles conviennent en outre de substituer cette Convention Supplémentaire aux dispositions en pareille matière comprises dans les Traités et Conventions de 1860.

ARTICLE IV.

A partir du 1 Janvier 1874, ou plus tôt si faire se peut, les huiles minérales d'origine Britannique seront admises en France et en Algérie, au droit de Douane de 5 pour cent, c'est-à-dire au taux du droit en vigueur avant la Loi du 8 Juillet 1871. Il demeure cependant convenu que les dites huiles devront, conformément aux dispositions de l'Article IX. du Traité du 23 Janvier 1860, remis en vigueur par l'Article I. du présent Traité, acquitter en outre les droits de 5 ou 8 fr. par 100 kilog. établis sur les huiles brutes ou raffinées par la Loi du 16 Septembre 1871, ou ceux qui seraient ultérieurement établis sur les mêmes huiles fabriquées en France.

Une Commission, qui sera composée d'un membre nommé par chaque Gouvernement, se réunira à Paris immédiatement après la ratification du présent Traité, pour régler de la manière ci-dessous prévue les questions relatives aux droits perçus sur les huiles minérales d'origine Britannique; et en même temps pour examiner toute autre question que les Hautes Parties Contractantes conviennent ou conviendront de lui soumettre, et en faire l'objet d'un rapport.

Le bénéfice des dispositions précédentes sera étendu aux huiles minérales d'origine Britannique, ayant fait l'objet de marchés pour la livraison des dites huiles en France avant la promulgation de la Loi du 8 Juillet 1871.

La Commission examinera dans quelle mesure il sera possible d'effectuer le remboursement des droits perçus en plus du droit de 5 pour cent et de la taxe de 5 ou 8 fr. par 100 kilog. ci-dessus indiquée, dans le cas où des huiles minérales d'origine Britannique auraient été introduites en France depuis promulgation de la Loi du 8 Juillet 1871, autrement que pour l'exécution de contrats préalablement passés.

En ce qui concerne les contrats ci-dessus visés, le règlement comprendra une indemnité des poursuites exercées pour défaut d'exécution des contrats passés avant l'application de la Loi du 8 Juillet 1871.

Les Hautes Parties Contractantes, avant l'échange des ratifications du présent Traité, nommeront une tierce personne destinée à intervenir comme Arbitre sur toute matière en rapport avec les questions ci-dessus désignées qui se rattachent aux huiles minérales et sur lesquelles les Commissaires ne seront pas d'accord. La Commission défèrera toute difficulté de cette nature à l'Arbitre, dont la décision sera obligatoire pour les Commissaires, qui feront leur rapport en conséquence.

Les Hautes Parties Contractantes prendront sans retard les mesures nécessaires pour l'exécution des décisions de la Commission ou de l'Arbitre.

ARTICLE V.

Le présent Traité restera en vigueur jusqu'au 30 Juin 1877. Dans le cas où aucune des deux Hautes Parties Contractantes n'aurait notifié douze mois avant la dite date son intention d'en faire cesser les effets, il demeurera obligatoire jusqu'à l'expiration d'une année à partir du jour où l'une ou l'autre des Hautes Parties Contractantes l'aura dénoncé.

ARTICLE VI.

Le Président de la République Française s'engage à demander à l'Assemblée Nationale, immédiatement après la signature du présent Traité, l'autorisation nécessaire pour ratifier et faire exécuter le dit Traité. Les ratifications en seront échangées à Paris le plus tôt que faire se pourra, et le Traité entrera immédiatement en vigueur.

En foi de quoi, les Plenipotentiaries respectifs ont signé le présent Traité, qu'ils ont revêtu du cachet de leurs armes.

REGISTRATION DISTRICTS.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Registration of Births, Deaths, and Marriages Statute 1865* (28 Vict. No. 246 § 5) it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, divide the Colony of Victoria into districts, and assign the said colony and districts to the Registrar-General and Deputy-Registrars respectively, or to so many of them as he may think fit, and may define the limits of such districts, and from time to time revoke, vary; and alter, such division and the limits of such districts: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance of the provisions and for the purposes of the recited Act, do hereby divide the portion of the Colony of Victoria, comprising the localities hereinafter mentioned, into the districts which are hereinafter defined, that is to say:—

SOUTH MELBOURNE.—Bounded on the north by Victoria street and Victoria parade, on the south-west by Elizabeth street, the River Yarra Yarra, and the St. Kilda road, on the south by Commercial road, and on the east by Hoddle street (Punt road).

NORTH MELBOURNE.—Bounded on the south by Victoria street, on the east by Nicholson street, on the north by the northern limits of the borough of Hotham and of Smith and Albert wards, and on the west by the western limits of the borough of Hotham.

WEST MELBOURNE.—Bounded on the north by Victoria street, on the east by Elizabeth street, on the south by the River Yarra Yarra, and on the west by the registration districts of Footscray and Williamstown.

COLLINGWOOD.—Bounded on the south by Victoria street and Clifton street, on the east by the River Yarra Yarra, on the north by Johnston street, and on the west by Nicholson street.

NORTH FITZROY.—Bounded on the south by Johnston street, on the east by the River Yarra Yarra and the Merri-merri Creek, on the north by the registration district of Brunswick, and on the west by Nicholson street.

RICHMOND.—Bounded on the north by Victoria street and Clifton street, on the east and south by the River Yarra Yarra, and on the west by Hoddle street (Punt road).

IN pursuance of the 64th section of *The Scab Act 1870*, the Administrator of the Government in Council has revoked all previous Orders relating to the Quarantine Districts hereinafter mentioned, and has ordered that the portions of Victoria whereof the boundaries are hereinafter described shall be Quarantine Districts within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:—

Pursuant to Order of 28 April 1873.

BALLARAT CLEAN DISTRICT.—Commencing at the intersection of the main road from Skipton to Smythesdale and the eastern boundary of the Benjamin run; thence by the eastern boundary of that run to the Emu Creek; thence up that creek northerly to Baillie's Creek; thence up that creek northerly to Carringham run; thence by the western, southern, and eastern boundaries of that run to Baillie's Creek; thence by that creek northerly to Lake Burrumbeep; thence westerly and northerly along the margin of that lake to a one-chain road, at Paynter's Point, between sections 22 and 23, parish of Brewster; thence westerly by that road to the eastern boundary of Trawalla run; thence northerly by the eastern boundaries of that run and Mount Ross run to the south-west corner of the Ercildoum property; thence by the southern, eastern, and northern boundaries of that property to the Main Dividing Range; thence by that range to the northern boundary of the United Ararat and Burrumbeep Goldfields and Farmers' Common; thence westerly by that common to the Armstrong's Common; thence by the eastern and northern boundary of that common to the Black Range; thence southerly by that range to the Ararat Common; thence by the west boundary of the Ararat Common to the boundary of the Lexington run; thence by the eastern and southern boundaries of that run to Barton run; thence by the eastern, southern, and western boundaries thereof to Mount Burchett run; thence by the eastern, southern, and western boundaries of that run to La Rose, Mokepille, and Lexington run; thence by the western boundary of that run to Woortook run; thence by the southern boundaries of that run, Rosebrook, and Brim Spring runs to Glenisla run; thence by the eastern boundaries of that run and Markanger run to the Plains run; thence by the north-eastern boundaries of that run, Mount Sturgeon Plains north, and Mount Sturgeon Plains run to Lillithgow Plains run; thence by the northern boundaries of that run, Burril-burril, and Glenronald runs to Greenvale run; thence by the southern and eastern boundaries of that run to the Lake Manonia run; thence by the southern boundary of that run to View Lake run; thence by the western and southern boundaries of that run and the southern boundaries of Fiery Creek and St. Enoch's runs to the Benjamin run; thence by the south-western and south-eastern boundaries thereof to the starting point at the intersection of the main road from Skipton to Smythesdale. GIPPSLAND CLEAN DISTRICT.—Commencing at the point on the sea-coast where the eastern boundary of the county of Mornington abuts thereon; thence northerly by the said

AUSTRALIA—SOUTH COAST.

VICTORIA:

CAPE NORTHUMBERLAND TO CAPE OTWAY.

All bearings are Magnetic. Variation 8° E. (1873).

FROM Cape Northumberland Cape Bridgewater bears E.S.E. 39 miles. Between these two capes a bight is formed, near the centre of which, 15 miles from Cape Northumberland, is the River Glenelg. Off the river, 4 miles from its mouth and 2 miles from the shore westward of the river, is the Ruby Rock of 3 feet. Close to the mouth of the river, on its western side, is the marked boundary line between Victoria and South Australia, in long. $140^{\circ} 58' 07.251''$ E.

The coast of the bight eastward of the Glenelg River is a succession of hummocks, about 150 feet in height, partly covered with bushes, the sand in many places running up to the summits. At 2 or 3 miles inland there are densely timbered rises, but these are only about 300 feet high. A heavy swell constantly rolls on to this piece of coast, which should be given a wide berth.

Approaching Cape Bridgewater, at a distance from it of about 12 miles, a range of hills, 500 feet in height and heavily timbered, lies at the back of the coast hummocks at about 2 miles from the shore. At the west extreme of this range, between it and the shore, is a group of high bare sand hummocks, and a large tract of bare sand occurs at a distance of from 7 to 4 miles from the Cape. At about 4 miles from the shore, at the back of the range of hills above spoken of, is—

MOUNT KINCAID (692 feet high), which lies N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. $12\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Cape Bridgewater Geodetic Station; it is scarcely visible from seaward, its appearance being that of a few trees only slightly elevated above the surrounding country.

MOUNT RICHMOND is a hill 711 feet high with a broad flat top; not having a high range in its vicinity, it stands out in relief and is always conspicuous. Mount Richmond lies, from the Geodetic Station on Cape Bridgewater, N. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. (nearly) $7\frac{1}{4}$ miles, and is one of the points of the triangulation of the colony, though the station is not conspicuous.

CAPE BRIDGEWATER.—The highest portion of this cape is 441 feet above the level of the sea, and will be visible 25 miles; it has a flattish summit, and falls gradually to the cliffy coast south and west of it and to the cultivated land to the northward; the latter, at its lowest part, being elevated about 200 feet. A small station erected on its summit forms one of the points in the geodetic triangulation.

The intention of building a lighthouse either upon this cape or Cape Nelson appears for the present to be abandoned. It is, however, very necessary that a good light should be shown from one or other of these capes, and Cape Nelson is to be preferred, being the most southern point; the light here would also be a guide to vessels wishing to run into Portland Bay for shelter.

Westward of Cape Bridgewater there is some little shelter from easterly winds, but the bay is exposed to the prevailing winds, and cannot be recommended. Steamers might use it with discretion, but a heavy swell will almost constantly be found rolling in.

BRIDGEWATER BAY.—Eastward of Cape Bridgewater is a bight known as Bridgewater Bay, but it cannot be re-

commended as an anchorage. A heavy swell rolls in during south-westerly breezes, or if there has been a breeze to the southward. The swell threatens to break in 20 fathoms on a line between Cape Bridgewater and Nelson, and does actually break at nearly a mile from the shore; there is often a set out along the coast of the cape, and except under favorable circumstances vessels ride uneasily.

To the eastward of Bridgewater Bay, in the bight between Capes Bridgewater and Nelson, but nearer the latter, there is a large conspicuous body of drift sand, just east of which is a small peaked hill, 405 feet high, known as Mount Chaucer. Mount Chaucer forms one of the points of the geodetic triangulation.

CAPE NELSON lies from Cape Bridgewater E. by S. 7 miles. It is an irregular cape of jagged cliffs; the latter, 200 feet high, rise at the back and centre of the cape to lightly timbered and grassy hummocks, the highest of which is elevated 459 feet.

Note.—**PORTLAND LIGHT** is red 'between the bearings of N.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. (nearly) and S.S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. (nearly). Inshore of S.S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. it changes to white. It should be cut off so as to be visible when just east of the Lawrence Rock, and change to white on a S. by E. bearing at the line of the outer anchorage, clearing at the same time the tail of the reef at Whaler's Point. It is intended to change the latter line as suggested.

For directions from Cape Nelson to Fitzroy River E. of Portland, see—

PORTLAND BAY.

CAPE NELSON is a cliffy head similar to Cape Bridgewater, though the land forming it has a more level appearance until it rises to a hill 387 feet high, $1\frac{3}{4}$ miles to the northward. The shore of the intermediate bight is all sand, with such stunted vegetation as is customary in such soils. Cape Nelson is bold of approach to the south-eastward.

From Cape Nelson the land trends northerly for nearly 3 miles and thence east for 2 miles, where it suddenly turns S.E. to the promontory-shaped point named Cape Sir Wm. Grant. This piece of coast is composed of limestone cliffs from 100 to 200 feet in height.

CAPE SIR WM. GRANT lies N.E. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 4 miles from Cape Nelson, and has a table summit, the highest part of which is 222 feet high; the cape on all sides has precipitous cliffs, about 150 feet in height. Projecting, as this point does, 1 mile direct to seaward, it is well defined.

POINT DANGER lies N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. from the last-mentioned cape, forming a bight between, outside of which, and at a distance of $\frac{2}{3}$ of a mile south of the point, there is a reef with only 16 feet of water on it, upon which the sea breaks heavily. A reef with 17 feet of water upon it also extends from the point in an easterly direction to a distance of $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile from the shore.

LAWRENCE ROCK E. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. 2 miles from Cape Sir Wm. Grant and S.E. by E. 1 mile from Point Danger, is formed of two small but conspicuous islets of limestone, the largest of which has two summits, the highest 132 feet high. The passage between Point Danger and Lawrence Rock is not safe for shipping, and no object is obtained by making use of it.

In strong winds from the southward a current will be found setting out through this channel, sometimes with a force of 3 knots.

PORTLAND BAY may be said to extend from Point Danger N.E. $\frac{3}{4}$ N. $12\frac{1}{2}$ miles to the Fitzroy River. In its depth off the town of Portland it affords good anchorage, thoroughly sheltered from all but south-easterly gales, which rarely occur, and still more rarely with strength to do any damage to shipping. The holding ground is good, being limestone ledges full of holes, generally filled with sand, but occasionally with blue clay and small boulders, apparently of volcanic origin.

Coir springs are supplied by the Government for the use of shipping caught in south-easterly gales.

From Point Danger the south-west shore of Portland Bay trends N.N.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. 1 mile to Blacknose Point, and from thence in the same direction nearly 2 miles to the

lighthouse on Observatory Hill. The shore about Points Danger and Blacknose is low, being only from 60 to 70 feet in height.

POINT BLACKNOSE has a reef extending from it to a distance of nearly $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile, at which distance there is 3 fathoms of water.

The Quarantine Ground is at about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile north of Point Blacknose, where a buoy painted yellow is moored.

There is no station.

PORTLAND LIGHT, on Observatory Hill, is red and fixed, 105 feet above the level of the sea. It should be visible 13 miles, but being of a deep-red color it is often so indistinct as that the ordinary town lights are first seen. (I have recommended that the red shades be removed.)

The light is visible between the bearings of N.W. and S. by E., the latter bearing showing the inner line of anchorage in the bay and clearing the shoal patch off Whaler's Lookout.

From the lighthouse on Observatory Hill the coast trends west-north-westerly nearly half a mile to the entrance of Wattle Hill Creek, and from there curves to the northward along the front of the town of Portland to Whaler's Lookout, which is N.N.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles from the lighthouse.

JETTY LIGHT AND LIFE-BOAT.—Near the centre of the bay is a jetty which runs out 1000 feet into 17 feet of water. This jetty has superseded an old jetty, which is still in existence, about one cable's length farther to the southward.

A green light is exhibited from the new jetty, but it can scarcely be seen from the anchorage. There is a life-boat at the jetty.

WHALER POINT, or LOOKOUT, is a limestone cliff 107 feet high, off which to a distance of $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile a reef of rocks extends with only 7 feet on its outer and shoalest part. East of the Lookout, on the tail of the reef, in $3\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms water, a chequered buoy is moored.

There is no channel over this reef.

The shore from Observatory Hill to Whaler Point, or what may be termed Portland Bay proper, is bordered by a sandbank which has been heaped up by the swell; the edge of this sandbank in 3 fathoms of water is at a distance of $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile from the shore, the water then deepens more suddenly, and at $3\frac{1}{2}$ cables or less 5 fathoms of water will be found. The water then deepens gradually, until at a distance of nearly 2 miles there is 10 fathoms.

ANCHORAGE AND MOORINGS.—The best anchorage is in about 6 fathoms, $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile from the shore, with Lawrence Rock open of Point Blacknose S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. and in a line with the new jetty, but vessels may anchor where most convenient, only preferring the southern shore. A mooring-buoy, painted red, a little inside of this position, will be a guide to the anchorage.

(The other buoys marked on the Admiralty Chart do not exist, they having only been used in the survey of the bay by the gentleman who made the survey.)

From Whaler Point the land trends N. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile, then N.W. nearly a mile, whence it turns suddenly to the northward, and at $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile again suddenly to N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. At a distance of 5 miles is the mouth of the Surrey River, about which is the village of Narrawong. This piece of coast from its turn to the north-eastward is very low, being only from 6 to 12 feet above high water; at a short distance back from the beach it rises, but the whole coast is so densely timbered as to make it uncertain where the elevation takes place. A sandy beach fringes the coast described, and off it is a ledge of rocks known as the Minerva Reef.

THE MINERVA REEF is a long reef, 4 miles in length, extending itself almost the whole distance between the Surrey River and Whaler Point.

Its shoal water of 9 feet does not lie more than $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile from the shore, but 21 and 22 feet will be found at a distance of 1 mile; the whole forms a large piece of uneven bottom on which the sea breaks at times very heavily.

At $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles north of the mouth of the Surrey River is Mount Clay, whose highest part is 612 feet about the level of the sea.

From the mouth of the Surrey River the land trends with a slight curve in an easterly direction nearly 8 miles to the mouth of the Fitzroy River, and the coast continues in the same direction for a further distance of several miles.

The whole coast from the Surrey River is a succession of sand hummocks about 30 feet high, nearly destitute of vegetation, having perpendicular or cliffy faces.

REMARKS.—It was intended some years since to erect a lighthouse on Cape Bridgewater, which lies to the westward of Cape Nelson; the intention is for the present abandoned.

The Government of Victoria have in anticipation the formation of a breakwater at Portland.

TIDES AND CURRENTS.—The tide in Portland Bay, as regards its rise and fall, is entirely dependent on the winds.

It is high water, full and change, at 0.30 p.m., the ordinary rise being about 3 feet.

On the outer coast there would appear to be, according to masters of shipping, a traverse current, which will set in the direction of and with any strong breeze, supposing the breeze to be blowing along the coast.

PORTLAND STATISTICS.—The estimated population of Portland for the year 1869 was 3000.

The land about Portland, except that upon which the town is situated, is not good for agriculture, consequently its agricultural products are small. Its principal export is wool.

The revenue derived from all sources during the ten years ending December 1869 amounted to £450,399, or about £45,000 per annum.

TELEGRAPHIC COMMUNICATION.—There is telegraphic communication between Portland and all the Australian colonies and Tasmania.

In clear weather, when off Portland Bay, a high mountain, called Mount Napier, 1400 feet in height, is visible in the distance, and with Mount Clay, a lower hill, 612 feet high, near the coast between Portland Bay and Port Fairy, will enable a stranger to identify the land hereabout. The appearance of Mount Clay is of a flat-topped hill with a notch in the centre; but for the notch it would closely resemble Mount Richmond.

From the Fitzroy River the coast trends with a curve E. by S. $\frac{3}{4}$ S. 10 miles to Lake Yambuk, in a south-easterly direction from which is Mills Reef.

MILLS REEF lies $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile from the shore abreast of Lady Julia Percy Island; it consists of several rocks awash at high water; masses of kelp give notice of the approach to the vicinity.

In consequence of a heavy swell often found between Lady Julia Percy Island and the main, the passage is not recommended for sailing vessels.

LADY JULIA PERCY ISLAND lies from Cape Nelson E. $\frac{3}{4}$ N. 21 miles, is of a triangular form, 155 feet high, and flat-topped. From all points it presents the same appearance, with the exception that the southern extreme is a few feet higher than the other parts, towards which the island has the least possible decline. There is landing on the north side in a small bay, but it is not good. The island is cliffy on all sides. Rabbits have been placed upon it and are numerous. Lady Julia Percy Island is one of the points of the geodetic triangulation.

From Lake Yambuk, Boulder Point bears S.E. by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles. The coast for the first half of the distance is sandy, having bare sand and other grassy hummocks immediately over it; the highest, 213 feet high, forms one of the points in the triangulation of the colony; the remaining half of the distance is of a rocky character.

From Boulder Point the coast runs unevenly E. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles to the south point of Griffith Island. All this coast is strewn with boulders of various sizes, some uncovered at high water; a few sunken rocks lie at about $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile's distance from the shore.

Note.—Tower Hill, by more computations of its height, was ascertained to be 300 feet high.

For directions from Griffith Island to Sisters Point, see—
PORT FAIRY.

For 7 miles on either side of Port Fairy the coast is low, that to the westward having grassy slopes with a few scattered trees, whilst that to the eastward is composed for the most part of bare sand hummocks about 60 feet in height.

In making this port from the southward the first remarkable land seen will be Tower Hill, which is 315 feet high, and lies 7 miles N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. from Griffith Island.

TOWER HILL presents the appearance of a table-land, but that part named more particularly Tower Hill is a peak thrown up by volcanic agency in the centre of a fresh-water lake, upon which a geodetic station has been erected. This hill is not only a good mark for Port Fairy, but also for the adjoining port of Warrnambool, it being situated midway between the two places.

GRIFFITH ISLAND is the island which, extending from the land in a north-easterly direction, forms Port Fairy. In Griffith Island is included what was formerly named Rabbit Island. These two islands were united to seaward by artificial means, since which the sand has heaped up inside.

After making Tower Hill, Griffith Island will be the next conspicuous land visible. It has two or three hummocks upon it, the highest of which is 74 feet above high water, and standing out as it does from the land is more conspicuous than the adjacent parts of the coast.

This island is $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile long and $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile broad in its broadest part, tapering away to the north-eastward, where it is only 15 feet above high water.

From its south extreme, which is composed of large volcanic boulders of the same description extend to the eastward, with a channel at high water between that part adjacent to Griffith Island and the eastern extremity, which is distant from the south point $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile. This latter portion is known as Dusty Miller Island, from a vessel wrecked there. The highest part of the Dusty Miller is 10 feet.

Sunken rocks extend for a distance of 1 cable from the southern shore of Griffith and Dusty Miller Islands, and continue to 1 cable off the eastern point of Griffith Island, upon which the lighthouse stands.

LIGHT.—A red circular stone lighthouse stands on the eastern part of Griffith Island. It is built nearly at high-water mark, and from it is exhibited a red light 41 feet high, visible between the bearings of N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. and S. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. to a distance of 9 miles.

From the lighthouse on the east point of Griffith Island to the E. and N.E. a reef dry at low-water extends for a distance of 1 cable; also from the same point, in a N. by W. direction, a reef extends for more than 3 cables, with 7 and 10 feet near the northern extreme, and in no place exceeding 15 feet. At this extreme a black buoy is moored.

BACK PASS is a narrow channel between Griffith Island and the main land about the town of Belfast. It has a bar of 6 feet, outside of which the depth rapidly increases to 10 fathoms. This passage has been used occasionally by boats, but is not safe except in extraordinarily calm weather.

In south-westerly breezes a strong current sets along the coast to the eastward, which has led the Government to remove some of the obstructions from the channel, which, leading into the River Moyne, is intended to scour the sand from the river's mouth, and so permit ships to enter the river and use the wharves at the town. Here, as at Portland, the jetty, so far as the purposes of loading and unloading are concerned, is quite useless.

The stone removed from this Back Pass has been formed into walls which are being extended from the Moyne River entrance out into the bay to the E.N.E.

The coast to the westward of the Back Pass is bordered by sunken rocks, which extend from 1 to 2 cables from the shore. The shore itself is formed principally of large volcanic boulders.

MOYNE RIVER flows into Port Fairy, at the N.W. part of Griffith Island, between it and the main land forming the

western shore of the port. On this shore, on a hill 38 feet high, close to the river's mouth, the flagstaff is situated.

When the survey was being made there was a bar at the mouth of the river with only 2 feet on it at low water. Since that time a south-westerly gale has given a greater depth, which will no doubt vary with the prevailing winds, and freshets.

From the Moyne River entrance the coast trends to the N.N.W., and thence curves gradually round to N.N.E. and E. by N. to Reef Point, which is N.E. by N. $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the lighthouse. All this piece of coast has a sandy beach with grassy sand hummocks until within a mile of Reef Point, when the hummocks are all of bare sand 50 to 65 feet in height.

Off Reef Point volcanic boulders from 9 to 2 feet in height extend themselves to a distance of 2 cables, and sunken rocks extend for a further distance of $\frac{1}{2}$ a cable.

JETTY AND LIFE-BOAT.—At $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables to the northward of the Moyne River entrance a jetty is built out for two cables into 7 feet of water; it can very seldom be used except as a landing place. At 1 and 2 cables north of the jetty, and at $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables from the shore are two patches of sunken rocks, but being in shoal water they do not interfere with shipping. There is a Life-boat at the jetty.

From Reef Point, Sisters Point bears E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles. A point lies midway between, forming a sandy bight on either side, but the whole distance between from $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ mile from the shore is filled with high-water, half-tide, and sunken rocks.

Sisters Point is conspicuous from its having immediately over it two hummocks, 65 feet high, so like each other as to have obtained for them the name of the Sisters.

Boulders 4 feet above high water lie $\frac{1}{2}$ mile to seaward of this point.

The coast between Reef and Sisters Points is a succession of bare sand hummocks about 50 feet high.

ANCHORAGE.—The anchorage for large ships is in 5 to 6 fathoms off the tail of the reef extending from the N.E. point of Griffith Island with the lighthouse bearing S. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. and the flagstaff in line with or a little open to the northward of the end of the jetty S.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. The anchorage will be near the outer mooring-buoy.

MOORINGS AND BUOYS.—There are three moorings in Port Fairy. From the outer the flagstaff bears S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. and the lighthouse S. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. The moorings are laid down in 5 fathoms of water and consist of a 25 $\frac{1}{2}$ -cwt. anchor with 90 fathoms of 1 $\frac{3}{8}$ -inch chain. Of the marks given in the present sailing directions for the port the windmill is not in existence, and the direction posts are not at all conspicuous.

The direction posts were originally intended to clear the reef off the lighthouse to the eastward and northward.

One has been blown down, and as the bay is so open they do not appear to be needed.

There are two other moorings; one consists of a 20-cwt. anchor with 90 fathoms 1 $\frac{3}{8}$ -inch chain in 25 feet of water W. by S. 1 cable from the first mooring; the other is a 15 $\frac{1}{2}$ -cwt. anchor with 90 fathoms 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch chain in 3 fathoms of water W. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 2 cables from the second. To each mooring a red buoy is attached.

A black buoy is moored in 17 feet of water on the tail of the reef extending from the N.E. point of Griffith Island. From it the custom-house is just open of the end of the jetty bearing W. by S. $\frac{3}{4}$ S., and the lighthouse bears S. by E.

Vessels trading to Port Fairy generally pick up an anchorage in about 15 feet of water between the black buoy and the jetty.

Vessels making use of the port only during the continuance of a south-westerly gale may get, as close in, as their draft of water will permit.

The anchorage is very bad in easterly weather, and no vessels are recommended to try and ride out a south-easterly gale except as a matter of necessity; then all precautions should be taken, and springs placed on the cable.

Coir hawsers are here, as at Portland and Warrnambool; in charge of the Harbor-master.

DIRECTIONS.—After making out the hill on Griffith Island, steer so as to clear the reef which extends from the lighthouse, then haul up for the anchorage (for which the flagstaff in line with the jetty is a good mark), or make fast to the moorings.

TIDES AND CURRENTS.—It is high water, full and change, at Port Fairy at Oh. 31m. p.m.; ordinary rise 3 feet.

Masters of shipping locally acquainted report a traverse current as existing. A 1-knot current was found setting to the westward after a prevalence of easterly winds, and it is likely the opposite is the case, especially as the improvements of the port are based upon the knowledge of a strong current setting to the south-eastward, during south-westerly winds. It may not be exaggerating to say that a current of a force of 3 knots sets into Bass Strait during a prevalence of strong south-westerly or westerly winds. Mariners should therefore be prepared for such a current.

BELFAST STATISTICS.—The estimated population of Belfast for the year 1869 was 3500. The principal exports are wool, potatoes, and wheat. The revenue derived from all sources for the 10 years ending December 1869 was £282,122, or at the rate of about £28,000 per annum nearly.

TELEGRAPHIC COMMUNICATION.—There is telegraphic communication between Belfast and all the Australian colonies and Tasmania.

ARMSTRONG BAY, one mile E. by N. of Sisters Point, is a small sandy point fringed with boulders, forming a small bay known by the name of Armstrong. This bay is used by fishing boats; sunken rocks are numerous and nearly fill it up.

TOWER HILL (300 feet high) lies N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. 7 miles from Griffith Island summit. When viewed from the westward, Tower Hill itself is not visible, except in very clear weather, being from that direction in line with the rather higher table-land which lies 1 mile to the eastward. When it begins to bear northerly it opens out west of the table-land and continues to be visible as a single cone peak. The table-land falls to the westward and appears to join Tower Hill; eastward it falls to the same elevation as the western land. The land in the vicinity, both east and west, is higher than the general coast-line.

HELEN ROCK.—E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Sisters Point, and S. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. from Tower Hill, is the Helen Rock, of 1 fathom; it is 1 mile from the shore, has 8 or 10 fathoms close to on all sides, and is of so pinnacle a form that a lead would not rest upon its summit. It rarely breaks, and is much in the way of coasters.

From Sisters Point, Middle Island, off Warrnambool, bears E. by S. 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles; the coast between is a sandy bight with hummocks over it, generally grassed, varying from 100 to 160 feet in height; at the western part of this piece of coast lies Armstrong Bay, as above described. At between 1 and 2 miles from Middle Island is a tract of bare sand.

From outside, abreast of the vicinity of Warrnambool, the whole coast to the eastward presents an almost unbroken appearance, the only break to its uniformity being a broad-topped cultivated hill, 220 feet high over the east bank of the Hopkins River, and a fall in the land 9 miles east of Warrnambool.

The mouth of the Hopkins River lies E. by N. 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Middle Island.

For directions hereabout, see—

WARRNAMBOOL HARBOR.

WARRNAMBOOL HARBOR, formerly known as Lady Bay, is formed by several outlying islands and rocks nearly connected with each other, which extend from Point Pickering in a S.E. and E.S.E. direction. The largest of these is what is named Middle Island, on the summit of which the lighthouse stands. Between Middle Island and Point Pickering is Merri Island, and outside to the eastward is what has been named Breakwater Rock, which is 18 feet above high water and is encircled with sandstone ledges, which uncover at half tide. Other rocks uncovering at half

tide and awash at low water lie to the south-eastward. The extreme of these rocks bears from Point Pickering S.E. by E. distant 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ cables.

From Point Pickering the land trends W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. for about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile, this piece of coast being composed of sandstone cliffs; the shore having numerous indentations with half-tide and sunken rocks lying off it, in some places to a distance of 3 cables. Immediately over the cliffy shore are numerous sand hummocks, in some cases grassed, but generally bare; the westernmost and highest of these is 115 feet above high water; the others vary from 60 to 80 feet.

MERRI ISLAND lies $\frac{1}{2}$ a cable S.S.E. of Point Pickering, to which it is all but attached by half-tide rocks. Merri Island is 47 feet high; it is very small, not being 1 cable in extent.

MIDDLE ISLAND, the central and largest of the three islets which form Warrnambool Harbor, is 250 yards long N.W. and S.E., and 100 yards broad; it lies S.E. of Merri Island, to which it is almost joined by rocks of various heights. On one of these, named Datum Rock, a datum mark for tides has been placed, upon which is written:—"The bottom of this is 5 feet 6 inches above ordinary low water."

From Middle Island, in a southerly direction for a distance of one cable, extend several half-tide rocks, and at a further distance of 4 cables, in a S.S.E. direction, is a dangerous rocky patch of 17 feet, upon which the sea breaks heavily, and between which and the island is all uneven and rocky bottom.

LIGHT.—The lighthouse (white) is erected on the highest part of Middle Island, and exhibits a fixed light at 70 feet above the level of the sea, visible 13 miles.

It is intended to build the lighthouse near the position of the Upper Obelisk, so as to enable shipping to enter at night by keeping two lights in line. There is a flagstaff near the lighthouse.

HARBOR LIGHT is not now exhibited, but it will be when the position of the lighthouse has been changed.

BREAKWATER ROCK (18 feet high) is a small islet which lies due east of the lighthouse on Middle Island, from which it is distant 1 cable. Between it and Middle Island is a small rocky passage with from 2 feet to 2 fathoms of water.

Fronting Breakwater Rock to the S. and S.E. are several half-tide ledges nearly joined to one another, and distant from Breakwater Rock nearly 1 cable; off these again to the S.E., at a further distance of 1 cable, is another half-tide ledge, with two small patches each 1 foot above high water.

Rocks awash at low water extend to a distance of 1 cable from the last-mentioned ledge.

MERRI RIVER.—Immediately behind Point Pickering is the mouth of the Merri River, which ordinarily may be stepped across, but in time of floods washes the sand from its mouth and discharges a rather large body of water.

Formerly the Merri River curved along the shore at the back of the sand hummocks, but it was feared that as the sand was being blown inland the river might be the means of conveying a large quantity into the harbor and so help to fill it up; in consequence of which a chain of lagoons were joined and united with the river above the sand encroachment part.

From Merri Point (the north entrance point of the Merri River) the land trends in a northerly direction for about 3 cables, when it trends in an easterly direction for about $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile, and then S.E. to the mouth of the Hopkins River, the heads of which form the east side of Warrnambool Harbor.

THE BAR.—Warrnambool Harbor is protected to the south-eastward by a bar of 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 5 fathoms of water, which adjoins and extends from a rocky patch awash at high water, lying south 3 cables from the Hopkins River Heads.

The 5 fathoms extreme of this bar is at a distance of only 3 cables from the low-water rocks extending S.E. from the islands off Point Pickering, and this distance forms the Main or South Channel into Warrnambool Harbor.

SOUTH CHANNEL, which is the best entrance into Warrnambool Harbor, has in its centre two rocky patches of 28 and

29 feet, which are the leading marks (two obelisks in line N. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.) lead immediately over.

The bottom of the whole channel is rocky and very uneven, varying from 9 fathoms to 28 feet, but in which a depth of 6 fathoms might be maintained.

Between the bar and about $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile from the shore the soundings vary from 7 to 4 fathoms, the bottoms being generally sand over rock or sandstone rock.

MOORINGS.—There are two moorings in Warrnambool Harbor, one in $3\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms, consisting of a 37-cwt. anchor with 90 fathoms $1\frac{3}{4}$ -inch chain; the other in 13 feet, consisting of a 26-cwt. anchor with 75 fathoms of $1\frac{3}{8}$ -inch chain; to the end of each chain a red mooring-buoy is attached.

JETTY AND LIFE-BOAT.—At 2 cables north of the mouth of the Merri River a jetty is built out into 12 feet of water to a distance of 700 feet from the shore.

At the jetty is a life-boat, and there is a flagstaff at the shore end of the jetty.

A green light will be exhibited at the end of the jetty when the position of the lighthouse is changed.

LEADING MARKS.—There are two obelisks (white), 140 yards apart, erected on the north shore of Warrnambool Harbor, the summits being respectively 109 and 87 feet above high water. The harbor lighthouse on the shore, at a distance of 280 yards from the lower obelisk, is also in the same line, and is elevated 40 feet above high water.

DIRECTIONS.—A stranger bound to Warrnambool Harbor from the westward or southward will be greatly guided as to his position by Tower Hill (315 feet high), which is only 3 miles from the coast and 7 miles west of Warrnambool.—(See sailing directions for Port Fairy.)

Taking care to avoid the 17-foot patch which lies S.S.E., nearly half a mile from Middle Island, vessels are advised to bring the upper obelisk its breadth open west of the lower one N. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., and steer into the harbor on this line. Sailing vessels, especially, cannot do better than hug the break off the rocks, as by getting under their lee they are enabled, without danger of shipping a heavy sea, to haul up for the anchorage.

Vessels are recommended not to approach too near the mouth of the Hopkins River.

In bad weather, or with a heavy southerly swell, the sea breaks 1 mile off the land.

In fine weather, however, vessels may and do cross in all directions the bar extending from the Hopkins River.

From the eastward, Tower Hill is the best guide to the locality. Warrnambool Hill is hidden by the land if within 4 miles, and, being above ten miles inland, it is often obscured by mists.

After approaching near enough to make out Warrnambool, either cross the bar to the south-eastward, or proceed to get the leading marks as before directed.

Crossing the bar must depend entirely on the weather; the great disadvantage of crossing it is, that vessels will have to proceed broadside to the swell.

ANCHORAGE.—Warrnambool Harbor is small and not a harbor for large vessels; the outer anchorage being in $3\frac{1}{2}$ and 4 fathoms, with a swell sometimes which causes a diminution of the depth. The best anchorage is in about 15 feet of water about 1 cable from the ledge of the Breakwater Rock.

Vessels, having entered the harbor, must pick up an anchorage where most convenient, according to their draught of water, only endeavoring to anchor as close as possible to the Breakwater Rock; or they may make fast to the moorings.

CAUTION.—It is not safe to enter or leave Warrnambool Harbor in south-westerly or southerly gales.

TIDES.—It is high water, full and change, at Oh. 37m. p.m.; ordinary range 3 feet.

CURRENTS.—(See sailing directions for Port Fairy.)

REMARKS.—Warrnambool is the only one of the three western ports of Victoria which may be considered safe in

south-easterly gales. This is in consequence of the outer swell being broken on the bar fronting the harbor to the south-eastward.

Coir springs are supplied by the Government, and should be placed on the cable in the event of a heavy swell setting in to the anchorage.

WARRNAMBOOL STATISTICS.—The estimated population of Warrnambool is 3170. The principal exports are wool, potatoes, and wheat.

A meat-preserving factory has lately been established.

TELEGRAPHIC COMMUNICATION.—There is telegraphic communication between Warrnambool and all the Australian colonies and Tasmania.

WARRNAMBOOL HILL.—In clear weather, and if more than 5 miles from the shore, Warrnambool Hill will be visible; it has a round but not very even summit 707 feet above the level of the sea. It lies from Warrnambool Lighthouse N.E. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. 13 miles, and from Flaxman Hill N. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. 14 miles; a low spur of the same hill lies about 3 miles to the westward.

FLAXMAN HILL bears S.E. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 14 miles from the mouth of the Hopkins River. It is 262 feet high; and $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile N.W. is a second hill not quite so high, but sometimes more conspicuous in consequence of its sandy appearance. The two hills together are a good guide to the locality of a part of the coast which otherwise presents a great sameness of appearance, overhanging cliffs forming the principal feature. Flaxman Hill is one of the points of the geodetic triangulation, and a large pile of stones has been built upon its summit.

About midway between Flaxman Hill and the Hopkins River, the coast range immediately over the cliffs is rather higher than the adjacent land, being there elevated 242 feet above the level of the sea.

The coast from the Hopkins River to Flaxman Hill is nearly straight and apparently bold, though a heavy swell constantly rolls in and breaks in about 5 fathoms; thence it continues to trend in the same direction and to be of the same character for a further distance of $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles, and is then locally known as the Bold Projection.

The Bold Projection is the only projecting part of the coast between Moonlight Head and Warrnambool, but otherwise is no more conspicuous than other parts of the coast hereabout.

Sunken rocks will here be found at a distance of $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile from the shore.

The Bold Projection down upon the old charts, at about 7 miles east of Warrnambool, apparently relates to a projecting piece of cliff, but it could not be distinguished from many other projecting parts of the cliffs equally remarkable.

BAY OF ISLANDS.—The western land of the Bay of Islands lies close S.E. of the Bold Projection, or S.E. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 18 miles from Warrnambool. It may be identified by its white cliffy appearance, varied by numerous small islands, all of the same character, the whole presenting a pleasing and striking appearance to the eye.

From the western part of the Bay of Islands the coast continues to run in an irregular manner (cut up by bays and small islands) E.S.E. 4 miles to Curdie Inlet. It was not safe to sound this piece of coast, but the sea breaks heavily $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile from the shore, and it is very probable that sunken rocks are numerous and fringe the whole distance. It is a piece of coast that should be carefully avoided.

CURDIE INLET is conspicuous from the sandy nature of the entrance; the mouth is of low sand interspersed with low-water rocks, and is often barred across. At the west point of the inlet on the highest part of the coast there is a conspicuous sand patch, and eastward there are other sand hills or patches; these are more conspicuous from their contrast with the cliffy coast on either side.

From the immediate mouth where the fresh water discharges itself there is a widening of the entrance to a second or outer mouth, and at the points which form this outer mouth are several limestone rocks, those about the western point being more numerous; those off the eastern point are

about $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile from it, and are joined to it by a narrow neck of sand, the centre portion of which is washed over by the sea; the highest of the eastern rocks is about 17 feet in height, and a ledge extends from it in a N.W. and S.E. direction. East and south the sea breaks violently, and across the mouth from the ledge to the rocks off the western point there is also a heavy break. It was here that the *Schomburg* was wrecked; she was standing in with a light breeze, which dying away left her unmanageable close in shore.

From Curdie Inlet, Hesse Point bears E. by S. 3 miles; the coast between is irregular and clifty.

From Hesse Point the coast trends E. by N. 2 miles to the mouth of Campbell Creek.

CAMPBELL CREEK.—The mouth of this creek is the nearest approach to an anchorage between Warrnambool and Cape Otway; it is locally known as Port Campbell. Unfortunately for the utility of the place, it is directly open to the S.W.; sunken rocks extend more than $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile in a south-westerly direction from the east point, and there are also sunken rocks off the shore on the opposite side. After northerly winds there is good landing, and when the district becomes populated and telegraphic communication is established, there will be no difficulty in utilizing the place in favorable weather.

From Campbell Creek the coast trends E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 3 miles to the Sherbrook River, and thence with a slight curve S.E. by E. 11 miles to Moonlight Head. At mid-distance is Point Ronald. There are several ledges which cover and uncover at between 1 and 3 miles west of Moonlight Head, and off these again are a few sunken rocks; none extend more than $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile from the shore.

The whole coast from 4 miles east of Warrnambool to Moonlight Head is of the same clifty character, but the cliffs are higher as they approach Moonlight Head.

At Curdie Inlet the appearance of the coast begins to change in consequence of the cliffs being backed by higher ground. At 1 and 2 miles east of the Sherbrook River are a few islets and rocks known as the Sow and Pigs.

POINT RONALD, lying midway between the Sherbrook River and Moonlight Head, is a bluff point 257 feet high, made conspicuous by having to the eastward a large body of drift sand; the point forms the west head of the Gellibrand River; this river, though draining a rather large tract of country, is similar to Curdie Inlet, Campbell Creek, and Sherbrook River, having a small mouth barred across in dry seasons and never very broad.

MOONLIGHT HEAD is rounded and bold, and densely timbered, not only over the cliffs, but wherever it is possible for vegetation to cling; the undergrowth is almost impenetrable; the hills immediately over the coast are about 500 feet high; the highest, 546 feet, has a geodetic station erected upon its summit. These hills form spurs of the Otway Ranges, which rise gradually at the back until, at 2 and 3 miles from the shore, they attain an elevation of over 1000 feet.

The highest hill of the Otway Ranges west of Cape Otway lies from Moonlight Head N.E. $10\frac{1}{2}$ miles; it is 1800 feet high, with a rounded summit.

Several rocks above water skirt the shore of Moonlight Head, but do not extend any distance. North-eastward of Moonlight Head, distant $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile, is Point Reginald, with a small islet close to. The coast continues to trend in a north-easterly direction until, at 2 miles from Moonlight Head, it alters its trend to easterly, and forms a small bight to Lion Headland.

LION HEADLAND is formed of bold high cliffs, perhaps the highest on the coast of Victoria; here too the Otway Ranges have the greatest elevation when near the coast.

ROTTEN POINT lies E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 4 miles from Lion Headland. Between the two points a bight is formed, in the depth of which, at 3 miles from the latter place, is Joanna River, with a sand island at the mouth.

Rotten Point is rocky, and has a rock awash at high water lying $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile to the southward. Cape Otway bears from it S.E. by E. 7 miles; midway between is the Ayr

River. There are several conspicuous sand patches about the mouth of the Joanna River and Rotten Point, and there is one very large body of drift sand just to the eastward of the Ayr River.

The whole coast between Rotten Point and Cape Otway is rocky, and the sea generally breaks in 5 fathoms of water.

A conspicuous conical peak 1650 feet high, with a range of about the same elevation near it to the northward, lies from Cape Otway Lighthouse N. by E. 10 miles.

SOUNDINGS.—The 50-fathom line, distant 3 miles south of Cape Nelson, increases its distance from the shore rapidly until, south of Lady Julia Percy Island, it is distant from that island 18 miles or 23 miles from the shore; it thence continues to increase its distance, but in a slighter degree, until south of Moonlight Head, where it is distant 30 miles; from thence it takes a gradual sweep in towards the mouth of the strait, and at Cape Otway is distant only 8 miles.

Inshore of the 50-fathom line the soundings shoal very gradually.

The 100-fathom line is found at about 20 miles off Cape Northumberland, 17 off Capes Bridgewater and Nelson, and from thence it increases its distance from the shore until, S.W. of Moonlight Head, it is 40 miles off; thence it slightly increases its distance, and is about 50 miles from a line joining Capes Otway and Wickham, and is distant 30 miles from the west coast of King Island. At the 100-fathom depth the bank of soundings appears to drop very suddenly. Outshore of this depth no bottom was obtained at 165 and 175 fathoms.

TIDES AND CURRENTS.—It is high water, full and change, on this coast at all places at nearly the same time, viz. :—

The tides are much affected by the winds; the flood comes from the westward on the Victorian shore, and from the southward on the King Island or Tasmanian shore. A south-westerly or westerly breeze keeps up the flood tidal stream and increases its force; an easterly breeze has an opposite effect. While tides were being observed in Surprise Bay, an easterly gale had the effect of doing away entirely with one flood-tide. The current will therefore depend upon the wind. In October, November, and December, when south-westerly breezes mostly prevail, a current may be expected to run to the eastward. In January, February, and March a current may be looked for from the eastward; but as these currents do not appear to be at any time continuous, they cannot be allowed for as a matter of course. They will be found stronger as the coast is approached, and strongest off the various headlands, such as Capes Bridgewater and Nelson, Moonlight Head, and most particularly off (but near) Cape Wickham.

AUSTRALIA—BASS STRAIT.

KING ISLAND.

KING ISLAND, lying in the centre of the western entrance to Bass Strait, is 35 miles long and generally 12 broad.

CAPE WICKHAM, the N.W. point of King Island, lies S.E. by S. 48 miles from Cape Otway. The principal entrance into Bass Strait from the westward is between these two capes. The other western entrance lying to the southward of King Island is seldom used, and cannot be recommended. In addition to the natural dangers, which are several, the tides are baffling and almost altogether dependent upon the winds; lastly, the channel is not lighted.

Cape Wickham is formed of grey granite; a few sunken rocks fringe the shore but do not extend further out than 1 cable. North of the cape the unevenness of the bottom and the strong tides often cause a break at a much greater distance. Upon the cape is erected a lighthouse, and over it there is a round hill 300 feet high.

Light.—The lighthouse upon Cape Wickham is a white circular tower 145 feet high, exhibiting at a height of 280 feet above the level of the sea a fixed white light of the catadioptric and first-class order. It is in lat. $39^{\circ} 35' 38.5''$ S., and long. $143^{\circ} 57' 03''$ E.

The light will be visible in clear weather at a distance of 24 miles when bearing from N.N.E. round by E. to W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. with the following exceptions, namely, that when within a radius of 19 miles, if on a N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. bearing, the light will be obscured by the highest part of North New-Year Island. A ray of light is visible on a W.N.W. bearing over a dip in the land.

Caution.—For a single light the place of Cape Wickham light is not well chosen. Here, as at Wilson Promontory, one light has been made to serve the purpose of two.

The dangerous locality hereabouts is the west coast of King Island, but Cape Wickham light is of little or no use as a warning of this locality; its principal use at present is as a warning against the Harbinger and Navarine Reefs, but a light upon North New-Year Island would have answered this purpose equally well, while at the same time guarding the coast to the southward. The remark of the Commissioners, that "the light on King Island is only to be regarded as a beacon for warning navigators of danger rather than as a leading light to a great thoroughfare," would have lost none of its pointedness if the light had been placed nearer the dangerous locality against which it was the desire of the Commissioners to caution mariners.

HARBINGER REEFS.—N.E. rock, or East Harbinger, lies N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Cape Wickham Lighthouse. It consists of a group of sunken rocks about 1 cable in extent. In heavy weather, or when there is a swell, this reef breaks much heavier than the West Harbinger, but there are times when it will only occasionally break. Vessels must therefore not consider themselves out of danger because they do not observe a break.

The West Harbinger, lying W. by N. $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Cape Wickham Lighthouse, has the appearance of a small flat-topped boulder about 1 foot above high water; a sunken rock, which does not always break, lies $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables to the S.W. The East and West Harbingers are $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles apart; there is deep water between them, and from 9 to 14 fathoms all round. Irregular depths, varying from 15 to 28 fathoms, will be found between the Harbingers and the shore.

NAVARINE REEF lies N.N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Cape Wickham Lighthouse, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the shore; the principal part is a rock awash at high water, N.E. of which, at a distance of 1 cable, is another rock occasionally dry; the body of the reef is nearly $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile long in an E.N.E. and W.S.W. direction.

VICTORIA COVE, 1 mile from Cape Wickham in a south-westerly direction, is a second cape, which may almost be considered as part of the former. Between the two capes a cove is formed, known as Victoria Cove; it has a small sandy beach on which the sea breaks continuously and generally violently, but being in the vicinity of the lighthouse quarters it is used as a landing place for stores.

The lighthouse-keeper is supplied with a large and good surf boat, which lessens the danger; but no ordinary boat should attempt a landing without a thorough understanding with the lighthouse-keeper that such a course is safe.

The following signals are adopted:—

A ball at the south yard-arm of the flagstaff in addition to the ensign at the masthead of the same, and then lowered a little, signifies that a boat can land at the cove.

Ensign at south yard-arm.—Vessel should anchor at New-Year Islands.

Ensign at north yard-arm.—Vessel should anchor east side of King Island.

Two fires on the point is the signal to a vessel waiting at New-Year Islands that there is safe landing at the cove.

Notwithstanding these signals as to safety of landing, it would be wiser, since the lighthouse-keeper has a surf boat, not to risk valuable lives in ill-adapted boats; but to let this dangerous service be performed by those thoroughly acquainted with its nature and supplied with proper appliances.

NEW-YEAR ISLANDS AND ANCHORAGE.—North New-Year Island lies S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 7 miles from Cape Wickham Lighthouse; it is curved in form, and about 1 mile long N.E. and S.W.; its highest part near the S.W. extreme is 117 feet above high water. A channel $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile broad divides the North from the South New-Year Island; the latter is $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile long in a N.N.W. and S.S.E. direction, and less than 100 feet in height. Under these islands is an anchorage for small craft protected from all weathers, known locally as New-Year Islands anchorage, and never mentioned or indeed known as Franklin Road.

The anchorage is in 5 or 6 fathoms with the east point of North New-Year Island N. by W., and a remarkable rock at north extreme of South New-Year Island, known as the Ass's Ears, bearing about S.W.; but the best guide for the anchorage is the absence of kelp, which grows everywhere except in the tidal gutter setting between the islands; here only the bottom is comparatively free from rocks.

The anchorage ground being small in extent, it is necessary to moor, unless in a small craft, when there would be room nearer the shore. An ordinary sized vessel must either moor or anchor further out, and in the latter case would be exposed to the swell, which, more than the wind, has to be guarded against at this anchorage. Immediately a swell sets in, a spring should be placed on the cable, and care taken that the cable does not foul any sunken boulders, which, however, is not likely to happen if the ship is moored in the position recommended. A small rock, generally above water, but sometimes covered, occupies what would otherwise be the best anchorage.

Though the anchorage may be considered quite safe if the above precautions are taken, yet mariners are not advised to use it. Independently of the foul bottom, and the smallness of the anchorage ground, which will only accommodate one ordinary sized vessel, the tides often run too strong to enable a ship to pick up a berth as wished. A schooner of 120 tons was in this way, during the survey, forced to take up an outer berth, and was only saved from wreck by the fact of the *Victoria* towing her into a place of safety.

The principal use of the New-Year Islands anchorage is as a place of waiting for the vessel bringing stores or wishing to communicate with the lighthouse.

Tides.—It is high water, full and change, at New-Year Islands at Oh. 48m.; rise 3 feet. The stream turns, in fine weather, at high or low water, but is greatly affected by prevailing winds.

Between South New-Year Island and the King Island shore there is a distance of over a mile; several rocks, some above water, others sunken, occupy, at nearly equal distances, the whole of this space, leaving, however, channels of deep water between. As the sea breaks upon the various dangers, the channels may be used in a case of necessity, such as a vessel happening to get upon a lee shore.

Crayfish are numerous here, and occasionally other fish abound. The "mutton" bird, (a well-known bird in Bass Strait), the flesh of which is eaten and the oil used for tanning purposes, have a breeding place on these islands, and arrive regularly every year from the 23rd to 28th November to deposit their eggs, which are sold to the pastry-cooks. Snakes are very numerous. There is a watering place in the S.E. corner of North New-Year Island, facing the anchorage.

From the point lying a mile S.W. of Cape Wickham, the coast, of the same nature for 2 miles as the Cape Wickham shore, trends with a curve S. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 8 miles to Whistler Point, lying S.E. of the New-Year Islands. At two miles some sunken rocks extend to a distance of nearly $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile from the shore; and here a sandy beach commences, and continues to within $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile of Whistler Point; at 6 miles a

fresh-water creek empties itself. At the south-western extreme of the sandy beach there is a good landing in nearly all weathers; a dilapidated hut, originally built for the protection of lighthouse stores, points out the landing place. N. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile from Whistler Point is the Elizabeth Rock, dry at low water; numerous other rocks, above water as well as sunken, lie off the point in all directions.

NETHERBY POINT, so named from the *Netherby* ship wrecked there, lies S. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 12 miles from Whistler Point. The whole intervening coast is broken up into small bays, with off-lying rocks, generally above high water, but sometimes sunken; the sunken rocks in some cases extend to a distance of $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile from the shore, and outside of these there is much foul ground, which, with tidal streams and a westerly swell, often makes a nasty breaking sea, leading any one unacquainted with the coast to imagine rocks everywhere. At $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles south of Whistler Point there is a small sand patch, and at $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles there is a very conspicuous long and bare sand hill, at the foot of which there is a sandy beach. The whole coast between Whistler and Netherby Points presents a very uniform appearance; the coast ranges are all densely timbered and about 300 feet in height.

At W.S.W. $3\frac{3}{4}$ miles from the sand hill, and S. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Whistler Point, is a patch of foul ground, which was often observed to break, but upon which, when not breaking, no less water than 6 fathoms could be found. N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. 2 miles from Netherby Point is a rock awash at low water which breaks heavily.

CURRIE HARBOR lies just to the southward of Netherby Point. It is only adapted for small craft such as frequent the island for seal or kangaroo skins; when once inside it affords shelter from all winds.

From Netherby Point the land trends to the southward and eastward for nearly 2 miles to Waterwitch Point, south of which at a distance of 2 miles is the Waterwitch Reef, so named from a vessel of that name having been wrecked upon it; the reef, with the foul ground adjacent, is nearly a mile in extent, but the centre is the only part which continuously breaks. Midway between the Waterwitch Reef and the shore is a rock which uncovers, and between it and Waterwitch Point there is nothing but foul ground.

From the Waterwitch Point the coast trends south-easterly for 2 miles to a conspicuous long sand hill, similar to that to the northward, and thence the coast, of the same broken and rocky character, trends S. by E. $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles to Fitzmaurice Bay.

FITZMAURICE BAY affords good anchorage in easterly winds in about 10 fathoms sand off the sandy beach in the depth of the bay. A sand patch is a good guide to the locality. As the wind always veers from E. round northerly to N.W. and W., and the westerly change is often very sudden, this bay can only be used with caution. There is a good freshwater stream near the northern corner of the sandy beach, but a heavy surf will nearly always be found.

CATARAQUI POINT (so named from the *Cataraqui*, wrecked hereabout) forms the western point of Fitzmaurice Bay; it lies from Netherby Point S. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 9 miles. Off it, at a cable's distance N.W., are a few sunken rocks, some awash at low water. From Cataraqui Point the coast, which has an elevation of about 300 feet, and is here bold and cliffy, trends S.S.E. for $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles to Surprise Point, eastward of which is the bay of the same name.

SURPRISE POINT.—Rocks above water extend a quarter of a mile to the southward of this point, and between it and the opposite point of Surprise Bay is a single rock just above high water with a group of sunken rocks lying about it. South of Surprise Point the land falls suddenly to about 100 feet.

SURPRISE BAY is much used by sealers and small craft visiting the island; it affords good protection in all weathers for this class of vessel, the sea being broken upon the group of rocks in the centre of the bay. In strong westerly winds it cannot be entered.

Tides.—It is high water, full and change, in Surprise Bay at Oh. 43m.; rise 3 feet. An easterly gale had the effect of doing away entirely with one flood-tide, thus showing how much the tides are influenced by the winds.

STOKES POINT lies S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Surprise Point. Its south extreme is only a few feet above high water, and takes the appearance of a group of boulders, over and outside of which the sea is constantly breaking; there are a few sunken rocks south of the point at $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables from the high line. At 1 mile north of the point the land has an elevation of 144 feet, and falls gradually on the opposite side to about 100 feet. In rounding Stokes Point care must be taken to give it a good wide berth. The low shore at the south extreme, and the rocks lying off it, will appear more distant than they are in reality, in consequence of the gradually rising hill to the northward.

SEAL BAY.—From Stokes Point the coast trends northerly for about a mile and then north-westerly $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile to the sandy beach of Seal Bay. Middle Point, the north point of Seal Bay, bears from Stokes Point N. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. $2\frac{1}{4}$ miles off Middle Point; half-tide and sunken rocks extend in an E.S.E. direction for $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile. The best anchorage is near the centre of the bay in 7 to 8 fathoms, with the eastern part of Stokes Point just open of the next point to the northward. The bay, though seemingly protected from prevailing winds, is actually exposed, for easterly winds are of more frequent occurrence here than on the Victorian coast; it has a bleak and warning appearance, and sealers never use it by any chance, preferring the safer anchorage upon the opposite side in Surprise Bay. Should a sailing vessel wish to anchor in Seal Bay she is recommended to anchor in about 10 fathoms outside the anchorage ground above given. A swell setting into the bay, or indications of an easterly wind, should be the signal for her to get under weigh.

SEAL ROCK lies N.E. by E. $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Stokes Point. It is 12 feet high, and at $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables S. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. from it is a smaller rock, which uncovers at low water; a few sunken rocks lie near it. East of the Seal Rock, at a distance of $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles, are several rocky patches, with less than 1 fathom upon them; between these and the Seal Rock the general depth is about 7 fathoms; but there is one patch of 3 fathoms, at 4 cables distance from the rock, and another of 5 fathoms, at $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile. No shoaler water could be found, but in moderately heavy weather the sea will be observed to break the whole distance from Seal Rock to the outer rocky patches.

BLACK POINT lies from Stokes Point N.N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles, and may almost be considered the N.E. point of Seal Bay. Over the point there is a hummock 113 feet high, and to the northward over the coast there is a higher range of conspicuous sandy hummocks; the point itself is a black rock about 30 feet high. Off it to the eastward, at $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile from the point, but only $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile from the nearest shore, is a rock above water, with sunken rocks between it and the shore.

N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 2 miles from Black Point is another small point, at the back of which the land rises, and off which, to the south-eastward at a distance of 2 cables, is a small rock above water; at 1 mile in the same north-easterly direction is a smaller point, of which, on a S.S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. bearing, and at distances of 4 and 7 cables respectively, are the Brig and South Brig Rocks. At the back of this piece of coast the land of King Island attains its greatest elevation of 700 feet.

BRIG ROCK, so called from its resemblance to a brig under sail, is 45 feet high; there is deep water between it and the shore and between it and the South Brig Rock.

The South Brig Rock is 40 feet high, and of much greater extent than the Brig Rock; it has no resemblance whatever to a vessel under sail, but is much more easily seen, from its black appearance. A few detached rocks lie off it to the southward, and the sea breaks one cable off its south extreme. South Brig Rock bears from Seal Rock N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. distant $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

BOLD POINT bears from South Brig Rock N.E. by N. 5 miles; several small points and bays occupy the space between; the first half of the distance has several rocks, most of them above high water, lying off the shore at a distance of about 3 cables. Over the point the coast range has an elevation of 630 feet, and is densely timbered.

S.W. by S. $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile from Bold Point there is a point, with a small detached rock forming its south extreme; off this at a cable's distance are a few sunken rocks. From Bold Point the coast trends N. by E. 4 miles, and north 3 miles to the south point of Sea Elephant Bay. This piece of coast is broken and almost steep to; small sandy beaches vary its rocky character, and over it are densely timbered ranges about 500 feet in height, which, at the south point of Sea Elephant Bay, trend away to the north-westward.

SEA ELEPHANT BAY is a wide bay nearly 6 miles broad and $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles deep, open to the eastward. Its extreme points bear from each other N. by W. and S. by E. Off its northern point, on an easterly bearing and distant $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles, is Sea Elephant Rock, a small island 75 feet high, and nearly $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile in extent; between the point and the rock is a channel of about 3 fathoms. At 1 mile N. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. of Sea Elephant Rock is a rock which at very low tides is uncovered about 2 feet; there is foul ground about it $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile in extent. To the south-westward, at a cable's distance, is a rock above water near which are a few sunken rocks.

To the eastward of Sea Elephant Bay, at nearly 7 miles from the shore, there is a bank with as little as 22 feet upon it; the bank generally is of $4\frac{1}{2}$ and 5 fathoms sand, and at this depth is 3 miles long in a N. by W. and S. by E. direction. Midway between it and the shore the water deepens to 12, 13, and even 14 fathoms, and thence shoals gradually again until at $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile from the shore 5 fathoms will be found.

The bottom throughout the bay is sand or sand and shells, and vessels may anchor anywhere in about 9 fathoms, though the centre of the bay is most convenient.

The bay is a very useful and safe anchorage. Vessels only need go there during westerly gales, and the wind invariably, when the weather is clearing, veers to the southward. In the summer months there is much easterly weather, and a nasty swell rolls in, but vessels do not then require to make use of the anchorage. In the southern part of the bay there is a good fresh-water stream.

Tides.—It is high water, full and change, in Sea Elephant Bay at Oh. 50m.; rise 3 feet. The flood stream runs to the northward, and the ebb to the southward, with a velocity at spring tides of $1\frac{1}{4}$ knots. The turn of the stream is influenced by the wind; in fine weather it occurs at high and low water.

From the north point of Sea Elephant Bay the coast, nearly straight and consisting of low sand hummocks, trends N. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles to Lavinia Point, which is the N.E. point of King Island. At 1 mile is the Sea Elephant River, a small stream, accessible at high water to small craft drawing 3 feet of water; at the back is a swamp. Midway, and at about 2 miles inland, is a double-topped hill, densely timbered, 338 feet in height, and known as Sea Elephant Hill.

LAVINIA POINT, the N.E. point of King Island, is low and sandy. It has been given its name from a vessel called the *Martha and Lavinia* having been wrecked there. From Lavinia Point the coast, which continues to be sandy, trends N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles to Boulder Point, so named from a large granite boulder which forms it; at $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles is a conspicuous sand patch. A few sunken rocks lie off Boulder Point, and a shoal, with as little as 11 feet of water upon it, extends from the point in a N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. direction for $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile; the meeting of the tides has caused a heaping up of sand in the vicinity of this point, and it is not uncommon for coasters to drop anchor in westerly gales in about 9 fathoms upon the sand bank thus formed. If the gale has settled into a westerly one, the anchorage is as safe

as Sea Elephant Bay, and it is handier for proceeding westward when the weather clears.

At 1 mile to the north-westward of Boulder Point is a very large and conspicuous sand patch, much more so than that between Lavinia and Boulder Points.

The coast from Boulder Point continues to trend to the north-westward for 3 miles to another point unnamed, off which, at a cable's distance, is a rock awash, and W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from which lies a rock above water, known as the Doughboy, having a reef, dry at low water, connecting it with the shore, from which it is distant 3 cables.

The Doughboy lies E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 1 mile from Cape Wickham. There is a passage of deep water between it and the Navarine Reef, but the tide often runs very strong and causes a nasty rip. The passage is not recommended.

SOUNDINGS.—(See remarks in sailing directions for coast from Glenelg River to Cape Otway.)

At 25 and 30 miles west of King Island the bank of soundings drops very suddenly from about 60 or 70 fathoms to over 100 fathoms, no bottom. Inshore of 60 fathoms the bottom is rather irregular.

The 30-fathom line, commencing at about 4 miles N.W. of Cape Wickham, just outside the Harbinger Rocks, follows the curve of the shore and passes the New-Year Islands at only 1 mile's distance; thence down the west coast of King Island at about 3 miles from the shore, until at 5 miles N.W. of Netherby Point it is distant 5 miles from the coast adjacent. Here 21 and 22 fathoms were found with much foul ground leading to the rocky patch of 6 fathoms already described. Thence the 30-fathom line approaches the shore to within 3 miles of Netherby Point, increasing its distance from the shore to 4 miles, but again nearing the land at Cataraque Point, where it is only distant 1 mile. At Surprise Point it is distant only $\frac{1}{4}$ a mile, and at Stokes Point nearly a mile, from whence it becomes a very irregular line, trending first easterly, and then towards the Reid Rocks. W. by S. of Stokes Point there is a rocky patch, but not less than 10 fathoms of water. It is not unlikely that the sea breaks here in bad weather.

On the east side of King Island the water is never so deep as 30 fathoms. 21 miles to the eastward of Sea Elephant Bay is 25 fathoms sand, and 23 miles to the eastward of Lavinia Point is 24 fathoms fine white sand. From these positions towards the shore the water would appear to shoal very gradually, while offshore it would appear to deepen as gradually. To the northward of the island the 30-fathom line is 2 miles north from Cape Wickham, passes the Navarine Reef at 1 mile's distance, and trends easterly.

CURRENTS AND TIDES.—Off Cape Wickham there is occasionally a very strong current, which may be more correctly termed a tidal stream, accelerated by the wind. Close to the Cape this current is said to run occasionally as much as 5 knots, but 2 is the ordinary velocity at spring tides. It loses in force as its distance from the shore is increased, and was scarcely felt at all at a distance of 6 miles. It is probable that a westerly gale will keep up the flood stream, which sets here to the eastward, and that an easterly gale will have an opposite effect.

Upon the west coast of King Island an unaccountable current was often found setting to the north-westward. Southward and westward of King Island the currents, or tidal streams, were baffling. They are known at times to be very strong; but as they were never experienced of any strength during the survey, it is certain that they have no regularity, and therefore owe their force and direction to the wind.

Sealers report that, in the strait between King Island and Tasmania, a current will be found setting eastward during easterly weather. If this is so in the centre of the strait, it is likely that inshore on both sides there is a stream setting in an opposite direction.

TORRES STRAIT AND SOUTH-EAST COAST OF NEW GUINEA.

The following information relating to the navigation of Torres Strait, and to the south-east coast of New Guinea, is from the Reports and Surveys of Captain John Moresby, R.N., and the officers of H.M.S. *Basilisk*, 1873.*

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation 6° Easterly in 1873.]

TORRES STRAIT.

Caution.—In navigating the northern parts of Torres Strait during the N.W. monsoon, the water is frequently so discolored (probably by the fresh water from the New Guinea rivers) that the eye is unable to detect the positions of the shoals. Mariners are cautioned accordingly.

Basilisk Bank, upon which H.M.S. *Basilisk* grounded in 1873, in the eastern entrance of Bligh Channel, Torres Strait, lies 3½ miles E. by S. ½ S. from Passage Islet; and in lat. 10° N., long. 142° 17' 30" E. There are from 7 to 8 feet on the shoal at low-water springs; in rough south-easterly weather the sea is reported to break on it; and near the danger the ebb tide sets E. by S. at the rate of 2½ knots per hour, the flood W. by N., but with less force.

From the ship, when aground, Possession Islet bore S.S.E. ½ E., Passage Islet W. by N. ½ N., Banks Peak S. by E. ½ E., and Bond Islet S. by W. ½ W.

The bank is nearly one mile and a half long, in an east and west direction, and about half a mile in breadth, with from 1½ to 3 fathoms on it; but being composed of light sand and mud, is liable to change its form and extent during heavy gales.

The passage between Basilisk Bank and the shoal which lies south-east of Passage Islet should not be used by large vessels until it has been more accurately surveyed.

The shoal south-eastward of Passage Islet is liable to shift in south-east gales; and it is uncertain what width of channel exists between Basilisk Bank and Providence Shoal.

Vessels from the eastward are therefore recommended to pass between Possession Islet and Providence Shoal, keeping in mind that the tide runs with great strength, rendering the frequent ascertaining of the ship's position by cross bearings necessary.

Jervis Island.—Philip Harbor is formed at the east end of Jervis Island. In consequence of the unsurveyed waters and strong tides, Philip Harbor must be approached with caution. The *Basilisk* anchored about one mile off shore, but the spring tides were found to run about 5 knots, causing the ship to drag.

It is recommended that a berth should be taken nearer the south-east shore of Jervis Island, where there is considerably less tide.

A small supply of indifferent water is to be found on the island.

Belle Vue Islands are a group of detached wooded islands off the north shore of Jervis Island; they are surrounded by extensive reefs, through which a boat passage exists. Tides run with unusual strength through the group.

Tiwan Island.—A clear deep water passage exists between Gabba and Tiwan Islands. But when steering for Tiwan Island, Mount Cornwallis, the peak of that island, should not be brought to bear to the westward of north, as the water shoals to the eastward.

Fresh water may be found on Tiwan Island throughout the dry season.

Cocoa-nut Isle.—A remarkably snug boat harbor during the N.W. monsoon is to be found off the west end of this isle, inside the reef, which can be crossed in from 3 or 4 feet of water at low tides.

The isle is without fresh water; the natives procuring their supply from Sue Islet.

Darnley Island.—H.M.S. *Basilisk* anchored off the reef on the west side of this island, near the principal village, in which the native missionary teachers live, and the Beech de Mer smoking building is established. In February an abundant supply of fresh water was found, but difficult to obtain, on account of the great extent of shore reef.

This is the only island in Torres Strait where the sago palm has been seen; it grows very luxuriantly at the head of a well-watered cocoa-nut grove belonging to the native teachers.

Murray Island.—The passage between Darnley and Murray islands should be used with great caution, and only during clear weather, choosing, if possible, low water or half tide for passing the eastern reefs, before hauling up to the eastward.

The *Basilisk* anchored off Murray Island in 25 fathoms sand and shells, with the extremes of the island bearing from S. ½ E. to S.W. ½ W. During the S.E. monsoon, a vessel might anchor nearer the shore with advantage.

The missionary teacher's and the Beech de Mer establishments are situated on the west side of the island, round which

the tide sweeps with great force, especially between Maer and Dowar islands.

Natives.—The Torres Strait islanders are well acquainted with white men, and are friendly disposed towards them; the Pearl shell, and Beech de Mer traders having worked amongst them for six years, and occupied stations on many of the islands.

Solitary white men live in security on the islands for months at a time, with quantities of trade and other articles, of great value to the natives, often not protected by either a lock or key.

No danger need now to be apprehended from these islanders as long as their domestic rights are respected.

NEW GUINEA—SOUTH-EAST COAST.

Redscar Bay.—Redscar Head bears from Cape Suckling S.E. ½ E., distant 25 miles; the coast between receding 6 miles forms Redscar Bay, in the depth of which is Towtou opening. The *Basilisk* anchored in Redscar Bay in 7 fathoms mud on the following bearings:—Skittle Rocks N.W. ½ N., Towtou opening N.E. by E. ½ E., distant 3½ miles. At 2½ cables inside this position the bank shoaled rapidly to 4 and 3 fathoms.

It is therefore recommended that a ship drawing more than 18 feet should not anchor in less than 8 or 9 fathoms, as a heavy sea gets up with a strong breeze.

From the *Basilisk's* anchorage to the shore an uninterrupted bank extends, on which, with the wind against the tide, there is a dangerous sea for a boat. This anchorage is more convenient than that under Redscar Head for communicating with the mission station at Towtou opening.

Redscar Hill is about 3 miles to the eastward of Redscar Head, and when made from the southward appears quoin shaped, but when made from the northward and westward the hill appears more rounded.

Drift timber and discolored water.—Off the coast westward of Cape Suckling large quantities of drift wood are sometimes seen, which in the early morning may be mistaken for reefs; the sea also has a discolored, muddy appearance.

Galley Reach, about 3 cables wide, in which there are from 5 to 8 fathoms, extends 6 or 7 miles from Towtou opening in a N.E. by N. direction, terminating in an extensive, densely wooded, mangrove swamp.

Edith River empties itself into Galley Reach, at 4 miles from Towtou opening, and is, when above the influence of the tide, a very rapid winding stream from 20 to 40 yards in width, with an average depth of 10 feet. This river was ascended about 10 miles, through low swampy ground; the country then changed to undulating spurs, but the rapidity of the current and the quantity of uprooted trees and snags prevented a further advance.

Usborne River.—This river, which falls into Towtou opening, is about 30 yards broad, with an average depth of 12 feet, for about 14 miles above the mission. Above the confluence of Lily River the current is very rapid, a boat scarcely being able to stem it, and one mile further up the whole course of the river is blocked by rafts of trees, forming vegetated islands, under which the river rushes violently. The country at this point was comparatively open, with small hills.

Four days were spent in examining these rivers without meeting a single canoe, or a sign of natives anywhere. But at Towtou village the natives spoke of a very warlike tribe who lived some miles up one of the rivers.

Caution Bay, studded with dangerous reefs and outlying patches, and fronted by Cliff and Aplin islands, lies between Redscar Head and Cliff Point, which is 10 miles south-east of it. The soundings are irregular, varying from 15 fathoms to 3½ fathoms, without any apparent change in the color of the water; but a safe channel from Redscar Head to the eastward, inside the Barrier Reef, may be found by following the sweep of Caution Bay at a distance of about 2 miles from the shore, and passing within half a mile of Cliff Point; on this passage the least water obtained by the *Basilisk* was 4 fathoms.

From Cliff Point to Port Moresby, about 9 miles to the south-eastward, the reefs are plainly visible, and well defined in clear weather from the masthead. The least water found was 5 fathoms, off the south-west end of Lily Island, which should be given a wide berth, as the water shoals rapidly round it.

Basilisk Passage.—The Fisherman Islands lie 9 miles S.E. by S. from Cliff Point; and at 3 miles to the eastward of Fisherman Islands is Basilisk Passage, about three-quarters of a mile in width, and clearly visible between the reefs which break on either side. A course N.E. ½ E. leads through, no bottom being obtained at 21 fathoms. Inside the passage there is a small 5-fathom patch, but the water immediately deepens, and 11 to 12 fathoms may be carried into Port Moresby.

Lily Island.—This island, lying one mile and a half off shore and about 3½ miles N.N.W. of the centre of the large Fisherman Island, is 2 miles in circumference, low, wooded, fringed with extensive shoals, and between the island and the shore are patches which dry at low water.

Palli-palli Point, the western entrance point of Port Moresby, is 17 miles south-east of Redscar Head; off Palli-palli Point there are two islands which from seaward appear as part of the point. The larger of these islands is named Mourilyan Island, and the other Elizabeth Island.

Elizabeth Island is formed by two abrupt hills, about 180 feet in height, connected by a coral beach which covers at high tides. The island is about one mile in circumference, and is surrounded by a small shore reef; a narrow passage, in which 4 fathoms were found, separates Elizabeth Island from Mourilyan Island.

Mourilyan Island is about 800 feet high, grassy, sprinkled with trees, about 3 miles in circumference, and separated from Palli-palli Point by a boat channel full of coral patches and rocks.

Port Moresby.—The entrance to Port Moresby is between Palli-Palli Point and Paga Point, which is about 2 miles to the eastward of it.

The port can be approached by the inshore passage from Redscar Head, but this route is only recommended for steam vessels, or small sailing vessels. A clear deep channel also leads from Basilisk Passage into the port, a depth of 12 and 10 fathoms being carried. After passing Mourilyan Island a good look-out must be kept for the coral patch, which lies about 3 cables off the west shore, and about half a mile S. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. of the south-west point of Jane Island. The eastern shore of Port Moresby is fringed by a reef extending nearly one mile from the shore, and entirely blocking up the passage between Jane Island and the main land to the eastward of it.

Fairfax Harbor.—A channel nearly half a mile wide to the west of Jane Island, with 8 and 9 fathoms, leads into Fairfax Harbor, which is land-locked, with extensive anchorage ground for a large number of ships, in 5 fathoms. The north-west arm of the harbor is shoal, and the shores are fringed with coral reefs. Although high land surrounds the harbor, the only available water found was in water-holes on the grassy valley which lies on the north-west side of the harbor, in the rear of mangrove bushes. Boats can obtain water from one of these water-holes, whose position is distinctly marked by a narrow clear opening in the mangrove bushes leading to the valley, but at low tide a great length of hose would be required.

Pigeons and wallaby abound in the neighborhood.

Jane Island, a bold conical island about 600 feet in height, situated about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles within the entrance point of Port Moresby, forms a good leading mark for that port at all times. A village is situated on its north side, and the natives have a good well of water.

Boatless Inlet is immediately to the eastward of Pyramid Point, 7 miles E.S.E. of Port Moresby; but the entrance is so blocked up with reefs that no advantage could be taken of the deep water inside.

Head Islands are a group of small detached islands lying about 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles to the eastward of Pyramid Point.

Pyramid Point to Hood Point.—Soundings, with no bottom at 10 fathoms, were found on a S.E. by E. course for about 7 miles from Pyramid Point to Bayswater Point; and continued from there on a S.E. course about 20 miles to Round Head.

A course S.E. by E. about 18 miles from Round Head to Hood Point, passing, but not nearing Paira Point, would be apparently a safe passage with not less than 7 fathoms.

No safe channel exists from Hood Point to Hood Lagoon, and it would be dangerous for a ship to attempt to proceed beyond Hood Point inside the reef. The point which separates the bay from the lagoon is foul for one mile and a half off.

Coast from Cliff Point to Hood Point.—The general appearance of this country is a succession of abrupt, round-topped, grassy hills, sprinkled with trees, and bearing a striking resemblance to each other. They rise directly from the beach to an average height of 500 or 600 feet, and are backed by a higher range. The valleys are fertile, well wooded, and composed of a peaty, black, alluvial soil, which appears to absorb the water, for none was seen discharging itself into the sea.

Numerous bright green spots on the side of the steeper hills might easily be mistaken for water-falls when the sun is shining on them.

The only water noticed along the whole coast was at one mile and a half to the northward of Round Head, and half a mile from the beach, where there were two mounds with large water-holes on their tops. The bay between Hood and Paira points contains two villages, built partly in the water; the ground is low with hills beyond.

Paira Point to Round Head forms another bay with the appearance of fresh-water creeks, has a village on the hills, and another one at the water's edge.

Natives.—The whole extent of coast above referred to is dotted with numerous villages, many containing an estimated population of from four to five hundred.

The natives are apparently of Malay descent, copper colored, but with the frizzled hair of the Papuan. Like the Malays, their houses are built upon tall poles, sometimes standing far out on the reefs. Their villages on the hills, surrounded by rudely cultivated ground, have a very picturesque appearance.

A more friendly, quiet race of people could not be met with; during three weeks' stay amongst them not a native was seen armed, and whether the boats were absent on detached service, or in the presence of the ship, the natives were equally harmless. Hostilities also appear to be unknown amongst themselves, their canoes, quite unarmed, traversing the coast and calling at the different villages in the most friendly manner.

So far as could be ascertained, they had never before seen white men; they were perfectly unacquainted with the use of iron, white glass bottles or red beads being the only articles of trade they appeared to value.

(1) Reported danger near Cape Melville.

The Colonial Government of Queensland has given notice that the master of the schooner *Hannah Broomfield* reports having struck upon a mushroom-shaped coral patch in the inner route near Cape Melville.

This danger, *Broomfield Rock*, has about 4 feet over it at low water, and 15 fathoms close to; from it Cape Melville bears W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., Barrow Point S. by E.; and Rocky Point S.W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. These bearings place the danger in lat. $14^{\circ} 12' 40''$ S., long. $144^{\circ} 40' 30''$ E.

QUEENSLAND.

(2) Temporary Light, Burnett River.

Also, that a temporary fixed white light, visible seaward between the bearings S.E. and N.W., is now exhibited from the pilot station on the south head of Burnett-River, which in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 9 miles. Position: lat. $24^{\circ} 45'$ S., long. $152^{\circ} 25'$ E.

(3) Reported danger between Percy Isles and h. h. Group.

Also, that the master of the vessel *Enterprise* reports having at low water observed breakers upon what appeared to be a sunken danger, between Percy Isles and h. h. Group, and nearly midway between Sphinx Isles and h. 2 Island. Position: Pine-Peak E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N., and h. 2 Island bluff W.S.W. (southerly) and Pradhoe Island nearly in a line with the south-east islet of the Beverley group N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. These bearings place the reported danger in lat. $21^{\circ} 34' 20''$ S., long. $150^{\circ} 4' 30''$ E.

VICTORIA—PORT PHILLIP.

(4) Leading Lights for South Channel.

With reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 31, dated 29th March 1873, on the intended establishment of leading lights for the South Channel, Port Phillip—

The Colonial Government has given further notice, that from the 1st September 1873 the eastern or inner light would be exhibited at the end of the jetty at Dromana. The light is a fixed green light, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 4 miles.

Also, that the erection of the pile lighthouse at No. 10 buoy would necessitate the removal of that buoy from the same date.

BYE-LAW NO. XII. OF THE MINING BOARD OF THE MINING DISTRICT OF BALLARAT.

At a Meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Ballarat, begun and holden at Ballarat, in the said district, on the Eighth day of December One thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, it is ordained by the said Board as follows, that is to say:—

1. *Claims shall pay rates.*—That for the purpose of enforcing and regulating the drainage of quartz reefs and of claims occupied under any bye-law of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Ballarat heretofore or hereafter to be made, and of lands held under gold mining or mineral leases heretofore or hereafter to be granted, and for imposing on such claims and lands, and on the plant and machinery belonging thereto, such reasonable and periodical rates or contributions as shall be necessary for the purposes aforesaid—such rates or contributions are hereby imposed upon all claims or lands as aforesaid within the areas described in the schedule hereto numbered 1; and upon all plant or machinery upon or belonging thereto, as shall, in the aggregate, be sufficient to pay the cost of draining such claims and lands.

2. *Cost of draining.*—That the cost of draining the claims and lands within the areas aforesaid shall be made up of and comprise—(a) the cost for the time being of working the machinery and appliances used for the purpose of draining such claims or lands less the amount (if any) realized from the sale of the water raised from such claims and lands; (b) the cost for the time being of keeping such machinery and appliances in repair; and (c) interest upon the original cost of such machinery and appliances, computed at the rate of £10 per centum per annum.

3. *Persons entitled to rates.*—That the person, persons or company who shall sink, or owner or owners of any shaft which shall have been sunk within the areas aforesaid sufficiently deep to drain the water from the claims or lands as aforesaid within such areas, or from any quartz reef or lode, or from any alluvial lead, drift, or deposit, within such claims or lands, and shall have fixed or fitted pumps, tank or tanks, into such shaft, and erected efficient steam machinery in connection therewith, capable of raising or lifting the water drawn from such claims or lands, or from any reef, lode, lead, drift, or deposit as aforesaid therein, and shall have constantly (unavoidable delays excepted) employed such pumps or tanks and machinery in raising or lifting such water, shall be entitled to receive from the holder or holders, owner or owners, or occupier or occupiers (including in these terms any mortgagee in possession) of such claims and lands as aforesaid, the rates or contributions hereinbefore mentioned.

4. *Rates, how ascertained.*—That for the purpose of ascertaining the amount of rates or contributions that should be paid in respect of each claim, and of each piece or parcel of land held under gold mining or mineral lease, the cost as defined in the clause hereto numbered 2, of draining the claims and lands within the areas aforesaid, shall be decided by the aggregate number of acres in such claims and lands, and the result multiplied by the number of acres in each claim, or in each piece or parcel of land, shall be the amount of rates or contributions payable in respect thereof; and such rates or contributions shall be payable monthly, quarterly, half-yearly, or annually, at the will of the person, persons, or company or owner or owners entitled as aforesaid to receive them.

5. *Rates shall be paid.*—On demand made by the officer or officers appointed or to be appointed by this Board for the collection of rates or contributions to be levied under this bye-law, the holder or holders, owner or owners, or occupier or occupiers (including in these terms any mortgagee in possession) for the time being of each claim, or of each piece or parcel of land held under gold mining or mineral lease within the areas aforesaid shall pay to such officer or officers as aforesaid such rates or contributions as shall at the date of such demand be due in respect of the claim or land as aforesaid, and such officer or officers as aforesaid shall receive as salary for collecting such rates or contributions ten (10) per centum of all such rates or contributions collected by such officer or officers.

6. *Rates may be recovered.*—That any rates or contributions which may be due in respect of any claim or land as aforesaid, and which shall not be paid on demand, may be recovered as provided in *The Mining Statute 1865*, and for the purpose of enforcing and recovering payment of such rates or contributions, the person, persons, or company or owner or owners as aforesaid, may be required to prove that he or they has or have sunk a shaft sufficiently deep to drain the water from the claim or land in respect of which the rates or contributions are said to be due, and that he or they has or have erected and worked pumping apparatus or tank or tanks

capable of drawing the water from such shaft; but he or they shall not be required to prove that he or they has or have drained the water from the claim or land in respect of which such rates or contributions are said to be due. And the holder or holders, owner or owners, or occupier or occupiers (including in these terms any mortgagee in possession) for the time being of the claim or land in respect of which such rates or contributions are said to be due, shall be adjudged liable to pay such rates or contributions, unless he or they prove that such rates or contributions have been paid, or that his or their claim or land has not been drained by means of the shaft and pumping apparatus, or tank or tanks aforesaid.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir George Ferguson Bowen, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor may make and proclaim reserves for the preservation and growth of timber, and may from time to time, after one month's notice shall be given in the *Government Gazette*, alter and revoke any such proclamation, and the Board of Land and Works may issue licenses to cut timber upon such reserve or any part thereof on such terms and conditions, and subject to the payment of such license fee, as shall from time to time be approved of by the Governor and be set forth in such license: And whereas due notice has been given of the intention to alter the Proclamation of the timber reserve called the Grampian State Forest and to diminish the same: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, in accordance with and subject to the provisions of the 53rd section of the above-recited Act, do hereby alter the Proclamation of the timber reserve designated the Grampian State Forest bearing date the twenty-seventh day of May 1872, and do diminish such timber reserve by deducting therefrom One hundred acres of land, which have been applied for by George Stephens; and also sixty-four acres one rood and twenty-eight perches of land which have been applied for by R. Ridgwell.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir George Ferguson Bowen, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor may divide into counties the territory not already included in any county, and may also subdivide any county into parishes and towns, and may divide into parishes and towns any territory not included in any county, and by proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette* may define the boundaries of such counties, parishes, or towns, and may distinguish each by a name; and after such proclamation the territory comprised within the boundaries of any of the said divisions shall thenceforward be recognized as a county, parish, or town, by the name so given as aforesaid; the Governor may from time to time at the request of the council of any shire or borough alter by proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette* the name of any such shire or borough, and may also from time to time by proclamation as aforesaid alter the name of any county, parish, town, township, land, area, goldfield, river, harbor, lake, bay, lagoon, swamp, mountain, glen, or other place or locality whatsoever within Victoria: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby define the boundaries of the Town hereinafter described, that is to say:—

TOWNSHIP OF NUMBIE MUNJIE.—County of Tambo, parish of Numbie Munjie: Commencing at the north-east angle of allotment 21; thence by the northern boundaries of that allotment and special allotments 5 and 3 to Little River; thence across that river; thence up that river to the north boundary of allotment 29; thence west thirty-five chains seventy links; thence by a line and allotment 32 bearing south eighty chains; thence east about eighty-six chains to the aforesaid river; again by that river upwards to the north boundary of a reserve under the 110th section; thence east about thirty-eight chains fifty links to the east boundary of allotment 21, and thence north about fifty-two chains to the commencing point.—(74.O.10830.)

Except as to all matters done, rights acquired, and obligations incurred thereunder, Clause 1 of the Regulations contained in chapter xvii. of the Regulations made by the Governor in Council on the 26th day of May 1873 is hereby rescinded so far as the same relates to the form contained in Schedule xxxvii. of the said Regulations, and in lieu thereof the form contained in the schedule herewith shall be the form of certificate for improvements under section 20 of *The Land Act 1869*.

And the Honorable James Joseph Casey, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Crown Lands and Survey for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS under the provisions of the 17th section of the Boroughs Statute, the council of any city, town, or borough, established under the said statute, may from time to time as shall to them seem fit, make bye-laws for the preservation of public decency, and for any of the purposes for which the several subdivisions of the twelfth schedule of the said statute are intended to provide, one of which is to make regulations for and with respect to the time and place of bathing at or within such part, and according to the sex of the persons bathing or otherwise, and also as to persons resorting to or passing by such part, whether by land or water, and for the stands of bathing-machines, and otherwise for securing reasonable privacy for bathers and the observance of decency: And whereas it is expedient to make better provision for the regulation of bathing upon the sea shore on that portion of the sea shore within the limits of the town of Emerald Hill, the council of the town of Emerald Hill ordain as follows, that is to say—

1. Bye-law No. 9, for the regulation of bathing on the sea coast, shall be and the same is hereby repealed.
 2. No male person shall bathe from the portion of the beach set apart for females, nor linger about such portion of the beach when the place is occupied by females either bathing, apparently about to bathe, or having just bathed.
 3. No person shall bathe from any portion of the beach within the limits of the town of Emerald Hill, except as follows:—On Sundays, before the hour of Eleven o'clock in the forenoon only; and on other days, before the hour of Eleven o'clock in the forenoon and after the hour of Five o'clock in the afternoon only.
 4. Any person contravening any of the provisions of this Bye-law shall, on conviction thereof, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Five pounds.
