Of the reported deaths, 71, or 55 per cent., were children not exceeding the age of 3 years; 46, or about 33½ per cent., being under the age of 1 year, and the remaining 25, or rather more than 19 per cent., being of the ages of 1 to 3

years.
The most fruitful causes of death among children were diarrhose, measles, and teething.
A few cases of scarlet fever are reported by the Deputy-Registrar for Prahma, but no deaths therefrom.
At Kew I death occurred in the Lunatic Asylum, at South Meibourne 12 deaths occurred in public institutions, and at Prahman 3 deaths occurred in the Alfred Hospital.

The births of 724 children, viz., 366 boys and 358 girls, were registered in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of January. In the month of December 681 births were registered, or 43 less than in the month under review.

The deaths in January numbered 992, viz., 511 of males and 481 of females; this was the largest number ever recorded in Melbourne and suburbs during one month. The month under notice was one of the very few occasions in which the deaths in the district exceeded the births. This they did by 268. The deaths exceeded those in December by 333, and exceeded the average of January during the previous ten years by 555. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, the excess over the average of January will be found to be reduced to 455.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 110-4° on the 20th and the lowest was 46:9° on the 14th. The mean temperature of the month (66:7°) was more than half a degree above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (48:8°) took place on the 18th, viz., from a maximum of 59:0° to a minimum of 50:2°. The least range (8:5°) was on the 7th, viz., from a maximum of 66:3° to a minimum of 57:8°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29:788 inches) was a little below the average.

Fifteen persons of the age of 75 years or upwards died during the month, viz. —Two laborers aged 75 and 76 respectively of dysentery; a soldier aged 77, and a painter aged 79, of asthma; a laborer aged 77 of the effects of an injury to the foot; a female aged 79 of cancer; a saddler aged 85 of brain disease; a female aged 85 of paralysis; a shoemaker aged 81, a male servant aged 87, and five females aged respectively 75, 77, 82, 83, and 89, of old age.

The deaths from external causes during the month amounted to 39, a number much above the average. This was mainly owing to the fact that no less than twenty-six persons succumbed to insolatio, consequent on the ex

One hundred and twenty-three deaths, or 12 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—51 in the Melbourne Hospital; 6 in the Immigrants' Home; 2 in the Children's Hospital; 11 in the Alfred Hospital; 11 in the Lying-in Hospital; 13 in the Benevolent Asylum; 9 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum; 13 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum; 1 in the Melbourne Gaol; 2 in the Melbourne Industrial School; and 4 in St. Vincent de Paul's Orphanage.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 659, of which 839, or 51 per cent., were of males; and 320, or 49 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 345 were under one year of age, 192 were between one and two, 71 were between two and three, 29 were between three and four, and 22 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 333. Of these, 172, or 52 per cent., were males and 161, or 48 per cent., were females; 41 were between five and ten, 18 were between ten and fifteen, 16 were between fitteen and twenty, 29 were between twenty and twenty-five, 17 were between twenty-five and thirty, 33 were between thirty and thirty-five, 21 were between thirty-five and forty, 30 were between forty and forty-five, 22 were between forty-five and fifty, 23 were between fifty-five, 19 were between sixty and sixty-five, 13 were between sixty-five and seventy, 15 were between seventy and seventy, 8 were between seventy-five and eighty, 7 were upwards of eighty, and 1 was of age unknown.

Next to that from measles the greatest mortality was due to diarrhea and dysentery, which occasioned 151 deaths, as against about half that number (76) in December. The mortality was also very high from diseases of the nervous system, which caused 118 deaths, as against 50 in December; also from atrophy and debility of infants, which caused 60 deaths, as against 38 in December. Deaths from childbirth and metria were likewise still above the average, the number being 9, or a proportion of 1 to every 80 births registered. Deaths from phthisis were below the average, and numbered 32, as against 48 in December.

Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and may be forwarded (if by post, prepaid) addressed to the Honorable the Postmaster-General, with the words "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails" endorsed on the cover, or placed in the tender-box at the General Post Office.

Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire services called for. The amount of the tender must be stated in words as well as figures.

Every tender must bear the bond fide signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount

to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to Ten per Cent of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient. The money deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, on the bond and contract being completed.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them on application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.

In the event of a portion of railway affecting any particular service being opened for traffic during period of contract, and it being decided that the mails shall be conveyed by rail, the place of departure for the mail coaches shall be altered in such way as the Postmaster-General may from time to time

direct; a rateable reduction shall be made in the amount paid for the service as then rendered by the contractors, such reduction to be computed on the basis of the average mileage rate of the lump tender or the average mileage rate of the single tender, in whichever form the tender may be accepted. Persons tendering are requested to state the description of the vehicle they intend to use, and the number of horses by which it is to be drawn.

A separate tender must be sent in for each service; but notwithstanding this condition, any offer will be entertained for the performance of any number of services for a lump sum. The number of the service or services tendered for must be plainly endorsed on the outside of the cover and on the tender itself.
