Of the reported deaths, 71, or 55 per cent., were children not exceeding the age of 3 years; 46, or about 35 per cent., being under the age of 1 year, and the remaining 25, or rather more than 19 per cent., being of the ages of 1 to 3 years.

The most fruitful causes of death among children were diarrhoea, measles, and teething.

A few cases of scarlet fever are reported by the Deputy-Registrar for Prahran, but no deaths thereby.

At Kew 1 death occurred in the Lunatic Asylum, at South Melbourne 12 deaths occurred in public institutions, and at Prahran 3 deaths occurred in the Alfred Hospital.

The births of 724 children, viz., 366 boys and 358 girls, were registered in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of January. In the month of December 681 births were registered, or 43 less than in the month under review.

The deaths in January numbered 992, viz., 511 of males and 481 of females; this was the largest number ever recorded in Melbourne and suburbs during one month. The month under notice was one of the very few occasions in which the deaths in the district exceeded the births. This they did by 268. The deaths exceeded those in December by 333, and exceeded the average of January during the previous ten years by 555. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, the excess over the average of January will be found to be reduced to 455.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 110.4° on the 20th, and the lowest was 46.9° on the 14th. The mean temperature of the month (66.7°) was more than half a degree above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (48.8°) took place on the 18th, viz., from a maximum of 99.0° to a minimum of 50.2°. The least range (8.5°) was on the 7th, viz., from a maximum of 66.3° to a minimum of 57.8°. The mean daily range was 24.5°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.738 inches) was a little below the average.

Fifteen persons of the age of 75 years or upwards died during the month, viz.:—Two laborers aged 75 and 76 respectively of dysentery; a soldier aged 77, and a painter aged 79, of asthma; a laborer aged 77 of the effects of an injury to the foot; a female aged 79 of cancer; a saddler aged 85 of brain disease; a female aged 85 of paralysis; a shoemaker aged 81, a male servant aged 87, and five females aged respectively 75, 77, 82, 83, and 83, of old age.

The deaths from external causes during the month amounted to 39, a number much above the average. This was mainly owing to the fact that no less than twenty-six persons succumbed to insolation, consequent on the extreme heat of five successive days, during which the thermometer averaged 105.6° and reached a maximum of 110.4° in the shade. Of the total deaths from external causes, 37 were set down as accidental and 2 as suicidal. The particulars are as follow:—A laborer aged 77 died of the effects of an injury to the foot; two laborers aged 48 and 49 respectively were accidentally crushed to death; an infant aged 12 days died of umbilical hæmorrhage; a female aged 58 died of burns; twenty-six persons died of insolation, viz.:—three male children aged respectively 34 weeks, 1 and 2 years; nine female children aged respectively 2, 13, 20, 21, 30, 34, 39, and 40 weeks, and 1½ years; five adult females aged respectively 31, 37, 40, 43, and 72 years; and nine adult males—a coachman aged 28, a farm laborer aged 35, a master mariner aged 35, a groom aged 40, a laborer aged 41, a shipwright and carpenter each aged 54, a fisherman aged 71, and a man, of occupation not stated, aged about 50; five persons were accidentally drowned, viz.:—a bootmaker aged 22, and a seaman aged 25, by the upsetting of a boat in the Yarra, a seaman aged 41 in Hobson's Bay, a boy aged 11 while bathing in a water-hole, and a girl aged 3 at Borooandara; a female infant aged 8 days was accidentally suffocated in its mother's arms. A female servant aged 30 committed suicide by drowning; and a man, of occupation not stated, poisoned himself with strychnine.

One hundred and twenty-three deaths, or 12 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—51 in the Melbourne Hospital; 6 in the Immigrants' Home; 2 in the Children's Hospital; 11 in the Alfred Hospital; 11 in the Lying-in Hospital; 13 in the Benevolent Asylum; 9 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum; 13 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum; 1 in the Melbourne Gaol; 2 in the Melbourne Industrial School; and 4 in St. Vincent de Paul's Orphanage.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 653, of which 339, or 51 per cent., were of males; and 320, or 49 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 345 were under one year of age, 192 were between one and two, 71 were between two and three, 29 were between three and four, and 22 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 333. Of these, 172, or 52 per cent., were males and 161, or 48 per cent., were females; 41 were between five and ten, 18 were between ten and fifteen, 16 were between fifteen and twenty, 29 were between twenty and twenty-five, 17 were between twenty-five and thirty, 33 were between thirty and thirty-five, 21 were between thirty-five and forty, 30 were between forty and forty-five, 22 were between forty-five and fifty, 23 were between fifty and fifty-five, 19 were between fifty-five and sixty, 20 were between sixty and sixty-five, 13 were between sixty-five and seventy, 15 were between seventy and seventy-five, 8 were between seventy-five and eighty, 7 were upwards of eighty, and 1 was of age unknown.

By far the most fatal complaint was measles, which from the date of its first outbreak to the end of January has caused the following deaths in the city and suburbs:—

Next to that from measles the greatest mortality was due to diarrhoea and dysentery, which occasioned 151 deaths, as against about half that number (76) in December. The mortality was also very high from diseases of the nervous system, which caused 118 deaths, as against 50 in December; also from atrophy and debility of infants, which caused 60 deaths, as against 38 in December. Deaths from childbirth and metria were likewise still above the average, the number being 9, or a proportion of 1 to every 80 births registered. Deaths from phthisis were below the average, and numbered 32, as against 48 in December.

*Pursuant to Orders of 23 December 1874.*

**BRENAH QUARANTINE DISTRICT** (including Brennah and Coyocora Springs runs).—Commencing at the north-west angle of Cato's run; thence by that run south-easterly to the northern boundary of the Glenalbyn run; thence by that run westerly and southerly to the Kingower run; thence by the northern and western boundaries of that run to the Bealiba run; thence by the northern and western boundaries of that run, westerly and southerly to the eastern boundary of the Avoca Forest East run; thence by that run north-westerly to the southern boundary of the Spring Hill run; thence by that run north-easterly and northerly to the southern boundary of Torpichen run; thence by that run north-easterly to Powlett's Plains run; and thence by that run, and the Salisbury Plains run, south-easterly to the point of commencement.

The wood is to be split out of large forest timber (of suitable quality for lighting engine fires) into billets of convenient sizes for the use of the engines, and is to be cut into billets of 2 feet in length, and no small branches will be received.

The whole of the firewood, when delivered, is to be stacked where pointed out, at the contractor's expense, in stacks of

such sizes as will be directed, ready for measurement. The stacks are to be 2 feet wide by 5 feet high, with space between each stack for measuring, and the billets are all to lie the same way, viz., crossways of the stacks, in the form of a cord, and are to be laid as closely and solidly as possible in the stack.

The wood for the locomotive engines is to be stacked on the station grounds as aforesaid, but that required for the pumping engines will have to be delivered at the pumping engines, and stacked inside the fence.

A separate price is to be stated for delivery at each station, and tenderers must specify the description of wood, and, if mixed, in what proportion of kind; the date of commencing and completing delivery must also be given.

Tenderers are to state the price at per ton of 50 cubic feet. No wood will be measured until it shall have been stacked fourteen days, so as to have settled down, and must then stand 5 feet high by 2 feet wide.

Tenders must be upon the printed forms, and no tender by telegram will be received.

Security will be required to the amount of Ten per cent. on the total amount of the contract, either in Government debentures, bank deposit receipt, or cash deposit, as the tenderer may elect. The security must be completed within ten days of the acceptance of tender, failing which the contract may be again advertised, or another tender accepted.

Tenders must be accompanied by bank notes, or a bank draft in favor of the Secretary of the Tender Board, for Ten per cent. of the amount of security required, which will be returned within ten days to unsuccessful tenderers. The firewood is to be delivered at each place mentioned herein, and at the rate of at least 100 tons per week, delivery to commence on acceptance of tender.

For each and every week's delay in the delivery beyond the times specified in this contract the Government shall be entitled to deduct, as and for liquidated damages, the sum of Ten pounds sterling.

The Railway Storekeeper shall have full power to reject any wood which he may consider not in accordance with the specification, notice of which will be given to the contractor in writing, stating the reason.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supply as to the quality or kind of timber, the same is to be decided by the General Overseer of Locomotives, whose decision shall be final.

Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

Irregularity in quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor to such mulct, not exceeding Twenty-five pounds for each case, as the Government may direct. Every tender must bear the *bonâ fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfillment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, on the bond and contract being completed.
