MUTUAL SURRENDER OF BRITISH AND HONDURAS FUGITIVE CRIMINALS.

SIR,—I have the honor to transmit to you, for publication in the colony under your Government, a copy of a Treaty between Her Majesty and the President of the Republic of Honduras for the mutual surrender of fugitive criminals, as well as a copy of the Order in Council of the 5th instant, for carrying that Treaty into effect.

PRESENT:

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled *An Act for amending the Law relating to the Extradition of Criminals*, and also by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled *An Act to amend the Extradition Act 1870*, it was amongst other things enacted, that where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operations thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the sixth day of January 1874, between Her Majesty and the President of the Republic of Honduras, for the Mutual Extradition of Fugitive Criminals, which Treaty is in terms following:—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and His Excellency the President of the Republic of Honduras, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice and to the prevention of crime within the two countries and their jurisdictions, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes herein-after enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up, have named as their Plenipotentiaries, to conclude a Treaty for this purpose (that is to say):—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Edwin Corbett, Esq., Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires and Consul-General to said Republic of Honduras, &c.;

And his Excellency the President of the Republic of Honduras, the Señor Don Augustin Gomez Carrillo, Deputy to the present Legislature of Guatemala, &c.;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other those persons who, being accused or convicted of a crime committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party, under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty.

ARTICLE II.

It is agreed that Her Britannic Majesty and His Excellency the President of Honduras shall, on requisition made in their name by their respective Diplomatic Agents, deliver up to each other reciprocally any persons, except native subjects or citizens of the Party upon whom the requisition may be made, who, being accused or convicted, whether as a principal or an accessory, either before or after the fact, any of the crimes hereinafter specified, committed within the jurisdiction of the requiring party, shall be found within the territories of the other Party:—

1. Murder, or attempt or conspiracy to murder.
2. Manslaughter.
3. Counterfeiting or altering money, or uttering counterfeit or altered money.
4. Forgery, counterfeiting or altering, or uttering what is forged or counterfeited or altered.
5. Embezzlement or larceny.
6. Obtaining money or goods by false pretences.
7. Malicious injury to property, if the offence be indictable.
8. Crimes against bankruptcy law.
9. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee or director or member or public officer of any company made criminal by any law for the time being in force.
10. Perjury or subornation of perjury.
11. Rape.
12. Abduction.
13. Child-stealing.
14. False imprisonment.
15. Burglary or housebreaking.
16. Arson.
17. Robbery with violence.
18. Threats by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort.
19. Piracy by law of nations.
20. Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting or conspiring to do so.

Su Majestad la Reyna del Reyno Unido de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, y su Excelencia el Presidente de la República de Honduras, habiendo juzgado conveniente, con la mira de mejorar la administracion de justicia y prevenir los delitos en ambos países y sus jurisdicciones, que las personas acusadas ó convictas de los delitos que en seguida se enumeran, y que anden huyendo de la justicia, sean, bajo ciertas circunstancias, reciprocamente entregadas, han nombrado por sus Plenipotenciarios para concluir una Convencion al efecto:—

Su Majestad la Reyna del Reyno Unido de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, al Señor Don Edwin Corbett, su Encargado de Negocios y Consul-General en la mencionada República de Honduras, &c.;

Y su Excelencia el Señor Presidente de la República de Honduras, al Señor Don Augustin Gomez Carrillo, Diputado á la actual Legislatura Guatemalteca, &c.;

Quienes despues de haberse comunicado sus respectivos plenos poderes, y encontrádoslos en buena y debida forma, han ajustado y concluido los Articulos siguientes:—

ARTICULO I.

Las Altas Partes Contratantes se comprometen á entregarse mutuamente las personas que, acusadas ó convictas de un delito cometido en el territorio de una de las Partes, se encuentren dentro del territorio de la otra Parte, bajo las circunstancias y con las condiciones espresadas en el presente Tratado.

ARTICULO II.

Se ha convenido en que Su Majestad Británica y su Excelencia el Presidente de Honduras, en virtud de requisición hecha á su nombre por sus respectivos Agentes Diplomáticos, se entregarán reciprocamente cualesquiera personas, excepto súbditos nativos ó ciudadanos de la Parte á quien se pide la estradiccion, que siendo acusadas ó convictas, ya sea como principales ó como cómplices antes ó despues del hecho, de alguno de los delitos que aqui se especificarán, cometidos dentro de la jurisdiccion de la Parte requeriente, se encuentren dentro de los territorios de la otra Parte:—

1. Asesinato ó tentativa ó conspiracion para asesinar.
2. Homicidio.
3. Falsificacion ó alteracion de moneda, ó dar circulacion á moneda falsificada ó alterada.
4. Contrahacer, falsificar ó alterar ó poner en circulacion lo que está falsificado, ó contrahecho, ó alterado.
5. Hurto de uso ó hurto simple.
6. Estafu.
7. Perjuicio malicioso á la propiedad, si la ofensa es justificable.
8. Delitos por bancarrotas contra la ley de quiebras.
9. Fraude cometido por un depositario de bienes banquero, mandatario, comisionista, administrador de bienes ajenos, ó miembro ú oficial público de alguna Compañia, considerado el fraude como criminal por alguna ley vigente á la sazón.
10. Perjurio ó soborno para perjurar.
11. Fuerza.
12. Rapto.
13. Hurto de niños (plágio).
14. Prision indebida.
15. Hurto con escalamiento ó fractura, de dia ó durante la noche.
16. Incendio intencional.
17. Robo con violencia.
18. Amenazas por medio de cartas ó de otra manera, con ánimo de estorzonar.
19. Pirateria segun la ley de las naciones.
20. Echar á pique ó destruir un buque en el mar, ó esforzarse ó conspirar para hacerlo.

21. Assaults on board a ship on the high seas with intent to destroy life or to do grievous bodily harm.

22. Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the master.

Provided that the surrender shall be made only when, in the case of a person accused, the commission of the crime shall be so established as that the laws of the country where the fugitive or person so accused shall be found would justify his apprehension and commitment for trial if the crime had been there committed; and, in the case of a person alleged to have been convicted on such evidence as according to the laws of the country where he is found, would prove that he had been convicted.

ARTICLE III.

No Honduran as above stated shall be delivered up by the Government of Honduras to the Government of the United Kingdom, and no subject of the United Kingdom shall be delivered up by the Government thereof to the Government of Honduras.

ARTICLE IV.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of the Government of the United Kingdom, or the person claimed on the part of the Government of Honduras, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial in the territory of the United Kingdom or of Honduras respectively for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of the Government of the United Kingdom, or if the person claimed on the part of the Government of Honduras, should be under examination for any other crime in the territory of the United Kingdom or in the Republic of Honduras respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

ARTICLE V.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequent to the commission of the crime or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applied to.

ARTICLE VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

ARTICLE VII.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made, for any other crime, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place. This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

ARTICLE VIII.

The requisition for extradition shall be made through the Diplomatic Agents of the High Contracting Parties respectively.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A requisition for extradition cannot be founded on sentences passed *in contumaciam*.

ARTICLE IX.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

The prisoner is then to be brought before a competent Magistrate, who is to examine him and to conduct the preliminary investigation of the case, just as if the apprehension had taken place for a crime committed in the same country.

ARTICLE X.

The extradition shall not take place before the expiration of fifteen days from the apprehension, and then only if the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the said State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition.

ARTICLE XI.

In the examination which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as entirely valid evidence the sworn depositions or statements of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, provided such documents are signed and certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of such State, and are authenticated by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice or some other Minister of State.

21. Asaltos á bordo de un buque en alta mar, con intencion de quitar la vida ó hacer otro daño grave corporal.

22. Sublevacion ó conspiracion para rebelarse por dos ó mas personas á bordo de un buque en alta mar contra la autoridad del maestro ó capitán.

Con la condicion de que la entrega se hará solamente cuando en el caso de una persona acusada, la comision del crimen se establezca de tal modo que las leyes del pais donde se encuentre el fujitivo ó persona así acusada, justifiquen su aprehension ó auto de prision para el juicio, como si el crimen hubiese sido cometido allí; y en el caso de una persona de quien se afirma haber sido convicta con tales testimonios que, segun las leyes del pais donde se halle, prueben que ha sido convicta en efecto.

ARTICULO III.

Ningun Hondureño como antes se ha indicado será entregado por el Gobierno de Honduras al Gobierno del Reyno Unido, y ningun súbdito del Reyno Unido será entregado por su Gobierno al Gobierno Hondureño.

ARTICULO IV.

La estradicion no tendrá lugar si la persona reclamada por parte del Gobierno del Reyno Unido, ó la persona reclamada por parte del Gobierno de Honduras, ha sido ya juzgada y absuelta ó castigada, ó está aun procesándose en territorio del Reyno Unido ó de Honduras respectivamente, por el delito por el cual se pide su estradicion.

Si la persona reclamada por parte del Gobierno del Reyno Unido, ó si la persona reclamada por parte del Gobierno de Honduras, estuviese sometida á juicio por algun otro delito en territorio del Reyno Unido ó en la República de Honduras respectivamente, se diferirá su estradicion hasta la conclusion del juicio y la plena ejecucion de cualquiera castigo á que fuese condenada.

ARTICULO V.

La estradicion no tendrá lugar si subsiguientemente á la comision del delito ó al comienzo del proceso ó á la conviccion del reo, se ha adquirido la escencion de prescripcion con el transcurso del tiempo, segun las leyes del Estado á quien se hace el reclamo.

ARTICULO VI.

El reo prófugo no será entregado si la ofensa por la cual se pide su entrega es de un caracter politico, ó si prueba que la requisicion para entregarlo se ha hecho en efecto con la mira de juzgarlo ó castigarlo por una ofensa de un caracter politico.

ARTICULO VII.

Una persona entregada no podrá en ningun caso ser mantenida en prision ó procesada en el Estado á quien se ha hecho la entrega, por ningun otro delito ó por ninguna otra causa que aquella por la cual la estradicion ha tenido lugar. Esta estipulacion no se aplica á crímenes que se cometan despues de la estradicion.

ARTICULO VIII.

La requisicion para la estradicion se hará por medio de los Agentes Diplomaticos de las Altas Partes Contratantes respectivamente.

La requisicion para la estradicion de una persona acusada debe ir acompañada de una órden de prision dada por la autoridad competente del Estado que pide la estradicion, y fundada en tales testimonios que segun las leyes del lugar donde se encuentre el acusado, justifiquen su apresamiento como si el delito hubiese sido cometido allí.

Si la requisicion se refiere á una persona ya convicta, debe ir acompañada de la sentencia de condena pronunciada contra la persona convicta por el Tribunal competente del Estado que hace la requisicion para la estradicion.

Una demanda de estradicion no puede fundarse en sentencias proferidas en contumacia.

ARTICULO IX.

Si la demanda de estradicion está de acuerdo con las precedentes estipulaciones, las autoridades competentes del Estado á quien se dirige la requisicion procederán al arresto del fujitivo.

El prisionero será conducido entonces ante la autoridad competente, que debe examinarlo y hacer la investigacion preliminar del caso, tal como si la captura hubiese tenido lugar por un delito cometido en el mismo pais.

ARTICULO X.

La estradicion no tendrá lugar antes de pasados quince dias desde la captura, y entonces solamente si los testimonios se encuentran suficientes, segun las leyes del Estado á quien se hace la requisicion, ya sea para justificar la sujecion del prisionero á juicio en caso que el crimen hubiese sido cometido en territorio de dicho Estado, ó para probar la identidad de la persona convicta por los Tribunales del Estado que hace la requisicion.

ARTICULO XI.

En el examen que tienen que hacer de conformidad con las precedentes estipulaciones, las autoridades del Estado á quien se haga la peticion, admitirán como prueba plena el testimonio y declaraciones bajo juramento recibidas de testigos en el otro Estado, ó copias de los mismos, como igualmente los autos de prision y sentencias dadas en él, siempre que tales documentos estén firmados ó certificados por un Juez, Magistrado ú oficial de dicho Estado, y estén autenticados por algun testigo juramentado, ó que estén sellados con el sello oficial del Ministro de la Justicia ó algun otro Ministro de Estado.

ARTICLE XII.

If sufficient evidence for extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, he shall be set at liberty.

ARTICLE XIII.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery thereof, be given up when the extradition takes place; and the said delivery shall extend, not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

ARTICLE XIV.

The High Contracting Parties renounce any claim for the reimbursement of the expenses incurred by them in the arrest and maintenance of the person to be surrendered and his conveyance till placed on board ship; they reciprocally agree to bear such expenses themselves.

ARTICLE XV.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the colonies and foreign possessions of her Britannic Majesty.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or foreign Possessions shall be made to the Governor or chief authority of such Colony or Possession by the Chief Consular Officer of the Republic of Honduras in such Colony or Possession.

Such requisition may be disposed of (subject always, as nearly as may be, to the provisions of this Treaty) by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and foreign Possessions, for the surrender of Honduran criminals who may take refuge within such Colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis, as nearly as may be, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal from any Colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding Articles of the present Treaty.

ARTICLE XVI.

The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties, but shall remain in force for six months after notice has been given for its termination.

The Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratification shall be exchanged at Guatemala, in twelve months counted from this day.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

Done at Guatemala, the sixth day of the month of January, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy-four.

ARTICULO XII.

Si despues de dos meses de solicitada la estradicion no se hubiere aducido prueba bastante que justifique la captura del fugitivo, se le pondrá en libertad; contados esos dos meses desde la captura del fugitivo.

ARTICULO XIII.

Cualesquiera articulos embargados que al tiempo de la captura de la persona que se ha de entregar, estén en su posesion, si la autoridad competente del Estado requerido para la estradicion ha ordenado la entrega de la persona serán entregados al tiempo de verificarse aquella; y dicha entrega se estenderá no solamente á los articulos robados, sino á todo lo que pueda servir como prueba del crimen.

ARTICULO XIV.

Las Altas Partes Contratantes renuncian á cualquier reclamo para el reembolso de los gastos hechos en la captura y mantenimiento de la persona que ha de entregarse y en su conduccion hasta ponerle á bordo del buque: se comprometen reciprocamente á hacer ellas mismas tales gastos.

ARTICULO XV.

Las estipulaciones del presente Tratado serán aplicables á las Colonias y posesiones extranjeras de Su Majestad Británica.

La requisicion para la entrega de un criminal fugitivo que se ha refugiado en alguna de tales Colonias ó posesiones extranjeras, se hará a Gobernador ó principal autoridad de tal Colonia ó posesion, por el principal Agente Consular de la República de Honduras en dicha Colonia ó posesion.

Podrá darse curso á semejantes requisiciones, sujetándose siempre lo mas aproximadamente posible á lo prevenido en este Tratado, por dicho Gobernador ó principal autoridad, quien, sin embargo, estará en libertad de conceder la entrega ó deferir el negocio á su Gobierno.

Su Majestad Británica quedará, sin embargo, en libertad de hacer arreglos especiales en las Colonias Británicas y posesiones extranjeras para la entrega de los criminales Hondureños que puedan refugiarse dentro de tales Colonias y posesiones extranjeras, sobre la base, lo mas aproximadamente posible, de las estipulaciones del presente Tratado.

La requisicion para la entrega de un criminal fugitivo de alguna Colonia ó posesion extranjera de Su Majestad Británica estará sujeta á las reglas establecidas en los Articulos precedentes del presente Tratado.

ARTICULO XVI.

El presente Tratado comenzará á rejir diez dias despues de su publicacion, de conformidad con las formas prescritas por las leyes de las Altas Partes Contratantes. Puede ponerse término por cualquiera de las Altas Partes Contratantes, pero permanecerá vigente por seis meses despues de haberse dado aviso para su terminacion.

El Tratado será ratificado, y las ratificaciones cangeadas en Guatemala dentro de doce meses contados desde el dia de hoy.

En fé de lo cual, los respectivos Plenipotenciarios lo han firmado, y lo han puesto sus sellos.

Hecho en Guatemala, á los seis dias del mes de Enero del año del Señor mil ochocientos setenta y cuatro.

ORDER IN COUNCIL UNDER "THE MERCHANT SHIPPING (COLONIAL) ACT 1869."

With reference to their letter of the 19th ultimo, I am directed by the Board of Trade to transmit, for the information of the Earl of Carnarvon, the accompanying Orders in Council, which have been issued by Her Majesty for the colonies of Victoria, New Zealand, New South Wales, and South Australia, substituting a cumulative domicile of three years in any of the Australasian colonies for a domicile of three years in the particular colony in which the certificate is issued, as required by the Orders in Council of the 30th March 1871, 9th August 1872, 30th August 1873, and 12th May 1874 respectively.

In transmitting the amended Orders I am to point out that the former Orders are revoked.

I am also to enclose copies of an Order in Council extending the provisions of section 8 of *The Merchant Shipping (Colonial) Act 1869* to the British possession of Tasmania.

Both the amended Orders and the Order relating to Tasmania will come into force on the 1st April, and I am to suggest for Lord Carnarvon's consideration that the Governments of the Australian possessions referred to may be informed of the issue of the Orders and be supplied with copies thereof.

The Board of Trade trust that the Tasmanian Government will furnish them with copies of certificates of competency and examination papers which they propose to use, at the earliest possible date.

PRESENT:

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by *The Merchant Shipping (Colonial) Act 1869* it is (among other things) enacted, that where the Legislature of any British Possession provides for the examination of and grant of certificates of competency to persons intending to act as masters, mates, or engineers on board British Ships,

and the Board of Trade reports to Her Majesty that they are satisfied that the examinations are so conducted as to be equally efficient as the examinations for the same purpose in the United Kingdom, under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and that the certificates are granted on such principles as to show the like qualification and competency as those granted under the said Acts, and are liable to be forfeited for the like reasons and in the like manner, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council,—

1. To declare that the said certificates shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts.

2. To declare that all or any of the provisions of the said Acts which relate to certificates of competency granted under those Acts shall apply to the certificates referred to in the said Order.

3. To impose such conditions and to make such regulations with respect to the said certificates and to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension thereof as to Her Majesty may seem fit, and to impose penalties not exceeding Fifty pounds for the breach of such conditions and regulations.

And that upon the publication in the *London Gazette* of any such Order in Council as last aforesaid, the provisions therein contained shall, from a date to be mentioned for the purpose in such Order, take effect as if they had been contained in the Act, and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to revoke any Order made as aforesaid.

And whereas the Legislature of the British Possessions of Victoria have provided for the examination of and grant of certificates of competency for the foreign trade to persons intending to act as masters, mates, or engineers on board British sea-going steam ships, which certificates are hereinafter denominated Colonial Certificates of Competency, and the Board of Trade have reported to Her Majesty that they are satisfied that the said examinations are so conducted as to be equally efficient as the examinations for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and that the certificates are granted on such principles as to show the like qualifications and competency as those granted under the said Acts, and are liable to be forfeited for the like reasons and in the like manner.

And whereas Her Majesty, by Order in Council dated the 30th day of March 1871, has been pleased to declare that (subject to certain conditions and regulations therein contained) the said Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Steam Navigation Board of Victoria appointed by the Government of the said possession of Victoria shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts relating to Merchant Shipping.

And whereas by the condition or regulation, numbered 5, contained in the said recited Order in Council, it is provided that such Colonial Certificates of Competency shall be granted only to persons who have been domiciled in the said Possession of Victoria, or who have served in ships registered therein, for a period of or for periods amounting to at least three years immediately preceding their application for such Colonial Certificates, and that certificates of competency granted contrary to this regulation shall be regarded as improperly granted.

And whereas it has been represented to Her Majesty in Council that the provisions of the said 5th condition or regulation in the said recited Order in Council of the 30th day of March 1871 should be modified and amended so as to admit of domicile in or service in ships registered in any of the following Australian colonies, viz., the colonies on the continent of Australia, and New Zealand and Tasmania, forming part of the three years domicile required under the said condition or regulation: And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that such modification and amendment are expedient, and that the said recited Order in Council should be revoked and a new Order in Council, modified and amended in manner aforesaid, substituted in lieu thereof.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, doth hereby direct that from and after the 1st day of April 1876 the said recited Order in Council of the 30th day of March 1871 shall be and the same is hereby revoked; provided, however, that the revocation of the said Order in Council shall not affect or invalidate any Colonial Certificate of Competency granted thereunder prior to the said 1st day of April 1876, and subsisting at that date.

And Her Majesty is further pleased,—

(1.) To declare that the said Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Steam Navigation Board of Victoria, appointed by the Government of the said possession of Victoria, shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts.

(2.) To declare that all the provisions of the said Acts which relate to certificates of competency for the foreign trade granted under those Acts, except so much of the 139th section of *The Merchant Shipping Act 1854*, and the 10th section of *The Merchant Shipping Act amendment Act 1862*, as requires the delivery by the Board of Trade to any master, mate, or engineer of a copy of any certificate to which he appears to be entitled as therein mentioned, so much of the 3rd paragraph of the 23rd section of the said last-mentioned Act as requires at the conclusion of a case relating to the cancelling or suspending of a certificate, such certificate, if cancelled or suspended, to be forwarded to the Board of Trade, and the whole of the provisions of the 4th paragraph of the same section shall apply to such Colonial Certificates of Competency.

(3.) To impose and make the conditions and regulations following, numbered 1 to 10 respectively, with respect to the said Colonial Certificates of Competency, and to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension thereof, and to impose

for the breach of such conditions and regulations the penalties therein mentioned.

1. *Form of Certificate.*—Every such Colonial Certificate of Competency shall be on parchment and as nearly as possible similar in shape and form to the corresponding certificate of competency for the foreign trade granted by the Board of Trade under the Acts relating to merchant shipping.

2. *Name of Possession to be inserted.*—Every such Colonial Certificate of Competency shall have the name of the said possession of Victoria inserted prominently on its face and back.

3. *Certificates to be numbered consecutively.*—Such Colonial Certificates of Competency shall be numbered in consecutive order.

4. *Lists of Certificates granted, cancelled, &c., to be sent to Registrar-General of Seamen.*—The Government of the said possession shall furnish the Registrar-General of Seamen in London, from time to time, with accurate lists of all such Colonial Certificates of Competency as may be granted by them as aforesaid, or as may for any cause whatsoever be cancelled, suspended, renewed, or re-issued.

5. *Three years' domicile or service necessary.*—Such Colonial Certificates of Competency shall be granted only to any person who for a period of three years immediately preceding his application for such colonial certificate, or for several periods amounting together to three years the earliest of which shall have commenced within five years prior to such application, has been domiciled in or has served in a ship or ships registered in one or more of the following Australasian colonies, viz., the colonies on the continent of Australia, New Zealand, and Tasmania.

Certificates of competency granted contrary to this regulation shall be regarded as improperly granted.

6. *Certificates not to be granted when former are cancelled.*—Such Colonial Certificates of Competency shall not be granted to any person who may have had a certificate, whether granted by the Board of Trade or by the Government of a British possession, cancelled or suspended under the provisions of the said Acts, or of any Act for the time being in force in any part of Her Majesty's dominions, unless the period of suspension has expired, or unless intimation has been received from the Board of Trade or the government by whom the cancelled or suspended certificate was originally granted to the effect that no objection to the grant of such colonial certificate is known to exist, or unless a new certificate has been granted to him by such board or government, and in the last-named event no such Colonial Certificate of Competency shall be for a higher grade than the certificate so last granted as aforesaid. Colonial Certificates of Competency granted contrary to this regulation shall be regarded as improperly granted.

7. *Certificates improperly granted may be cancelled without formal investigation.*—Any such Colonial Certificate of Competency which appears from information subsequently acquired, or otherwise, to have been improperly granted, whether in the above or in any other respect, may be cancelled by the government of the said possession, or by the Board of Trade in the United Kingdom, without any formal investigation under *The Merchant Shipping Act 1854*, and the holder of such certificate shall thereupon deliver it to the Board of Trade or the Government of the said possession, or as they or either of them may direct, and in default thereof shall incur a penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds, which shall be recoverable in the same manner as penalties imposed by the Acts relating to merchant shipping are thereby made recoverable.

8. *Cancellation, &c., of a Certificate shall involve cancellation of all the other Certificates possessed by its owner.*—Every decision with respect to the cancellation or suspension of a certificate pronounced by any board, court, or tribunal under the provisions of the said Acts shall extend equally to all the colonial certificates at the time possessed by the person in respect of whom the decision is made, as well as to all certificates granted to him under any of the Acts relating to merchant shipping, and whether such certificates be specified in such decision or not.

9. *Certificates believed to be fraudulent may be demanded.*—Any officer of the Board of Trade, or the Registrar General of seamen, or any of his officers, or a superintendent of a mercantile marine office, or a consular officer, or duly appointed shipping officer in a British possession, may demand the delivery to him of any such Colonial Certificate of Competency which he has reason to believe has been improperly issued, or is forged, altered, cancelled, or suspended, or to which the person using it is not justly entitled, and may detain such certificate for a reasonable period for the purpose of making inquiries respecting such issue, forgery, alteration, cancellation, suspension, or possession, and any person who, without reasonable cause, neglects or refuses to comply with such demand shall incur a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds, which shall be recoverable in the same manner as penalties imposed by the Acts relating to merchant shipping are thereby made recoverable.

10. *Suspended Certificates to be re-issued only by colony by which originally granted.*—Any such Colonial Certificate of Competency which has from any cause been cancelled or suspended, whether by a tribunal in Victoria or elsewhere, shall be renewed or re-issued only by the Government of Victoria.

This Order shall take effect in the said Possession of Victoria from and after the 1st day of April 1876, and shall apply not only to Colonial Certificates of Competency granted under this Order, but to such as shall have been granted under the Order hereby revoked and be subsisting at the above date.

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the *Foreign Deserters Act 1852* it is provided that, whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering or apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of any foreign power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from merchant ships belonging to such power when within Her Majesty's dominions shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of His Majesty the King of the Hellenes: Now therefore Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said *Foreign Deserters Act 1852*, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the *London Gazette*, seamen, not being slaves, and not being British subjects who, within Her Majesty's dominions, desert from merchant ships belonging to the kingdom of Greece, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board

their respective ships: Provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions he may be detained until he has been tried by a competent court and until his sentence (if any) has been fully carried into effect.

And the Secretaries of State for India in Council, the Home Department, and the Colonies are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

CLEAN DISTRICTS UNDER "THE SCAB ACT 1870."

IN pursuance of the 66th section of *The Scab Act 1870*, the Administrator of the Government in Council has revoked all previous orders relating to the Clean Districts hereinafter mentioned, and has ordered that the portions of Victoria whereof the boundaries are hereinafter defined shall be Clean Districts within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:—

GIPPSLAND CLEAN DISTRICT—Commencing at the point on the sea-coast where the eastern boundary of the county of Mornington abuts thereon; thence northerly by the said boundary to the Powlett West A run; thence by that run to Mountain Glen run; thence northerly, easterly and northerly by that run to the Moe; thence across the Moe to the eastern boundary of Tanjil Hills run; thence by that boundary to the north-eastern corner thereof; thence by a straight line to Mount Baw-baw; thence by the south-eastern and eastern boundaries of Mount Useful run to the Main Dividing Range; thence by that range to Mount Hotham; thence north-easterly by the watershed between the head waters of the Little River and the head waters of the Cobungra and Bundarah creeks to Mount Cope; thence northerly by the watershed between the head waters of the Little River and the head waters of the Big River to Mount Nelson, Bogong; thence south-easterly by a range dividing between the waters of the Big River and the heads of Snowy Creek to Mount Wills; thence easterly by Wombat Creek, being the south boundary of Mount Martin run, to its junction with the Mitta-mitta River; thence north-easterly by the south-east boundary of the Gibbo run to the south-east corner of said run; thence by the north-east boundary of said run to the north-west corner of Buemba run; thence easterly by the northern boundary of Buemba run to the trigonometrical station on Mount Gibbo; thence by a straight line to the north-west corner of the Tom Groggin run, as gazetted in

Government Gazette of 16th February 1872; thence by the north boundary of said run to the Indi River; thence up the Indi and Upper Indi River, being the boundary between the colonies of Victoria and New South Wales, to Forest Hill; thence south-easterly by the boundary-line between said colonies to Cape Howe; and thence south-westerly by the sea-coast to the point of commencement.

KILMORE CLEAN DISTRICT—Commencing at the junction of the Goulburn River with the Murray River; thence up the Goulburn River to the Muddy Creek; thence up the Muddy Creek to the north-west corner of the Killingworth run; thence south by the west and south-west boundary of that run to the north-east corner of Murrindindi East run; thence south by the east boundary of that run and Muddy Creek or Lambourne run to the source of the Muddy Creek in the Main Dividing Range; thence by that range to the Glenvale run; thence by the eastern, northern, and western boundaries of that run to the aforesaid range; thence again by that range to the source of the Campaspe River; thence down that river to the Langwornor run; thence by the southern boundary of that run to the Coliban River; thence down that river to the Campaspe River aforesaid; thence again by that river to the Axedale East run; thence by the southern, eastern, and northern boundaries of that run to the Campaspe River; thence again by that river to the Campaspe River run; thence by the southern, western, and northern boundaries of that run to the Campaspe River; again down that river to the Wharapella run; thence by the southern and eastern boundaries of that run to the River Murray; and thence up that river to the commencing point. Of the total deaths recorded 41, or 34 per cent., were children not exceeding the age of 3 years, 22 being under the age of 1 year.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGOUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it was amongst other things enacted, that notwithstanding anything thereinbefore contained the Governor might by proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, should cut, dig, or remove live or dead timber or particular description of timber, or bark, stone, gravel, sand, loam, brick, or other earth, from such portions of Crown lands as were named in such proclamation, or should exercise on any such portions the powers, or any of them, conferred by any license granted under the authority of Part III. of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power conferred by the above-recited Act, do by this my Proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall cut, dig, or remove live or dead timber, or particular description of timber or bark from such portions of Crown lands as are comprised within the boundaries of the Municipal District of Eaglehawk, or shall exercise on any such portions the powers or any of them conferred by any license granted under the authority of Part III. of the said Act.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common, and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees should be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees should be disposed of, and at any time alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim as a common the unappropriated Crown land comprised within the boundaries hereinafter described, viz.:—

HEYFIELD COMMON.—Four thousand six hundred acres, more or less, county of Tanjil, parishes of Glenmaggie and Tinamba, being the unappropriated Crown land comprised within the boundaries hereinafter described, viz.: Commencing at a point on the left bank of the Thomson River where it is intersected by the western side of the road from Rosedale to Seaton; thence by that road north-easterly, northerly, north-westerly, and westerly to the north-west angle of allotment 72, parish of Glenmaggie; thence by the west boundary of that allotment, a line, the west boundaries of allotments 73 and 75, a line, and the west boundary of allotment 85, bearing south to the aforesaid river; and thence by that river downwards to the point of commencement.—(76.W.888.)

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE LUCKNOW COMMON.

WHEREAS by regulations made by the Governor in Council under *The Land Act 1869* the council of every shire in which any common is situate are appointed managers of such common, and empowered to make rules and regulations for its management under the sanction of the Board of Land and Works: Now therefore the Council of the Shire of Bairnsdale hereby make the following Regulations for the management of the Lucknow Common:—

1. In the construction and for the purposes of these Regulations the words "large cattle" shall mean cows, heifers, oxen, steers, mares, geldings, colts, fillies, asses, and mules; and the words "small cattle" shall mean sheep and goats.

2. Persons entitled to commonage will be permitted to depasture on payment of fees according to the following scale:—

Four head of large cattle, or the equivalent of the whole or a portion thereof in small cattle, on the basis that one head of large cattle be deemed equivalent to three head of small cattle. A farmer having under cultivation not less than one-tenth portion of the land occupied by him may depasture one additional head of large cattle or the equivalent in small cattle for every ten acres of such land cultivated by him.

C. For every head of small cattle per annum	0	3	0

3. No cattle will be considered as registered unless the above fees are paid at the time of entering their brand or other distinguishing mark and description by the herdsman; and all fees must be paid half-yearly in advance, the licenses dating from the first day of January and the first day of July in each year.

4. No fees will be charged for the progeny of registered cattle which in the opinion of the managers or herdsman are under six months old. No bulls or entire horses will be allowed to depasture on the common without the special consent of the managers.

5. All large and small cattle shall have a distinguishing brand on them, and horned cattle shall be marked with the common brand.

6. The herdsman will attend at the common yard every Monday from nine a.m. to three p.m. to register and brand all cattle brought to him, and in the performance of this duty the owners are required to assist.

7. It will be the herdsman's duty to see all cattle under his care every alternate day; the managers will not however be responsible for any cattle depasturing on the common, but the herdsman is required to give immediate notice to owners when he becomes aware of their cattle having strayed from off the common; neither do the managers hold themselves responsible for any neglect or irregularity on the part of the herdsman.

8. The herdsman will be authorized to impound all cattle, sheep, pigs, and goats trespassing on the common; and entries of all impoundings shall be kept in a book for that purpose, so that all damages and fees accruing from that source may be accounted for.

9. No person will be allowed to remove any cattle from the common without giving at least twelve hours' notice to the herdsman; and no person will be allowed to disturb or remove any cattle unless the herdsman is present.

10. The managers reserve the right to remove from the common any cattle suspected of contagious diseases.

11. Persons desirous of registering cattle shall sign a description of such cattle, describing all brands and other distinguishing marks in the form of schedule 24 appended to the Regulations made by the Governor in Council under *The Land Act 1869*. The herdsman shall give to each person registering a receipt for all moneys paid on account of the depasturing of any cattle, and shall hand over all such moneys to the shire treasurer within three days of its receipt.

12. At the request of the person registering, the herdsman may register and brand elsewhere than at the common branding yard, in which case an additional fee of one shilling per head for one beast, and sixpence per head for two or more, will be made.

13. The general mustering of cattle shall take place in the first week of January and the first week of July in each year, the three first days in each of these weeks to be for horses, the remainder for neat and small cattle. Cattle thus mustered for registration shall, if not registered and paid for, be impounded on the third of the respective days set apart for such mustering.

14. The managers are empowered to set apart a portion of the common for the grazing of sheep.

15. Persons removing cattle will be allowed to substitute others upon payment of a registration fee of one shilling per head.

16. Every person offending against any of the foregoing Regulations shall on conviction before any justice forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds for each offence.

REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE LINTON TOWN COMMON AND OF THE ARGYLE AND LINTON FARMERS' COMMON, SITUATED WITHIN THE SHIRE OF GRENVILLE.

THE Council of the Shire of Grenville, by virtue of the powers vested in it by the regulations under *The Land Act 1869*, has, on this 30th day of March 1876, ordered as follows:—

1. That ratepayers in the shire, holders of miners' rights, business licenses, or carriers' licenses, and farmers residing within five miles of the common, may respectively depasture on the common four head of large cattle, or the equivalent of the whole or a portion thereof in small cattle, on the basis that one head of large cattle be deemed equivalent to three head of small cattle, on payment to the managers of the fees hereinafter prescribed, and provided that no person be allowed to depasture more than four goats.

2. That the fees for depasturing on the common shall be paid in advance, and shall be at the rate of eight shillings per annum for horses, six shillings per annum for horned cattle, two shillings per annum for sheep, and two shillings per annum for goats, and that the quarters shall commence respectively upon the first Saturday in the months of March, June, September, and December in each year.

3. That the managers shall appoint certain times and places for the registering and branding of cattle, shall give notice thereof, and shall by their herdsman attend at such times and places for the purposes aforesaid; and all persons desirous of depasturing cattle shall be in attendance with their cattle at the time and place appointed for the purpose of assisting to brand the same, and shall pay the prescribed fees for such cattle before the same shall be branded.

4. That all cattle found upon the common not registered and without the common brand shall be deemed to be trespassing thereon, and shall be forthwith impounded, or the owners of such cattle may be proceeded against by summons.

5. That no bull or entire horse shall be depastured without the sanction of the managers.

6. That no pigs shall be depastured on the common.

7. That the managers shall not be responsible for any loss or injury of or to any cattle depasturing on the common.

8. That the managers may destroy any goats found upon the common unless such goats are registered and branded with the common brand, and unless the fees for the depasturing of such goats be duly paid.

9. That every person offending against any regulation for the management of the common shall on conviction before any justice forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds for each offence.

3. Orders will be supplied in turn, to be regulated by the post date upon the envelope of the same, and when two or more orders shall bear the same date, then alphabetically.

4. When an order cannot be supplied in full, a refund shall be made to the person whose name appears in the deposit-receipt; but such refund shall be made only on the certificate of the Superintendent of the State Nursery, and shall be only for the amount named in his certificate.

5. The Superintendent of the State Nursery will pack, address, and deliver the trees at the Macedon railway station, unless any purchaser should elect personally to superintend the same or should appoint another to do so in his behalf, but in such case no deduction in the prices will be made as an allowance for cost of packing.

6. All charges levied upon the trees subsequent to their delivery at the railway station, Macedon, shall be borne by the consignee.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by The Local Government Act 1874 (38 Vict. No. 506), it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time, and from time to time, upon the request of the council of any municipality by notice in the Government Gazette to declare any land reserved, used, or by purchase or exchange acquired for a street, road, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley, or right-of-way to be a public highway, and such land should thereupon and thenceforth from the date of such proclamation become and be absolutely dedicated to the public as a public highway within the meaning of any law then or thereafter in force: And whereas the Council of the Borough of Hawthorn has requested that certain streets within the said borough be so declared public highways: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this notice declare the lands acquired or used for the streets hereinafter named and described and situate in the Borough of Hawthorn to be respectively public highways within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:

WHEREAS by The Local Government Act 1874 (38 Vict. No. 506) it was amongst other things enacted that, subject to the provisions of the said Act, the Governor in Council might from time to time make Orders, amongst other things, to subdivide or re-subdivide any municipal district into any number of subdivisions not exceeding eight; and every such Order should be published in the Government Gazette, and should take effect as from the day of such publication: And whereas

a petition purporting to be signed by one-fourth of the persons whose names are for the time being inscribed on the municipal roll of the Shire of Wimmera has been presented to the Governor in Council, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published in the manner prescribed in the forty-sixth section of the said Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, and in compliance with the prayer of the petition hereinbefore mentioned, doth by this present Order subdivide the Shire of Wimmera into three several subdivisions, the boundaries whereof shall be as follow, that is to say:—

THE WEST RIDING.—Commencing at the most northern point of the River Glenelg; thence westerly along the boundary between the Shires of Wimmera and Kowree to its junction with the Shire of Lowan; thence northerly and easterly by the boundary between the Shires of Wimmera and Lowan to the River Wimmera; thence southerly by that river to its junction with the Norton Creek; thence southerly up the said creek to its source; and thence by a direct line to the commencing point.

THE EAST RIDING.—Commencing at a point on the Yarriambiack Creek where it is intersected by the northern boundary of the Kewell run; thence eastward by the boundaries of the Kewell, Kirkwood, and Rich Avon runs to the Avon River; thence along the said river and the Richardson River southerly to opposite the eastern boundary of allotment No. 192, parish of Wirehilleba; thence to the south-east angle of the said allotment, west to the north-east angle of allotment No. 226, parish of Riachella, south to the road between Navarre and Horsham opposite the south-west angle of allotment 205 in the same parish, westward along same road to south-west angle of allotment No. 197 in the aforesaid parish, north and west by the parish boundaries of Riachella and Marma to the Main road between Glenorchy and Horsham, along this road to opposite the southward angle of allotment No. 43, parish of Marma, west to the River Wimmera, north westerly by this river to the bifurcation of the Yarriambiack Creek, and thence northerly by said creek to the commencing point.

THE CENTRAL RIDING.—Commencing at the intersection of the Yarriambiack Creek with the north boundary of the parish of Werrigar; thence southerly by that creek to the Wimmera River; thence up that river to a point bearing north-east from Brigg's Bluff, Grampian Range; thence to said bluff and along the watershed of the Grampians to the north-east angle of the county of Dundas; thence north-westerly by that county-boundary to the most northern bend of the Glenelg River; thence by a direct line to the source of Norton's Creek; thence by Norton's Creek and the River Wimmera to the intersection of the south boundary of the parish of Dimboola; thence by the south boundary of the parish of Dimboola east to its south-east angle; thence by the east boundaries of the parishes of Dimboola, Katyil, and Terranyurk north to the north-east angle of the last-named parish; thence by the north boundaries of the parishes of Cannum and Werrigar west to the commencing point.

And the Honorable Joseph Jones, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Tenders having alterations or erasures therein will not be entertained.

Security to the amount of £15 will be required either in Government debentures, bank deposit-receipt in favor of the Secretary to the Tender Board, or cash deposit, as the tenderer may elect.

1. The tallow required for the service of the Victorian Railways is to be in accordance with the sample and specification, and in every respect to be of the very best description, quality, and manufacture, subject to the approval of the General Overseer of Locomotives.

2. The order for supply must issue from the Secretary for Railways, and the tallow must be delivered free of charge to the Railway Stores, Williamstown.

3. Delivery, as a rule, is to be of the full quantity ordered at one time; but all deliveries must be accompanied with detailed invoices or bills of parcels in duplicate, showing quantity, rate, and value, also the number of the order for the goods, otherwise the goods will not be received. 4.
