## TONNAGE MEASUREMENT OF ITALIAN VESSELS.

**T**HE accompanying Order by Her Majesty the Queen in Council is published for general information.

### ORDER IN COUNCIL REFERRED TO.

At the Court at Balmoral, the 30th day of September 1873.

#### PRESENT:

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the "*Merchant Shipping Act amendment Act 1862*," it is enacted, that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that the rules concerning the measurement of tonnage of merchant ships, for the time being in force under the principal Act, have been adopted by the Government of any foreign country and are in force in that country, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, to direct that the ships of such foreign country shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificate of registry or other national papers, and thereupon it shall no longer be necessary for such ships to be re-measured in any port or place in Her Majesty's dominions; but such ships shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificate of registry or other papers in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purposes in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of British ships is to be deemed the tonnage of such ships:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the rules concerning the measurement of tonnage of merchant ships now in force under "*The Merchant Shipping Act 1854*," have been adopted by the Government of His Majesty the King of Italy, and such rules are now in force in that country, having come into operation on the first day of July One thousand eight hundred and seventy-three.

Her Majesty is hereby pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to direct as follows:—

1. As regards sailing ships—That merchant sailing ships of the said Kingdom of Italy, the measurement whereof, after the said first day of July One thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, has been ascertained and denoted in the registers and other national papers of such sailing ships, testified by the date thereof, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in such registers and other national papers in the same manner,

and to the same extent, and for the same purpose in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of British sailing ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships.

2. As regards steam ships—That merchant ships belonging to the said Kingdom of Italy, which are propelled by steam or any other power requiring engine-room, the measurement whereof shall, after the first day of July One thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, have been ascertained and denoted in the registers and other national papers of such steam ships, testified by the dates thereof, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in such registers or other national papers in the same manner, and to the same extent, and for the same purposes in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of British ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships; provided, nevertheless, that if the owner or master of any such Italian steam ships desires the deduction for engine-room in his ships to be estimated under the rules for engine-room measurement and deduction applicable to British ships, instead of under the Italian rule, the engine-room shall be measured, and the deduction calculated according to the British rules.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common, and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees should be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees should be disposed of, and at any time alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it was also enacted that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons should be published and all objections thereto should be heard in the manner set forth in the One hundredth section of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the Crown lands hereinafter described as a common, that is to say:—

DUNMUNKLE COMMON.—Two thousand acres, more or less, county of Borung, parish of Dunmunkle, being the unappropriated Crown land comprised within the boundaries hereinafter described, viz.:—Commencing at the north-west angle of M. Munro's 19th section block, No. 3114; bounded thence by that block bearing southerly to the south-west angle thereof; thence again by that block and A. Munro's 19th section block, No. 44009, bearing easterly to a point bearing north from the north-west angle of D. Munro's 19th section block, No. 1101; thence by a line and the last-mentioned block bearing southerly to the north-east angle of A. Nimmo's 19th section block, No. 4369; thence by that block bearing westerly and southerly to a point bearing east from the north-east angle of J. ## PROCLAMATION

commons; and it was also enacted that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons should be published and all objections thereto should be heard in the manner set forth in the One hundredth section of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby add to the undermentioned Commons respectively the Crown lands hereinafter described, that is to say:—

The United Clarendon and Buninyong Town and Farmers' Common, proclaimed by Order of the 31st October 1870, is hereby increased by adding thereto the unappropriated Crown land comprised within the boundaries hereinafter described, viz., county of Grant, parishes of Buninyong and Clarendon: Commencing at a point on the west boundary of William Chisholm's 19th section block, No. 11181; bearing south eighty chains twenty-six links from the north-west angle thereof; bounded thence by that block and a line bearing north to the south boundary of H. G. Heather's block, No. 748; thence west and north by that block to the southern boundary of the existing common; thence north-westerly and west by that boundary to the north-east boundary of H. Smith's 49th section block, No. 3983; thence south-easterly and south-westerly by H. Smith's licensed land to the Leigh River; thence by that river downwards to the north boundary of allotment C2, parish of Clarendon; thence east, south, and south-westerly by that allotment to a point in line with the east boundary of J. # PILOT BOARD REGULATIONS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to approve of the 8th, 37th, and 38th clauses of the Pilot Regulations being rescinded, and of the accompanying rules being substituted for clauses 37 and 38 respectively.

# CLAUSE 37.

a. Pilots prior to taking pilotage charge of outward bound vessels, or going as passengers to sea, are in all cases to report the same in the book kept at the Pilot Office for that purpose.  
b. And shall immediately on their vessels being moored after arrival inwards fill up and sign their reports in a book to be kept open at the Pilot Office for that purpose, and at the same time report in writing for the information of the Board any extraordinary circumstances that may have occurred on board while under their charge.

# CLAUSE 38.

a. The master of any ship requiring a pilot must make an application in writing to the Secretary at the Pilot Office, such notice to be given during office hours, and to be given twelve hours previous to the time when the pilot is required.  
b. Each company shall have the privilege of piloting outwards all vessels it may have piloted inwards, unless sufficient reason should be shown by the master to the contrary.  
c. On due application being made for an outward pilot by any such vessel the pilot first on turn of the company to whom she belongs shall be appointed to her; and should there be no pilot belonging to such company at the station, or should the vessel requiring a pilot not belong to any company, the pilot first on turn of any company shall be appointed.  
d. No exchange of turns by the pilots shall be permitted except by the authority in writing of the Secretary.  
e. In every case in which such an exchange is made, the pilot making the exchange shall take the place on the roster of the pilot with whom he exchanges.  
f. Pilots when appointed to any vessel are immediately to repair on board, and are not to leave the vessel without the written permission of the master, unless in case of severe illness, which must be verified by a medical certificate; but should she not be ready to proceed to sea the pilot must obtain a written statement to that effect from the master or officer in charge, and immediately report himself at the Pilot Office as eligible for appointment to another vessel.

## AUSTRALIA—SOUTH COAST—INVESTIGATOR STRAIT.

### Sunken Rock off the South-west Point of York Peninsula.<sup>1</sup>

The Colonial Government of South Australia has given notice that the Commander of the steam-vessel *Governor Musgrave* has reported the existence of heavy breakers about 2½ miles off the south-west point of York Peninsula, bearing W. by N., distant about a mile from Emmes Reef. At the time the breakers were seen a moderate south-west gale was blowing with a high sea.

This bearing and distance places the danger in lat. 35° 18' 40" S., long. 136° 47' 30" E.

## VICTORIA.

### Alteration in Position of Jetty Light, Port Fairy.<sup>2</sup>

The Colonial Government of Victoria has given notice that the lighthouse formerly on the jetty at Port Fairy has been moved S.W. by W. 500 yards, to a position on Look-out Hill.

The light is a fixed green light, and in clear weather should be seen between the bearings of south and W.S.W. from a distance of about 3 miles.

NOTE.—Approaching from seaward the green light may be steered for as soon as seen, and anchorage taken up as convenient. Small vessels will find the best anchorage in about 3 fathoms water, one cable north-west of Foul Bank buoy.

## TASMANIA.

### Alterations in Harbor Lights at Hobart Town.<sup>3</sup>

#### SOUTH-WESTERN PART—FIJI ISLANDS.

##### Viti Levu Island.

The following information relating to Suva Harbor, Viti Levu, and to Savu Savu Bay, Vanua Levu, is from the reports and surveys of Lieutenants L. S. Dawson and W. U. Moore, H.M.S. *Alacrity*, 1876.<sup>1</sup>

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation 9° 40' easterly in 1876.]

*Suva Harbor* (Tomba-Ko-Suva), situated on the south-east coast of Viti Levu, just west of Suva Point, is about 2 miles long east and west, and from a half to 2 miles broad; the land in the neighborhood being tolerably high and thickly wooded protects it from the prevailing easterly wind, which however

seldom veers to the southward of S.E.; while the reef forming the southern part of the harbor renders the water invariably smooth, and the shores, except immediately northward of the entrance, without surf or break. The entrance is through a clear opening in the reef 3 cables broad, having in mid-channel 40 to 38 fathoms.

Walou Creek, on the east side of the harbor, extends about three-quarters of a mile inland, and affords good accommodation for vessels of 5 feet draft.

About the middle of the northern shore of Suva Harbor, and nearly abreast of the entrance, a spit (which dries at low-water springs) extends nearly 6 cables from a low cliffy point, narrowing the harbor at that part to half a mile.

Suva has also in its north-west part an inner harbor (Nai Ngalo Ngalo) which is capable of accommodating several vessels.

*Directions*.—Na Komba Levu, a mountain 1446 feet high, situated about 3 miles inland, and northward of Suva Harbor, bearing N. 4 E. will lead from the offing, and through the entrance in mid-channel, until a large white storehouse, on the east side of the harbor, bears E. by S., which will lead to the anchorage.

There is also a narrow channel inside the reef between Suva Harbor and Lauthala Bay, about 3 miles to the eastward of it; this channel, if buoyed, would ensure a smooth water communication between the two harbors for small vessels.

*Tides*.—It is high water, full and change, in Suva Harbor at 6h. 30m.; springs rise 4½ to 5½ feet, neaps 3 to 3½ feet. The hurricane waves that are experienced at Nandi and other parts of the west coast of Viti Levu, do not, according to native report, reach Suva Harbor.

## VANUA LEVU ISLAND.

*Savu Savu Bay*,<sup>2</sup> about 10 miles in extent, is situated on the south side of Vanua Levu; the fringe reef on the east side of the entrance extends about 1½ miles from Savu Savu Point. Valanga Bay, Savereka-reka Bay, and Na Kama Creek, are three anchorages on the east side of Savu Savu Bay, all of which have good holding ground (stiff mud) and are protected by the land from the prevailing trade wind.

*Valanga Bay*, the northern anchorage, is nearly three-quarters of a mile in extent, having depths of 19 to 10 fathoms; the south-east part of the bay is fringed by a reef, which at the south entrance point extends nearly a quarter of a mile in a north-west direction; in the north-east part of Valanga Bay there is a sandy beach about half a mile long, and at 2½ cables to the southward of the north entrance point lies a coral patch nearly awash at low water, with 9 to 16 fathoms close around.

*Savereka-reka*, about half a mile to the southward of Valanga Bay, is about 3 cables wide north and south and 3½ deep, having 15 fathoms in the entrance, and 5 to 6 fathoms within half-a-cable of the shore reef.

The fringe reef extends about one cable from the northern shore of this bay, and 1 to 2 cables from the eastern; the south side is formed by the coral reef which dries at low water, and extends 1½ miles S.W. by W., where it encircles Nawi Island, north side of Na Kama Creek entrance.

*Na Kama Creek*, the southern anchorage in Savu Savu Bay, is about half a mile long E. by N. and W. by S. with an average breadth of 150 yards, having depths of 14 to 6 fathoms in the middle.

On the south shore of Na Kama Creek, and 200 yards from the beach, there are some boiling springs, generally in active operation, and form a considerable stream flowing into the creek at Moniseva.

Between Moniseva and Daku, one mile to the westward of it, hot springs occur along the beach at several places.

*Water*.—Good water can be obtained in Valanga Bay, Na Kama Creek, and at Daku.

*Earthquakes*.—Slight shocks of earthquakes are experienced occasionally during the hot season, and not unfrequently precede a gale.

*Caution*.—When the trade wind is fresh sailing in boats is dangerous, on account of the heavy squalls which sweep off the land across the bay.

*Tides*.—It is high water, full and change, in Valanga Bay at 5h. 55m.; springs rise 5½ feet, neaps 2½ feet.

## DIRECTION ISLAND REEF.

*Directions from Savu Savu Bay to the westward*.—Small sailing vessels gain time by passing through a break in the Direction Island Reef, abreast Direction Island. Steer, when approaching the long reef, with right extreme of Direction Island just open of the left extreme of Makongai Island, pass within a few yards of Direction Island, and take the most westerly of three breaks in the western side of the barrier. This course will, if the prevailing trade wind be blowing, save a tack to weather the south point of Direction Island Reef.
