FIXING THE TIME FOR HOLDING THE FIRST SESSION OF THE TENTH
PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Most Honorable George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Earl of Mulgrave, Viscount Normanby, and Baron Mulgrave of Mulgrave, all in the County of York, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; and Baron Mulgrave of New Ross, in the County of Wexford, in the Peerage of Ireland; a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Constitution Act* it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he might think fit; and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he should deem it expedient: And whereas the said Council and Assembly are called "The Parliament of Victoria," and it is expedient to fix the time for holding the next Session thereof: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation fix Tuesday the ninth day of March instant, as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of the said Council and Assembly, called the Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, at Twelve of the clock at noon, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Parliament place, Spring street, in the City of Melbourne; and the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this second day of March in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty, and in the forty-third year of Her Majesty's reign.

IN pursuance of the provisions contained in the fifth section of *The Bank Holidays Act 1873*, I, the Governor of Victoria, do by this my Proclamation appoint

WEDNESDAY THE 3RD OF MARCH INSTANT

a special day to be observed as a Bank Holiday at Horsham and Kerang;

SATURDAY THE 6TH OF MARCH INSTANT

a special day to be observed as a Bank Holiday at Wahgunyah;

THURSDAY THE 11TH OF MARCH INSTANT

a special day to be observed as a Bank Holiday at Lancefield and Romsey;

THURSDAY AND FRIDAY THE 11TH AND 12TH MARCH INSTANT

to be observed as Bank Half-holidays at Benalla, from the hour of Twelve noon.
