EXTRADITION TREATY WITH SWITZERLAND.

SIR,—With reference to my Circular Despatch of the 18th of March last, I have the honor to transmit to you, for publication in the colony under your government, a copy of a letter from the Foreign Office, enclosing an Order of Her Majesty in Council, dated the 15th of December, for giving effect to the Convention between this country and the Swiss Confederation, signed at Berne on the 8th of December, prolonging the duration of the Treaty of the 31st of March 1874 for the Mutual Extradition of Fugitive Criminals.

It will be seen that the Order in Council likewise applies to the Treaty of the 31st of March 1874, the Protocol of the 28th of November 1874, the Convention of the 19th June 1878, and the Convention of the 13th of December 1878.

SIR,—I am directed by the Marquis of Salisbury to acquaint you, for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that an Order in Council for giving effect to the Convention between this country and Switzerland, signed at Berne on the 8th of December 1879, prolonging the duration of the Treaty of 31st of March 1874 for the Mutual Extradition of Fugitive Criminals, was passed on the 15th instant.

This Order, of which I enclose three copies, likewise applies to the Treaty of the 31st of March 1874, the Protocol of the 28th of November 1874, the Convention of the 19th of June 1878, and the Convention of the 13th of December 1878.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts of 1870 and 1873, it was amongst other things enacted, that where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient :

No. 39.—APRIL 9, 1880.—1.

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the thirty-first day of March, One thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, between Her Majesty and the Swiss Confederation, for the Mutual Extradition of Fugitive Criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following:—

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the Swiss Confederation, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice and to the prevention of crime within their respective territories and jurisdictions, that persons charged with, or convicted of, the crimes hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up, have named as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Treaty for this purpose, that is to say:—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Alfred Guthrie Graham Bonar, Esquire, Her Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Swiss Confederation;

And the Federal Council of the Swiss Confederation, Joseph Martin Knüsel, Member of the Swiss Federal Council;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other those persons who, being accused or convicted of a crime committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty.

ARTICLE II.

The crimes for which the extradition is to be granted are the following:—

- (1.) Murder (including infanticide) and attempt to murder.
- (2.) Manslaughter.
- (3.) Counterfeiting or altering money, uttering or bringing into circulation counterfeit or altered money.
- (4.) Forgery, or counterfeiting, or altering, or uttering what is forged, or counterfeited, or altered; comprehending the crimes designated in the Penal Codes of either State as counterfeiting or falsification of paper money, bank-notes, or other securities, forgery or other falsification of other public or private documents, likewise the uttering or bringing into circulation, or wilfully using such counterfeited, forged, or falsified papers.
- (5.) Embezzlement or larceny.
- (6.) Obtaining money or goods by false pretences.
- (7.) Crimes against bankruptcy law.
- (8.) Fraud committed by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, or director, or member or public officer of any company made criminal by any law for the time being in force.
- (9.) Rape.
- (10.) Abduction of minors.
- (11.) Child stealing or kidnapping.
- (12.) False imprisonment.
- (13.) Burglary, or housebreaking, with criminal intent.
- (14.) Arson.
- (15.) Robbery with violence.
- (16.) Threats by letter or otherwise with intent to extort.
- (17.) Perjury or subornation of perjury.
- (18.) Malicious injury to property, if the offence be indictable.

The extradition is also to take place for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, as an accessory before or after the fact.

ARTICLE III.

No Swiss shall be delivered up by Switzerland to the Government of the United Kingdom; and no subject of the United Kingdom shall be delivered up by the Government thereof to Switzerland.

ARTICLE IV.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of the Government of the United Kingdom, or the person claimed on the part of the Swiss Government, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial, in one of the Swiss Cantons or in the United Kingdom respectively, for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of the Government of the United Kingdom, or if the person claimed on the part of the Swiss Government, should be under examination or have been condemned for any other crime, in one of the Swiss Cantons or in the United Kingdom respectively, his extradition may be deferred until he shall have been set at liberty in due course of law.

In case such individual should be proceeded against or detained in the country in which he has taken refuge, on account of obligations contracted towards private individuals, his extradition shall, nevertheless, take place; the injured party retaining his right to prosecute his claims before the competent authority.

ARTICLE V.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution, or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applied to.

NACHDEM Ihre Majestät die Königin des Vereinigten Königreichs von Grossbritannien und Irland, und die Schweizerische Eidgenossenschaft, behufs besserer Verwaltung der Rechtspflege und zur Verhütung von Verbrechen innerhalb der beiden Gebiete und Gerichtsbarkeiten es für zweckmässig befunden haben, dass Personen, welche der in diesem Vertrage aufgeführten strafbaren Handlungen beschuldigt oder wegen solcher verurtheilt und vor der Justiz flüchtig geworden sind, unter bestimmten Umständen gegenseitig ausgeliefert werden sollen; so haben sie behufs Abschlusses eines desfallsigen Vertrages zu Ihren Bevollmächtigten ernannt und zwar:

Ihre Majestät die Königin des Vereinigten Königreichs von Grossbritannien und Irland Alfred Guthrie Graham Bonar, Esquire, Ihren ausserordentlichen Gesandten und Bevollmächtigten Minister bei der Schweizerischen Eidgenossenschaft;

Und der Bundesrath der Schweizerischen Eidgenossenschaft Joseph Martin Knüsel, Mitglied des Schweizerischen Bundesrathes;

Welche, nachdem sie sich gegenseitig ihre Vollmachten mitgetheilt und dieselben in guter und gehöriger Form befunden die folgenden Artikel vereinbart und abgeschlossen haben:—

ARTIKEL I.

Die hohen vertragenden Theile verpflichten sich einander diejenigen Personen anzuliefern, welche wegen einer, auf dem Gebiete des einen Theiles begangenen strafbaren Handlung beschuldigt oder verurtheilt sind und in dem Gebiete des andern Theiles aufgefunden werden, sofern die in dem gegenwärtigen Vertrage angegebenen Fälle und Voraussetzungen vorhanden sind.

ARTIKEL II.

Die strafbaren Handlungen, wegen deren die Auslieferung zu gewahren ist, sind folgende:—

- (1.) Mord, mit Inbegriff des Kindsmordes, und Mordsversuch.
- (2.) Todtschlag.
- (3.) Nachmachen oder Verfälschen von Metallgeld, Verausgabung oder Inumlaufsetzen nachgemachten oder verfälschten Metallgeldes.
- (4.) Fälschung, Nachmachen oder Verändern, sowie die Verausgabung dessen, was nachgemacht, gefälscht oder verändert ist, inbegriffen die Verbrechen welche in den Strafgesetzen des einen oder andern Staates als Nachmachen oder Verfälschen von Papiergeld, Banknoten oder andern Werthschriften enthalten sind; ferner die Fälschung oder Verfälschung anderer öffentlicher oder Privat-Urkunden, sowie die Verausgabung, das Inverkehrbringen oder der wissentliche Gebrauch solcher nachgemachter, gefälschter oder verfälschter Papiere.
- (5.) Diebstahl und Unterschlagung.
- (6.) Betrug, resp. Erlangung von Geld oder andern Sachen durch falsche Vorspiegelungen.
- (7.) Betrügerischer Bankrott, resp. Verbrechen gegen das Gesetz betreffend Bankrott.
- (8.) Untreue Seitens eines Verwalters Beauftragten, Banquiers, Agenten, Prokuristen, Vormundes oder Kurators, Verstandes, Mitgliedes oder Beamten irgend einer Gesellschaft, soweit dieselbe nach den bestehenden Gesetzen mit Strafe bedroht ist.
- (9.) Nothzucht.
- (10.) Entführung von Minderjährigen.
- (11.) Menschenraub.
- (12.) Rechtswidriges Gefangenhalten.
- (13.) Einbrechen oder Einsteigen in ein Wohnhaus in verbrecherischer Absicht.
- (14.) Vorsätzliche Brandstiftung.
- (15.) Raub unter Anwendung von Gewalt.
- (16.) Drohungen mittels Brief oder auf andere Weise, mit der Absicht, zu erpressen.
- (17.) Meineid und die Verleitung zum Meineid.
- (18.) Böswillige Eigenthumsbeschädigung insofern sie kriminalrechtliche Verfolgung begründet.

Die Auslieferung findet auch statt wegen Theilnahme an einer der vorbezeichneten strafbaren Handlungen, mag die Theilnahme vor oder nach der Verübung stattfinden.

ARTIKEL III.

Kein Schweizer wird von Seiten der Schweiz an die Regierung des Vereinigten Königreiches und von Seiten dieser kein englischer Unterthan an die Schweiz ausgeliefert werden.

ARTIKEL IV.

Die Auslieferung soll nicht stattfinden, wenn die von der Schweizerischen Regierung verfolgte Person im Vereinigten Königreich, oder die Seitens der Regierung des Vereinigten Königreiches verfolgte Person in einem Kanton der Schweiz wegen derselben strafbaren Handlung, wegen deren die Auslieferung nachgesucht wird, in Untersuchung gewesen und ausser Verfolgung gesetzt worden, oder sich noch in Untersuchung befindet, oder bereits bestraft worden ist.

Wenn die von der Schweizerischen Regierung verfolgte Person im Vereinigten Königreich, oder wenn die Seitens der Regierung des Vereinigten Königreiches verfolgte Person in einem Kanton der Schweiz wegen einer andern strafbaren Handlung in Untersuchung liegt oder bestraft worden ist, so kann die Auslieferung verschoben werden, bis diese Person in gehörigen Rechtsgang in Freiheit gesetzt worden ist.

Wird ein solches Individuum wegen Verpflichtungen, die dasselbe mit Privatpersonen abgeschlossen hat, in jenem Lande, in welchem es Zuflucht genommen hat, gerichtlich verfolgt oder mit Personalarrest belegt, so soll dessen Auslieferung dennoch stattfinden, dabei aber der beschädigten Partei das Recht vorbehalten bleiben, ihre Aussprache vor der kompetenten Behörde geltend zu machen.

ARTIKEL V.

Die Auslieferung soll nicht stattfinden, wenn seit der begangenen strafbaren Handlung, oder der Einleitung der strafgerichtlichen Verfolgung, oder der erfolgten Verurtheilung nach den Gesetzen des ersuchten Staats Verjährung der strafgerichtlichen Verfolgung oder der erkannten Strafe eingetreten ist.

ARTICLE VI.

If the individual claimed by one of the two Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present Treaty should be also claimed by one or several other Powers, on account of other crimes committed upon their respective territories, his surrender shall be granted to that State whose demand is earliest in date; unless any other arrangement should be made between the Governments which have claimed him, either on account of the gravity of the crimes committed, or for any other reason.

ARTICLE VII.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or is connected with a crime of that nature, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try and punish him for an offence of a political character.

ARTICLE VIII.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison, or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made, for any other crime, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place.

This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

ARTICLE IX.

The requisition for extradition must always be made by the way of diplomacy, and to wit, in Switzerland by the British Minister to the President of the Confederation, and in the United Kingdom to the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs by the Consul-General of Switzerland, who, for the purposes of this Treaty, is hereby recognized by Her Majesty as a Diplomatic Representative of Switzerland.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A requisition for extradition cannot be founded on sentences passed in *contumaciam*.

ARTICLE X.

A fugitive criminal may, however, be apprehended under a warrant issued by any police magistrate, justice of the peace, or other competent authority, in either country, on such information or complaint, together with such evidence or after such judicial proceedings as would in the opinion of the officer issuing the warrant justify its issue, if the crime had been committed in that part of the dominions of the two Contracting Parties in which he exercises jurisdiction. Provided, however, that in the United Kingdom the accused shall in such case be sent as speedily as possible before a police magistrate in London. Such requisition may be made by means of the post or by telegraph.

The accused shall, however, be discharged if, within such reasonable time as, with reference to the circumstances of the case, the police magistrate may fix, the requisition shall not have been made according to the stipulations contained in Article IX.

ARTICLE XI.

The extradition shall not take place before the expiration of fifteen days from the apprehension, and then only if the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the said State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition.

ARTICLE XII.

In the examination which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as entirely valid evidence the sworn depositions or statement of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, provided such documents are signed or certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or Officer of such State, and are authenticated by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of a British Secretary of State, or of the Chancellor of the Swiss Confederation.

ARTICLE XIII.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, he shall be set at liberty.

ARTICLE XIV.

All articles seized, which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension, shall, if the competent authority of State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery thereof, be given up when the extradition

ARTIKEL VI.

Wird ein Individuum von einer der beiden Vertragsparteien auf Grund des gegenwärtigen Vertrages zur Auslieferung reklamirt, zugleich aber auch dessen Auslieferung von einer oder mehreren andern Mächten wegen andern auf deren Gebieten begangenen Verbrechen verlangt, so ist dasjenige Gesuch im Vorgange zu bewilligen, welches das älteste im datum ist, es sei denn, das zwischen den Regierungen, die das betreffende Individuum reklamirt haben, entweder wegen der Wichtigkeit der begangenen Verbrechen oder aus andern Gründen ein anderes Abkommen getroffen würde.

ARTIKEL VII.

Ein flüchtiger Verbrecher soll nicht ausgeliefert werden, wenn die strafbare Handlung, wegen deren seine Auslieferung verlangt wird, einen politischen Charakter an sich trägt, oder mit einem derartigen Verbrechen zusammenhängt, oder wenn er nachweisen kann, dass der Antrag auf seine Auslieferung in Wirklichkeit mit der Absicht gestellt worden ist, ihn wegen eines Verbrechens oder Vergehens politischer Natur zu verfolgen oder zu bestrafen.

ARTIKEL VIII.

Die ausgelieferte Person darf in dem Staate, an welchen die Auslieferung erfolgt ist, keinesfalls wegen einer andern strafbaren Handlung oder auf Grund anderer Thatsachen, als derjenigen, wegen deren die Auslieferung erfolgt ist, in Haft behalten oder zur Untersuchung gezogen werden.

Auf strafbare Handlungen, welche nach erfolgter Auslieferung verübt sind, findet diese Bestimmung keine Anwendung.

ARTIKEL IX.

Das Auslieferungsbegehren muss immer auf diplomatischem Wege gestellt werden und zwar in der Schweiz durch den Englischen Gesandten bei dem Bundespräsidenten und in Grossbritannien durch den Schweizerischen General-Konsul in London, welcher von Ihrer Majestät für die Zwecke dieses Vertrages als diplomatischer Repräsentant der Schweiz anerkannt wird, bei dem Staatssekretär für die auswärtigen Angelegenheiten.

Mit dem Gesuche auf Auslieferung eines Beschuldigten müssen ein Verhaftsbefehl welcher von der zuständigen Behörde des die Auslieferung begehrenden Staates erlassen ist, und solche Beweiss beigebracht werden, welche nach den Gesetzen des Ortes, wo der Beschuldigte aufgefunden wird, dessen Verhaftung rechtfertigen würden, wenn die strafbare Handlung dort begangen wäre.

Betrifft das Auslieferungsbegehren eine bereits verurtheilte Person, so muss das Strafurtheil beigebracht werden, welches von dem zuständigen Gericht des die Auslieferung begehrenden Staates gegen den Verurtheilten erlassen worden ist.

Auf Strafurtheile, welche in *contumaciam* erlassen worden sind, kann das Auslieferungsgesuch nicht gegründet werden.

ARTIKEL X.

Indessen kann ein flüchtiger Verbrecher in beiden Ländern auch verhaftet werden auf Grund eines Verhaftsbefehles, der von einem Polizeimagistrat, Friedensrichter, oder von einer andern kompetenten Behörde auf eine solche Strafanzeige oder Klage und zugleich auf einen solchen Beweis oder nach einem solchen gerichtlichen Verfahren erlassen wird, dass nach der Ansicht des Beamten, welcher den Verhaftsbefehl erlässt, dessen Erlass gerechtfertigt wäre, wenn das Verbrechen in demjenigen Theile der Gebiete der Vertragsparteien begangen worden wäre, in welchem der Beamte Gerichtsbarkeit ausübt. Es wird indessen bedungen, dass in dem Vereinigten Königreiche in einem solchen Falle der Beklagte so schnell wie möglich vor einen Polizeimagistrat in London gesendet werden soll. Solche Requisitionen mögen vermittels der Post oder durch den Telegraphen gemacht werden.

Der Angeklagte soll indess des Verhaftes entlassen werden, wenn inner einer billigen Frist, die von dem Polizeimagistrat anzuzeigen ist und bei deren Fixirung die Verumständungen des einzelnen Falles zu berücksichtigen sind, das Begehren nicht in Gemässheit der in Artikel IX. enthaltenen Bestimmungen gestellt worden ist.

ARTIKEL XI.

Die Auslieferung erfolgt nicht vor Ablauf von fünfzehn Tagen seit der Ergreifung und nur dann, wenn die Beweise für genügend befunden worden sind, um nach den Gesetzen des ersuchten Staates entweder die Verweisung des Ergriffenen zur Hauptuntersuchung zu rechtfertigen, falls die strafbare Handlung im Gebiet dieses Staates begangen wäre, oder darzuthun, dass der Ergriffene mit der von den Gerichten des ersuchenden Staates verurtheilten Person identisch ist.

ARTIKEL XII.

Die Behörden des ersuchten Staates haben bei der Prüfung, welche ihnen nach den vorstehenden Bestimmungen obliegt, den beschworenen Depositionen und Zeugnisaussagen, welche in dem andern Staate zu Protokoll genommen sind, desgleichen den Abschriften hievon und ebenso den im andern Staate erlassenen Haftbefehlen und Urtheilen volle Beweiskraft beizulegen, vorausgesetzt, dass diese Schriftstücke durch einen Richter, eine obrigkeitliche Person oder einen andern Beamten dieses Staates unterzeichnet oder bescheinigt und durch einen beidigten Zeugen oder durch Beidrückung des Amtssiegels eines Englischen Staatsministers oder des Schweizerischen Bundeskanzlers beglaubigt sind.

ARTIKEL XIII.

Wenn die zur Auslieferung genügenden Beweise nicht binnen zwei Monaten von dem Tage der Ergreifung des Flüchtigen an beigebracht werden, so ist der Ergriffene auf freien Fuss zu setzen.

ARTIKEL XIV.

Alle in Beschlag genommenen Gegenstände, welche sich zur Zeit der Verhaftung der auszuliefernden Person in deren Besitz waren, sollen, wenn die zuständige Behörde des um die Auslieferung ersuchten Staates die Ausantwortung derselben angeordnet

takes place, and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

ARTICLE XV.

The Contracting Parties renounce any claim for the reimbursement of the expenses incurred by them in the arrest and maintenance of the person to be surrendered, and his conveyance to the frontiers of the State from which he is required; they reciprocally agree to bear such expenses themselves.

ARTICLE XVI.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the Colonies and foreign Possessions of Her Britannic Majesty.

The requisition for the arrest and surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or foreign Possessions shall be made through the Swiss Consul-General in London to the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, who shall proceed in conformity with the provisions of the present Treaty and the laws of the land.

Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and foreign Possessions for the surrender of such individuals as shall have committed in Switzerland any of the crimes hereinafter mentioned, who may take refuge within such Colonies and foreign Possessions, on the basis, as nearly as may be, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal from any Colony or foreign Possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding Articles of the present Treaty.

ARTICLE XVII.

The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties, but shall remain in force for six months after notice has been given for its termination.

The Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratification shall be exchanged at Berne in four weeks, or sooner if possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

Done at Berne, the thirty-first day of March, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy-four.

And whereas a Protocol amending Article XVI of the aforesaid Treaty was signed by the Plenipotentiaries of Her Majesty and of the Swiss Confederation on the twenty-eighth day of November, One thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, which Protocol is in the following terms:—

THE undersigned Plenipotentiaries of Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Federal Council of the Swiss Confederation, having met in Conference, have taken into their consideration the following subject:—

They have directed their attention to the fact that the second paragraph of the XVIth Article of the Treaty, which stipulates that the requisition for the arrest of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of the Colonies or foreign Possessions of Her Britannic Majesty shall be made through the Swiss Consul-General in London to the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, was not in accordance with the law of England, and they have, consequently, resolved to declare that the second paragraph of that Article beginning:

“The requisition for the arrest,” and concluding with, “and the laws of the land,” shall be null and void, and in lieu thereof the following words shall be substituted:

“The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or foreign Possessions shall be made to the Governor or to the Supreme Authority of such Colony or Possession through the Swiss Consul, or, in case there should be no Swiss Consul, through the Consular Agent of another State charged for the occasion with the Swiss interests in the Colony or Possession in question.

“The Governor or Supreme Authority above mentioned shall decide with regard to such requisitions as nearly as possible in accordance with the provisions of the present Treaty. He will, however, be at liberty either to consent to the extradition or report the case to his Government.”

The other provisions of Article XVI remain in force as they have been agreed upon in the Treaty.

This Protocol shall be regarded and acted upon as forming part of the Treaty in question.

In witness whereof the undersigned have signed this Protocol, and have hereunto affixed their seals.

INCENDIARISM NEAR ORFORD.

TWO HUNDRED AND FIFTY POUNDS REWARD.

The births of 569 children, viz., 295 boys and 274 girls, were registered in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of February. In the month of January 672 births were registered, or 103 more than in the month under review.

The deaths registered in February numbered 432, viz., 219 of males and 213 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 137. The deaths were less than those in January by 31, and below the average of February during the previous ten years by 14. If, moreover, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been less than the average of those ten years by 66.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 96.3° on the 3rd, and the lowest was 53.3° on the 18th. The mean temperature of the month (70.39°) was by far the highest recorded for February during the past twenty years, and was nearly 4½ degrees above the average of the last ten. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (36.0°) took place on the 24th, viz., from a maximum of 96.1° to a minimum of 60.1°. The least range (3.1°) was on the 28th, viz., from a maximum of 63.5° to a minimum of 60.4°. The mean daily range was 20.0°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.925 inches) was above the average.

Males contributed 51 per cent. and females 49 per cent. to the mortality registered during the month. Deaths of children under 5 years of age amounted to 52 per cent. as against 45 per cent. in February 1879; 52 per cent. in February 1878; 51 per cent. in February 1877; 53 per cent. in February 1876; 63 per cent. in February 1875; 54 per cent. in February 1874; 53 per cent. in February 1873; 56 per cent. in February 1872; 65 per cent. in February 1871; and 55 per cent. in February 1870.

Eighteen deaths of persons of the age of 75 years and upwards were recorded during the month under notice viz.:—Those of a laborer, aged 75, who died of diarrhoea; a widow, aged 75, and a carpenter, aged 77, of bronchitis; a sailor, aged 77, of pneumonia; a widow, aged 77, of liver disease; a female, aged 78, of jaundice; a pointsman, aged 79, of dysentery; a woolsorter, aged 79, of cancer; a female, aged 79, of paralysis; a tailor, aged 80, of carbuncle; a dairyman, aged 82, of gout; a laborer, aged 83, of hepatitis; a widow, aged 85, of diarrhoea; three laborers, aged respectively 75, 81, and 84, and 2 females, each aged 82, of old age.

Twenty-five deaths from external causes were registered during the month under notice, of which 20 were ascribed to accident, 1 to homicide, and 4 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A male infant died of fracture of the skull received at birth; a mariner, aged 27, died of injuries to the head and spine caused by diving in shallow water; a waggonette driver, aged 31, died of the effects of a kick from a horse; a carter, aged 42, was killed through being thrown from a cart; a seaman, aged 50, died of injuries to the head caused by a fall down stairs; a female, aged 15, died of neglected scalds; a female, aged 58, was burnt to death; a male infant, aged 12 months, died of sunstroke; a female, aged 37, of lead poisoning; a girl, aged 6, a school-boy,

aged 8, two boys, aged 12 and 14, a lithographer, aged 16, a copper-smith, aged 24, and a seaman, aged 55, were accidentally drowned; a gentleman, aged 31, and a contractor, aged 49, were found drowned; a male and a female infant, aged 8 and 14 days respectively, were suffocated in bed. The homicidal death was that of a male infant, aged 8 months, who was murdered by the mother whilst suffering from religious mania. Of the suicidal deaths, a laborer, aged 34, shot himself; a stove and fender fitter, aged 27, drowned himself; a widow, aged 38, and a carpenter, aged 66, hanged themselves. The last three were stated to have been temporarily insane.

Seventy deaths, or 16 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—39 in the Melbourne Hospital, 7 in the Immigrants' Home, 3 in the Alfred Hospital, 4 in the Lying-in Hospital, 9 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 2 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Melbourne Gaol, 1 in the Homeopathic Hospital, and 1 in the Protestant Orphanage.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 208, of which 104, or 50 per cent., were of males, and 104, or 50 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 175 were under one year of age, 25 were between one and two, 5 were between two and three, 2 were between three and four, and 1 was between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 224. Of these, 115, or 51 per cent., were males, and 109, or 49 per cent., were females; 9 were between five and ten, 6 were between ten and fifteen, 12 were between fifteen and twenty, 16 were between twenty and twenty-five, 19 were between twenty-five and thirty, 15 were between thirty and thirty-five, 14 were between thirty-five and forty, 19 were between forty and forty-five, 20 were between forty-five and fifty, 19 were between fifty and fifty-five, 17 were between fifty-five and sixty, 12 were between sixty and sixty-five, 21 were between sixty-five and seventy, 7 were between seventy and seventy-five, 10 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 8 were upwards of eighty.

Deaths from zymotic and developmental diseases were more numerous by 8 and 19, but those from local and constitutional diseases were fewer by 50 and 13 respectively, in the month under review than in the previous one. Under the zymotic head, diarrhoea caused 61 deaths, or about a seventh of the total mortality, as against 54 deaths in January; whilst typhoid fever caused 15 deaths, as compared with 8 in the previous month. The decrease in the local class was chiefly in lung and heart diseases, the former showing a decrease of 19 and the latter of 14, as compared with the numbers in January. Forty-seven deaths in February were ascribed to atrophy and debility, 43 of the victims to which were under one year, being nearly a fourth of the total number who died at that age.

REGULATION.

WHEREAS, by *The Melbourne Harbor Trust Act 1876*, the Melbourne Harbor Trust Commissioners may from time to time, by regulation approved by the Governor in Council, alter, raise, and lower at discretion all tolls, rates, and charges which they are authorized to demand, collect, and receive under the said

Act: Now the said Commissioners, in pursuance of the said powers, do make the following Regulation, viz.:—

From and after the publication of this Regulation in the *Government Gazette* a toll rate and charge of Threepence per ton shall be payable in respect of all ballast composed of sand and shingle, or of sand or shingle respectively, landed from any vessel at any wharf, dock, pier, jetty, landing-stage, slip, or platform, within the Port of Melbourne.

SHIRE OF WARRNAMBOOL.—"HOPKINS' POINT TIMBER RESERVE."

WE, the President and Councillors of the Shire of Warrnambool, the duly appointed Committee of Management of the land at Hopkins' Point, in the parish of Mepunga, reserved for Public purposes, having framed the following Regulations for the care, protection, and management thereof, and for the preser-

vation of 'good order and decency therein, submit the said Regulations to the Board of Land and Works, to be made by such Board, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 108 of *The Land Act 1869* :—

Regulations.

1. The reserve shall be open to the public from sunrise to sunset.
2. No person shall enter or remain in the reserve who may offend against decency as regards dress, language, or conduct.
3. No person shall damage in any way the trees, shrubs, or flowers in the reserve, nor shall fires be lighted therein.
4. No person shall climb or jump over the fences or gates, stick-bills thereon, or cut names on the fences, trees, or seats, or roll or throw stones in the reserve.
5. No person shall put in the reserve any cattle, horses, goats, or pigs, or bring any dog therein unless led by a chain or cord, without the authority in writing of the Committee of Management.
6. No person shall erect any dwelling in the reserve, nor any booth or other structure for the purpose of offering for sale any article, without the consent in writing of the Committee of Management first obtained.
7. No person, except laborers and workmen employed in the reserve, shall enter any plots therein which may be enclosed for plantations of young trees or shrubs.
8. No persons shall engage in any game or sports in the reserve on Sunday.

Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with section 108 of *The Land Act 1869*, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each offence; and every person who shall knowingly and wilfully offend against any such Regulations, and who shall not, after he shall have been warned by a bailiff of Crown lands or any constable, desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable, and be taken before some justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

SHIRE OF DUNMUNKLE.—LAKE MARMA RESERVE.

Regulations for the care, management, and protection of the reserve for Public purposes in the Parish of Ashens, at Murtoa, known as "Lake Marma Reserve."

WHEREAS by a regulation of the Board of Land and Works, made on the third day of November 1879, the Council of the Shire of Dunmunkle was duly appointed a Committee of Management of the land temporarily reserved by Order of 13th day of October 1879 as a site for Public purposes in the parish of Ashens, at Murtoa, and hereinafter styled "Lake Marma Reserve": Now therefore the said Council of the Shire of Dunmunkle, having framed the following Regulations for the care, management, and protection of the said reserve, submit the same to the Board of Land and Works to be made by such Board, in accordance with the powers conferred by section 108 of *The Land Act 1869* :—

Regulations.

1. No person shall bathe in Lake Marma, or shall wash, cleanse, throw, or cause to enter therein any animal, whether alive or dead, or any rubbish, filth, stuff, or thing of any kind whatsoever, or shall cause or permit or suffer to run or be brought therein the water of any sink, sewer, drain, engine, or boiler, or other filthy, unwholesome, impure water, or shall do anything whatsoever whereby the said reserve or the water in the said Lake Marma shall be fouled, obstructed, or damaged, or whereby any culvert or drain leading thereto shall be obstructed, cut away, or damaged.
2. No person shall, without the consent in writing of the Shire Council first had and obtained, divert or convey, by open drains, pipes, or by any other means whatsoever, water from the said lake, or from any race or drain leading thereto.
3. No person shall discharge any firearms in the said reserve.

Every person offending against these regulations shall, in accordance with the provisions of section 108 of *The Land Act 1869*, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each offence; and every person who shall knowingly and wilfully offend against any such regulations, and who shall not, after he shall have been warned by a bailiff of Crown lands or any constable, desist from so offending, may

be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable, and be taken before some justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

REGULATIONS IN REGARD TO THE IMPORTATION
OF OATS AND EXPORTATION OF OATMEAL.

Act 43 Vict. No. 646, section 9.

THE Governor in Council has approved of the subjoined Regulations.

REGULATIONS.

Importers of oats will be allowed to take delivery thereof without payment of duty on importation, subject to the following regulations and conditions:-

1. Any importer of oats desirous of availing himself of these regulations must make an application in writing to the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, submitted in the names of two persons willing to become sureties to the bond, of which form is hereto annexed, in the sum of Two thousand pounds each.

2. Oats imported under these regulations must be specially entered and so described on the entry, as with goods entered for the warehouse, and the same number of copies of such entry, and will be treated in all respects as goods warehoused.

3. A Dr. account will be kept of all oats entered by such importer, and all oatmeal exported by such importer will be credited to such account, provided that a special export entry be passed for such oatmeal, to be weighed in the presence of an officer of Customs, at the expense of the applicant.

4. On the 31st March, 30th June, 30th September, and 31st December, or on such other days as may be approved of by the Commissioner of Customs, a balance will be struck of all such oats imported or of oatmeal exported by any approved importer; and if such oatmeal, in the proportion of 60 per cent. of oatmeal for every hundred pounds of such imported oats respectively, be exported, no import duty will be charged in respect of the oats the equivalent of which has been so exported.

5. Provided that, in accordance with section 9 of the Act No. 646, all oats imported by any such importer in excess of the proportion of oatmeal as aforesaid exported shall be chargeable with the usual import duty.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency The Most Honorable George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Earl of Mulgrave, Viscount Normanby, and Baron Mulgrave of Mulgrave, all in the County of York, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; and Baron Mulgrave of New Ross, in the County of Wexford, in the Peerage of Ireland; a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of the most distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

That part of the Shire of Avoca commencing at the intersection of North and High streets, in the township of Avoca; thence westerly by North street to the Avoca River; thence northerly by the Avoca River to the boundary line of the portion of the shire already proclaimed under section 14 of *The Licensing Act 1876*; thence easterly to High street; and thence southerly by High street back to the commencing point.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. All the articles are to be of the best quality of the several kinds, in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages, free from all charges for cartage, freight, &c.

2. Bread.—A sample of the best ordinarily retailed to the public will be considered as a test loaf for first quality. Second quality to be made of flour known in the trade as "best seconds," and the third quality (that issued to prisoners of the Crown) to be made of flour, fine sharps, the produce of prime, strong, thin skinned, good colored wheat, to be perfectly free from coarse pollard or other offal.

3. Milk.—The milk must be fresh, pure, and of the best quality, and subject to test when required by the department. Should the supply prove to be not of contract quality, any expense incurred will be charged to the contractor.

4. Fresh meat is to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and, when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately, also buttocks only when ordered. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than ten inches, must have been cut off. The sticking pieces must be removed from the fore quarters of beef.

5. Potatoes to be dry and free from dirt. Contractors to supply 105 lbs. of potatoes for each cental credited to them, and, in addition to take back all rejected before being cooked.

6. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department concerned.

7. The order issued by the head of department must accompany the goods, and the account is to be rendered simultaneously with the delivery of the supplies. For the supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts the account is to be rendered monthly for such quantities only as are issued, the difference between the supply and issue to be kept at the contractor's credit. Supplies not issued at the termination of the contract to be removed by the contractor. The rates or quantities quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

8. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order, they will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account.

9. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final. In the event of the decision being against the contractor, the survey fees and expenses (if any) will be deducted as in clause 8.

10. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor; failing which it will be procured by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 8.

11. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the person to whom the rations are due or to the contractor in waiting for a board of survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead; failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 8.

12. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivery or replacing them when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report of the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government to terminate the contract forthwith.

13. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

14. It will be competent for the Secretary to the Tender Board on behalf of the Government, or the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three full calendar months; it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made. It will also be competent for the Secretary to the Tender Board to terminate the contract, without notice, on infringement of condition No. 13, or should there be reason to know that the contractor takes advantage of his contract to communicate improperly with a prisoner.

15. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being broken, infringed, or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service, or by any contracts made by the Imperial Commissariat, or on account of other Governments; or by the consumption of the produce or surplus stock of any Government establishment; or by any article being made at and supplied for the use of any Government establishment.

16. In the event of any alteration in the tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Government, or the contractor, as may be the case, will make a proportionate allowance by way of deduction from or increase of the price of the item so affected.

Tenderers are to specify the kind or kinds of wood and the proportions of each kind tendered for.

The firewood for Yarra Bend is to be tendered for at per ton weight, as well as at per ton measurement.

The wood is to be split out of large forest timber of either red or white gum, box or she-oak (no other kind will be received), perfectly sound, and cut into billets not exceeding nor less than two feet in length, and not less than four inches by four inches in thickness. Neither burnt wood, heart wood, nor outside pieces of bark will be received.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The firewood to consist of either box, she-oak, red or white gum, and must be dry, perfectly sound, and of good burning quality. The charcoal must be made from redgum and be of the best quality, free from dirt or other impurities.

2. The orders will be issued by the departments requiring the supplies; and should an order not be complied with within forty-eight hours, it will be competent for the department concerned to purchase at the contractor's risk, and to deduct from the contractor's account the extra expense (if any) over and above the contract price.

3. The contractor for firewood will be bound to supply the description of wood named in the order, and to place the same in separate stacks of two feet in width and five feet high for measurement, on such ground as may be pointed out, a space being left between each stack. In case the firewood for Yarra Bend is required to be supplied at per ton weight, the contractor will be bound to weigh the wood upon the Asylum weigh-bridge. Each load to be tared separately. The weigh-bridge ticket to be rendered in support of the account. Firewood, when ordered by weight, is not to be stacked by the contractor, but it must be deposited on such ground as may be pointed out.

4. As soon as the orders shall have been completed, the contractor will be required to furnish his account in the prescribed form, with the order attached thereto, to the department supplied. Accounts will be payable at the Treasury, Melbourne, Ballarat, or Geelong, as the contractor may require.

5. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supply as to the quality, the same is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered as final.

6. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense (if any) will be deducted from the contractor's account.

7. If from any cause injury would accrue to the public service by waiting for a board of survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of station, will have the power to reject such articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged as in condition 6.

8. A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, or of refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor to such mulct not exceeding £50 as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

9. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

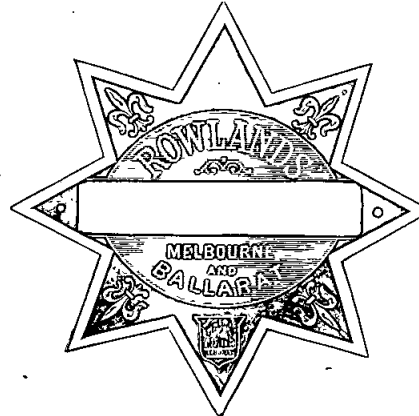
