BOROUGH OF ESSENDON AND FLEMINGTON.

PROPOSED SEVERANCE OF AREA, AND CONSTITUTION OF A NEW BOROUGH.

IN pursuance of the provisions of *The Local Government Act* 1874 (No. 506, sec. 46), the substance and prayer of a Petition, in accordance with the 44th section of the said Act, which has been presented to His Excellency the Governor, are published, viz.:—

The petitioners purport to constitute a majority of the rate-payers in the portion of the Borough of Essendon and Flemington which is described in their petition, and they desire that the area so described may be severed from the Borough of Essendon and Flemington and constituted a separate municipality under the title of the Borough of Flemington and Kensington.

Area described in the petition:—

Bounded on the north by Moonee Ponds; on the south and east by Moonee Ponds Creek; and on the west by the Saltwater River.

Petitioners state that they represented the Flemington and Kensington Ward of the Borough; that the members of the other wards have, by their votes, deprived them of a fair proportion of the revenue to which they are entitled; that a large portion of the income has been wasted in useless law suits; that, notwithstanding the large increase in population and revenue, there is very little more macadamised road in their ward than there was ten years ago; that their property is seriously injured by this neglect, and they fully believe that the income derivable from this ward (if spent under their own control) would increase the value of their property, and attract a large population to the district.

Petitioners therefore pray that their case may be taken into favorable consideration, and that your Excellency will exercise the powers conferred by *The Local Government Act* 1874 by severing the Flemington and Kensington Ward from the Borough of Essendon and Flemington, and constituting it a separate municipality, under the title of the Borough of Flemington and Kensington.

REGULATION RELATING TO RACES, DRAINS, ETC.

THE Governor in Council has cancelled the Order of the 12th January 1881, published in the *Government Gazette* of the 21st January 1881, and in lieu thereof has made the following additional Regulation relating to licenses to cut, construct, and use Races, Drains, Dams, and Reservoirs under *The Mining Statute 1865*, viz.:—

The grants of licenses to cut and use races shall be subject to the following conditions, in addition to those already prescribed by the Governor in Council:—

IX. Any miners engaged in washing auriferous earth by means of a tub or cradle or both shall be permitted to use, free of charge, from the race held under the authority of such license, the water necessary for the same, provided that no coarse tailings or silt produced by such operations shall be deposited in such race without the consent of the licensee.

X. Nevertheless the licensee may refuse such permission if, in the opinion of the Minister of Mines for the time being, the privilege granted shall have been abused.

XI. Subject to the reservations contained in such license, no water shall be sold by the licensee or used for any other purpose than for the working of mines in his occupation, except upon such terms and conditions as shall, from time to time, be approved in writing by the Minister of Mines.

XII. Nevertheless it shall be lawful for the licensee, with the consent of the Minister of Mines, from time to time, to alter and vary the manner, terms, and conditions in and upon which such water shall be used or sold, but no such alteration or variation shall take effect until the approval, in writing, of the Minister shall have been obtained.

NOTE.—All permissions granted under the XIth and XIIth conditions above mentioned shall be recorded in the office of the Warden for public information.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled *An Act for Hospitals and Charitable Institutions*, it was amongst other things enacted, that any institution established for the cure of disease, or for the relief of diseased, aged, incurable, or destitute persons, and supported in whole or in part by the voluntary contributions of not less than fifty persons, each of whom should have paid not less than One pound per annum or Twenty pounds in one donation, might be incorporated as thereafter mentioned, and all persons who should have paid as aforesaid should be deemed contributors within the meaning of the said Act; and it was also enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor in Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than twenty-five of the said persons praying that such institution might be incorporated, to cause the substance or prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition, signed by an equal or greater number of such persons, should have been delivered at the office of the Chief

Secretary within one month after the date of such publication) the Governor in Council might declare the contributors for the time being to such institution to be, and they should thereupon become and continue, a body politic and corporate by the style and title named in the Order in Council, and should have perpetual succession and a common seal: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition, signed by not less than twenty-five contributors to the institution known as the Colac District Hospital, praying that the said institution may be incorporated: And whereas the substance or prayer of the said petition has been published in the *Government Gazette*, and no counter-petition has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, declare the contributors for the time being to the institution called and known as the Colac District Hospital, situated at Colac, in the colony of Victoria, to be a body politic and corporate by the style and title of "The Colac District Hospital."

SOUTH ENTRANCE TO MORETON BAY.

By following the directions published in April last, for using the South entrance to Moreton Bay, with the leading beacons open twice their width to the northward, vessels cannot now depend on carrying more than 13 feet at low-water springs.

With the beacons open to the southward one width, they can carry 10 feet, and from 4 to 8 widths, 11 feet.

When the state of the bar, however, will allow a vessel to haul up with the sea abeam, a depth of from 15 to 16 feet at low-water springs can be carried as follows:—

Cross the bar with the beacons open to the northward about three times their own width, and steer for the North break until a small sand cliff on the Amity Point shore comes in line with the dip near the western end of the high land at the back of the point. Steer with these in line until the North break is passed, when keep away for the main channel between the North and South breaks.

A Monsieur le Ministre de l'Agriculture et du Commerce, Paris.
Monsieur le Ministre.—La Société Philomathique de Bordeaux a décidé d'ouvrir en 1882 sa XII^{ème} Exposition générale des Produits de l'Agriculture et de l'Industrie, des Arts industriels et de l'Art ancien.

Avant d'indiquer sommairement le programme de cette Exposition et les considérations qui nous ont amenés à la décider, permettez-nous de rappeler à grands traits l'origine de notre Société, ses développements et les services qu'elle a rendus à la population bordelaise.

Fondée en 1808, sous la seule initiative et par les seules ressources de quelques hommes de bien, c'est à la Société Philomathique que revient l'honneur d'avoir organisé à Bordeaux les premières solennités musicales, les premières Expositions de peinture et de sculpture; c'est elle qui a créé, longtemps avant l'établissement des facultés actuelles, des cours publics et gratuits de haut enseignement et de langues vivantes, qui a organisé des lectures et des conférences et institué des bibliothèques publiques, à une époque où nul exemple ne l'y encourageait.

C'est elle enfin qui a ouvert à Bordeaux, si ce n'est en France, les premières écoles d'adultes (1839) et constitué cet enseignement professionnel auquel toute la population ouvrière accourt avec un empressement toujours croissant.

C'est de sa tige féconde qu'elle a vu s'élever tour à tour la Société Linnéenne, le Cercle Philharmonique, la Société d'Agriculture, celle des Amis des Arts, etc., etc., et si elle a été la première à applaudir aux succès mérités de ces diverses compagnies, elle a le droit incontestable et incontesté de revendiquer l'honneur de leur création (*).

C'est par des progrès incessants et en adaptant son œuvre aux nécessités de chaque époque, que la Société en est venue, aujourd'hui, à consacrer toute son activité à ses deux manifestations les plus importantes : ses classes d'apprentis et d'adultes et ses Expositions industrielles.

Nos classes d'adultes existent depuis 1839. En 1863, nous y avons ajouté des cours destinés aux apprentis de douze à quinze ans, et en 1867, nous avons pu couronner notre édifice scolaire par la création de classes de femmes adultes dont le succès a dépassé toutes nos espérances.

Actuellement nos classes gratuites du soir comprennent l'enseignement primaire, commercial et professionnel : elles comptent trente-trois cours, vingt-huit professeurs, et reçoivent plus de deux mille élèves, apprentis ou adultes, et plus de quatre cents femmes adultes.

Rappelons enfin la part honorable prise par nos élèves aux Expositions universelles de Paris, où, malgré des conditions absolument défavorables, nous avons obtenu :

En 1867, une médaille de bronze;

En 1878, une médaille d'argent.

De tels services ont valu à notre société, en outre de l'estime et de la reconnaissance publiques, des subventions annuelles accordées par le Conseil général, la Municipalité, la Chambre de Commerce, subventions qui sont moins un secours matériel qu'une preuve de patronage et de sympathie.

C'est à ces mêmes résultats que nous devons aussi la subvention importante que votre ministère nous accorde depuis un certain nombre d'années et qui nous est doublement précieuse.

Au point de vue des expositions, notre action n'a pas été moins considérable. La première date de 1827 : elle était à la fois artistique et industrielle; elle comprenait cinq départements et réunissait une soixantaine d'exposants.

Ce n'est pas sans quelque fierté, qu'à côté de ces humbles commencements, nous pouvons rappeler :

En 1854, la IX^{ème} Exposition, sous la présidence de M. Alphand, où les produits de l'agriculture et de l'industrie sont seuls admis, à l'exclusion des beaux-arts, mais dont le concours s'étend à toute la France. Inaugurée par M. Heurtier, délégué de M. le Ministre des Travaux publics, elle reçoit plus de 600 exposants et se termine sans déficit.

En 1859, la X^{ème} Exposition, sous la présidence de M. Alexandre Léon, est étudiée en mission spéciale par M. Audiganne, délégué du Ministère de l'Agriculture et du Commerce, et honorés de la visite du chef de l'Etat. Elle compte 1,308 exposants et se solde par un bénéfice de plus de 20,000 francs. C'est aussi à cette exposition qu'il faut rattacher le décret impérial du 27 juillet 1859, déclarant la Société Philomathique Établissement d'utilité publique.

En 1865, la XI^{ème} et dernière Exposition, sous la présidence de M. Émile Fourcaud, ancien maire de Bordeaux et actuellement sénateur inamovible, admet, en outre de l'Algérie et des Colonies les produits de l'Espagne et du Portugal. Elle compte 2,058 exposants et reçoit plus de 200,000 visiteurs; malgré l'élévation du chiffre des dépenses, le déficit de l'entreprise n'est que de 8,000

frances, bien compensé d'ailleurs par l'augmentation du nombre des membres de la Société.

C'est cette tradition non interrompue de progrès accompli et de services rendus que nous avons décidé de reprendre en 1882.

Même après les expositions universelles des grandes capitales, et sans méconnaître les modifications qu'elles ont dû subir dans ces derniers temps, nous avons persisté à penser que ces manifestations n'en ont pas moins gardé un caractère sérieux et une utilité pratique incontestables.

Comme par le passé, elles sont encore utiles à l'industrie dont elles stimulent les progrès et vulgarisent les procédés, utiles aux populations dont elles développent l'intelligence et dont elles forment le goût, en même temps qu'elles établissent entre les producteurs et les consommateurs des rapports avantageux au bien-être du tous.

Notre XI^e Exposition ne se contentera pas de grouper autour d'elle tous les progrès et toutes les conquêtes de l'Agriculture et de l'Industrie.

Sans agrandir le champ géographique de sa devancière, qui comprenait la France, l'Algérie, les Colonies, l'Espagne et le Portugal, elle devra faire une plus large part à certains éléments sociaux qui jouent un rôle de plus en plus marqué dans la vie des peuples modernes. Conférences, questions d'hygiène et d'enseignement, réunions pédagogiques, matériel scolaire, résultats comparés des écoles et des méthodes diverses, participation des ouvriers dans le travail, institutions de prévoyance en leur faveur, il nous paraît qu'il y a là tout un ensemble d'études et de préoccupations nouvelles, bien fait pour mériter les sympathies d'un gouvernement aussi libéral et aussi éclairé que le nôtre.

Dans un autre ordre d'idées et pour ne parler que du produit qui intéresse le plus notre région, nous voulons donner à l'exposition des vins un caractère d'universalité et d'authenticité qu'elle n'a jamais présenté : par une exception que justifient les difficultés agricoles et commerciales contre lesquelles nous luttons actuellement, nous appellerons à figurer à côté de nos vins Français, les vins de l'Espagne, du Portugal, ceux de l'Italie, de la Hongrie, de la Russie, de l'Amérique même et de l'Australie ; et pour la première fois, nos visiteurs trouveront dans nos galeries un champ complet d'études et de comparaisons dont le négociant, le producteur et le consommateur ne manqueront pas de tirer parti.

Tel est, Monsieur le Ministre, le programme que nous avons à cœur de réaliser : nous y serons aidés par les sympathies qui nous entourent, par tous ceux à la compétence et au zèle desquels nous avons l'intention de faire appel, par les Ministères eux-mêmes qui voudront bien nous accorder le concours de leurs expositions spéciales.

Nous vous demanderons plus tard de vouloir bien accepter la présidence d'honneur de notre exposition ; nous avons même cette ambition de la voir honorée de la visite du Président de la République, et aucun effort ne nous coûtera pour la rendre digne de telles faveurs.

Mais en présence des dépenses considérables auxquelles nous aurons à faire face, la Société ne peut oublier qu'elle est riche que de son dévouement et de l'autorité que lui donne son passé ; elle a dû, en conséquence, s'adresser au Conseil Général, à la Municipalité, à la Chambre de Commerce, aux grandes lignes de chemins de fer, et leur demander de l'aider à constituer une sorte de fonds de garantie, la mettant à l'abri des pertes possibles qu'elle ne serait pas en mesure de supporter.

Déjà cet appel a été entendu. Dans sa séance du 22 avril, le Conseil municipal a voté en faveur de la XI^e Exposition, une subvention de 50,000 francs et dans sa réunion du 11 mai, la Chambre de Commerce, non moins généreuse, a voté en notre faveur une somme de 25,000 francs.

Le Conseil général, les Compagnies du Midi et d'Orléans ne se montreront pas moins bienveillants. Mais dans une entreprise qui touche de si près aux intérêts généraux du pays, il est un autre concours qui sera la plus haute signification des patronages dont nous avons besoin pour assurer notre succès : c'est celui de l'État. C'est ce concours, Monsieur le Ministre, que nous venons vous demander aujourd'hui avec la plus entière confiance.

En 1872, et dans des circonstances analogues, le gouvernement a bien voulu accorder un crédit de 200,000 francs à l'Exposition de Lyon ; l'Exposition de Bordeaux ne vous paraîtra pas mériter une moindre marque de bienveillance. Les résultats de nos précédentes expositions, les subventions déjà accordées, celles que nous attendons encore, nous autorisent à croire que cette somme sera loin d'être absorbée par les résultats de l'entreprise. C'est donc sans crainte de l'avenir que nous appelons votre attention sur les dispositions de remboursement éventuel, que nous avons été les premiers à soumettre à la Ville et à la Chambre de Commerce.

Il serait, en effet, bien convenu que dans le cas probable où le montant de nos recettes laisserait intact tout ou partie de l'ensemble de nos subventions, le reliquat en serait restitué, au prorata, à chacun de nos donateurs.

Nous pouvons le dire sans dépasser la mesure sympathies locales que notre XI^e Exposition a déjà groupées autour d'elle : ce n'est pas seulement la Société Philomathique, c'est le Conseil Général, la Ville de Bordeaux, la Chambre de Commerce, qui demandent à l'État, par votre intermédiaire, de s'associer dans la plus large mesure à une œuvre d'intérêt général qui leur appartient autant qu'à nous-mêmes. La grandeur de cette entreprise, les services qu'elle doit rendre, la confiance que mérite notre passé, le dévouement si énergique et si éclairé que vous apportez vous-même, Monsieur le Ministre, à la défense des intérêts qui vous sont confiés, tout nous est garant que nous trouverons auprès de vous l'accueil favorable et le concours personnel que nous sollicitons pour la demande de la Société Philomathique.

Nous avons l'honneur d'être, avec respect, Monsieur le Ministre, vos très humbles et très respectueux serviteurs.

Art. 5.
Un règlement spécial déterminera les conditions de l'envoi, de la réception, et de la réexpédition des produits.

Art. 6.
Les produits à exposer devront être rendus à destination avant le 1^{er} mai 1882. Passé ce délai, aucun produit ne pourra plus être admis.

Art. 7.

Le Jury s'entourera de toutes les garanties qu'il jugera nécessaires à l'accomplissement de sa mission. Il aura toujours le droit d'exclure du concours tout Exposant qui aurait tenté de surprendre sa bonne foi.

Art. 24.
Le Jury appréciera la part que les ouvriers pourront avoir dans les progrès constatés. Ces ouvriers seront compris, s'il y a lieu, dans la distribution des récompenses.

Art. 25.
Les récompenses décernées par la Société consisteront en *Diplômes d'honneur*, en *Médailles d'or*, d'*argent*, de *bronze*, et en *Mentions honorables*.

Le titre de *Membre honoraire de la Société* pourra être aussi conféré par l'Assemblée générale, sur la proposition du Comité d'Administration.

Art. 26.
La séance de Distribution des récompenses aura lieu immédiatement après la clôture de l'Exposition.

The births of 720 children, viz., 380 boys and 340 girls, were registered in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of November. In the month of October 752 births were registered, or 32 more than in the month under review. The births were 54 above the average of the previous seven years, but 20 below that average, if allowance be made for increase of population.

The deaths registered in November numbered 440, viz., 260 of males and 180 of females ; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 280. The deaths exceeded those in October by 43, and were the same number in excess of the average of November during the previous ten years. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been less than the average of those ten years by 18.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 92° on the 13th, and the lowest was 43° on the 5th. The mean temperature of the month (59°1') was slightly below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (36°12') took place on the 12th, viz., from a maximum of 89°5' to a minimum of 53°4'. The least range (6°5') was on the 17th, viz., from a maximum of 57°8' to a minimum of 51°3'. The mean daily range was 17°3'. The mean atmospheric pressure (29·812 inches) was slightly below the average.

Males contributed 59 per cent. and females 41 per cent. to the mortality of the month. Children under the age of 5 years contributed 38 per cent. to that mortality as against 41 per cent. in 1880; 39 per cent. in November 1879; 35 per cent. in November 1878; 42 per cent. in November 1877 and 1876; 46 per cent. in November 1875; 47 per cent. in November 1874; 42 per cent. in November 1873; 48 per cent. in November 1872; and 42 per cent. in November 1871.

Eighteen deaths of persons aged 75 years or upwards were recorded during the month, viz.:—Those of a gentleman aged 76, of mitral valvular disease; a needlewoman and a female of occupation unstated, both aged 77, of congestion of the lungs and erysipelas respectively; two gentlemen, both aged 79, of paralysis and bronchitis respectively; a dealer, a solicitor, a female servant, and a female of unspecified occupation, all aged 80, of dysentery, apoplexy, disease of the brain, and paralysis respectively; a gardener, a shepherd, and a female, all aged 77, a laborer aged 79, a builder aged 82, a female aged 83, a shipwright and a female, both aged 84, and a gentleman aged 87, of old age.

Of the deaths registered during the month 25 were due to external causes, of which 21 were ascribed to accident and 4 to suicide. The particulars of the deaths from accident are as follow:—A musician, aged 55, was killed by coming in contact with a railway train in motion; a jockey, aged 19, died of fracture of the leg, caused by a fall from his horse during the race for the Melbourne Cup; a boy, aged 10, a male of occupation not stated, aged 19, and a farmer aged 21, died of fractures caused by being thrown out of vehicles; a carter, aged 51, was killed by being knocked down by a horse in a dray; a laborer, aged 43, died of injury to the head, the result of a fall; a blacksmith, aged 53, died of fracture of the arm; a laborer aged 18, and a farmer, aged 44, died of accidental gunshot wounds.—In the former case the accident was caused by the gun having caught in a fence, and in the latter by a boy meddling with the gun; a boy aged 4, and a female aged 65, died of burns, their clothes having caught fire; two male children, aged 12 months and 3 years respectively, died of scalds—the former through the upsetting of a kettle, and the latter by falling into a bucket of boiling water; a grocer, aged 72, died of poisoning by chlorodyne, self administered; a male school teacher aged 21, and a female aged 22, were "found drowned" near the Moorabbin Beach, and a laborer aged 19, a boy aged 6, and a laborer aged 33, were accidentally drowned—the two latter whilst bathing; a female infant, aged 21 days, was suffocated in bed. Of those who committed suicide, a town clerk, aged 45, shot himself; a female boarding-house keeper aged 40, and another female aged 61, poisoned themselves with strychnine; and a shoemaker, aged 63, drowned himself.

Ninety-two deaths, or 21 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—53 in the Melbourne Hospital, 9 in the Immigrants' Home, 1 in the Children's Hospital, 5 in the Alfred Hospital, 6 in the Lying-in Hospital, 4 in the Benevolent Asylum, 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 6 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, and 2 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 168, of which 97, or 58 per cent., were of males, and 71, or 42 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 126 were under one year of age, 29 were between one and two, 3 were between two and three, and 6 were between three and four, and 4 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 272. Of these, 163, or 60 per cent., were males, and 109, or 40 per cent., were females; 12 were between five and ten, 11 were between ten and fifteen, 19 were between fifteen and twenty, 21 were between twenty and twenty-five, 12 were between twenty-five and thirty, 15 were between thirty and thirty-five, 19 were between thirty-five and forty, 19 were between forty and forty-five, 26 were between forty-five and fifty, 19 were between fifty and fifty-five, 20 were between fifty-five and sixty, 27 were between sixty and sixty-five, 17 were between sixty-five and seventy, 17 were between seventy and seventy-five, 9 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 9 were upwards of eighty.

In the month under review, as compared with the previous one, deaths from zymotic diseases increased by 35, of which 27 were attributable to dysentery and diarrhoea, and 5 to typhoid fever. Deaths from phthisis also increased by 8, the numbers in the two months being respectively 47 and 55. Six deaths were set down to childbirth and metria in the month under notice, which brings the total number of deaths in childbirth since the beginning of the year up to 87. Compared with the births registered, this number gives a proportion of 1 death of a mother to every 97 births.

CROWN LANDS DEPARTMENT—SURVEY BRANCH. PUPIL SURVEYORS AND DRAUGHTSMEN.

APPLICATIONS will be received, addressed to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners, up to Thursday, 12th of January next, from candidates desirous of being appointed as Pupil Surveyors and Draughtsmen in connection with this Department.

CONDITIONS.

An applicant must be not more than twenty years or less than sixteen years of age; he will be required to produce a medical certificate to the effect that he is of sound constitution and not affected with any physical infirmity which could interfere with the proper exercise of his profession.

He must possess one of the following qualifications:—Having matriculated at the Melbourne or other recognized University, passing in Algebra, Euclid, and Arithmetic; or, having passed the Civil Service Examination, including the subjects above named; or, he shall produce such a certificate as to his competency in those three subjects as shall satisfy the Board of Examiners for Authorized Surveyors. He shall also, with such certificate, send in a specimen of his plan drawing.

COMPETITIVE EXAMINATION.

Having duly complied with the foregoing requirements he will undergo a competitive examination in trigonometrical computation, plotting, and plan drawing, on Monday, 16th of January, when the two competitors to whom shall be awarded a sufficient number of points by the Board of Examiners will be recommended for appointment, subject to the regulations of the department as to probation.

TERM OF SERVICE.

The pupil's service in the department will be for a term of four years, the first two of which will be served in the office, where

he will be engaged in drawing and computing; he will then (if thought necessary) be examined in trigonometry, including computation of areas and reduction of traverse surveys, also plotting for field-book and plan drawing. If his progress up to this time is not deemed satisfactory, he will be liable to be dispensed with, but, if satisfactory, he will be placed under a departmental surveyor for two years for field practice.

Afterwards he will have the privilege of attending for two months at the Melbourne Observatory, where he will be instructed in such branches of practical astronomy as are necessary for the duties he may be called on to perform as a qualified surveyor.

He will be allowed to present himself at the next ensuing examination for land surveyors (without payment of fees), for the purpose of obtaining the formal certificate of the Board of Examiners as to his qualifications.

REMUNERATION.

He will receive the following remuneration during the term of his pupillage:—1st year, £52; 2nd year, £52; 3rd year, £60; 4th year, £84.

SUBJECT TO REGULATIONS.

During the whole term of his pupillage and service in the department he shall be subject to the Regulations for the Civil Service of Victoria dated 31st of December 1866, or any subsequent substituted or additional regulations.

Printed forms of tender and conditions of contract may be obtained from the Secretary, Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne, or from the officer in charge of police at any station, by whom also information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

As much forage as can be stored at any station where the storage is small, will, for the convenience of the contractor, be ordered at one time.

The price, which must be expressed in words as well as in figures, and without alterations, erasures, or discrepancies, must be per cental of 100 lbs. (net weight), including delivery at the stations and all charges except the bags, which will remain the property of the contractor. At stations where the bags can be at once emptied, the contractor will be required to remove them when delivery is taken. At other stations notice will be sent to the contractor when the bags are empty. Bags to be removed at contractor's expense.

Tenders, which should be upon the printed form, will be received for either oats, bran, hay, or straw (the particular kind of hay or straw offered to be stated); but if all be included in one tender, it may be accepted for one article only, if advisable. Telegrams will not be entertained.

Tenders not complying with the terms of advertisement will not be entertained.

The successful tenderer will be required to enter into a bond for one-third of the estimated amount of the contract within ten days after the acceptance is notified. Two approved sureties are required for contracts amounting to £150 and upwards, and one surety for contracts under £150.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders, or failing to carry out their contract satisfactorily, will be ineligible to again hold contracts for Government supplies.

Tenders must be enclosed in an envelope, marked "Tender for Forage," and deposited in the Tender-Box, Pay Office, Treasury, Melbourne; or, if sent by post, they must be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known by *Gazette* notice, and by letter to accepted tenderers.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The hay to be good, sound, and sweet, and properly trussed; the straw to be wheaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats (Victorian grown) and bran to be sound and sweet and of the best description; chaff to be made from oat hay of the best quality; the maize to be of the best quality.

2. The supplies are for police, telegraph, and other horses, and are to be delivered on the order of the officer in charge of the district or station. The quantities stated in the schedule being only approximate, it must be understood that the Government may draw either more or less than those mentioned; and should new telegraph stations be formed, or additional horses required to be stationed at any of the stations, the contractor will be required to supply the additional forage. Should the additional number of horses, however, exceed two, the contractor may, if he desires it, terminate the contract by supplying at once the whole quantity due at the station under the contract according to the foregoing schedule.

3. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by the particulars of quantity, showing the net weight, to be endorsed on the back of the order, which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

4. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own accounts in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the district, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

5. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours of the time specified in the order for delivery, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

6. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to the quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering the supply, and the decision of the Board is to be considered final.

7. If the Board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 5.

8. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 5.

9. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of the delay in delivering or replacing it when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £20, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

10. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

11. It will be competent for the Secretary of the Tender Board, on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice can only be given from the 1st day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th September 1882; and in the event of a station being discontinued or any change in the supplies required, the contractor will receive the earliest possible intimation.

SHEPPARTON, WARANGA, AND YARRAWONGA WEIGHTS AND MEASURES UNION.

BY-LAW No. 1.

A By-Law made under section 30 of the "Weights and Measures Statute 1864," and numbered 1, for regulating the meetings for the transaction of the business of the Union, appointment of Chairman, &c., and fixing the amount of Fees to be paid to the Inspector for examining and comparing Weights and Measures within the said Union.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the "Weights and Measures Statute 1864," the Councils of the Shires of Shepparton, Waranga, and Yarrowonga, proclaimed under the said Statute to be a Union for the purposes of the said Act, order as follows:—

The Councils of the said Shires forming the said Union doth further order that by-law No. 1 shall be—

1. *Ordinary meetings.*—That the Union shall hold ordinary meetings for the transaction of general business at the Shire Hall, Shepparton, half-yearly, on the second Tuesday in the months of December and June, and the secretary shall have power to fix the hours at which such meetings shall be held.

2. *Special meetings.*—Two members of the Union, or the secretary, shall have power to call special meetings for the

transaction of special business. No meeting of the Union shall be held unless six clear days' notice thereof, at least, be given to each of the members of said Union.

3. *Election of chairman.*—On the day of the December meeting in each year, the members present shall proceed to the election of a chairman.

4. *Quorum.*—All powers vested in the Union may be exercised at any legally constituted meeting, by any three members present, and no business shall be transacted at any meeting of the Union unless the said number of members be respectively present.

5. *Adjournment of meetings.*—The members present at any meeting may from time to time adjourn such meeting, and if at any meeting of the council there be not present within half an hour after the time appointed for holding such meeting the number of members hereby authorized to exercise the powers vested in the Union, the members present, or the major part of them, or any one member (if only one be present), or the secretary if no member be present, may adjourn such meeting to any time not further distant than fourteen days from the date of such adjournment.

6. *Fees for comparisons.*—The following fees shall be paid to the Inspector of Weights and Measures, for the time being, for the said Union, for comparing any weights, measures, scales, balances, steelyards, beams, or other weighing machines, with the "authorized copies" of the standard weights and measures in his possession according to the said Act, viz.:—

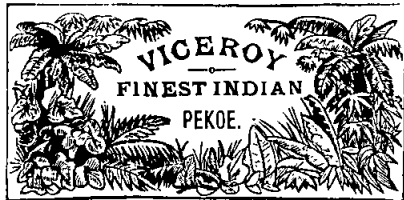
